Constitution

Article 1. This Association shall be known by the name of The Florida Baptist Association. The object of this Association shall be to conduct the work of missions, colportage, Sabbath school enterprises and other work that will tend to the spread of the Gospel.

Article 2. This Association shall be composed of white members chosen by the respective churches in its union in the proportion of two members for each church of fifty or less, and one additional delegate for every twenty-five members over fifty.

Article 3. The letters sent by the church at each session of the Association shall express their respective members in full fellowship, those baptised, received by letter, restored, dismissed, excommunicated and dead since last session.

Article 4. Believing it to be proper on account of the diversity of opinion among men as to the import of Scripture contained in the Old and New Testaments to declare our belief and understanding thereof we therefore append our belief in twelve Articles and present them with our Minutes to the Baptist denomination.

Article 5. The Association when convened shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. A moderator and Clerk shall be chosen by the votes of the members present who shall hold their offices until the close of the next session of the body and until their successors are elected. The moderator shall preside at the meeting of the Association and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article 6. The Association thus organized shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article 7. Newly constituted churches may be admitted to this union on application by letter and delegates; and if, upon examination, found to be orthodox, shall be received by the Association and the right hand of fellowship extended to the delegates by the Moderator.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the Minutes of their proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article 9. The Minutes of the Association shall be publicly read (and corrected, if necessary), and then signed by the Moderator and Clerk before adjournment.

Article 10. Any amendment or ratification of this Constitution may be made by the votes of two-thirds of the members present at any two regular successive meetings of the Association. All other matters of fellowship shall be decided by a majority vote. In matters of fellowship the Association must be a unit.

Article 11. The Association shall have power first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to give the churches advice in matters of difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any failing to be represented at the meetings of the Association; fourth, to withdraw all connection from any church or churches in this union who shall violate the rules of this Association, or shall deviate from the orthodox principles of the revealed Word of God; fifth, to appropriate the money contributed and sent up to the Association as specified by said churches, and when not specified it shall be apportioned to promote the best interests of the Master's cause; sixth, to adjourn to any future time and place they may deem most convenient to the churches in the union.

RULES OF DECORUM OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

1. At every meeting of the Association the Moderator shall call the members to order and cause the Clerk to read the minutes of the previous Association.

2. The Moderator shall preserve order, and shall speak on any point of order with reference to the other members, and shall decide questions of order, subject to an appeal to the Association when requested by any two members.

3. The Moderator shall put all questions distinctly in this form: "As many as are in favor (as the question may be) say 'aye,'" and after the affirmative vote is taken, "As many as are of a contrary opinion say 'no.'" If doubtful which voice is in the majority, it shall be decided by rising and counting.

4. The Moderator shall appoint the committees, except in cases of appointment by ballot.

5. In all cases of ballot the Moderator may vote. In all other cases he shall not vote unless the association be equally divided, or unless his vote given to the minority will make the division equal. In that case the question shall be lost.

6. When any member is about to speak in debate he shall rise and address the Moderator.

7. If any member, while speaking or otherwise employed, transgress the rules of decorum, the Moderator shall, or any member may, call him to order.

8. When two or more members shall rise at the same time, the Moderator shall decide who is first entitled to the floor.

9. No member shall indulge in unkind remarks in debate, nor shall any member speak more than twice on the same question without leave from the Association nor more than once until everyone choosing to speak shall have done so.

10. While any member is addressing the Association, it shall be the duty of the Moderator to suppress all private discourses that may be entertained between the members and require strict attention on the part of the members.

11. When a motion is made and seconded it shall be stated by the Moderator before debate.

12. Every motion shall be reduced to writing if desired by any member of the Association.

13. After a motion is made and seconded it shall be deemed in possession of the Association, but may be withdrawn at any time before being discussed or amended.

14. When a question is under debate no motion shall be entertained un-

less to amend it or refer it to a committee, or for the previous question, or for adjournment.

15. A motion for adjournment shall always be in order, and decided without debate.

16. Any member may call for a division of a question when two or more distinct propositions are set forth, and when the substance will admit of division.

17. Motions and amendments may be referred to a committee at the pleasure of the Association.

18. Every resolution shall receive two statements or readings in the Association previous to its passage. The first shall be for information, and the second when the decision of the Association is to be made.

19. These rules may be changed or amended at any full meeting of the Association.

20. The association shall be opened and closed with prayer each day by the Moderator or some other member.

21. All queries shall be fairly stated in writing and approved by two-thirds of the members present before they shall be acted on.

ARTICLES OF FAITH OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead—the Father, the Son, and the Holy Ghost.

Article 2. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article 3. We believe in the doctrine of particular and eternal election.

Article 4. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article 5. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article 6. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ.

Article 7. We believe that God's elect shall be called, regenerated and sanctified by the Holy Ghost.

Article 8. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and never finally fall away.

Article 9. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article 10. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead and a general judgment.

Article 11. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous will be eternal.

Article 12. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of the Presbytery.

PROCEEDINGS
of the
NINETY-FOURTH ANNUAL SESSION
of the
FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
Held with the
Crawfordville Baptist Church
at
Crawfordville, Wakulla County, Florida

FIRST DAY

Thursday, October 15th, 1936, 10:00 o'clock A. M.

1. The Florida Baptist Association, in its 94th annual session, met with the Crawfordville Baptist Church, Crawfordville, Florida, at 10 o'clock A. M. on Thursday, October 15th, 1936. The Church auditorium being of inadequate size the meetings were held in the school building, through the courtesy of the school officials.
2. The meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Alphonse Pichard, and devotions were conducted by Dr. J. Dean Adcock of Orlando.
3. A roll call of Churches was made by the Clerk, D. A. Avant, and it was announced that all Churches of the Association were represented by Letter or Messengers, or both, except Saint Marks. A motion prevailed that the Messengers present, and those who should arrive later, compose the Association.
4. New Pastors were recognized, viz: O. H. Crawford of Carrabelle, R. B. Mayfield of Monticello and Walter A. Rector of Greensboro.
5. A suggested program was read by the Moderator, and a motion prevailed that this program be adopted

with such changes as may later become necessary.

6. Miss Billie Ruth Currin, Baptist Student Secretary, Florida State College for Women, read report on Christian Education, which was discussed by W. M. Vines and D. P. Lee and adopted.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There are enrolled approximately 2000 Baptist students in the colleges of our State. Our own John B. Stetson University has a total enrollment of 197, of whom 150 are Baptists. Approximately 800 Baptist students are enrolled at the University of Florida, Gainesville, and 400 at the Florida State College for Women, Tallahassee. Due to the fact that many Baptist students attend State Schools it has become necessary that provision be made for them. A State Student Secretary is employed to promote this work, with headquarters at Gainesville, where a Baptist student building has been provided. Also a Student Secretary is employed at Tallahassee, but no building has been provided. Our girls at Tallahassee are desperately in need of such a building. It is imperative that our Denomination catch a vision of the real need of Christian understanding among the leaders of the world today and spend more time and money establishing Christian ideals among students.

7. A motion prevailed that our Moderator present the need of a Baptist Student Building at Tallahassee to the State Convention at its next regular session.

8. E. B. Evans, Pastor of First Church, Arcadia, delivered an encouraging message concerning our Children's Home, and its management, located there.

9. The Moderator appointed Messrs. John Scruggs and Willie Smith to serve as members of the Finance Committee with Mr. J. E. Shelfer, Treasurer.

10. The Annual Sermon was preached by D. P. Lee, Pastor at Havana, using as his subject: "Victory through the Blood of the Lamb," his text: Rev. 12:11, "And they overcame him by the blood of the Lamb, and by the word of their testimony; and they loved not their lives until the death."

11. The Moderator announced adjournment for dinner, to re-convene at 1:45 P. M.

FIRST DAY—AFTERNOON SESSION

12. The Association re-convened at 1:45 P. M. on Thursday, October 15th, the Moderator in the chair and L. R. Christie conducting the devotional.

13. J. M. Rowan read report on Baptist Brotherhood, which was discussed by Mr. Hugh Lattimer and adopted.

REPORT ON BAPTIST BROTHERHOOD

The purpose of the Brotherhood is to serve the Churches by enlisting and developing the men in practical, spiritual service. A primary service is the winning of the unsaved to Christ. A brotherhood should be organized in every church. A worthy objective would be, in cooperation with the Pastor, to get the Church to adopt a worth-while Program, assist in the Every member canvass, putting on the "Prove Me Plan," offering their services as teachers in the Sunday School, Directors of B. T. U., and organizing Mission Sunday Schools. Mr. Hugh Lattimer is employed by our State Mission Board as Brotherhood Secretary, and he will gladly assist any of our Churches in organizing a Brotherhood if they will call him.

14. Mr. C. L. Wattenbarger read report on B. T. U. which was spoken to by R. B. Mayfield and adopted.

REPORT ON B. T. U.

A Baptist Training Union is a factory which takes raw material and multiplies its value many fold, returning it to the Church in life-giving streams of intelligent faith, trained power and sacrificial giving. It deepens the spiritual life, cultivates Christian fellowship, trains in Christian Stewardship, instructs in Baptist Doctrine and history, creates a desire for Bible reading and enlists in Missionary endeavors. The B. T. U. organization provides a place for every Church member, and unquestionably every Church in our Association should have such an organization. Dr. W. W. Willian, our State Sunday School and B. T. U. Secretary, is asking that we increase our organizations from 1479, the present number, to 1998, and increase the membership from 25,000 to 35,000 by 1941. A worthy goal this! If you need help call Dr. Willian.

15. W. M. Vines read the report on Cooperative Program, which was ably discussed by Dr. C. M. Brittain, State Mission Secretary, and adopted.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program is a plan by which each Church member may support all the causes fostered by our Denomination, including State, Home

and Foreign Missions, Orphanages, Hospitals, Ministerial Relief and Christian Education. Each dollar contributed is equitably divided and a portion of that dollar goes to every cause we foster. It makes the Every Member Canvass, in the local Church, easy, requiring the taking of only one canvass for Denominational and Local work. It provides a regular source of income for our various causes, and gives them their just portion of the funds. It enables the local Church to achieve the high aim of "Every member giving every week to every cause, in proportion to his ability, through his Church." If your church has not taken an Every Member Canvass, or does not contribute to the Cooperative Program may we suggest, and urge, that you write at once to Dr. C. M. Brittain, Jacksonville, asking for further information.

16. Report on Foreign Missions was called for but no member of the Committee was present and no report read. However, this subject was discussed in a masterful address by Dr. J. Dean Adcock, President of the State Convention.

17. The following Committees were appointed by the Moderator: On Time, Place and Preacher, W. E. Wood, L. J. Clark and Mrs. J. M. Rowan. On Resolutions, John Scruggs, Mrs. R. C. Poythress and Miss Margaret Moore.

18. Rev. O. N. Revell, Pastor of the hostess Church, called attention to the homes and hospitality offered for the night and invited all messengers and visitors to avail themselves of these privileges. The meeting adjourned until 10:00 o'clock next day, with prayer by Rev. W. A. Rector.

SECOND DAY—MORNING SESSION

19. The Association re-convened at 10:00 o'clock A. M. Friday, October 16th, with the Moderator presiding and Rev. R. B. Mayfield leading the devotional.

20. The report on Sunday Schools was read by G. C. Tarpe and adopted.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

In Florida we have 22 District Associations, 827 Churches with 122,544 members. We have 711 Sunday Schools with an enrollment of 102,161, or a

Sunday School enrollment of 77 percent of the Church membership. In our Association we have 33 churches with membership of 5,802, 29 Sunday Schools with enrollment of 4,385, or 75 percent of the Church membership. The unchurched white population of Florida is 455,435. The white population within our Association is 36,090, with only 7,990 enrolled in Sunday Schools of all Denominations, leaving 28,090 white people in our Association not enrolled in Sunday School. The above figures are a challenge to all Baptists in the State, and should impress us that the field truly is white unto harvest. It is to be hoped that by another year we will have a Sunday School in every Church, and that our Sunday School enrollment may at least equal our Church membership.

21. A motion prevailed that our District Association sponsor two Sunday School Associations within our bounds, one on the west side of the Ocklocknee River, known as the Gadsden County S. S. Association, and one on the east side, known as the Florida S. S. Association.

22. Upon being duly nominated the following named persons were elected officers of the Gadsden County Sunday School Association: G. T. Hunt, Superintendent, D. A. Avant, Associate Superintendent, and E. M. Dyal, Secretary-Treasurer.

23. Upon being duly nominated the following named persons were elected as officers for the Florida Sunday School Association: W. E. Wood, Superintendent, and F. A. Rhodes, Associate Superintendent. Secretary-Treasurer to be named later.

24. Report on Home Missions was read by W. E. Wood and adopted.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions is simply missions in our home land. Our Home Board, with headquarters in Atlanta, is doing a miraculous work in giving the Gospel Message to the millions who have it not, within our own land. We have 200,000 Indians in New Mexico and Oklahoma, 800,000 Mexicans this side of the Border, 225,000 Spanish speaking people in New Mexico, 600,000 French speaking people in Louisiana, ten million negroes in the South, to say nothing of the millions of foreigners who are spiritually marooned on our shores. To carry the Gospel to all these millions the Home Board is able to employ only 283 missionaries. Such a number divided among the Mexicans alone would give each Missionary 3000 unsaved people to minister to. Comparing this with the fact that we have only about 200 unsaved in our Association to each Preacher we can readily see how very little actual Mission work in the South we are doing, and how very greatly it is needed. The Home Board is seeking the means whereby they may evangelize these millions. They are living within their income and at the same time paying their debts,

but for want of sufficient funds they are compelled to leave undone much needed work. May God speed the day when our people will support all Missions in a manner pleasing unto Him who gave himself for us.

25. Motion prevailed that R. B. Mayfield serve as Superintendent of B. T. U. Work in the Florida Association.

26. Report on Social Service was read by O. N. Revell, spoken to by W. M. Vines and L. R. Christie and adopted.

REPORT ON SOCIAL SERVICE

When we view our Nation as a whole, and especially our own South land, and compare our "today" with our "yesterday" we are shocked. "Yesterday" our people toiled and earned their bread honestly, they accommodated their neighbors gladly, their word was their "bond," they spent their leisure time in the family circle, building homes and character. They honored the Sabbath Day, and attended Church services with regularity. They built homes, Churches and Schools, and were willing to "Take Time To Be Holy." Today we appear to be in reverse. We are a people of greed, speed and selfishness, living beyond our means, ignoring our obligations, living in sinful lust, and endeavoring to get money without toil. We deplore the return of legalized liquor which is now debauching our womanhood as well as our manhood. In addition, we now have legalized gambling, such as horse racing, dog racing, slot machines, etc. We are face to face with a situation that is appalling. Only the religion of Christ will save our "today." May our people speedily return to Him who gave his life for us, that we may have the abundant Life.

27. The report on Children's Home was read by G. T. Hunt, spoken to by L. R. Christie, Alphonse Pichard and adopted.

REPORT ON CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Home at Arcadia has made considerable progress during the past year. Much painting has been done, two buildings re-roofed and much of the physical equipment has been renewed. The Dairy continues to play an important part, and shows profit from year to year. The cost of producing vegetables is about one-half the wholesale cost on the market, and the cost of milk about one-third. The children attend the city schools of Arcadia, and the grades of our boys and girls rank slightly higher than the average of the whole student body. They attend First Baptist Church for Sunday School, Preaching service and Prayer meeting, and many of them help as teachers and leaders. Our finances have been satisfactory. All current bills are paid when due, in spite of the fact that several hundred dollars were paid for building and improvement. This was made possible by the monthly offerings of about one-fourth of our Sunday Schools, which joined by others

with an occasional offering, made 27.1 percent of our schools contributing. If more of our schools would contribute one Sunday's offering each month the Home would be able to admit many worthy full orphan children, whose applications are now pending.

28. Report on Fifth Sunday Meetings was read by W. G. Durrance and adopted.

REPORT ON FIFTH SUNDAY MEETINGS

The Fifth Sunday Meetings met four times during the year, with the following churches: Ebenezer (L), Lake Ellen, Mount Elon and Aeon. Contributions sent by Churches \$44.45, offerings at the meetings \$27.92—Total receipts \$72.37. Contributions: To Cooperative Program \$33.37, Children's Home \$2.50, a widow lady \$8.50, local expenses \$28.00—Total \$72.37. For the ensuing year W. G. Durrance was elected Moderator and H. S. Davis Clerk.

29. L. E. Goodgame read report on Ministerial Relief and Annuities, which was adopted.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

The Relief and Annuity Board, located at Dallas, Texas, continually faces the task of providing food, clothing and shelter for thousands of Ministers who have grown old in the service of Christ. More than three-million dollars have been paid out to date. More could be done if more churches would cooperate. It is suggested that a "Fellowship Offering" be taken for this purpose in connection with the observance of the Lord's Supper, the offering to be sent through our Mission Board at Jacksonville, marked "Special Fellowship Offering for Ministerial Relief."

30. Report on W. M. U. was read by Mrs. J. M. Rowan, spoken to by W. M. Vines and adopted.

REPORT ON W. M. U.

"As my Father hath sent me even so send I you" is the Watchword for the W. M. U. for this year. This links up with our general Watchword, "Laborers together with God," and our hymn, "Lead on O King Eternal." The chief aim of our union is Prayer, Bible Study, Mission Study, Stewardship and Missionary Education of our young people. We have in the State 1574 organizations, 163 new organizations were reported last year. Mission receipts were \$53,357.74. We have in the Florida Association 26 active Young People's organizations with a membership of 445; 14 W. M. S. with 725 members. Their gifts for missions, Local, Hundred Thousand Club and Charity amount to \$4,924.24. Miss Alice Smith, Intermediates G. A. of Quincy won the State Stewardship contest, while Quincy Sunbeams won the West Florida Assembly Pennant. The Immanuel and First Baptist W. M. U's. of Tallahassee are Standard, and the Immanuel of Tallahassee won the West Florida Assembly Pennant. The annual W. M. U. Association meeting held October 13th in Tallahassee First Church was helpful and inspirational, with 175 members present. Dr. J. F. Plainfield, our Italian Missionary, was

the Inspirational Speaker. Our women seem encouraged and are doing a great work.

May we, with burning zeal and love for God's kingdom,
Never let the folds of the Banner of the Cross be lowered,
So the world may know the victorious Christ and King.
With David of Old let us say: "Thine O Lord is the Victory. Lead on O King Eternal."

31. R. B. Mayfield read the report on the Hundred Thousand Club, which was adopted.

REPORT ON THE HUNDRED THOUSAND CLUB

The Hundred Thousand Club was launched three years ago in an effort to pay all debts of all agencies of the Denomination. The plan is to secure 100,000 people who will contribute \$1.00 per month each for five years, over and above other gifts. Dr. Frank Trip of St. Joseph, Mo., has led the Movement for three years without pay from the Denomination, and the Sunday School Board has furnished free all literature, and the Denomination has gone on the principal of the debts. Recently Dr. James E. Dillard has been elected as Director of Promotion and will have general charge of the Hundred Thousand Club. The same plan of organization will be used as in the past. During the months of January and February, 1937, special attention will be given this Movement with a view of bringing the Club up to its full strength of 100,000 members. More than a half-million dollars has already been raised in this way and applied on the debts.

32. The Moderator appointed Messrs. S. R. Doyle, W. M. Vines and D. P. Lee as a committee to draft a resolution from this Association in reference to Slot Machines and present a copy of same to the next Legislature.

33. Report on State Missions was read by L. R. Christie and adopted.

REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

We need to constantly remind ourselves that the strength and effectiveness of our State Mission Program will determine the measure of success that comes to every other enterprise fostered by our Denomination. Every cause looks to our State organization to present its appeal to the Churches and to the people, to receive and distribute the funds, and to keep this machinery of service perennially going. If the State organization fails it will spell disaster for every denominational object looking to the Churches for support. It must be apparent to any thoughtful Christian that unless we have some strong unifying agency holding our Churches and people together in cooperative fellowship and activity they will speedily begin to disintegrate.

We have some justifiable pride in the effectiveness with which our Board has fulfilled its mission in this State. The progress made in this generation

has been phenomenal. Under wise leadership we have not been lured into embarrassing indebtedness as have so many of the States, and we are fortunately situated to meet the challenge of the enlarging opportunities of our times.

The Board reported in January that 672 of our Florida Churches had been enlisted in our missionary program for 1935, as against 562 for the previous year. The budget of the State Mission Board is set up on a basis of \$56,930.00 to take care of its important program. This includes the following items: 1, headquarters expense, 2, Sunday Schools, 3, W. M. U., 4, B. T. U., 5, Baptist Brotherhood, 6, the Evangelistic Department (two full time evangelists), 7, Pastoral Aid (helping 27 churches and mission stations, including a missionary to the Indians), and 8, one full time Missionary to the Indians in the Lake Okeechobee District.

For the maintenance of this program the Board looks to three sources for its income: 1, 20 percent allocation from the Cooperative receipts, 2, special October gifts from the W. M. U. Week of Prayer and special offerings from the Sunday Schools, 3, a donation of \$5,500.00 from the Sunday School Board to assist in the Sunday School, B. T. U. and B. S. U. work.

34. Report on Periodicals was read by L. R. Christie in the absence of the writer, O. H. Crawford, and adopted.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS

We have in the Florida Association 33 Churches, more than 5000 members; approximately 1450 families. We should have no less than 1450 copies of the Florida Baptist Witness (one for each home) coming into our Association each week. Reports indicate that less than 200 families receive this invaluable paper each week, a fact sufficient to challenge the best that is in us. The Witness has a plan whereby any part time Church may have 12 copies for \$12, paid in advance, and a full time Church may have the same rate for its official group, or more. We recommend that our people take advantage of this opportunity. Furthermore, "Home and Foreign Fields" should be widely read by our people. These periodicals are ably edited and are worthy of our best support.

35. Report of Committee on Time, Place and Preacher was read by W. E. Wood, the content of which, after amendment, was as follows:

TIME: Ten o'clock A. M., Thursday following second Sunday in October, 1937.
PLACE: First Baptist Church, Monticello, Florida.

PREACHER: Dr. L. R. Christie, with Rev. G. T. Hunt as alternate.

The matter as to how long the Association shall be in session next year is hereby referred to the Executive Committee. Report adopted.
