### **RODUTTUTION**

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

ARTICLE III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

ARTICLE VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of the departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music); the officers of the Association.

The Committee on Nominations will name the members of the Executive Committee during the Annual Association, or the Nominating Committee of the Executive Committee shall name them ad interim, filling vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in

session.

ARTICLE IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds set up for that purpose by the churches.

ARTICLE X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

ARTICLE XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in Annual meeting; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

ARTICLE XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

### ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability. ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and shall never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinanances of Jeses Christ that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

### RULES OF DECORUM

- The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
- 3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
- Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
- The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
- These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

1. The one hundred and sixteenth annual session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by Dr. Harold G. Sanders, Moderator, at 10:00 o'clock A.M. on October 23, 1958 at the Seminole Baptist Church, Tallahassee, Florida.

Program theme - "New Life For You Through Evangelism."

Scripture - "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly" - John 10:10.

- Frank Boggs led the congregation in singing, "Marching On Zion".
   Pianist Mrs. J. E. Robinson.
- Rev. R. P. Tomberlin, Jr., the host pastor, made the welcome address and gave the delegates a most cordial welcome to their new church.
- 4. Dr. Harold Sanders, Moderator, reported on the organization and the Clerk, W. M. Scruggs, Sr., made a motion and seconded by Rev. John Hunt that the messengers already registered, together with others that come, constitute the organization of the body. The motion carried,
- 5. Report of program committee by Rev. Ray C. Tindall; Chairman, who presented the program and made a motion that it be adopted with whatever hanges may be necessary as the meeting progressed. Rev. Ellis B. urner seconded the motion and it was passed.
- 6. The Vice Moderator, Rev. Ellis B. Turner, took the Chair and Dr. Harold G. Sanders gave the report of the Executive Committee and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Rev. Walter E. Bailey and passed.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

October 23, 1958

1. Duties. To do the work assigned to them by the Association in Annual Meeting, and to conduct the work of the Association ad interim.

2. Meetings. We have met once each month, with one additional meeting in September for the purpose of accepting phrasing on an Amendment to the Constitution concerning membership.

3. Attendance. This year the attendance of Committee members has been exceptionally good. The interest in our work is high. We have met this year at East Hill Baptist Church, Tallahassee, and the church has provided hot coffee and doughnuts to start off the meetings well.

4. Membership. The Executive Committee now consists of all active pastors of cooperating Baptist Churches, heads of departments, officers of the Association (with the Moderator as Chairman and the Clerk as Clerk) - ex-officio, and as many as ten lay men or women. Ministers of education and Music are honorary members; the Field Secretary and Baptist Student Union Director are advisory members.

5. Accomplishments.

(1) Secured the free showing of "This is the Answer", 30-minute Television series of the Baptist Radio and Television Commission, for thirteen weeks over WCTV, Channel 6, Tallahassee, for which we are grateful. We hope to get this again January - March, 1959.

(2) Secured current showing of "The Baptist Hour", radio broadcast, 30 minutes, each Sunday morning, 7:30-8:00 A.M., over WMEN, Tallahassee, starting October 1st. Also, Quincy, WCNH, has been carrying the "Baptist Hour" radio from 12:30-1:00 P.M., Sundays. (Note: We are proud that our Music Director for the Association, Frank Boggs of First Church, is now the soloist on the "Baptist Hour" radio network).

(3) Dedication of the Historical Marker, organization of the Florida Baptist Association, at Fbenezer Jefferson Baptist Church, Sunday, March 30, 1958, 2:30 P.M. A beautiful stone marker noting the organization date, October 13, 1843. Elaborate and appropriate program was held.

(4) Evangelistic Clinic, in preparation for the April 12-26, 1959 Simultaneous Crusades to be held, we pray, in every Baptist Church, held June 2, Seminole Church, under direction of Dr. Paul Meigs, State Director of Evangelism, Jacksonville.

(5) "Forward Program of Church Finance" Clinic also held at Immanuel Baptist Church to help prepare our leadership for Bible Stewardship designed to reach all people, lead all to become tithers, and thus, to make it possible to send missions to all the world.

(6) Departmentalized advance. We are proud of the fine leaders afforded our Association, and the great progress made in all departments Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music. Our program of training, our general promotion, showed unusual signs of life, We are sure the digest of Church letters will encourage us.

(7) Souls saved. We were distressed with the low, low figure of 487 souls saved and baptized by all our churches during the year ending September 30, 1958. We challenged the Executive Committee and the Churches to double that number this year - 1,000 baptisms. We will receive an exact total here during the Association, but we know that many churches have doubled, some have trebled last year's number of baptisms. We thank God for this. Next year, with 2-weeks revivals, we should go beyond this.

(8) Prize for best Program. We are proud that our Associational Program for last year again won first prize at the Annual Moderators and Clerks Conference in Jacksonville. It is judged on five counts.

(9) New Churches. We are glad that the First Baptist Church, Tallahassee, opened the Crawfordville Road Mission January 5th, 1958, and that the building is nearing completion now. The Immanuel Baptist Church is tying up land in the Tharpe Street area of Tallahassee for a mission. The First Church is expecting to tie up land on Perry Highway and possibly another area or two this coming year, Jim Lee Road perhaps, or in Lakewood area. The Parkway Baptist Church went into its new building this year; also, Seminole went into its new building; and Thomasville Road is now ready to build its auditorium. Other churches have done remodeling and enlargement. The New Baptist Student House, 602 W. Call, Tallahassee, was completed last fall, as a gift from the Baptist State Mission Board.

(10) Future Planning. Your Executive Committee, trying to help us plan for the future, and to be a vital part in the larger program of Southern and World Baptists, is joining in the program called 'Baptist Jubilee Advance' - 1959-1964.

### EVANGELISM REPORT

Evangelism was at the heart of the purpose and work of our Lord. He came giving as His reason for leaving Heaven for our planet, "I have come to seek and to save that which is lost." His passion has come down the centuries through the burning hearts of His followers.

According to the reports from our churches this year we have 808 or 321 more baptisms than we did in the year previous. We have received 1,477 or 294 more through other means. This gives us a total of 2,285 or 615 more additions this year over last. Only 3 churches have reported no baptisms.

As we rejoice over our victories of the past, already plans are working

for greater things in the new year.

The Jubilee Advance Program has begun on a firm basis as we have just closed a year dedicated to prayer. Girded with this power we are launching into what we hope will be our greatest year of evangelism.

You have just elected a steering committee to organize efforts for a simultaneous revival to be held next April. We are urging that every church cooperate in this wonderful undertaking with plans for a two-week meeting, if possible.

Last June an Evangelistic Conference was held when we were challenged

to win our Association for Christ.

Every department of our churches will be enlisted to do their parts in the campaign to win men, women and children to a saving knowledge of Christ Jesus. Let us adopt the slogan suggested, "New Life For You," together with that of our Sunday School, "That They Might Have Life."

Soul-winning Commitment Day on January 4, 1959; Bible Study Week, January 5-9, using the study of the "Gospel According to Mark" by Hugh R. Peterson; Evangelistic Conference in Jacksonville; simultaneous Religious Census, February 1, Soul-Winning Training in February and Associational Evangelistic Rally in April are the mechanics that will have no meaning at all if we do not use them under God.

We recommend that we cooperate with the state office in having an Associational Evangelistic Conference during the week of February 8, 1959.

### SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

Intemperance, irreligion and immorality will destroy America unless the people called Baptists do something about it. Any undergirding of the Christian life deserves the fullest support of all of our people. Far too many areas are presently controlled by, or at least dominated by anti-Christian forces. These areas provide our chief fields of service. There is an upward course in crime, social drinking and moral delinquency. Increasing numbers of our people of both sexes, youth as well as adults, are being committed to penal and mental institutions. These things alone, without individual case histories to provide heart throb, should arouse us to maximum indignation towards all literature, propaganda, advertisement or radio and TV commercials with sexy, immodest, immoral or intemperate expression.

The vicious liquor traffic is still the number one foe. Standing right beside it is legalized gambling. Adolescent drug addiction has reached major proportions. The traffic in narcotics, especially among youthful "thrill seekers," "hot-rodders," "cool-cats" and so-forth, is unbelievable. Ten thousand times ten thousand voices cry out against all this -- BUT WHO CARES???

We must expose these things for what they are - and then expell them from decent society. Social drinking, Church sponsored dancing, bingo, lottery must go. Baptist will have to stand alone in all this but it won't be the first time.

The time for action has come. We must fight fire with fire. If the organized forces of crime purpose to enlist, teach and train our young people to become willing tools for destructive programs — then let us organize holy crusades and turn the tables. Underworld experts plan to use our young people, and gullible adults too, to lead our nation down and out. Christ's soldiers can lead up and in through a crusade of righteousness. Thousands will join such movement. Let's clean out and close up the joints, jooks, taverns, houses of prostitution, bookies and so on. We can, with proper leadership, planning and programming, save America.

We have followed our CHALLENGE for the past year "Look for the World's need of Missions" and have met this Challenge to the best of our ability in Christian knowledge. We fell short of our goal of "Having a Missionary Society in every church" by end of our year. We have organized one new society, namely; Lake Ellen and we are grieved to report two societies have disbanded, namely; Shady Sea and St. Marks, now a total of 29 societies.

We have reported a membership of 1,618. We had 119 Mission Study Classes with an attendance of 1,923. 719 Tithers and 796 Royal Service

Magazines.

The Youth work under Mrs. L. A. Turner as YWA Director, Mrs. G. A. Layfield as GA Director and Mrs. Hannah Dykes as Sunbeam Director have 77 Auxiliaries - 1,009 members and 226 subscriptions to all Youth Magazines. The GA Coronation Service was held with Gretna Baptist Church with 9 Churches represented and 31 Awards presented.

First Quarterly meeting was a joint meeting with several other Associationa in a "Day of Instruction" held with Bluntstown Baptist Church,

September 24, 1957.

Second Quarterly meeting was held January 20, 1958 with Crawfordville Baptist Church with 138 attending. Miss Josephine Jones, State Woman's Missionary Union Secretary was speaker.

Third Quarterly meeting was held April 8, 1958 with Parkway Baptist Church in Tallahassee with 144 attending. Dr. and Mrs. John Mein, Mis-

sionaries to Brazil and the Bahamas were speakers.

Fourth Quarterly meeting was held July 25, 1958 with Chattahoochee Baptist Church with 95 attending. Mrs. R. Cecil Moore, Missionary to Chile was speaker. This was a combined Woman's Missionary Union Meet-

### SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

At the beginning of the year we had a Sunday School in every church except Arran, with an enrollment of 10,922. During the year one Mission school (Grawfordville Road) has been established, and we now have an enrollment of 11,933, a gain during the year of 1,011. During the year 32 churches had some form of training, receiving 2,211 training awards, which was 60 less than in the previous year. 59 Vacation Bible schools were conducted with an enrollment of 4,080, or a gain of 487 over last year. 410 Baptisms were reported through the Sunday Schools during the year. We had 3 Standard schools, viz: Capitola, Immanuel and Mt. Elom.

Our goal for the new year: A 10% increase in enrollment, a 15% increase in average attendance, 35 Vacation Bible schools, 37 churches in training with a minimum of 2,005 training awards, 15 Standard schools, and a

Standard Association by June 1, 1959.

Our 24 officers pledge our best efforts to help you build a better school in your church. We solicit your prayers and cooperation.

### REPORT ON BAPTIST LITERATURE

The state circulation of the Baptist Witness is now well over 51,000 copies per week. There is at least 134 churches sending the State Baptist paper in all the homes of these churches. See if your church is on this list. If not get your Church to place it in the Budget.

Our prayer is that we might use our literature to gain knowledge that through our laboring together we might glorify GOD and may that always be our Goal. May we use HIS Word and apply its message to our lives that

truly, we might grow in wisdom.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

The Brotherhood department was created in 1928, by the Florida Baptist Convention, to serve the churches in enlisting laymen. Last year the Royal Ambassadors were given to this department. The Royal Ambassador responsibility came as a result of a transfer of this area of work from the Woman's Missionary Union to the Brotherhood department throughout the Southern Baptist Convention, as of October 1, 1957. In April, 1955 the Woman's Missionary Union requested the Brotherhood department assume the responsibility of this work. The implement this work the Florida Captist Convention hired as associate to G. A. Rattarree, Brother Tom hotts, January 1, 1958.

The Brotherhood in Florida boasts a membership of 19,275; with a Brotherhood in 912 churches. In the Florida Association we have 38 churches, with 18 Brotherhoods and an enrollment of 592. This year we are fully organized with a functioning executive committee. Our aim is to enlist every man on the church rolls into active support of the whole church program. We have 2 new Brotherhoods; Concord Baptist Church with 20

charter members, and Crawfordville with 16 members.

The major emphases of the Brotherhood for 1959 are:
1. Co-operative witness and the 30,000 movement

2. Studying world missions

3. Complete and train associational Royal Ambassador organizations

4. Promote tithing

The Brotherhood encampment of 1959 will be July 31-August 1 at Panama City.

The major emphases of the Royal Ambassadors for 1959 are:

1. To challenge the churches to recognize Royal Ambassadors as a part of the total church and Brotherhood program.

2. To challenge the men, through the Brotherhood, to accept from their

churches this opportunity for service.

July 20-25, Panama City Camp July 27-31, Panama City Camp

Dr. Moyle gave the report of the work of the Baptist Student Union at the Florida State College. The report was adopted.

### REPORT OF THE BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

The Baptist Student Union of Florida State University can say with pride that they have achieved its standard of excellence, First Magnitude, again last year. This marks the third consecutive year that they have been able to achieve this standard. It is still the only Baptist Student Union in the state of Florida to obtain this goal.

To reach at least 50% of the Baptist preference students in a unit organization such as Sunday School or Training Union or Young Women's Auxiliary or Brotherhood is a difficult attainment. To reach at least 35% of the Baptist preference students in moving their church letters to one of the local Baptist churches, is also not any easy task, yet both of these are only two of the 20 requirements necessary for meeting the Standard of Excellence. We are still the largest state university in the Southern Baptist Convention to achieve this distinction with over 2,000 Baptist preference students on

Certainly the biggest blessing we had last year was the opening and dedication of our new Baptist Student House. The Florida Baptist Convention's investment of money is paying off in larger use, more students being reached and enlisted for Christ and our denomination. To say that we are proud of our facilities is to put it mildly. If you have not seen our building and furnishings, we invite you to view them at your earliest convenience. The building, furnishings, and grounds are valued in excess of \$200,000.00.

The International students, numbering 165 from 55 foreign countries were welcomed at a special Birthday celebration at International Vespers last year. The cake was the largest ever baked at F. S. U. and it weighed an enormous amount, having to be baked on a piece of plywood. It took one baking student 22 hours of work to put the flags of the 55 countries on the cake.

Santa Claus put in his annual appearance near Christmas time for 10 needy children that otherwise would not have had any Christmas. They received clothes, toys, fruit and candy. This was sponsored by the Sunday Schools and the students gave money above and beyond their tithes and offerings for this worthy endeavor.

Retreats, conventions, week-end revivals, and socials were all well attended and well received. During Student Week at Ridgecrest we had Mangum Lodge filled to capacity with student from F. S. U. While we were accomodating 38 students there, 8 of the students from F. S. U. served as missionaries with the Home Mission Board. There were only 13 students from Florida chosen to do this work last summer and we are especially proud that over half of them were from Florida State University.

In our annual Hobo drive where the students do odd jobs to make money for our summer mission fund, we saw many cars washed, and many children had students as baby sitters. We sent \$400,00 for the last two summers to the State Baptist Student Union to assist in sending some student or students as summer missionaries. In addition to this money the students worked for, a check for \$372.79 was given to Florida State University to assist in bringing an International student to the University.

One of our students, Wayne Hobbs, served as the minister of music on the state Baptist Student Union Revival Team. I hope that more of our churches will plan on using the State Baptist Student Union Revival Team

in their churches during the summer. We ought to have a Baptist Student Union Revival Team from Florida State University and we can provide one if there is a need for it. We have some students that are especially qualified to do this work. If you are interested, please contact me. Also if you need any supply work in your pulpits, we have a number of students who need the experience and it would thrill your hearts to listen to them.

If we in the Baptist Student Union at Florida State University can assist your church or you in any way, we would be happy to do so. We are off to

a grand start and we continually covet your prayers.



### REPORT OF THE MISSION COMMITTEE

Because of the long distance between the members of this committee we have done almost nothing as a committee and for this report all cred is due largely to Rev. Dave Alderman, T. J. Chason and Claude Sapp.

In order that we might comprehend the conditions confronting us today according to the census state wide, the population of Florida within the past seven years, 1950 to 1958 has increased 1,158,000 and certainly Tallahassee has received her share and as Baptists a great opportunity and problems confront us.

Perry Highway - 1,500 people. Area - 2.8 by 2.5 miles with 364 homes. 15 under construction and 150 staked lots for future homes. In addition

to this, there is very probable development of a large tract.

Campbells Park, Woodville Highway - 1,200 people. 1.9 by 1.3 miles, 257 houses and 33 under construction. 235 staked off lots and 250 houses to be built within the next 18 months and approximately 200 acres to be developed.

Jim Lee Road - 1.5 miles square, 1,600 people. 386 houses, seventythree under construction and 250 staked off lots and approximately 200

acres to be developed.

Forest Heights - 1,600 people. 1.4 by 2.1, 303 houses, 23 under construction, 243 staked off lots. Park Side with 178 houses and Gibbs Drive with approximately 100 houses. Immanuel Church has planned to develop this area.

There are great possibilities for development on the Jacksonville Highway and Meridian Road; neither should we forget the area around the new Air Port.

association only one.

### VISUAL EDUCATION REPORT

We are all acquainted with the old saying, "A picture is worth a thousand words." In our every day life we certainly see ideas visualized in the newspapers, magazines, the theatre and on television. More and more churches are realizing that visualized materials are very helpful in bringing the message of Christ to the people.

Visual education materials include posters, bulleting boards, maps, globes, chalk boards, charts, graphs, pictures, objects, dramatics, phonograph, slides, filmstrips and motion pictures. Sometimes these materials are referred to as instructional materials or teaching materials, or audio-

visual aids.

Southern Baptists produce a wealth of such material which are prepared especially for the needs of the Southern Baptist churches:

(1) The teaching pictures for Nursery, Beginner, Primary and Junior

(2) The films, filmstrips and slides put out by the Audio-Visual Aids Department and other Southern Baptist agencies.

(3) And the other materials which are available through the Baptist Book Store.

The "Baptist Book Store Catalog 1959" and "Focus: A Catalog of Audio-Visual Aids, 1959" are available free upon your request from the Jacksonville Book Store to help us see the variety of materials and to guide us in selecting materials to meet our needs.

Suggestions for audio-visual materials are mentioned each month in the Training Union Magazine. The Church Library Bulletin, which is available

on request from the Sunday School Board, also carries suggestions.

The Audic-Visual Aids Department of the Sunday School Board has been reorganized to give more effective service in carrying out its program. Basic to the program is the conviction "that audio visuals are materials which should be used by regularly elected leadership, in the established organizations, as a part of the week-by-week curriculum and program "rather than "a program of audio-visual aids." Free pamphlets are available to help the local church and association organize more effectively for using audio-visual aids.

The book "Using Visual Aids in a Church" by Earl Waldrup gives basic

information on the subject.

Some of the latest releases in visual aids include:

(1) filmstrips on Training Union work such as "Assembly Programs for Training Union," "Presenting Effective Programs," "Preparing and Presenting a Part," "How to Have a Training Union Study Course" and a series of five filmstrips, one for each of the committees in Training Union: the Program, Membership, Missionary, Bible Reading and Social Committees.

(2) slides to illustrate the foreign mission study on Southeast Asia.
(These five sets of slides are available for churches through our Associa-

tional Woman's Missionary Union)

(3) a series of motion picture based on the Book of Acts. Visual Education has a definite place in the work of the local church. Let us be informed of what is available, how to provide for it in our church budgets, how to organize our workers for using it, and then use it to the best advantage in building up the kingdom of God.

### REPORT OF FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

The Foundation is an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention being related as a "Non-Departmental Agency" and supported from the overall Budget of the Convention. The Trustees are elected by the convention.

The Foundation through its promotional office and the Florida Baptist Witness, seeks to publicize and commend all the objects of our work both

State and Southwide to our people.

Through an arrangement with the Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, the Foundation can arrange the purchase of Annuities to be funded by the Relief and Annuity Board and by these contracts the Annuitant is given the right to designate the gift portion of such Annuity to any Baptist object of their choice. By this plan the Annuitant receives

the income of the Annuity for their life time and is privileged to make a substantial gift to a cherished object of their choice.

The Foundation joins with the Committee of the Convention in emphasiz-

ing the growing need for a home or homes for the aging.

Since our last report, one substantial Annuity has been arranged, the gift portion being divided equally between the Home and Foreign Mission Boards. Our Legal Counsel has assisted in drawing six (6) wills, another is now in process, with fourteen pending.

Our Legal Counsel will advise with those who desire to leave properties,

by Will, Bequest, etc. to any State or Southwide Baptist Agencies.

### REPORT OF STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

In Exodus 35:5 God says: Take ye from among you an offering unto the LORD: whosoever is of a willing heart, let him bring it. Also 35:21 "And they came, every one whose heart stirred him up, and every one whom his spirit made willing, and they brought the Lord's offering to the work of the tabernacle of the congregation.'

There was no compulsion in connection with this offering. It was all

based on the voluntary actions of the givers.

Note the stress placed on the attitude of the givers in both above quotations, "whosoever is of a willing heart," and "every one whose heart stirred him up." This shows us clearly that the impulse to give came from within. These ancient men of Israel wanted to help construct, furnish and operate the tabernacle as an expression of their worship and service to God.

Evidently our people of the Florida Association have not taken the command of our Lord, to tithe, very seriously. Neither do they have "a willing heart." nor have they been stirred in heart to the extent that they are fully obeying this command. In comparing the Associational Minutes for the years of 1957 and 1956, we find that there were 107 less tithers in 1957 than in 1956. These figures should be of great concern to every child of God. For He has said, "The tithe is holy unto the Lord," and is to be brought into His storehouse.

Therefore, by the grace of God, let us endeavor to teach our people: (1) That for one not to tithe is to steal from God, and He has said,

"Thou shalt not steal."

(2) That God loves a cheerful giver and one should not give just

because he knows it is required by God.

- (3) That giving helps to develop the Christian. God is testing by intrusting in our care these material things. God is trying to make "men"
- (4) That our love for God is determined by how honest we are with that which belongs to Him.

### REPORT ON ASSEMBLIES

Florida Baptist are endeavoring to carry out the commission of the Lord Jesus when he said, "All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ye therefore, and disciple all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the World." Matthew 28:18-20.

The leadership of the individual churches, of our Associations, and of the State Convention and her Auxiliaries have undertaken to "Teach" our Youth and Adults the things which Jesus wanted taught. One of the ways this is

being accomplished is through our assemblies and camps.

There were two "All Church" assemblies held this past year in our state, namely, Deland Assembly at Stetson University in Deland and West Florida Assembly at Panama City. Numerous Associational Assemblies were held and in addition G.A., R.A., and Music Camps were held. From all reports these were each well attended and all enjoyed well planned programs at each assembly and camp.

Because the assembly date was advanced two weeks by the Silver Lake management we found it impracticable to hold Silver Lake Assembly this past summer. Because of the concern of a few and inquiries by many attempts were made to hold it at an earlier date in Metcalf, Georgia. Inquiry revealed that accommodations were so inadequate that the committee thought best to postpone Silver Lake Assembly for another year.

We checked with the management of the Silver Lake Organizations camps and grounds recently and found that suitable dates were available for 1959. The date June 29 through July 3 has been accepted for the Assembly next

rear.

We recommend:

### RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORT

Last year at the annual meeting of the Florida Baptist Association, motion was made and passed requesting WCTV-Channel 6 of Tallahassee and Thomasville, to carry the Southern Baptists' television program This Is The Answer. WCTV cooperated in a wonderful way; therefore, a motion has been passed that this association go on record as expressing its thanks to Station WCTV for showing This Is The Answer during the first three months of 1958.

It has also been recommended and passed that this body prayerfully request that WCTV carry the series on Televangelism during the first three months of 1959. These film are to be used in preparation of the Simultaneous Crusades of 1959. They will deal with problems common to a great multitude of people - problems that stand between them and a vital faith in Christ.

"The Baptist Hour" radio program of Southern Baptists is now being carried by over 480 stations here and abroad. At present the program is being carried over station WMEN, Tallahassee at 7:30 AM Sunday. The present estimated listening audience is 28,000,000. WCNH, Quincy, 12:30 Sunday.

Radio and television are being utilized to a great extent by our local churches. Many of the churches are broadcasting their Sunday morning worship services. First Baptist of Tallahassee has a fifteen minute program "Windows Toward God" each Sunday afternoon at 5 o'clock on WCTV-Channel 6.

The BEAM, monthly magazine of the Radio and Television Commission, continues to grow with a circulation of over 30,000. Pastors and other workers are urged to subscribe to THE BEAM.

The Reverend Ray C. Tindall, pastor of the East Hill Baptist Church of Tallahassee has been elected as Radio-TV committeeman of the Committee on Evangelism for the Simultaneous Crusade during April 12-26, 1959.

The opportunities for winning the lost through the use of radio and television are greater than ever before. We thank God for the many blessings

which have come through use of these outlets. Let us pray for Divine guidance as we seek to use it in the future to His honor and glory.

### BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

The year ending Septmeber 30, 1958, was one of great importance in the work of the HOME. The social service department was well staffed and the results of the "CASE WORKER" will be of great help to every one connected with the Children.

We will give only a few of the highlights of the past year - 208 children in the home at Lakeland and our new home in Miami, 9 cared for in foster homes, 13 given emergency help in their own homes, 19 enrolled to receive STATE MOTHER'S AID. A total of 249. We have had 1685 office interviews, 740 visits to the home of children and parents and 636 other visits. The Home had 286 applications for admission. Each application was given careful consideration. We could not take care of every one. We assisted in securing help from other sources where possible. The work of the CASE WORKER has been a great help in assisting the CHILD and with the parents.

First year for the MIAMI HOME--- The home has had 26 during the year. They have two cottages on the campus and need another now and hope to get the cottage in 1959.

PROGRAM AND OFFERINGS:

In 1957 the expansion program was started. The work must be continued, and to enlarge if we as BAPTIST care for the children in need of help. We receive funds from the cooperative program and from our "Thanksgiving Offering." Many of our churches DO NOT push and secure an offering during THANKSGIVING. the HOME needs the help of every CHURCH if they enlarge and care for the children in need.
FLORIDA ASSOCIATION:

The past year many of our churches send funds marked for the CHILD-REN'S HOME, but a great many of our churches did not aid in any way. Our Association being the OLDEST and the BEST can't we be the FIRST in the State with every CHURCH BUDGET having an item for the CHILDREN'S HOME?

To do this we should send a check each month or at least each quarter marked the Children's Home.

GIFTS:

Last year twenty churches of this association partly filled a truck with all kinds of feed, food and supplies valued at over three hundred dollars. This year we surely would like to see EVERY CHURCH in the Association join with us and let a truck load (overflowing) with feed, food, and supplies be collected when the truck comes your way in NOVEMBER.

Let every one help the CHILDREN'S HOME that they may help the CHILDREN that need our care. GOD will bless each person and church

when we do our part for the LITTLE ONES.

### AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

Southern Baptist plans for the Baptist Jubilee Advance, 1959-1964, remind us that

In every missionary advance the Bible goes forward first!

The Bible is a "must" in missions and evangelism. If the people of the world are to know Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations, they must have the Bible. It is the one basic source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool; he uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay when he must leave—and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own language, but in most countries the people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The American Bible society helps to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost, for worldwide mission work. For the Blind, it supplies Scriptures, at a small fraction of cost, in raised letter systems and on Talking Book records. The Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists and serves every form of Southern Baptist mission work at home and abroad.

During 1957 the American Bible Society-----

----distributed throughout the world nearly 15 million volumes of Scriptures.
----donated more than one million Scriptures volumes for distribution by
Chaplains to our Armed Forces, as a vital link between the home churches
and the men in service.

----introduced the Finger Phono, a new feather-weight plastic phonograph, operated by one finger. These are being supplied, with Scripture recordings in the languages needed, in areas where very few people can read. They are now in use among the Navaho Indians in the U. S. A. and in various parts of Africa and Asia.

---accepted a new joint responsibility, with the British and Foreign Bible Society, for the work in India, in France and in the Congo Basin of Africa. In India, the Bible Societies are undertaking to provide in the next 5 years, a New Testament for every Christian who can read and a Gospel for every non-Christian who can read; this will require 90 million Scriptures volumes in 5 years for India alone!

SOUTHERN BAPTISTS SUPPORT THE WORK:

Because the Bible Society serves mission work-and because Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for distribution to their people--Southern Baptist churches give to the American Bible Society.

In 1957, Southern Baptist churches gave \$118,815 to the American Bible Society ---but still stood in second place, exceeded by Methodist

gifts of \$136, 499.

### BAPTIST MEMORIAL HOSPITAL REPORT

This progress report to Baptists and other friends of Baptist Memorial Hospital is a thrilling example of how Go' blesses the efforts and faith of His people. We can be humble grateful of the progress made while we strive to follow God's will in the future.

DYNAMIC GROWTH SHOWN:

Baptist Memorial Hospital gave 83% more service during its third year—which ended September 13, 1958—-than during its first year. The last unused patient beds were opened in September, 1957, and found immediate good use. Sixty beds now under construction will be opened next January following completion of the third and fourth floors of the Wolfson Children's Hospital. The Hospital will then have 333 beds for adults and children and 70 bassinets for newborn infants. It is interesting to note that during the past twelve months 5,655 operations were performed, 12,739 adult and child patients were admitted and 2,073 newborn infants were delivered.

Schools for Medical Technologists and X-Ray Technicians were fully approved by accrediting agencies during the year. The Hospital welcomes inquiries from wholesome young people for admission to next year's classes in these schools. Other teaching programs include twelve rotating Internships and thirteen specialty Residencies for young physicians. Medical research, proceeding in a fine way, is made possible by research grants from the Damon Runyon Memorial Fund and other private foundations as well as the National Institutes of Health. The Hospital received "full accreditation" from the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals at the end of its first year.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENT:

The long range planning committee of our Board has developed a proposed plan to help meet expansion needs for this Hospital. Such expansion, already sorely needed, is dependent upon capital funds from the Southern Baptist Convention and othes gifts, and to an important extent upon the availability of land. Acquisition and "filling" of a portion of the St. Johns river bed and extension of our present bulkhead line is badly needed for the construction of a nurses' school and residence in order that the land previously designated for the nurses' school might be used to add another wing to the Hospital.

OUR MISSION:

We have dedicated ourselves to the task of providing the "best possible care at the least possible cost in an atmosphere of Christian love and understanding". We wish to thank you for the support you have given. Pray for us and our work-that it may ever increase its Christian witness.
