### CONSTITUTION

### ARTICLE I-NAME

The name of this association shall be called THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

### ARTICLE II—OBJECTS

The objects of this association shall be:

(a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.

(b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized

areas within the bounds of the Association, and

(c) To effect a closer cooperation between the churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of missions education, and benevolence.

### ARTICLE III—CHURCHES

(a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.

(b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associations, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received

into membership in the Association.

(c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for doing so. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

### ARTICLE IV-MEMBERS

This Association in session shall be composed of:

(a) All officers elected by the Association.

(b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and

(c) Messengers elected by their respective churches on the following basis, and certified to the Association in session in their annual letter or petitionary letter: Each church shall be entitled to a minimum of three messengers and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof over the first fifty members, except that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

### ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

(a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Womens Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President.

Chairman of Evangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.

(b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

### ARTICLE VI-MEETINGS

(a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.

(b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Womens Missionary Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping

with the Denominational program.

### ARTICLE VII—COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

(1) All officers elected by the Association.

(2) The Pastor of the Churches and Missions in the Association, and (3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.

(b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator.

Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

(c) The following committees, and any other authorized by the Association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Missions Committee composed as follows: Moderator, Clerk and three additional members appointed on the following basis:

In October 1954, one for one (1) year, one for two (2) years and one for three (3) years and thereafter one each year for a term of three

years.

### ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association up on a two-thirds vote of the members present, provided however, that one day's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

### RULES OF DECORUM

### SECTION I—DUTIES OF CHURCHES

(a) It shall be the duty of each church in the Association to forward to the clerk of the Association, at least three days prior to the opening of the annual Association, a written report on forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous years.

(b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership in the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the

annual session.

### SECTION II—DUTIES OF OFFICERS

(a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.

(b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderators request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the

Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.

(c) Clerk:
(1) The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association.

and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.

(2) He shall send to the clerks of the churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

(3 He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.

(4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.

(5) The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the association at its annual session. Additional funds may

be provided for the expense of his office.

(d) Treasurer:

(1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Moderator.

(2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.

(3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and bank staement, and shall be delivered to his successor.

(4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Com-

mittee and annually to the Association in annual session.

(c) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

### SECTION III—DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month

prior to the session.

(c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The Committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

### SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS

These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present, all proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be ROBERTS RULE OF ORDER

(Revised).

### WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The 75th Anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union, Auxiliary to the Southern Baptist Convention, was celebrated this year all over our nation. The women of Santa Fe River Association observed the Anniversary in a number of different ways. Early in the year, we had a prayer retreat at High Springs, then a Leadership Training Course was taught at First Church in Gainesville. About thirty women completed the course.

The first quarterly meeting was at Parkview Church in Gainesville on January 30th. Miss Ethel Harman, Missionary to Nigeria, told of her work as a nurse in that needy area. Then, Miss Josephine Jones, Executive Secretary for Florida W. M. U. led a conference for local presidents. A donation of \$100.00 was made toward the Camp Fund for our Florida Camp in the center of the state.

In May, we celebrated the Anniversary with a special meeting in Micanopy. Many ladies were dresses of an early era and a large cake with the W.M.U. emblem in lavender was served at noon. The Micanopy W.M.U. is the oldest in Florida, being organized in 1881, seven years before the Southwide Union came into being. The ladies of First Church, Gainesville, presented a lovely pageant, led by Mrs. Fred Langhon, depicting the early days. Mrs. Audrey Cowley, a Florida Missionary to Nigeria, was the inspirational speaker at this meeting and the Association decided to send \$120.00 for the support of a student in the school where Mr. and Mrs. Bill Cowley work.

Our Summer quarterly meeting was at Antioch Church in LaCrosse. At this time, we sent \$100.00 to the Goodwill Center in Panama City for the purchase of a record player. We had visited this work while attending the State W.M.U. meeting and were impressed to give them this aid. We had as our speaker at this meeting, Miss Dorothy Latham, Missionary to Manous Brazil. She was serving in our G.A. Camp for the summer and was a most attractive, young, spiritually minded person. She is in educational work in Brazil.

During the year, \$44.00 was given by individual societies for the purchase of literature to be placed in the hospitals by our Community Missions Chairman, Mrs. W.L. Thomas. \$300.00 was used to send officers to the State meeting in Panama City, to Ridgecrest for W.M.U. Week, and to the Leadership Conference in DeLand. We feel that our women become "World Aware" as we attend these larger gatherings of Baptist women and hear the inspirational programs provided.

The last meeting of this year will be in Hawthorne, October 24. Mrs.

Fred Langhon will be the speaker.

Now, plans are being made for the Jubilee Year, starting again with a prayer retreat on November 4 at Keystone Heights. Leadership training will be provided on November 7-8 at First Church in Gainesville: On Nov. 19th at First Church. Mrs. Fred Langhon will teach a Mission Study on the Mandelbaum Gate. She traveled over this area this summer and has excellent pictures to show, also, First Church has invited the whole association to join in this study. Beginning with a covered dish supper at 6:30, the study will last three hours.

There are three points of particular importance on our plans for this year: First, each society aim for higher recognition on Achievement.

Second, 15% increase on both home and foreign mission offerings - participate in personal soul winning - Every member read the entire New Testament this year. Third, in conjunction with the Sunday School Board and the Brotherhood, an emphasis on the "Church fulfilling its Mission Today."

Jeremiah 31 admonishes, "Set thee up way marks, make thee high heaps; set thine heart toward the highway." One highway is clearly defined for every Christian. In Isaiah 40:3, we read, "Prepare ye the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God." The jubilee

indicates an era of special importance, a time when we are expected to do more than usual, In the 25th Chapter of Leviticus, we read that God instituted the jubilee as a time of returning and restoration" when His children were to return to His high purpose for them, a time of personal examination. Our age has been described as "the era of the great goof-off," when we American Christians stampeded from responsibility.

Does our multiplicity of activity spell true devotion? We race and pant, work feverishly beyond our strength, jostle each other in our haste. Has all of this deceived us into bursting in our own strength? We need to return to prayer and repentance, to praise and thanksgiving. Prayer will give us what God can do. We will not accomplish much without greater faith and more than a casual interest. We must pray for laborers in God's work, for a vision of Christ's Kingdom around the world, for ourselves and our nation. Let us look again at Christ's purpose for His Church, reexamine our motives, and rediscover true Christian service.

Indeed, let us set up way marks and set our hearts toward the highway, making no provision for arm-chair travelers. Ours is a highway of royal service, of individual responsibility, of personal growth. The hymn chosen for the Jubilee Year is my prayer: "O God, our help in ages past, Our hope for years to come, Be Thou our guard while life shall last, and our Eternal home."

### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

One of our important Baptist beliefs is in the authority of God's Holy Word. The American Bible Society is actively pursuing the goal that people everywhere shall have the opportunity to read, feel and hear the Word of God.

God's Word is printed in 1, 127 different languages in its entirety or in parts, as of 1957. Special groups such as the blind, deaf, and service personnel are supplied Bibles. In addition, other groups like in hospitals, homes for aged, rescue missions, correctional centers, migrant workers, and international exchange students are given special attention by the A. B.S. The American Bible Society projects a world view.

There are urgent needs today for printing presses for India, Congo and South America. Bible vans for remote villages in the Phillipines and additional staff for France are also needed. These needs together represent \$375,000.00 in unmet needs.

Baptists and the American Bible Society have long cooperated. May this year see our churches give unselfishly and pray fervently for the worldwide task of the A. B. S.

### BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

A typical student at Baptist Bible Institute would be 32, married, with two or three children, and would have a background as a deacon or other lay leader in a Baptist Church.

We have assembled a highly trained, experienced faculty to train this mature student. Classes, chapel exercises and Field Guidance classes led by denominational leaders from both state and SBC agencies, combine in a deliberate effort to produce graduates who not only can lead the churches, but also who will lead them along paths of denominational loyalty.

Courses parallel those leading to the B.D. in our seminaries. We require three years, or 100 semester hours of satisfactory work, for graduation in pastoral training, sacred music, or religious education. Enrolment for the first semester was 191, a record. Total unduplicating enrolment for both semesters last year was 225.

A new classroom building should be ready for use by 1964; the adminis-

tration building should be in use by next June.

Professor Thomas S. Roote, Jr., joined the faculty in September. He has completed residence work for his Doctor of Religious Education degree from the New Orleans Seminary, and will continue to work on his dissertation while here.

Our budget was \$189,609.05 for 1962-63. Money received last year came from the Cooperative Program, Florida Baptists, \$92,643.17; State Mission Offering, Florida, \$8,400.00; gifts designated through and by churches, directly or through the State Convention office, \$24, 211.50; personal gifts, rentals, tuition fees, book sales, and otherwise, made up the difference.

The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges

for \$175,000.00.

Further needs include a new cafeteria, and housing both for dormitory students and for student families. We shall have to meet these needs before

Several colleges will accept up to two years college credit on Bible

major for the three years work done in the Institute.

An anonymous friend has promised \$5,000.00 if the Institute will match it with \$20,000.00 for a student loan fund. The Trustees are raising our share, expecting to complete the job by December 31, of this year.

CONCLUSIONS: Southern Baptists profit from this vital home mission effort of Florida Baptists. And Florida Baptist churches profit by having good men drawn into the state to attend the Institute, most of whom remain in the general area as pastors or other staff workers.

We thank you for your love and support. We promise to continue, as far as we are able, to merit your continuing cooperation, and to work with you as fellow-laborers for the King.

### STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Your State Missions program is seeking, in every area, to maintain a growth pattern in keeping with increasing needs of our state. Since Florida is the fastest growing state in the Southern Baptist Convention, every area is in need of enlargement and extension, and we are able to meet many of these needs thru the good stewardship practices of the churches in Florida.

in other areas. Thus, we are able to speak the message of Christ more effectively in many new and varied ways. Paul said, "I am become all things to all men, that I may by all means save some." It is our desire to be as much to all men as possible.

There is much to be done. One of the areas of advancement that needs the attention of us all is the starting of new missions and churches. The New Work Revolving Fund is available to the cooperative churches of Florida as a financial help for such mission endeavors. In 1964, we will seek to start some 290 missions, which will help us reach our goal of 1,000 new missions during the Baptist Jubilee Advance; but especially, that we may put the message of Christ in 290 new places of need in Florida.

This year, a new mission endeavor was begun with the purchase of property on Lake Yale. Buildings will be erected on the property, and the message of Christ will be presented in this most urgent and helpful manner.

In State Missions, we want to serve all the churches in Florida, and advance the Kingdom of God thru Evangelism, Brotherhood, Training Union, Sunday School, Music, Student Work, Woman's Missionary Union, Education, Child Care, Ministry to the Retired and countless other ways. Your prayers and support are urgently needed.

### Home Missions

Southern Baptist mission forces reported approximately 5,000 missions and churches started in 1962 as a part of the Convention's effort to organize 30,000 missions and churches by 1964. C.C. Warren of Charlotte, N.C., director of the movement, reports a total of 19,117 units started since 1956. During 1963, the 30,000 Movement will emphasize missions with language roups and in 1864 with urban areas.

The Home Mission Board, which has led Southern Baptists in responding to the needs of Latin American refugees, has helped meet another critical relief need. Winter and spring floods wrecked a number of churches in the Southern Appalachian Mountains, and the mission agency voted \$5,000.00 to help restore buildings and furnishings in Kentucky, Virginia and West Virginia.

Nearly 850 Cubans had been resettled through the efforts of Southern Baptist Churches by May, 1963; and thousands have been assisted with food and clothing in Miami. Churches in Richmond, Atlanta and other cities have responded to needs through Spanish classes, departments, and missions that these Latin friends might have the gospel in the "language of their souls."

There are 738 Southern Baptist ministers serving as chaplains in the

military, hospitals, industry and institutions.

The Home Mission Board enlarged its ministry of survey and special studies with employment of William A. Powell of Chicago and Orrin D. Morris of Jackson, Mississippi, as assistant to Leonard G. Irwin, department secretary.

More than 21,000 missionaries now serve with the Home Mission Board. Most of these missionaries serve under 26 state agreements between the mission agency and the state conventions. These missionaries reported 48,700 professions of faith last year. There were also 595 student summer workers who served.

The migrant missions ministry of the Home Mission Board changed its emphasis to a church-centered approach. Missionaries to the migrants have sold their trailers and established permanent residence from which they will serve limited areas. Instead of ministering to the migrants on a direct basis, the missionaries now serve as advisors to associations and churches who will minister to migrants coming into given church fields.

The Division of Evangelism, which led Southern Baptists to baptize 381,510 during the year, is leading the Convention toward the climatic year of the Baptist Jubilee Advance under the theme, "Spiritual Conquest, NOW!" This theme was adopted by the mission agency for special literature for

World Missions Week, the Convention program, assembly weeks, and the Evangelistic Conference in Dallas in July, 1963. New associate in the division is Newman McLarry.

During 1962, the mission agency appointed 414 missionaries, according to Glendon McCullough, personnel secretary. He said there has been a significant increase in interest and applications by qualified couples and single young women. There continues to be, however, an urgent need for missionaries to Spanish, Italian, Polish, Yugoslavian and good will center missions. Some of these urgent requests have gone unanswered for two years. Missionary nurses and young women in mission centers are a major need. Mc-Cullough also noted that some language group appointees are being sent to language school before service.

Foreign Missions:

Appointments totaling 129 during 1962 and 47 from January to May, 1963, bring the number of foreign missionaries in active service to 1,685. Seventeen missionary associates are included in this number. Missionaries serve 53 countries.

World Evangelization:

Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each mission field -- churches, schools, hospitals, publication plants, good will centers. But all are interactive and the goal of each is evangelization. Whatever their institutional duties, all missionaries participate in the work of the churches in their stations. National pastors number 2,701. Education

Educational work not only offers opportunities for evangelism, but also trains a strong national leadership. The 1,060 Baptist schools, which enroll 169, 178 students, are served by 5, 656 national and 290 missionary teachers. Among the schools are 41 theological institutions with 1,394 students and 6 women's training schools with 467 students. Medical Work:

The primary aim of missionary medicine is the healing of the whole man - both spiritually through a personal knowledge of Jesus Christ and

physically through the best possible practice of medicine.

Medical mission institutions include 18 hospitals and 46 clinics and dispensaries with a total of 1, 156 beds. There are 55 missionary and 82 national physicians, plus 56 missionary and 207 national nurses. They served 328, 898 patients during the year, of whom 35, 144 were inpatients. Publications:

Strong churches need not only trained leaders, but also literature for evangelism and religious education. The largest mission publication centers are located in El Paso, Texas (Spanish), and in Rio de Janerio, Brazil (Portuguese). The major plant for Chinese literature is located in Hong Kong. Several other Missions have plants of varying sizes.

There are 127 people working at the Board's home office, 3806 Monu-

ment Avenue, Richmond, Virginia.

### CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home continues to render distinct services to the needy families of our state. Assistance was given to 436 children during the year. There were 190 in the Home at Lakeland and Miami. There were 52 on Mother's Aid and four in foster home care. Caseworkers had 740 interviews with children and 439 with parents and relatives. They made 31 visits to those receiving Mother's Aid and 15 visits to the homes of those who had been discharged.

Mother's Aid is one of the most satisfactory and successful methods of child care. Under this plan, the children remain at home with their mother who is given financial assistance. A Caseworker visits the home at least once each quarter during the year and counsels with the mother and the child-

This type of assistance is dependent upon the cooperation of the parent with the policies of the Home, which require that children attend and become a part of the local church and its services. They also must attend school when possible.

Some children need more personal attention than is available in group living. These are placed in foster homes that will give them Christian training. All foster homes and children in their care are supervised by workers

from Lakeland or the Miami branch.

The children under supervision last year were principally from homes broken by illness, a lack of strength of the parent to carry the responsibility of family life, inability to provide competent support for the family, desertion and divorce. When rehabilitation can be achieved or the parent becomes well enough to assume family responsibility, they are reunited and supervised as long as the workers think necessary.

The Women's organizations, Missionary Circles, Sunday School classes, and Training Unions provide some help by giving spending money, clothing, and other personal needs of the children. This is an excellent way to foster and maintain an interest between the members of our churches and the Home. Interest in a child is as important to those who are giving as to the child himself. It teaches him that others are interested in him and want to help him. Children learn best by personal relationship with Christian adults, and those who give to help him are enriched more than the child.

Someone has said that Christian education means "Education with a plus." Christian education is concerned with the physical, mental, social and spiritual development of the youth. Baptists have been believers in Christian education.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Southern Baptists are operating a total of 73 schools. Of this number, there are 6 seminaries 35 senior colleges 19 junior colleges 7 academies 5 Bible schools and 1 seminary, jointly operated with the National Baptists.
- 2. The shortage of qualified teachers is the number one problem of administrators. There is an over supply of teachers in Bible and Religion but a critical shortage in every other area.

3. Baptist colleges enroll 1 out of 5 of all Baptist students. There were a total of 80,987 students enrolled in Baptist colleges last year. DID YOU KNOW?

1. Florida Baptists have 2 schools. Stetson University is located at

DeLand. Baptist Bible Institute (BBI) is at Graceville.

2. Stetson University, the oldest University in Florida, enrolled 2,686 students last year. Out of this number, 501 were Baptists - 87 were committed to church-related vocations - 43 were ministerial students - 40 were preparing to be ministers of Education and Music - and 4 were Home and Foreign Mission volunteers.

3. Stetson has been made the recipient of a \$1,500,000.00 grant by the Ford Foundation. It will be on a two for one matching basis (one dollar for every two raised by Florida Baptists and Stetson.)

WHAT ABOUT FLORIDA BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE?

1. Baptist Bible Institute is located at Graceville. It offers special training for students who do not qualify for college training.

2. There was an enrollment of 225 last year. Members from the student body came from 18 states, with 121 of them from Florida.

3. The Institute is owned and operated by Florida Baptists.

4. A high quality of work is being done at both Stetson and BBI. WHAT ABOUT OUR SEMINARIES?

 Our 6 seminaries reported an enrollment of 5, 230 last year. The Name, Location and Enrollment of each seminary as of last year is as follows:

### VISUAL AIDS

The Broadman Films Department of the Baptist Sunday School Board has developed a plan for making films and film strips available at a cost which should be within the reach of all our churches. Not only are films and

film strips offered at a greatly reduced cost, but two projectors (one motion picture and one film strip) are assigned to each association or group

of twenty churches within an association.

The films will be those prepared by Broadman Films each year. There will be a minimum of five and maximum of ten with six planned for this church year. Five films will have a value of \$66.00 in rentals. There will be twelve film strips each year, having a value of \$72.00, and they become the property of the individual church. The motion picture projector and the film strip projector which have a value of \$766.00 are made available to each church on a rotating basis free of charge.

The total yearly cost of this program to each church is just \$75.00 and the basis for this low fee, and the key to its success, in our association,

rests on the degree of participation by the churches.

### ANNUITY BOARD

Special Death Benefit Added to Southern Baptist Protection Plan:

The Southern Baptist Protection Plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death.

If the member dies a natural death before age 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate equal to the average salary on which dues were paid. If he dies because of an accident, the cash settlement will be double the average salary.

There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the Protection

Plan.

The benefit is easy to figure. Suppose a member dies at age 32 of natural causes, and the average salary on which he had paid dues in the Protection Plan was \$3,550.00. His widow or estate would get a cash settlement of \$3,550.00, plus the regular widow benefits. If he is killed accidently, his widow or estate would receive twice this amount, \$7,100.00 plus regular widow benefits.

Benefits Paid:

More than \$41 million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year, these benefits totaled more than \$3 million, and were paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

Membership in Retirement Plans: As of April 1, 1963, there were 15,964, or 49%, of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program for their pastors. 'Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

Field Representatives:

The Annuity Board field representative for Florida is Phil Maxwell. He promotes the Board's retirement plans, trying to enlist all those pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in Florida. He also conducts a program of education, helping those who are in the plans to know more about the provisions they have for the future, and advising them if they should seek additional protection through a supplemental plan with the Board.

Rev. Maxwell is available to speak to a group in the church or association, or for personal conferences about any phase of the Annuity Board's work

### MUSIC MINISTRY

The year 1964 should be a very significant one for Baptists in America. This is the third "Jubilee" year. It should be a year when every Baptist member and church endeavors to reach its maximum for God in Celebration for his goodness during the years of organized Baptist life in America. In order to reach every church and to inspire and lead it to maximum service, the associational music ministry organization stands as a key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in this 'Jubilee' year. To this end, many things are planned in which each church may participate such as hymn sings, schools of training, carol sings and general promotion of better music.

There were some 375 churches in music training out of approximately 1,500 churches in the state during 1962-63. These are the churches who have recognized their musical needs and have endeavored to inform themselves. The associational organization and the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention stand ready to assist every church with its music training needs. Special application forms for workers may be secured from the Church Music Department of the Florida Baptist Convention, 1230 Hendricks Avenue, Jacksonville 7, Florida.

This past year, the associational music ministry organization showed 43 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. 255 churches participated in the festivals with 602 choral groups, totaling 12,544 choir members. 207 hymn players, 50 song leaders, 1 instrumental ensemble with a total of 7 participants. (Our Associational Festival was held at Calvary Baptist Church on January 27, 1963. We are planning to have a festival during January 1964.)

There will be 11 State Music Festivals in 1964. The 1963 report of the State Festivals is as follows: There were 322 choral groups with 7,229 members - 146 hymn players - 31 song leaders - 1 instrumental ensemble with 8 participants. A grand total of individuals participating in the State Festivals was 7,414. There were 153 churches participating and 505 certificates of award issued. We plan to encourage our churches to participate in the nearest festival. In order to participate in the State Festival, it will be necessary for every church to participate first in an Associational Festival.

For the third consecutive year, Florida has reached 100% efficiency in organization, which is the highest in the Southern Baptist Convention for associational music organization. Thank you again pastors, music directors and others for your cooperation in this endeavor.

Florida was fourth in the Southern Baptist Convention in reporting through the Church Letter to the Association in 1962. There were 902 churches out of 1,510 reporting music ministries with an enrolment of 53,129. This is an increase over 1962 of 152 churches reporting and the difference in the enrolment of 6,880. Every church is urged to realize that if it has adults and children, which uses music in its worship services and in the organizations and which elects a music director and has regular rehearsals, it has a Music Ministry.

Harmony Bay Youth Music Camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City again this year. The limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp enjoyed superb music leadership from the best faculty available. These were held in August. During 1964, these camps will be held as follows: August 3-9 will be the camp for first time Intermediates only. August 10-16 will be the camp for Intermediates who have attended before and all Young People, ages 17-24. Each church in our association may send 5 Intermediates to the first camp and 5 Young People or second time Intermediates to the second camp. These camps are designed to train our best and most talented young people in our churches. Let us send one or more next year.

Two southwide music conferences were held during 1963. Approximately, 500 from Florida attended along with more than 3,000 others throughout the south at Ridgecrest the week of June 27-July 3. More than 1,200 attended Music Week in Glorieta, New Mexico with 20 of them being from Florida. Glorieta Music Conference was held July 11-17. Dates for 1964 are: Ridgecrest, June 25-July 1; Glorieta, July 16-22.

The associational music organization and the State Music Department, wish to thank each church and its music leaders for a very fine year and wish for you another good year for "more and better music by more and better musicians, singing with grace in their hearts to the Lord."

### CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION

Our committee was appointed by the Moderator to continue the work begun the year before on revising and rewriting the constitution and by-laws of Santa Fe River Association. The present document is outdated and is not adhered to as being of any effective service. The committee was organized and began its work on February 21, 1963. For several weeks, lengthy meetings were held in an effort to study our present constitution, By-laws, our program of work, officers and leaders jobs for background of the new constitution and By-laws. The document was revised six times in an attempt to incorporate the best suggestions of our leaders, officers and member churches. We feel that it is acceptable to each messenger and church for the benefit of our cooperative effort. This new document is not a master but a means toward harmonious relations, effective cooperation and strengthening of our witness for Christ here.

Recommendation: That we adopt this Constitution and By-Laws.


