CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

Article II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

Article III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Article IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

Article VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

Article VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article VIII. On the first day of each annual meeting the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the officers of the Association and the members of the Executive Committee for the ensuing year. Nominations may also be made from the floor. All officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee. The Executive Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring in the committee between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll, (1) any member who moves from the Association within the year, (2) any member who dies during the year, and (3) any member who is absent from the regular or called meetings of the Committee for three consecutive times without giving a written reason for such absence. This committee shall meet as often as it may desire; shall set up a quorum of not less than eight of its number; shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

Article IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which, after examination, are found to be orthodox; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

Article XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

- Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy
- Article II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.
 - Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.
- Article IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.
- Article V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.
- Article VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.
- Article VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.
- Article VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.
- Article IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.
- Article X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

- The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
- 3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
- 4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
- 5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
- 6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

THURSDAY, OCTOBER 6, 1949

MORNING SESSION

- The one hundred seventh annual session of the Florida Baptist Association was held October 6-7, in the First Baptist Church, Chattahoochee, Florida. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Rev. Homer Duggar at ten o'clock. Rev. Fred W. Sliger led the congregation in singing "Open My Eyes, That I May See". Mrs. C. B. Miller was the accompanist at the piano.
- Rev. Fred W. Sliger, pastor of the University Heights Baptist Mission, read Mark 10:46-52; I Corinthians 2:9 and led in prayer.
- Rev. C. W. McDonald, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Chattahoochee, and pastor of the host church, gave a warm welcome to all the messengers of the Association.
- James T. Barber made a motion that the messengers present and those who later enroll constitute the working body of the Association.
- The Report of the Program committee was made by Harold G. Sanders. He made a motion that the Program as printed be the guide for our procedure for the meeting.
- 6. New Pastors present were introduced by Rev. T. J. Barnett. Those present were: Rev. C. W. McDonald, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Chattahoochee, Rev. W. A. Robinson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Havana, Rev. Fred W. Sliger, pastor of the University Heights Baptist Mission. Later, other new pastors were introduced. They were: Rev. S. A. Coxwell, pastor of the Corinth Baptist Church, Hosford; Rev. J. B. Coston, pastor of the Concordia Baptist Church, Concord. Visitors recognized during the session were: Rev. George Slater, Dr. Chester Quarles, Rev. Paul McCullers, L. E. Brooker, and Dr. W. A. Burns.
- Rev. Homer Duggar read the report of the Executive Committee and was adopted.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The executive committee for the 1948-49 associational year has held regular monthly meetings. There has been a quorum present at all meetings.

The committee has transacted such business as they felt would advance the Lord's Kingdom and for the betterment of the association. There have been three associational wide events during the year that have been sponsored by this committee. Also, the ground work for these events was done by committees appointed by the executive committee. The events mentioned above are: 1—schools of missions and one day mission rallies. 2—Simultaneous revivals, and 3—Silver Lake Assembly. This committee has gone on record in opposition to any form of legalized gambling. They voiced their opposition by sending resolution to the legislative body asking that they oppose any form of gambling.

The heads of the different departments have made reports of their work at various times. The committee has counseled and cooperated with these departments as much as possible.

Plans have been made and a committee appointed for another simultaneous revival to begin March 19, 1950.

REPORT ON SIMULTANEOUS REVIVALS 1948-1949

There were 20 churches participating in the Simultaneous Revivals, April 10-17, 1949. There were 125 received by letter and 180 by baptism, and one by statement, giving a total of 306 additions. Also, there were 228 rededications and 7 volunteers for full time religious service. We thank God and take courage for this report.

Plans are now being made for a similar Crusade for March 19-April 2, 1950. Too, the date for 1951 has been set—March 25-April 8. We are anticipating Pentacostal blessings in these series of meetings. As general chairman for evangelism, I wish to make the following recommendations:

THAT, every church in Florida Association plan to have a revival March 19-April 2, 1950, if possible.

THAT, definite plans be made in each local church to fully cooperate in the Simultaneous Revivals in every church East of the Mississippi, April 1-15, 1951.

THAT, each local church shall elect a committee on evangelism composed of representatives of the departments of the church, viz.: Sunday school, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood. This over-all committee will plan and promote evangelism in the church in view of its large soul-winning opportunities.

THAT, new mission stations and new churches, wherever it seems advisable, be organized, looking forward to the formation of an independent church.

THAT, every church, whether rural or city, send her pastor to the Evangelistic Conference in Jacksonville 10-12, 1950.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

It is estimated there will be 400,000 college students to be graduated this year. Enrollment is at a record peak. These college students will assume positions of leadership in every community in Florida and the nation. Certainly our colleges and universities in Florida are fields of missionary opportunity. Baptists need to conserve and train Baptist youth as they take their places in our denominational life in the future. Our present responsibility to them is great.

Our Florida Baptist Convention has a department of Student Work with Rev. Ray Koonce as State Director and full-time director on the campus at University of Florida. The department has three other full-time student directors. They are: Mr. Bill McCammon,

Stetson University; Mr. Harold Massey, University of Miami; and Miss Mary Elizabeth Ainsworth, who followed Miss Faith James on May 15 at Florida State University this year. Three other campuses have a Baptist Student program: University of Tampa, Florida Southern, and St. Petersburg Junior College. We have Baptist Student Center Buildings at Florida State University, Stetson University, and University of Florida. We are very proud of our new \$150,000 Student Center in Gainesville just completed and dedicated last spring.

The Baptist Student Union co-ordinates all the voluntary religious activities of the Baptist students in the schools of higher learning. Every Baptist student in one of these schools is a potential member of the Baptist Student Union. He becomes an active member when he joins a Baptist church in the college center, the Sunday School, the Training Union or the Young Woman's Auxiliary. The church-centered program of enlistment and training for active membership is promoted through the Baptist Student Union Council elected annually. Any Baptist Student is eligible for membership on council.

Activities on the campuses are varied and full. They include Student Evangelistic Week, Vocational Emphasis Week, Vespers, Morning Watch, retreats, church organization camps, various phases of extension and summer work. All activities are designed for the spiritual development of the students and prepare them for active leadership in the church and community life while in school and following graduation.

The state department of student work promotes three state-wide meetings during the year. Florida State University had 59 students attending the State Convention in Jacksonville this year. Twenty-eight of the 150 Florida Students at Student Week at Ridgecrest were F.S.U. students. Forty-five students from F.S.U. attended the spring retreat at Camp O'Lena for training new officers in their duties.

You have had a great part in the success of the Baptist Student Work on the Florida State University Campus. Thank you for your fine cooperation and genuine interest. We covet your earnest prayers and sincere cooperation as we represent you on our Florida college campuses.

PETITION FOR DISSOLUTION

TO THE HONORABLE W. MAY WALKER, one of the Judges of the Circuit Court of the Second Judicial Circuit of the State of Florida, in and for the County of Leon:

The members of the Baptist Memorial Hospital, of Tallahassee, Florida, consisting of the Board of Trustees elected by the Florida Baptist Association as its hospital governing board, respectfully show unto this Court the following:

Baptist Memorial Hospital, a corporation not for profit, was formed pursuant to the order of this Court dated April 13, 1945, with the primary object and purpose of erecting and operating a hospital in or near the City of Tallahassee Florida. Toward this end a substantial sum of money was raised by gifts and donations. In the spring of 1946, plans were formulated for the operation by the corporation of a temporary hospital in buildings formerly consisting of hospital facilities at Dale Mabry Air Base at Tallahassee,

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Florida, and on July 1, 1946, in accordance with a lease agreement entered into between the Corporation and the City of Tallahassee, Florida, the Corporation commenced the operation of a hospital under the name of Baptist Memorial Hospital. Within the year following July 1, 1946, the City of Tallahassee authorities became convinced that the plan of the Corporation for the erection of a hospital to cost approximately one-half million dollars was not sufficiently large, in view of the greatly increased cost of construction, to meet the needs of this area, and the City authorities expressed their intention to raise, through public means, sufficient funds to erect a much larger hospital. This action nullified the program which had been planned by this Corporation for the erection of a hospital. and the Board of Trustees discontinued further solicitation or collection of funds for the erection of a proposed hospital. The Board of Trustees sent a communication dated February 8, 1947, to all donors requesting that each one within ninety days, direct the Corporation as to the distribution of the funds contributed to the hospital. Gifts were returned to donors or were held in trust for later disposition, or were used for charitable services or for the operation of the temporary hospital, in accordance with the requests of the donors.

The Corporation continued the operation of a temporary hospital until April 23, 1948, when, by agreement with the City of Tallahassee, the Corporation turned over to the City the hospital property and concluded the management of the hospital.

The purpose for which the Corporation was founded was thus otherwise fulfilled, and thereupon on October 14, 1948, the Florida Baptist Association adopted a resolution authorizing the following action:

- "1. That the Trustees of Baptist Memorial Hospital are authorized to apply to one of the Circuit Judges of the Second Judicial Circuit, in and for Leon County, Florida, for a dissolution of the Corporation, and to take all necessary action to accomplish the dissolution of the Corporation:
- "2. That the Trustees of Baptist Memorial Hospital are authorized to continue to make remittance to any donors upon receipt of requests therefor and upon determination of their validity, and are authorized to pay any claims or debts against the Corporation which may be determined to be valid;
- "3. That any funds remaining in the hands of the Corporation at the time of dissolution shall be transmitted to the Treasurer of this Association to be used for hospitalization and charitable purposes as may be decided upon from time to time by the Association, after the dissolution shall have been effected."

The Trustees of this Corporation have continued to dispose of funds according to the requests of donors and have continued to pay any debts of the Corporation, and a final report of receipts and disbursements of the Corporation will be filed with this Court prior to the entry of a decree of dissolution.

WHEREUPON the members of Baptist Memorial Hospital hereby petition this Honorable Court to enter an Order prescribing a rea-

sonable notice to be published relative to the petition for dissolution of the Corporation and, at the expiration of the time, fixed thereby, to enter a decree of dissolution and to make such other orders and decrees for the winding up of the affairs of the Corporation as to the Court may seem proper.

ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED that the Petition for Dissolution filed on behalf of the members of Baptist Memorial Hospital be and it is hereby granted and Baptist Memorial Hospital, a corporation not for profit, be and it is hereby finally dissolved.

IT IS FURTHER ORDERED, ADJUDGED AND DECREED that the sum of \$10,728.55 now held by the Corporation should be transmitted to the Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Association to be used for hospitalization and charitable purposes as may be decided upon from time to time by the Association and that the Resolution of Florida Baptist Association dated October 14, 1948, to this effect is hereby approved.

MEMORIALS

Among the many faithful members of our churches, who, during the past year have gone from this earthly to the far better heavenly life, there to inherit the reward set aside by the Master and to live in His Mansions prepared for them, are two ministers of our churches. One of them crowned with white hair and rich experience, the other young and brilliant.

Rev. J. Ivey Edwards of the Quincy Church, makes this statement concerning the former: "At 9 o'clock, Thursday morning, March 25, 1949, God in His infinite mercy and wisdom saw fit to take unto Himself our beloved brother and fellow laborer, The Reverend E. H. Garrott. Brother Garrot had for many, many years been one of the leading pulpiteers in his home state, Kentucky, and in Mississippi, Alabama and Florida where he served his latter years. For the past several years he lived in retirement in Quincy where we came to know him as a brother beloved and from which he supplied many of our churches and blessed us with his presence. In his going we lose a dear friend and a wise counsellor.

Let me speak concerning the latter, who was a member of my church. Rev. William Haywood Cates, Jr., age 24, graduate of Leon High School in Tallahassee, student of the University of Florida and graduate of Mississippi College under the Navy V-12 program, also graduate of the Yale Divinity School, lost his life accidentally in Six Mile Pond south of Tallahassee on the night of December 29, 1948. Son of Deacon and Mrs. W. H. Cates of our church, he had lived an exemplary life and had been ordained in the First Baptist Church in August, 1947. He had returned to his native city and was professor in the School of Religion of Florida State University at the date of his untimely departure, full of promise both in this life and in the life to come.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS.

The East Hill Baptist Church, Tallahassee, was organized November 14, 1948, with 36 Charter Members. They called as Pastor, Rev. Nat H. Brittain. The Church was received into the Association by the Executive Committee, at their January, 1949 meeting. The Church has a Sunday School of 127; and a Training Union of 58. During the year the Church membership reached 69. They purchased a lot valued at ten thousand dollars; and have erected a building on it. Their budget was above eleven thousand dollars.

The Woodville Baptist Church lost its building by fire; but on the lot where the former structure stood, they have erected a new building, with furnishings, at a cost of approximately fifteen thousand dollars. The seating capacity of the Church is 200, with additional educational facilities for 150; with ten Sunday School rooms. This has been accomplished under the leadership of their Pastor, Rev. Homer Duggar.

The Wilma Baptist Church was organized July 15, 1948. They have completed their new Church building, constructed with concrete blocks, sufficient for their needs. Our Association granted this Church fifty dollars on their building. Rev. Jesse Pollock is Pastor.

The Southside Baptist Church, Tallahassee, recently invested two thousand dollars in a lot on the highway south of the City on which the Church plans to build in the future. Plans are in hand for the first unit, to cost around twenty thousand dollars. Rev. T. J. Barnett is Pastor.

The First Church, Quincy, has a growing Mission work started east of Quincy; with a property investment of seven thousand dollars. The Church is being led by Laymen, under the direction of a Mission Committee of the Church.

Lake Ellen has erected a new building; and while the work is not complete, they have so far invested six thousand dollars in their program of construction. Their pastor is Rev. J. H. Hobbs.

The University Heights Church, Tallahassee, which is Branch No. 1 of the First Church, Tallahassee, is making good progress. They adopted a budget this year for eight thousand dollars. The Church has gone to full time services. The Sunday School, Training Union, and Woman Missionary Society, are all flourishing. Their Pastor is Rev. Fred W. Sliger.

The Thomasville Road Church, Tallahassee, which is Branch No. 2 of the First Church, Tallahassee, is growing rapidly. It has adopted this year a budget of eleven thousand dollars; has gone to full time services; and called as their Pastor, Rev. Joe F. Alewine, effective October 9th.

The First Church, Tallahassee, has started construction on their new building program, under the leadership of their Pastor, Dr. Harold G. Sanders. The first unit of their building is now being erected, at a cost of approximately two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. The Educationsl Building will provide for 500 University Students; 5 Nurseries; 3 Beginners, 3 Primary; 2 Junior; 2 Intermediate, and one Young Peoples Departments. Also the offices, kitchen, dining room, etc., will be in this building. It should be complete by next Easter. When the entire building program is finished, they will have an investment of seven hundred and fifty thousand dollars.

The Havana Church is in a building program which at present amounts to sixty eight thousand dollars. When completed they will have a seating capacity in the Church of 450; a Sunday School department to take care of 350, with 25 rooms. When completed the total cost will be around one hundred thousand dollars. Rev. W. A. Robinson is pastor.

REPORT, FLORIDA SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

We have 23 churches and 21 Sunday Schools in the Florida Sunday School Association. During the year three schools, Aenon, Arran and Newport ceased to function, but one new school, Ebenezer (Leon County) was organized, thus we have had a net loss in number of schools during the year of two. However, it is encouraging to note that the enrollment in these 21 schools this year is 5133 as compared with an enrollment of 4893 in the 23 schools last year, a net gain in enrollment of 240 during the year in the Association.

Another encouraging feature is the fact that our average attendance this year in 21 schools was 2454, as against an average attendance in 23 schools last year of 2221. In other words we had 233 more people in Sunday School every Sunday this year than we had last year.

On September 19th last we had an Associational Planning Meeting, and adopted the following goals for the new year:

Silver Lake Assembly was held June 27-July 2 at the U. S. Forestry Organizational Camp Silver Lake near Tallahassee. We are pleased to report that the assembly was one of the best we have had, if not the best. There were 182 registrations with 165 staying at the assembly. Those attending testified they had received many spiritual blessings. With the aid of past experience we were able to shift a crowded schedule to enable everyone to enjoy every moment of the assembly.

Six courses were offered in Training Union work; six courses were offered in Missions; one course was offered in Sunday School work; and three courses were offered in Music, one at each hour of study. In addition to the one Sunday School course, two classes in story telling was offered for Juniors and one Life Conference class for Intermediates. This year we had seventeen faculty members plus six other administrative workers, or a total of 23 adults leading our assembly.

We would like to offer words of appreciation to everyone who attended the assembly for their part in making this assembly a success. We are grateful to the Music-Brotherhood Department for the help provided and to Mr. Linney for directing the music; to Rev. J. C. Sims, of Hogansville, Georgia, for his congenial fellowship and the splendid messages he brought both morning and evening; to our Dietitian, Mrs. Hazel Fowler for providing appetizing meals; and to our Lifeguard for the splendid way he handled the swimming activities.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Southern Baptists have established five types of schools, the oldest of these being the college and university, ten of which are over 100 years old. Of this type there are 29. There is the Junior college of which there are 23. The third is the academy, offering high school education, of which we have eight. The one W.M.U. Training School is a fourth and unique type. The fifth of which there are three, is the Seminary, where specialized training is obtained for work in the field of religion.

The enrollment in all of these schools has reached an all-time high of 54,979 in a twelve-month period just completed. Increases were shown in universities, colleges, and seminaries while decreases were shown in Junior colleges and academies. Of the total enrollment there were 6571 ministerial students and 2197 volunteers, including special Christian workers and missionaries.

There are three sources of support for our Baptist schools. First, the co-operative program has been the most effective means of support for Seminaries and training school. Second, special gifts or endowments by friends or alumni. Third, educational institutions other than seminaries, sixty in number, depend upon state conventions, alumni associations, and upon friends who have become convinced that our colleges and universities are here to stay and meet standard requirements and that donations to them constitute a contribution to Christian education and to the maintenance of our Christian civilization.

Southern Baptists have an investment \$115,131,099.45 in these schools represented by buildings, equipment and endowments. The endowments are only one-third of this amount denoting that these institutions are not as secure as they should be and will be when the endowments equal the amount of buildings and equipment.

Turning to our own Stetson University at DeLand we note that there were reported last year 2615 students enrolled. Of this number 118 were ministerial students and an equal number of volunteers for full time Christian work. \$1,348,297.30 was paid out in operating expense, of which \$43,332.55 was provided by the Florida Baptist convention. 677 Churches, faculty, friends and students have had a part in making possible the dream of the Stetson Religious Center building contributing toward the fund which has now reached \$100,000.00. Actual building plans are materializing fast.

The great plan and purpose of Christian education challenges the very best that is in us as a denomination when the responsibility for training Christian leaders is fully understood and demands the full support of every Baptist.

Recommendations:

- That every church observe Stetson Week, January 22-29, 1950
- 2. That we urge our people to make a visit to the campus
- 3. That we send our sons and daughters to Stetson
- 4. That we place Stetson in our wills

The committee appointed was, W. A. Robinson, Havana, Chairman, H. C. Meador, Tallahassee, and Nat H. Brittain, Tallahassee.

REPORT ON BROTHERHOOD

Southwide the Brotherhood is the fastest growing organization in Baptist life, according to a statement compiled and published by Porter Routh, statistician of the Southern Baptist Convention. On a Convention-wide basis, in the past two years the number of Brotherhoods has more than doubled and the number of men enrolled is up about 125%.

In Florida the work has steadily advanced. During the year past there has been nearly 100 new Brotherhoods organized and the total enrollment has increased nearly 50%. Mr. George Linney has been added to the Music-Brotherhood Department and is taking over the Brotherhood work, Mr. Holcomb devoting his time to music.

In the Florida Association we are reporting eight Brotherhoods instead of six for last year with a slight increase in membership. Our Association definitely recognizes and endorses brotherhood work by appropriating the amount of \$75.00 for promotional expense.

Mr. James Watts of Quincy is Association President for the coming year and we wish for him the assistance and co-operation of every Pastor.

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

This is one of the most important subjects confronting the American people today. So many of us fail to take it seriously. We think about it and at times mention the fact that something should be done about its teaching and the training of our young people, but that is about all we do. Some churches are doing a little teaching along the lines of social service, but it isn't a thorough course and can not be called social service. A complete program should be scheduled and carried out in a very effective way. Our young people need this training and it would help some of the older ones too.

The Southern Baptist Convention has a scheduled program that any church would be doing their membership a great service if they would have this course taught during the coming year.

The Convention recommends as leaders or teachers for the course the following:

Two Ministers

Two Physicians (if possible an Obstetrician and a Pediatrician)

One Lawyer

One Psychiartrist

One Psychologist

One Sociologist

One Social Worker

One Public School Administrator

One Scout Executive

One Public Health Nurse

One Secretary of YMCA or YWCA

One Home Economics Teacher

The subjects recommended by the Convention are placed in seven groups as following:

- 1. Children's hour
- 2. Dating and courtship
- 3. Preparation for marriage

- 4. Adjustments for early marriage
- 5. Problems of the expanding family
- 6. Adjustments of the contracting family
- 7. The unmarried

This course or any of these subjects can be taught at night if the schedule worked out by the Convention is followed. It is recommended that leaders or teachers be brought in from outside the church in which the course is to be taught.

This course or conferences was conducted by the First Baptist Church of Vicksburg, Mississippi, Dr. Swan Haworth, pastor. Also by Istrouma Baptist Church, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, Dr. S. C. Rushing, pastor and the Immanuel Baptist Church, Tulsa, Oklahoma, Dr. John Newport, pastor.

The Convention is working on other conferences or groups of subjects and they will be as following.

Religion in Life: A study for churches in race relation

Religion in Life: A program for churches in industrial relation

Religion in Life: A workshop for the rural churches and its social problems

Religion in Life: A survey for churches and their leaders of the social problems of the city.

It is believed that if our churches of today would do something about the teaching of social service it would greatly reduce the divorces of our people of all ages. Education is one of the greatest helps in our every day life and when we fail to have the proper training we are not prepared to face certain issues of life and that has caused many marriages to go on the rocks. Our churches should do their part in training our young people, we owe it to them.

The social service commission of the Southern Baptist Convention has inaugurated a bulletin service. Their monthly publication, "Light" is being released ten times a year. It is available to pastors and lay leaders at present without charge. It includes factual and statistical data together with ethical and moral evaluation of the present day problems of our social order.

An effort is being made this year to get a concise factual summary of our social problems into the hands of the chairman of the social service committee of every state Convention and each district association in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention. This will make possible an up to the minute report of facts on social service. They urge that all such committee chairman communicate with their office, 2825 Lexington Road, Louisville, Kentucky if you are not on their mailing list.

It is recomended that this association before it meets again inaugurate some definite program for social service training. The program to be studied and set up by our executive committee. This is truly one of our God given duties.

TEMPERANCE REPORT

We note with deep concern the increase in the amount being spent by the American people for alcoholic beverages, the amount for 1948 being \$9,640,000,000. An amount equal to nine dollars for every minutes since Jesus was born in Bethlehem. Converted into silver dollars and laid flat on the ground edge to edge this amount would make a line 228,000 miles in length, or more than nine times around the globe. We also note with alarm that Florida has practically doubled its per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages during the past few years, and that for 1946-47 our per capita consumption of hard liquor was 2.26 gallons, while the national average was 1.58 gallons. It seems that our people are doing more than their share of drinking.

According to the American Business Men's Research Foundation there are two saloons to every church. Three saloons to every school and one saloon to every 51 youths between the ages of 17 and 24.

There is no one thing in America that has sent more homes to the divorce courts, nor sent more people to our federal, state and county penal institutions than alcoholic beverages. When we hear of a car wreck, the first thing we usually ask, did any one get hurt, but the next question is, was the driver drinking. People who are so conscious of this deadly menace will vote in favor of legalizing its sale and so many of these people think nothing of serving liquor in their homes to guest and some times this is done in the presence of children and some parents will give their children just a sip. When a child is reared in a home where liquor is served and are given these sips usually learn to like the taste of the filthy mess and when they are grown the desire for alcohol increases till they either become a habitual drinker or a drunkard. This applies to both boys and girls, however, there are exceptions to this.

There is more money spent each year in this great state of ours on alcoholic beverages than we spend on all our schools. Each year our state receives an enormous amount of taxes from the sale of liquor. Some say that we must have this money to help pay the high cost of our government. We got along without this tax during prohibition and we can do it again. Deaths, property and time losses in our state alone that are caused directly or indirectly from alcohol is most alarming. We have people who will not agree with this, but it is true just the same.

This is a deplorable condition and when we say that nothing can be done about it we are only kidding ourselves. If all the Christians in this grand state would pool their efforts and really go to work as we should it wouldn't be long before this evil would be lessen far more than we might think. Lots of prayers and plenty of hard work can do many things thought impossible.

It is recommended that this association make some effort toward stamping out this evil and not just do a lot of talking without action.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home has had a good year. The cottage for the little children has been finished and all the children have been moved from Arcadia to Lakeland. This cottage like all the others, was constructed to cut down on repairs through the years. There are no porches or other attachments to the buildings that might be a source of constant expense. The walls of the Administration building have been brought up to floor height, the fill dirt for the floor has been hauled in and they are now ready to proceed with finishing the building. They hope to have it completed by January 1950.

With the completion of the Administration building there will be eleven buildings on the property in Lakeland. Five of these are cottages for children. The others are for utility purposes. They need a chapel and two cottages immediately. These buildings would complete the first unit of the institution and would allow us to care for more than 150 children.

They maintain a farm and a dairy. They have about fifteen acres of muck land and several acres of good loam soil that they use for grove and farming. They also have 120 acres of pasture land, forty acres of which has been planted to improved pasture grass.

They have planted shrubs, lawn grass, and palms around the cottages and on the property in front of the buildings.

The children attend the public schools of Lakeland. Three of our girls and one boy graduated from high school last year. Two of the girls took jobs; one went in training at the Baptist Hospital in Tennessee, and the boy is in school at Florida State University at Tallahassee.

Our children attend church and Sunday school at the First and the Southside Baptist churches of Lakeland.

We gave assistance to 157 children last year; but we were not able to help all who needed the services of the Home. The addition of two cottages would enable us to add forty children to the number we are helping now. The cottages are badly needed.

You will be asked for a special offering this Christmas to erect buildings at the Home. Let us urge you to give liberally to this worthy cause. Jesus said, "Inasmuch as ye did it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye did it unto me." The writer of proverbs tells us, "He that hath pity on the poor lendeth to the Lord; and that which he hath given will he pay him again."

MISSIONS

Our Lord gave the privilege to every Christian to "be witnesses unto me," beginning at "Jerusalem". "Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel," is a tremendous responsibility for every Baptist. It is worldwide, beginning on the home front. To meet this worldwide need Florida Association, during the year 1948-49 gave \$2.20 per capita to the cooperative program. In this Association it took 15½ people to win one soul to the Lord. It took 16 Baptists in the state of Florida to win one soul.

The task is worldwide, we must "Go," we must "Witness," to meet God's plan and aim.

STATE MISSIONS

State Missions is the home front for worldwide Missions. No structure can be stronger than the foundation upon which it rests. Watering and keeping alive the spirit of worldwide missions is the task of State Missions. This is tremendously important, because our worldwide missions program is so completely bound up in the success of State Missions.

State Missions strengthens the Mission Stream at its fountain head. It builds missions, establishes new churches, and develops a mission-conscious-attitude. A stream cannot rise higher than its combined sources.

State Mission Institutions are vital factors in the life of the whole denomination. The organizations are basic in training preachers, missionaries, and denominational workers. While our churches are giving an ever increasing amount of mission money, our schools are busy turning out preachers, missionaries, and christian leaders to take the places of those who have fallen in the ranks.

During this associational year of 1948-49, our cooperative program funds have been divided 50-50. Florida's 50% is divided as follows:

HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board report at Oklahoma City, in May 1949, revealed a successful year in evangelism with 46,351 conversions, which nearly doubled the figures of last year. There were 741 missionaries serving during the year with an additional group of 287 student summer workers giving three months of service.

Direct Missionaries distributed 48,336 copies of the Bible and Gospel portions and 1,776 pages of tracts. The magazine, Southern Baptist Home Missions, had a circulation of 116,000. Mission Study books, sold through the Book Stores numbered 127,009.

There were 281 new missions opened during the year, 53 among the language groups, 129 in City missions, and 99 in western states. The report showed 245 new churches constituted and 54 revived.

New fields of home mission opportunities have been added by the Southern Baptist Convention which organized Oregon and Washington and directed the Home Mission Board to open work in Alaska.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

Southern Baptists have mission work in thirty geographical areas. In seven of these areas work is at present carried on by nationals without missionary personnel; three of these are in Communist Europe, three in Communist China and the other in Moslem Trans-Jordan. The Foreign Mission Board has 689 active missionaries under appointment, working in 119 mission centers.

Seventy-three missionaries were appointed in 1949; forty-six additional appointments were made between January 1 and May 31, 1949. Missionaries are stationed in four new areas: Guatemala, Venezuela, Formosa, and West China. Also, Costa Rica with two missionaries was transferred from the Home Mission Board to the Foreign Mission Board on May 1, 1949.

The healthy condition of Baptist work abroad is evident in national Baptist conventions organized within the year and in the extensive work of older national organizations. The Colombian-Venezuelan Convention was organized in February this year; the China Baptist Convention, for the first time bringing Baptists from the whole of China into one organization, was formed in November, 1948; and the Uruguayan Convention was formed in June, 1948. The value of such national organizations is demonstrated in countries where national Baptists are holding Southern Baptist work together without missionary aid.

Foreign Mission advance depends upon devotion to Christ and his Kingdom program. The Holy Spirit will provide the necessary resources in men and money, if Southern Baptists are determined to do the will of God.

Mr. Moderator, distinguished Preachers, visitors and members of the Association:

The past year has gone quickly and it is time to give an account of the work done by the Missionary Union to the Florida Baptist Association.

Your President is deeply aware that this report would have been better if more of our women had sent in reports and if the reports had been fully and accurately filled out. We are showing improvement in our methods of reporting and in emphasizing the need for every society to compile four reports during the year—one every quarter. Last year according to report only one Association in the whole state (595 missionary societies) received the quarterly report every quarter from every W.M.S. May we constantly compare what we have done with what we ought to do, for this is the way of growth.

The first quarterly meeting was held at Tallahassee First Church January 19, 1948. The methods class was taught by Mrs. A. G. Chappell of Marianna. Registration 105.

The Spring Quarterly meeting assembled at Providence Church April 8, 1949. Dr. Courts Redford, Associate Secretary of The Home Mission Board, appeared on the program. Two Associational wide projects were approved: Children's Home \$200.00 (two hundred dollars); Birmingham Building \$80.00 (Eighty dollars). Reports were given from the annual W.M.U. Meeting. Special offering of \$25.05 was sent to the Negro Seminary in Nashville, Tennessee.

Chattahoochee entertained the July Associational Young Peoples' Clinic. Miss Ainsworth, Baptist Student Union Secretary of Florida State University, spoke on "Christ The Theme of Life". Mrs. Grady Turnage was elected as special delegate to W.M.U. week at Ridgecrest.

The fourth quarterly meeting convened with Monticello First Church September 29, 1949. 124 Registered. Dr. Harold Sanders, Pastor of Tallahassee First Church, was guest speaker. Dr. Sanders gave high light of his recent trip to Europe. Collection amounting to \$42.76 was given to the two Nigerian students attending Florida A. & M. College in Tallahassee.

The following officers were installed: President, Mrs. Tom Moore, Tallahassee; Mrs. R. F. Goddord, Quincy Vice-President; Mrs. Walter Roberts, Tallahassee, Secretary; Mrs. Grady Turnage, Chattahoochee, Young Peoples Director. Havana W.M.U. won the attendance award. Their attendance was 39%.

In closing this report it is the desire of your President to thank all who have in any way aided in our work. Especially are we grateful to God for the financial assistance which the men have given. We are grateful and thank God for our Young People; we are grateful that our membership has reached 1101; that we have 340 tithers (78 new ones this year).
