# CONSTITUTION.

- This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.
- This Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and they must present letters from their respective churches certifying as to their election as Messengers.
- 3. The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.
- This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.
- 5. Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from whence it comes.
- 6. This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.
- 7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council, and shall treat the churches composing it as independent bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.
- 8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-oficio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and have power to fill vacancies.
- 9. The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon to do so.
- 10. All churches shall be entitled to two Messengers for the first

fifty members, and one additional messenger for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by the order of the Association or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

#### EDUCATION.

We, the Committee on Education, respectfully report that:

We believe that in education the highest interests of our people are in the lowest schools.

We do not believe like the English, that society needs an aristocracy. However, where needed, this will assert itself without special aid. We need rather that our people should be all noble; this will be more likely to happen, when they are all educated.

Though, as we can not believe that education is religion, we hall the hope that still happier day when Our Father's promise shall be fulfilled: "Thy people shall be all righteous."

That training of the mind and increase of information called education multiplies greatly the natural powers, and these powers should be under Christian influence, or else they may be against us instead of for us.

We commend first our common schools and urge our brethren to . believe that they owe to their children the right to enjoy all the advantages which our noble school system affords.

We commend for higher education Stetson University, the peer of any. To those whose health requires a change of climate, we commend Mercer University, and to all preachers we commend our Louisville Seminary.

Also the Home Field, published by our Home Board, Atlanta, Ga., should be in every Baptist home in the South. The Foreign Journal published in Richmond, Va., by the Foreign Board, is indespensable as a disseminator of missionary facts. Every Baptist family should have it on their table

The Southern Baptist Witness, so recently acquired by gratuitous gift, and now the property of the Baptist Convention of the state of Florida, therefore your property, and the only medium of social communication and dissemination of general state information among Baptists, should not only commend itself to the Baptists of the state, but every Baptist home should make it their welcome guest. # MINUTES OF W. M. U. MEETING.

The Fifth Annual Meeting of the W. M. U. of Santa Fe River Association was held on the evening of October 19, 1904, Vice Presidents Mrs. W. C. Foster and Miss Cava Jernegan in the chair.

The meeting opened with singing "Jesus, Lover of My Soul." Scripture reading of John 10. The Lord's Prayer in concert.

Enrollment of messengers and their reports:

Alachua—Mrs. W. C. Foster reported society small in number, but a great increase in the spiritual condition. For missions the past year, \$50.

Eliam—Mrs. Sallie Lane, Mrs. Lillian Alderman and Mrs. M. J. Kennedy. Reported a small attendance of society, but these tried to be faithful to the cause of their Master, and their report exceeded that of last year. For missions, \$34.05

Hawthorn—Mrs. Laura Weeks reported small in numbers, as a good many had moved away, but these few were trying to be faithful to the work. Reported for missions, \$81.09.

Rochelle--Mrs. Rollins, but could give no report, as society had

gone down on account of not having a president.

Eliam Band—Misses Minnie Lee, Leecy Perry, Katie Mizelle, Dacie Price and Leona Fowler reported a membership of 55; that all of its members were energetic in their work, and always ready to do more work. They mentioned two ways of the Band to raise money for missions, viz., making and selling of quilts and sawing wood to be sold, while a great portion was given by free-will offering. Reported for missions, \$85.68.

Alachua Band—Mrs. W. C. Foster, as leader, reported only six months since organization; only a few in numbers, but an eager little Band for work. This Band has done well for this short time. For missions, \$4.25.

Gainesville, LaCrosse, Rex and Waldo failed to report.

The amount reported for missions by three Societies and two Bands, \$255.07.

A prayer of thanks for the work done, and for blessing on the work of the coming year, was offered by Mrs. Laura Weeks.

Vice President Mrs. W. C. Foster reported organization of the Alachua Band and a Society in the Harmony Association. The Societies and Bands together this year gave \$41.57 for the support of a Bible woman in China.

The Vice President elected for the coming year was Miss C. Jernegan of Melrose.

As there was no one present who was willing to serve, it was decided to wait until the Convention at Hampton in this month, and then choose the second Vice President.
