

MINUTES.

- 1. The congregation assembled in the house, and the Introductory Sermon was preached by Brother J. J. Grantham, from the 15th verse and 2d chapter of Paul's second letter to Timothy: "Study to show thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth."
 - 2. One hour's intermission.
- 3. After intermission and refreshment, the delegates convened in the house, and the Association was organized for business by singing and prayer. Prayer by the former Moderator.
- 4. The Letters from the Churches were then handed in and read.
- 5. Elected Brother William M. Howell Moderator, and Brother Stephen Rowe Clerk.
- 6. Invited ministers of our faith and order, and not of this body, to seats with us.
- 7. Called for petitionary letters from newly-constituted Churches, and received a letter from the Church at Bethel, Holmes county, Florida, and also one from Pleasant Hill, Jackson county, Florida, both of which being found in good order, were received into fellowship with us, and the hand of fellowship extended to their delegates.
- 8. Called for correspondence from religious bodies and received from the Judson Association Brother J. M. Poyner, and from the Newton Brother T. J. Dormany.
 - 9. Appointed committees as follows, viz:

On Preaching-Brethren E. H. Marlin and Daniel Williams, with the delegation from the Greenwood Church.

On Documents-S. Rowe, D. Williams and King White.

On Sabbath Schools-E. H. Marlin, A. Bevis, J. B. Everett.

On Finance-B. H. Banks, W. W. Boykin and A. Bevis.

On Publications-W. B. Lacy, W. W. Odom, R. C. B. Lawrence.

On Missions—G. Hartsfield, M. Osborn and J. J. Grantham. On Nominations—J. A. Collier, Wm. Brunson and Tyler Chumney.

On Decease of Ministers-William Brunson, Wm. Sorey and J. B. Baxley.

On the State of the Churches-G. Hartsfield, E. H. Marlin and W. Williams.

- 11. The Committee on Preaching report that Brother Odom preach to-night, and Brother Poyner to-morrow, at two o'clock.
- 12. Agreed to meet for prayer to-morrow morning, at nine o'clock.
- 13. Adjourned business to nine o'clock, Monday morning. Prayer by Brother G. Hartsfield.

Sabbath, October 27th.

The congregation convened in the morning for prayer.

At 11 o'clock, Brother Howell preached the Missionary Sermon, from the gospel by Luke, 10th chapter and 2d verse: "The harvest is great, but the laborers few: pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth laborers into his harvest." Brother Poyner preached in the afternoon. The congregation was large and attentive. The sum of \$21.65 was collected.

Monday, October 28th.

Met according to adjournment. Prayer by Brother Rowe-

- 1. Read and approved the Minutes of the past two days.
- 2. Called the roll.
- 3. Renewed invitation to seats with us.
- 4. Renewed call for correspondence.
- 5. Renewed call for petitionary letters, and received a letter from the newly-constituted Church at Bethlehem, which was received into fellowship.
- 6. The report of Executive Committee was read and adopted. (See Appendix, letter A.)
- 7. The Committee on Preaching report that Bro. Dormany will preach in the Methodist Church at 11 o'clock, and Bro. Osborn the Farewell Sermon at 2 o'clock.
 - 8. The report on Publications was read and adopted, (B.)
 - 9. The report on Documents was read and adopted, (C.)
- 10. The report on Sabbath Schools was read and adopted, (D.)
 - 11. The report on Nominations was read and adopted, (E.)
- 12. The report on the Decease of Ministers was read and adopted, (F.)
- 13. The report on the State of the Churches was read and adopted, (G.)
- 14. The report on Finance was read and adopted, (H.)
- 15. The Treasurer's Report was read and adopted, (I.)
- 16. An interesting letter from Brother D. P. Everett was received and read.
- 17. On motion, appointed as Executive Committee and Treasurer the same that served last year, viz: T. Barnes, Treasurer; J. A. Collier, A. J. Sims, Wm. Sorey, J. B. Everett and Wm. P. L. Horn—the Moderator added.
- 18. It being reported that Brother Horn would probably move away, on motion appointed Brother E. H. Marlin in his place.
 - 19. The report on Missions was read and adopted, (J.)
- 20. Appointed the next session to be held with the Church at Antioch, Calhoun county, Florida, on Saturday before the fourth Sabbath in October, 1868.
 - 21. Instructed the Clerk to have four hundred copies of

these Minutes printed and distributed, and that he have thirty dollars for his services.

22. The Letter of Correspondence was read and adopted.

23. Agreed to adjourn for forty-five minutes, then to reassemble to hear the farewell sermon by Brother Osborn.

24. After intermission and refreshment, the Association came together, and the following preamble and resolution

WHEREAS, our Church house at this place came near being destroyed by fire, and was saved by the timely presence and attention of Mr. William Gray, a young gentleman of Greenwood. Therefore,

Resolved, That the Greenwood Baptist Church, and the West Florida Association, do tender Mr. Gray our sincere thanks for saving us from this immense loss.

25. After the sermon by Brother Osborn, a hymn was sung, and the parting hand taken, and prayer made by Bro. Odom, the Association was then adjourned to the time and place above mentioned.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE WEST FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE I. We believe in the existence of one only true and living God, and that He has made himself known to his people, under the name of the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost, the same in essence, and equal in divine perfection. Exodus xx: 3; Isa. ix: 6-46; Matt. xxviii: 19; Mark xii: 32; John i: 1-4; and v: 23; and x: 30; 1 John v: 7.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the words of God, and the only rule of faith and practice. 2 Sam. xxiii: 2; Acts 1: 16; 2 Tim. iii: 16-17; 2 Peter i: 21.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of election; that God chose his people in Christ before the foundation of the world; that they should be holy and without blame before him in love; having predestinated them to the adoption of children, by Jesus Christ, according to the good pleasure of His will. Matt. xx: 16; and xxiv: 32; John xiii: 18; and xv, 16-19; Acts xiii: 48; Rom. viii: 28, 29; and ix: 10-16; and xi: 5; Eph.i: 4-11; 1 Thess. i: 4; 2 Thess. ii: 13; 1 Peter i: 2.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in the doctrine of original sin. Gen. vi. 5; Psalms v: 9; Eccle. viii: 11; Rom. 6: 20; and vii: 18; and viii: 8; 1 Cor. ii: 14; 2 Cor. v: 14; Eph. ii: 1-3; Col. ii: 2-13.

ARTICLE V. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state he is in by nature, by his own will and ability. John vi: 44, 45; Rom. xi: 6; Eph. ii: 8, 9.

ARTICLE VI. We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ. Isa. lvii: 8; Acts iv: 11, 12; Rom. iii: 21-36; and v: 6; viii: 9; x: 11-21.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost. John vi: 63; and xvi: 13, 14; 1 Cor. ii: 10-12; 2 Cor. i: 10-12; Eph. ii: 1-10; 2 Tim. i: 9; Tit. iii: 4-7.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe that nothing can separate the true believers from the love of God; but that they will be kept by the power of God through faith unto salvation.

John vi: 37; x: 28-30; xiii: 1; xvii: 23; Phil. i: 6; Heb. vi: 17, 18; 1 Peter i: 5.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that true believers are the only subjects of these ordinances, and that immersion only is baptism. Matt. iii: 5-12: Mark i: 5; Luke iii: 7; Acts ii: 38-42; John iii: 23; Rom. vi: 3, 4; Col. ii: 12; 1 Peter iii: 21; Acts xviii: 8.

ARTICLE X. We believe in the resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment. Job xix: 26, 27; Daniel xii: 2; Hos. xiii: 14; Mark xii: 24-27; 1 Cor. xv; 2 Cor. v: 10.

ARTICLE XI. We believe that the punishment of the wicked will be everlasting, and the joys of the righteous will be eternal. Matt. xxv: 46; 2 Thess. i: 9; Daniel xii: 2; Mark ix: 43, 44; Luke ii: 17; xvii: 26; John iii: 36; 2 Thess. i: 7-9; Rev. xiv: 9-11.

ARTICLE XII. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances, unless he is called of God, and come under the imposition of hands by a presbytery, and is in fellowship in the church of which he is a member. Isa. lxii: 6; Mal. ii: 7; Acts xiv: 23; Rom. xii: 6,7; 1 Cor. 1: 1; 2 Cor. v: 18; Col. iv: 17; 4 Tim. i; 12; Eph. iv: 11-13.

DECORUM.

- 1. Every query sent up to the Association by any Church in this union, shall be read, and put to vote by the Moderator, whether it shall be debated or not; and if there be a majority for it, it shall be taken up and investigated; but if not, it shall be withdrawn: provided, always, that those be first considered that affect the union of the churches.
- 2. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it.
- 3. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject in debate, or use indecorous language.
- 4. No person shall speak more than three times upon the same subject, without leave of the body.

5. No member shall abruptly break off or absent himself without leave of the body; and if he so does, he shall be marked as an abrentee.

6. The names of the members of the Association shall be enrolled by the Clerk, and called over as often as the body

may require.

7. The Moderator shall be entitled to the same privilege of speaking as any other member, provided the chair be filled; but he shall not vote, except the body be equally divided.

8. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to see that these rules are strictly observed by the body.

9. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a regular record of the proceedings of the body.

· 10. The minutes of the Association shall be read and signed by the Moderator and Clerk before the body rises.

11. Amendments may be made to this form of government by two-thirds of the members in session.

The want of funds upon which to operate has tied the hands of your Committee upon the subject of Missionary operations.

And as your Committee believe it to be one of the most efficient means used for the promotion and advancement in building up the cause and kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ upon earth, would respectfully recommend the pastors of the several churches within the bounds of our Association, to urge the importance of the great work upon their congregations, hoping that a revival of the work may take place, and that we may be able at our next session to report a Sabbath School at every Church within our bounds; also, that they urge the necessity of parents and children taking the Child's Delight, a little Sabbath School paper, published by Rev. Samuel Boykin, Macon, Georgia, as it will act as a great

stimulant to both parents and children in building up Sabbath Schools.

Your Committee on the State of the Churches report that the letters to your body indicate the existence of a good degree of internal order and harmony, and several of them report encouraging additions to their bodies, while several others remain pretty much stationary, and a few show a small decline. The net increase of the Churches of your body during the past year is about sixty. Four of your Churches-Providence, Antioch, Ebenezer and Smyrnareport Sabbath Schools connected with their bodies. Greenwood Church reports preaching two and Ebenezer three Sabbaths in each month; and Ebenezer reports an example worthy to be imitated by all churches, of two prayer-meetings each week. One or two churches of your body are represented only by letter, and several others entirely unrepresented. Poplar Spring Church asks aid to support her pastor, while others complain of entire pastoral destitution
