REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

(The report was read by J. L. Massey, and after remarks by Rev. J. P. Smith, was adopted.)

The evils which strong drink has brought upon us are so tremendous, and threaten such overwhelming ruin to the morals and liberties of our country, that good men tremble in all the land. Intemperance, like other mischief, has been as the letting out of the waters. Christians are calling for the help of the Lord against this curse that is degrading our countrymen and drawing the youth of the land into shameful ruin. Our churches have not escaped its influence. In view of this fact we would recommend that every church exercise great vigilance and caution in treating cases that come under their discipline. If a church silently endorses this vice it is accessory to the same. Let us give, in no uncertain tones, our disapproval of this soul destroyer. We must say that we have not been troubled as much as heretofore with intemperance in this county. This has been brought about by the vigilance of the Government, and we earnestly bid it God speed in its efforts to stop the manufacture of this poison. J. L. MASSEY,

Report of Missionary J. P. Smith:

#### REPORT OF MISSION WORK.

Being employed by the State Board of Missions and Executive Committee of the West Florida Association to labor as a Missionary within the bounds of said Association, and devote two weeks out of each month, for seven consecutive months, beginning with the 1st of June; I ask attention to the following report:

Having no knowledge of the destitutions, the first month was spent mainly in hunting them and making appointments, and at the time I expected to do the most effectual work the sickness of my family disconcerted all my plans. Much travel over the territory of the West Florida Association has satisfied my mind that there are existing destitutions of the most stubborn character. There are two features of the destitution I wish to mention. 1st, They are confined to the Eastern, Southern and Western borders of the Association, which renders the work very difficult, as so much time and travel are necessary to do the work. 2d, The other feature I would mention, is the remarkable extent to which many professed Baptists are ignorant of the doctrines of our church, and in consequence, the causes with which they are decoy edoff into error.

### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

After hearing the letters read and looking over the report on Sunday Schools at the last session of the Association, we are at a loss what to say. Many, and probably a majority of our churches, do not report any Sunday Schools, and from our own knowledge of the work at those churches that have schools, we can say that only a small per cent. of the members engage in the work.

Now, what is the remedy, how can we improve in this branch of Christian labor? There are reports made every year and appeals sent out for more earnestness, yet still there is a cold indifference on the part of many. While a few have flourishing schools, others are kept up by four or five members and so many more children, the remainder of the church, to all appearance, in ignorance that such an organization is in existence.

Now, we would recommend the same suggestions as were made in the report on this work at our last session, and, in addition, earnestly appeal to each delegate to go to work when he reaches home and try to get up more interest among the members. Children are not the only ones who need instruction in God's Word. Alas! it is ignorance of its precepts, we fear, that causes such apathy

among parents. "The entrance of Thy Word giveth Light," "All these things shalt thou teach thy children." This was the instruction given to Israel of old. Infidelity is abroad and the brilliance of her tints and the beauty of her blandishments are bowing the minds of men. As first impressions last through life, it is our duty to extend and imprint the truths of the Bible, as we understand them, upon the minds of the children.

Of all people on earth, Baptists are most solemnly bound to teach their distinctive faith and practice, not only in Sunday Schools, but everywhere. They stand alone—being the only order of professed Christians which cannot go into organic union with all or any members of other denominations without abandoning their history. May God help us to sound a loud note of appeal to the churches that shall not go unheeded. Provide adequate instruction in the Word of God. It is the great corrective to loose notions of inspiration now prevalent; that teaching which is most thoroughly saturated with the Bible is that which most convinces and converts.

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Second in importance to a development of the heart in grace, is the cultivation of the mind for thought and thinking. It is gratifying to observe an increase in the great factor of civil progress, but the partial indifference yet existing is enough to impart greater energy to the advocates of education. But we would not forget to emphasize the importance of a religious education. Education apart from piety is a power for evil; and for this reason great stress should be placed upon a suitable selection of teachers and schools. Our common schools should be taught by men whose religious character is strong enough to impress their pupils with a pious prefer-

As Baptists, our choice of books should be in keeping with our denominational faith. We heartily recommend Stetson University for the higher education of Baptist boys and girls, and the Theological Seminary, located at Louisville, Ky., for the training of young men for the ministry.

We also recommend that each church in our Association contribute something each year for ministerial eduction. The small sum of \$100 would keep one of our pastors in the Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Ky., each session.

#### DECORUM.

ARTICLE 1. Those members who are regularly chosen by the churches in our union shall compose the Association.

ART. 2. The members so chosen shall produce letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, together with their number in fellowship, theos baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, ex-communicated and dead, since the last Association; also, a statement of the amount of funds sent up by the delemade during the year.

ART. 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall be denominated the West Florida Baptist Association.

ART. 4. The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by the members present.

ART. 5. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor by which she can infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches.

ART. 6. If newly constituted churches, or others, desire to be admitted into this union, they shall petition by letter and delegates; and if found, upon examination, to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and such reception shall be manifested by the Moderator giving to the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

ART. 7. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to two delegates, and when her number of members shall reach twenty-five she shall be entitled to three, and shall be entitled to an additional delegate.

ART. 8. Every query sent to the Association by any of the churches in this union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator whether it shall be discussed, and if there be a majority for discussion, it shall be taken up always those be first considered that effect the union of the Church.

ART. 9. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it motion shall be first in order.

ART. 10. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, except he depart from the subject.

ART. 11. No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject without permission from the Association.

ART. 12. There shall be no talking or whispering in time of public speech, nor shall any reflection be cast upon the speaker.

ART. 13. No member shall absent himself from the Association without first obtaining permission from the body or Moderator, and the Moderator shall only have power to act while the body is in session. The Association is not considered closed until after the farewell sermon is preached.

ART. 14. If any member shall break the rules of this Constitution he shall be immediately reproved by the Moderator.

ART. 15. It is the business of the Association, 1st., to provide for the general union of the churches; 2nd., to keep up a correspondence with Associations of the same faith and order, that the chain of communication may be preserved among the churches; 3d., to give the churches the best advice in matters of difficulty, and if the communion between any of the sister churches be broken, to inquire into the cause of the breech and use the best means to remove the difficulty, but if the breech cannot be made up, to withdraw from any church whom they shall look upon as unsound in principle or disorderly in practice, until she be reclaimed; 4th, to admit any of the brethren in the ministry as assistants, if they deem it to be necessary; 5th., to appoint a clerk to keep the records of every meeting of the Association; 6th., to have the minutes read and corrected, if need be before the Association rises, and have them printed if they think proper; 7th., to amend this plan of government at any time when the majority of the Association may deem it necessary; 8th., to adjourn to any time or place considered most proper.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

ARTICLE 1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there is a Trinity of Persons in the God-head—the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit; and yet there are not three Gods, but one God—Mark xii, 32; Mat. iii, 16, 17; xxxiii, 19; 1 Tim. 1, 2, 5; Exod. xx 1, 3; v. 23; x 30; John i, 1, 4; v. 23, 30.

ART. 2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and that they are the only rules of faith and practice.—2 Tim. iii, 16, 17; 2 Peter i, 21; 2 Sam. xxiii, 2; Rev. xii, 18, 19.

ART. 3. We believe in the fall of Adam, and the imputation of his sin to his posterity; in the corruption of human nature. and the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.-Isaish i, 5, 6; Psalm xiv. i, 3; Rom, v, 12; John vi, 44; 1 Cor. xv, 20, 1; Job xiv, 57; Eph. ii, 8, 10,

ART. 4. We believe in the everlasting love of God to His people, and the eternal election of a definite number of the human race to grace and glory, and that there was a covenant of grace of redemption made between the Father and Son before the world began, in which their salvation is secure, and they, in particular, are redeemed. -xxi, 3; John xv, 16, 17; Isaiah xi, 8, 9; Eph. i, 4, 5, 11; Acts xiii, 48; 2 Thess. ii, 13; 1 Pet. i, 2; Rom. viii, 29, 30; Rom. ix, 11, 12. 23, xi, 4, 7; 2 Tim. ii, 9.

ART. 5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Christ imputed to them.—Rom. iii, 21, 5, 56; Psa. xiv; John x, 9, 15; Rom. v, 1, 10; Cor. i, 30.

ART. 6. We believe that all those who are chosen of God in Christ will be effectually called regenerated, sanctified, and supported by the spirit and power of God so that they shall persevere in grace, not one of them be finally lost -John x, 29, 30, vi, 37; Phil. 1, 6; 1 Pet. i, 3, 9; Heb. vi, 16. 20; John xvii, 2, 3; 2 Tim. 1, 9, 10; Tit. iv, 4, 7; Eph. ii, 45; Rom. viii, 28, 31.

ART. 7. We believe that good works are the fruits of faith, that they follow after justification, and that they only justify us to the sight of men, and are only evidences of our Christianity.-Eph. ii, 10; James ii, 13, iii, 13; 1 Peter ii, 3, 5; Mat. v, 16.

ART. 8. We believe there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a General Judgment and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.-Mark xii, 24, 27; 2 Cor. v, 10; 1 Cor. xv, 12, 29; Acts xvii, 31; Mat. xxv, 46; John v, 28, 29; Thess. i, 7, 10.

ART. 9. We believe that the Church of Christ is a visible congregation of baptized believers, who have gained Christian fellowship with each other; and that immersion is the only scriptural mode of baptism .-Rom. vi.

ART. 10. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of His Church and only Lawgiver, and that the government is with the body; and is the privilege of each individual, and that the discipline of the church is in-

tended for the reclamation of those Christians who may be disorderly, either in principle or practice, and must be faithfully kept up for God's glory, and the peace and unity of the Church.

ART. 11. We believe that Water Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Lord, and are to be

continued until His second coming.

ART. 12. We believe that none but those regularly baptized, and who are in fellowship with the church, have a right to commune at the Lord's table.
