Constitution

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

Article 3. The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them with our Minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until the close of the next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the Minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The Minutes of the Association shall be publicly read

(and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority vote. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the causes of any falling to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST
ASSOCIATION

1. At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.

2. The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association when requested by any two members.

3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say 'aye,'" and after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say 'no.'" If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.

4. The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.

5. In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the association be equally divided, or unless his vote given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the question shall be lost.

6. When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.

7. If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.

8. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.

9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association nor more than once until everyone choosing to speak shall have done so.

10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourses that may be entertained between the members and require strict attention on the part of the members.

11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.

12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.

13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.

14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained unless to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.

15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.

16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.

17. Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.

18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.

20. The association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.

21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approbated by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST
ASSOCIATION

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptised believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgement.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.

PROCEEDINGS

FIRST DAY

Thursday, October 17th, 1935, 10:00 A. M.

1. The Florida Baptist Association, in its 93rd annual session, met with the Providence Baptist Church, R. F. D. 3, Quincy, Florida, at ten o'clock A. M. on Thursday, October 17th, 1935.

2. The meeting was called to order by Moderator, W. M. Vines, and devotions conducted by Rev. G. T. Hunt, pastor of the Providence Church.

3. A Roll call of churches was made by Clerk, D. A. Avant, and it was announced that all churches of the Association were represented by Letter or Messengers, or both, except Saint Marks and Sumatra. A motion prevailed that the messengers present, and those who should come later, compose the Association.

4. A resolution unanimously approved at the last regular session of the Association, proposing a change in the Constitution, was read by W. M. Vines, to wit: "Whereas the Constitution of this Association provides that the officers be elected at the beginning of each session, and we believe it to be more practical to elect officers at the close of each session, to serve through the next regular session, now, therefore, we, the Association in regular session assembled, RESOLVE, that Article five of the Constitution relating to the tenure of office of the officers be changed, and the words: "The close of

the" be inserted in said article five just following the word 'until' first appearing in said article." This resolution, on motion, was unanimously approved.

5. An application from the newly constituted Immanuel Baptist Church of Tallahassee, Dr. Waldo E. Wood pastor, to unite with this Association, was read by Clerk, and a motion prevailed that we accept this church without a formal examination, because its faith and practices are well and favorably known to this body.

6. A request from the First Baptist Church of Apalachicola for a letter of Dismissal from this Association to unite with the North West Gulf Association was read by Clerk, and motion prevailed that this letter be granted.

7. A suggested program was read by Moderator, and a motion prevailed that this program be adopted with such changes as may later become necessary.

8. A motion prevailed that officers for the ensuing year, to take office at the close of this session and to serve through the next session, be elected just after the noon hour of the first day.

9. Miss Katherine Rawls, Baptist student secretary, Florida State College for Women, read report on Christian Education, which was discussed by E. D. Solomon and Mr. Doyle and adopted.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There are today approximately 1,000,000 students in American colleges. This element of American life has been referred to as the "Strategic Million." Of these approximately 100,000 are Southern Baptist students. This group may well be thought of as the "Strategic One Hundred Thousand." From them will come our leaders in the years just ahead. The most pressing need in the Church, Home, School and Social World is the "Christian Attitude." Unless such an attitude is developed in our basic institutions our whole social and economic order must fall. Southern Baptists have their largest single investment, aside from local church properties, in schools. This implies a proportionately large obligation. Yet, some of our colleges are left to live or die, many churches refusing to assume any responsibility for their existence. It is important that we patronize our Denominational schools. Our own Stetson has a curriculum equal to

the best.

10. Rev. O. N. Revell read report on Children's Home, which was discussed by Superintendent T. M. Johns and adopted.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

The average number in the Home during the past year was 142. Five are in College and one in a Hospital for Training. Those in college are supported by individuals or organizations. The Home is unable to assist further than high school. Four are at Stetson. Our receipts for first six months this year are about \$2,337.66 compared with same period last year. We have many applicants for places in the home to which we have to turn a deaf ear, because we have not the bread with which to feed them. The support of the Home should be more general. Every church in the state should contribute some amount to this institution each month.

11. Rev. Charles L. Wattenbarger delivered the annual sermon, the subject of which was "Standard of Excellence for a Church." His text was found in the 16th chapter of Matthew, 16th and 17th verses.

12. Dr. L. R. Christie led in prayer and the Moderator announced adjournment until 1:45 P. M.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

13. The Association reconvened at 1:45 P. M. on Thursday, October 17th, the Moderator in the chair and Rev. J. K. Hutchings conducting the devotional.

14. New Pastors in the Association were recognized, as follows: D. M. Smith, Concord, L. E. Goodgame, Sopchoppy, R. M. Hall, Crawfordville, D. P. Lee, Havana, and L. R. Christie, Tallahassee. Rev. W. D. Keis of Tallahassee was recognized as a visitor.

15. Nominations for the election of officers for the ensuing year resulted in the election of Alphonse Pichard as Moderator, D. A. Avant as Clerk, J. E. Shelfer as Treasurer and W. M. Vines as member of the State Board of Missions.

16. A stirring and inspirational address was delivered by Dr. J. D. Adcock of Orlando, President of the Florida Baptist Convention.

17. Mrs. M. A. Love read report on W. M. U., which she and E. D. Solomon discussed, and the report was adopted.

SUMMARY OF REPORT ON W. M. U.

There are 1502 W. M. U. organizations in Florida, with 22,448 members enrolled. Mission study course awards were granted to 8,758 members during the past year. These organizations contributed last year \$53,028.50 to missions and more than \$30,000.00 to local church work. Two of our distinct projects are the Training School at Louisville for young women, and the Margaret Fund, used to educate in the United States children of Foreign Missionaries. More than ever are our Women appreciating the privilege of living their Watchword, "Laborers together with God."

18. Dr. Waldo E. Wood read report on Periodicals, which he discussed, and which was also ably discussed by Dr. E. D. Solomon, editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, and adopted.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS

Of 33 churches in the Florida Baptist Association there are 5703 members, approximately 1425 families. In these homes there are only 93 copies of the Baptist Witness, less than three copies to the church. The Baptist Witness has a plan by which any part time church may have 12 copies for \$12.00, paid for periodically in advance, and a full time church may have the same rate for its official group.

We recommend the adoption of the minimum budget plan in each church in the Association, which plan would result in not less than about 495 subscriptions. We believe we should not do less. Nor should the Home and Foreign Fields, the Mission Journal of Southern Baptists, have less circulation. The combination subscription plan can be carried out quarterly in a practical way. Other periodicals are many and well deserving of wide use.

19. The moderator appointed the following committees, to report at tomorrow's session: Time, Place, and Preacher, O. E. McKeown, Mrs. J. E. Robinson, and Al-

phonse Pichard. Resolutions: L. E. Goodgame, W. E. Wood and D. P. Lee.

20. A motion prevailed that the Executive Committee encourage the sending of produce from this Association to the Children's Home, and appoint a committee to secure and send these provisions about the first of December.

21. Rev. G. T. Hunt, pastor of the hostess Church called attention to the homes and hospitality offered for the night and invited all delegates and visitors to avail themselves of these privileges. The meeting adjourned until ten o'clock next day, with prayer by Dr. L. R. Christie.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

22. The Association reconvened at 10:00 A. M. Friday, October 18th with the Moderator presiding, and G. T. Hunt leading the devotional.

23. The Clerk read minutes of the preceding day, which were approved.

24. Mrs. J. E. Robinson read report on Cooperative Program, which was spoken to by C. L. Wattenbarger and adopted.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is a simple plan by which each church member may support all the mission and benevolent work of the Denomination. Each dollar contributed is divided in an equitable and predetermined way, and a portion of it goes to each cause fostered by the Denomination. It is earnestly desired that all of our churches contribute some amount each month to this program.

25. Mr. O. E. McKeown read report on Sunday Schools, which was spoken to by W. C. Sale, E. Newberry, W. E. Wood and adopted.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday Schools of the south have had an annual increase in enrollment of \$9,880 for the past fifteen years, making a total enrollment of 3,104,411 in 1934. During this period the number of Sunday Schools have increased from 17,648 to 32,072. The number of baptisms

into the churches was 1,068,207, and we feel that a large percentage of these came from the Sunday Schools. In our Association one year ago we reported 4,258 as enrolled in Sunday Schools, and this year our Church Letters indicate an enrollment of 4,212, an apparent loss of 146.

26. Mr. Alphonse Pichard read report on Social Service, which was spoken to by Dr. C. M. Brittain and W. M. Vines. A motion prevailed that it be adopted and the Clerk was requested to ask for its publication in the Florida Baptist Witness.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

The term "Social Service" today has a wide variety of meanings. In the opinion of business men Social Service by the Government means the pauperizing of our citizens, and Government competition with private business. With our Clubs it means Boy and Girl Scout activities, recreation, and work among under-privileged children. In our Churches it is anything from benefit card parties to our activities against sin and crime. What we need most of all is the pioneer spirit of our forefathers, who, with an unshakable faith in God, built an empire out of a war-ruined South; a respect for law and constituted authority, and a reverence and obedience to the laws of God handed down from Mount Sinai. These commandments, not to kill, not to steal, not to commit adultery, but to keep the Sabbath Day holy and to love and honor God seems to have relegated to the past. Instead we are a people of greed, selfishness, wealth and wealth-getting, pleasure and pleasure-getting, living in sinful lusts. America today is a nation of murderers, gangsters, crime and accidents. Our own city of Jacksonville holds the world record for homicides. Our accidental death rate appalls the world. Accidents can hardly be termed as such any more. They are the result of indifference, selfishness, drunkenness and utter disregard for the interest of others. We seem to be no longer our brother's keeper. Thousands of our people spend the Sabbath Day at business, recreation parks, bathing beaches, ball games, etc. It is said we are growing better. Perhaps! Lynchings have decreased, but all the lynchings of history do not approach the wholesale murder of the helpless Ethiopians today, while the rest of the world looks on, ready to fly at each others throat in deadly combat. Lloyd George has well said: "It is Christ or Chaos." The liquor interests promised to "be good" after their long and forced vacation, but as a sow returns to her wallow and the dog to his vomit so have the liquor interests returned to their old tricks of evading, violating and

prostituting our laws, bribing, electing thugs and low politicians to positions of trust, and enticing even our young women, as well as men, into the way that leads to destruction. Instead of the burly bartender of old, we today have the gaudily painted bar maid to lure and tempt the unwise. We can trust no promise made by the liquor interests. Even our President promised to protect dry territory. My own home County voted dry, but today there are 46 liquor dealers operating under Federal license. Within a few months after repeal Keely Institute patients increased 55 percent. Arrests for drunkenness have increased everywhere, my own home town showing an increase of 128 percent; my County, an increase of 109 percent, since 1932. In Boston, Mass., drunkenness among women increased 75 percent in three months. Since repeal deaths from automobile accidents have increased 77 percent in the United States.

Christ did not offer us a picnic when he said: "Take up your cross and follow me." He was offering real work. Will we cringe or weaken? NO! We re-affirm our faith in God; in the benefits of temperance and prohibition, and we will continue our fight for temperance, sobriety, truth, honesty and virtue, and call upon our ministers and church workers to take the lead in the fight against all forms of sin and unrighteousness.

27. Three mission reports were read as follows: State Missions, J. M. Rowan; Home Missions, G. T. Hunt, and Foreign Missions, D. P. Lee. These reports were all spoken to, as one, in a masterful and powerful address on Missions by Dr. C. M. Brittain, Executive Secretary of our State Mission Board, and adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

The pastors of our churches in Florida have cooperated with the State Mission Board in a beautiful and heartening way through the year. Their hearts have been with us in the work, and our souls have been knit together in one Christly brotherhood, which has kept our churches going forward like a victorious army. No serious discord has hindered our onward march. No schism has torn asunder our solid rank. Our Baptist Zion in Florida is standing more solidly together than ever before. It is heartening to note how much our people have given to missions and benevolences during the past eleven years. To Foreign Missions, \$479,998.66; To Home Missions, \$201,616.24, to State Missions \$646,237.51, to Children's Home, \$398,000.66, to Christian Education, \$235,129.91, to relief of aged ministers, \$48,458.14, and to other

benevolences, \$155,688.16, making a grand total of \$2,168,129.38. During the same period we have baptized into the fellowship of our churches 71,213 members, giving us a membership today of 122,800 as compared with 51,168 eleven years ago. Let us be even more faithful to declare the whole truth of God during the next decade than we have in the past. We recommend that our churches continue to support the Co-operative Program, which is the best known method of financing all our mission causes.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

The work of the Home Mission Board during the past year has been signally blessed of the Lord. Revival fires have burned high. We have 228 missionaries with 18 additional workers in Sanatorium, Schools and Good Will centers. It maintains 598 mission stations and preaching places, operates in whole or in part five good will centers, two rescue missions and a Seaman's Institute. The missionaries reported last year 3,740 conversions and baptisms, made 39,515 personal contacts with unsaved people, visited 22,000 homes and distributed 443,225 tracts, bibles and pieces of literature. Our receipts in 1934 were \$320,030.95, which was an increase over 1933 of \$81,330.42. The old frontiers of Home Missions are changing, but the need for evangelization of the home land remains the same. Many influences are at work to undermine our civilization. The salvation of our country depends on the enthronement of Christ in the life of our people. Christ did not overlook his Home land. Let us not overlook ours.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Contributions to the Foreign Mission Board in 1934 amounted to \$789,634.39. To this may be added \$117,840.90 received from other sources, making total receipts \$907,475.29. A goodly portion of this added income is due to the Lottie Moon offering and the One Hundred Thousand Club.

The Board adhered strictly to the program of retrenchment and economy, thus keeping within the budget agreed upon, so with this increased income greatly reduced the burdensome debt of the Board.

There has been created the office of Assistant to the Executive Secretary, and Miss Jessie R. Ford was elected to fill this office. During the absence of the Executive Secretary in the Orient, Miss Ford, with the direction and help of the Board's President, carried the work on in a satisfactory manner.

Reports from abroad are encouraging. There were added to the

membership of the churches in foreign lands a net gain of 21,722. This is the largest gain in any one year in the history of the Board's activities. The 204,894 Baptists in those lands gave \$376,075.86 to the Master's cause last year.

28. The report on B. T. U. was read by Miss Margaret Moore, in the absence of Dr. L. R. Christie, the writer, discussed by L. E. Goodgame, and adopted.

REPORT ON B. T. U.

The Baptist Training Union which is the worthy successor of the Baptist Young People's Union, is gradually coming into its own in the services of our churches and of the Kingdom. It is doubtful if we have ever realized larger returns from any kind of Christian service for the amount of service expended than we have realized from the time-honored Baptist Young Peoples Union. Perhaps some of these days our churches will realize the almost boundless possibilities of this part of our program, and will begin giving to it the attention and the emphasis which it deserves. While we are still a long way from the goal of real excellence, the reports this year indicate a wide spread of abiding interest in this program. The reports from the churches indicate there are 987 of our people enrolled in 59 Unions in 18 churches, that there are 294 Daily Bible Readers; 252 taking special study courses, and 424 are systematic supporters of the program of the local church and Kingdom. There were 6 unions in the Association Standard during the year. It is an interesting fact that 3 of these 6 Standard Unions are in this local church where our sessions are being held. This establishes the fact that the Training Unions can be just as effective in the country churches as in the city. There are four general organizations reported, 1 in First Church Tallahassee, 1 in Salem, 1 in River Junction, and 1 in Immanuel at Tallahassee. Ten churches reported no Baptist Training Union at all.

29. The report of the Executive Committee was read by D. A. Avant and adopted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Executive Committee is composed of each pastor in the Association, and one lay member from each church, such lay member to be elected by the church each year. Your committee had only one meeting last year, which was held in Quincy on January 7th 1935.

The following appropriations were recommended for the year 1935: To Aeon Church, \$36.00; to Little Sycamore, \$72.00; to Pansosa Springs, \$120.00. The Clerk was requested to send one or more copies of the Minutes to each church, whether such church had made a contribution to the Minutes fund or not. We understand that a number of churches are without pastors. Your committee stands ready to assist such churches in any possible way.

30. A motion prevailed that the Moderator of the Association be a member of the Executive Committee.

31. Report of the Treasurer and Finance Committee was read by J. E. Shelfer, Treasurer, and Chairman of Finance Committee, and adopted.

35. The Clerk explained to the Association that he had a file of old minutes in his possession, containing a copy of the Minutes for almost every session since the Association was organized, and made motion that these minutes be sent to Dr. C. M. Brittain, State Mission Secretary, for safe keeping. Motion carried.

36. On motion the new Moderator and Clerk were instructed to appoint Standing Committees for the ensuing year, and notify such appointees by mail.

37. Rev. W. C. Sale of Jacksonville delivered an informative and inspirational address, dealing with the relation of the white and black races in the South, from a religious standpoint.

38. L. E. Goodgame read report for the committee on Resolutions, which was adopted:

Resolved that the Florida Baptist Association, assembled at Providence Baptist Church, extend its sincere thanks and appreciation to the Providence Church and community for the brotherly and helpful hospitality extended to the Association.

39. Dr. W. M. Vines called to the chair the newly elected Moderator, Alphonse Pichard, and introduced him as such. Following a few appropriate remarks by Brother Pichard, Dr. Vines led in prayer and announced adjournment until 10 A. M. Thursday, October 15th, 1936 at Crawfordville, Florida.
