CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME: The Name of this Association shall be called THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE II—OBJECTS: The objects of this association shall be:

- (a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.
- (b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized areas within the bounds of the Association, and
- (c) To effect a closer cooperation between the Churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of missions, education, and benevolence.

ARTICLE III—CHURCHES:

- (a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.
- (b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associations, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received into membership in the Association.
- (c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for so doing. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ARTICLE IV—MEMBERS: This Association in session shall be composed of:

- (a) All officers elected by the Association,
- (b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and
- (c) Messengers elected by their respective Churches on the following basis: Each Church shall be entitled to a minimum three messengers, and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members over the first fifty, except that no Church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS:

- (a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Women's Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.
- (b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS:

- (a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.
- (b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary

Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping with the Denominational program.

ARTICLE VII—COMMITTEES:

- (a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:
 - (1) All officers elected by the Association,
 - (2) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and,
 - (3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.
- (b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- (c) The following committees, and any others authorized by the association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Obituaries Committee.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS: These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association upon a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided however, that one lay's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

SECTION I—DUTIES OF CHURCHES:

- (a) It shall be the duty of each Church in the Association to forward with her messengers a written report on the forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous year. This report shall be presented on the first day of each annual session.
- (b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership on the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the annual session.

SECTION II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS:

- (a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee, submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.
- (b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderator's request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.
- (c) Clerk:
 - (1) The clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association, and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.
 - (2) He shall send to the clerks of the Churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.
 - (3) He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.
 - (4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.

(5) The clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the Association at its annual session. Additional funds may be provided for the expense of his office.

(d) Treasurer:

(1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Moderator.

(2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.

(3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and bank statements, and shall be delivered to his successor.

(4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Committee and annually to the Association in annual session.

(e) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

SECTION III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES:

a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month prior to the session.

(c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS: These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present. All proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be **ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER** (Revised).

It must fight for attention, even in our Christian homes. Bible teachings must be presented in forms that will attract the attention of readers of all ages. Hence the need of the many religious books distributed by our Baptist book stores and the numerous periodicals, all designed to

aid in Bible study, to help the home and the church in their efforts to teach the Bible, to build and maintain a genuine spirit of daily Christian living, and to promulgate Baptist programs.

Time and printing space will permit me to merely mention only a few of the available periodicals; the Baptist book stores will gladly supply information on good books available.

Home Life, "a Christian family magazine." One-sixth of the Baptist families of our Santa Fe River Association territory take it.

The Training Union Magazine, published monthly, reaches more than 2,500 of the Baptist families of the State.

The Sunday School Builder goes monthly into a large proportion of the Baptist families represented in our Sunday Schools.

The above mentioned periodicals are published by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. The Sunday School Board publishes Sunday School literature, painstakingly prepared for all age groups and publishes study course books read each year by thousands of Sunday School and Training Union workers of Florida.

Home Mission, published monthly by the Home Mission Board.

The Commission, the foreign mission journal, published monthly goes to one in eighteen Baptist families of our State and the Santa Fe River Association.

Our own **Florida Baptist Witness**, "Organ of the Baptists of Florida," published weekly by the Florida Baptist Convention, goes into almost one-half of the Baptist families of Florida, more than one-third of the Baptist families of our Santa Fe River Association. Information comes from the editor's office that more than one-half of the churches of our Association send the Witness to the homes of their members thru the budget of the church.

HOME MISSIONS IN 1948

The annual report of the Home Mission Board to the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Oklahoma City, May, 1949, revealed a successful year in evangelism with 46,351 conversions. There were 741 missionaries serving during the year with an additional group of 287 student summer workers giving three months of service.

There were 281 new missions opened, 53 among the language group, 129 in city missions, and 99 in the western states, and 245 new churches constituted and 54 revived, 23 among the language groups, 98 in the city missions program, 33 in rural work, and 90 in the western states.

The Home Mission Board's participation in the Cooperative Program for 1949 is 16½ per cent of Southwide distributable funds.

New fields of home mission opportunities have been added by the Southern Baptist Convention which recognized Oregon and Washington and directed the Home Mission Board to open work in Alaska.

Departments of home mission work include: church building and loan, radio, Southern Baptist chaplains, general field workers, work among the Negroes, and departments of education and publicity, Jewish work, evangelism, summer student missions, co-operative missions (city missions, rural church program, western mission program, mountain missions), and direct missions (Cuba, Canal Zone, Panama, Indians, Spanish-Mexicans, Cubans in the States, French, Italians, Chinese, Japanese, language groups, deaf, mission centers, rescue missions).

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Southern Baptists have mission work in thirty geographical areas and 689 active missionaries under appointment, working in 119 mission centers

Seventy-three missionaries were appointed in 1948; forty-six additional appointments were made between January 1 and May 31, 1949. Missionaries are stationed in four new areas.

Among the foreign mission highlights are: a missionary doctor's success in securing a license to practice medicine in Paraguay; a missionary couple sent to Paraguay for Russian-speaking people; purchase of Southern Baptists' first missionary airplane; rehabilitation of China and Japan from the destruction of the war.

The Colombian-Venezuelan Convention was organized in February this year; the China Baptist Convention, for the first time bringing Baptists from the whole of China into one organization, was formed in June, 1948. The value of such national organizations is demonstrated in countries where national Baptists are holding Southern Baptist work together without missionary aid.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME TO THE ASSOCIATION FOR THE YEAR ENDING SEPT. 30 1949

Our Children's Home has had a good year. The cottage for the little children has been finished and all the children have been moved from Arcadia to Lakeland. This cottage like all the others was constructed to cut down on repairs through the years. There are no porches or other attachments to the buildings that might be a source of constant expense. The walls of the Administration building have been brought up to floor height the fill dirt for the floor has been hauled in and they are now ready to proceed with finishing the building. They hope to have it completed by January 1950.

With the completion of the Administration building there will be eleven buildings on the property in Lakeland. Five of these are cottages for children. The others are for utility purposes. They need a chapel and two cottages immediately. These buildings would complete the first unit of the institution and would allow us to care for more than 150 children.

They maintain a farm and a dairy. They have about fifteen acres of muck land and several acres of good loam soil that they use for grove and farming. They also have 120 acres of pasture grass.

They have planted shrubs, lawn grass, and palms around the cottages and on the property in front of the buildings.

The children attend the public schools of Lakeland.

Our children attend church and Sunday School at the First and the Southside Baptist churches of Lakeland.

We gave assistance to 157 children last year; but we were not able to help all who needed the services of the Home.

You will be asked for a special offering this Christmas to erect buildings at the Home. Let us urge you to give liberally to this worthy cause.

Funds for the operation of the Home come through the Cooperative Program, 50% of which is for State Work, 12% of this 50% which goes to the Children's Home. A special building offering will be taken. Designated gifts are made. Contributions of food and clothing and Coupons are made by Church organizations and individuals; but there is still much to be done.

We of the Santa Fe River Association need to be concerned with what we can do to help in a more specific way. Some of our Churches are helping as will be shown in the minutes; the Associational W. M. U. gave \$634.61 in food, clothing, and cash, part of which will be shown in the reports of the various Churches represented. We should, however, through our Children's Home Chairman, coordinate the efforts of all Churches and their organizations and individual contributions in a united effort, set a definite goal, and proceed without delay to reach it or surpass it, in backing one of our more worth-while Institutions for the Advancement of Christian Service.

REPORT ON RADIO GOSPEL BROADCAST

Your Committee on Radio Gospel Broadcast has, during the past year, endeavored to carry out the instructions of the Association which were:

- (1) To inform the churches of opportunities to use the services of the Radio Commission,
- (2) To promote the cause of radio gospel broadcasting, and
- (3) To look into the possibilities of developing a program of gospel broadcast in our own association.

The first duty has been performed by use of a circular letter to

the churches outlining the services of the commission that are available and suggesting that they be used.

Both radio stations in this territory have been contacted by members of your committee and we find that it is possible to secure time on either of them at commercial rates for the use of the Association in its promotion work and for gospel preaching.

The Year-Round Baptist Hour, promoted and broadcast by the Radio Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention covers the territory of the south very well except for some notable gaps. Unfortunately, our association is in the very center of one of those gaps. If this association should secure time over a local station for the broadcast of this program, the gap would be filled. This time can be secured over WRUF on Sunday afternoon either at the time of the broadcast or the time immediately following. The Radio Commission will supply the programs without cost to us. The station offers the time at \$19.10 per week for a half hour program. This would amount, in round numbers to \$1000.00 per year.

We Recommend:

1. That the committee be instructed to secure the best possible contract for the broadcasting of the Baptist Hour over a local station and, under the advice of the Executive Committee, raise funds and expend them for this purpose.
2. That a goal of \$1100.00 be set for the carrying on of the work of this committee and that the churches be asked to contribute, through the Executive Committee and its organization to this work.

REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

The Baptist Brotherhood is the fastest growing organization in Baptist life. This statement is based on statistics gathered and published by Porter Routh, statistician of the Southern Baptist Convention. On a convention-wide basis in the past two years the number of Brotherhoods has more than doubled and the number of men enrolled is up about 125%.

In Florida, the work has kept pace. In the last twelve months there have been nearly one hundred new Brotherhoods set up, and the total enrollment as shown by the churches this fall is expected to be increased by about 50% in this one year alone. This year has also seen the coming of Mr. George E. Linney as associate in the state Music-Brotherhood Department. C. A. Holcomb, secretary of this department, states that Mr. Linney is winning his way into the hearts of the men in a noble manner. Since Mr. Linney is proving to be so fine in Brotherhood work, he is now spending very little time on music, but practically all on Brotherhood. Mr. Holcomb spends most of his time on music, but, of course, gives general supervision to all activities of the department. Both of these men will work some of the time in both fields of work, but each will have his specialty.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The officers of the Board are: Dr. Wallace Bassett, President; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. R. S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer-investments.

There were 2,297 new certificates issued in all plans of the Board, 774 of them being in the Ministers' Retirement Plan.

The Widows Supplementary Annuity Plan is now in force in all of the states of the S. B. C. with the exception of one, Tennessee.

As yet, there are too many pastors and lay workers who do not have the protection the Board offers. Every person gainfully employed in denominational work, whether pastor, missionary, employee of State or southwide board, institution, or agency, and every lay worker such as educational director, church secretary, janitor, etc., should be enrolled in one of the plans fostered by the Board, that when retirement age is reached or ill health impairs there may be some income provided.

The relief department paid out \$237,252.09 to 1,385 beneficiaries. In nine states more money was paid for relief than was received for relief in those states.

A meeting was also held with a group of seventeen colored women of the Jerusalem Baptist church.

The Business Woman's Camp was a great success with around seventy five women attending. It was held at Camp O'Leno Labor Day weekend which is to be the same time and place for 1950. Besides our State W. M. U. workers, there were three Missionaries present who represented our W. M. U. work over our land in a most interesting way. The missionaries were Miss Pearl Todd, returned missionary from China, Miss Irene Chambers, Home Mission field representative and Mrs. Minnelle Graves of Miami Mission Center.

There were thirty seven mission study classes reported with five hundred and twenty three ladies participating in mission study.

One hundred seventeen ladies reported they are tithing.
