CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

Article II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

Article III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Article IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

Article VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

Article VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of all cooperating churches in the Association; and where there is no pastor, a layman shall be elected; in addition thereto, as many as ten men and women may be named to the Committee, as deemed wise by the Nominating Committee during the Annual Association, or the Committee on Nominations of the Executive Committee ad interim. The Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring between the meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association

within the year or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year. The heads of the departments shall be members of the Executive Committee. This committee may meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

Article IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article XI. This Association shall have power: **first**, to provide for the general union of the churches; **second**, to counsel with any church in difficulty; **third**, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; **fourth**, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; **fifth**, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in Annual meeting; **sixth**, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; **seventh**, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

Article XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

Article VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.

Article VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immer-

sion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

Article IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

Article X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

PROCEEDINGS
of the
ONE HUNDRED TENTH ANNUAL SESSION
of the
FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
held with

WOODVILLE, FLORIDA

1. The one hundred tenth session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by James T. Barber, the Moderator, at 10:00 o'clock A.M. on October 9, 1952.
2. Wm. Fred Sliger led the song service and Ellis B. Turner read I Corinthians the thirteenth chapter and led the opening prayer after brief remarks.
3. U. W. Rollins, the host pastor, extended a cordial welcome to all messengers and visitors.
4. J. E. Robinson made a motion that all those knowing themselves to be elected messengers from their churches be seated as such. H. C. Meador seconded the motion and it passed.
5. Jack Eppes brought the report of the program committee and called attention to minor change in the agenda and some changes of personnel.
6. Jack Bridges, Thomasville Road; Edward L. Jackson, East Hill; B. Sexton Hall, Olive; R. L. Middleton, Antioch; Ellis B. Turner, Carrabelle; and Durwood Kilpatrick, Southside—all new pastors in the Association—were presented by H. C. Meador.
7. The report of the Executive Committee was read by James T. Barber who moved its adoption. H. C. Meador seconded the motion and it passed.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Association Constitution designate the Executive Committee to "transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association and shall act for the Association when it is not in session. The Executive Committee consists of all pastors of all cooperating churches in the Association; in addition thereto, as many as ten men or women may be named to the committee; also, the heads of the departments, Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union director, Brotherhood president, and Women's Missionary Union president.

The Executive Committee has met regularly at the designated time and transacted such business as is delegated to it. Regular reports have been made concerning all departments of our work.

Under the wise leadership of Rev. J. Ivey Edwards the Association cooperated in a Simultaneous Revival—March 30-April 6. Miss Roumelle Bowen has led in a magnificent way our Training Union work. Many of our churches have been touched by her influence this year. Mr. D. A. Avant has arranged for and carried out a progressive program of Sunday School work, with Mr. T. J. Robinson leading in a challenging way our Brotherhood. Our Woman's Missionary Union was led by the capable leadership of Mrs. W. W. Massey.

The Executive Committee approved and will recommend to amend the constitution pertaining to Article XI. The amendment only affects the "fifth" power of the Association.

Article XI of the Constitution will read as follows:

"This Association shall have power: **first**, to provide for the general union of the churches; **second**, to counsel with any church in difficulty; **third**, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meetings; **fourth**, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; **fifth** to accept into this Union other Baptist churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in annual meetings; **sixth**, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; **seventh**, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union."

One regret this year as in years passed, all of our committees have not functioned. Many of the pastors of our smaller churches have not attended our regular meetings. We urge this year the full cooperation of every member of the Committee to attend regularly, thus deriving the full benefit of all of our work.

It not only reflects increased costs of all that we do, but the main item of increase is the **SIMULTANEOUS ENLARGEMENT CAMPAIGNS**, in which **each** and **every church** will have at least two (2) state or southwide workers **IN YOUR CHURCH**, without cost except entertainment. Here is the proposed Budget:

Church Council of Evangelism

We encourage each church to have a council on evangelism, composed of the pastor and heads of each church agency, to plan a program of evangelism a year in advance. Write the Cooperative Missions Department for any help along this line.

- 4, Observe Bible Study Week January 5-9, 1953.
- 5, Participate in the Convention-wide effort involved in the "Transfer Church Membership Week" next September.

- 6, Adopt and use the Standard of Excellence as a program of work.

- 7, Center all efforts on reaching and winning to Christ every person in the community.

We have a complete staff of 23 officers and leaders, representing every section of our Association, who are fully dedicated to the accomplishment of this task. However, they alone cannot do the work. They solicit your prayers and active support, especially the support of the Pastors of the Association.

REPORT ON ASSEMBLIES

The state of Florida is now operating three assemblies, DeLand Assembly, Stetson University, DeLand, Florida; West Florida Baptist Assembly, Panama City, Florida; and, East Coast Assembly. A record attendance was reported for these three assemblies. A program of vital interest to the leadership of the churches of the state was provided. Inspiration for the individuals attending was received. Very few of our people of this area of Florida attended the DeLand or East Coast assemblies. Over 200 registered for the West Florida Assembly and some 168 were in attendance upon the daily sessions. West Florida Assembly offers to the people of West Florida one of the most challenging opportunities that can be found anywhere. The physical equipment has been greatly improved since last year. A new Auditorium has been built. Old auditorium has been rearranged to care for Dining hall, Canteen, Bookstore, and recreation area. The beach on East Bay has been graded and new walk way provided. Palmettos have been cleaned out between entrance gate and buildings. Shrubbery has been planted at entrance making it more attractive. Hot water heaters have been purchased for each cabin and will be installed before next summer. Plans now are to provide an adult building in the very near future. The highlight of the assembly this year was the consecration service when 21 fine young people came forward dedicating their lives to special Christian work. We are urged to return to our churches and arrange to send our leadership to our West Florida Baptist Assembly next year.

We have 28 Churches with Training Unions and two Missions, with 28 Churches requesting Awards. Six Churches in our Association have no Training Union and have requested no awards, one of which is planning a Training Union Study Course next week and Shady Sea plans to organize a Training Union as soon as the Study Course is completed. Join us in prayer that each of these Churches will organize Training Unions this coming year and have a program of Study which will inspire them to have good Training Unions.

The Training Union Associational Officers have assisted in teaching and planning 14 Training Union Study Courses, two Group Schools, and helped in clinics when called upon. We have enjoyed working in each Church that we have had an invitation to participate in Training Schools and look forward to hearing from them again.

Our Associational Meetings for the last year have been very well attended but not as many Churches represented as we hoped for. While we did not have a Training Union Study Course in every church—let's press forward toward the Goal of 3,000 awards or more for next year. With our Enlargement Campaign coming up April 5-12 we should have no trouble in reaching this Goal. Our Goal in Florida according to the State Training Union Department is to have a 20% increased enrollment in Training Union. If you have not written Mr. Radford for a pamphlet on "How to Enlarge Your Training Union" do so now.

Did you know? That the State Training Union Department has announced that the State Sword Drill and Young People Speaker's Tournament winners for 1953 will be given \$25.00 each towards their expenses to Ridgecrest if they win at DeLand. Will our Association furnish the winners next year to the District, State and Ridgecrest? For many years Florida winners have been "tops" at Ridgecrest. Wouldn't it be fine for Florida Association to have the winner next year.

Mr. Training Union Director, begin now to work with your Pastor and Training Union Officers to make this the greatest "M" Night in Florida Association. Last year the total attendance was 13,838 in the State with 642 Churches represented. Our Goal for Florida is 15,000 in attendance with 700 Churches. What will our Association do toward meeting that goal? I am asking each Church to set their Goal, and inform the Associational Training Union Director as soon as possible, so we can count on your Church to do its part, in the "Kick-Off" on December 5th, Mobilization Night for the Training Union Department.

Our Associational Officers' Clinic will be at Marianna—January 26th, 1953. Plan to send your Training Union Officers to this Clinic. Mr. Radford has arranged for about the best Faculty in the land, he says, as follows: Harvey T. Gibson, Nashville, Tenn., David Mashburn, Augusta, Ga., John Maguire, our own Executive Secretary, Jacksonville, Miss Laverne Ashby, Nashville, H. E. Rid-enour, Jr., Warren Capell, and Mr. Radford from our State Department.

Please Note: Dates for Assemblies—June 11-19, Florida Baptist Assembly, DeLand; June 30-July 8, East Coast Assembly, Stuart; —West Florida Assembly, Panama City—and plan to send a bus load or at least a car to one or more of the Assemblies next Summer. This is the place where so many of our young people and Intermediates dedicate and consecrate their lives for full time Christian Service. Let's make our Unions Stand-ard so that we may get the maximum good from our Training Unions and attain our "Goal of Spiritual Excellence for every member of the Training Union." Unless each member of the Training Union has a real spiritual experience each Sunday in the Union, we are not accomplishing our purpose.

BAPTIST STUDENT TRAINING UNION REPORT

I rejoice that our own denomination is aroused to great activity to match the need of the day in which we live. Years ago Dr. John L. Hill made the statement to a group of students that he had reached this definite conclusion, I quote, "That my best chance to contribute to the solution of the world's problems is to do my best to make my church what Jesus would have it be. I don't have to wait until I go to Africa to settle something, or to Japan, China or Europe. But I am where I am, and I shall be where I shall be and I am living now, and if I'm going to make any impress on my day I must make it right now." Recently I browsed through the proceedings of the Fourth All-Southern Baptist Student Conference meeting in Memphis in 1936. I noted that the students who were serving Christ in that day are serving him now all over the world. Edgar Hallock's message on "My Experience with Christ in Winning Souls" has carried him to Brazil as a missionary.

The plan of the Baptist Student Union is for an organized group to serve as a connecting link between the college and the churches. The plan provides for all Baptist students an attractive program of activities including every spiritual interest. The plan is to promote spiritual advancement through sustained Bible study, earnest prayer, student evangelism, mission study, and campus conquest, for the advancement of the kingdom of God. The plan is workable and Southern Baptist students attempt it.

The purpose is for students to transmit Christ on a college campus. Through Baptist Student Union students are enabled to

provide an adequate Christian program, to promote a church-centered program, to plan intelligently a spiritual program, and to pray for visitors in a collegiate program. The purpose is for students to reach other students for Christ. The purpose is for students to make vital student and college-church relationship. The purpose is for students to serve Christ willingly and effectively on a campus. The purpose is a challenge and Southern Baptist students accept it.

In addition to his state student responsibilities this year Rev. Ray Koonce is directing the program at the University of Florida as local BSU Secretary. Mrs. Koonce is assisting on a part-time basis until a full-time associate to work with women students can be secured. Full-time student directors again this year are Mrs. Lloyd Rees, University of Miami; Mary Elizabeth Ainsworth, Florida State University; and Bill McCammon, Stetson University, who returns after a year's leave of absence to work on his doctorate at Southwestern last year. Mrs. J. C. Permenter is serving Florida Southern at Lakeland on a part-time basis. We have organized work at University of Tampa and St. Petersburg Junior College.

Last year the BSU at Florida State attained First Magnitude requirements. This is the highest recognition that can come to BSU on a local campus. It was the only BSU on a state university campus meeting these requirements last year.

We have four Baptist student centers in Florida. Three of them have been built within the past three years. The student center at Florida State, built in 1937, is well equipped but inadequate now to meet the needs of the hosts of Baptist and Baptist preference students on the campus.

Students from all over Florida will gather at the Riverside Baptist Church, Miami, October 17-19, for their annual Baptist Student Convention. Remember this group as you pray for many important decisions are made each year during these days.

We appreciate this opportunity to present this all important program of our Florida Baptist work and thank you for its financial support through the cooperative program, and encourage your continued prayerful support for the student directors on these campuses.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

THE FIELD IS THE WORLD. . . . A report of the services and achievements accomplished through the Foreign Mission Board could never be made by the use of statistics alone. Spiritual contributions and accomplishments cannot be measured by figures. Figures alone applied to the ministry of Jesus while he was on earth would prove him a failure. With this thought in mind let us take a look at a brief summary of the figures: Southern Baptist have, at the beginning of 1952, a total of 832 missionaries who are serving 30 countries of the world. They are associated with 3,000 national Baptist workers in 1900 organized churches which have a total of 189,225 members. These churches operate 3660 mission points which have an enrolment of 17,700. During the year, 18,372 members were added to the churches by baptism.

The objective in all these countries is to develop indigenous churches which will become evangelizing agencies of their own people. Therefore, the churches promote the various organizations for training, teaching, and promoting that our churches in America have—Sunday Schools, Training Unions, Woman's Missionary Societies and auxiliaries.

In many fields, Christian schools are imperatively needed to train Christian workers. Through the Conventions, 400 schools are operated which have 49,000 pupils. There are also 18 high schools and 14 seminaries.

These churches and schools must have supplies of Christian literature of all kinds. To meet this need, there are five publication houses. Five hospitals, 10 dispensaries and five clinics ministered to patients in areas where medical facilities are available for only small margins of the population.

To comprehend the full significance of these achievements, we must keep in mind the confused and unstable condition in the areas of the world in which our missionary work is done. In many of these areas uncertainty is the only form of certainty. Advance in missions is achieved in most instances despite a multitude of forces that obstruct the way ahead. May we express gratitude to the missionaries and to the nationals of all countries where we serve, and to God without whom no achievements would have been possible.

THAT THE WORLD MAY KNOW. . . . We are not to think of home missions as set over in competition with foreign missions as if the two were set on separate levels; but we are to think of home and foreign missions as complementary parts of the one mission program of Christ. Fundamentally, home missions is the expression in the homeland of the same divine urge that causes the disciples of Christ to join forces in sending missionaries to lands afar.

A summary of the work of our Home Mission Board shows a total of 1170 workers, including 305 student workers and 68 missionary-pastors on new fields being supported in part by the Board. 36,390 conversions, 669 new churches opened, and 239 new churches constituted are reported.

Work under Direct Missions Department includes work with Chinese, deaf, French, Good Will Centers, Indians, Italian, Japanese, Spanish-Speaking peoples and Rescue Mission Work. Department of Jewish Evangelism continues to grow through special visitation in homes and through local churches. The Negro work under Guy Bellamy is reaching more people than ever before. Negro leaders everywhere are appreciative of our assistance and all agree that the best way for us to help them is to continue the work of training their leaders. Education, schools of missions, publicity, and promotion are fields through which our people keep pace with the ever-growing need. There are now nine churches and four mission stations in Alaska, our summer mission program covered work in 26 states, as well as Cuba, Alaska and Panama. Pioneer ranch ministry and migrant work offer opportunities for carrying the Gospel to the uttermost parts of many communities and unchurched territories.

No work that we can do in America today will mean so much to the rehabilitation of the world as the evangelization of America.

40. The report on Baptist Papers was read by C. W. McDonald who moved that it be adopted. W. A. Robinson seconded the motion. G. A. Ratteree, in the absence of W. P. Everson, spoke briefly to the report. The motion carried.

THE REPORT ON BAPTIST PAPERS

More than a century ago our Baptist leaders were convinced of the value and importance of the publicized information of our denominational activities. Hence, 20 years before the Southern Baptist Convention was organized, the Baptist press was established for the express purpose of disseminating Kingdom interest and Gospel truth.

More and more we are becoming convinced that our people cannot and will not love a cause of which they have little or no knowledge, and we cannot expect them to support that cause which they do not know about. Thirty-seven years ago the late Dr. George W. Truett was one of a committee on editorial and educational work, while the Southern Baptist Convention was in session

at Baltimore, Maryland, in which this statement was given: "The zeal that lasts, and grows, and triumphs, is a zeal which is according to knowledge."

The denominational paper is the connecting link between the Lord's people and the Lord's work. Twelve years ago, a definite and vigorous campaign was launched to increase the circulation of our denominational papers, at which time Dr. Louie D. Newton of Atlanta was chosen to head a committee and to push this important matter. This effort has resulted in far-reaching effect and today many hundreds and thousands of our Baptist lay constituency are now reading our Baptist papers and publications along with our pastors and leaders in the denomination.

All of our Southern states are now publishing and supporting their respective state Baptist papers. Among these we mention our own state paper, the Florida Baptist Witness, which stands out with no small prominence as one among the very best of our weekly Baptist papers. Rev. W. G. Stracener is our worthy and scholarly and capable editor: We should, therefore, encourage all of our churches to place in their budgets our state paper and, where possible, some of our convention-wide weekly and monthly periodicals.

THE SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

As we face the vast field of human relations, we are made to realize that, as Christians, we have a tremendous challenge—a challenge concerning the social and moral issues of our day. To meet this challenge our churches and denominational schools must continue to produce men and women of character and integrity who will take with them the ideals of the Christian faith into their professional, social and domestic living.

The church of Jesus Christ should launch a crusade for righteousness, morality, justice and love to save society from disintegration. The Ten Commandments and the principles and teachings of Jesus must be preached, taught, accepted, obeyed and practiced in human relationships. The pagan spirit is increasing in America today at an alarming degree and expresses itself in drinking, gambling, immorality, broken homes, divorce, crime, the desecration of the Lord's Day, the worship of the physical, selfishness and greed, and in other ways. Even church members are guilty of these things. We deplore this state of affairs and call upon the churches and pastors to wage war against it.

Beverage Alcohol

According to Arnold Toynbee, the eminent historian, the two great menaces to civilization are racism and alcohol. Strong drink continues to bring death and destruction to our State and Nation. Beverage alcohol continues to destroy lives, property, homes, ideals, morals, faith and happiness. Liquor is the greatest evil in America and causes more harm perhaps than all other social evils combined.

We wish to highly commend the Leon County Dry Crusade, headed by Dr. Harold G. Sanders, in helping defeat the efforts of the wets in trying to take our county. Also we wish to thank the Leon Better Citizens League for all the excellent work being done for Temperance and the defeat of the liquor business.

The membership to Leon Better Citizens League is on a three-fold basis namely: individual membership, organizational membership, and church membership (consisting of pastor plus two others—either male or female).

The aims of the Leon Better Citizens League are:

1. To encourage the efforts and cooperation among all groups and individuals working for better citizenship and law enforcement;
2. Respect for, obedience to, and enforcement of the laws, with immediate attention being given to beverage laws;
3. Crusading for civic and moral righteousness;
4. Encourage full civic responsibility by all citizens—especially voting;
5. Encourage high-type men to seek public office, and elicit full clarification of the policies of candidates for the guidance of the public; **we will not endorse candidates;**
6. To promote the civic, moral and social welfare of all citizens;
7. To intensify education for abstinence from alcohol and other narcotics through schools, churches, other organizations, radio and press.

We today are beginning to realize that the Christian forces should be as wise as the liquor interests and project a great educational campaign against beverage alcohol. We should use our churches, Sunday Schools, our homes and our Christian colleges in this campaign—to teach the evils of alcohol, to urge total abstinence and discourage social drinking. Our pulpits should ring out strongly in the anti-liquor crusade. Christian people should refrain from drinking.

Race Relations

We are sure that significant progress is being made in dealing with the delicate problems of race relationship. There is a strong evidence that race relations in the South are improving. Prejudice and misunderstanding are gradually and slowly giving way to Education, Christian attitudes and improved economic conditions. Better school buildings are being erected for Negroes and better salaries are being paid their teachers, which is an indication that a more equitable division of the public funds is being made. Also in many of the Southern cities the housing of the Negroes is gradually being improved. Progress is being made in spite of the harmful influence of certain politicians and deep rooted sensitiveness of many people on the race question. **The problem of race**

relations can be solved only by Christian attitudes and Christian relationships. Our people must face the question on a Christian basis, and deal with it by the Golden Rule given us by our Master.

Gambling

Gambling and evils associated with it are nation and world-wide. Christians of today seem to be indifferent to this evil and have little conscience on the question. There is very little effort to oppose and combat it. Church members, themselves, engage in gambling and teach it to the young.

Millions of Americans gamble by playing Bingo and games of chance. They engage in horse racing and dog racing. People gamble with slot machines, on athletic contests and on almost everything. The radio networks with their give away programs and the picture houses with their jackpot nights are contributing to the gambling spirit. It has been said that America is becoming a nation of gamblers. Let us continue to fight this and all social evils as we proclaim the Kingdom of God and his righteousness at home and abroad.

52. A. Pichard read the report on the Children's Home and moved that it be adopted. Harold G. Sanders seconded the motion. B. W. Burns, Pastor of the First Baptist Church of Marianna, spoke to the report. The report was adopted.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Home continues to expand its facilities. We have recently added a cottage for children of pre-school age. This cottage houses both boys and girls and has enabled them to increase the enrollment by 12. The number taken care of in the building has been purposely kept low because of the attention required by a little child. Those who do group work with children have found that a small child gets along better and develops more rapidly when he is given considerable personal attention. This is the seventh cottage for children and completes the first unit of the new Institution.

The farm and dairy are important in the operation of the Home. They get many of the vegetables used in their dining rooms from the farm and all the milk they can use from the dairy. The average milk production for the past four months has been about 260 quarts per day. The calves are kept for future dairy cattle and for beef. There are 96 head in the herd. They expect to produce a large percent of the meat used on the campus. The Home has an excellent pasture of 130 acres, 40 of which are planted with improved pasture grass.

Applications for admission from October 1, 1951 to September 1, 1952 have exceeded those of any similar period for which there are records. The total number of applicants for the 11 months

was 478. This indicates a feeling on the part of many people throughout the state that they can help at the Children's Home, and it also shows a need for better care than the child can receive in his local situation. They admitted 92 children during the year which left 386 applications that were withdrawn, dropped because of a lack of interest on the part of those making them, and for a lack of space in the Institution. They turned away some children who should have been admitted because they did not have the room. Mother's Aid was given in some cases, if there were wholesome family ties, and the child was permitted to stay with his parent.

They admitted 92 and discharged 52 children during the year. The total number under the care of the Institution during the past Associational year was 168.

Your Committee wishes to call to your attention the Special Offering which will be taken for the Home November 23. This is in keeping with the spirit of Thanksgiving and is the time when most of the Children's Homes in the Southern Baptist Convention ask for special gifts. They are not asking for funds for building this year. They want us to help feed and clothe our children. We want every church in this Association to give something for the care of the children in the Home. The increase in enrollment, the Mother's Aid Program, and boarding home care will require more funds. If your church cannot make an offering at the suggested time, set a date that will be convenient for you and make it then. It is important to you and to the Home that you have a part in it. If you give to children, you will get a blessing; the child will get a blessing; and your church will be spiritually stimulated.

The Apostle Paul in his charge to the elders of Ephesus said, in Acts 20 and 35, "I have showed you all things, how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how he said, It is more blessed to give than to receive."

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

It is important here to make a proper evaluation of the status of Christian Education among Southern Baptist. It is not difficult to give evidence of the tremendous contributions of these institutions to the life of our denomination.

The Christian college, Seminary and Training School has given to our denomination 806 of the 827 missionaries now serving on the foreign field. More than 70% of our college trained denominational leaders received their schooling in our denominational colleges. A great amount of our progress in all fields will be measured by our proportion of college trained leadership.

Our 69 institutions of learning are valued at One Hundred forty-five millions of dollars in terms of endowment and property values. In all of our schools there is an upsurge of interest and a program of expansion.

Why do we not make full use of our splendid colleges?

Why do we invest our monies in them and send our sons and daughters elsewhere?

Apparently because we know so little about them and the opportunities involved. Where else can we rest assured that the basic fundamental of education will be encouraged: man's relation with his Creator. Where else can we be confident that our sons and daughters will return with a growing faith in a living God, instead of a god-less faith and undermined moral incentives.

Report of Seminaries

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Dr. Duke K. McCall succeeded Dr. Ellis Fuller who died October 29, 1950. Two new faculty members were added during the past year in keeping with the Seminary's policy of increasing the size of the faculty as rapidly as possible and advisable. The oldest of our seminaries is developing a special program reaching outside the pastoral ministry into specialized fields to meet a growing need.

THE SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Southwestern's School of Music has been accredited by the American Association of Schools of Religious Education. A Department of Pastoral Ministry, including personal counseling has been added to the School of Theology. An increase in the faculty of 38, new dormitories and increased income for student expenses are reported as apparent needs by Dr. E. D. Head, President.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

The student body has more than doubled during the past six years. The new 75 acre campus on Gentilly Boulevard will be occupied in September, 1953. Dr. Roland Q. Leavell, President, says, "New Orleans and its environs form America's most potential mission field. Those who give to New Orleans Seminary get double for their money. They get their money's worth in home mission work and also in ministerial and missionary training."

GOLDEN GATE BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Situated in Berkeley, Calif., Golden Gate Seminary is beginning its third year as a Southern Baptist institution. Dr. Harold K. Graves is the new president and already a program of expansion and remodeling is underway. Situated in the populous West where 7 out of 10 people belong to no church. Dr. Fred L. Fisher is the new Professor in New Testament.

SOUTHEASTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

Southeastern Seminary is gradually taking over the buildings of Wake Forest College but this year only 200 of the 400 applications could be accepted due to housing facilities. Six new faculty members have been added. Dr. Sydnor L. Stealey, president, says, "Our urgent needs are for student aid funds and for Endowment."
