

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CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I-NAME

The name of this association shall be called THE SANTA FE RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE II—OBJECTS

The objects of this association shall be:

(a) To encourage the spirit of cooperation between the member churches in their Divinely appointed work.

(b) To provide direct missionary activity in reaching unevangelized

areas within the bounds of the Association, and

(c) To effect a closer cooperation between the churches and the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention, and a greater participation in the Denominational program of missions education, and benevolence.

ARTICLE III—CHURCHES

(a) This Association shall consist of Missionary Baptist Churches of regular faith and order, holding regular communication with the Association in its annual sessions, and subscribing to the beliefs of the Denomination and the objects fostered.

(b) Churches presenting petitionary letters from other Associations, and newly constituted churches presenting proper credentials of organization and articles of faith, accompanied by properly accredited messengers, may, by majority vote of the annual session, be received

into membership in the Association.

(c) This Association admits the right of any of the churches comprising it to withdraw by application for a letter without assigning any reason for doing so. At the same time, this Association claims the right to withdraw from any church which departs from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice.

ARTICLE IV-MEMBERS

This Association in session shall be composed of:

(a) All officers elected by the Association.

(b) The Pastors of the Churches in the Association, and

(c) Messengers elected by their respective churches on the following basis, and certified to the Association in session in their annual letter or petitionary letter: Each church shall be entitled to a minimum of three messengers and two additional messengers for every twenty-five members or major fraction thereof over the first fifty members, except that no church shall be entitled to more than ten messengers.

ARTICLE V-OFFICERS

(a) The officers of this Association shall be: Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Womens Missionary Union President, Brotherhood President,

Chairman of Evangelism, Music Director, and Pianist.

(b) Officers shall be elected at each annual session, from members of this Association, to take office immediately, except the Moderator and Vice-Moderator, who shall take office at close of final session. The Moderator and Vice-Moderator shall be elected by ballot from nominations made on the floor of the first session of the annual session, and shall not hold office for a period longer than two successive years. All other officers shall be nominated by the nominating committee. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term. All officers shall serve until their successors have been elected.

ARTICLE VI-MEETINGS

(a) The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as the body shall have determined at its annual session. In emergencies, the Executive Committee may make such changes in the time and place of the annual session as will best serve the interests of the Association.

(b) The Sunday School, Training Union, Womens Missionary Union, and Brotherhood officers shall conduct such meetings as are in keeping with the Denominational program.

ARTICLE VII-COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall be composed of:

(1) All officers elected by the Association.

(2) The Pastor of the Churches and Missions in the Association, and (3) One additional member from each Church. These additional members to be nominated by their respective Churches and elected by the Association in annual session.

(b) The Program Committee shall be composed of the Moderator,

Vice-Moderator, and Clerk.

(c) The following committees, and any other authorized by the Association, shall, unless otherwise provided, each be composed of three members appointed by the Moderator: Nominating Committee, Resolutions Committee, Radio Committee, Budget Committee, and Missions Committee composed as follows: Moderator, Clerk and three additional members appointed on the following basis:

In October 1954, one for one (1) year, one for two (2) years and one for three (3) years and thereafter one each year for a term of three

vears.

ARTICLE VIII—AMENDMENTS

These articles may be made, altered or rescinded at any annual session of the Association up on a two-thirds vote of the members present. provided however, that one day's notice shall have been given, and that the proposed amendment shall have been presented in writing.

RULES OF DECORUM

SECTION I-DUTIES OF CHURCHES

(a) It shall be the duty of each church in the Association to forward to the clerk of the Association, at least three days prior to the opening of the annual Association, a written report on forms provided, specifying the names of her messengers and giving statistical account of the work of the previous years.

(b) Each Church shall nominate a layman for membership in the Executive Committee and shall report such nomination in writing to the

annual session.

SECTION II-DUTIES OF OFFICERS

(a) Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside at all sessions and appoint all committees not otherwise provided for. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee submitting a written report of its work to the annual session. He shall also be Chairman of the Program Committee. He shall countersign all checks of disbursement.

(b) Vice-Moderator: It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to perform all the duties of Moderator in his absence. He may also preside at Moderators request. He shall serve as Vice-Chairman of the

Executive Committee and of the Program Committee.

(1) The Clerk shall keep a correct record of the proceedings of the Association, supervise the printing and distribution of the minutes keep a regular file of the published proceedings of the Association,

and deliver same, with all other materials belonging to the office, to his successor.

(2) He shall send to the clerks of the churches the "Associational Letter" report forms at least thirty days prior to the annual session.

(3 He shall notify in writing, immediately upon their election or appointment, all persons elected to office or appointed on committees.

(4) He shall serve as Secretary of the Executive Committee, keeping a correct record of its proceedings and notifying its members in writing of all regular and special meetings.

(5) The Clerk shall receive remuneration for his service, the sum to be fixed by the association at its annual session. Additional funds may be provided for the expense of his office.

- (1) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse all Associational funds. All receipts shall be deposited in a public bank and all disbursements shall be made by check signed by Treasurer, countersigned by Modera-
- (2) All expenditures shall be authorized by the Executive Committee or the Association in annual session before disbursement is made.

(3) Permanent records shall be kept, including cancelled checks and

bank staement, and shall be delivered to his successor.

(4) Written reports shall be made quarterly to the Executive Com-

mittee and annually to the Association in annual session.

(c) Other Officers: The officers of the Sunday School, Training Union, Women's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Chairman of Evangelism shall perform the functions usual to their offices, following the plans outlined in their respective Denominational publications. The Executive officer of each department shall present at the annual session, a written report of the work of his department. The Music Director and Pianist shall have charge of the music at Associational and Executive Committee meetings, and shall endeavor to promote the cause of good music at the Churches.

SECTION III-DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

(a) The Executive Committee shall transact all business of the Association between annual sessions. It shall meet quarterly at a time and place decided upon by the committee, and at other times and places upon the call of its chairman. If a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, the Executive Committee shall elect an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(b) The Program Committee shall suggest the order of business for the annual sessions. Persons expected to make reports or otherwise take part in the program shall be notified in writing at least one month

prior to the session.

(c) The Nominating Committee shall, by written report at the first session of the annual session nominate all officers of the Association except as otherwise provided. The Committee shall have personally conferred with each nominee at least one week prior to his nomination. The Committee shall serve throughout the year and if a vacancy occurs in any office between sessions, shall make nomination to the Executive Committee of an officer to fill such vacancy for the unexpired term.

(d) Other Committees shall perform the duties assigned them.

SECTION IV—AMENDMENTS

These Rules of Decorum may be made, altered, or rescinded at any annual session by a majority vote of the members present, all proposed amendments shall be presented in writing.

SECTION V: The parliamentary law which shall be used in the government of this Association shall be ROBERTS RULE OF ORDER

(Revised).

THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

Missions depend on the reaction of the individual Christian to the responsibility he has been given in the Bible. God made some pronouncements in the Old Testament, and Jesus built on these in the New Testament. One of the fundamental pronouncements of the Old Testament had to do with possessions. The tithe, or one tenth of all a man had made it very clear that everyone is expected to tithe.

For a good many years now, we have been using the slogan, "Every Baptist a Tither," but this is somewhat general. Even though every Baptist tithing is our goal, we are not moving too rapidly toward its accomplishment. In Florida, according to best reports, we have 16.3 per cent of our Baptist church members tithing. This adds up to 89,538 people. This is a very small number when we think of the 543,676 church members in our state.

At the May & meeting of the State Board of Missions, a goal was approved to seek to add 50,000 new tithers to this number during the period April 1, 1965 to March 31, 1966. This will be in cooperation with Southern Baptist efforts to add 2,000,000 new tithers during this same period. This represents a 10 per cent increase in tithers for Florida Baptists.

The increasing demands of a waiting world make our attention to these matters urgent. There are lost people everywhere and they must be ministered to. The response of churches in the Santa Fe River Association to this tith-

ing campaign is important. We are suggesting a goal of 10 per cent based on the church membership listed in the 1963 Florida Baptist Annual. This would be 118 for the association.

We urge you . . . "BEGIN TO TITHE IN '65,". The cooperative program depends on your stewardship.

With hundreds of thousands of new residents, huge military space programs, industrial and agricultural expansion and seemingly unlimited economic prosperity, the Sunshine State seems destined to reach even greater heights of "fame" and "wealth" in the future.

But what about her soul! While our churches grow in number and size, there is also a sin-sickness of epidemic proportions which destroys more, and younger, victims each day.

CONSIDER THESE FACTS:

- 1. The state issued two thousand new alcoholic drink licenses in the past two years, increasing the total to 18,600 legalized liquor outlets, selling annually 80 million gallons of beer-wine-whiskey, for over \$500 million dollars. When all the "contributions" to human misery, economic loss and depravity are totaled up, the liquor costs Floridians twenty times as much as it produces in tax income.
- 2. There are 166 dog tracks, 6 horse tracks, and 6 Jai Alai Frontons, which takes in \$400 million dollars a year.
- 3. The pornographic literature and other forms of obscenity "filth" that once dismayed and sickened the public conscience is now accepted and ignored while the moral decline continues to increase.
- 4. While many public officials and community leaders parrot the propaganda line put out by liquor-gambling-obscenity promoters that by legalizing evil it can be better "controlled," every dependable study shows that Florida has a tremendous amount of illegal liquor-gambling-vice; crime, suicide, illegitimacy, delinquency rate often double the national rate; an overwhelming tide of emotionally disturbed persons and welfare cases; a greatly under-financed school system; many public services of below average quality and quantity. All of this in spite of the professed belief by many that a "tax income" from liquor and gambling would make Florida a utopia. Instead, it is fast becoming another Sodom and Gomorrah.

WHAT CAN WE DO:

1. Tell those in authority, local-state-national, that you want action now, both administrative and legislative.

2. Let the people know where you stand, and where your church stands on these critical moral issues.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

On May 1, 1964, there were 16,251 churches of our Southern Convention with their pastors participating in the Annuity Program. This is 50 per cent of all the churches. There were at the same time 118 educational institutions, hospitals, children homes, houses for the aged and other south wide agencies out of the 174 such institutions and agencies participating. This made a total membership of approximately 25,000. Since the beginning of the Board's work, there has been \$43,500,000 paid in Relief and Annuity benefits. There

were \$3,250,000 paid in such benefits last year.

The Board is now offering a new, "Life Benefit Plan", to our convention. Every church, Pastor, or denominational

to our convention. Every church, Pastor, or denominational worker is eligible to participate, regardless of whether they are participating in the retirement plan. The Board hopes to have the necessary 3,000 to put the program into operation by October 1, 1965. The cost is low. Only 1 per cent of salary with a salary of \$4,000 to \$12,000, making a minimum monthly rate of \$3.34 to a maximum monthly rate of \$10.00 for the \$12,000 salary. Car expenses, housing and utility allowance may be added to salary, to increase the salary base. The benefits for the participants are high. For example the widow of a man 45 or under will receive two and one-half time the salary basis. If death is accidental the benefits double. On a \$12,000 annual salary the benefits would be in case of natural death \$30,000, in accidental death \$60,000. The benefits are scaled down one-tenth of 1 per cent each year as one gets older. If a person joins the first year of eligibility and pays into the plan for 10 years continually. after 65 he will have a paid up benefit of \$1,000 or the amount equal to the amount paid in, if less than \$1,000. In case of total and presumably permanent disability the payment is waived but his coverage continues. If further information is desired, contact: Rev. 1. We recommend that each cooperating church of the Santa Fe River Baptist Association be requested to include in their annual budget 1% of their budget receipts for the associational budget and support of associational missions.

2. We recommend that all departments receiving an offering at an associational meeting be requested to channel such runds through the Treasurer of our association in order that complete records of receipts and disbursements may be made to the association.

3. Concerning honorariums and travel expense, we recommend that speakers from outside the association be given \$15.00 honorarium, plus 10 cents per mile. No honorarium or travel expense to be given to those within the association.

4. We recommend that the balance of items budgeted for "establishment of missions" at the end of year be placed in savings as trust for future missions use as may be approved by executive committee or the association.

5. We recommend that funds received above the adopted budget be divided 25% to association general budget and 75% to establishment of local missions.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The breakup of homes and the desertion of children has become all together too common in our society. The sense of responsibility, if indeed many of our people have been taught any, has fled, and hundreds of children are deserted by one or both parents with little or no remorse for what they have done. The number of applications to our Children's Home during the spring and summer, indicate a turn for the worse in family relationships.

The Children's Home has four case workers, each of whom has graduated from an accredited school of social work. It is their business to counsel with children and parents, and in every case where good family life can be maintained, to keep them together. Their success is shown by the fact that 94 applications were with-drawn and 55 children were returned to their families or near relatives. 75 children were admitted to the Home in Lakeland and Miami for a total of 183 in residential care and 64 assisted through Mother's aid program. 1,094 counseling sessions were held with children and 684 with relative.

It is the right of every child to have his own home. It is the responsibility of every parent to care for his child to the best of his ability. In fact, when children are admitted to the Home, parents are asked to pay toward support of their children if it is at all possible. When parents are un-

able to care for their children, it becomes the privilege of an institution such as ours to help. Many excellent men and women have spent some time or have been reared in our Children's Home. Those who are so unfortunate as to need help because of the breakup of their own home, should be given assistance if possible.

If the members of our churches would give 2 cents a week for child care, we could double the number we are now helping, and who knows but that some of those children

might be ours.

We trust you will place the poster for the Thanksgiving offering in a prominent place in your church so that those who wish to help in the care of our children, may be prepared when the offering is taken.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

It has been well said that Christian Education means "Education with a plus." This means that the content and process are presented and interpreted in the light of the Christian Religion. Not only of the young, but is vitally concerned with their spiritual development. Huge sums of money invested in our institutions of higher learning can be justified only in light of the contribution they make to this development and in the service they render the Kingdom of God and Baptists.

Southern Baptists now operate 73 schools; 6 seminaries and a joint operation with National Baptists of another seminary, 37 senior colleges, 17 junior colleges, 7 academies, and 5 Bible schools. Only 3 of the colleges old enough to be ac-

credited lack full recognition.

Qualified teachers for the schools continue to be a major problem. The sciences, English, and economics are areas critically short of Ph.D's while there is a great oversupply of teachers of religion.

Enrollment and Support — Enrollments of students have reached a record high for 1963-64 of 83,589 students compared

to 80,987 in 1962-63.

Graduates from 73 schools from September, 1962 to August, 1963, totaled 11,083 compared to 10,922 the preceding year.

State conventions and the Southern Baptist Convention increased gifts to the schools from \$15,514,770 to \$16,863,416, according to the reports from the schools. Gifts from the conventions for operations amounted to \$11,027,128 and for capital projects \$5,836,288.

In addition, the schools received \$15,888,961 in other gifts, grants and donations. The total assets of Southern Baptist

educational institutions are now \$416,207,080 of which \$102, 091.461 is for endowment.

GOODWILL CENTER COMMITTEE REPORT

The committee set aside by the Executive Committee, Santa Fe River Baptist Association to explore the approximate cost of starting and maintaining a Goodwill and Childcare Conter in Gainesville for Negroes met Wednesday morning, July 1964, in the Chapel of the First Baptist Church, Gainesville. (Meeting time 10:30-12:15).

The following are our educated estimates of the approximate cost for starting and maintaining the suggested Center.

I. Building and Capital:

1. The suggested site, both building and property, is available with out cost (except possibly the \$3,000 indebtness of the Trustees).

The Home Mission Board can operate with only a lease

and will not need a deed to the land.

2. To put the building in operational condition (including furnishings) will cost approximately \$30,000 to \$50,000 (this is our estimate after the City Inspector looked at the present building). There is a question of zoning but the committee feels this can be arranged without complications.

II. Operational:

1. Cost to operate per month:

a. One (1) Director, \$350.00 (includes house allowance).

b. Extra Help-we feel the income from the child-care

would approximately take care of this.

c. Maintanence and General Operation--minimum would be \$150.00 Approximately \$200.00 to \$300.00.

III. Associational Committee:

It is our opinion that a Committee from the Association will be needed to work with the Director of the Center to corelate activities and communications between the Association and the Center.

1. The Home Mission Board will set up the Program and

be the general director of the Center.

2. The Home Mission Board will participate in the Capital Outlay. (Possibly as much as 50%, but we must remember that \$14,000 has been their high outlay before.)

3. On operational Expenses the Home Mission Board will pay the monthly salary of the Director. We will be responsible

for the remainder.

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Chairman recommended we do the following:

A commitment of our willingness to attempt the project.
 A committee be authorized (in cooperation with Executive Committee) to:

(1) Work with Home Mission Board and present Trustees of property involved to work out satisfactory arrangements.

(2) Make plans for raising the capital funds needed.

(3) Make recommendations as needed concerning devlopment of the program at the center, committees needed, and suggestions to finance committee as to budget needs. Passed.
