CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE 1-NAME: The name of this association shall be called THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE II OBJECTS: The objects of this association shall be; (a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.

- (b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized areas within the bounds of the Association, and
- (c) To effect a closer cooperation between the churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of misssions education, and benevolence.

ARTCLE III CHURCHES

- (a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.
- (b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associtions, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received into membership in the Association.
- (c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for doing so. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ARTICLE IV MEMBERS: This Association in session shall be composed of:

- (a) All officers elected by the Association.
- (b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and
- (c) Messengers elected by their respective churches on the following basis, and certified to the Association in session in their annual letter or petitionary letter: Each church shall be entitled to a minimum of three messengers and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof over the first fifty members, except that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V-OFFICERS:

- (a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Women's Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Eyangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.
- (b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

ARTICLE VI-MEETINGS:

- (a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.
- (b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping with the Denominational program.

ARTICLE VII-COMMITTEES:

- (a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:
 - (1) All officers elected by the Association.
 - (2) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and
- (3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.
- (b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.
- (c) The following committees, and any other authorized by the Association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Missions Committee composed as follows: Moderator, Clerk and three additional members appointed on the following basis:

In October 1954, one for one (1) year, one for two (2) years, and one for three (3) years and thereafter one each year for a term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS: These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association up on a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided however, that one day's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

SECTION I-DUTIES OF CHURCHES:

- (a) It shall be the duty of each church in the Association to forward to the clerk of the Association, at least three days prior to the opening of the annual Association, a written report on forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous year.
- (b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership in the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the annual session.

SECTION II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS:

- (a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committee not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.
- (b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderator's request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.

(c) Clerk:

- (1) The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the mineutes, keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association, and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.
- (2) He shall send to the clerks of the churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.
- (3) He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.
- (4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.
- (5) The clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the association at its annual session. Additional funds may be provided for the expense of his office.

(d) Treasurer:

- (1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Moderator.
- (2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.
- (3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and bank statement, and shall be delivered to his successor.
- (4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Committee and annually to the Association in annual session.
- (c) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

SECTION III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES:

- (a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.
- (b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month prior to the session.
- (c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The Committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacationey occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.
 - (d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS: These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present, all proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be ROBERTS RULE OF ORDER (Revised).

HOME MISSION REPORT

Climaxing the Five-Year Crusade of the Home Mission Board, the emphasis this year is on witnessing for Chrst. In the Board's objective to lead every individual Christian to become a more effective witness it is hoped that the Christian testimony may be given among the minority groups, the neglected, and the underpriviledged. Not only is it necessary for the individual to witness but every church ought to manifest its interest as a body in the unreached. Then churches, associations, and groups of churches working together are supporting local missions and building new churches.

Last Year's Record (1953)

During 1953 the Home Mission Board had 937 regular missionaries and employed 366 youths in the Student Summer Mission Program, making a total of 1,303 missionaries. Dr. J. B. Lawrence rounded out his tenure as executive secretary-treasurer and was succeeded by Dr. Courts Redford. The missionary staff gave full tribute to Dr. Lawrence in his last year of leadership by vogorously promoting the Board's work and assured Dr. Redford of full co-operation in planning for the future.

Soul-winning Was Paramount

In the meetings and regular work of the missionaries 31.849 conversions were reported. Professions of faith reported by Baptist chaplains numbered 17.912 and numbered 6.140, making a grand total of conversions reported under either direct or indirect ministry of home missionaries 55,901.

New Units of Work

In the reports of home missionaries for 1953 it was revealed that 284 new churches were constituted and 706 new missions opened. The missionaries entered into the "Million More in '54" program and organized many new classes and mission Sunday schools. Even mission churches opened missions and missions start missions before new churches.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board appointed 70 missionaries during 1953; 37 have been appointed during the first five months of 1954. During the year and five months, 53 missionaries were jost from altive service through death, resignation, and retirement, giving an increase of 54 for active service. As of June 1, 1954, the Loard has 931 active missionaries.

Missionaries are located in 170 stations in 35 countries or territories: Argentina has 45 missionaries, the Bahamas 4 (and one retired couple), Brazil 179, Chili 34, China 32 (English Hong Kong 12, Portuguese Macre 4, unassigned 16), Columbia 23, Costa Rica 4, Ecuador 7, Egypt (Caza) 3 Formosa 27, Gold Coast 6, Guatemala 8, Haweii 43 Honduras 6, Indonesia 20, Israel 13, Italy 10, Jamaica 2, Japan 101, Jordan 8, Korea 15, Lebanon 7, Malaya 13, Mexico 27, Nigeria 166, Paragury 17, Peru 4, Philippines 31, Southern Rhodesia 16, Spain 6, Switziand (European seminary) 9, Thailand 17, Uruguary 12, Venezuela 8, and Spanish Publishing House in El Paso 8, Two Ci the countries — Jamaica and Egypt — were entered during 1954.

Indirectly, Southern Baptist missions extend to many other countries: Through funds aiding national Baptist; through mesi naries of the Foreign Mission Board of Brazil, its daughter mission; through Baptist churches co-operating with Baptist associations of mission countries, though beyond their borders; through pastors trained at the international semnary in Switzerland; and through literature sent from the Spanish Baptist Publishing House.

The 2,201 churches affiliated with Southern Baptist Missions reported 20,326 baptisms during 1953. Their 8,000 organizations (Sunday schools, youth groups, and women's groups) reported 200,000 members. More than 64,000 pupils were reported in 500 mission schools, including 700 students in 19 theological schools. Almost 200,000 patients were treated in eight hospitals, four dispensaries, and 12 c inits manned by 27 missionary doctors, 37 missionary nurses, and 44 national doctors and nurses. Approximately 8,000,000 pieces of literature were published, including 51,000 Bibles.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

The work of teaching the Bible through the Sunday School has received wide attention throughout this past year in every state and association in our Southern Baptist Convention. The Campaign for "A Million More in '54" has had widespread attention and has given much impitus to the work of Bible Teaching. The full record of the results of that campaign will not be written until all of the reports of all of the associations are gathered in our Southwide offices.

The results of the Campaign here in Florida can be anticipated vith some degree of accuracy. Many churches and several of the associations report having passed their goals of increased enrollment. Our State Sunday School Secretary is quite confident that when the re-

ports are all in we will have attained our State Goal of an increase of 50,000 in enrollment in our Sunday Schools of the State.

The picture in our association is more bleak. While there are outstanding bright spots in the record the total is not good. At our meeting of the association last year we reported a net increase in enrollment of 723 and a goal of 1300 net increase in this year. Towards that goal we can only report a net increase of 532.

Brighter reports can be made on the effort to reach and maintain standard recognition of our Sunday Schools. Seven churches report having standard Sunday Schools, an increase of one over last year. Had our association been able to secure a full crop of leaders for the departments of our Sunday School work we could have reported a Standard Association. All other points of the standard were attained.

We commend those of our churches who reached the Standard of Excellance in this work.

We commend those of our churches who increased their enrollment during the past year, with special commendation for the churches who surpassed their net-increase-in-enrollment goals. ie., Hawthorne, Keystone Heights, Southside and Calvary Mission.

WE RECOMMEND that the churches of the association enter into the plans of the South for increasing the percentages of baptisms in each church to "ONE IN EIGHT," and that the Sunday Schools lent their every effort to attaining that goal:

THAT the churches of the association enter into our own Sunday School plan for an Enlargement Campaign in Every Sunday School and that they join in the Simultaneous Enlargement Campaign of our Association, the week of Nov. 7-14, 1954, and that an Enrollment of 125 in Sunday School every 100 church members be adopted.

Finally, THAT the Executive Committee of our Association be instructed to elect the Associational Sunday School officers upon the romination of the one who is elected to serve as superintendent for the next year.

REPORT OF RADIO COMMITTEE to SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION October 8, 1954

From the time of its origin until now the primary effort of the Padio Committee has been to maintain the broadcast of the Southern Baptist produced program. "The Baptist Hour," in the territory of our association. Through this means the gospel has been heard not only in the communities of our churches but in the communities of several surrounding counties which otherwise would not hear the Baptist message over the air.

We are grateful to those churches in neighboring communities which have helped us financially with this work and have encouraged us in its continuance. Those helping financially were the church at Williston and the church at Cross City.

We RECCMMEND THAT the clerk be instructed to send each of these two churches a letter of appreciation for the help they have given us in this work.

The broadcast of "The Baptist Hour," continues to be at 9 o'clock Sunday morning over Station WRUF, Gainesville, We are supported by the Director of the Southern Baptist Radio and T-V Commission in our conviction that this is the best possible hour for this broadcast; that at this hour we reach many who do not attend our churches and do not intend to do so, would not hear the gospel by other medium

than by its broadcast and would not be available to listen to the, broadcast at later hours in the day.

The coming of the new director to the Southern Baptist Convention Radio and T-V Commission marked a new step in expansion of the activities of that agency. "The Baptist Hour," continues to be their major project. It is now broadcast over 390 radio stations in 36 states and 8 foreign lands.

The Commission is entering the field of Television program production. The first Southern Baptist T-V film has been produced. Several films, formerly used on screens in the churches are being revised for T-V broadcast. The purpose of this is to provide stations with good religious programs which they need and want.

We commend the work of this commission and urge the churches and their members to support it with their contributions and prayers.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Southern Baptists are now operating six theological seminaries located in Nashville, Tennessee; Louisville, Kentucky; Berkeley, California; New Orleans, Louisana; Wake Forest, North Carolina; and Fort Worth, Texas. We have invested more than \$25,000,000 in property and endowment in thise seminaries, and during the past year, these schools enrolled 5,632 ministerial students.

The State Conventions of thirteen Southern Baptist operate thirty senior colleges and universities, twenty-one junior colleges and eight academies. The only Baptist institution of higer learning in Florida is a senior college—Stetson University—located at DeLand, Florida.

Although Florida is the most rapidly-growing state east of the Mississippi River, it has only one Baptist college and there are fourteen Southern Baptist colleges in this area which have more money invested in college buildings than does Stetson University, and nine Southern Baptist colleges which have a greater endowment. Florida Baptists have invested less in Christian education than any other state in the same area.

Fortunately, Florida Baptist have finally awakened to their responsibility in the field of Christian education, and during the past five years have poured nearly \$1,500,000 into Stetson University. Moreover, the money being invested in the plant and facilities at DeLand is paying dividends far out of proportion to the amount of money being invested. This year 127 ministerial students and many more full - time volunteers to the mission fields and other Christian full-time vocations are receiving special preparation. In addition, Stetson is returning to the communities of Florida men and women

trained as teachers, lawyers, doctors, and businessmen to assume positions of civic and church leadership.

Stetson University is the only one of our Southern Baptist colleges which provides tuition scholarships to students possessing outstanding capacities for lay leadership in the Florida churches. For the second year now, Stetson University has joined the churches of this State in selecting and training students who have academic promise and who have ability which indicates that they will be able to make a significant contribution to the churches of this State.

In the State of Florida, Stetson University with less than onetwentieth of the total college enrollment in Florida has about onethird of the names listed in the current volume of Who's Who. Leading all of the State institutions proportionately, Stetson University had more individual names in this volume of Who's Who than all of the other private colleges in the State combined.

In his report to the Southern Baptist Convention at St. Louis, Dr. Orin Cornett, Executive Secretary of the Education Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, said.

REPORT OF BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

Now in its new location at Graceville, Florida, with an extension in Lakeland, Baptist Bible Institute has this year enrolled 118 students. The number is limited because of facilities.

Buildings on the new campus consist of the Homer G. Ray Memorial Classroom Building, three apartment buildings housing 21 families, temporary administration building, seven houses in Graceville leased or purchased for temporary dormitory units, and one trailer court for four trailers. Two income producing properties are now in operation—The Poultry Research Project and the Hatchery. These provide student employment.

Over half of the students have been called to rural churches in the tri-state area, and heavy calls for preacher supplies provide preaching opportunities for nearly every student every Sunday.

The Robert G. Lee Chapel Fund continues to grow with indication that the Chapel may be started next Spring.

The current outstanding need is for a boys' dormitory, dining room and music building.

The Lakeland Division continues to operate under Dean L. B. Johnson, assisted by Dr. J. T. Williams and four local pastors giving part time service.

At Graceville, Dr. Virgil Davis is serving as Acting Dean and in connection with the Home Misson Board, Dr. John D. Freeman heads the Rural Life Department.

REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE and

THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

Slowly but surely we believe it is beginning to dawn upon rightthinking Christian citizens that "people do what they read."

On the one hand we have, for example, the recent statement of the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges in an adopted resolution which said in part:

"Comic books and horror magazines depicting crime, sadism, vulgar sex and horror scenes contribute toward the moral breakdown of our children today (and are) often responsible for the criminal in adult life.

"The charater of juvenile delinquency is no longer the thoughtless acts of children, but in all too many instances is the consequence of stimulation by these publications.

"These are not comics, but 'tragics,' resulting in acts of violence, armed robbery, rape, torture, and even homicide. We daily see the tragic and pitiful consequences of these vicious and vile publications which now condition the minds of our children."

The judges called for action on federal, state and local levels to "outlaw, curtail and prohibit the publication, dissemination and distribution" of such publications.

On the other hand, we could recite repeated testimonies of people whose homes have been strengthened and families blessed by the reading of Christian publications, and of churches which have become more vitally evangelistic and more generously missionary through the use of their denominational paper.

Southern Baptists are increasing their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as fast as our people will make use of the publications, which is not yet fast enough for the best results. Last year the Sunday School Board printed and distributed 54,145,087 copies of its periodicals, plus 3,914,880 books, plus more than 210 million tracts.

The publications of the various agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have a total circulation of more than 800,000 copies per issue.

At this year's Convention the 22 Baptist State Papers reported their total circulation as 1,117,462.

Our own FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS (as of August 1, 1954), is reaching 34,717 subscribers and continues slowly and steadily to increase its circulation. There are at least 35,000 more Baptist homes in Florida into which their churches are not sending the paper. Let every church co-operate in reaching these at the earliest possible time.

One of the best investments any church can make is to send the Baptist Witness to every family in the membership through the simple Church Budget Plan, to be paid in easy monthly installments.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

There is little doubt that the year 1954 will go down in history of the Relief and Annuity Board as one of its most important years. A few of the achievements of the year are: (1) Liberalization of the Ministers Retirement Plan, resulting in the Ministers Security Plan. (2) Inauguration of the Southern Baptist Protection Plan, and (3) Liberalization of the Baptist Boards Plan.

Income for the year 1953 was \$6,027,301.25. Benefits paid were \$1,653,372.70. Investment income was \$1,086,874.78, thus passing the \$1 million mark for the first time in the history of the Board.

On January 4th, the Board suffered a great loss in the death of its treasurer, Mr. Orville Groner. He had been with the Board 33 years and had earned the appreciation of multiplied thousands of Southern Baptists because of his valuable service to the Board and to the demonimation.

All the states of the Southern Baptist Convention have qualified for the inauguration of the Ministers Security Plan on July 1. Far more than two-thirds per cent of the members in the Ministers Retirement Plan have signified their desire to make the transfer. In some states, the percentage of active members transferring may be as high as 95 per cent. The benefits of this plan include (1) Annual disability annuity increased by 80 per cent, providing a maximum annuity of \$900 rather than the present \$500. (2) Retirement on commuted annuity if disability occurs after 60. (3) Protection for member's wife after retirement. (4) Early retirement after age 60, and (5) eligibility beginning at age 25 or date of first denomination position after age 25.

Pastors entering the retirement program after July 1 must come into the new Southern Baptist Protection Plan, and on a 5%-5%-5% basis. Two radical changes have been made in the retirement program under this Plan. First, annuity credits will no longer be 2% of the salary basis for each year of participation up to 25 years. The credit toward an age retirement annuity will be 1-1/2% of the salary basis for each year of actual participation in the Plan.

This does not mean that age retirement annuity will be smaller than heretofore. It means, on the contrary, that young preachers who participate in the Plan longer than 33-1/3 years may be able to create an annuity far in excess of 50% of his average salary, as much as 60% for 40 years of participation, even more if participating a longer period of time. Second, the member will receive credit according to dues paid. If he does not pay the dues in full for a particular year, he will not be treated as in arrears, but his account will be credited with dues he has actually paid in full upon a correspondingly reduced salary basis. After the Plan has been set in operation, men who are in the Ministers Retirement or Ministers Security Plans who would be better benefitted, will be given the opportunity to transfer.

W. M. U. ANNUAL REPORT (1953-'54)

We have come to the close of another year in W.M.U. work. We are happy to report the progress that has been made in many phases of the work. The year began with 19 Women's Missionary Societies. Two disbanded, but one re-organized. Three new societies have been added to our Association. They are Southside and Calvary Mission in Gainesville and Eden, making a total of 21, with a reported membership of 833. All Executive Board and regular meetings were held in conjunction, quarterly, (including the Annual Meeting), a district Methods Class was held in Ocala with 54 members from our Association attending. The 60th Anniversary Celebration of W.M.U. was held at Daytona Beach last April with four Associational Officers and many others attending. The President and Stewardship Chairman attended the State Leaders Conference at Daytona Beach, September 21-23.

Our Quarterly Meetings were held in the following places: Island Grove, Sardis, Worthington, N. Central, Gainesville and Hawthorne. Speakers for these meetings were Mr. Armand Ball, State R. A. Secretary, Rev. Marvin Stedham, our District Missionary and Miss Bonnie Jean Rae, Missionary to China. Mrs. Earl May of Gainesville very impressively installed the Associational Officers at the Annual Meeting.

559 W.M.S. and 166 Auxiliary members are reported as having participated in directed Community Missions. There were 125 Family Altars. 10 societies promoting wholesome activities for young people, 8 doing Institutional work which includes giving literature and programs at Raiford and local jails, cards, gifts and magazines to groups and individuals, personal supervision of play at the Farm Colony regularly, and programs for the Odd Fellows Home for the aged. Three white Vacation Schools were conducted and eight Community Surveys completed. Other projects carried out were cheer to shut-ins, concentrated visitation "adopting" individual families in need, sending young people to camp who could not go otherwise, ministry to the sick, clothing for school children, necessities for charity patients in the hospital, donations to help build negro church, literature to negro recreation center and cash and supplies to negro nursery for children whose mothers do public work. The most effective Community Missions work included spiritual and physical care of needy and shut-ins and visitation program with religious literature.

Following is a partal report of the work of the Auxiliaries: 46 Auxiliaries with a membership of 522. Thirteen new Auxiliaries were organized, 8 of these were R.A. Chapters organized under the direction of Associational R.A. Leader, making a total of 14 R.A. Chapters with 140 boys enrolled and 15 Counselors (local). R.A. Conclave organized January 26th at N. Central church with 62 R.A.'s present, the second Conclave was held in the Southside Baptist Church with 82 present, March 26th. The Conclave meets quarterly to plan and promote R.A. work on an Associational basis. Due to the success of last year's venture in securing an Associational Counselor we have added another Associational Officer to our agenda, that of Girls'

Auxiliary Leader who will work with the Associational Young People's leader in promoting the work among our girls. The Annual Youth Rally was held in Juiy at the N. Central Church, with Miss Bonnie Jean Rae as speaker. The following reported advance in G.A. Forward Steps and R.A. Ranking System was made: Maidens 108, Ladies-in-Waiting 28, Princesses 17, Queens 12, Pages 13, Squires 2, and Knights 2. The Auxiliary reports 51 Mission Study classes, 86 tithers with 22 new tithers, and four Stewardship Ctudy courses. They gave \$102.80 to Missions through the Annie Armstrong, State Missions and Lottie Moon offerings.

The Association allotted \$50.00 to the Royal Ambassadors to help charter a bus to the R.A. Congress in St. Petersburg in April and due to the increase and the need, the Auxiliary work was included in our Associational budget at the Annual Meeting.

Of 17 societies reporting, 48 Mission Study classes were conducted with 1,229 enrolled. 721 reported having read Mission books. There were three church schools of missions reported.

Gifts to Children's Home report include: Cash \$110.00, eight boxes (one valued at \$34.17), one dozen sheets and 20,710 coupons sent. 10 children were sponsored by sending \$1.00 each month and birthday, Christmas and other gifts to each child sponsored.

Of 16 societies reporting there are 362 tithers with 61 new tithers, 14 Stewardship Study Courses conducted, five churches observing Stewardship Night, and five promoting "Plans of Stewardship Education" of young people.

Gifts: Home Missions (Annie Armstrong Offering) \$1,283.87 (\$25.13 over last year), State Missions \$730.11 (\$248.43 over last year), Foreign Missions, Lottie Moon Offering \$2,341.84 (\$795.15 over last year), other objects \$711.37. Offerings at Quarterly Meetings were used as follows: January \$50.00 to Key West Good-Will Center. April \$50.00 to Nigerian Student and American Theological Seminary, July \$21.33 to Seminole Indians for Mission Camp last summer. October \$28.31 retained in Association to help defray the expenses of our Auxiliary work and other Associational expenses.

The State Federation of Business Women's Circles met at Boca Raton with 106 attending and 192 attending the BWC Banquet. One new BWC was organized at Sardis, Worthington, making a total of eight.

Now let us embrace the thought, as Mrs. William McMurray, Supt. of W.M.U. Fundamentals so ably puts it, "Blow out your little candle of meager preparation, for today the world is lit by lightning." It is our hope and prayer that we shall indeed be inspired to set higher goals toward which we may reach with eager hands, outstretched in faith to the Master who has sustainance for all who trust Him.

Southern Baptists have made greater progress in recent years in the understanding and practice of the Bible doctrine of Christian stewardship than any other major denomination in America, as indicated by the statistics on giving through the religious bodies in the United States.

We are making progress, which encourages us to further progress. But we have little of which we may boast or feel proud. Dr. J. P. Edmunds reports that the total gifts of all Southern Baptists for all purposes through their churches last year amounted not to 10% of their income — the Biblical tithe — but only to 2.6% of their income. We cannot boast or feel proud of that record.

YOUR COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS:

- 1. That every church plan now to conduct a Stewardship Revival, October 31-November 7 or nearest convenient week. Set the date. Secure explanatory literature and all needed matrials. Begin work now for full attendance for your Stewardship Revival.
 - 2. That every church have a budget.
 - 3. That every church have an every member canvass.
- 4. That every church include gifts to missions through the Cooperative Program in the budget for a certain percentage of the total budget, rather than for a certain number of dollars.
- 5. That every church prayerfully consider increasing the percentage going to missions through the Cooperative Program each year.

REPORT OF DISTRICT MISSIONARY

We have about 7 counties in our District.

Total population of 140,000.

October 1, 1953, we had 75 churches. The total membership was 17,558. An average of 230 members per church.

'140,000 is an average of 1,866 per church.

"One out of every 6 people in Florida are Baptists." said Dr. Stracerer. Then, 23,233 in our District are Baptists.

This means that next Sunday morning, we should have 5,775 Baptists joining our churches by letter — an average of 77 people coming into each of our churches. OR, we could have 25 new churches with 25 people left over.

140.000 minus 23,333 Baptists leaves us 116,667. Suppose we take one-half of these, or 58,334 as our prospects. Then,, let's add to our 58,334 our 23,333 and we have a total of 81,667 TOTAL PROSPECTS.

THIS would require a total of 277 churches, or an added 202 brand new churches of the same average of 230 members each.

TO RE-STATE IT: For each church we now have, we have 1.866 prospects, or 75 different groups of 1.866 people each.

THERE ARE 64,109 people in our District who are unenlisted, unsaved and perhaps definitely LOST.

TO ME this is a tragic picture. We live IN a mission field right bere at home. We should NEVER quit nor grow weary when the Lord is so tolerant of our feeble and unworthy efforts. HOW LONG IS HE going to wait upon us, do you suppose?

LET US MAKE OUR PLANS FOR OUR WORK BIG for the Master for the coming year.

WE OWE IT TO HIM AND TO OURSELVES!
