CONSTITUTION.

1. This Association shall be called the Santa Fe River Baptist Association.
2. This Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches, of which they must be members, maintaining the Gospel discipline, and they must present letters from their respective churches certifying as to their election as Messengers.
3. The object of this Association shall be the reunion of the churches, the promotion of the true Gospel, and the dissemination of Bible truth.
4. This Association shall meet annually, on the first day of which meeting it shall elect, by ballot, a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer.
5. Any Baptist Church newly organized may become a member of this Association by letter petitioning for membership and giving information concerning organization and presbytery and by whom organized. Any church coming from another Association may become a member of this Association by presenting petitionary letter, accompanied by a letter of dismissal from the Association from whence it comes.
6. This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.
7. This Association shall be deemed an advisory council, and shall treat the churches composing it as independent bodies in all matters of self-government, and shall at no time interfere with their rights.

8. This Association shall have an Executive Committee of five, of which the Treasurer shall be a member ex-officio. The other four members shall be elected annually by the Association, no two members being from the same church. Three shall constitute a quorum for business. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman and secretary and have power to fill vacancies.

9. The Associational mission work shall be under the control and supervision of the Executive Committee, and all Missionaries shall make quarterly reports to them when called upon to do so.

10. All churches shall be entitled to two messengers for the first fifty members, and one additional messenger for each twenty-five additional members after the first and for the major fraction thereof.

11. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse all funds of the Association, but only by the order of the Association or Executive Committee.

12. This Constitution may be amended at an yregular meeting of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the Messengers present.

MINUTES

LaCrosse, Fla., Oct. 22, 1909.

The Santa Fe River Baptist Association met at 10:30 a. m. today with the First Baptist Church, LaCrosse, in its fifty-third annual session.

Report on Missions was read by J. F. Bunch. Discussed by H. C. Sealey and J. F. Bunch, and adopted as follows:

Report on Missions.

Inasmuch as God thought it right and necessary to offer up his son (our blessed Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ,) for the salvation of the world, He has shown us the estimate he has placed on the work of mission or evangelization of the world. Now we, as heirs of his, should show some interest in this great work, "But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt and where thieves do not break through nor steal, for where your treasure is, there will your heart be also."

"Go ye therefore and teach all nations," was the blessed command of our Savior.

"When the Son of Man shall come in his glory," and he shall set the sheep on his right hand but the goats on the left. Then shall the king say unto them on his right hand, come, ye

blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world, for I was an hungered, and ye gave me meat, I was thirsty, and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you took me in, naked and ye clothed me, I was sick and ye visited me, I was in prison and ye came unto me. Then shall the righteous answer him saying: When saw we thee an hungered and fed thee? or thirsty and gave thee drink? When saw we thee a stranger and took thee in, or naked and clothed thee? Or when saw we thee sick or in prison and came unto thee? And the king shall answer and say unto you, inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me. The field is large and the needs are great, from our doors to the utmost parts of the earth, the cry still rings out, "Come over and help us." We recommend that our pastors bring this subject often before their congregations, arguing the pressing needs of this work, and that our Sunday School, and young people's societies be educated along the lines of contributing to the work of missions.

Report on Sunday School was read by H. C. Parker, discussed by H. C. Parker and adopted as follows:

Report on Sunday Schools.

We are pleased to note that very nearly every church represented in our association report a Sunday School and are evidently doing a great work.

We find that the churches with the most active Sunday Schools report the greatest increase in membership and are doing more for the spread of the gospel. The more we learn of Christ the more we love him and the stronger our faith becomes. Faith comes by hearing and hearing by the word of God.

We would urge upon our people to look well to the Sunday Schools, as impressions made upon the plastic minds of children are likely to continue through life, see that none if possible but converted and consecrated men and women are selected as teachers to instruct the young, for the natural man cannot know the things of God, because they are spiritually discerned, and no man can teach those things he does not know, we would recommend that, as soon as convenient, the State Board place a Sunday School evangelist in the field, whose duty shall be to visit our churches and arouse an interest in this part of the work, and that our pastors preach more on the necessity of the study of God's word. God give to our people light and courage to honor him in the suppression of the open saloon.

Many young men and women have been led to take hold of church work, possibly who now would be idle and neglecting their Master's gentle, but firm command, "Go ye into all the world and preach my work to every creature."

In the preaching service the young people are not gotten hold of speech, and from embarrassment and feeling that this

work should be attended to by older ones they fail to take hold of any work. The time is taken up by preaching and general routine work, while in the Young People's Union the older and more experienced members have the time and by proper tact can lead the young membership to higher and nobler aims of Christian work.

Relative to the older membership, and especially the Pastors and Deacons, we wish to state that they in general do not lend their hearty support to the young people, and their inattention they greatly discourage one of the noblest works of the Church.

We believe that where it is practical every Church should have a B. Y. P. Union, and that the Church should give to the Union her full and hearty support.

Therefore, we urge every Church to take up this part of the work in our Master's vineyard and bring it to its highest perfection.

Report on Education.

Hence the great importance of having noble men and women to teach our children—especially during the first fifteen years, when character is so largely moulded and fixed. In the training we give knowledge and skill. These are for the purpose of enabling the man or woman to use self for the greatest good in the world. We are living for a purpose, and whatever helps us to accomplish that purpose is education. We have many schools, and most of them are doing well. Let us rejoice in every school that is doing honest work; but it is to our denominational schools that we must look for our Christian leaders. These schools, more than all others are training our preachers and other church

leaders. If our denomination is to live and go forward we must have trained leaders. Our own Columbia College opened September 29th with an attendance 20 per cent. larger than the enrollment last year at the opening. A splendid body of boys and girls is that now at our college. All is going well. The faculty is strong and every teacher is doing excellent work. We have there a plant that could not be reproduced for less than \$225,000. Fifteen young men are there preparing for the ministry. The Florida Baptist Convention promised to give that school this year \$5 000 for general expenses. If this amount shall be realized the success of Columbia College will be assured.
