Articles of Faith of the West Fla. Baptist Association.

DECORUM.

1. Every query sent up to the Association, by any cherch in this union, shall be read, and put to vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated of not, and if there he a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated; but if not, it shall be withdrawn, provided always that those be first considered which effect the

2. Every motion made and seconded, shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be wtihdrawn by the member who made it.

3. Every person who speaks in debate, shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject in debate, or use indecorous language. 4. No person shall speak more than three times upon the same subject, without

leave of the body.

5. No member shall abruptly break off, or absent himself without leave of the body; and if he so does, he shall be marked as an absentee.

6. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and culled over as often as the body may require.

7. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled, but he shall not vote except the body be equally divided.

8 It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that these rules are strictly observed by the body.

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(B) REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee have again to report: That owing to the continuance of the war, and the consequent derangement of affairs, they have done nothing in the way of missions, except the labors of Brother Howell, west of Campbelton. He has continued his labors monthly during the year, and succeeded in raising a tolerably promising church, which has just been received in your body, called Damascus. He has also labored occasionally at another very destitute point.

The committee have agreed to pay Brother Howell \$75 for his labors as aforesaid, provided the amount can be raised. We recommend that an effort be made in the body

We also recommend the continuance of Brother Howell's

labors at said points.

In consequence of the breaking down of our currency, about \$430 died on our hands, so that nothing is left in the Treasury except what has been sent up at this session.

Your Committee on publications have but a small field from which to cull their report on the present occasion .-The effects of the devastating war from which we have just emerged, have been as fatal to the publication and mail departments, as to any other branch of the public interests of our country; and hence, we have of late been deprived of the circulation of newspapers, and all other literary periodicals. We have recently been cheered, however, with the reappearance of the Baptist Banner, hailing from and conducted by Brother J. N. Ells and Elder E. T. Winkler, and we heartily recommend it to all lovers of Biblical truths. We hope also soon to greet the Christian Index-that timehonored organ of the Baptist interests which triumphed through the vicissitudes of near half a century, until crushed recently by the late cruel war. And should it be revived, as we hope, we recommend it to a more general introduction

into the families connected with your body than ever. These periodicals, with others of like character, we advise our brethren and sisters, take and read with care, and in the spirit in which the noble Berians heard Paul and Silas preach, not to take their teachings upon their bare assertions, but to search the scriptures daily, whether their teachings be true or not. Last, and infinitely most important, we recommend to the universal perusal of men and women every where, the holy scriptures, which, we are assured, were given by inspiration of God, and are profitable for doctrine. for reproof, for correction, and for instruction in righteousness.

Your Committee on Documents report that they find nothing claiming the attention of your body, except that the Church at Orange Hill. petitions for the next Association.

Your Committee on Missions beg leave to report: That though the difficulties now in the way of carrying on missionary operations are numerous and great, they trust that the efforts of chorches will not be relaxed. The importance of the work is the same; the assurances of the Great Head of the church remain unchanged—the value of souls is the same, and if our means are less abundant than formerly, it becomes us to husband those means more carefully, and by some systematic plan, to have them so concentrated as to be

made efficient.

Our facilities for hearing from foreign missionary fields are so limited as to cut of all information, and we have nothing to ley before you in connection with that part of our operations. It may be that God has smitten us with poverty, because of our former carelessness upon this subject, and that he has cut us off from information of the rest of the world, to give time for considering our wants at home, and maturing some more efficient plan for supplying those wants. Let us not be found neglecting the indications of His providence; far more, let us not be wholly hindered from this work by the adversity surrounding us.

That school to which we refer is conducted by the Holmes Valley church, and is well attended, and is doing a good work. We are glad to know that there is this light shining, and hope that other churches may be influenced to follow their example. It is to be regretted that there is so little interest manifested in this great work. The young mind is not only more vacant and susceptible of impressions, but these impressions are more lasting, and while so many young minds are open for either good or bad impressions, how exceedingly important that the Sabbath School, one of the most efficient means in the world, should be employed for the religious culture of the children of the land. Your Committee on Decease of Ministers wish to report as follows:

Our Association has been highly favored of God during the last associational year, with regard to the preservation of our ministers, with one exception. We refer to our beloved Brother, Alfred Williams, who was a member of Pilgrims Rest church. This brother had been but recently set at liberty by his church, to exercise his gifts as a minister. He was a brother highly esteemed by those who knew him. He gave promise of great usefulness in the ministry, and on account of his death, this was a great loss to his church and vicinity. Brother Williams was a good and true man, so far as your Committee has been able to learn, in all the relations of life in which he had been called to act. The loss of good and useful men is at all times a calamity to a church or community. They are the strength, the bone and sinews of society,

and cannot be spared without great apparent detriment to those most immediately connected with them. But sad as such dispensations of Providence may be to his immediate relations and friends, it is proper for them and us to remember that it is God's will, and must be done, and we should be comforted, knowing that the God of all the earth will do right.

Brother Moderator:

Your Committee on the state of the Churches are unable in the short time allowed to make out this report, to get all the information desired in reference to the condition of the Churches. But from the best information we can obtain.

1. The Churches in your bounds are in fellowship with each

other and at peace internally.

2. That God has in the dispensations of his grace visited several of the Churches, which has resulted in addition of about one hundred souls.

3. That only about four have a scriptural pastorate. The remainder being served once a month (or less often) by ministers

from other Churches from a distance.

4. That there is probably a want upon the part of most of those serving the Churches, both as to study and practice of prepation for and presentation of those strengthening and soul-inimang doctrines of the Gospel so forcibly urged, both by the Saviour and the Apostles, viz: The unity of the God-head, the Divinity of Christ; the Mediator, the personality of the Holy Spirit, the doctrine of Predestination and Elections, the utter impotency of man to reinstate himself in the favor of God and the certain salvation of all those who are the called of God.

1 5. Before closing this report may we not call the attention of the body to a subject which probably will effect the state of the Churches early in the ensuing year? viz: The relation of the colored membership of the Churches to the whites. Recent events affecting the civil and political relation of the two races will most probably affect their religious relations, may we not for the sake of concert of action, and as a safeguard against losses that might otherwise occur with propriety recommend to all our Churches to follow in the old paths, and so far as the administration of Discipline is concerned and the right of suffrage and such like, to proceed as heretofore.

6. It is distressing to know that some four or five of your Churches in your western bounds is now and has for three or more years been destitute of preaching. Brethren cannot something be done?
