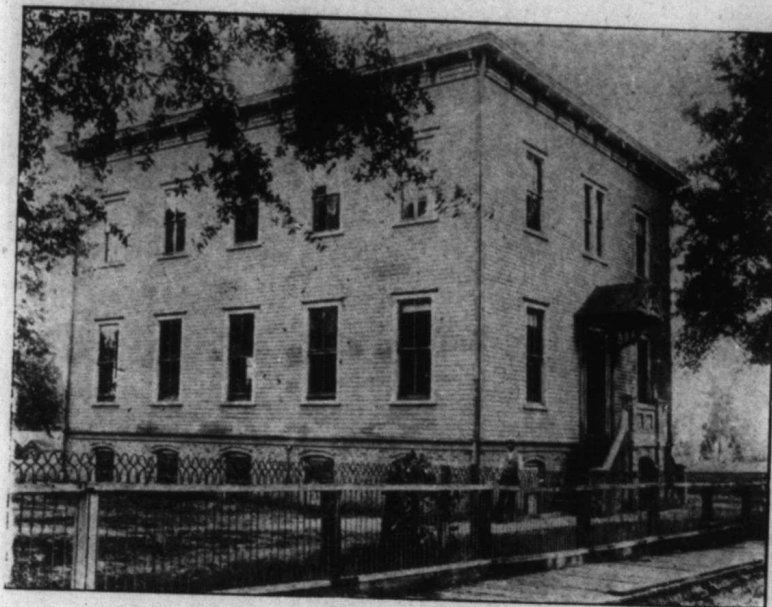

### RULES OF ORDER.

1. The sessions of this body shall be opened and closed with prayer or praise to God, or both.

2. The Moderator shall preside over the deliberations of this Association, keep order, and explain and put questions, but shall not vote, except in case of a tie.

3. In discussing subjects before this body the speaker shall rise from his seat and address the Moderator, and shall not speak more than ten minutes at a time, nor more than twice on the same subject, without leave of the body, and the speaker shall carefully avoid personal reflections that are offensive.

4. It is the duty of the Clerk of this Association to keep a fair and correct record of the proceedings of this body while in session, and prepare the manuscript for the press, and have the minutes printed and otherwise put in good style, and distribute them among the churches at the earliest day practicable, and shall keep a complete file of the minutes for the use of the Association.

5. The Treasurer of this Association shall hold the moneys sent up by the churches and from other sources, keep strict account of the same, and pay out to the order of the Association or its Executive Committee, and shall make report, in writing, at each annual meeting of all moneys received and disbursed.

6. The Constitution and Rules of Order shall be read at each annual meeting, immediately after permanent organization.

7. These Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any annual meeting by a vote of a majority.

## CONSTITUTION.

1. This organization shall be known as the **South Florida Baptist Association**.
2. It shall be composed of Baptist Churches of the same faith and Gospel order.
3. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually by ballot by the properly authorized messengers sent up by the churches.
4. Each church shall be entitled to two messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five over the first fifty.
5. This Association shall meet annually at any time and place agreed upon, by letters and messengers, in which letters should be stated the names of the messengers sent for the respective sessions and the conditions of the churches.
6. This Association shall recognize the independence of the churches, and shall not in any case exercise jurisdiction over them, yet shall have power to drop from its connection any church which it may deem corrupt in faith or practice.
7. Churches may be received into this body by petition, setting forth their faith and willingness to conform to the rules and regulations by which this Association is governed; and, upon reception the Moderator shall give to the messengers the hand of fellowship.
8. Any church shall be at liberty to discontinue its connection at any time it may deem proper, by giving notice of such intention, without breach of fellowship. But if any church shall fail to represent itself for three years in succession, it shall be dropped, unless retaining for the purpose of visitation by committee or otherwise.
9. This Association may correspond with sister Associations.
10. This Association may alter or amend this Constitution at any regular meeting of its members by two-thirds of the votes of the messengers present.

## MINUTES.

The Forty-Second Annual Session of the South Florida Baptist Association convened in regular session with the Turkey Creek Baptist Church Tuesday, October 13, 1908, at 10 o'clock A. M.

At the conclusion of the usual devotional services the Moderator, John S. Howard, formally opened the Association for business.

Motion prevailed to dispense with reading the letters, and a committee be appointed to examine them, and bring all pertinent things to be acted upon before the Association in a concrete form.

Upon the completion of the roll-call the Association unanimously re-elected the following officers:

Moderator, John S. Howard; Clerk, A. T. Mullins; Treasurer, W. S. Knight.

The regular order of business was continued with the reading of the Constitution and By-Laws by the Moderator.

The Moderator then appointed E. Sanford, J. H. Humphries and J. L. Hampton as a committee to canvas the letters as provided for by previous motion.

A short recess was now taken by the Association, after which Rev. A. J. Beck, of Bradentown, preached the introductory sermon from Eph. iv. 1. It was a strong exhortation on living as servants of God, and was much appreciated by all. At its conclusion, Rev. R. T. Caddin gave the Association a most hearty welcome, inviting the messengers to feel at home. The subsequent entertainment proved how truly he bespoke the entire church's sentiments.

The motion then carried to adjourn till 1:30 o'clock P. M.

#### TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

Prayer and praise service, led by the Moderator, preceded the afternoon session, after which he appointed the following committees:

Under the head of Petitionary Letters, the Clark Memorial Church of Ybor City asked admission to the Association, and, on motion, it was received and the hand of fellowship extended by the Moderator.

The Committee on Examining Letters of the Churches then reported a letter from the Friendship Baptist Church at Fruitville, asking for a letter of admission to unite with the Peace River Association. On motion, the letter was ordered granted.

The visiting brethren were now invited to make themselves known, and W. D. Turnley, of Dade City, addressed the Association.

The report of committees was the next order of business, and the report on "Modern Evils That Confront Us" was passed till later.

Rev. E. Sanford then read the report on "Orphanage," which was as follows:

**ORPHANAGE.**

"Thou hast been the helper of the fatherless." The primary meaning of the word orphanage is an establishment in which orphans are provided for and educated. History says that in all well-regulated States the duty of caring for the destitute orphans was recognized at an early age. It appears that the cities of Athens and Rome and many others had establishments in which orphans, deserted, and some other children were supported and educated at the public expense. In the laws of some of the early emperors frequent mention is made of such institutions. In the Middle Ages such places were numerous and generally under the direction of the clergy. In recent times public orphanages have been substituted or supplemented by the farming-out system—that is, the child is sent out to a private family to be raised and educated. This system, with the proper selection of the guardian and wise, judicious supervision, has proved satisfactory along most lines. Usually the religious training is not demanded, and the child is left without this most necessary development.

Some States have a State institution; others, each county cares for its own wards. Some are supported as private institutions, assisted by legislative appropriations. Beyond any time in the past they are being cared for by religious bodies. The Catholics long ago saw the wonderful power to convert the child to their faith by this means, and have thus provided houses for all they can induce to go, or parents permit. No one doubts the wisdom and necessity of our own home at Arcadia. But all rejoice because of it.

The report of "Sunday Schools" was also passed for the present, while the report of the Committee on Education was made a special order for Wednesday morning.

The report on Missions was now read by Rev. G. T. Leitner and

adopted as read. It was spoken on by Dr. L. D. Geiger and Brother Leitner. It was as follows:

### Missions.

The marching orders given by our Master to His disciples was, "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." This is one of the first duties that confronts the child of God; the Holy Spirit rings it into the heart and ears: "the kings of business require haste."

For convenience, we speak of Foreign, Home, State and Associational Missions, but it is all one—viz., the work of Christ, the spreading of the Master's Kingdom. Never before in the history of the world has there been so much activity among the people of God as now in obeying the commission of our Saviour. But there is much yet to be done. Our churches need to be aroused to a greater interest on the subject of missions—giving. Many give nickles who ought to give dollars, and many give dollars who ought to give hundreds, as to the grace of giving. The apostle said, "See that ye abound in this grace also."

This is truly an age of forward movement. The world for Christ. "Come over and help us," is the cry coming from the unsaved millions. They hunger for the bread of life. Tell us "where we can find Him whom my soul longest for?"

Our Home Mission Field enlarges before our eyes. It seems as if the world has become our Home Mission Field. With the vast stream of foreigners pouring into our Southland every year, admonishing us that unless we lead them to Christ, they will lead our people away from Him.

What shall we say of State Missions? The population of our States is growing by leaps and bounds. Our larger cities and smaller towns are filling up at a rapid rate. Can we, will we meet the demands of the growing and increasing population with the Gospel message of salvation? Our boards are doing their best. Brethren, remember they are our agents to lead under God this people to do greater things for Him.

Missions, children of God, churches of our common Saviour, what is your duty in this great work before you?—the evangeliza-

tion of the world, the uplifting of the fallen to Jesus. "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God" is the duty of every Christian.

"We would see Jesus, the great rock foundation,  
Where on our feet were set with sovereign grace.  
Not life, nor death with all this agitate  
Can thence remove us if we see His face.  
We would see Jesus—this all we need—  
Strength, joy and willingness comes with the sight."

It was then decided to continue the Question of Missions until Wednesday morning.

The motion was also carried to take up "Religious Literature" at 9:30 o'clock Wednesday morning.

Adjournment was then ordered.

In the evening Rev. W. D. Entzinger gave a most splendid discourse from the text, Matt. i. 21.

### WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Rev. J. R. Frier lead the prayer and praise service, and the session opened with the further discussion of the subject of "Missions," by Revs. Duke, Sparkman and Sanford. Brother Duke brought out the fact that "Missions" was too broad a head for the subject, and again this topic was voted a half hour in the afternoon session.

The report on "Religious Literature," as follows, was read by Rev. Duke and adopted as read. It was spoken to by Revs. Duke, Tharpé, Leitner, and Entzinger.

### Religious Literature.

"Reading makes a full man." Dr. Austin Phelps has given us a great book entitled "Men and Books." The thought is that men and books are the two chief sources from which one may gain wisdom. Well does the author put the study of men first in the title of his book. We can hardly place too much emphasis upon the study of men. Literature can never take the place of personality. God has wisely ordained that through "the foolishness of preaching" the world shall be saved. History furnishes numerous instances of men



of mediocre ability who have attained to greatness simply through the inspiration of some companion of marked ability. It pays immensely to study men—living men. But books, after all, possess some advantages. In the library we make the great men of all past time our immediate and willing companions. They give us the very best thoughts of their lives, presented in their best literary style. Well are a man's books called his "works." We have the product of his best thinking unmingled with his weaknesses and faults.

Not all literature, however, is pure and good. Like some men, many books make very poor, or even dangerous companions. Scarcely can a mother do a wiser thing than to exercise a judicious censorship over the reading of her sons and daughters. Much literature that purports to be religious is not only subversive of the truth, but positively unmoral.

We respectfully urge that our pastors, from time to time, preach on good reading, urging their people to read and offering suggestions as to what to read.

In addition to a more careful study of the Bible, we would commend our denominational magazines, such as the Foreign Mission Journal, the Home Field and Our Mission Fields. Especially would we urge upon our people the claims of our State paper, the "Florida Baptist Witness." By all means let us see that our people be kept in touch with our work in Florida through this, the only channel of information.

We would commend, also, a free use of tracts in our churches, especially those on Evangelism, Giving and Doctrine.

The report on "Modern Evils That Confront Us" was read by Rev. C. H. Nash. It was adopted as read.

**"Modern Evils That Confront Us."**

Since their name is legion, we cannot dwell on any one of them at length. Among those mentioned in the report one year ago were: The Saloon Evil, the Divorce Evil, the Social Evil, and the Sabbath Evil. We would add to this list the Gambling Evil. We firmly believe that our attitude both as churches and individual Christians, toward all these evils should be more positive and outspoken; that

our pastors should seek to arouse their people to the pernicious influence of these evils on the rising generation, as well as their destructive work on the generation passing; that they should draw a very sharp line, and that the Bible line in the matter of marrying divorced people, and that our churches should not tolerate in their membership any who stand in with these evils.

How can we expect to make any headway against this growing desecration of the Sabbath, if we, as Christians, do not "remember the Sabbath day to keep it holy"? How can we succeed in breaking down to any extent this mania for gambling while so many of our people tolerate it by their presence at horse-trots and ball-games, where gambling is one of the main features, or where Christian card parties have their miniature gambling to add spice?

As for the saloon evil, there is no middle ground. We are standing either with God or the devil. The call is imperative just now for united, earnest action against this death-dealing curse of the saloon. Take all the saloons away, and many of these evils rooted in it will die with it. We sing, "Are there no foes for me to face?" Here they are; face them.

The report on "Woman's Work" was read by Mrs. Taylor. It was discussed by Revs. Pettie and Duke, and adopted as read. It was as follows:

#### Woman's Work.

Larger things was the keynote sounded by Southern Baptist women at their convention last May, and from that to the State conventions, on to the local societies the same note has been triumphantly sounded, until to-day, at the close of the associational year, the women of the South Florida Association are able to make a better report than ever before.

We rejoice that God has honored our efforts and blessed the work done, and with praise and thanksgiving we recognize His mercies toward us. Yet the success and blessings of the past year's achievement must not drown the still small voice that gently speaks to us, and says: "There are yet heights to be taken; there is land to be gained for Christ; there are more gifts to be brought to the Master's feet. "Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse."

Study classes have been foremd, missionary information has been spread until an increased intelligent interest has been aroused, and with it enlarged giving.

The Young Woman's Auxiliary and the Sunbeam Band have played no small part. Through them the girls and children are being trained for useful work—not only for work, but in their hearts are being planted seeds that will bring forth fruit for the Kingdom.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Your Executive Committee beg leave to report that we have looked after the spiritual interests of our Association to the best of our ability, and feel confident that much good has been accomplished for the Master.

We can see the increasing responsibility upon us, and we feel that every effort should be put forth to meet them. And only by the help of the Lord can we succeed.

Your committee employed O. N. Williams at a salary of \$50 per month to work at the Phosphate Mines in Polk county, and we believe that Brother Williams has sown spiritual seed that will come forth to the glory of God.

In addition to the work spoken of, there is a mine being opened within two miles of Plant City that will employ from 500 to 1,000 men. We recommend that this body endorse the effort put forth by the Bradentown, Palm Avenue and Tampa First Churches.

We feel profoundly grateful for the success of Brother Dunklin as a missionary in Tampa, and recommend that he be retained at a salary of \$100 per month.

We earnestly recommend that this Association ask that a man from Tampa be appointed on the State Board of Missions, and we heartily endorse Rev. C. W. Duke for this position.

We feel, brethren, that our work is hampered for the want of funds, and we urge the brethren to look well to this matter and come to the help of the Lord with all the liberality possible.

### THURSDAY MORNING.

The praise services were led by Rev. H. H. Norris, and at the conclusion of same the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools was read by S. J. Hancock, as follows:

### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your Committee is happy to report a growing interest in Sunday School Work in this Association. We believe the Sunday school to be the greatest benefit in Christian work; and, if properly carried on, will result in the revolutionizing of our land. And, if controlled and guided in its work by the church, will be the means of bringing the souls of children to Christ in large numbers.

Your committee is glad to report a great interest in this work among our churches in this Association, and heartily commend the system of Sunday School Institutes held and controlled by this body. We also commend most heartily the lesson helps and Sunday School Supplies furnished by our Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn., as they are equal to the best.

It was spoken to by Brothers S. J. Hancock, Thiot, Martin, Mullins, Corr, Caddin, Mabry, and McClelland. Adopted.

### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The report on "Education" was read by Rev. R. W. Thiot and adopted. It was as follows:

The importance of educating our boys and girls is not over estimated by the wisest men of to-day. We do not need longer to wake up our people as to the importance of the question.

Our public school system and the many colleges in our State tell of our interest in education. The call for educated men and women tells of the grand possibilities for the educated boy or girl.

We are glad to see the great progress in the work of education. The needs of the public schools are more teachers and better teachers. How shall we answer the needs of the hour? What part shall we take in supplying the demands? We have Columbia College. This is ours, and deserves our support. Columbia College is under the control of the Baptist State Convention in every respect, and as it belongs entirely to us has claims upon us which we should acknowledge by giving our help—our immediate help. The two things Columbia College needs are pupils and money. The Baptists of Florida have both pupils and money. With these two things Columbia College need not be second to any school.

We can answer the question as we have done in other things of like importance. We shall be faithful and wise. The duty is plain. We shall give to Columbia College our boys and girls and the means to make it the pride of the Baptists of this State so far as schools are concerned.
