CONSTITUTION.

- This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.
- This Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and they must present letters from their respective churches certifying as to their election as Messengers.
- 3. The object of this Association shall be the re-union of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.
- 4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.
- 5. Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismission from the Association from whence it comes.
- 6. This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.
- 7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council, and shall treat the churches composing it as independent

bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

- 8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and have power to fill vacancies.
- 9. The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon to do so.
- 10. All churches shall be entitled to two Messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional messenger for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.
- 11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by the order of the Association or Executive Committee.
- 12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

So far as letters have been received, the Sunday Schools show an increase both in pupils and money contributed.

It is worthy of note that good Sunday Schools accompany good churches; nor is this surprising, because the lively Christian church is just the place to find good teachers. Good teachers are the very foundation of Sunday Schools; without them good work cannot be done, neither can the attendance of pupils be maintained.

We would urge our pastors to carefully look out all available teachers, and those likely to become such, and train

them in systematic Bible study.

The Sunday School Board has three men on our Southern Convention field who are especially engaged in this work. Let us avail ourselves of their help, so far as is possible, and so may we expect still better work in our schools in the future and through our schools more additions to our churches.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Education realizes the importance of a Christian education. We know that a Christian education will give us a better citizenship from day laborer to Statesman. No education is complete that does not train the heart as well as the mind and hand.

We would urge upon our people the importance of this great truth—and would urge upon our brethren the importance of giving to, working and praying for this noble cause. We would suggest that pastors preach more upon the subject of a Christian education and that at least one collection per annum be given to ministerial education. We would heartily recommend our own Stetson University, DeLand, Florida, as an institution that offers this kind of an education.

We also urge upon our Brethren and Sisters to use all legitimate means to place in Stetson University all worthy young men and women.

Your committee, realizing the demand upon us for a better educated ministry would recommend that young men entering the ministry be encouraged to take a college or university course, then take a course at the Southern Baptist Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky.

28. Report on Missions was read by B. R. Moseley. Pending the adoption of the report L. D. Geiger preached a missionary sermon, and at the suggestion of S. B. Rogers the roll of churches was called and the following pledges for missions during the coming year were made: Gainesville, \$300.00; La Crosse, \$200.00; Hawthorn, \$100.00; Alachua, \$150.00; Ochwilla, \$20.00. The report was amended by adding the following resolution: That we instruct our delegates to the State Convention to pledge this

Association for \$800.00 for missions during the coming year. The report was then adopted as follows:

MISSIONS.

We are happy to believe that the cause of missions is growing. Our Savior is Almighty God, and can not fail. We love to know that Christianity is light to them that sit in darkness,

It chases away the cruelty, the superstitions, the degradation of heathenism, and brings health and happiness, joy and gladness, intelligence and purity.

It is a false standard to compare so-called Christian nations with so-called heathen people. The vast majority of people in this so-called Christian land are worse than the heathen; for they deliberately reject the gospel, preferring darkness.

Not until the prophecy is fulfilled: "Thy people shall be all righteous," can a nation be called Christian. Yet Christianity is a blessing even when in the minority. It blesses, enlightens and even dominates. A native Indian said that Christ and not England ruled India. We believe that Christian ethics, however obtained, were with the Japanese and won them victory. By every principle of honor and gratitude, by every sentiment of love and mercy, by every consideration that can melt to pity those who have plenty to help those in need, we are urged to give to those in darkness, both at home and abroad, the light of the gospel. We have improved much; let us advance still more.

The best efforts are not spasmodic and sensational, but with plan and purpose, system, regularity and liberality.

31. Report on Publication was read, and after discussion by S. B. Rogers, F. C. Edwards, G. W. S. Ware, B. R. Moseley, W. C. Foster and G. W. Riles, was adopted as follows:

PUBLICATION.

"This is preeminently an age of literature"-not perhaps the greatest, the world will ever see; but surely the greatest it has ever seen. The modern facilities for placing literature on the market to-day surpass anything hitherto known to the world. It is touching every phase of life, and has become a necessary and living factor in all the great enterprises of earth. The merchant, the manufacturer, the farmer, the banker, the politician, the reformer-indeed all classes and conditions of men-are realizing, and calling to their aid the power of the periodical page. In this the church of God has not been slow to move, and yet your committee doubts if the children of the kingdom as fully appreciate and utilize this medium of help as they should. No less than sixty secular papers, together with thousands upon thousands of circulars are printed, in and circulated throughout Florida, to say nothing of those printed beyond her borders-having a large circulation among her people. To attempt to use the ear alone is to use the least half of our opportunity to do good. The printed page is one of the mightiest agencies in advancing the Kingdom of God.

Three classes of literature especially does your committee desire to recommend to this body and to all Baptists Missionary, Sunday School, and the State organ: The Foreign Journal and Home Field should be in every Baptist home in Florida. Our Sunday School literature, which is so abundant and cheap, should be taken for the sake of our children and the coming kingdom. The Southern Witness, our own paper, we must take. It is now a denominational enterprise,

and our only medium of communication. We heartily commend it to every Florida Baptist.

Stephens be appointed to represent us as messengers to the next Florida Baptist Convention. Fifth, that S. B. Rogers be elected as our delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention.

33. Report of Committee on Spiritual Condition of the Churches was read, and after discussion by B. R. Moseley, W. C. Foster, G. W. S. Ware and S. B. Rogers, was adopted as follows:

THE SPIRITUAL CONDITION OF THE CHURCHES.

So far as we know the spirituality of our brotherhood might not be called in question. There is peace, we think in all the churches and efforts for all the services usually held to be vital among us. We think however that in some churches, the reluctance to grieve a brother has led to delay in discipline which has injured those very brethren and the churches too. We also fear that while we see abounding prosperity on every side, wonderful revivals among churches and but meagre results among our own, we may well be uneasy at our own barrenness, "When Zion travailed, she brought forth children."

Have we been unconcerned? "Woe to them that are at ease in Zion." Let us desire sincerely, pray earnestly and labor heartily that souls may be won to Christ—and that our former prosperity may be restored and surpassed.

We, your Committee on Orphanage, beg leave to report as follows:

Our hearts swell with pride when we contemplate the work being done by the Orphanage at Arcadia, the youngest, save one, of the enterprises undertaken by Florida Baptists. Beginning only three years ago and with nothing save the love and loyalty of 27,000 Baptists for the homeless and helpless little ones of our State we now have a plant consisting of houses and lands worth some \$1,500. In this home are now thirty-four children, cared for by the ever ready and careful hands and prayerful, loving hearts of Brother and Sister B. M. Bean. The home is thoroughly furnished throughout with every comfort of a modern home. Every possible provision, physical, mental, moral and religious, is made for the children. The first thought of Brother and Sister Bean is to lead the children to become

Christians and to inculcate in them the principles of true Christian living. As a result of this, many of them have already professed Christ and united with the church.

The brethren, churches, Sunday Schools and societies have rallied nobly to the support of the orphanage with their prayers and their means. The needs have increased, however, as the number of children has increased and money is needed even now for the support of this precious heritage of Florida Baptists. We would recommend that the churches, Sunday Schools and societies of this Association as early as possible make liberal contributions to this work. God has entrusted this precious work into our hands; we would now praise Him for it and lay our money and our hearts on His altar for its support and development.
