BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. The sessions of this body shall be opened and closed with prayer or praise to God or both.
- 2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, and explain and put questions, but shall not vote, except in case of a tie.
- 3. In discussing subjects before this body the speaker shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not speak more than ten minutes at a time, nor more than twice on the same subject without leave of the body; and the speaker shall carefully avoid personal reflections that are offensive.
- 4. It is the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings of this body while in session, and prepare the manuscript for the press, and have the minutes printed and otherwise put up in good style, and distribute them among the churches at the earliest day practicable, and shall keep a complete file of the minutes for the use of the Association.
- 5. The Treasurer of this Association shall hold the moneys sent up by the churches and from other sources, keep strict account of the same, and pay out to the order of the Association or its Executive Committee, and shall make report in writing, at each annual meeting, of all moneys received and disbursed.
- 6. The Constitution and Rules of Order shall be read at each annual meeting, immediately after permanent organization.
- 7. These Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of a majority.

BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION.

- 1. This organization shall be known as the South Florida Baptist Association.
- 2. It shall be composed of Baptist churches of the same faith and Gospel order.
- 3. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot by the properly authorized messengers sent up by the churches.
- 4. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers, and one additional messenger for every twenty-five over the first fifty.
- 5. This Association shall meet annually at any time and place agreed upon, by letters and messengers, in which letters should be stated the names of the messengers sent for the respective sessions and the condition of the churches.
- 6. This Association shall recognize the independence of the churches, and shall not in any case exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any church which it may deem corrupt in faith or practice.
- 7. Churches may be received into this body by petition, setting forth their faith, and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which this Association is governed; and upon reception the Moderator shall give to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
- 8. Any church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection at any time it may deem proper, by giving notice of such intention, without breach of fellowship. But if any church shall fail to represent itself for three years in succession, it shall be dropped, unless retained for the purpose of visitation by committee or otherwise.
 - 9. This Association may correspond with sister associations.
- 10. This Association may alter or amend this Constitution at any regular meeting of its members by two-thirds of the votes of the messengers present.

MINUTES.

The association convened with Bethany Church, Hillsborough County, Fla., November 5th, 1902. Introductory sermon was preached by Elder Irvin, Walden, from first Cor., 3:9.

MORNING SESSION

At 9 a. m. November 6, the association convened after song and prayer service.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT.

We find from the letters 17 schools reported with 91 teachers, 865 pupils, and \$411.50 expenditures. This is at least 25 per cent. less than last year's report. However, we feel sure the decrease in our report is caused by failure to report schools in church letters. We would urge every church clerk to report the school in full, for we are making history for future generations and we want it correct.

We note that what schools are reported are rich and full in interest and are supported by active missionary churches; whereas, churches with no Sunday schools report few additions, and seem to be doing little or nothing toward missions or general church work; which fact within itself is very significant.

We commend those schools that are doing missionary work, and suggest that all others follow their example.

We recommend that all churches exercise direct jurisdiction over their respective schools, so that the school will realize that it is a creature of the church, and not a separate organization.

That the entire church membership be active members of the school.

That the periodical be a help in the study of the Bible, and not the Bible a help in the study of the periodical. Impress the idea that the Bible is God's book, while the periodical is the comment of good men. Not that we love the periodical less but the Bible more.

That the fundamental principles of the Bible as held by the Baptists be instituted into the minds of the pupils, thereby giving the church a sound, educated membership.

We commend Valrico for fostering three schools. Why cannot every church have at least one?

PROMINENT EVILS CONFRONTING US.

The spirit of worldliness and what it springs out of, and what it leads to, is doubtless the evil closest at our doors, and which brings the greatest hindrance, and hurt to our churches as an immediate effect. An over love for the world grows out of a weak

faith in the great truths of the Bible, and generally there is closely associated with this condition of things, a serious ignorance of the Bible itself. Worldly Christians are weak Christians, and weak Christians make weak churches.

Closely allied to this, and growing largely out of the same source is a susceptibility to the influence of the many issues so prevalent in the land, and to which some of the weak, unstable ones have yielded 'hemselves. The holiness craze, which often takes the form of a vaunting self-righteousness. The new lights, and evening lights, and side lights, and no lights, and miraculous healing which are really of the echo of the old voice. "Lo, here is Christ, and lo, there is Christ," gain the attention of many, draw away the unstable, and the Scripture comes true: "My people are destroyed for lack of knowledge."

The "Higher Criticism" looms up at a distance, and is more or less animous along the line of the coming ministry that may have been, or shall be tinctured by it. The evils of the whiskey traffic constitute an old enemy which ignores our churches at many points; sometimes in the tippling of some of the members, sometimes in sweeping away young men from the reach of the Gospel, who, otherwise, might be brought within the fold, and all the time in the fact, that the majority of Ghristian votes stand behind, and are largely responsible for whiskey traffic itself.

Therefore we recommend the reading of the publications of the Sunday School Board, American Baptist Publication Society, The Home Field, Foreign Mission Journal, and commend with emphasis our State organ, The Florida Baptist Witness, also Florida Baptist, and ask all to stimulate their membership along these lines.

MISSIONS.

The work of missions is simply carrying out the last, and great commission of our blessed Master. The command was given to the church to go, and disciple the nations, which the church has been carrying out in a measure, all along during the ages, but not-withstanding the great amount of time that the church has had to work, we have only just commenced, and unless we improve in our contributions it will take a great while yet to Evangelize the world, especially when we look over the fields. Thousands yet have never heard of Christ. The cause of missions ought to stir every christian heart, to put forth every means possible to carry out the command of the Master.

The questions of missions rest on one great theological question of God's word, if it is a fact that God regenerates, sanctifies, saves independent of any means, or instrumentality, then missions is useless, and sinful, also a waste of money and men, but if God does use means, and if the Gospel is the means that God blesses to the salvation of men, then it is the indispensable duty of every Christian to do all he can to acquaint the world of Christ.

The word of God teaches us that God has ordained the preaching of the Gospel unto salvation to every one that will believe, also faith comes by hearing, how then can they "hear without a preacher?"

Paul said that he was debtor, both to Greeks and Barbarians. Paul felt that he owed a debt to the heathen, and that debt was to acquaint them of the salvation of Christ, and we never will feel the burden of the salvation of the lost until we realize that we are in debt to the world, and that debt consists in giving them the Gospel. If we could fully realize that we must stand in the judgment with this generation of heathens, and give an account of our negligence in giving them the Gospel, and hearing them say, if you had done your duty we might have been saved.

Oh, how bad some of us will feel when we realize that our carelessness and stinginess withheld the truth from them. We ought to take courage when we consider that we have the best opportunity of any age of the Christian world. Every heathen land now opens for the Gospel, and then consider what missions has done. The writer can remember when there were very few Baptists in this State. When I first began to notice statistics the Baptists had only about seven thousand, the Methodists, twenty-five thousand, but by missionary effort, (in part at least) we have as many members (nearly) as the Methodists. Many of our best churches were a few years ago missionary stations. And yet there

remains much work to be done in our own association in the eastern and southern part, especially. The city of Tampa demands our immediate attention, where God has so blessed our efforts in the past.

Therefore, we resolve to increase our missionary contributions at least twenty-five per cent, this coming year, and that we insist on each of our pastors to preach more on missions, and acquaint the people with the needs of the work.

May the Lord bless the cause of missions.

Committee.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION:

Your committee in presenting this subject would emphasize, first of all, the fact that no man can be a true minister of the Gospel unless he is called of God to this work, and has the right to enter upon this work as a man would select for himself any of the professions or vocations of life. The choice and call of a true minister is of the Holy Spirit. The evidence of this call to the man himself is a matter of his own consiousness, bythe impressions of the Holy Spirit, leading him to realize that necessity is laid upon bim by his Divine Lord to preach the Gospel. But God sets the minister in His church, and not outside of it, and hence the setting apart publicly of the minister chosen of God should scripturally be under the authority and direction of the church, and by a Presbytery of elders duly called for that purpose. The proof to the church and Presbytery of minister's call consists in the possession by the minister to be ordained, of the qualifications for this office as clearly set forth in the scriptures. It will not be questioned that such a person called of God to teach and proclaim the Gospel should have all the educational training possible, both by his own dilligent study of the scriptures and mental culture by his own efforts and the help of his brethren.

This age of ministerial education demands much more than ever before an educated ministry. A cultured and educated people will not be satisfied with other than an educated preacher, but your committee, as before stated, emphasizes the truth, that it is the Divinely called minister, who is to preach, and that no amount of educational training in itself, apart from this, will make a man a preacher, or invest him with the right to exercise this high calling of God.

An educated man is one whose physical, mental and spiritual talents or faculties have been trained and developed. The education of the whole is necessary to a complete education, and your committee would point out the danger of a partial education as of the mind or body with the elimination of spiritual and moral culture in the curriculum of education, and as the public or state schools minimize the importance of moral training, the work of establishing schools under the authority and patronage of our own churches seems a necessity.

And as there were schools of the ancient prophets or seers and as the apostles were for three years under the personal instruction of Christ, the great teacher, so we think it is well to have theological seminaries or schools where our young ministry may under able, sound and wise teachers receive instruction and training in all the lines appropriate to their great work.

But such schools should as we think be the control, direction of the churches who patronize and sustain them; so that the faculty or corps of instructors shall be composed of those who are sound in the doctrines of the scriptures as we hold them.

Theological seminaries and Baptist schools would prove a curse rather than a blessing if the instructions given should be contrary to the scriptures.

We cannot be too careful, as churches, in requiring that all our schools, literary and theological, should be free from all heresies and heretical teachers or teaching.

Your committee recommend to our young ministers Stetson University at DeLand, and the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville as schools furnishing fine facilities of education in their respective lines or departments of education. On motion prevailing, the Woman's Missionary Society make their own report before the Association at its next session.

EXECUTIVE BOARD.

Your board has during this year assisted weak churches in support of the Gospel at the following named places: Brother J. H. Tharp, at Winter Haven; Brother E. Vickers, at Enterprise, and Maple Creek; Brother J. R. Frier, at Keysville; Brother Irvin Walden, at Plafici. We have also assisted in the building of church houses at College Hill Baptist church near Tampa, and at Green Pond, and at Mulberry, and Six-Mile Creek. We rejoice to know that at this time regular services are being held at the several places mentioned, and they are growing rapidly in self-support and in regular church work. We desire and hope for the hearty co-operation of our Brethren and Sisters in South Florida Association, so as we may still further advance the cause of Christ in assisting weak churches and helping to build houses of worship where they are needed in our bounds. The treasurer's report will show the several amounts paid out by your board.

REPORT OF MANATEE RIVER ASSOCIATION.

Dear Brother—After prayerful consideration we have dissolved the Manatee River Association, realizing that we were too poor financially, and too weak in members to cultivate the field as it should be for the good of the Master's cause. The majority of the churches which compose our Association will apply to your body for admission. In doing so we wish to give you a short synopsis of our needs, and condition in this part of our Master's vineyard.

Since the advent of the railroad into our county it is building up rapidly, which is making it one of the most important fields in the state for missionary work.

There are, springing up all along the line of railroad, towns of importance that should be supplied with Baptist preaching at once.

The railroad has been completed to Palmetto, and there are ritory known as the Manatee River Association section.

The railroad has been completed to Palmetto, and there are already towns being built.

We will mention them in rotation, beginning in the northeastern part of our territory: First Balm, a station on the railroad in Hillsborough county. Here we have had a missionary preaching for the last four months to large and interesting congregations. There are several Baptist families, and a strong Baptist sentiment in the community. Second, is Parish, a station on railroad, twelve miles east of Palmetto, in one of the best sections of the county. We have had no Baptist preaching there for several years. The place is now building up, and several Baptists have, and are moving in. We should by all means occupy that point at once. Third is Sarasota, south of Braidentown, a population of about two hundred and fifty. This little town is located on Sarasota Bay. The railroad will be completed to this point by the first of January, 1903. We have secured a beautiful lot to build on. We have had a missionary there for the last year, and have a church organized with ten members. This place is destined to soon become one of the most important towns in the county. There is a strong Baptist sentiment in this town, and could we push the work, as it should be, we would soon have a self-supporting church. Fourth, Terra Ceia Island, situated on Terra Ceia Bay, six miles from Palmetto, population about two hundred and fifty and is noted for its orange and vegetable industry. We have been keeping a missionary at this point for the last ten years. It is a very important point, and the work should be kept up. To accomplish good results and do the work that we should do, it is absolutely necessary that we should have church buildings at the places to which we have called your attention.

There are other places on the line of the railroad which we will mention: Little Sarasota, Venice and Englewood, and last, Boca Grande, which will be the terminal of the S. H. L. R. R.

Hoping that our heavenly Father will guide you by His spirit and that His blessings may rest upon our efforts.
