CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

Article II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

Article III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Article IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

Article VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

Article VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of all cooperating churches in the Association; and where there is no pastor, a layman shall be elected; in addition thereto, as many as ten men and women may be named to the Committee, as deemed wise by the Nominating Committee during the Annual Association, or the Committee on Nominations of the Executive Committee ad interim. The Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring between the meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association

within the year or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year. The heads of the departments shall be members of the Executive Committee. This committee may meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

Article IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which, after examination, are found to be orthodox; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

Article XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

Article VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.

Article VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immer-

sion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

Article IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

Article X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

PROCEEDINGS of the ONE HUNDRED NINTH ANNUAL SESSION of the FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION held with THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH QUINCY, FLORIDA

1. The one hundredth ninth session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by James T. Barber, the Moderator, at 10:00 o'clock a. m., October 11, 1951.
2. Ralph Rittenhouse led the song service and E. M. Freer read the scripture and led in prayer.
3. J. Ivey Edwards, the host pastor, extended a cordial welcome to all who might attend the meetings.
4. J. Ivey Edwards, the Clerk of the Association, made the following motion, "Brother Moderator, I move that those present who know themselves to be regularly elected or appointed messengers from their churches, together with those who may arrive later and know themselves to be such, constitute the official roster of this Associational meeting." The motion passed.
5. J. Ivey Edwards, Chairman of the Program Committee, presented the tentative program which was adopted as the agenda of the meetings.
6. E. Forrest May, Moderator of the newly formed Gadsden Association, read a letter from the Gadsden Association requesting letters of dismissal for the churches withdrawing and requesting the good wishes of the Florida Association. The letters of dismissal were granted and our good wishes assured. The letter reads as follows:

All of our organizations: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, and Brotherhood have had their regular meetings and have shown some progress in their work.

During the year, the Gadsden Association was formed, consisting of the following churches: Bristol, Flat Creek, Greensboro, Lake Mystic, Santa Clara and Wilma.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

During the Simultaneous Revival Crusade last Spring, 676 Florida churches baptized 6,489 new converts, or one-fourth of the goal set for the year in baptisms. Including those coming by letter and statement, total additions to Florida churches were 9,408.

In Florida Association, 38 churches and missions cooperated in the Simultaneous Crusade, resulting in 546 additions: 359 by baptism, 176 by letter, and 11 by statement. Other visible results were 1,052 rededications, a Sunday School gain of 177, and 87 new members in Training Unions. God has blessed our cooperative efforts, for which we are grateful.

The multitudes yet unreached call for a continuing emphasis on evangelism. Florida's 1952 program of evangelism follows the same pattern as that of last year, except that each Association is asked to plan its own crusade at the time most suitable for that location. Therefore, we recommend:

THAT, every church in Florida Association plan a revival meeting March 30-April 6, 1952, the date approved by our Executive Committee.

THAT, pastors and other church leaders plan to attend the State Evangelistic Conference in Jacksonville, January 15-17.

THAT, our churches be mindful of the need of continued and perennial evangelism, as well as the suggestion of two revivals a year in each church, and make this central in plans for the year ahead.

Article VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article III, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of all cooperating churches in the Association; and where there is no pastor, a layman shall be elected; in addition thereto, as many as ten men and women may be named to the Committee, as deemed wise by the Nominating Committee during the Annual Association, or the Committee on Nominations of the Executive Committee ad interim. The Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring between the meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year. The heads of the departments shall be members of the Executive Committee. This committee may meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

1950-51 REPORT OF THE GADSDEN SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

On September 21, 1950 the Gadsden Sunday School Association held its Associational planning Meeting at Gretna, with ten of the fifteen churches represented. There was a total of 70 officers and teachers. Goals were set and accepted. Teams were assigned to go to each church to present the year's plan of work.

The reports on the attainments of goals set is very incomplete but practically all churches held a January Week of Bible Study. There were 523 study course awards. Although we fell short of our goal in awards, we had awards going to every church in the association, a record attained by only three associations in the state. Thanks to the untiring efforts of our Superintendent of Training, Mr. C. H. Darsey and to the faithful and loyal teachers and officers of our Sunday School.

Only six Vacation Bible School reports were sent in but others were held and we feel sure the reports went into Jacksonville.

There were 45 Baptisms from the Sunday School reported this year. This record is also incomplete.

In October 1950 we had seven officers to attend the State Sunday School Clinic at Orlando. In November these officers held

a very successful centralized training school at Greensboro. This school was under the very able leadership of our associational associate superintendent, Mrs. G. T. Hunt and Dr. Clarence Watson of Jacksonville.

Due to the wonderful spirit of our teachers and officers and their deep consecration we feel that our Sunday School Association has accomplished much and several of our smaller churches have caught a vision and with God's guidance and our help will go forward in a great way to win souls for Him.

The Woman's Missionary Union of the Florida Baptist Association brings you the following account of the year 1951.

To date three meetings have been held and the fourth, which is the last meeting of the year is to convene within the next two weeks.

Noteworthy of the year's activity has been the finishing and printing of the History of the Association. Mrs. R. F. Goddard and her committee are due much credit for this. Second, the Constitution and By-Laws have been revised and re-printed in booklet form. Mrs. Stonewall Howard was chairman of this committee. Our special thanks go to the men of our Association for the financial help towards these two pieces of activity.

The attendance at the meetings has averaged 150.

The state's goal for this project is \$6,000.00—\$3,000.00 for the Children's Home and \$3,000.00 for Stetson. This amount is raised by apportionments from each W.M.U. in the Association.

Our Young People's Meeting in July was well attended. Miss Kathryn Bigham of China and Rock Hill, S. C., was our guest speaker. Most of the twenty-seven auxiliaries of the Association were represented. Mrs. Grady Turnage of Chattahoochee, is the untiring leader of this important group.

To date the association has 1,078 members with 424 tithers. The majority of societies report directed community missions. Flat Creek, our newest society, reports 10 members, 4 tithers and all committees functioning with associational dues paid. What a challenge to the larger societies.

REPORT OF THE BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union LINKS the Baptist college student to a local Baptist church in the college center. Any college student may hold membership in it, but only by joining a local Baptist church or one of its unit organization. The Baptist Student Union SEEKS to develop well-rounded students, and thus fosters a well-rounded program, meeting the varied needs and interests of young people with worship, devotional, musical, Bible study, social, and recreational activities, providing a wholesome outlet for every God-given talent and ability and an opportunity for life-long and inspiring friendships. The Baptist Student Union SERVES the entire college community by providing a well-staffed and well-equipped center for religious activities. It seeks to raise the standards and ideals of the entire university through the consistent Christ-like living of its members, and ever strives to make Christianity a growing influence in the university community. The Baptist Student Union

STRENGTHENS the life of the state and the nation by giving to it year after year Christian businessmen, teachers, ministers, and homemakers for whom "to live is Christ."

Rev. Ray Koonce is the secretary of the Student Department for Florida Baptists. Working with him are four full-time student directors. They are Mary Elizabeth Ainsworth, Florida State University; Mr. Dan Bates, University of Florida; Mrs. Lloyd Rees, University of Miami; William McCammon, Stetson University. Mrs. J. C. Permenter is now serving as part-time director at Florida Southern College. These directors serve as a link between the church and the students on the campus. For the individual student the director acts as counselor, confidant, and friend. On the local campus he serves as a "spiritual coach" of the students. He seeks to discover and develop each individual member's maximum spiritual capacity.

Each local student director has a local committee to advise with him. The committee is directly responsible to the State Mission Board. Each quarter a report is made by members of this committee to the chairman of the State Mission Board's committee on student work. The local committee members for Florida State University are Dr. Harold G. Sanders, chairman, Mrs. J. Lewis Hall, Mr. D. S. Barineau, Mrs. Doak S. Campbell, and Mrs. Ira Gatlin.

In Florida we have four Baptist Student Union Buildings. The Baptist Student House at Florida State University was built in 1937. It is located adjacent to the campus at the corner of Call and Copeland Streets. The student director has a room in the home. All Baptist students and friends are cordially invited to enjoy the Student House at every opportunity. It opens every day except Monday at 8 a.m. It closes at 10 p.m. Monday through Thursday and 11 p.m. Friday and Saturday. In addition to the various socials and committee gatherings vespers, Y. W. A., Brotherhood, Morning Watch, and Executive Council meetings are held regularly.

All campuses cooperate and work together through a state student council. Two outstanding events are Spring retreat at Camp O'Lena and Baptist Student Convention. A southwide student retreat at Ridgecrest is held at the close of each school year.

Each local campus cooperates with the southwide student department in the promotion of "Join-the-Church Day", Vocational Guidance Week, followed by "Life Commitment Day", Summer Work. Each campus has a pre-school retreat before the opening of the regular school term. Florida State University B. S. U. sponsors Mission Days, R. A. and G. A. Conclaves; cooperates in campus-wide Religious Emphasis Week; participates in local revivals and observes the special seasons of prayer as promoted by the Woman's Missionary Union.

Baptist students are earnestly encouraged to place their church membership in one of the local churches and to support faithfully its program, that their spiritual experience may be broadened during their college life. Many parents and pastors have aided the program of the Baptist Student Union on a local campus in supplying the names and talents of individual students to the local student director. Woman's Missionary Societies have supplemented the

equipment of the student houses as individual projects. All churches are supporting the work through the Cooperative Program.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian education has enjoyed a brilliant past. Great men have lived and died with the vision of Southern Baptists arriving at this point in education. It is tempting to accept the idea that we have "arrived" and merely attempt to maintain the level already achieved. That is the most dangerous attitude we could assume. We of the Southern Baptist Convention have a great challenge before us. Let us now see what the various institutions are doing.

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary

For the first time this school has seen the enrollment go beyond 1,000. The total enrollment was 1,200.

The Alumni Memorial Chapel has been a blessing to the work of the seminary. With the great increase of student enrollment it is now necessary to expand the library facilities. Built and stocked to accommodate less than 500 students, it becomes apparent that an extension must be built and the number of volumes greatly increased.

Plans are being made toward the expansion of the seminary in order to meet the increasing needs of the times. Also, study is being made toward the establishment of a school of Religious Education, a much needed addition in this area.

With great regret Southern Baptists note the passing of two great scholars, both from Southern Seminary. Dr. Ellis Fuller and Dr. William Hersey Davis will be sorely missed in the years to come.

Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary

The gross enrollment for 1950-51 is 2,315, highest in its history. 366 were sent out from this school this year. The seminary faculty is only 42. 58 have been appointed for mission service this year: 41 foreign and 17 home missionaries.

The Extension Department of the seminary is being discontinued in order to cooperate with the other seminaries in the new combined plan of extension work. Future plans are being made toward the increase of endowment and more adequate housing for students. 72% of the students live off campus.

New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary

The student body has almost doubled in five years. There were 667 students enrolled in the 1950-51 session. Four student apartment buildings on Gentilly campus were occupied September 1, 1949 and a fifth December 21, 1950. The new library building will be occupied September 1, 1951. A dormitory and an administration building should be completed by September 1, 1952. Three faculty residences have also been completed.

It is asked that an endowment of two million dollars be built up as soon as possible. Work scholarships for worthy students are badly needed.

The total endowment for all schools is \$41,842,916.49. Property value totals amount to \$91,613,842.19. Present needs and future plans have led thirty-nine of the sixty-six schools to launch building programs and campaigns for increased endowment. The total objective of these campaigns is more than \$62,000,000. A great challenge to the Southern Baptist Convention—can we meet it? Of course we can and will.

41. T. J. Barnett read the Report on Baptist Papers. Harold Davidson, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Live Oak, Florida, spoke to the report. It was adopted:

REPORT ON BAPTIST PAPERS

According to the report of the committee on Baptist papers printed in the annual of the 1951 session of the Southern Baptist Convention in 1940 the circulation of all the State Baptist papers in the Convention were 200,000 subscribers. At the 1940 session of the Convention the editors requested that a committee be appointed to serve with the editors and secretaries in an effort to increase the circulation of all the state Baptist papers. The result of this effort was a circulation in 1950, ten years later, of 850,612 subscribers. This was an increase in the ten year period of 650,612 subscribers. During this time the Florida Baptist Witness had an increase of 16,870 subscribers, giving a total of 26,300 in 1950. These papers carry much valuable information into our Baptist homes every week. They give us information on all phases of the work being done in our state, and then too, the people have access in these papers to the doctrine that Baptists believe, love and teach. In this day of increased false doctrine, should cause our churches to put the state Baptist paper in the budget and see that it goes into every home of the membership. "Informed Baptists Are Better Baptists." We urge the churches of the Florida Baptist Association to put the Baptist Witness in every home of the membership. Also the Home Mission, and The Commission.

42. J. E. Williams read the Social Service Report. (Dr. John Maguire called this the best report he had heard). It was adopted as read:

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

The Social Service Commission was formed to extend the work of the Committee on Temperance to include along with alcoholism and its social evils, other vices and social practices that are hostile to social order and human well-being. Its purpose is to voice the Christian convictions and moral concern of our people on the social and moral issues of contemporary society. In these times of the broken homes and questionable society, we must declare the demands of Jesus Christ for a high order of morality and love in human relationships. We must take our stand against every evil that threatens justice, truth and righteousness: that tends to degrade humanity.

The Ten Commandments and the teachings of Jesus must be preached in the pulpits, taught in the Sunday School and Training Union classes, accepted and obeyed by the Christian people in the everyday walk and business of life. The unchristian spirit is appearing all around us in drinking, gambling, immorality, broken homes, desecration of the Lord's Day, selfishness, dishonesty in public office which reaches to the very top of our governmental organizations. Even church members are involved in these things. Such things should be and must be deplored by Christian people today and definite action taken against them if we expect a wholesome society to exist.

In the 1951 Annual Report of the Southern Baptist Convention, the following thoughts are found. It is not because Christianity has failed that we see all about us in the world today the tragic results of fear, distrust, hatred and greed. G. K. Chesterton expressed it in these words, "Christianity has not been tried and found wanting; but Christianity has been found difficult and not tried". Part of the failure has been with those of us who profess to be Christians. We have not witnessed as faithfully as we ought to the power of Christ to save men. If the Christian is to function as light or salt then he must demonstrate the reality of his Christian hope by taking both the judgement and the redemptive power of Christianity into all areas of his life. A commitment of one's self to the total cause of Christ takes courage because it has its price. Jesus paid the price on the cross. He was not crucified, as one has said, for saying "consider the lilies of the field how they grow but for saying consider the thieves of the temple how they steal."

Marriage and Divorce

If our homes are to stand we must conform to God's original purpose for the home. God's original plan for the home was one man and one woman joined together for life. "What God hath joined together, let no man put asunder".

In 1950 there were 27,086 marriages in Florida with 17,848 divorces. Divorces are increasing. Desertion ranks high. But the thing that makes this bad situation worse is that more and more people are accepting divorce as normal and natural.

Economic Dangers

Inflation is an economic danger. It is getting worse. The dollar is now worth only a fraction of what it was a few years ago. The people who are on a fixed salary are the ones feeling this most.

Deficit spending by the national government increases inflation.

Our Prison System and Crime

Many articles have been printed recently in our daily papers of the mismanagement of our prisons, mistreatment of the prisoners, and the general lack of business-like control.

Some important workers in our income tax divisions have been found irregular in their work and have been suspended or dismissed. Dishonesty in government is widespread. Murder is so common that we have "Murder Incorporated". Human life is held almost in contempt. The use of narcotics and the attending evils are widespread.

Gambling

Gambling, with all of its accompanying crime, is on the increase. Its influences have been felt in almost every walk of life. It is a big and powerful business. It is an international and national racket.

Many gambling elements are legalized in Florida. They are taxed and the money used for the upkeep of government agencies including the public schools.

It is said that America is becoming a nation of gamblers. Christian people should awake to this evil and openly and actively combat it instead of condoning it.

Beverage Alcohol

Liquor is the greatest evil in America today. Strong drink takes its toll in human life and property. Beverage alcohol destroys lives, property, homes, ideal and all that is sacred and good in people. Billions of dollars are spent for liquor and the resulting crime and destruction. The full cost of liquor cannot be estimated in dollars.

According to the FBI in its publication, "Uniform Crime Reports", arrests for drunken driving jumped from 153.5 per 100,000 in 1948 to 164.8 per 100,000 population in 1949.

One out of FOUR drivers in fatal accidents in 1949 had been drinking. One out of FOUR adult pedestrians killed in 1949 had been drinking according to the National Safety Council.

In the field of sports where telecasts of baseball games were made, 19 out of 29 stations carrying the games were sponsored by brewers.

The following suggestions for action against beverage alcohol are taken from the Report On Temperance found in the 1950 Annual Report of the Florida Baptist Association.

1. Check on the enforcement of laws governing sale of beverage alcohol.
2. Urge enactment of laws which prescribe instruction in public school on the effects of alcohol.
3. Urge candidates for public office to commit themselves on issues involving beverage alcohol.

4. Abstain yourself. Show that it is the Christian's moral obligation to abstain.

47. Alphonse Pichard read the Report on the Children's Home and T. M. Johns spoke to it. It was adopted as read:

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME LAKELAND, FLORIDA

The Memorial Chapel at the Home was finished January 15 of this year. Those who have seen it express themselves very favorably as to its general appearance and furnishings. It is considered the most beautiful building on the campus. It was erected in memory of the boys from the Home who gave their lives in the service of our country during World War II. It serves as a congregate meeting place for the children and workers in the Home. Chapel is held each Wednesday evening, and at other times for special occasions. They do not hold church services at the Institution. The children attend the First Baptist Church and the Southside Baptist Church in Lakeland.

The cottage for junior boys has been finished and twenty children have been added to the enrollment which is now 130. This does not include those who are receiving Mother's Aid. There are 26 children who receive help from the Institution and remain in their homes. The enrollment on the campus and those receiving Mother's Aid make a grand total of 156 who are receiving assistance now. Last year we cared for a total of 169 children—148 on the campus and 21 on Mother's Aid.

A wing has been added to the Gaines Vocational Building. It provides facilities for six boys. The major part of the cost of this addition was provided from funds left over from the construction and furnishing of the main building. If the need arises for a cottage for older boys another building of similar design can be easily added, which would give them the cottage and cut the cost to a minimum.

The farm and dairy are utilized in the operations of the Home. The dairy supplies the milk for the entire campus. A program of dairy and beef production is carefully followed which will give them all the milk they will use and much of the beef. They have 78 cows and calves in the herd. There are 130 acres in pasture, 40 of which are improved.

The Home has been given permission to ask for a special offering at Thanksgiving. The offering will be taken Sunday, November 25. The income from this source will be used to build a cottage for small children and for the operating expenses of the Home. They are asking for one day's pay from everyone who will help.

The need for the cottage is shown by the fact that they have 32 applications pending for admission. These children need help and, because they believe in Florida Baptists, they have turned to us. We must not send them away. We must not forget that Jesus blessed little children and that he said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me." We can provide a cottage for these children on November 25, furnish it, and admit every child to the Home it will accommodate if we give ONE DAY'S PAY to the Institution. Let us here and now dedicate ourselves anew to service in the Kingdom of God and help those who have appealed to us and are in distress.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

Are the heathen lost? Missions stand with an affirmative and fall with a negative answer to this all important question. If they are saved, mission work is nonsense: if lost, it is the greatest work ever given to redeemed men. Christianity and Missions stand or fall together. No intelligent mind can reject the doctrine of missions and continue to believe the Bible. The activity and perpetuity of our churches are wrapped up in this question. The Sovereignty of God, the total Depravity of man, the Vicarious Atonement by Jesus Christ according to the Eternal Covenant of Redemption and Justification by Faith, are the corner stones of the superstructure of missions. Erroneous faith makes erroneous practice. To sweeten the stream we must cleanse the fountain.

Jesus was missionary in origin, Galations 4:4 "But when the fulness of the time was come, God sent forth his Son—" Jesus repeatedly described himself as "The Sent". John 6:38 "For I came down from heaven, not to do mine own will, but the will of him that sent me." In his high priestly prayer, he prayed, "As thou hast sent me into the world, even so have I also sent them into the world." To his Church he spake, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

We are deeply grateful to Almighty God for the marvelous way in which he has led us, and firmly believe that we are facing the most brilliant dawn Christian Missions has known in nearly two thousand years. Dr. Maguire informs us, that we have just closed the greatest year in the history of our great Florida Baptist Convention. Thirty-seven of our thirty-eight associations were 100% in giving to missions, and in the remaining association only one church failed to participate. This record-breaking achievement of enlistment in giving is the result of Spirit-led cooperation on the part of individual Baptists all over Florida, consecrated leaders and faithful members alike.

Our Home Mission Board in 1950 had 754 missionaries plus 271 student workers for the summer making a total of 1,025. In recent years the Convention has added 988,642 square miles of territory and 22,000,000 people. Something of the sweeping scope of the work can be gotten from the fact the Gospel is being preached to the Indians, Mexicans, Spanish-Americans, Jews, Italians, French, Cubans, Chinese, Negroes, neglected mountain groups, the western states, Alaska, the Armed Forces and numerous groups in the industrial sections and the slums of our larger cities.

The Foreign Mission Board has lengthened its cords and strengthened its stakes in all parts of the world during the past year. Funds for Foreign Mission Advance have enabled the Board to establish new stations in almost every country in which it has work, and in four countries in which Southern Baptists have not been represented before. We have never before had as many foreign missionaries on the field as we have now. The future of

advance is definitely related to how well-informed Southern Baptists are about the needs of the world.
