

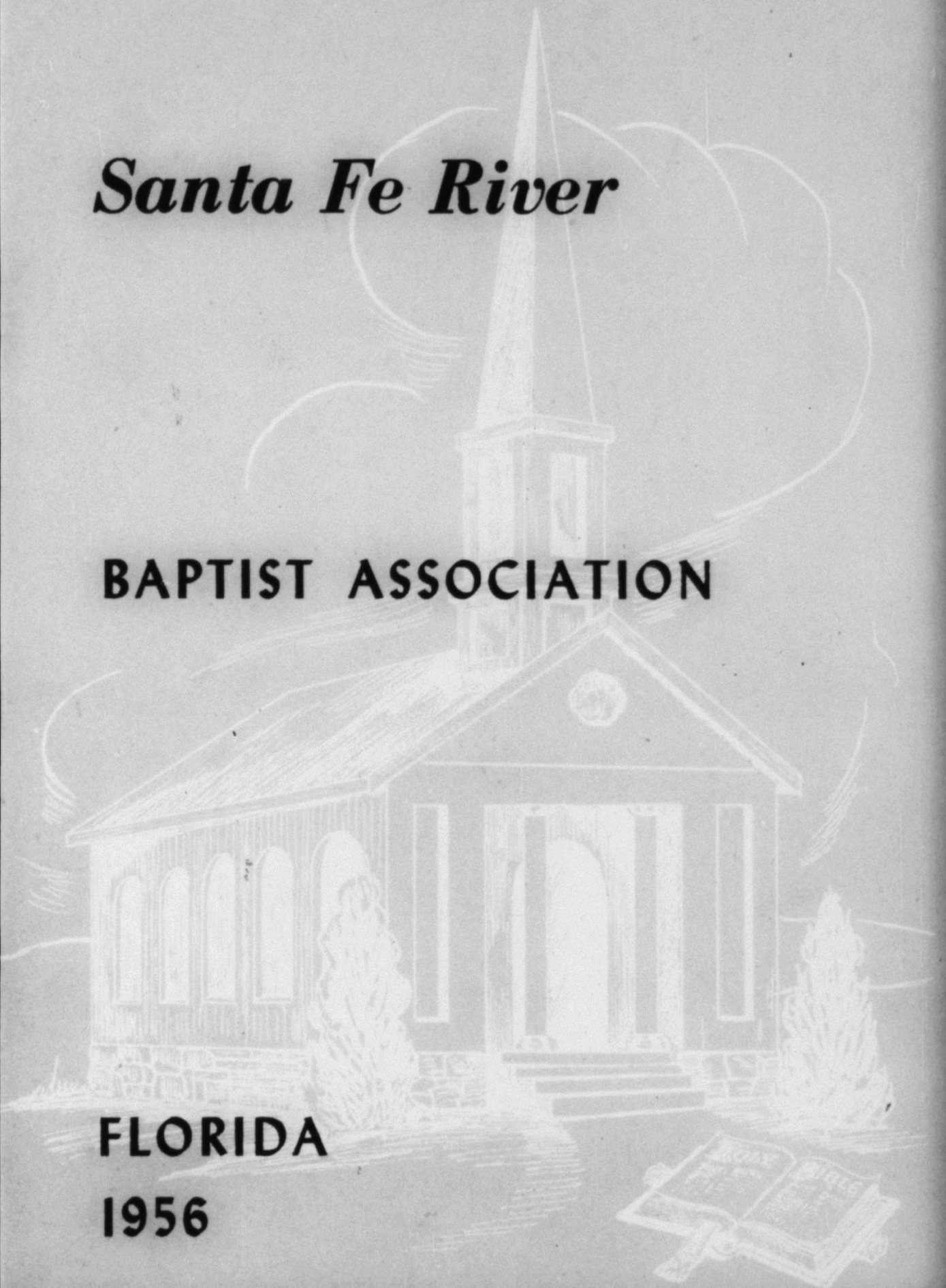

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME: The name of this association shall be called THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE II—OBJECTS: The objects of this association shall be:

(a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.

(b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized areas within the bounds of the Association, and

(c) To effect a closer cooperation between the churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of missions education, and benevolence.

ARTICLE III—CHURCHES

(a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.

(b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associations, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received into membership in the Association.

(c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for doing so. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ARTICLE IV—MEMBERS: This Association in session shall be composed of:

(a) All officers elected by the Association.

(b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and

(c) Messengers elected by their respective churches on the following basis, and certified to the Association in session in their annual letter or petitionary letter: Each church shall be entitled to a minimum of three messengers and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof over the first fifty members, except that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS:

(a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Women's Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.

(b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS:

(a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.

(b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping with the Denominational program.

ARTICLE VII—COMMITTEES:

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

(1) All officers elected by the Association.

(2) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and

(3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.

(b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

(c) The following committees, and any other authorized by the Association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Missions Committee composed as follows: Moderator, Clerk and three additional members appointed on the following basis:

In October 1954, one for one (1) year, one for two (2) years, and one for three (3) years and thereafter one each year for a term of three (3) years.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS: These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association up on a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided however, that one day's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

SECTION I—DUTIES OF CHURCHES:

(a) It shall be the duty of each church in the Association to forward to the clerk of the Association, at least three days prior to the opening of the annual Association, a written report on forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous year.

(b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership in the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the annual session.

SECTION II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS:

(a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committee not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.

(b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderator's request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.

(c) Clerk:

(1) The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes, keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association, and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.

(2) He shall send to the clerks of the churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

(3) He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.

(4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.

(5) The clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the association at its annual session. Additional funds may be provided for the expense of his office.

(d) Treasurer:

(1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Moderator.

(2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.

(3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and bank statement, and shall be delivered to his successor.

(4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Committee and annually to the Association in annual session.

(c) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

SECTION III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES:

(a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month prior to the session.

(c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The Committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS: These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present, all proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be ROBERTS RULE OF ORDER (Revised).

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY ANNUAL REPORT 1955-56

In this Centennial year of our Association we have enjoyed a pageant prepared especially for it's celebration. As history unfolded before our eyes we saw the beginnings and the gradual progress of every phase of our work. Another historical event took place in our Association some seventy-five years ago, which is of great interest to all our people, especially the W. M. U. The first W. M. S. in Florida was organized at the Micanopy Baptist Church by Mrs. N. A. Bailey who was the Pastor's wife and later the Ass'n. Secretary, on April 6, 1881. Mrs. Watt Smith was first President and served in that capacity for years. They both are buried in the Micanopy Cemetery where a Memorial Service was held in their honor March 26, 1954. At the planning and arrangement of Mrs. J. E. Thrasher, present President of the Micanopy Society, Mrs. Roy Lassiter, State President and Miss Josephine Jones, Executive Secretary of Florida W. M. U., participated in the service. A Sunbeam Band of

First Church, Gainesville, was actively supporting one of our Missionaries in those early years also. Today there are 23 Societies with a reported membership of 954.

All regular and Executive Board meetings were held in conjunction quarterly at the following places, N. Central-Gainesville, Waldo, and Antioch. Guest Speakers for two of these meetings were Mrs. George Q. Holland, State President, who brought a message on her world tour and visit to Spain, and Samuel Ho of Hong Kong, China, and Ministerial Student at Stetson. The Annual Meeting will be held at Archer October 16th, with Mrs. J. G. Hughes teaching the New "Aims for Advancement" which will replace the W. M. U. Standard of Excellence. The Association was well represented at the Annual W. M. U. Meeting in St. Petersburg in April and 100% represented by the Association Officers at the State Leadership Conference at Daytona Beach in September. The President participated in an Association Leadership Conference that included leaders from all phases of our Church, life early in the year at Hawthorne. The Annual W. M. U. Meeting for 1957 will be held at First Church in Gainesville in April.

The following is a compilation of the year's work as reported. This work is promoted through various committees and Chairmen largely through the Quarterly Associational Meetings. Since all Societies have not reported regularly to the Association the compilation offers only the facts from those received by the Associational Officers through the regular channels. It does give a good picture of the accomplishments of the large majority of the Societies and their Auxiliaries.

COMMUNITY MISSIONS: 652 members engaged in directed Community Missions activities such as making community surveys, soul-winning activities, promoting the establishing of Family Altars, enlisting more people in definite prayer through the Intecessory Prayer League, urging faithful attendance at mid-week Prayer Services, working in cooperation with Rev. Jack Eppes in the Alcohol Education Program "United Christian Action", urging the Christian use of the ballot, working in Vacation Bible Schools, promoting wholesome recreational activities and establishing libraries to furnish good reading material for our young people, fostering their Auxiliaries, and doing the many necessary things to help alleviate the suffering and supply the needs of the aged, sick, bereaved, shut-in, physically handicapped, underprivileged, migrant, and in Institutions. Cash gifts were donated to meet various needs.

MISSION STUDY: An Association Mission Study Institute on the Home Mission Series presenting a preview of the study on the American Indian was conducted by the Association Chairman in January. Another on the Foreign Mission Series will be conducted on a study of Japan at the Annual Meeting, October 16th. Two Churches held Schools of Missions, 39 Mission Study Classes were conducted on Home and Foreign Missions, Stewardship and Prayer locally, during the year with an enrollment of 1,273 members, 570 of these reading other missionary books.

STEWARDSHIP: Three Churches observed Church Stewardship Night. Only 269 tithers with 30 new tithers were reported. Cash gifts include: Home Missions \$1,504.22, State Missions \$767.63 (very incomplete), Foreign Missions \$3,419.09, to Associational R. A. Leader for chartering a bus to R. A. Congress in Daytona Beach \$65.00, to Youth Director for expense toward taking girls to G. A. Houseparty, \$30.00, additional for promotion of Associational Youth Work \$10.00, added to budget for Association leadership training \$15.00, to BBI toward Woman's Building

\$24.30, to Foreign Relief \$25.00, (The Association pays the expenses of it's Associational Officers to the State and Leadership Conferences and it's Young People's workers to their various Leadership Schools.)

CHILDREN'S HOME IN LAKELAND: Cash gifts to the Home \$80.00, other cash gifts \$76.49 plus spending money for children regularly sponsored by W. M. U., Twenty-three boxes of articles, clothing, pajamas, socks, dresser scarves, underwear, and 10,809 coupons were sent.

TRAINING SCHOOLS: Cash gift \$5.00 and 5 boxes were sent to Carver School of Missions and Social Work in Louisville. Three of our young women are interested in attending one of our Training Schools upon graduation from High School. They are Mazie Young, Lake Butler (Carver School), Melba Ruth Rutledge, Hawthorne, and Erma Lee Hines, Archer.

A Prayer Chairman was added to our roster of Associational Officers this year who promoted her work by encouraging the use of the full time allotted for the three Seasons of Prayer, regular attendance at the mid-week Prayer Services, urging the enlistment of more people in the Incessary Prayer League and keeping before us the necessity of laying the right foundation for all our work by putting prayer first.

The Historian is preparing as accurate a History as can be established from the available records for the Associational W. M. U.

YOUTH WORK: Reported are 66 Auxiliaries including 14 Sunbeam Bands, 21 Jr. and Intermediate G. A. 's, 12 Y. W. A. 's, 19 R. A. Chapters, with a total membership of 692. Officers for the year were Youth Director, R. A. and G. A. Leaders. These officers planned for and promoted all the work of the youth including Quarterly G. A. Council Meetings, R. A. Conclaves, Conferences for Leadership Training of local Counselors, the Annual Youth Rally, an Associational G. A. Coronation and Recognition Service was held with 111 receiving awards. An Associational soft ball league was started. Over 200 young people and W. M. S. members attended the Youth Rally at Antioch. A Youth Leadership Conference was conducted in Gainesville Church, lead by State workers. 33 R. A. boys attended the R. A. Congress in Daytona Beach with the R. A. Leader and was the third largest delegation present. Samuel Ho was Missionary Speaker at their rally in July. The Association was presented with the State Efficiency Banner at the Annual W. M. U. Meeting in St. Petersburg in April for it's youth work.

Forward Steps and Ranking System accomplishments are: 53 Maidens, 21 Ladies-in-Waiting, 14 Princesses, 10 Queens, 1 Queen with Sceptre, 22 Pages, 5 Squires, 7 Knights, and 1 Ambassador. 17 Directors and Leaders and Counselors have completed the Leadership Courses. Many of the Auxiliaries observed all three Seasons of Prayer, contributing through them to Home, State, and Foreign Missions offerings, many tithe and give through the Cooperative Program through their Churches, participate in Community Missions activities directed by their leaders, attend Mission Study Classes and read other missionary books. Many take part in Stewardship Education Plans monthly and in the Annual Church Stewardship Night programs.

We have had a glimpse into the year past through the established records. Shall we now take a glimpse into the future with a forward look at our new program as presented through the new "Aims for Advancement" which is our guide, and be reminded of the Apostle Paul when he said,

"---but this one thing I do, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus," and with this in mind begin now laying a good prayer foundation upon which every phase of our Church life can be built sure and strong.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY REPORT

Big news of the year is the inauguration of a new group program for all retirement plan members---low cost death benefits. Family Benefit Endorsement will go into effect for all retirement plan members January 1, 1957, provided enough members agree to take out this additional protection.

The Endorsement offers lump sum death benefits, with double the benefit in case of accidental death, and premium waiver in case of disability. No physical examination will be required.

Until January 1, 1957, all those under age 65 will be accepted. Thereafter, only those under age 60 will be accepted. Low cost of benefits is possible because this is term protection ceasing at age 65. For instance, the cost of the Family Benefit for a man 20-25 is 28¢ per thousand; for a man 36-40, 52¢; for a man 51-55, \$1.43 per month. Cost of benefit increases each five years until age 60, when it increases each year until age 65.
