#### FIRST DAY.

SATURDAY, October 14th, 1882.

The sixteenth annual session of the South Florida Baptist Association was held with the Thenotasassa church, in Hillsborough county, commencing Saturday, October 14th, 1882

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder E. J. Hull, from the 12th verse of the 77th Psalm—"I will meditate also, of all thy work, and talk of all thy doings."

After refreshments, the Association was called to order by Elder L. J. Simmons, the former Moderator, and Elder J. M. Hayman acting as Clerk.

Letters from the churches composing this body were called for and

and read, and delegates' names enrolled.

Petitionary letters were then called for, when letters from the following named churches were presented by their respective delegates, to-wit: Bethany, Sandhill and Goodhope, in Hernando county, and Mount Olive and New Salem, in Polk county, and County Line, in Hillsborough county, and being found orthodox, were received as members of this Association, and the right hand of fellowship was given to their delegates by the Moderator.

On motion, Elder R. N. Pylant was recognized as a delegate from the Spring Hill church, in the absence of any regular delegate.

#### SABBATH EXERCISES.

At 9:30 A. M. a prayer meeting commenced and continued till nearly eleven o'clock, at which time Elder W. T. Gordon preached on the subject of missions, to a very large concourse of people for this country, with apparent good effect, at the close of which a collection was taken up for missions amounting to about fifty dollars.

At 3 o'clock P. M. a Sunday-school mass meeting was formed, the Moderator of the Association presiding, when stirring appeals were made in behalf of Sunday-schools, and Sunday-school literature, by Elders Sparkman, Gordon, Simmons and others. The exercises of the hour were then closed in order.

At night Elder E. J. Hull preached at the stand an edifying sermon to a large and attentive audience.

#### SECOND DAY.

MONDAY MORNING, October 16th, 1882, 9 o'clock.

The Association convened pursuant to adjournment. After singing ahymn, prayer was offered by brother Taylor.

Called the roll. Read and approved the minutes of Saturday Called for correspondents, when Elders E. J. Hull and T. J. Sparkman, from the Manatee Association, presented themselves as corres-

ponding messengers, and were received as such in usual form.

On motion, the Moderator appointed a Committee on Deceased Ministers and Deacons, to-wit: S. L. Hancock, S. Walden and W. J. Tay-

Preamble and Resolution in regard to Antioch Church, of this Association.

WHEREAS, Antioch church is known to be in disorder in not observing the advice of this Association in putting away from her membership John A. Gandy, therefore,

Resolved, That this Association withdraw fellowship from said Antioch church.

WHEREAS, one John A. Gandy, within the bounds of this Association, is representing himself as a minister of the Gospel, in good standing, and attempting to perform baptism and other ceremonies, as such, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we advise the churches of this Association to beware of and not recognize the said John A. Gandy as a minister of the Gospel in order, nor any of his acts as such.

A proposition was made to this Association from the Manatee Association, by their corresponding messenger, Elder E. J. Hull, to accept the services of Elder T. J. Sparkman for half his time, as Sunday-School Missionary of the American Baptist Publication Society, and pay to the said American Baptist Publication Society the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, which proposition was acceded to.

Resolved, That the churches represented in this Association be recommended to make quarterly collections for missions, and forward the several amounts to the Executive Committee of this Association, to be appropriated as may be designated by the churches making the oontributions, or to the secretaries representing the different mission

Resolved, That the churches be, and they are hereby, requested to make at least one contribution during the year to State Missions, and the Home Mission of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Report of Committee on Sabbath Schools.

There is no interest connected with the progress of our work as a denomination, that is more important than the Sunday-school work. We therefore recommend the churches to cordially co-operate with the Sunday-School Missionary in his work of organizing and encouraging, and supporting Sunday-schools in the bounds of this Association; and that at least one collection be made during the year to the American Baptist Publication Society, and paid over to the Executive Board of this Association. Respectfully submitted.

On motion, a Committee on Decessed Ministers and Deacons were appointed, to-wit: S. L. Hancock, S. Walden and W. J. Taylor.

Elder D. T. McLeod preached at the stand, 11 o'clock, A. M., text:
Mat. 20th chap. 6th verse, "Why stand ye here all the day idle?"
On motion, it is ordered that the fund collected on yesterday at the close of the Missionary Sermon be applied as follows: One-fourth for Missions of this Association, one fourth to English Missions on the standard of the Missions of for Missions of this Association, one-fourth to Foreign Missions, onefourth to the Home Mission of the Southern Baptist Convention, and one-fourth to the American Baptist Publication Society.

A letter from Elder W. F. Wood, of Key West, addressed to J. M. Hayman, was read in the Association, which elicited remarks from several brethren, in regard to the condition of the Indians in Florida; and on motion, it was

Resolved, That Elder W. F. Wood be, and he is hereby, appointed a committee to visit the Seminole Indians in South Florida, that may be accessable to him and report their condition to the Home Mission

Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### Committee on Letters and Documents.

We report that we have examined the letters sent to this Association by the churches, and find that peace and harmony abound, and some revival interests awakened. We notice that the Sand Hill church desires the ordination of brother J. I, Spivy to the ministerial office, we would advise that church to consult a Presbytery of ministers, in regard thereto. We notice two petitions for the next Association from Shiloh and Turkey Creek, and we recommend the petition from Shiloh be

We would ask the churches to be as brief as possible in their letters to the Association. The churches ask the prayers of the Association

for them. Respectfully submitted.

This, coupled with universal legal prohibition of the manufacture and sale of these liquors, will, without doubt, secure to us larger and more lasting prosperity as citizens and Christians, in the several communities in the land.

In view of these incontrovertable statements, and the recent favorable results attending the earnest, constant efforts of the temperance

workers, both North and South, we recommend to our churches a firm adherence to the principles herein indicated, and an ever active contest in their favor until victory, sure and complete, shall be ours for all time. Respectfully submitted.
