#### REPORT.

After examining the reports of Sunday School statistics sent to this Association, we fail to find the interest manifested in the Sunday School that it deserves.

We are very much pained to find that some of our largest churches, numerically speaking, have no Sabbath Schools at all. Brethren, why do we find this the case? Do we as Baptists believe in reading the scriptures and teaching and having them taught to our children, if so, why not have Sabbath Schools in every church and school house throughout the bounds of the West Florida Association? We as Baptists boast of our Baptist faith and doctrine and yet a majority of the Baptists of West Florida seem to be careless as to the importance of having these doctrines and truths of the Bible taught to our children.

Pastors have you done your whole duty in instructing your members of your several churches as to the importance of the Sabbath School work? Brethren of the laity, fathers and mothers of the children of West Florida, what say you in regard to this line of church work, are you satisfied, have you discharged your whole duty to your children in this particular? Alas! we fear not, we believe that this is the church at work. We believe also that there is no better way in which the children and young people can be taught the doctrines of the Bible than in the Sabbath School.

Therefore we beg and insist that every pastor will see that there is a Sabbath School in every church he serves.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

In consequence of a general diffusion of intelligence men are becoming vastly better acquainted with the moral condition of each other. Intelligence of every kind has become an article of profit; and when once this is the case there can be no doubt it will be abundantly supplied. Hence the moral influence which men are exerting upon each other is greater than it has been at any period in the history of the world. Knowledge provokes to comparison, and comparison leads to reflection. The fact that others are happier than themselves prompts men to inquire whence this difference proceeds, and how their own melioration may be accomplished. The means of extending knowledge and influencing the human mind by argument and moral power are multiplied a thousand fold. In the primitive age the light of science beamed only on a small portion of mankind. The mass of mankind were not and could not be instructed to read. Everything was transient because so little was made permanent in books. Now not only tracts and Bibles but even libraries are brought within the reach of every man and every child. We would urge our people to avail themselves of the privilege of the common schools for their children, and to insist that teachers only be employed whose religious character is strong enough to impress their pupils with a pious preference. We heartily recommend Stetson University for the higher education of boys and girls, and the Theological Seminary, located at Louisville, Ky., for the training of young men for the ministry.

Resolved, That the Executive Committee be instructed to expend the funds on hand to their best discretion.

Resolution of thanks was read by J. P. Smith, and adopted by a rising vote.

I beg leave to offer a resolution of thanks to the dear brethren and sisters, of Piney Grove Church, for the liberal entertainment given to the West Florida Association during its present session.

Upon motion, the body adjourned, having had a very pleasant session; harmony and peace characterized the entire session. After singing the parting hymn: "Blest be the tie," &c., the parting hand was given each other. The Moderator closed by leading the body in prayer.

The next session will be held with Wewahitchka Baptist Church, on Friday before the 3d Sunday in October, 1893.

ARTICLE 1. Those members who are regularly chosen by the churches in our union shall compose the Association.

ART. 2. The members so chosen shall produce letters from their respective churches, certifying their appointment, together with their number in fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, ex-communicated and dead, since the last Association; also, a statement of the amount of funds sent up by the delegates, and for what purpose, and any other contribution made during the year.

ART. 3. The members thus chosen and convened shall be de-

nominated the WEST FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ART. 4. The Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, who

shall be chosen by the members present.

ART. 5. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage, nor by which she can infringe upon any of the internal rights of the churches.

ART. 6. If newly constituted churches, or others, desire to be admitted into this union, they shall petition by letter and delegates; and if found upon examination to be orthodox and orderly, shall be received by the Association, and such reception shall be manifested by the Moderator giving to the delegates the right hand of fellowship.

ART. 7. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to two delegates, and when her number of members shall reach twenty-five she shall be entitled to three, and for every additional increase of twenty-five members she shall be entitled to an additional delegate.

ART. 8. Every query sent to the Association by any of the churches in this union shall be read and put to a vote by the Moderator whether it shall be discussed, and if there be a majority for discussion, it shall be taken up and considered, if not it shall be withdrawn, provided, always, those be first considered that effect the union of the Church.

ART. 9. Every motion made and seconded shall come under the observation of the Association, except it be withdrawn by the member who made it. The last motion shall be first in order.

ART. 10. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, except he depart from the subject.

ART. 11. No person shall speak more than three times on the same subject without permission of the Association.

ART. 12. There shall be no talking or whispering in time of public speech, nor shall any reflection be cast upon the speaker.

ART. 13. No member shall absent himself from the Association without first obtaining permission from the body, or Moderator, and the Moderator shall only have power to act while the body is not in session. The Association is not considered closed until after the farewell sermon is preached.

ART. 14. If any member shall break the rules of this Constitu-

tion he shall be immediately reproved by the Moderator.

ART, 15. It is the business of the Association, 1st, to provide for the general union of the churches; 2d, to keep up a correspondence with Associations of the same faith and order, that the chain of communication may be preserved among the churches; 3d, to give the churches the best advice in matters of difficulty, and if the communion between any of the sister churches be broken, to inquire into the cause of the breach and use the best means to remove the difficulty; but if the breach cannot be made up, to withdraw from any church whom they shall look upon as unsound in principle or disorderly in practice, until she be reclaimed; 4th, to admit any of the brethren in the ministry as assistants, if they deem it to be necessary; 5th, to appoint a Clerk to keep the records of every meeting of the Association; 6th, to have the minutes read and corrected, if need be, before the Association rises, and have them printed if they think proper; 7th, to amend this plan of government at any time when the majority of the Association may deem it necessary; 8th, to adjourn to any time or place considered most proper.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in one true and living God, and that there is a Trinity of Persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit; and yet there are not three Gods, but one God.—Mark xii. 32; Mat. xvi. 17; xviii. 19; 1 Tim. 1, 2, 5; Exod. xx. 1, 3; John i. 1, 4; v. 23; x. 30.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament are the word of God and that they are the only rules of faith and practice.—2 Tim. iii. 16, 17; 2 Pet. i. 21; 2 Sam. xxiii. 2; Rev. xxii. 18, 19.

3. We believe in the fall of Adam, the imputation of his sin to his posterity; in the corruption of human nature, and the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.—Isa. i. 5, 6; Psa. xiv. 1, 3; Rom. v. 12; John vi. 44, I Cor. xv. 20; I Job xiv. 57; Eph. ii. 8, 10.

4. We believe in the everlasting love of God to his people, and the eternal election of a definite number of the human race to grace and glory, and that there was a covenant of grace of redemption made between the Father and the Son before the world began, in which their salvation is secure, and they in particular are redeemed.—xxi. 3; John xv. 16, 17; Isa. xi. 8, 9; Eph. i. 4, 5, 11; Acts. xiii. 48; 2 Thess. ii. 13; 1 Pet. i. 2; Rom. viii. 29, 30; Rom. ix. 11, 12, 23; xi. 4, 7; 2 Tim. ii. 9.

5. We believe that sinners are justified in the sight of God only by the righteousness of Christ imputed to them.—Rom. iii. 21, 5, 56; Psa. xiv; John x. 9, 15; Rom. v. 1, 10; Cor. i. 30.

6. We believe that all those who are chosen of God in Christ will be effectually called, regenerated, sanctified, and supported by the spirit and power of God so that they shall persevere in grace, not one of them be finally lost.—John x. 29, 30, vi. 27; Phil. 1, 6; 1 Pet. i. 3, 9; Heb. vi. 16, 20; John xvii. 2, 3; 2 Tim, i. 9, 10; Tit. iv. 4, 7; Eph. ii. 45; Rom. viii. 28, 31.

7. We believe that good works are the fruits of faith, that they follow after justification, and they only justify us to the sight of men, and are only evidences of our Christianity.—Eph. ii. 10; James ii. 13; iii. 13; I Pet. ii. 3, 5; Mat. v. 16.

8. We believe there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a General Judgment and that the happiness of the righteous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.—Mark xii. 24, 27; 2 Cor. v. 10; 1 Cor. xv. 12, 29; Acts xvii. 31; Mat. xxv. 46; John v. 28, 29; Thess. i. 7, 10.

9. We believe that the Church of Christ is a visible congregation of baptized believers, who have gained Christian fellowship with each other; and that immersion is the only scriptural mode of baptism.—Rom. vi.

no. We believe that Jesus Christ is the great head of His Church and only Lawgiver, and that the government is with the body; and is the privilege of each individual, and that the discipline of the church is intended for the reclamation of those Christians who may be disorderly, either in principle or practice, and must be faithfully kept up for God's glory, and the peace and unity of the Church.

11. We believe that Water Baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Lord; and are to be continued until his second com-

12. We believe that none but those regularly baptized, and who are in fellowship with the church have a right to commune at the Lord's table.
