CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this association shall be called **THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.**

ARTICLE II—OBJECTS

The objects of this association shall be:

(a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.

(b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized areas within the bounds of the Association, and

(c) To effect a closer cooperation between the churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of missions education, and benevolence.

ARTICLE III—CHURCHES

(a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.

(b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associations, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received into membership in the Association.

(c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for doing so. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ARTICLE IV—MEMBERS

This Association in session shall be composed of:

(a) All officers elected by the Association.

(b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and

(c) Messengers elected by their respective churches on the following basis, and certified to the Association in session in their annual letter or petitionary letter: Each church shall be entitled to a minimum of three messengers and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof over the first fifty members, except that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

(a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Womens Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President, Chairman of Evangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.

(b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

ARTICLE VI—MEETINGS

(a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.

(b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Womens Missionary Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping with the Denominational program.

ARTICLE VII—COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

(1) All officers elected by the Association.

(2) The Pastor of the Churches and Missions in the Association, and

(3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.

(b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

(c) The following committees, and any other authorized by the Association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Missions Committee composed as follows: Moderator, Clerk and three additional members appointed on the following basis:

In October 1954, one for one (1) year, one for two (2) years and one for three (3) years and thereafter one each year for a term of three years.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association up on a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided however, that one day's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

SECTION I—DUTIES OF CHURCHES

(a) It shall be the duty of each church in the Association to forward to the clerk of the Association, at least three days prior to the opening of the annual Association, a written report on forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous years.

(b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership in the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the annual session.

SECTION II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

(a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.

(b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderators request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.

(c) Clerk:

(1) The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association,

and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.

(2) He shall send to the clerks of the churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

(3) He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.

(4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.

(5) The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the association at its annual session. Additional funds may be provided for the expense of his office.

(d) Treasurer:

(1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Moderator.

(2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.

(3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and bank statement, and shall be delivered to his successor.

(4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Committee and annually to the Association in annual session.

(c) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

SECTION III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month prior to the session.

(c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The Committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS

These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present, all proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be ROBERTS RULE OF ORDER (Revised).

If this is a total revolution, then it means that it will sweep the entire world in its onslaught. This certainly provokes a terrible urgency. This is not another crisis. The world has had numbers of these. This is total revolution and it can only be met with any degree of success with total dedication, on our part, to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

During the year 1961-1962, the people of our churches in our association won and baptized 312. We lost by transfers, deaths, etc., 908. There were 29 reported revivals with six churches reporting two revivals during the year. One church reported no profession of faith. Four churches reported no revivals. Grand total associational membership 10,877. Total churches included in this report 28, and one mission. We received by letter and other additions 1,012.

The past is behind us and the future is before us. What can we do in a practical way to meet this present threat? Evangelism offers us a commendable contribution through our local church, our association and our Convention.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Woman's Missionary Union is enlistment for mission. It was for this purpose that the organization came into being. This year, October 1, 1962 to October 1, 1963, is the 75th Anniversary of WMU and the 50th year of Girls' Auxiliary. Many plans are being made for this observance and sixteen high goals have been set for the local societies. An increase in all offerings, an increase in tithers, and an increase in membership and trained leaders. An increase in periodicals and missionary reading and many others.

This past year much emphasis was given to prayer and enlistment. Seventy-five days of prayer from July 18 to October 1st ushered in our Anniversary Year. During that time Associations and local societies were urged to have prayer retreats and many did with great blessing. Mrs. Helen Fling recording secretary of Woman's Missionary Union wrote a book, Enlistment for Missions, and this book will be studied and put into practice in the coming days. Some societies are planning an Enlistment week. This book could be used to advantage in other organizations of the church. She says that every woman has a contribution to make to world missions and often enlistment is the vital factor that is needed. This is a two-fold thing--enlistment of the unenlisted and enlistment to full participation on the part of those who are already in the WMU.

With all our labor saving devices what will women do with the time saved? Will it be a blessing or a cursing? The women of today has many capabilities and she will give her time to something. The Missionary Society has much to offer a women for it is constructed for the younger Woman and the older Woman. There is a place where her Christian personality can develop, where her horizons may be lifted, and her community service channeled, women need the fellowship and inspiration of small groups. They in turn, have much

to give to the Lord's work, in prayer, talent, money, and the rearing of a new generation to carry on the church.

In this day of quantity it is Quality that counts. There are enough Christians to win the world to Christ, if they were only Christian enough. A woman who faithfully puts her best into WMU will be a better church member. She will give more and pray more. Jesus depended upon the women of his day. There are 22 instances in the New Testament where he spoke to them especially. Luke 8:1-3 suggests the way he was supported during his ministry. "Certain women which had been healed ministered unto Him of their substance."

The Watchword for the year has been Psalm 67:2 "That thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations." To this end a study was made of Europe before the Week of Prayer for Foreign Missions. Before the Week of Prayer for Home Missions we studied the new church for our times and the needs of the state were studied during State Mission Season of Prayer. These seasons are now a combination of study, prayer, and giving. Thus we become "Laborers together with God" for his glory.

A new system of reporting was projected this year. It is much more simplified and only an annual report is required instead of Quarterly. Leadership training was provided in courses taught locally and in Days of Instruction taught by a state team, as well as Advanced Training for Leadership given by the state at Deland in September. Six Associational officers were sent and the expense paid by the Association to the Advanced Leadership workshop. Five officers were sent and expense paid for by the Association to the State Annual Session in Orlando in April. The Association gave \$100 to Cuban Relief.

Quarterly meetings were held the first month in each Quarter. In January we met in First Church Gainesville with Miss Carolyn Burnett, State Sunbeam Director, as guest speaker. In May the Southside Church of Gainesville had the meeting and Mr. Robert Scarborough, BSU Director at the U of F, brought a very challenging message on the work he is doing with students. The July meeting was at North Central and the president gave a condensed report of The Southern Baptist Convention, which met in California in June. The last meeting of the year will be in High Springs, November 1st at which time Rev. Hilton Olive will install the officers for the coming year.

We now have 8 YWA's organized in a council and 35 GA's in a council. We have 30 Sunbeam organizations and 28 WMS. In round numbers about 2,000 members in all missionary organizations in this Association. Now is the time for much dedication. It is the world's need. It is our opportunity. It is the Lord's command. The hope of the world lies in the promise of God that "The earth shall be filled with the knowledge of the glory of God, as the waters cover the sea."

WORLD MISSIONS

The Church Member and His Missions Obligation.

John 20:21 "Then said Jesus to them again, Peace be unto you: as my Father hath sent Me, even so send I you."

This is the fifth appearance and the first Commission of our Lord. Matthew 28:18-20, "And Jesus came and spake unto them saying, All authority is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore and make

disciples of all Nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

This is the eighth appearance and the second Commission. Luke 24:29, "And, behold, I send the promise of my Father upon you: but tarry ye in the City of Jerusalem, until ye be endued with power from on high." Acts 1:8, "But ye shall be Witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the Uttermost part of the earth."

This is the tenth appearance and the last Commission of our Lord. The greatest institution in the world is the Christian Home. Next to that is the Christian Ecclesia. In this called out group of Christians we are to witness by all we do. The emphasis is upon teaching and the word teach is imperative. We teach by precept and example. Each Lord's Day the Faithful one is found at his or her post Witnessing for the glory of God. It means that every one that has been saved by God's Grace will be living for Him. If we live for Him we will be soul-winners. We will preach, teach, pray, missions in the Christian Ecclesia. If we live this Faithful life we will promote missions in the congregation, home and community. Being faithful means to give our money, talents, time, personalities to Christ.

In District #4 for 1961-62, we organized three Churches. We had 2 full missions and 16 partial missions. For 1962-63, we hope to organize 3 new Churches and 7 new missions.

Last year, 1961-62, in the state, we organized 41 Churches and 293 missions. We have organized 263 Churches and 656 Missions, since the 30,000 Movement began. Our one imperative is to have the presence and power of the Holy Spirit in our lives and to be able to see the dire spiritual poverty of the world. It is not material destitution that makes a mission field. It is Spiritual destitution. Your own Congregation may be one of the greatest mission fields in the world. Jesus said, "If ye love me ye will keep my commandments." John 14:15, Paul said to the Christian Ecclesiant Ephesus, Ephesians 2:12, "That at that time ye were without Christ, being aliens from the Commonwealth of Israel, and strangers from the Covenants of promise, having no hope and without God in the world." That was the condition they were in before Paul brought to them the message of Jesus. Has it come to the point in time and prophecy that we are reversing the message of the Bible? Paul, Peter and the author of Hebrews have something to say about this also.

First Timothy 4:1-2, "Now the Spirit speaketh expressly, that in the latter times some shall depart from the faith, giving heed to seducing spirits and doctrines of devils; Speaking lies in hypocrisy; having their consciences seared, with a hot iron."

II Peter 2:22, "But it happened unto them according unto the true proverb, The Dog is turned to his own vomit again; and the sow that was washed to her wallowing in the mire."

Hebrews 12:6-8, "For whom the Lord loveth he chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth. If ye endure chastening; God dealeth with you as with sons; for what sone is he whom the Father chasteneth not. But if ye be without Chastisement whereof all are partakers, then are ye bastards, and not sons."

John says, I John 2:19, "They went out from us, but they were not of us; for if they had been of us, they would no doubt have continued with us: but they

went out, that they might be made manifest that they were not all of us."

The thrill of our hearts and lives is to know that Jesus is King of Kings and Lord of Lords. He is present now in the power of the Holy Spirit and one day he is coming in person. Are we doing what we can do and ought to do for Jesus?

If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

But, in most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The Bible, is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave-and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists. It serves mission work at home and abroad. It helps missionaries to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the Blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

In 1961 Southern Baptist churches gave \$164,342.00 to the American Bible Society. Methodist gifts were \$163,593.00. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,065,649.00.

Baptist Bible Institute located at Graceville, Florida fulfills a great need among Southern Baptists. Dr. James E. Southerland, President of B.B.I., has ably pointed out the intent and purpose of this great institution in the following words:

Baptist Bible Institute is owned and operated by the Florida Baptist Convention. We have a steady increase in enrolment each year. We are in the business of training preachers and other Christian vocational workers. We are needed because a recent survey showed that nearly 40% of Southern Baptist preachers do not have a college education. A larger percentage do not have seminary training. Baptists believe God calls men to preach regardless of education. Baptists also believe that once a man is called to preach he should take training and prepare to do his work efficiently and effectively. That is why we believe Baptist Bible Institute fulfills this unique need.

The past year B.B.I. enrolled around 200 students. With a yearly increase in worthy students, the needs are greater year by year. One recent report stated two major needs of B.B.I. right now. These are more buildings and

endowments. Of course, new faculty members are urgently needed as enrolment increases. The Administration recently cited some of the major buildings needed. An administration building, music building, women's dormitory, apartments, cafeteria, and kitchen.

As we think of the purpose and the great needs of B.B.I., it challenges our association to pledge anew our whole-hearted support in prayer, interest, and finances.

HELP FOR ANNUAL STATE MISSION

Each year an attempt is made to give help in the matter of making the annual report on State Missions in the associational meetings. This report is given with the hope that it will be of value to you and that it will serve as a means of telling the State Missions story in a way that will benefit all who hear it.

If the population of Florida doubles by 1970, as many predictions indicate it will, Baptists must assume their rightful share of the load. No state in the Southern Baptist Convention has a more challenging and sobering responsibility. Millions of people will be coming to our state, and a large percentage of them will be without Christ.

This population increase means we must be constantly alert to the increasing needs of State Missions. Where we are now serving one, we will be serving two by 1970. The demands on our Children's Home and Retirement Centers will be doubled, as will the demands for Christian education. Our camps and assemblies will demand further enlargements to keep up with the larger number to be served.

The demands do not end with our institutions but extend to the areas of more personal contact through the departments of service connected with our Florida Baptist Convention. The Departments of Evangelism, Sunday School, Church Music, Brotherhood, Training Union, Student, and Woman's Missionary Union will touch an ever increasing number of people. Through these departments comes help for the local churches as they seek to do their God-given task more efficiently. And through the Field Missions program a group of dedicated men will stand ready to lead out in every practical way in the establishing of new missions and serving the churches as needs come. From October 1, 1961 through September 30, 1962, 313 new missions and 47 new churches have been started.

This State Mission program needs your support. Every church needs to consider its responsibility in this behalf and fulfill this responsibility. A church's contribution to the State Mission program is through Cooperative Program gifts. Constantly increasing these gifts is the only way we can ever hope to finance such a demanding program.

From October 1, 1960, through September 30, 1961, Florida Baptists gave a total of \$2,613,458.10 through the Cooperative Program. For the same period 1961-1962, our gifts total \$2,777,500.90, undesignated, through the Cooperative Program. This is an increase of 6%. While this is encouraging, it must continue to increase if we are to meet the demands. It is suggested that every church increase its gifts by at least 2% per year, until we are doing for world missions what is needed to spread the Gospel of Christ everywhere.

MISSIONS

He who said "I am the light of the world", also said "The field is the world". Thus the field of missionary activity is given to us. Missions is missions regardless of the place of activity.

FOREIGN

The work of Southern Baptist "Foreign Missions" is carried out through varying means and methods. Through, churches schools, hospitals, publication plants, good will centers, and through many other means. All these are interactive and the goal of each is evangelization. Regardless of what their institutional duties are all missionaries participate in the work of the churches in their respective stations.

To perform our task Southern Baptists have 1,563 missionaries under appointment in 51 political entities. There were 103 new missionaries appointed in 1961, and 26 more were appointed during the first four months of 1962. During this time the board has entered six new countries. The board expects to have 2,000 missionaries in the field by the close of the Baptist Jubilee Advance or the end of 1964. There are now several urgent needs, in the following phases of our activity. First the need in the field of evangelism, then in the field of church development, followed by theological education and nursing, as well as student work and religious education.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists to foreign missions last year amounted to \$17,835,615.82, of this amount \$9,315,754.78 was given through Lottie Moon Christman offering.

National pastors number 2,534. Most of the churches have Sunday Schools, and many have other church-affiliated organizations. In 1961 the 3,627 churches and 6,815 chapels and mission points reported 419,744 enrolled in Sunday School, 34,364 baptisms, and 475,727 members.

HOME

By January 1, 1962 the 30,000 movement was near the halfway mark, C. C. Warren, director, announced 14,210 missions and churches had been started. The year 1962 has been designated as "Church extension" year of the Jubilee Advance. The goal for 1962 is 6,000 new operating units.

Woman's Missionary Union has had as their theme for this year "New Churches for Our Time". One of the main items of concern has been and is, the convention wide ministry of relief and resettlement, of more than 100,000 Latin American refugees in Miami, Fla. Most of these are from Cuba. Under the leadership of the Home Mission Board, states have appointed committees which have enlisted churches to aid in the resettlement of families. Last year churches gave \$50,000 as a part of the Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions to be used in relief work.

Churches are now being asked to start missions for language groups as a part of the 30,000 movement. During the year 1963 Language Missions will also be emphasized, under the theme "Sharing Christ in our land."

The Home Mission Board is constantly seeking new ways of advancing the work of Christ in the territory in which it operates. Two are worthy of mentioning. First The Brotherhood has joined forces with the board in sending

men into frontier areas for revivals and other witnessing. Second it has entered into agreements with a number so states. These cooperate in the employment of mose of the 1,975 missionaries.

STATE

Florida is faced every year with a population growth. If this continues with the present pace, it is estimated that our population will be doubled by 1970. Baptists must assume their share of this load. No state in the S. B. C. territory has a more challenging and sobering responsibility. Millions coming to our state, a large part of them will be without Christ.

This fact points up to one fact we must be constantly alert to the increasing needs of State Missions. Where we are now serving one we will be serving two by 1970. The demands on our Childrens Home and Retirement centers will be doubled, as will be the demand for Christian education. Our camps and assemblies will demand futher enlargements, to keep them in pace with the enlarged responsibility.

This State Mission program needs our support. Every church needs to consider its responsibility in this behalf and fulfill this responsibility. Our most effective instrument is the cooperative program, and this implimented by our special State Mission Offering. Constantly increasing these gifts is the only way we can hope to finance such a demanding program.

CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home at Lakeland and the Branch at Miami provide Christian care and training for many dependent children from broken homes.

They have devotionals daily in their cottages, Prayer services are held each Wednesday evening on the campus; however, the children and staff attend and have an active part in church services in three of the local Baptist churches where they are members.

Extra training in Christian living and in knowledge of the Bible comes through study courses, G. A., and Sunbeam training on the campus. The leadership for this work is provided by the local churches.

Religious Focus Week is one of the "mountain top" experiences for children and staff each year. Both campuses are together for a week of training, discussion groups activities, and fellowship. Leaders for this occasion come from over the state and are prominent in their own church programs.

Aside from the institutional care that is provided, there are other methods helping the dependent children of Florida through the Foster Home and Mother's Aid programs. They are very effective and in some instances give the children a great deal more help than could be given in group living. Some children are much happier and make better adjustments when they do not have to compete with or conform to group living. They offer these methods of helping children in order to meet the needs of each child who is admitted.

Last year, they assisted 243 children. One hundred and seventy three of these were from the Lakeland Home and facilities and 52 were in the Miami Branch. They also supervised the rehabilitation of 18 who were returned to their homes. This is an important part of the work as sometimes a little

assistance at the right time can prevent the break-up of the home after a child has been returned.

The special offering at Thanksgiving is an occasion when each member in every church in Florida can have a part in the program of the Home. We ask for your prayers and support for our work with dependent children.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian education from the viewpoint of Baptists means the activities of education presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian religion. Christian education goes beyond the development of the mental, physical, and social, to include the development of the spiritual side of a student's nature. This plus quality is the justification for the existence of Christian educational institutions and the expenditures of the large sums of monies that are allocated for this cause. Baptists have been believers in education and have earnestly sought to take God in account and to present Christian truth and training.

Southern Baptists now operate thirty-two senior colleges and nineteen junior colleges. Seven new colleges are in various stages of planning, to be located in densely populated areas, to serve the hundreds of Baptist students not now near an existing Baptist College. Only two senior colleges and three junior colleges remain unaccredited by their regional accrediting agencies. All expect to be accredited by the Baptist Jubilee Year 1964. Southern Baptists operate six seminaries, Carver School of Missions and Social Work, and the American Baptist Theological Seminary (operated jointly with National Baptists), seven academies, and five Bible schools. The 1962 meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention approved the merger of Carver School of Missions and Social Work and Southern Baptist Seminary.

FLORIDA BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Florida Baptist have two schools: Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, located at Deland, and Baptist Bible Institute, located at Graceville. During the 1961-1962 term, there were 2,788 students enrolled in Stetson University, 635 of who are Baptists. Eighty three students are committed to some full time church-related vocation. Of these 50 are

ministerial students, 9 are mission volunteers, 7 are preparing for religious education work, and 17 are preparing for church music service.

Baptist Bible Institute offers a special training program for students who do not qualify for college entrance. Enrollment increased this past year from 187 to 224. Members of the student body come from 19 states, plus Canada, Cuba, and the District of Columbia. The institute has been engaged in a campaign to secure \$200,00 in funds for capital improvements and endowment. There are 13 members of the faculty who carry on the training program.

During this year, the joint committee from the trustees of Stetson University and the Florida Baptist Convention have been working to bring about a closer relationship and understanding between Stetson and the Florida Baptist Convention. The committee will report to the annual meeting of the Florida Baptist State Convention this fall.

2. There are 6 horse tracks.
3. Florida is the only State in the United States with 6 Jai Alai Frontons.

DID YOU KNOW?

1. The Obscene Literature Traffic pours forth its filth through news stands, drug and grocery racks, movie and other "accepted" areas of entertainment.

WHAT IS UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION?

1. It is a state-wide organization, directed by a Board of Directors and Advisory Councils, composed of 250 of Florida's finest pastors and lay leaders.
2. It is dedicated to the task of serving our churches and protecting our homes by offering Christian solutions to Alcohol, Gambling, Indecent Literature, and related moral problems, through a program of Education, Legislation and Rehabilitation.
3. Jack Eppes is Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the organization. Phil Padgett is Associate Director. Dr. M. Durward Long is Director of Education.

4. State Headquarters are located at 1705 Gary Road, Lakeland, Florida.

STEWARDSHIP AND THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptists' way of saying "yes" to the Great Commission. When Jesus said "Go ye", he said it in the framework of a Biblical plan of finance, which is the tithe. Jesus made this very clear when he said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfil" (Matt. 5:17). Every church should give more earnest attention to the teaching of tithing as the Biblical principle of giving, and to the consistent increase in Cooperative Program giving.

The Forward Program of Church Finance is fast becoming standard procedure for many churches in helping the leadership guide all members toward Scriptural giving. The Forward Program is tested and proven. It is no longer a question mark in the minds of our people, but is now a finance program of proven quality.

We feel that our world missions program calls for a stronger appeal than ever before. The work we are able to do through the Cooperative Program and the added strength it receives from the regular use of the Forward Program is encouraging. But the greatest uplift we can ever give it is prayer. In this month of October we are participating in a special program of prayer for the Cooperative Program. If your church is not already engaged in this prayer program, we recommend that you use the remaining Wednesday nights of the month to pray for Cooperative Program causes.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That each church in Santa Fe River Association plan and carry out a definite program for teaching its membership to participate in the Biblical form of giving, the tithe;
2. That each church in Santa Fe River Association set up a system of regular monthly contribution through the Cooperative Program;
3. That each church in Santa Fe River Association consider the two-plus plan; this is increasing cooperative program gifts by two percent each year.
4. That each church in Santa Fe River Association study and use the Forward Program in its full form, or in its intermediate or beginner stages; and
5. That each church in Santa Fe River Association make a regular habit of praying for Cooperative Program causes.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

Our Retirement Center program has been in operation but one year and a half. The Lord has blessed us abundantly and in many ways. Since our last report we have built two more duplex cottages and added nine rooms to the main building. Also, all the porches have been screened, which has added much to the comfort and security of the residents as well as to the general appearance of the building.

We now have twenty-two residents. Only two single rooms and one duplex cottage are available and we are expecting them to be called for within a few days.

It will be necessary for us to continue the building program perhaps for several years to come because many worthy senior citizens are knocking at our doors. Almost all of the Cooperative Program funds we have received have been used in the building program and we now have property and buildings valued at something more than four hundred thousand dollars including the property which was the gift of Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham. We are so largely dependent on mission receipts for the building program.

We are happy to report that the residents have enjoyed relatively good health during the year though three of them have had to spend just a few days each in the local hospital here in Vero Beach. Everyone is also enjoying fellowship in the churches and all but two have already placed their memberships in the local Baptist churches.

BAPTIST LITERATURE AND THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS

"Through good reading we become acquainted with the wisest men of the ages... are kept cognizant of the affairs of our own day... and experience the joys of losing ourselves in other men's minds."

First and foremost in the regular reading for every Baptist should always be the Bible, God's own Word.

Close behind that first place should be the generous and wise use of good Christian literature which has become so tremendously important to our Christian living and to the growth and development of our churches and our denomination.

Our own state paper, the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, (as of August 1, 1962) had 63,104 different persons on its paid subscriber list with this many papers going into 843 different churches, 739 of which are using the budget plan for at least some portion of their membership. One hundred four other churches have small clubs of subscriptions. Each succeeding year sees more churches sending the WITNESS to every resident family. In spite of the increased circulation over which we rejoice, however, let us remember that there are still 449 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are failing to provide their members and themselves with all the benefits to be gained from a group subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

Every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its homes is urged to complete its subscription list by including every resident family, and

every church which does not now include the WITNESS in its budget is urged to consider doing so promptly. The paper is still available through the church budget plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year to be paid in installments of only 10¢ per month for each family on the subscription list.

In the campaign to reach a circulation of 70,000 by 1964, our association is asked to cooperate by electing a WITNESS representative who will serve as a contact person between the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS office and the churches of this association.
