MINUTES

The Messengers of the Santa Fe River Baptist Association assembled October 22, 1902, in its forty-sixth session with the Oehwilla Baptist Church, at McMeekin, Fla., for the purpose of organization and business.

In the absence of the Rev. F. J. Fowler, the appointee for the introduction sermon, Rev. J. B. Holley, of Gainesville, Fla., was elected, and preached from Rev. 1:18, after which service the session adjourned for dinner.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Messengers were called together by Moderator promptly at 1 o'clock p. m. After singing "To the Work," and prayers by Rev. H. C. Martin, the Moderator stated that in the absence of F. J. Fowler, Clerk for last Association, it would be necessary to elect a temporary Clerk. Upon motion, Bro. J. B. Holley was elected Clerk pro tem.

Letters from the Church were then called for, and Bros. H. C. Martin and B. R. Moseley appointed to read them.

After singing "Wonderful Words of Life," and prayer by J. B. Holley, the Association adjourned until 9 a. m. the following day, Thursday.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION.

Oct. 23, 1902.

After devotion exercises, conducted by the Moderator and Rev. L. D. Geiger, the minutes of previous day were read and approved. The call for letters was resumed, to which Rochelle responded. Rev. L. D. Geiger, Corresponding Secretary of the State Board of Missions, was recognized and invited to a seat among us.

REPORT OF MINISTERS' ASSURANCE ASSOCIATION.

The Baptist Relief Association is now an established fact. It has been a blessing to a great many families of deceased ministers. Its help has come when most needed, when the husband and father, the guide and protector, was taken away, and financial distress was added to bereavement.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

We are glad to note that the Association has been able to keep a Missionary in the field since last January, and rejoice to find that the ex-Committee has been so fortunate in the one employed. Bro. Riles has worked hard and faithfully, and God has abundantly blessed his efforts.

We note from his report, 1,708 miles traveled, 142 sermons, and 30 baptisms, besides 17 received by letter.

This is about one convert to every four sermons, and fifty miles traveled. It is much better than most of the pastors have made.

We, therefore, recommend that he be continued as Mis-

sionary in the bounds of this Association. But, brethren, we are not to remain in Jerusalem, neither in Samaria, but we must extend our work to the ultimate parts of the earth.

We must go with Dr. McConnell into the home field and search out the destitute sections of our Southland, and there pour out the light of the Gospel truth. Or, into the lanes, byways and slums of our cities, and there pluck fallen humanity as a "brand from the burning."

We must go with Dr. Willingham down here to our sister republic, Mexico, and help Walkins, Cleavens, Bartow and others fight Catholicism. We must go to Brazil to help Bagby against priest-craft. We must go to the "Flowery Land" and help Graves, Simmons, Bryant, Hartwell, Owens and others to drag the perishing millions of China from the temples of idolatry, or the iron grasp of Confucianism. Yes, obey the Master in preaching the Gospel to the whole world.

No Baptist should be satisfied with less than giving the "good news" to every creature. (Signed)

Time having arrived for adjournment, the Committee on Religious Exercises announced that Rev. W. C. Foster would preach at 7 p. m.

FRIDAY MORNING SESSION.

Promptly at 9 a. m. this Association was called to order by the Moderator, and after devotional exercises, conducted by Revs. H. C. Martin and G. W. Riles, the minutes of the former days were read and adopted.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee on Sunday Schools reports as follows: We notice that there were thirteen schools reported at the last meeting of this Association, with an enrollment of 522 pupils, making an average of over 40 to the school, and every church reported a school, save one, Orange Creek.

Only nine Churches have reported Sunday Schools this session, with an enrollment of 135.

Taking the numbers reported last year, of those re-

ported this year we have an aggregate of 669 pupils, an increase over last year of 117.

We regard the Sunday Schools among the greatest of our Christian work.

First, because it deals directly with the principal source of our nation's increase. From the families we gather the material out of which our nation's constituency is to be built. To children we must look for the future men and women of our country. "Cleanse the fountain and you purify the whole stream." Prepare the hearts of the children and they readily receive the words of eternal life.

Second, because in it may be found a field of labor suited to the capacity of every Christian, either great or small. Christ said to the disciples indiscriminately, "Go preach the Gospel to every creature," and right at our doors the young people many of them are growing to be men and women without religious or moral culture. We must enter the field and go to work. We must be willing to spend and be spent.

Third, we deem it one of the greatest, because the impressions made in childhood are the most lasting. Our religious views are formed in childhood, and if we do not enter this inviting field and plant it with the Gospel truths as we understand them, others will, to our exclusion.

We recommend that there be a Sunday School Missionary appointed, to give all or a part of his time to the Sunday School work in the bounds of the Association. As many of our teachers need better preparation, we recommend weekly teachers' meetings, wherever it is practicable, to study the lesson and learn by all the lesson helps at command how to teach the lesson.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK.

We, your Committee, have carefully considered the subject given us, and find that woman's work has become an important factor in the enterprising churches of the present time. That its importance has long been considered is shown in Paul's letter to the Romans, in which he mentions the names of several women as his helpers. He also writes: "I commend unto you Phebe, our sister, who is a servant of the Church at Cenchrea, that ye receive her in the Lord, as becometh saints, and that ye assist her in whatever business she hath need of you."

Woman's work in our churches is not considered a separate work, but as auxiliary or helper in the work of the church. As such, should it be discouraged and crowded out of our associational work, or should it have the help and co-operation recommended by Paul?

CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.

2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and they must present letters from their respective churches certifying as to their election as Messengers.

3. The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.

4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.

5. Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from whence it comes.

6. This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory coun-

cil, and shall treat the churches composing it as independent bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member exofficio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own Chairman and Secretary and have power to fill vacancies.

The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon to do so.

10. All churches shall be entitled to two Messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional member for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by order of the Association or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.
