in Christ will be effectually called regenerated, sanctified, and supported by the spirit and power of God so that they shall persevere in grace, and not one of them be finally lost.—John x, 29, 30 vi, 37; Phil. i, 6.; 1 Pet. i, 3, 9; Heb. vi, 16, 20; John xvii, 2, 3; 2 Tim, i, 9. 10; Tit. iv, 4, 7; Eph. ii, 45; Rom. viii, 28, 31

"7. We believe that good works are the fruits of faith; that they follow after justification, and that they only justfy us in the sight of men, and are only evipences of our christianity.—Eph. ii, 10; James ii, 13, iii, 13; 1 Peter ii, 3, 5; Mat. v, 16.

"8. We believe there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a General Judgment and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.—Mark xii, 24, 27; 2 Cor. v, 10; 1 Cor. xv, 12, 29; Acts xvii, 31; Mathew xxv, 46; John v, 28 29; Thess. i, 7, 10.
