Missionary Report.

I commenced work as your missionary on the 18th. of Jan- 1886. Since then I have traveled 3,150 miles and preached 113 sermons, gave 17 exhortations. This work was done in Jackson and Calhoun Counties and a portion of Franklin. Received by baptism 42, restored 9, received by letter 13, total 64. Brethren Bryan, Kiner and myself reconstituted the church at Poplar Head in Calhoun, Co. Bro. N. L. Connell and myself constituted a church at Iola. We have 6 Sabbath schools on the work. Received on my salary 44 do llars from missionary Board. "The harvest truly is plentiful but the laborers are few pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest to send forth more laborers into His harvest: Respt. submitted.

Report of Missionary work from the head of Holmes Valley to the Grassy Point church on North Bay. On the fourth Sunday in August. Bro. Daniel Creamer and myself ordained 2 deacons at the Grassy Point Church. Brother Cox and myself constituted a church at Green Head the 3rd Sunday in Sept. 1886. E. D. Nelson Mod. Jno. Cox Clerk. I have traveled 1,140 miles, preached 49 sermons, baptized 20, restored 2, receiv-Respt. submitted.

Missionary Report from St. Andrews Bay. During the year I have traveled on the work 560 miles. Preached 24 sermons and prayed with families eight times. Received two candidates for baptism. Restored one.

Report of Missionary work performed in the Apalachicola; St. Andrews and Point Washington mission fields. I have traveled 900 miles; Preached 40 ermons, delivered 6 Sabbath school lectures, Organized 1 church, papfized 4. Revived the church at Point Washington and have them in good working order. The church organized is in the St. Andrews mission, known as Pleasant Hill, Washington Co.

REPORT ON MISSIONS. Your Committee on Missions begleave to report: It has been a custom in this Association, since its organization, to prepare at each meeting a report on missions. When the practice first began no doubt at that time the preparation of such a report was very needful in as much as there was a difference of opinion amony christians as to the ways and means of carrying on the great work of the blessed Master. But in this day and time the necessity of such a report would seem to be obviated from the fact that all unprejudiced minds seem to be settled as to the fact that the master does not intend His work shall be accomplished only through the medium He has assigned. It does not require any very great degree of intelligence to see from the reports of the work

that is being carried on in the various parts of the world and the means that are employed to accomplish these ends that the work will still go on. Any argument, therefore in the way of a report on missions to prove the Divine origin of missions would be alltogether needless, and only the fact of keeping the subject prominently before His foltowers that they may be reminded of their duty as Christians would it be necessary to encumber the pages or our minutes with reports of the kind at atl. The question of destitution within your bound presents itself to the minds of your committee just now and the best way of supplying that destitution more forcibly than does the necessity of an argument in favor of missions. How to supply this destitution with the limited means that we are able to afford has ever been a difficult problem to solve. It is pleasant however, when we contrast the past with the present and realize the fact that our efforts have not been altogether in vain. We have evidence from the letters read in our hearing yesterday that the grand work is going on and our labors of love have been blessed. Let us therefore be encouraged to work on until the end with us shall come and our blessed Master shall have called us up higher to await the end of those who are left to take our places. Respt. Shall we be less zealous in seeing that our children, at least, have ample opportunities to learn of that book, a spiritual knowledge of which is declared to be as "a pure river of water of life clear as crystal;" No rather let us obey the Divine interuction, "In the morning sow thy seed, and in the evening withhold not thine hand for thou knowest not whether shall prosper either this or that or whether they shal be alike good. DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. Those members who are regularly chosen by the churches in our union shall compose the Association.

- 2 The members so chosen shall produce letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment, together with their number in fellowship, those baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead, since the last Association; also, a statement of the amont of funds sent up by the delegates, and for what purpose, and any other contribution made during the year.
- 3 The members thus chosen and conveaed shall be denominated the West Florida Baptist Association.
- 4 The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by the members present.
- 5. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor by which she can infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches.
- 6. If newly constituted churches, or others, desire to be admitted into this union, they shall petition by letter and dalegates; and if found upon examination, to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and such reception shall be manifested by the Moderator giving to the delegates the right hand of fellowship.
- 7 Each church in this Association shall be entitled to two delegates, and when her number of members shall reach twenty-five she shall be entitled to three, and for every additional increase of twenty-five members she shall be entitled to an additional delegate-
- 8 Every query sent to the Association by any of the churches in this union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator whether it shall be discussed, and if there be, a majority for discussion, It shall de taken up and considered, if not it shall be withdrawn provided, atways, those be first considered that affect the union of the Church.
- 9 Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it. The last motion shall be first in order.
- 10 Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and addess the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, except he depart from the subject.
- 11 No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject without permission from the Association,

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12. There shall be no talking or whispering in time of public speech, nor shall any reflection be cast upon the speaker.

13. No member shall absent himself from the Association without first obtaining permission from the body, or moderator; and the Moderafor shall only have power to act while the body is not in session. The Association is not considered closed until after the farewell sermon is preached.

14. If any member, shall break the rules of this Constitution he shall be immediately reproved by the Moderator.

15. It is the business of the Association—1st, to provide for the general union of the churches; 2nd, to keep up a correspondence with associations of the same faith and order, that the chain of communication may be preserved among the churches: 3rd, to give the churches the best advice in matters of difficulty and if the communion between any of the sister churches be broken, to inquire into the cause of the breach and use the best means to remove the difficulty, but if the breach cannot be 'made up, to withdraw from any church whom they shall look upon as unsound in principle or disorderly in practice: until she be exclaimed; 4th, to admit any of the brethren in the ministry as assistants, if they deem it to be necessary: 5th to appoint a Clerk to keep the records of every meeting of the Association, and to see that he is properly remunerated for his services; 6th, to have the minutes read and corrected, if need be, before the Association rises, and have them printed if they think proper: 7th, to amend this plan of government at any time when a majority of the Association shall deem it necessary! 8th, to adjourn to any time or place considered most proper.

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ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there is a Trinity of Persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; and yet there are not three Gods but one God—Mark xii. 32, Mat. iii. 16, 17; xxiii. 19; 1 Tim. i. 2, 5; Exod xx. 1, 3; John i. 1, 4; v. 23; x 30.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God and that they are the only rules of faith and practice.—2 Tim. iii. 16, 17; 2 Pet i 21; 2,

Sam. xxiii. 2; Rev. xxii. 18, 19.

3. We believe in the fall of Adam, and the imputation of his sin to his posterity: in the corruption of human nature, and the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.—Isa. i 5, 6: Psa. xiv. i. 3; Rom v. 12 John vi 44; 1 Cor xv. 20, 1! Job xiv. 57: Eph. ii. 8, 10.

4. We believe in the everlasting love of God to his people, and the eternal election of a definite number of the human race to grace and glory; and that there was a covenant of grace of redemption made between the Father and the Son before the world began, in which their salvation is secure, and they in particular are redeemed.— xxi. 3: John xv. 16, 17; Isa. xi 8. 9: Eph i 4, 5. 11; Acts xiii. 48; 2 Thess. ii: 13; 1 Pet. i 2; Rom. viii. 29, 30: Rom. ix. 11, 12, 23; xi. 4, 7; 2 Tfm. ii. 9.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Christ imputed to them. Rom iii 21, 5, 56; Psa. xxv; John x. 9, 15; Rom. v. 1, 10; 1 Cor i.30.

6 We believe that all those who are chosen of God in Christ will be effectually called regenerated, sanctified and supported by the spirit and power of God so that they shall persevere in grace, and not one of them be finally lost.—John x. 29, 30 vi, 37: Phil, i, 6; 1 Pet i, 3, 9; Heb. vi 16, 20; John xvii, 2, 3, 2 Tim, i, 9, 10: Tit iv, 4; 7: Eph. ii. 45: Rom. viii, 28, 31.

7 We believe that good works are the fruits of faith: that they follow after justification, and that they only justify us in the sigat of men, and are only evidences of our

christianity.—Eph. ii, 10: James ii, 13: iii, 13: 1 Pet ii, 3, 5: Mat. v, 16

8. We believe that there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a General Judgement and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal—Mark XII, 24, 27; 2 Cor. v 10; 1 Cor. xv, 12; 29: Acts xvII, 31; Mat xxv, 46; john v, 28 29: Thess I 7, 10,

9. We believe that the Church of Christ is a vissible congregation of baptized believers, who have gained christian fellowship with each other: and that immersion is the

only scriptural mode of baptism-Rom. vi.

10. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of His Church and only Lawgiver and that the government is with the body; and is the privilege of each individual: and that the discipline of the church is intended for the reclamation of those christians who may be disorderly either in principle or practice, and must be faithfully kept up for God's glory and the peace and unity of the Church.

11. We believe that Water Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the

Lord, and are to be continued until his second coming.

12. We believe that none but those regularly baptized, and who are in fellowship with the church, have a right to commune at the Lords Table.
