1. At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.
2. The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point or order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association, when requested by any two members.
3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say 'Aye'." And after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say 'No'." If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.
4. The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.
5. In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the Association be equally divided, or unless his vote given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the question shall be lost.
6. When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.
7. If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.
8. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.
9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association, nor more than once until every one choosing to speak shall have done so.
10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourses that may be entertained between the members, and require strict attention on the part of the members.
11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.
12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.
13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.
14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained unless to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.
15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.

16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.

17. Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.

18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.

20. The Association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.

21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approved by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

With the Moderator in the chair, a devotional service was conducted by A. C. Camp.

R. T. Russell, L. J. Clark, M. N. Smith were named as committee to arrange program for the night session.

They reported that Rev. B. Stephens would preach the sermon, and recommended that reports on B. Y. P. U. be read and discussed. Call for visitors was responded to by Rev. T. A. Cumbie, of The Bowen Association of Georgia; Bro. J. P. Edmunds and wife, who represented the Sunday School and B. Y. P. U. work; Rev. Dempsey W. Hodges, an evangelist of Dothan, Ala., and Bro. S. C. Crumpton, of Childsburg, Ala.

Motion, that file of Associational Minutes be given into the keeping of the First Baptist Church, of Tallahassee, it being understood that they arrange and bind, but the file to continue the property of the Association. The above compilation of Minutes came as a gift from Rev. F. M. Wells, through Bro. W. D. Richards.

On motion, 10 o'clock Wednesday be made a special hour for State Missions.

The report on Stewardship was read and discussed by W. L. Maige, and on motion adopted.

The Treasurer's report was read and adopted.

B. Stephens and D. A. Avant were named as committee to confer with like committees from S. S. Convention and the Western Union.

Report of Mutual Relation of Church and Pastor was read by J. A. Scruggs. Spoken to by J. A. Scruggs, W. H. Rugeley, and on motion adopted.

Meeting adjourned.

THURSDAY NIGHT

The meeting was called to order at 8:00 o'clock by the Moderator.

J. A. Scruggs acting as Clerk, in absence of Clerk Wells.

The report on B. Y. P. U. was read by P. Q. Cason. Spoken to by P. Q. Cason, J. P. Edmunds and on motion report was adopted.

After discussion of report the meeting was turned over to Rev. B. Stephens, who preached sermon from text 2 Cor. 4:5; subject, "The Lordship of Jesus."

FRIDAY MORNING

The meeting was called to order by the Moderator; the congregation sang "How Firm a Foundation"; Rev. F. L. Dykes led song and devotional service, reading the 49th Psalm.

Regular order of business continued.

The report on Baptist Children's Home, read by L. J. Clark, spoken to by S. R. Skinner, P. Q. Cason, and adopted.

Report on Prohibition read by F. L. Dykes, spoken to by Bro. Dykes, and on motion adopted.

Letter from Rev. Preston, of Madison, was read by Bro. Rugeley. Bro. Preston suggested the appointment of a missionary to give his full time, in four associations in Middle Florida. Matter was referred to the State Board of Missions.

The report on State Missions was read by L. J. Clark.

The report on Evangelism was read by B. Stephens. The two reports were then spoken to by B. Stephens, J. P. Edmunds, C. Frank Wells, and on motion the report was adopted.

Regular order was then discontinued, and Rev. R. T. Russell preached doctrinal sermon. His text was Matt. 22:42; his subject, "What Think Ye of Christ?" after which the meeting adjourned.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Song and devotional service, after which the regular order was continued.

The report on nominations was read by J. E. Shelfer, and on motion report was adopted.

The report of the Executive Committee was read by W. H. Rugeley, and on motion adopted.

On motion J. A. Scruggs write short report on Stetson University, report to be written into Minutes.

The report of Finance Committee was read by W. H. Rugeley and on motion report was adopted.

Present members of Executive Committee to be continued for the ensuing year.

The report on Woman's Work was read by Mrs. Meade Love, spoken to by Mrs. Love, and on motion the report was adopted.

The report on Sunday Schools read by D. A. Avant, spoken to by D. A. Avant, W. D. Richards, J. P. Edmunds, W. H. Dean, and adopted.

Resolution of thanks to Flat Creek Church and community was offered by W. H. Dean.

On motion the churches are requested to fill out and return to the Clerk their letters at least ten days before the next session, that chart may be made for material of information at next session.

On motion the Association adjourned, to meet with the First Baptist Church, of Quincy, Fla., Thursday after the second Sunday in October, 1926.

The song "Blest be the Tie That Bonds" was sung by the congregation. Prayer was offered by Rev. R. T. Russell, and the eighty-third session of the Florida Baptist Association was a matter of history.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

Never before in the history of this great state has the outlook for our great denomination been more promising. Although from all sides we hear notes of pessimism which seem to indicate that Florida Baptists are losing ground and are not meeting the great opportunities that our great state offers, we, your committee, believe that Florida Baptists are now ready to exercise their time, talents, and money in winning our state for our Christ. We realize that during the past year we have failed in a large measure and have not kept pace with our growing state. But we believe this condition was due to Florida's unsettled condition.

It is almost impossible for one to visualize the tremendous sweep of activity that is now going on throughout Florida. It commands the attention of the nation to a greater extent than any state in the Union ever did. Millions are being spent in building tracks, depots and shops. Nearly forty million will be spent in road building and road improvements. More than a score of hotels costing from one to seven million each are being constructed. The writer read last week where Miami announced that they were now ready to accommodate 90,000 more tourists this winter.

Thousands are coming into the state and they are bringing and making more money than we know how to handle.

With such a development going on it is not surprising to see large numbers of our Baptist people halt in their denominational work to watch Florida's landslide. And as they watched they were swept into the current by real estate enthusiasts.

So, because of this unusual progress of Florida our Baptist people have not been strong enough to stand by their post, and as a result our great Baptist program has been seriously hindered.

In view of the above situation and in contemplation of the immediate future, with a consuming passion for our own state and people, we plead for more definite and concrete method of work.

It is up to the individual churches. And the associations being the closest fraternal units to the churches can render best help.

Let us remember that when we give to state missions we are giving to the whole world, hence upon our hearts, in our homes, in our churches and everywhere, this one burden-bearer, this one base of supply, this one hope of all our agencies must not be neglected.

Your committee suggests the following:

That as many as possible attend the state convention which meets December 6-11 at Tampa. This is our centennial year, and we will have more time to discuss our great progress.

That each church shall inform this association what it will do, or will undertake to do in this holy conflict, 1926.

That the association shall tell the state convention upon what it can hope to project its work for the coming year.

That we plead for a full half day in this association meeting for a free, frank and fraternal discussion of the state and worldwide situation.

Finally, we suggest that at the close of this report this body spend two minutes in silent prayer for our cause, and for our great secretary, Dr. Rogers, who at this time is confined to the bedside of his dear wife.

ASSOCIATIONAL REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board presented its eightieth annual report to the Southern Baptist Convention last May in Memphis, Tennessee. Eighty years of service by this board since its organization in 1845 constitute a real romance in Home Missions. Through many vicissitudes and steady and unvarying purpose for the salvation of the lost and the up-building of the Kingdom in our Southland, the Home Mission Board presents an unbroken history of fidelity and spiritual conquest.

It has been for Southern Baptists the one great constructive, cooperative and unifying agency. It has been the foster-mother of our weaker enterprises, the founder and support of thousands of our churches and the forerunner of most all our State Conventions and a stimulating factor in their organization and progress.

The Board in its report presented a significant comparison as follows:

For the last twenty-five years the advance in Home Missions has been at times remarkable and always continuous and healthy. It reached its highest point in 1920, the first year of the 75-Million Campaign. Since that time, due to various causes but chiefly to

the falling off in receipts, the Board has made severe and drastic retrenchment in many phases of its work. In some instances such severe retrenchment has brought the work to the verge of calamity. The Board has had to stand still in the face of countless and unwonted opportunities. Fields ripe for the harvest have cried out for the sickle of the reaper and the Board has not been able to thrust laborers sufficient into harvest fields to garner the grain.

At the recent annual meeting in June, on account of the heavy and burdensome debt, the Board had to still further retrench. Enlargement on the contrary is called for in every direction:

First, in an increase of forces; second, in better equipment.

The Board has need for at least fifty capable young women and as many men in the field at home and a half dozen young women for Cuba.

In equipment the needs are even greater. For school buildings in El Paso, Texas, and Havana, Cuba; the enlargement and better equipment of our thirty mountain schools; at least fifty chapels in the homeland and Cuba and Panama. The greatest need of the Board just now is a mighty increase in financial receipts to lift the heavy burden of debt and prepare for the recovery of lost ground and to enter new fields that are white unto harvest.

Notwithstanding the retrenchments made, the Board presents a year of wonderful results:

With 1,077 missionaries, they report 49,219 weeks of labor; 2,381 churches and stations; 144,087 sermons and addresses; 30,027 additions by baptisms; 4,896 by letter; total additions 50,354; 210 churches constituted; 355 church houses built or improved; 608 Sunday Schools organized; distributed 12,995 Bibles and Testaments.

The Home Mission field was never so great and urgent as now. To save our own land is a condition of saving the lost in distant lands. Home Missions furnish the great base of supplies for the work at home and afar.

Let's remember the Board all its work in our prayers and come with greater liberality in our gifts!

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

When Paul told Timothy (II Tim. 4:5) to "do the work of an evangelist" he laid on Timothy and every church, as well, the responsibility of winning lost souls to Christ. Individually and collectively our only excuse for holding the name "Christian" is that we may be used to help save others. The old motto of the B. Y. P. U. of America, "Saved to Serve", is a good one for every Christian.

We have heard considerable talk about "first things first". "First things first" may be one thing to one man or organization and an altogether different thing to another. "Back to the Book" is a companion slogan of the one above. Here again there may be diversity of opinion. It is the opinion of your committee on evangelism that the Bible in its entirety (the parts we understand and the parts we don't understand now) constitutes God's revealed word and will to man; that this Book is sufficient for faith and practice; and that to abide by its teachings will make

one wise unto salvation and then cause the saved to go after the lost and bring them unto Christ—the only, but all-sufficient Saviour from sin to life eternal. To preach Christ, the history of His life and His teachings as revealed in the Bible, is putting “first things first” and we must get “back to the Book” to learn that history and catch the inspiration of that life.

If the evangelistic fires are kept burning and an “intensive evangelism becomes the dominant note of the church” (Broughton), it is our opinion that much of the spirit of division, criticism, and indifference would be overcome. A unity of spirit would ensue. Petty bickerings would recede before the larger light. Churches would be filled with people. Sinners would inquire the way of life and saints have the joy of salvation restored. Then we would have sufficient workers and ample means with which to adequately carry on the work of the Lord.

We call special attention to two facts: Nineteen churches in this association reported “no baptisms” to the last meeting of the association. Second, we are glad to note that the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has re-established the department of evangelism. Rev. Ellis A. Fuller, Greenville, S. C., has been selected superintendent of the department.

Your committee suggests (1) that all the churches of the association undertake to hold a series of evangelistic meetings during the year; (2) that tracts dealing with the plan of salvation be freely distributed; (3) that by prayer and study we try to keep the spirit of evangelism aggressively active in all our churches.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

It is with the deepest regret that we make a report on foreign missions which of a necessity carries with it a note of pessimism.

We have not advanced along the lines of foreign missions in the past year nearly so much as we might have done under a regime of world-wide progress and prosperity.

The radio, the wireless telegraphy and other forms of marvelously rapid means of communication have telescoped the world into a community, while at the same time forces are at work which are galvanizing each individual into a separate unit, with a government in his own consciousness which opposes all authority and defies restraint, political, religious and social.

A wave of restlessness and recklessness and unprecedented frivolity which is world wide in its scope is shifting the mind of humanity from religious zeal to the whirlpool of illicit pleasures and supreme selfishness.

The young man or woman who volunteers for foreign missions receives but little encouragement. The carelessness and unpar-

donable indifference of the masses of Christian people, dampen their enthusiasm and cause them, sometimes, to turn away from the task discouraged, sick at heart, and miserably disappointed.

In the pulpit, the theme of the “white Harvest fields” has shifted to the arena of the tremendous universal fight over the fundamentals of our faith, while we are neglecting the weightier matters of evangelism. Selfishness has gripped the heart of humanity and is dragging the people away from the teachings of Jesus Christ which was, above all things else, to carry the gospel to all people everywhere.

Under those conditions—which we do believe honestly exist—we, the committee, strongly and earnestly recommend that each messenger to this association go back to our respective churches and seek to create and to maintain throughout the next association year a missionary spirit among our people which will reach beyond local and selfish needs and reach every part of the world.

We recommend further that we call our people to prayer and service in this great undertaking, and that we rally to the urgent and piteous call of our faithful foreign missionary secretary, Dr. Love, who is wearing his life away in unselfish and loyal service, and that we give liberally of the means with which God has so richly blessed us in sending the blessed truth to the nations of the world.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

We, your Committee on our Children's Home, submit the following report:

Our Children's Home, as everyone in the State should know, is located at Arcadia, Fla. We have eighty acres of land, a very valuable piece of property, located in the corporate limits of the city on the Dixie Highway. Twenty-seven acres are in cultivation, 15 acres in playground and campus on which there are located four two-story buildings and three brick buildings, one concrete and a superintendent's home, a two-story frame building. There are other out-buildings such as the barn, wood shed, carpenter, painter and blacksmith shops. We have eight acres bearing orange and grapefruit grove, thirty acres in pasture land for the cows.

We understand we have about 110 boys and girls with the capacity for about 125. It is the aim of the management to increase the capacity of the institution by enlarging the buildings.

Our children attend services at the First Baptist Church in Arcadia and with just a few exceptions all of the children in the home old enough are members of the church. The home receives

children in ages from infancy to twelve years for girls, and ten years for boys who are full orphans. All children are received into the home upon application furnished by the superintendent properly filled out with a doctor's certificate attached.

The Home is supported by the Churches through the budget plan. We, your committee, recommend that the Church stick as closely as possible to the budget and in the event the Church is not following the budget plan, that more independent gifts and larger donations be sent the Home as often as possible.

How can our Home and Foreign Boards inform us as to their needs and let us know what they are accomplishing in all parts of the world except through their magazine, *The Home and Foreign Fields*, and it is the duty and ought to be the pleasure of every Baptist family to subscribe to these publications and get informed as to what we Baptists are doing for the uplift of the world and the spread of the gospel of our Lord and Saviour. The cost of these two magazines is only nominal, less than ten cents per week and we would urge our brethren to have these papers come into their homes every week so that they and their families can keep up with everything that is being done to bring this old world to a knowledge of our Lord and Christ.

REPORT ON B. Y. P. U.

The training of our young people is one of the most significant and far-reaching privileges and one of the most imperatively necessary duties incident to our organized work.

That this may be done harmoniously, effectively and systematically, the B. Y. P. U. has been organized, fostered and developed and should have the heartiest, most devoted and most unreserved co-operation of all our leaders.

That our loss has been incalculable and influence-curtailling as a result of our neglect of this strikingly important feature of our work there can be no possible question. In many instances the young converts, as soon as they are received into the churches, are left to themselves and cannot fail under such neglect to become indifferent and after a while actually become again to seek the glittering and ever-enticing companionship of those who are in the world, and are very often lost to the church, so far as activity and the exertion of Christian influences are concerned.

On the other hand, when gotten immediately into vital touch with the church activities through the tactful and persistent functionings of the Unions they become interested, attend the services, grow in grace and become soul-winning, self-sacrificing and insistently active workers.

"Making disciples" is the first duty we owe to the lost but "teaching them to observe all things" is equally binding and equally unevasive and your committee would most urgently plead with each pastor and his co-workers to give to this eminently important phase of our work that degree of interest its relative power for the advancement of all kingdom interest demands that our young people may grow up to be workers that have no need for sham but can at all times "rightly divide the Word of Truth."

As in the case in all organized endeavor, the getting of a proper leadership for the Unions is the first prerequisite; this being done, every possible encouragement and sympathetic co-operation should be given this same leadership in all departments of the church life.

Then again, social life within and under proper Christian influences must ever be the profound problem of the Unions for our young people are and for a while will remain young people and they simply must have social relationships and if these are not provided for, the dissatisfied and restless contingent will see that it is forthcoming and, alas, too often of such nature as to prove hurtful and at times deleterious to if not inimical to Christian growth and development.

That each and every church may have as many Unions as the membership may deem expedient, manned by an aggressive and consistent leadership, which at all times has the heartiest, fullest and most prayerful co-operation of each and every member of the Churches, and that we may have an invincible army of young people which shall go forth to do great things for the Master in this, the most significant and regnantly inviting age the world

has ever known, is the earnest prayer, the urgent recommendation and the anxious wish as well as the full expectancy of your committee.

REPORT ON WOMAN'S WORK

To Florida Baptist Association, at Flat Creek, Oct. 16, 1925:

In I Corinthians 3:9, we find the Woman's Missionary Union watchword. "Laborers together with God," and such has been the aim of the organized women of our churches, and it is a fact that we have achieved somewhat of that aim in the blessed service which has been done for our God and the extension of His Kingdom.

In Dr. Roger's report to the last Baptist State Convention he has this to say of the Florida Baptist Women's Missionary Union: "Perhaps in no field of our activities has there been such marked progress, such devotion to service, such sacrifice in giving, as in this particular branch of our activity. Wherever they have been shown the way, they have delighted to walk therein, and faithfully have borne their part."

The women of the Southern Baptist Churches in hundreds of places are organized into these bands called Missionary Societies. They are in the large city churches, and in the small country churches, but they all have the same hope and aim in the Lord's service, doing their part to carry out His command, to "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel."

We have the following seven objectives for our chief aim: (1) individual and united prayer; (2) Bible study; (3) soul winning; (4) enlistment; (5) mission study; (6) organized personal service; (7) systematic and proportionate giving. We can pray at home, but it helps us greatly to come together in our meetings for prayer, also for Bible study, Mission study, for discussion of how best to carry on our work for the Master in all the ways we are trying to do it.

The women of our Southland have done much to lead and train the young people into service for God, and they have done a great deal to stimulate all the members of our churches in giving to our Mission work. Another influential work of the Women's Societies is that of personal service, taking Christ into our everyday life, and helping those who need our love and sympathy, and help. In the plan of our work we have three special weeks of prayer and study each year, for Home Missions, Foreign Missions, and State Missions, when the work of each is given particular emphasis. Through this special effort the women have taught the children and the men of our churches more of the Master's work in all of our Mission fields.

The Woman's Missionary Union maintains a department of Literature, sending out leaflets along the lines of each branch of the work being done. They also publish two splendid monthly magazines, "Royal Service", dealing particularly with the Women's work; and "World Comrades" for the young people. Both of these magazines should be in every Baptist home.

It would do much to help build up every church in our Association if there were a Woman's Missionary Society in each church, helping to train the people into greater service for our Lord.

That the pastor study more carefully the vices, temptations, trials and hardships of his members and the people of his community in order that he may employ the most effective means for the uplifting of all and the salvation of souls.

Second. That a training school be held in each church at least once a year in order that our teachers may be trained for better teaching.

Third. That our people co-operate in a greater way with the Sunday School Department of the State Board of Missions.
