- Motion made and carried that Dr. S. A. Campbell be re-elected as Moderator.

- Motion made and carried that J. E. Shelfer be reelected Treasurer.
- Motion made and carried that Dr. S. A. Campbell be re-elected as a member of the State Mission Board.
- 7. Committee on Finance and Digest of Letters appointed by the Moderator, as follows: J. E. Shelfer, J. A. Scruggs, Alphonse Pichard.
- A suggested program was read by the Moderator, and motion made and carried that this program be adopted

with such changes as the Moderator finds necessary.

9. Report on W. M. U. was read by Mrs. W. W. Blount and adopted.

SUMMARY OF REPORT OF FLORIDA ASSOCIATION W. M. U.

The annual meeting of the W. M. U. Florida Association was held in Apalachicola on Sept. 26th, 1933. Meeting called to order at 2 o'clock P. M. Devotional by Mrs. W. W. Blount. Prayer by Mrs. Perkins. After routine business the officers and chairmen of Committees for the ensuing year were duly elected (Their names and addresses will be found under W. M. U. Directory). The Secretary's report shows that the Association has 656 members, 28 Circles, 48 Tithers, and that 9 Study Classes were conducted during the year. with 18 awards. We have the following number of subscribers to Baptist Literature: "Royal Service" 136, "H. & F. F." 23, "World Comrades" 20, "Witness" 114, "The Window" 5. Number of boxes sent to Children's Home 17, Value \$126.10, to Training School 2, Value \$12.70, to Margaret Fund 8, Value \$10.44. Cash for Aged Ministers \$33.46, Missionaries \$4.21. Apportionment \$1099.33. Week of Prayer \$217.98. Local \$252.00. Other objects \$238.54. Tallahassee Society has loaned to two girls \$100.00 each to enter Training School at Louisville.

10. Report on Christian Education read by C. L. Holton in the absence of E. S. Atkinson, and adopted.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION.

The friends of Christian Education are challenged as never before by an aggressive era of materialism and its attendant phylosophies. Chaos and confusion are upon us, largely because many schools and colleges, and much literature is unchristian. A student is influenced in no small degree by the character of his teacher. Let us see to it that the education of our children is symetrical, and sepecially that it contains the spiritual element. Then let us counteract irreligious influences by Bible study in the home, and by sending our boys and girls to reputable Baptist schools like Stetson University.

SUMMARY REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Upon the passage of the 18th amendment to the Federal Constitution, satisfied with statutory law, the dry forces of America seemingly fell asleep at their post of duty, and ceased to educate the younger generation of the dangers of alcohol. While so siesping the liquor forces have continually poisoned the minds of our youth, and today, to our mortification, we find the outlawed liquor industry dominating the policies of our government. If we would bequeth to our children a saloonless and liquorless nation we must again launch out upon an active and aggressive campaign of education, fight for the sanctity of our homes, and cease not to warn the people of the dangers lurking in the liquor traffic. May we go to the Polis in November 1934 in a solid phalanz and roll up an overwhelming majority to keep Florida in the Dry column.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON STEWARDSHIP.

Riewardship is the term usually applied to church finance, but in its fullest term includes a great deal more. Primarily it means the manner in which we use all of what God has entrusted to us. For the minister Stewardship is comforting the sorrowful cheering the sick, teaching the ignorant, helping the weak, and forever proclaiming the love, mercy and ready forgiveness of our Savior. For the ordinary saved soul Stewardship is the manner in which we serve our Lord, through the Church, with our time, money and talents. We believe our ministers should preach and teach lithing at all times, not as giving, but as paying a just debt. Surely we should all give, and teach giving, for ours in a gospel of giving and forgiving. Christ gave all for us, and freely forgives all who turn to him.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Florida Baptists gave to all missions last year \$167,897.13, or \$6,781.66 less than the previous year. Of the above amount \$86,761.77 was "designated" funds, including the two debt raising campaigns, and all this was sent on to the objects for which given without deducting a penny for handling. Our gifts to Missions continually decreases. There are other reasons for this than the financial depression. Dr. E. P. Alldredge gives the following as some of the reasons: 1st. We are 65 per cent unenlisted. 2nd. The 32 per cent who give spend millions for unnecessary things. 3rd. Too little of the spirit of self denial. 6th. The proportion of our gifts wrong. \$1.85 per

cent for local work and only 18.11 per cent for all missions. Your committee would urge that each church make an every member canvass before January next, enlist the unenlisted, and send generous and regular offerings to the Cooperative program.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON BIBLE SCHOOLS.

Of the 23 churches with 4.012 members in our Association we have 30 Sunday Schools with 4.492 pupils enrolled, or 480 more people enrolled in Sunday School than we have church members. To the three churches without Sunday Schools we would urge that they organize one at once, as every church needs a teaching service.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME.

We have 140 children in the home at present. They need to eat, sleep and wear clothes every day, just as other children. The receipts have not been sufficient to operate the home as it should be done, but

by careful economy no debt increase was made from July 1983 to July 1983. This was made possible by 189 churches or Sunday Schools sending us an offering each month. This is only 22.5 per cent of the number of churches in the State. We would recommend that each Sunday School in this Association send one Sunday's collection each month to the Home.

 Report on Foreign Missions read by C. L. Holton in the absence of F. P. Davis. Report adopted.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Our Foreign Mission Board, with headquarters in Richmond, Va., has for its fields of labor: Africa, Argentina, Brazil, Chile, China, Hungary, Roumania, Italy, Japan, Jugo-Slavlavia, Mexico, Palestine-Syria, and Spain. We have 398 Missionaries and 2830 native Missionaries, 15 theological schools, 9 hospitals and 5 publishing houses. There are 2698 churches, 1956 of which are now self supporting There were 17,284 haptisms last year, and a total membership of 192,078. The natives contributed to the work \$354,251.80. The receipts of the Board during the year was about \$800,000.00, and the debt was reduced by \$20,000.00. There were 591 more baptisms the past year than in any other single year of our work, despite the retrenchment in personnel and finance. There are more self supporting churches today than ever before. Foreign Missions are the frontiers of our Kingdom endeavors, and our activities in these far reaches furnish the gauge of our organic spiritual health. Here may he felt the pulse of our vital faith. Here may be observed the complexion of our inner life. May the early day some when we shall be able more worthly to live up to the name of real Missionary Zaptista. (Report signed by) FLOYD. P. SUMMARY OF REPORT ON B. Y. P. E.

Our B. Y. P. U. work throughout the South is quite encouraging. Our total number of Unions is 29,202, a gain for the year of 2,222. Our enrollment is 583,842, a gain of 36,894. In our Association of 25 churches we have only 8 general organizations with 62 Unions and 1,182 members. Several churches have no general organization or Union of any kind. We would urge such to organize at once and

keep it alive. The training of our young people is essential.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON BAPTIST COOPERATIVE

PROGRAM.

Our Cooperative Program is a plan of Southern Baptists for supporting every phase of Missionary, Educational and Benevolent work. The money received from the churches, to this cause, is divided equitably on a percentage basis, agreed upon by the different agencies of the Convention. This plan enables the individual to have a worthy part in the whole program of Jesus. This is the best plan yet found for God's people to bring God's money to God's house on God's day for God's work.

The Baptist Hundred Thousand Club is the plan adopted at the last session of the Southern Baptist Convention for paying all debta, by securing a hundred thousand persons to give \$1.00 per month over and above their regular contributions. This will release all funds received for the Cooperative Program for the current support of the different causes. The two plans are separate and independent, ohe seeking to pay debts only, and the other seeking to keep alive all work until the debts are paid. Both are essential and deserve the hearty support of every loyal Baptist.

An essential means of making the Cooperative Program effective is to put on a thorough Every Member Canvass, and we recommend that every Church in this Association do this before December 10th.

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A BRIEF HISTORICAL SKETCH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION UP TO 1854, AS GLEANED FROM SOME OLD MINUTES

The establishment of the oldest churches in this Association was as follows: Ebenezer, J., 1828; Indian Springs, 1829; Monticello, 1841; Aenon and Providence, 1843; Tallahassee, Nov. 19th, 1849; Mount Besor, (about) 1853; Concordia, 1858. Churches organized which functioned for a time, but are now extinct, were: Hickstown, Madison Court House, (date unknown); Elizabeth, 1834; Concord (Madison Co.), 1841 (transferred later to the Mercer Association, Georgia); Harmony, August, 1848; Mount Gilead, Sept. 29th, 1850; Pine Grove and Midway, 1856; and Aucilla in 1858. A church was organized at Quincy as early as 1849 and functioned until about 1864.

Some of the ministers of this period were: W. R. Cooper, H. Z. Ardis, Sam C. Craft, B. S. Fuller, John Broome, Wiley J. Blewett, G. W. Bostwick, R. Frier, E. C. Walker, J. B. Lacy, Z. G. Wheeler, W. H. Goldwire, R. J. Mays and O. E. McKeown. All of these men (and others) labored heroically, suffering hardships and deprivations unknown to us today. Probably the most outstanding minister of this period was W. B. Cooper, a sketch of whose life will suffice to illustrate the work of all.

Brother Cooper, a native of South Carolina, (1897-1877) was educated at home by cultured and pious parents and was taught languages by a private tutor. Later he attended Furman University for two years, followed by two years at Columbian College, Washington, D. C., from which he graduated. Because of poor health he came to Florida in 1838, his first work being with the Hickstown (Madison Court House) Church and vicinity. At that time the Seminole War was raging, but he courageously traveled alone on horseback through that part of Florida (then a Territory) which is now Hamilton, Madison, Jefferson and Leon Counties, and through Lowndes, Brooks, and Thomas Counties, Georgia. This territory was a wilderness, with no roads or bridges, and the settlements many miles apart. Frequently the Indian war-hoop could be heard, and burning houses seen at night, but alone he would ride, carrying in his saddlebags a change of clothes, Bibles and hymn books. Upon one occasion when going to Tallahassee, he was offered a military escort, which he refused, but made the trip safely. Following the Indian Wars, and no doubt as a result of the teaching and preaching of Brother Cooper-(and his co-laborers) the churches became agitated on the subject of Missions. Many persons, as they became more and more informed. accepted the Missionary idea. Many did not, and were very pronounced as to their position. Churches, and even families, were

givided on the subject, but an anti-missionary, or a group of them, was no match for the cultured, fluent, sympathetic Brother Cooper, who continued to travel, even swimming swollen streams to meet an appointment, or to teach and preach wherever he could get an audience of one or more. His work continued until his death.

As this Missionary idea grew, not only among the ministers, but also the laymen, it was thought well to form an "Association of Churches," having for its purpose the work of Missions, and thus, at Ebenezer Church, Jefferson County, on Oct. 16th, 1845, the "Florida Baptist Association" was organized with John Broome, moderator, and Sam C. Craft, clerk. This was, as far as our records show, the first "Association" organized in Florida.

Ressions of the Association were held annually. Early they adopted the plan of writing a "Circular Letter" directed to the churches, and another Letter to sister Associations, both of which were printed in the minutes. This, without doubt, was for the purpose of informing and inspiring the membership to higher standards of living and giving. The conception of this plan probably came from Paul's Letters to the churches of New Testament time.

In 1849 the membership was composed of \$65 whitee and 420 blacks. The amount of money sent up for "Domestic Missions" was \$455.50, and for "African Missions," \$248.73. Among the resolutions adopted at this session were: "That all members of this Association set apart the evening of the first Sabbath of each month for prayer to Almighty God to bless the efforts of His children engaged in Missions."—and "That we adopt the plan recommended by Brother Ball, agent of the Southern Board of Foreign Missions, viz: That each member contribute ten cents per year for Foreign Missions."

From reading the minutes of other sessions, one gets the idea that the Missionary spirit predominated, that the whole concourse of people was saturated with the thought, and had a holy passion, individually and collectively, to dispel ignorance, darkness, and sin by sending or carrying the light of the Gospel to every corner of the earth.

By 1852 the work had grown in a marvelous way. Two more Associations had been organized, viz. The Alachua and the West Florida. At this session, Nov. 22nd, 1852, at Olive Church, Thomas County, Georgia, the following resolution was adopted: "That it is the opinion of this body that it is proper, expedient and practicable to form an Association to be styled "The Florida Baptist State Convention." Committees were appointed to visit the Alachua and West Florida Associations to lay this matter before them, and, if they should concur, they were asked to elect delegates to the next ression of the

Florida Association. At that time the Florida Association would also elect delegates, and the three groups would form a joint delegation, authorized to organize the "Florida Baptist State Convention."

On Saturday, Nov. 18th, 1854, the Florida Association convened with the Concord Church, Madison County. As delegates from the Alachua Association, J. M. Hayman, Daniel Edwards, J. H. Breaker and William Connell, were present; and representing the West Fiorida organization, were Joshua Mercer, D. P. Everett, and G. N. Underwood. The Florida Association elected R. J. Mays, W. B. Cooper. B. S. Fuller, W. H. Goldwire, Wiley J. Blewett, D. G. Daniel, H. Z. Ardis, S. C. Craft, T. W. Terrell and John Cason. This Joint delegation convened in Brother R. J. Mays's parlor, Madison, Florida, on Monday night, eight o'clock, Nov. 26th, 1854, elected R. J. Mays to the chair, D. G. Daniel, secretary, and drew up and adopted the first constitution of the Florida Baptist State Convention. R. J. Mays was named President; D. G. Daniel, Secretary; S. C. Craft, Assistant Secretary; and John Cason, Treasurer. An executive committee was appointed as follows: H. Z. Ardis, S. C. Craft, W B. Cooper, B. S. Fuller, W. H. Goldwire, and Wiley J. Blewett. The executive committee was instructed to apply to the legislature of Florida for an act of incorporation. H. Z. Ardis was appointed to preach the introductory sermon at the next session, W. B. Cooper, alternate, D. G. Daniel to preach the missionary sermon, Wiley J. Blewett, alternate. The session adjourned with prayer, to meet at Union Academy, Jackson County, on Friday before the first Sabbath in December, 1855.
