MINUTES.

CAMPBELLTON, FLA., October 16th, 1880.

THE WEST FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION met with the Campbellton Church this day at Campbellton. The Introductory sermon was preached by Eld. D. A. Skipper, from Eph. ii., 8.,

At 21, P. M., the messengers assembled in the house, were called to

order by Bro. T. E. Langley.

Letters were then read from the churches and messengers' names enrolled.

The body was organized by the election of Eld. T. E. Langley, Moderator, and A. P. Ashurst, Clerk. .

REPORT ON MISSIONS.

Your Committee on Missions beg leave to report: That nothing has been done since our last session by our Association in obedience to our Lord's command to "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." Your Committee beg leave to urge the brethren of the West Florida Association to put an Evangelist in the field, and for that end we herein endeavor to present to your minds the importance, the necessity, as well as the commands of our blessed Saviour to carry on His work in this way. The language of Christ; "that repentance and remission of sins should be preached in His name among all nations, beginning at Jerusalem," is the fullest authority for missions, in the most enlarged sense of the term. "Beginning at Jerusalem" embraces the work of home missions, in all the forms of that work : while the words "among all nations" direct attention to foreign missions, in their world-wide operations. How sublime is the missionary enterprise; It contemplates the evangelization of the world, the salvation of immortal sonls, the triumph of the Red emer's kingdom, and the manifestation of God's glory in all the earth. This enterprise calls for the large contributions of the rich and the smaller offerings of the poor. Every Christian who is not "an object of charity," should give to this cause. How can money be so wisely used? How can gold be employed for a better purpose that in extending the Gospel of salvation, which is "more precious than gold-yea, than much fine gold"?" "The silver is mine, and the gold is mine, saith the Lord of hosts." We must not only cease to do evil when we become Christians, but we must learn to do good. This is our mission on earth-to bear fruit. "I have ordained you," says Christ, "that ye might bring forth fruit" My dear brethren, God has called on us to come up and prove Him by giving our substance for the support of His kingdom on earth, and says He will pour out a blessing in return more than we can contain. Solomon says: "There is that giveth, and yet increaseth; and there is that withholdeth more than is meet, but it tendeth to poverty."

Now, while we have no authority to say to any man that in giving to the cause of Christ he will be paid back in kind, we are authorized to say that "he who soweth bountifully shall also reap bountifully"; and that "it is more blessed to give than to receive." We are authorized to say that benefactions thus bestowed shall be returned, "full measure, pressed down, and running over." Whether this return shall be in kind, or its equivalent, may well be left to the direction of Infinite Wisdom. It may come in the way of health and vigor to a form wasted by disease; or it may come in blithe, buoyant, happy spirits to a mind surcharged with 'corroding care; or it may come in "the peace of God that passeth all understanding"-that is itself a priceless boon that money could not buy; or it may come in tears of gratitude from those whose souls have been enlightened by the precious truths of the Gospel that you have sent ; but, come when or how it may, it will be accepted by

the Giver as a fulfilment of the Divine promises.

To refuse to give to this great work, is to lay our talents up in a napkin. We know that giving is indispensable in Christian worship, or God would not have promised a blessing to follow it, for He does not bless that which is not

a duty.

If this be so, then pecuniary sacrifice is an essential element in the religion of Jesus Christ. Whether the absence of such sacrifice, when possible, is a fatal defect, is a question of profound import. Certainly such a defect, to say the least, must be fearfully dangerous; and a man whose religion is wanting in this essential element, has cause for the greatest alarm. Is prayer essential to Christian life? Certainly we should think so. Suppose it to be wholly wanting, would not any one say that such religion is vain? We have no right to distinguish between essential elements. If the absence of one be fatal, we can see no reason why the absence of another should not be equally so; and if this be so, then a religion that costs nothing is worth nothingand if this be so, then thousands of our brethren are deceiving themselves

with a false hope, and when their house falls, great will be the fall of it. We. too, are deceiving ourselves when we count on them as part of the people of God. The light that does not shine, is not to be reckoned; the salt that has

no savor, is fit for nothing but to be "cast out."

Under the former dispensation the tithes due to the altar could be counted; under the Gospel the arithmetic of the ease is dispensed with, and something above arithmetic and beyond its reach is substituted for it and enjoined: "Go ye into all the world, and preach the Gospel to every creature." What does not this all-embracing precept involve? If we are required to do a certain thing, the conditions on which alone that thing can be done are also required, whether expressed or unexpressed. What are the conditions to the great work before us? Does it not involve a large outlay of money? Yet we claim to rejoice in the Lord, and we sing psalms in honor of His name, and talk of our sweet experiences, and boast of the number of our converts, when our offerings have cost us nothing, and when we know in advance that the offerings of most of our converts will cost them nothing! Was there ever such empty worship? Is it possible that anything could be more vain and worthless? Is it worship-or is it insult?

But we hope for better things in this Association, and feel that when our brethren are brought to realize the importance of this work, that they will thank God that it is in their power to advance His great cause on earth.

Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord. Respectfully submitted,

ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there is a trinity of persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit—and yet there are not three Gods, but one God.—[Mark xii., 32; Matt. iii., 16, 17; Matt. xxiii., 19; 1st Tim., i., 2, 5; Ex. xx., 1, 3; John i., 1, 4; v., 23; x., 30.

ART. 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the Word of God, and the only rules of faith and practice.—[2d Tim., iii., 16, 17; 2d Peter, i., 21; 2d Sam., xxiii., 2; Rev., xxii., 18, 19.

ART. 3. We believe in the fall of Adam, and the imputation of sin to his posterity; in the corruption of human nature, and the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.—[Isa. i., 5, 6; Ps. xiv., 1, 3; Rom. v., 12; John vi., 44; 1st Cor. xv., 20, 1; Job xiv., 57; Eph. ii., 8, 10.

ART. 4. We believe in the everlasting love of God to His people, and the eternal election of a definite number of the human race to grace and glory; and that there was a covenant of grace of redemption made between the Father and the Son before the world began, in which their salvation is secure, and they in particular are redeemed.—[Jer. xxi., 3; John xv., 16, 17; Isa. xl., 8, 9; Eph. i., 4, 5, 11; Acts xiii., 48; 2d Thess. ii., 13; 1st Pet. i, 2; Rom. viii., 29, 30; Rom. ix., 11, 12, 23; and xi., 4, 7; 2d Tim. ii., 9.

ART. 5. We believe that singers are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Christ imputed to them.—[Rom. iii., 21, 5, 56; Ps. xlv.; John x., 9, 15; Rom. v., 1, 10; Ist Cor. i., 30.

ART. 6. We believe that all those who are chosen of God in Christ, will be effectually called, regenerated, converted and sanctified, and supported by the Spirit and power of God, so that they shall persevere in grace, and not one of them be finally lost.—[John x., 29, 30, and vi., 27; Phil. i., 6; 1st Pet. i., 3, 9; Heb. vi., 16, 20; John xvii., 2, 3; 2d Tim. 1., 9, 10; Tit. iv., 4, 7; Eph. ii., 45; Rom. viii., 28, 31.

ART. 7. We believe that good works are the fruit of faith, and follow after justification; and that they only justify as in the sight of men, and are only evidences of our Christianity.—[Eph. ii., 10; James ii., 13, and iii., 13; 1st Pet. ii., 3, 5; Matt, v., 16.

ART. 8. We believe that there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment; and the happiness of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked, will be eternal.—[Mark xii., 24, 27; 2d Cor. v., 10; 1st Cor. xv., 12, 29; Acts xvii., 31; Matt. xxv., 46; John v., 28, 29; Thess. i., 7, 10.

ART. 9. We believe that the Church of Christ is a visible congregation of baptized believers, who have gained Christian fellowship with each other; and that immersion is the only Scriptural mode.—[Rom. vi.

ART. 10. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great Head of His Church and only Lawgiver, and that the government is with the body and is the privilege of each individual, and that the discipline of the church is intended for the reclamation of those Christians who may be disorderly either in principle or practice, and must be faithfully kept up for God's glory and the peace and unity of the church.

ART. 11. We believe that Water Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Lord, and are to be continued until His second coming.

ART. 12. We believe that none but those regularly baptized, and who are in fellowship with the church, have a right to commune at the Lord's table.
