#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON MISSIONS.

The Committee on Missions made the following report, which was discussed by G. T. Leitner, W. N. Chaudoin and N. A. Bailey.

God is the author of missions. He saw lost and fallen man and sent His Son into the world to perfect a plan whereby man might be saved, rescued. That Son, whom God loved, called man to His help in proclaiming that wonderful salvation, commissioning them to "go into all the world and teach all nations." Thus Jesus became the great founder of a great truth—missions. "Ask of me

and I will give thee the heathen for thine inheritance, and the uttermost part of the earth for a possession." And yet, there are those who are asking the question, "Can't the heathen be saved without the Gospel?" Mr. Spurgeon aptly replied, "It is not a question of the heathen, but can we be saved if we refuse to send the Gospel to the heathen?" The work is immense, the field the world. The darkness is great. Do we really believe in missions? It is said that the Mormons have one missionary to every seventy members. The Baptists, one to every 12,500. Can we expect a great harvest of spiritual blessings at home when so many seem to refuse to heed the great conmand, "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." Go, we must, and proclaim the glad tidings of good news to all.

The harvest is great, but the laborers are few. The doors are open, the Macedonian cry is, "Come over and help us," both from the field and the missionaries. Our fathers prayed to God to open the doors of the nations. Those, long locked by superstition, prejudice, governmental pride, avarice and iniquity, have all been opened, with a single exception, one in Central Asia. Workers are ready. Men and women are waiting, begging to be sent as missionaries. These are among our brightest and best. They cannot be sent for lack of funds. Whose fault is it? Oh! may God help us to hear the words of the Master, "Go forward!"

God is blessing our work very graciously. Many baptisms are reported from different fields, cheering news from all around. Courage, brethren, laborers together with God, the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and his Christ. Remember, Christ's method is individual effort, and, while he masses us into churches, it is that we may exhort one another and provoke one another to love and good works. May we all be filled with His Spirit and so accomplish His will.

Organize; combine your efforts; despise not the day of small things; talk and sing and pray together over the perishing, and then put your offerings into the Lord's treasury and send it on the wing of your prayers, to bless the nations. Brethren, help the sisters. Encourage them. Arrange for them to have their meetings. Divide your money with them. Don't give it all yourself. Let your wives and daughters have the pleasure and blessing of giving. Let every church have its woman's mission society and let every sister be a member.

#### REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

The Committee on Temperance made the following report, which was discussed by D. B. Farmer, B. R. Moseley, D. Spencer, W. N. Chaudoin, Geo. T. Leitner and R. B. Weeks.

It is unnecessary for us to attempt to describe the evil results of intemperance. All true Christians recognize the fact that bar-rooms and dram-drinking demoralize society, destroy moral character and are enemies to the cause of Christ. The habitual use of strong drink hardens the hearts of sinners and, in many cases, renders them almost impervious to the Gospel; and even when they are converted the habit often returns and injures their influence as church members. One of the great hindrances to the progress of christianity is intemperance within the ranks of religious organizations.

Therefore, we recommend the following rules of action: I. That our pastors not only gather facts with respect to the effects of intemperance on morality and religion, but also acquaint themselves with the effects of alcohol on the bodies of those who drink habitually and in sermons or lectures instruct the people more thoroughly and emphatically than they generally have done in the past. 2. That we reaffirm the position heretofore taken by this Association that the churches should declare their opposition to the iniquitous liquor traffic by withdrawing

fellowship from all members who sign petitions for barroom license, or in any way sanction and encourage the sale and use of intoxicating beverages, except they repent and promise not to repeat the offense. 3. That Christians should carry their principles into all political work and not support candidates for office who patronize barrooms, or favor the liquor business and will not help in making and executing laws against this terrible curse. We should vote as we believe and pray.

In this connection we are glad to report that several of our young men, who have been called to the ministry, have entered the University at DeLand, and we urge that the churches of this Association make special contributions for their benefit. The present times demand an educated ministry, and Baptists should continue to move forward in this great, important work.

#### CONSTITUTION.

1. The Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.

2. This Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and who must present letters from their respective churches certifying to their election as messengers.

3. The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.

4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.

5. Any Baptist church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from which it comes.

6 This admits the right of any one of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council and shall treat the churches comprising it as independent bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for busi-

ness. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and shall have power to fill vacancies.

9. The Associational Mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them or whenever called upon to do so.

10. All churches shall be entitled to two messengers for the first fifty members and one additional messenger for each twenty-five members after the first fifty and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by order of the Association or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association, by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present.
