CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.
2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and they must present letters from their respective churches certifying as to their election as Messengers.
3. The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.
4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.
5. Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by a letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismissal from the Association from whence it comes.

6. This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council, and shall treat the churches composing it as independent bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and have power to fill vacancies.

9. The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon to do so.

10. All churches shall be entitled to two messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional messenger for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by the order of the Association or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at any regular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

20. Report on Temperance was read by J. N. Thompson; discussed by J. N. Thompson, S. B. Rogers, G. W. Riles, G. W. S. Ware, J. W. Hilton, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

We, your committee on Temperance, offer the following, viz.: We notice with pride the progress the temperance cause is making within the bounds of our Association. Only a few years ago the grasp of the saloon had been felt, and the influence of the illicit distilleries has been prominent in the social and political life of our fair country. By the earnest efforts and consecrated prayers of our temperance people this curse, largely, has been driven from our midst. By their earnest and untiring efforts, strict laws and strong sentiments have been created against this accursed traffic, laws and sentiments that have not only driven this curse from our midst, but will keep it out of this

section of our fair State. While we have achieved these victories we are confronted by this traffic in another aspect, that of the illicit dealer, better known as the "Blind Tiger." We should use every legitimate effort to rid our country of this dark blot. This may be done by creating a higher and nobler sentiment, a sentiment that frowns upon this traffic, and upon all who engage in it, a sentiment that stands for law and sobriety.

We pledge the Baptists of this Association to support the officers of the law in the enforcement of the law. We further pledge our influence for the enactment of more rigid laws on this subject, and call upon all Baptists of the State to labor and pray until our State be freed from this curse.

21. Report on Sunday Schools was read by J. W. Hilton; discussed by J. W. Hilton, S. B. Rogers, and adopted as follows:

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are pleased to note that every church represented in this Association reports a Sunday School, but from private information we are fearful that many of our churches are not as interested in this work as they might be. We also find that the churches with the largest Sunday Schools report the greatest increase in membership and are doing more for the spread of the Gospel. The more we learn of Christ the more we love him and the stronger our faith becomes. Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the Word of God. We would urge upon our people to look well to the Sunday Schools, as impressions made upon the plastic minds of children are likely to continue through life. See that none, if possible, but converted and consecrated men and women are selected as teachers to instruct the young. For the natural man cannot know the things of God because they are spiritually discerned and no man can teach those things he does not know. We would recommend, that as soon as convenient the State Board place a Sunday School evangelist in the field whose

duty shall be to visit our churches and arouse an interest in this part of the work and that our pastors preach more on the necessity of the study of God's word.

We, your committee on the Spiritual Condition of the Churches, find ourselves at a great disadvantage, as nearly one-half of the churches have made no report. As this condition has existed for a number of years we suggest that this body take some action to relieve said condition. So far as we can ascertain the spirituality of the brotherhood is very encouraging. The majority of the churches represented show an increase over last year's work both numerically and financially. Each church represented reports a Sunday School. We are advised by visiting brethren that the churches which show no increase in number are in a very fair condition spiritually, the decrease being the result of church discipline. So far as we can learn there is peace and harmony among all the churches. We would say with the Apostle Paul, "If we live in the Spirit let us also walk in the Spirit." For we, through the Spirit, wait for the hope of righteousness by faith.

26. Report on Education was read and discussed by S. B. Rogers, then adopted as follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Perhaps more is being said and written and thought of Education today than at any time in the past history of the world, and justly so, for no age, in the judgment of your committee, has ever demanded so many trained men and women as this, nor has the world ever made it so hard for those who lacked training as it is making now. Again, an education has never been so easy for the masses, and so completely at the command of every one as the circumstances of today places it. But with all may we not be mistaken in this age of schools and learning as to what really constitutes an education. The student who has successfully passed all the requirements of our schools and colleges may not be educated in the strictest sense of that term. For the student who has only had mental training may be a physical imbecile and a moral fool. While the moral culture alone can never meet the demands of this age, or any other, the student who gives attention alone to physical education, too often becomes a physical *monstrosity*, and degenerates to that point of mean animal ambition and power. To be educated as we understand education, a man must be educated in *mind, body and*

heart. The mental, physical and moral man, like the great "*God-Head*," are not three, but one man, and the education of either at the neglect of the other means a development out of harmony with the needs of the world and the will of God. We fear there is too great a tendency in our public schools of today to stuff the children's minds to the neglect of their little bodies and immortal souls. We desire to urge upon the parents of our children the urgent necessity of physical culture in our schools and a well-founded system of moral training. Let us lose no opportunity to educate our children, only in the highest sense of that term.

We recommend, in so far as is possible and practicable, that our people patronize their own denominational school. John B. Stetson University, in this State, offers advantages surpassed by no school in the State, and we take pleasure in recommending it to the brotherhood.

The Southern Theological Seminary, at Louisville, Ky., is without any doubt the leading theological school of *America*, and any young man seeking training along that line can do no better than avail himself of the great advantages it offers. It also maintains a training school for lay-workers, and every lay-worker who can should take a course of study there.

We, your Committee on Orphanage, beg leave to report as follows:

We feel proud when we think of the good work done by our Orphanage at Arcadia. Almost the youngest of our institutions in Florida. Only four years old, sustained by those that the love they have for the helpless little ones of our State compels their hands to go into their treasures and bring forth means that such an institution needs, until we have a place valued at \$15,000.

In this Orphanage there are now forty children who are cared for and are being brought up under the best training physically, mentally, morally and religiously by Brother and Sister B. M. Bean, who are surely in the right place and are the right ones for the place. A number of these children have already become Christians and have united with the church. And we, your committee, would advise that as soon as convenient every church, Sunday school and society would take a special collection for this institution that is doing so much good, as the increase of inmates has increased the expenses.

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Christ said "Go!" An obedient church heeds the command, and regardless of consequences carries out this marching order. A spiritual church is an obedient church. An intensely missionary church is always a spiritual church.

In the Moravian denomination one member out of every sixty-four is a foreign missionary, and no other denomination is having a greater growth than the Moravians. If we Baptists were to give to missions in the same ratio as the Moravians we would contribute \$8,400,000 per year. Such benevolence does not impoverish them and it would not hurt us.

We, your committee, recommend that this Association undertake the support of a missionary upon the foreign field, and apportion the amount among the churches in proportion to their numerical strength.

We also recommend that they contribute to each of the objects of our Mission Board at each monthly meeting.
