CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

Article II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

Article III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

Article IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

Article VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

Article VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

Article VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be ex-officio members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of all cooperating churches in the Association; and where there is no pastor, a layman shall be elected; in addition thereto, as many as ten men and women may be named to the Committee, as deemed wise by the Nominating Committee during the Annual Association, or the Committee on Nominations of the Executive Committee ad interim. The Committee shall have power to fill vacancies occurring between the meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him,

and (2) any member who dies during the year. The heads of the departments shall be members of the Executive Committee. This committee may meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

Article IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds sent up for that purpose by the churches.

Article X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Article XI. This Association shall have power: **first**, to provide for the general union of the churches; **second**, to counsel with any church in difficulty; **third**, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; **fourth**, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; **fifth**, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in Annual meeting; **sixth**, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; **seventh**, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

Article XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

Article I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

Article II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

Article III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

Article IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

Article V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

Article VI. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and shall never finally fall away.

Article VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immer-

sion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

Article VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

Article IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

Article X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.

3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.

4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.

5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

Climaxing the Five-Year Crusade of the Home Mission Board, the emphasis this year is on witnessing for Christ. In the Board's objective to lead every individual Christian to become a more effective witness it is hoped that the Christian testimony may be given among the minority groups, the neglected, and the underprivileged. Not only is it necessary for the individual to witness but every church ought to manifest its interest as a body in the unreached. Then churches, associations, and groups of churches working together are supporting local missions and building new churches.

Last Year's Record (1953)

During 1953 the Home Mission Board had 937 regular missionaries and employed 366 youths in the Student Summer Mission Program, making a total of 1,303 missionaries. Dr. J. B. Lawrence rounded out his tenure as executive secretary-treasurer and was

succeeded by Dr. Courts Redford. The missionary staff gave full tribute to Dr. Lawrence in his last year of leadership by vigorously promoting the Board's work and assured Dr. Redford of full co-operation in planning for the future.

Soul-winning Was Paramount

In the meetings and regular work of the missionaries 31,849 conversions were reported. Professions of faith reported by Baptist chaplains numbered 17,912 and baptisms reported in evangelism crusades led by members of the evangelistic staff numbered 6,140, making a grand total of conversions reported under either direct or indirect ministry of home missionaries 55,901.

New Units of Work

In the reports of home missionaries for 1953 it was revealed that 284 new churches were constituted and 706 new missions opened. The missionaries entered into the "Million More in '54" program and organized many new classes and mission Sunday schools. Even mission churches open missions and missions start missions before they become churches. Thus new units are constantly becoming new churches.

14. W. A. Robinson brought the Annual Sermon which was a challenging message from Revelation 3:7-13, THE OPEN DOOR. He led the closing prayer and offered thanks for the food which was served immediately following.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

We have 37 churches in our association with 23 Societies of which 2 are new, namely, Thomas Memorial of Quincy and Seminole of Tallahassee and Sopchoppy reorganized. Total membership 1226.

There were 23 Mission Study Classes with 1565 attending.

The Young People's Work under the leadership of Mrs. Jack Bridges have reported 69 Auxiliaries in 17 churches with 1022 membership. G.A.'s from 6 churches attended the Coronation Banquet at Havana Baptist church with 30 Awards in Coronation given. A Leadership Study Class for Auxiliaries Leaders was held with 60 attending. 4 new churches have organized Young People's Auxiliaries during the year.

First Quarterly Meeting was held January 14 with Chattahoochee Baptist Church with 148 attending. State R.A. Secretary: Mr. Armand Baal as speaker.

Second Quarterly Meeting was held April 13 with Lakeview Baptist Church Tallahassee, 137 attending. Florida W.M.U. Associational president: Mrs. Isham W. Shepherd gave the High Lights of State W.M.U. Convention.

The combined W.M.U. Quarterly Meeting and Young People's Rally was held July 27 with Monticello First Baptist Church with 83 W. M. S. Members and 100 Young People attending. Miss Lillian Robertson, a teacher in a University in the Philippine Islands was speaker.

Fourth Quarterly Meeting was held September 29 with Havana Baptist Church with 81 attending, the attendance being greatly reduced because of the polio epidemic. State W.M.U. Secretary: Miss Josephine Jones and Miss Mary Northington: W.M.U. State Secretary of Tennessee leading in the Instruction of Woman's Missionary work. Rev. W. A. Robinson, pastor of Havana, installed the officers for ensuing year. (Officers printed in other section of minute).

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

The first two or three months of the year a number of close surveys were made in the Eastern section of greater Tallahassee known as Indian Head Acres for the purpose of opening new work in that area. A lot of about two acres were located on the West side and adjoining the site for the New Grammar school in said area that could be purchased and used for church purposes. Immanuel Baptist church agreed to sponsor the new work and accepted the opportunity. The State Mission Board assisted the sponsoring church to purchase the lot. The sponsoring church took a Religious survey of the area and is making preparations to open the work as soon as possible.

The entire area of greater Tallahassee and adjoining areas have been surveyed for the purpose of establishing New Work. The areas where work should be opened as soon as possible are as follows: Forest Heights North West of the city, Epps Heights in the South West section of the area, Jacksonville Road beyond the City limits, a new but important area developing directly North of the city limits, between Meridian and Thomasville Roads known as Waverly Hills. A lot in this area should be secured at once.

The Baptist in Quincy have organized a new church, Thomas Memorial Baptist Church. Two or three new Sunday Schools have been organized within the Association, also Training Unions as will appear in those reports.

Your Committee brings the following recommendations:

1. That the strongest Missions Committee possible be maintained.
2. The Association create a fund for the purpose of purchasing sites and assist in doing so, for new work in needy areas.

20. D. A. Avant read the Sunday School report and moved its adoption subject to correction as all of the Associational letters come in. After a second by Truett, C. J. Smyly spoke to the report on the subject LET US GO ON. It passed.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We are happy to say that every church in our Association now has a Sunday School except one, Arran. In addition, we have two mission schools, or a total of 36 schools, all well organized and doing splendid work.

This has been our greatest year in at least two respects, training and enrollment. Our workers earned 2282 training awards this year as compared with 1116 the previous year. Early in the year (Nov. 30-Dec. 4) at First Church, Tallahassee, a central training school was held, which was directed by Mr. C. F. Barry, State Secretary, assisted by nine State and Southwide approved workers. Administration books were taught in the nine departments. About four hundred of our workers attended this school, which closed with a training banquet on Friday night, Dec. 4.

During the year we have had a net increase in enrollment of 1321, or about 15 per cent. During the previous year, because of the formation of the Gadsden Association and some of our churches reporting to it, we had a net loss of 137 in enrollment. Even so, we doubled our enrollment during the past ten years, with an average annual net gain of 420. At the rate of increase we had during this last year it will take only about four and one-half years to double our present enrollment of 9705.

The past year, while one of accomplishments, has really been one of preparation, training and the lifting of visions. We have become conscious of the throngs of unchurched people about us, and have been made to realize, in some degree at least, their need of a Saviour, and the value of the Sunday School in winning them. We have learned, for instance, that one out of three regular attendants in Sunday School is won to Christ in one year's time, whereas only one out of 240 not in Sunday School is won in the same length of time.

Furthermore, we have gotten some insight into correct methods of reaching, teaching, and winning these people to Christ. We recognize seven fundamental laws of Sunday School growth. First, we must have additional workers, Second, we must train these workers, Third, we must have small classes, Fourth, we must have more classes and more departments, Fifth, we must grade closely on the age basis, Sixth, we must observe Promotion Day annually through the entire school, and, Seventh, we must VISIT. Withal we have learned that people can be won, men, women and children of all ages. For every person, in sickness or in health, from infancy to old age, and regardless of occupation, we have a place in Sunday School.

It is our desire during the new year, not only to continue the growth begun, but, in the meantime, to enter wholeheartedly into the Evangelistic Crusade in our respective churches. A growing, thriving Sunday School has proved beyond doubt to be the best method of winning the lost. The larger the Sunday School in proportion to the church membership, the more people we will bring to Christ. Winning the lost, after all, is primal with every earnest Sunday School Worker.

We long to see the day when the enrollment in our Association will equal or exceed the church membership, which now is 12,429. To reach this number we need 2,754 new enrollees immediately, or a 30% increase. This would be a worthy goal. Are we willing to undertake it?

We have made a good beginning, now "Let Us Go On".

We hope and pray that there will be some reactivating and revivals in our Brotherhoods during the coming year. SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

In studying previous reports on Social Service, I find the subjects included are: Marriage and divorce, economic dangers, our prison system and crime, gambling, race problems, especially the new problems developing relative to segregation, comic books and obscene literature control, and the alcoholic beverage problems. Every adult Christian knows and realizes these evils that come within the proper consideration of our Social Service Commission.

I shall not tire you with a long discussion of statistics, but would like to say, rather than decreasing, we find them to be ever increasing. For example, more than a million wives and children throughout the United States in 1953, were receiving state aid as a result of having been "Deserted" by fathers. Whether this can be attributed to the increase in population, or the lack of effort on the part of Christians, I cannot say.

Discussing the subject of gambling, there are several facts given by Judge Renfro in the 1953 report that I would like to quote and keep before us as to what is being done about gambling. "The tremendous effect on the people of this nation through television, has brought about a more honest understanding of the extensive operations carried on in the gambling enterprise. In Florida, not only has the Kefauver Committee been active, but the committees of the State Legislature and several past governors in insisting that the gambling laws be enforced. Certain laws have been passed in Florida in the past few years and the gambling stamp law in Federal Congress, which have been helpful in enforcement and obtaining convictions. I definitely feel that people are wiser on this subject and their knowledge is having its effect in wise legislation, honest enforcement, and a substantial decrease in illegal gambling."

The second important area of activity that has taken place recently, and one that bears close observation, is the race relations and desegregation problems. As it is a growing concern, it is difficult to tell as yet, what solutions will come. Preparedness to act in a Christian way, will certainly be the answer to all problems that derive from this activity.

The third area that recent action has been taken to remedy is the problem of obscene literature and vicious comic books. Our youth in concerted action throughout the nation has succeeded in forcing the issue to a conclusion. A self-imposed censorship has been established by the factories and publishers that turn out the greatest volume of this type literature. This promises to eliminate a serious evil that has grown through the years to alarming proportions. Excellent work has been done by the teen-agers of this community toward bringing these evils to light.

The last and perhaps most important subject concerns alcoholic beverages. To me, the most important approach to this is "what can we do about the sale of beer—which is far greater than other beverages." In my work with the Juvenile Court, I find because of the easy way to obtain beer and the "cheap" price, thousands turn to that, who cannot afford higher priced beverages, causing more than 50% of all my cases. So let's down with legalized beer along with other alcoholic beverages and cooperate fully with the United Florida Drys and other preventive organizations.

According to statistics, Juvenile Delinquency is on the increase at an alarming rate, but this is not true in our associational area, and could we curb drink, that would end more than 75% of the delinquency problem. Someone has said, "Saving a child is Christianity with its sleeves rolled up." So may we work while it is yet day in promoting the wonderful program we as Southern Baptist have organized for our children.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The year 1953-54 has been the year we sought to "Keep the Faith". This was launched at the "M" Night program held at Leon High School Auditorium with Howard Butts speaker. The attendance reached the one thousand mark and more.

The Executive Committee met in October with Mr. Ridenour, State worker, present and plans and emphasis were made for the year which might be summarized in one word "Efficiency". Thus there was planned Leadership Training by districts.

The first Leadership school was held at Gretna and a Training Union was organized in the local church. The second was held at Crawfordville with two State Workers assisting. The Third was held at Monticello First with a Training Union organized in the church, and every church in the district participated in the Leadership School. The last was held in the Tallahassee area in connection with the City Wide Training School. A full staff of State Workers taught the Leadership books.

The efficiency of Associational officers was improved by attendance at the State Planning meeting at Marianna and Ridgecrest. Two car loads of people attended these meetings.

The second emphasis was a Study Course in every church. This was launched by using the "Faith Books." The statistics will reveal the number of awards earned.

The third emphasis was New Training Unions—Telogia, Gretna, Monticello First, and St. Marks. The Associational letters will reveal the facts of this work. There are 3,325 members enrolled by churches reporting.

The Fourth emphasis was the participation of Youth in all the Associational work and programs. In this respect the Association leads out in the South by having a Special Youth Program each year usually in September. This year, however a Mass Youth Choir of one hundred voices was featured at "M" night. Youth speakers were used at the June programs on Christian Citizenship and at a final Youth Program in September featuring the Special Youth workers who assisted in State and Home Mission fields. The attendance at this meeting reached two hundred. The Florida Association Training Union won both the Sword Drill and Better Speak-

ers contest in the regional district. The Association was well represented in all the assemblies by workers and Young People.

All of our goals were not reached, and our weak point to work on for next year is better attendance at Officers and Leader's meetings.

In looking to the future there is a suggested Calendar of activities we wish to submit as our plans for the New Year. (Calendar printed with other Associational Calendar in other part of minute.)

29. Mary Elizabeth Ainsworth read the report of the Baptist Student Union and moved its adoption. Charles Meadows made the second and then Betty Jean Nichols, President of the B.S.U. at F.S.U., spoke to the report on WHAT THE B.S.U. MEANS TO ME. It passed.

REPORT OF THE BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union of Florida State University is one of the four universities in Florida with a full-time student director employed by our Florida Baptist Convention. Rev. Ray Koonce is the director of the Florida Baptist Student Union Department. He and his associate, Miss Audrey Evans, directed the work at the University of Florida, Gainesville. Dr. Bill McCammon is the director of religious activities on the Stetson campus and a member of the faculty. Mrs. Lloyd Rees is the director at the University of Miami. The Baptist Student Union is organized on the campuses of Florida Southern, Lakeland, and the University of Tampa, Tampa, Florida. Mr. Clyde Hall has recently been employed by the department to assume the responsibility of these two campus. Miss Judith Borchers has assumed the work of Miss Audrey Evans, now Mrs. Bill Cowley, at the University of Florida this fall.

The program of the Baptist Student Union provides the individual student an opportunity for spiritual growth through attendance and participation in varied activities on the campus and in the churches. A Baptist Student Center "a home away from home" is provided where there is a full-time director. The chief purpose of the work is to be a connecting link for the student in his vital relationship in a local Baptist church. His training and experience during college days is to fit him for his role in the church and community of which he will become a part following graduation.

The campus program is promoted through an executive council composed of students elected annually. It is a church-centered program. Every unit organization of the church is represented on the council. An extensive extension program includes participation in study courses, week-end revivals, supply work, hospital, jail and road camp services. Students are encouraged to tithe through their church and give sacrificially to the annual foreign and home mission offerings which totaled \$395.63. In addition to this they gave \$401 to the student mission fund promoted by the student department.

A full program of weekly activities including vespers, morning watch, seminars, prayer-partners, life service group, choir, group parties, and special emphasis are highlights at the student center.

The student center at Florida State completed in 1937 is now inadequate to meet the needs of some 1400 Baptist and Baptist preference students each year. During the past year two lots at the rear of the house have been purchased and landscaped for future expansion.

We are grateful for the fine cooperation from pastors and church leadership during the past year. Please continue to support us with your prayers, personal encouragement, and abiding interest.

REPORT ON BAPTIST PAPERS

Slowly but surely we believe it is beginning to dawn upon right-thinking Christian citizens that "people do what they read".

On the one hand we have, for example, the recent statement of the National Council of Juvenile Court Judges in an adopted resolution which said in part:

"Comic books and horror magazines depicting crime, sadism, vulgar sex and horror scenes contribute toward the moral breakdown of our children today (and are) often responsible for the criminal in adult life.

"The character of juvenile delinquency is no longer the thoughtless acts of children, but in all too many instances is the consequence of stimulation by these publications.

"These are not comics, but 'tragedies', resulting in acts of violence, armed robbery, rape, torture and even homicide. We daily

see the tragic and pitiful consequences of these vicious and vile publications which now condition the minds of our children."

The judges called for action on federal, state and local levels to "outlaw, curtail and prohibit the publication, dissemination and distribution" of such publications.

On the other hand, we could recite repeated testimonies of people whose homes have been strengthened and families blessed by the reading of Christian publications, and of churches which have become more vitally evangelistic and more generously missionary through the use of their denominational paper.

Southern Baptists are increasing their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as fast as our people will make use of the publications, which is not yet fast enough for the best results. Last year the Sunday School Board printed and distributed 54,145,087 copies of its periodicals, plus 3,914,880 books, plus more than 210 million tracts.

The publications of the various agencies and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have a total circulation of more than 800,000 copies per issue.

At this year's Convention the 22 Baptist State Papers reported their total circulation as 1,117,462.

Our own **FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS** (as of August 1, 1954) is reaching 34,717 subscribers and continues slowly and steadily to increase its circulation. There are at least 35,000 more Baptist homes in Florida into which their churches are not sending the paper. Let every church co-operate in reaching these at the earliest possible time.

One of the best investments any church can make is to send the **Baptist Witness** to every family in the membership through the simple Church Budget Plan, to be paid in easy monthly installments.

Our association is requested to elect an **Associational Witness Representative** who will help enlist the churches in a wider and more effective use of the paper and to whom the editor may look for counsel in the important work of increasing the circulation in this association.

36. H. C. Meador read report on Assemblies after which he moved its adoption. J. B. Ansley made the second and it was passed.

REPORT ON ASSEMBLIES

The Leadership of our Baptist work long years ago learned the value of summer Assemblies in our work. Florida was among the first and for a long time the only state to offer a comprehensive Summer Assembly program to the members of our churches. This program at present has developed to three state operated assemblies. Namely, DeLand Assembly, West Florida Assembly and East Coast Assembly. There are the Royal Ambassador and Girl's Auxiliary camps, and the Harmony Bay Music Camp at Panama City. In addition to these many of our associations have developed an assembly program. This all points in one direction: Better trained church membership and leadership. An informed people is a pro-

gressive people. We need to give careful attention to the further development of our summer assemblies. On the southwide level we now have Ridgecrest and Glorietta with a full summer program each year to offer the leadership of our Churches.

Statistics were not available on our state operated assemblies during this past summer but as you recall reading in the Florida Baptist Witness each one enjoyed a capacity crowd and much enthusiasm was manifested. Surely we will continue to pray for our Assembly program.

After five years lapse we again revived our Local Associational Assembly better known to all of us as Silver Lake Assembly. A comparison of the five assemblies held at Silver Lake I believe this past year was the best yet held. It was the most congenial and co-operative group ever to assemble at the Lake. Words of praise continue to come in about the work there this summer. Much enthusiasm was expressed about the assembly for next year and many have already said we want to come back.

May we express to each of the pastors and church workers our sincere appreciation for whatever part you had in the promotion of and the execution of our Silver Lake Assembly. We deeply appreciate your interest. The enthusiasm manifested by the boys, girls and adults during this week of June 21-25 certainly justified all the effort we put forth.

We have the Assembly in our calendar for next June 20-24. BUT we would like to advise you now that there are a limited number of beds available, to be exact 155. We could move in some 20 or 30 cots, if we could get the cots and pads thus providing for 175-185. So when the first publicity comes out about the Assembly this next year get your registrations in. First Come First Served basis will be used this next summer.

REPORT ON THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

"Your English Bible speaks to my head, but my Chinese Bible speaks to my heart."

These words of a Chinese student express a missionary principle true in all lands:

**Every person must have the Bible in his own language
if the Word of God is to speak to his heart**

The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. He uses it in every form of mission work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave and keep on working in a man's heart.

The American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and distributes them without profit, usually below cost. In cases of special need at home and abroad, they are given without charge. Scriptures for the Blind are supplied in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records. The Society serves every form of Southern Baptist mission work around the world.

During 1953 the American Bible Society—

- distributed throughout the world more than 15 million volumes of Scriptures.
- in the U. S. A. distributed 9,726,391 Scripture volumes in 81 languages.
- helped the Japan Bible Society to continue its systematic program of widespread distribution of the Scriptures in that land.
- continued to supply Scriptures in Korea, through the Korean Bible Society, for civilians, military personnel and prisoners of war.
- strengthened its work throughout Latin America, where Scripture distribution by thousands of volunteer workers is producing outstanding missionary results.
- supplied some 500,000 volumes of Scriptures for refugees in Western Germany and materials for 400,000 Bibles and Testaments in Iron Curtain countries.
- provided 1,301,145 Scripture volumes for our own Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to more than 12 million volumes.
- received gifts which made possible its largest budget—and adopted for 1954 an even greater program to meet expanding needs for Scriptures around the world.

Southern Baptists' Part in the Work

In 1953, Southern Baptist churches gave \$102,010 to the American Bible Society.

Gifts from churches of all denominations totaled \$785,897. Southern Baptist gifts continued to stand in second place, exceeded only by Methodist gifts of \$148,724.

REPORT ON BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Statistics for 1953

A total of 36,076 people were admitted for all types of care. Of these, 19,329 were bed patients. There were 13,960 out patients and 3,787 newborn infants. In order to provide a high quality of care for these patients it is necessary for the hospital to employ 850 people. This does not include the student nurses.

Financial

The Southern Baptist Hospital has never closed a year with an operating deficit. This record has been made possible by conservative management and the faithful cooperation of our friends.

During the year of 1954 the hospital rendered \$93,182.13 in free service to the deserving poor and reduced its indebtedness \$175,000.00. Substantial sums of money have been spent on modernizing the first buildings and in the replacement of equipment. This program of capital improvement was made possible by funds received through the Cooperative Program. Although the hospital has been able to operate within its own income, it is not possible to accumulate enough funds to build new buildings and replace worn out equipment.

In addition to the \$120,000.00 a year received from the Convention for capital improvements, the hospital also received \$40,000.00 from cooperative funds which was applied on free service rendered to the poor.

New Hospital in Jacksonville, Florida

Acting under the authority of the Convention, the Hospital Board is establishing a new hospital at Jacksonville, Florida. It is expected that the building will be complete and ready for occupancy in the early spring of 1955. The building has been so designed as to permit future expansion at a very reasonable cost. It will be modern in every respect and although the bed capacity at opening date will be only 185, the facilities can be expanded to a capacity of 310 by finishing the interior of certain sections which were only roughed in under the present contract.

Religious Emphasis

In addition to its ministry of healing, Southern Baptist Hospital places great emphasis on its preaching ministry. Two full-time chaplains are available for consultation with patients and the families of patients. While one of the chaplains conducts early morning devotional services over the hospital public address sys-

tem, the assistant chaplain visit all the patients who will be going to surgery that day.

School of Nursing

The hospital's School of Nursing accepted 86 girls in the September, 1953 class, and expects to enroll an equal or greater number in the September, 1954 class. A full-time Director of Student Activities works in close cooperation with an excellent faculty to assure a well-rounded program of educational and recreational opportunities. Pastors of churches can assist our Southern Baptist Hospital by recommending young women to its School of Nursing. A number of scholarship are available to those who can qualify.

MISSIONS REPORT

Foreign Missions

The Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board appointed 70 missionaries during 1953; 37 have been appointed during the first five months of 1954. During the year and five months, 53 missionaries were lost from active service through death, resignation, and retirement, giving an increase of 54 for active service. As of June 1, 1954, the board had 931 active missionaries. Missionaries are located in 170 stations in 35 countries or territories.

Indirectly, Southern Baptist missions extend to many other countries: through funds aiding national Baptists; through missionaries of the Foreign Mission Board of Brazil, its daughter mission; through Baptist churches co-operating with Baptist associations of mission countries, though beyond their borders; through pastors trained at the international seminary in Switzerland; and through literature sent from the Spanish Baptist Publishing House.

The 2,201 churches affiliated with Southern Baptist missions reported 20,326 baptisms during 1953. Their 8,000 organizations (Sunday schools, youth groups, and women's groups) reported 200,000 members. More than 64,000 pupils were reported in 500 mission schools, including 700 students in 19 theological schools. Almost 200,000 patients were treated in eight hospitals, four dispensaries, and 12 clinics manned by 27 missionary doctors, 37 missionary nurses, and 44 national doctors and nurses. Approximately 8,000,000 pieces of literature were published, including 51,000 Bibles.

Southern Baptists gave for foreign missions during 1953 a total of \$8,759,948.87 through the Cooperative Program, Lottie Moon Offering, and special designated gifts.

State Missions

November 20 of this year will mark the closing of the Florida Baptist State Convention's first 100 years, for it was in 1854 that the Florida Baptist State Convention was organized in the home of R. J. Mays, near Lovett, Florida, and from that early, meager beginning, with from the very beginning the Convention becoming engaged in state mission work, we have seen the progress of state

missions march from that first church which was organized on Florida Baptist soil, the Pigeon Creek Church near Hilliard, until today, in the march of state missions, there is now actively connected with the Florida Baptist Convention 1,006 cooperating missionary Baptist churches, covering the entire state, and this number is growing year by year.

Florida continues to be a giant and almost virgin mission field for Baptists. We are told on very reliable authority that 150,000 new permanent residents come into Florida every year. At this rate, Florida's population will reach an increase of 1,500,000 in the next ten years. Added to the 3,000,000, this will give us approximately 4,500,000 people, or a need for at least 400 new churches in Florida within the next ten years to take care of nothing more than the increase from the outside. Thus we can see what the needs are in this rapidly growing state of ours. In many residential communities near our great cities, the population has spread so rapidly that we must at once go in and establish many new churches, to say nothing of the concern and attention we must give our large negro population that is calling for help and guidance in favored Florida.

Florida Baptists have today the most extensive and comprehensive program in their 100 years of history. The work of state missions has come to cover a wide scope of activities. It not only does the work of missions in Florida, but also is the chief agency for promotion of all missions fostered by the Florida Baptist Convention and our beloved Southern Baptist Convention. It is the agency through which Baptists promote all phases of kingdom work, including evangelism, which is primary, stewardship, teaching, training, enlistment, and every other phase of work fostered anywhere by either of our Conventions.

The work of state missions is carried on in Florida under the different departments. These departments are Sunday School, Brotherhood, Training Union, Music, Cooperative Missions, and Student work, and added to the combined work of all of these departments is the new phase of our work, included this year in our program, that of promotion and publicity, and working very closely with these departments is the W. M. U. All of these departments, agencies, and phases of our work are actively engaged in promoting every phase of mission work done at home and around the world.

The work of state missions is showing remarkable results. In addition to the regular work of the above-mentioned departments and phases of our work, we have each year a "special" state mission effort, to which all peoples are given an over and above opportunity to have a part in some particular phase of work for that particular season. Thus we believe that with everybody being informed, challenged, and encouraged to have a part in this worthy and all inclusive program that we will, as we begin a second century of progress for Christ in Florida, within the next 100 years be making a much greater progress towards advancing God's kingdom than ever before. You can see that as each one of you has a part in state missions, you are having a part in everything that Florida Baptists and Southern Baptists do, not only at home but to the ends of the earth.

This is a record increase of 914 over the previous year's enrollment. The needs are for more room for both faculty and students.

The total invested in these properties in this past year is a big 25,000,000 dollars.

The state convention of thirteen Southern Baptist states operate thirty senior colleges and universities, twenty-one junior colleges, and eight academies.

In these senior colleges and universities, we have invested 106,000,000 dollars.

Florida is the fastest growing state east of the Mississippi River. Florida is also the only southern state that has only one institution of higher learning, but we have put 1,500,000 dollars in our Stetson University in the past five years.

When we plan for our children, work out our church budgets, or plan our personal budgets and wills, let us not forget our institutions of insurance against ignorance.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

There have been substantial improvements in the Home during the year. The dairy herd has been increased and a poultry house was built. They produce all the milk needed in the Institution and since December 1, 1953, all the beef used on the campus has come from the dairy and beef herds. Twenty acres of white dutch clover was planted for winter grazing and fifteen acres of pensacola bahia was seeded in September. This makes a total of eighty acres of improved pasture grass with additional fifty acres of native carpet, or a total of 130 acres in pasture.

The educational and religious training programs keep pace with the public schools and churches in Lakeland. The children attend the public schools; they also go to church in the city. Central Avenue, First Church, and Southside are the church homes of our children.

Florida Baptists closed fifty years of service to children in February of this year. The first child admitted according to the records came to the Home in February, 1904. Since the admission of this child there has been a constant stream of children entering and leaving the Home. The early records are not complete, but it is estimated that Florida Baptists in the past fifty years have given aid to more than 2,500 children, enough to make a sizable town. These are living in every section of the country and some are on foreign soil, each thankful for the help given him and the training he received. Two hundred thirty-five children have been helped by the Home during the current year.

The good accomplished is not a commodity that is measured in dollars and cents. It is far more valuable than this. Preachers, teachers, nurses, and many other areas of service are numbered among those who have lived there. These are not too important within themselves. The most important thing the Home has done for its children is to help them grow up as useful, Christian citizens. It has assisted them in finding the Saviour and thereby have a sense of security and happiness that otherwise would be impossible. We have done a good job these fifty years but it is not enough. There are many hundreds more whom we must help.

Two cottages, one for junior boys and one for junior girls, were erected on the campus this summer. Applications were accepted for the space provided in these buildings two months before they were finished. These cottages will add 35 to 40 to the enrollment. This means that the Home must have more funds for operating expenses. An average of about 43% of the income for our children is received from the Cooperative Program. The remainder, or 57%, must come from other sources. The Thanksgiving Offering is the major source they must depend on to meet the 57% balance of their needs.

We urge every church to participate in the Offering for the Home. This year they are asking that we make our gift on November 21. If this is not suitable to you and your church, please make it at a convenient time for you. It is urgent that each church help support our children. The Lord Jesus Himself said, "It is more blessed to give than to receive."
