CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. This Association shall be composed of messengers elected annually by Baptist Churches cooperating with this union.

ARTICLE III. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected as the last item of business and just prior to adjournment each year, and they shall continue in office until their successors are elected.

ARTICLE IV. The objects of this Association are Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE V. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE VI. All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII. This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Board. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

ARTICLE VIII. A. On the first day of the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendation, to nominate suitable heads for all departments.

B. That the officers of the Association, as listed in Article II, shall be nominated from the floor on the second day of the Associational Meeting, and in case two or more persons are nominated for an office they shall be elected by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by popular vote. They shall take charge at the close of the last session of the annual meeting. The officers of the Association shall be members of the Executive Committee, and the Moderator shall serve as chairman of this committee.

C. The Executive Committee of the Association, shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of the departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music); the officers of the Association.

The Committee on Nominations will name the members of the Executive Committee during the Annual Association, or the Nominating Committee of the Executive Committee shall name them ad interim, filling vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the Nominating Committee shall vote to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire; eight (8) shall constitute a quorum; and it shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association, and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

ARTICLE IX. The Association shall furnish minutes of its proceedings in proportion to the funds set up for that purpose by the churches.

ARTICLE X. This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

ARTICLE XI. This Association shall have power: first, to provide for the general union of the churches; second, to counsel with any church in difficulty; third, to inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or to furnish statistical reports to such meeting; fourth, to withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the rules of this Association; fifth, to accept into this Union other Baptist Churches which are found to be orthodox and cooperative with the whole denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in Annual meeting; sixth, to appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified to the best interest of the Master's cause; seventh, to adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this Union.

ARTICLE XII. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature, by his own free will and ability.

ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall preserve in grace and shall never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinanances of Jeses Christ that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgment.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteousness will be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

RULES OF DECORUM

- The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
- The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
- Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
- The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
- These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee has the responsibility of transacting the business of the Association between Annual Meetings. It consists of all active pastors of cooperating Baptist Churches and Missions, Heads of departments, officers of the Ass'n (Moderator as chairman and Clerk as clerk), one lay person from each Church and Mission. Ministers of Music and Education are honorary members; the Field Secretary and Baptist Student Union Secretary are advisory members.

The Executive Committee met once each month during the year. Ten

times we met at 10 AM on Monday after the 1st Sunday of each month, but twice we met at 7:30 PM for the benefit of the lay members. The average attendance was 32. On Dec. 28, I was elected Moderator succeeding Rev. A. C. Phillips of Havana who moved to Dothan, and Rev. Ray C. Tindall was made Vice-moderator. Our format of meetings is about like this: (1) Reports from the departments, with bills to be paid or purchases requested, (2) planning for the future by departments or Ass'n: (3) report of Committees and Treasurer; (4) miscellaneous business; (5) messages.

ACCOMPLISHMENTS OF THE YEAR OF 1959-60

1. Successful promotion of state meetings held in First Baptist Church Tallahassee: (1) Florida Baptist Convention in November with Dr. Sanders as chairman; (2) State Royal Ambassador Congress in April with G. R. White and pastor of First Baptist as co-chairmen; (3) Tri-state Regional Training Union Workshop and Clinic in February, sponsored by the Association, State and Southwide Training Union departments, with Rev. Walter E. Bailey as chairman, O. K. Radford in charge of Workshop.

2. Special offerings: (1) Thanksgiving offerings of money and food for the Baptist Children's Home, promoted by W. M. Scruggs and others; (@) Lottie Moon offering for Foreign Missions, Annie Armstrong Offering for Home Missions, and Special State Missions offerings-promoted by the WMU. and assisted by the pastors; (3) Mother's Day Baptist Hospital Charity Fund Offerings, from 26 churches, totaling \$1,021.26 (increase of 12 churches and \$293.02 over last year), headed up by Harold G. Sanders and Committee.

3. Assisted Rev. D. O. Alderman in the (1) Schools of Missions in April with Rev. Thomas Cuttino leading: and the (2) School of the Prophets at West Florida Assembly. Also promoted our Assemblies throughout the state and the Ridgecrest Assembly.

4. Silver Lake Assembly was highly successful under the leadership of Rev. H. C. Meador of Crawfordville Road Church. Another planned for

next year.

5. Assisted in the ordination of Paul W. Ward (Aenon Church) and

Thomas J. Draper (First Tallahassee) to the gospel ministry.

BAPTIST HOSPTIAL CHARITY FUND-MOTHER' DAY OFFERING 1960-61

3:55 PM-Thursday, October 20

Our two (2) Southern Baptist Hospitals were "BUILT TO BLESS". The first Hospital is in New Orleans, and is one of the finest in America. Of special interest to us is the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Jacksonville, which likewise is perhaps the outstanding Hospital in Florida, and in advance of many in the Southeast.

Our Baptist Hospital has a bed capacity of 331, admitted 15, 466 patients last year, performed 101, 925 laboratory tests, filled 132, 702 prescriptions, prepared 270, 850 meals, performed 8, 182 operations, and brought 2, 156

babies into the world!

Of special concern to Christians, the marvelous spiritual program of the hospital provides the finest comfort and aid to suffering humanity. Our Chaplain made 4, 752 bedside visits, distributed 20, 000 tracts and other

religious literature, and assisted all pastors in their visitation.

The Charity features are both in-patient and out-patient, but mainly the latter. The Out-Patient Clinic examined and treated 4, 763 patients, and hospitalized (in-patient) 647 of these at a cost of \$166, 982. 79. Some of these paid all or in part, but the actual "CHARITY" ministry ran to \$104,032.76. This does not include the value of the services of physicians and dentists who gave their time and talent. Baptist Charity work would be valued at nearly a quarter million dollars.

Our State Charity Fund Goal for Mother's Day was \$75,000. Our own association gave \$728.24 in 1959, but went something over the \$1000.00 mark in 1960. We hope to increase this much more next year, and urge all Sunday Schools and Churches to plan to take the MOTHER'S DAY HOSPITAL

OFFERING for Charity in May.

Baptists in Florida gave only about \$20,000 for Charity work last year. The Convention gave \$10,000. A few gifts came from other than Baptists. Thus, the Hospital had to pay the balance of about \$65,000 from other needed funds for our Baptist Charity last year.

Surely we can give more to our beloved hospitals which are "built to bless" in the Saviour's Name. Your Hospital Committee urged you to help.

The theme last year was "THAT THEY MIGHT HAVE LIFE" (John

10:10).

ASSOCIATION MISSIONS COMMITTEE REPORT

4:00 P. M. Thursday:

We Need Parent Churches. Baptist and prospective Baptist are moving into this area all of the time. We now have 38 churches and 2 missions in

our association to minister to these people. We thank God for these churches but they are not enough. The circle of population widens in many areas every month as new people arrive.

The Association Missions Committee and Field Secretary appeal to the churches. We have no Mission Program except a church sponsored one.

Right Now there are several places where missions are needed. For instance, Jim Lee Road vicinity, Perry Highway, Jacksonville Highway, West Tharpe Street Extension. Truck Route (West) and Monroe Street at Allen Road. Other areas should be kept under constant observation, while many mission Sunday Schools and institutional missions are urgently needed.

It can readily be shown that a sponsoring church gets more, in terms of Bible teaching and converts for the money spent in sponsoring a mission than it gets for that spent in its own local program. Many times the mission becomes self-supporting within a few months after its beginning. We cannot over emphasize this fact: "The growing edge of Baptist Life is in its new work!" If we fail to reach the masses of the people, then we are faithful to Him who spoke, "Go ye therefore and teach all nations, baptizing them-teaching them, to observe all things -- both in Jerusalem, and in all Judaea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth". Matthew 28: 16-20, Acts 1:8.

Your Missions Committee has prepared and presented to the Executive Committee an over all Program of work for 1960-61. We stronly urge its adoption as a guide to help us as we labor together for His Glory.

FIELD SECRETARY REPORT DISTRICT THREE

District Three consists of the following associations: Florida, Middle Florida, Suwannee and Taylor. One Hundred seven (107) churches and three (3) missions.

Every church responded to some phase of mission work, but two failed to use the channel of the Cooperative Program. Three Associations enlisted every church in the support of World Wide Missions, Middle Florida, Suwannee and Taylor. Florida Association lacked two churches.

RADIO AND TELEVISION REPORT

Thursday, October 20th; 4:20 P. M.

"The Baptist Hour has been the heart of the ministry of the Radio and Television Commission for nearly 20 years. There is no way of telling the number of individuals who have accepted Christ as a result of hearing His Good News preached on this program week-in, week-out on hundreds of radio stations."

"Because the broadcast becomes a missionary when it leaves the shores of America, the Commission is ever alert to possibilities of reaching, through this program, lost and hopeless individuals of the world. Only two weeks ago a new 15-minute program of evangelistic preaching (Baptist Hour messages translated into Russian) was approved for production. It is to be beamed into Moscow, Russia, from a Trans World Radio transmitter located in Monte Carlo, "

There are three main facets to the work of your Radio-Television Commission: (1) preaching the gospel on radio and television; (2) building an audience for the programs; (3) providing counsel and filling requests which come in response to the programs.

The Commission now produces five weekly radio programs, with a children's program and a counseling program in the planning stages. Distributed weekly are: "The Baptist Hour, " "Master Control," "La Hora Bautista, " "International Sunday School Lesson, " and "The Chapel Upstairs," (See station list for local stations, times).

The new program "Master Control, a Baptist Network program is now being broadcast over WTAL Tallahassee, and numbers of other stations throughout the country. THIS IS THE ANSWER series is still one of the most successful television productions in religious telecasting. The total value of these efforts will never be estimated-but we know that the results far outweigh the cost. The new series of 13 films for use in 1961 is currently being produced, which will bring to 52 the films available to television stations. Other types of programs are currently being planned to serve and represent Southern Baptists on television.

Radio and television programs which have been produced by the churches of the Florida Baptist Association have been successful again this year.

Reports come in regularly from people who express their appreciation for the spiritual uplift gained from them. All churches should be aware of the effectiveness of communication with the public through these media.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

During 1959 the American Bible Society --

1. Donated more than a million Scripture volumes for distribution by the Chaplains to our Armed Forces and to patients in Veterans' Hospitals, providing a vital link between the home churches and the men and women in service.

 Approached its 125th anniversary of supplying Scriptures for the Blind, far below cost, in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

3. Rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1151 languages: the full Bible in 219, a Testament in 271 more an a Gospel or other complete book in 661 more.

4. Continued to supply Scriptures in such strategic areas as West Germany and other lands along the Iron Curtain, Africa, Latin America, Japan, Korea and India--and to many Chinese now living in other countries outside the communist-controlled China mainland.

5. Distributed a total of more than 17 1/2 million Scripture volumes. This was an increase over the 15 million volumes averaged in recent years, but still short of urgent needs.

Southern Baptists Support the Work

Because the Bible Society serves mission work--and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people --Southern Baptist Churches believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

Que year, 1958, Southern Baptist churches led all denominations in gifts to the American Bible Society. But in 1959 Southern Baptist gifts of \$144,200 stood second. Methodists led with gifts of \$156,244. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$955,135.

My outline is built around these three points:

 The Three areas of needs are: Retirement income for the pastor and/or staff, Disability income for the pastor and/or staff, Widow's benefits. These provided by the church.

2. In Florida Association, what is the situation? Only 45% of the churches participate in the Annuity Board plans for their pastors and/or

staff members.

What does the future hold for the young people entering full-time Christian service? We build schools and seminaries to train them; we follow their leadership during their active ministry. What do we do with them in old age? Or what security do we offer them and the loved ones of these faithful men of God? Where are the old preachers who have served your church? Did you do anything to help provide for them in old age?

What about the other 55% of the churches in Florida Baptist Association?

Will you start an Annuity Plan for or with your pastor this year?

3. The Protective Plan fills these three needs-retirement income, disability income, and widow's benefits.

Your church can enter. Your church must enter if the pastor is to

participate.

The cost is based upon the pastor's salary, with \$4000 being the maximum on which payments are made. The church pays 10% and the Florida Baptist Convention will pay 5%-thus 15% is deposited with the Annuity Board for these purposes in connection with your pastor (and/or staff).

If the Church feels that it cannot pay the 10%, it can pay 5% and let the pastor pay 5%. We recommend that the church pay the full amount.

If the church feels that it cannot pay the 10% on his full salary, it can pay 10% on part of his salary-for example, if his salary is \$3000, the church could pay on only \$2000 of his salary.

In this day of compromise, too often by church members, Florida's frightening moral slump is clearly evident. In Leon County we saw the results of compromise, brainwashing, and poor relations between the races in the WET VICTORY recorded July 12-Leon County went wet for the first time since 1904. It will take two years before we can call an election to return the county to a dry status.

WHY? Is the Divine Lord's desciption of the Laodicean Church a fit parallel to our churches today? "So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spew thee out of my mouth. I would that thou

wert either cold or hot, "(Revelations 3:16f).

Remember the words of Frances E. Willard? "The Liquor traffic would destroy the churches if it could; and the Church could destroy the liquor traffic if it would!" This time, we "would not". STATEWIDE, "Count the youthful murderers, rapists, thieves, liars, common drunks and prostitutes among Florida teenagers today... then ask why?... then find the answer in the weak example, moral cowardice, self-centered search for ease and pleasure by FAR TO MANY ADULTS in places of leadership... in some churches, many clubs, business and social organizations, industry and government, and professional groups. Attend convention gatherings of doctors, teachers, lawyers, public officials, Chambers of Commerce, Elks, VFW, American Legion... on and on the list grows... and look with utter amazement at the widescale and open approval and participation in drinking and drunkenness on the part of the 'mighty'." Thus Rev. Jack Eppes, former Tallahassean, Executive Secretary of United Christian Action, Inc., sizes up the SIN OF EXAMPLE which weakens youth and undermines leadership.

FINANCIAL NEEDS. We are grateful for the fact that nine denominations are now represented on the Board of Directors and Advisory Councils for United Christian Action, Inc., and our educational auxiliary organizations, known as Alcohol-Narcotics Education, Inc. In 1959 we received financial support from the following sources-Baptists 66%, Methodists 25%. all other sources, 9%. Florida Baptists contributed \$7,500 through the Annual State Missions Offering, \$1,118.12 through the Florida Baptist

Convention meeting in Tallahassee after Dr. Sanders appeal, and \$15, 784.33 received as designated budget gifts or special offerings from 152 individual Baptist Churches throughout the state.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION REPORT

8:50 PM Thursday

Dr. Frank S. Mead, in his thrilling little book, THE BAPTISTS, says this of the Baptist attitude toward education, "With many in their ranks suspicious of education, they (the Baptists) have presented us with scores of colleges (Bates, Bucknell, Colby, Denison, Franklin, Vassar, Wake Forest), universities (Baylor, Brown, Colgate, Richmond, Stetson), eighteen seminaries, and numerous secondary schools." In this year, 1961, several others are in the planning stage in various parts of the Southland.

The total number of schools, colleges, and seminaries operated by Southern Baptists is 71. In 1960-61 these enrolled approximately 62,000 regular students and approximately 9,000 special and extension students. There were over 10,000 graduates from these Baptist institutions last year. In proportion to their numbers these graduates will make tremenduous

contributions to the life and progress of the Southern states.

Two of the Southern Baptist institutions are in Florida. The best known is Stetson University, at DeLand, the oldest institution of higher learning in our state. Under the able leadership of President J. Ollie Edmunds, Stetson has achieved an enviable reputation as an educational center, dedicated to high scholastic standards and strong Christian emphasis. It has a strong Christian faculty dedicated to the education and guidance of young people. Its student body of approximately 1700 is drawn from some 37 states and 15 foreign countries. Over one-third of the students are Baptists and numbered among these are many ministerial students as well as numerous students of church music and religious education.

The Baptist Bible Institute of Graceville has just begun its 19th year. President James E. Southerland is giving able leadership in the development of this institution which is dedicated to the training of those called to church related vocations, but who do not find it possible or practicable to attend college. This institution is meeting the Christian educational needs of a student body, many of whom are not high school graduates.

President Southerland has brought together a dedicated and scholarly faculty, and is ably developing the facilities of the campus at Graceville.

These two institutions deserve the most loyal and liberal support of Florida Baptists. Both receive contributions from the Cooperative Program funds, but in the light of the services being rendered by these institutions, and the opportunities of both to do much greater service in the Baptist cause, the Cooperative Program contributions are distressingly small. Our churches must continue to assist in meeting the financial needs of these institution by making direct gifts to them.

The Duke of Wellington once said, "Educate men without religion and you make of them but clever devils." George Washington said, "Reason and experience both forbid us to expect that national morality can prevail

in exclusion of religious principles. "

It is the Christian educational institutions which provide much of the stabilizing influence in our society. From them we will get our future Christian leadership. They deserve our enthusiastic support.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

One year ago the enrollment of our 40 churches and missions was 12, 370, and today it is 12, 609, or a net gain of 239, whereas the year before we had a net gain of 437. During the past five years we have had a net gain of 1, 754, an average of 351.

Records of sixteen Sunday Schools for the last twelve months reveal a total net loss of 267. Enrollment of our two missions is included in the above figures, but I hasten to point out that each one had a net increase, Crawfordville Road 64 with present enrollment 263, and Haywood Cates 39 with present enrollment of 107.

During the year we earned 476 training awards in category 17 and

reported 18 Vacation Bible Schools.

Our goals for the new year: In every church and mission, January Bible Study Week, a Vacation Bible School, a study course in category 17 in addition to any Central or Group school, a net increase in enrollement, of 15% the use of the Standard as a guide, the observance of Preparation Week in September, a minimum of 125 new classes, 25 new departments, ten churches observing Operation Home Folks, 12 Standard schools and a Standard Association.

The Association is well organized, 27 of our best qualified leaders dedicated to the task of helping you. Please attend the Associational monthly meetings, call on us when we can help in your local church, and

pray for us.

LEADERSHIP TRAINING-A YEAR OF PRAYER-was the empahsis for 1959-60. Woman's Missionary Union Third Jubilee Advance Goals were promoted during the year and courses for leadership training were held in

the four districts of the association.

Woman's Missionary Union of this association has a membership of 2,700. There are 26 societies with 1,424 members, 10 Young Woman's Auxiliaries with 136 members, 43 Girl's Auxiliaries with 532 members, and 38 Sunbeam Bands with 608 members. At the beginning of the year there were 27 societies, but the society at Sopchoppy Church has disbanded.

The first quarterly meeting was held at East Hill Baptist Church on October 15, 1959 at 10:30 A. M. with 94 in attendance and 17 churches represented. The theme was "Leadership Training" and the speaker was

Dr. S. T. Lastinger from Florida State University.

The second quarterly meetings were held at Seminole Baptist Church on January 26, 1960 at 10:30 A. M. and 8 P. M. with 185 attending the two meetings including 3 pastors and 20 churches were represented. The theme was "Oh Tell Ye The Story" and the speaker was Miss Josephine Jones, Executive Secretary of Florida Woman's Missionary Union.

The third quarterly meeting was held at First Baptist Church, Monticello on April 19, 1960 at 10:30 A. M. 78 attended the meeting and 12 churches were represented. The theme was "Girls' Auxiliary and Camping" and the speaker was Miss Jeri Baldwin, GA Camp counselor and student at Florida State University.

The fourth quarterly meeting was held at First Baptist Church, Tallahassee on July 20, 1960 at 10:30 A. M. and featured our young people. There were 168 attended the meeting and 20 churches were represented. The theme was "Our Youth, His Instruments" and the speaker was Miss Pearl Todd, retired missionary from China and Japan.

The president, community missions, mission study and sumbeam directors attended the State Leader's Conference at Stetson University at Deland on September 6-8, 1960. The president and sunbeam director attended a Sunbeam Workshop in Gainesville on February 18-19, 1960 and then conducted a similar worshop in this association, on March 20, 1960 at Parkway Baptist Church. GENERAL INFORMATION

Jesus commands and expects willful witnessing world-wide. Southern Baptists need, desire, and deserve every stimulus from the Holy-Spirit God's Word and the knowledge of world needs.

The effectiveness and popularity of the Schools of Missions program can be attributed to its basic plan. Presenting Biblical inspiration, knowlege of world need, and all stages of mission endeavor, it challenges the whole church and each member in particular to complete commitment in carrying our Christ's Great Commission.

A Church School of Missions is a program in which the whole church, led by the Pastor and his co-workers, studies missions in age-graded classes during the five nights of one week and hears a missionary message at Sunday worship services and at a general assembly of all classes each

week-night.

PARTICIPATION

The Florida Association was privileged to be one of the many Associations in the South participating in a School of Missions in 1960. The week of the Florida Associational School of Missions was April 24-29. Of the 38 churches in the Association, 32 participated in the program. Twenty of these participated in the entire program, including the classes, and 12 additional churches participated using only the missionary speakers.

ATTENDANCE

The grand total attendance was 13, 135 and the average daily attendance 2, 627.

MISSIONARIES

The number of visting missionaries: State 5, Home 11, Foreign 12, Stewardship 2, and 1 visual.

It is impossible to measure the results of such a far reaching spiritual program as a School of Missions, however we can list the tangible results.

The social service committee reports with sorrow that one of the Counties within our Association (LEON) voted to legalize the sale of alcoholic beverages during the past Associational year. 1. An increased emphasis by each Church on the need for complete

and total abstinence from all alcoholic beverages by all Baptist.

2. A vigilant and alert Church on the watch for Illicit sales within each County. Insist that all law enforcement agencies function as they are required to by law is a never ending battle to end the illegal sale and manufacture of alcohol beverages. We as Christians are in an almost indefensable position when we ignore our Christian and Civic responsibilities in this field.

3. An intensive educational effort by all Churches to acquaint their membership and home communities with the evils of alcohol. To also off set the often repeated but mistaken claim by the Liquor industry that alcohol

benefits a community through taxes.

4. Support prayerfully and financially the efforts of the "United Christian Action" group in their battle against Liquor and other immoral activities.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT YEAR ENDING JUNE 30, 1960

This report is for a nine months period. It was necessary to change the date of the fiscal year to accommodate the auditors who check the books of our Home and other agencies of the Convention. Heretofore, it has been almost impossible for them to finish their work and have the reports in time for the meeting of our State Convention each November. The fiscal year will close on June 30 hereafter and the audit and reports will be for a period of 12 months.

Applications for admission to the Home have been unusually heavy during the past year. This was due in part to the growth of the state and also to the inability of some state agencies to help in the care of children who were not eligible for state assistance. These turned to the Children's Home for aid, which was given in every possible case. If the children could not be admitted, they were referred to other agencies which seemed best equipped to meet their needs. Every application was given careful attention.

A third cottage was opened at the South Florida Branch of the Florida Baptist Children's Home in December 1959. We now have three attractive buildings on the Miami campus and approximately seven and one-half acres of land.

Assistance was given to 384 children from 160 families for the period beginning October 1, 1959 and ending June 30, 1960. There were 183 in the Children's Homes at Miami and Lakeland, 2 were in foster home care, 26 on Mother's Aid, and 12 were assisted in the homes of relatives for a total of 223 under supervision. A total of 161 applicants were given help through counseling and referral to other agencies.

We wish to point out the need for your participation in the special Thanksgiving offering for the Home. It shares in the cooperative program but it does not get enough from this source to meet expenses. Each church throughout the state will receive a poster which we urge you to place on your bulletin board. You will also receive a postal asking you to fill in the number of envelopes you will need for the offering. These will be sent to you upon request, without charge. It is important that each church have a special part in our work with dependent children. We earnestly desire your cooperation in the Thanksgiving offering for our Home.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

5:10 PM Friday

The time for the Annual Associational meeting has arrived. This meeting has been firmly established in the thinking of our people. The District Association is the second unit of Baptist life. No meeting, except that of the local Baptist Church, looms so large and is so important as the Annual Meeting.

The first fact to be reported to our people is this-in county after county the population is decreasing simply because people are moving to other areas. This creates a real problem for the people who remain, for it so weakens their churches that they are scarcely able to carry on-many will have to merge, relocate or close. Now the other extreme is that in more than half of the state the population is increasing so fast that it can hardly be computed. In these areas the problem is where and how many new churches are to be established and who is to sponsor them? These churches must be established, or we surrender the field to other bodies and then arrive years later, wondering why we made the mistake of allowing the choice locations to be secured by someone else. We must act now.

Another fact to which we call your attention is the need for more training and using of the new converts who are coming into our churches each year. Thousands of these converts are "babes in Christ", and they need to be trained, enlisted, and utilized; for unless they are utilized, they become liabilities rather than assets to God's kingdom.

Still a third fact we need to point out is that every one of our churches needs to be encouraged to set a definite percentage of their total undesignated budgets for world missions through the COOPERATIVE PROGRAM, and then, advance that percentage year by year, until we give as the Master would have us give for the spread of the Gospel to the ends of the earth. Florida is now giving less than 10% to world missions through the Cooperative Program. Our need is to increase this by at least 2% in every local Baptist Church of our State each year.

The fourth fact I wish to point out is that the future of Florida is as bright as the unclaimed promises of God, and is as sure as our faith and our ability to claim these promises from God. The harvest in Florida was never more plenteous, and the laborers are still few. Let us continue to move together as one great band for Christ, as we have been moving in the past years, and as surely as we claim God's promises and allow Him to lead us, we will take the state of Florida.

State Missions cannot be minimized. State Missions cannot be neglected. State Missions is our mission. Florida is our state mission field.

HOME MISSIONS REPORT

5:15 PM Friday

Baptist work under the Home Mission Board stretches all the way from Cuba, the largest island of the West Indes to Alaska, sometimes called The Last Frontier.

We see a familiar scene when we look at home missions. It is the family next door which goes fishing when you go to church. It is the

beautiful resort town of your vacation filled with amusement but almost barren of worship. It is as familiar as the Chinese who feeds you his exotic food and charms you with his oriental grace, but who hungers as does every soul for fulfillment. It is your son away from home, now a man preparing to defend his country. It is the Jew who owns the clothing store on Main Street and still seeks to buy his salvation by an obedience to the law. It is the sprawling, fascinating city where you live, or it is the verdant, productive farm, the rolling country side---or the midst covered mountains, the acrid desert. It is Man; confused and ignorant, hungry and sick, wealthy and busy, destitute and lonely, and it is man lost. Above all it is man without God.

Home Missions is the seeking, and the finding, of the lost. It is the taking of, not the waiting with, the gospel and the church to man wherever he is and in whatever condition he is. It is man's daring, Militant attempt

to completely fulfill the Great Commission.

How grateful we are to God for the knowledge that the number of home missionaries now reaches 1,017. If we are to reach the millions who are lost within our Home Mission Board territory every Christian must consider herself or himself a missionary and make a sincere effort to win a soul to Christ. We must realize that we do not have to cross the ocean to become a missionary but we must take a long look at the "crucial mission field in our backyard".

Wherever there is human life there is need. This year the "Annie Armstrong Offering" goal was \$2,350,000. Of this amount \$574,250.00 was alloted for Language Missions. There are 80,000 Chinese, 7,000,000 French speaking Indians, 365,000 other Indians, 125,000 Japanese, 4,000,000 Spanish, others in Cuba, Panama, and smaller groups, such as Italians, Koreans, Russians, the deaf, and the migrant who need to draw from the well of life. (Every church will want to make a worthy offering for this work.)

The Home Mission Board is making progress in most phases of Home Mission work. Much has been done in the provision of buildings in the vast pioneer areas of the Western and Northern sections of our country. Of the 2000 churches established in relatively new areas, over 400 of them were

assisted by Home Mission Board church loans.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

5:20 PM Friday

Certain characters or symbols are taken by the Chinese to form words. The word "crisis" is a combination of two characters. One means danger and the other means opportunity. The word "Crisis" describes very vividly our present day. As Christians and Baptists we realize the dangers of facing our nation and the world. We also realize our opportunity to give the Gospel of Christ to all mankind.

Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, Executive Secretary of our Foreign Mission Board, says, "Southern Baptists must measure our mission undertaking by our potential-not by what we or others have done. When we put what we are doing alongside the reality of human need and the reality of open doors

in the world, we recognize that we have hardly begun. We must measure what we are doing by the crisis of our day. This is the day of destiny."

The number of missionaries in active service is 1,407. The year 1959 ended with the urgent need of 675 new missionaries but only 144 new appointments were made. Our missionaries now serve in 44 countries. Work began in six of these in 1959.

Evangelism is the ultimate goal and regardless of the institution, all missionaries participate in the work of the churches in their stations. The 3, 269 churches and 6, 332 chapels and mission points reported a Sunday School enrolment of 340, 346. There were 28, 828 baptisms during 1959. Church membership reached the 427, 204 mark.

There is an enrolment of 151, 276 students in the 1,002 Baptist Schools served by 4,781 national and 304 missionary teachers. Theological institutions number 32 with 1,359 students. There are 4 Women's Training

Schools.

During the year 263, 379 patients were served in the 17 hospitals and 80 clinics.

Fourteen publishing centers turned out 13, 125, 799 pieces of literature during the year. On the publication staffs 54 missionaries and 360 national served.

The gifts of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$15,985,116.39. Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$7,706,847.29.

In our day of danger and opportunity, may God lead Florida Association to accept a greater share of the responsibility of world evangelization.

ASSEMBLIES REPORT

Our Southern Baptist Constituency have come to accept the principal that trained leadership builds better churches. Therefore throughout our denomination assemblies have arisen to meet this challenge. Our two southwide assemblies, Ridgecrest and Glorieta, have contributed much to this leadership development. In addition there are State assemblies, Associational assemblies, Church assemblies, and Department assemblies all making their contribution.

Certainly the admonition of Solomon, "Train up a child in the way he should go: and when he is old, he will not depart from it" is one of the motives behind our Assembly program. This was one of the contributing factors which brought into existence our Silver Lake Assembly. Although our Assembly this year was one of the smallest we had probably our best assembly. There were a number of things which contributed to this decision,

namely, the general attitudes toward one another as we lived as one big family for the week; punctuality in class attendance; practially perfect attendance upon the classes; no homesickness; no epidemic of sickness such as we experienced last year; and last, cooperation by all in all of the assembly activities. The leadership of the assembly were high in praise about the assembly.

This year our assembly offered the following number of courses for those attending; Junior 14, Intermediate 6, Young People and Adult 2. There

were 253 awards earned by the members of our Assembly.

There were 75 Juniors and 34 Intermediates in attendance this year. The churches and number from each church attending were: Antioch 1; Carrabelle 17; Concord 1; Crawford Road Mission 11; East Hill 8; Ebenezar J. 1; Ebenezar L. 2; Fellowship 1; First Quincy 2; First Tallahassee 2; Havana 1; Immanuel 5; Lakeview 13; Monticello First 23; Santa Clara 4; Seminole 13; University Heights 17; Woodville 1.

One of the felt needs this year was more adult leadership in our program. Our thanks to everyone of our staff and teachers for their splendid dedication to their task and for the fine piece of work each did

with his or her group.

We respectfully urge all of our churches to promote the attendance of Silver Lake Assembly well in advance of the assembly date to assure better planning of a program. Difficulty arises in planning adequately when we do not know approximately the number attending. If registrations could close one month ahead of the date this would help a lot.

Last summer there were two students from FSU who served the State of Florida BSU in Alaska and Miss Pat Loveland represented the State of Florida BSU in Nigeria. Approximately \$930 was raised by the students at FSU by baby-sitting, car-wahing, and selling cakes for the summer mission program.

Three students worked on one of the state BSU Revival teams. They were Jack Yelvington, Preacher; Ernest Stoutamire, Minister of Music;

and Sara Barnes, Seminar-Recreation Director.

Three students also worked for the Home Mission Board during the summer as well as some also worked at Ridgecrest on the staff. The Director was honored on his 5th Anniversary by the students' presenting him a plaque commemorating his leadership and a surprise reception.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION REPORT

The business of the Foundation may be broadly described as that of promoting stewardship among our people, stewardship, not only of possess-

ions but likewise of time, life and love.

The pattern for the stewardship of possessions has through the years been blessed abundantly and has abundantly blessed those who have followed that pattern. The tithe becomes the basis of the pattern, but if we do not contemplate the stewardship of substance in the light of the stewardship of life, love and time, we may be in a perpetual and difficult mathematical process trying to work out a way in which we can "make ends meet" as we attempt to tithe.

Many of our people ask: "How may I help the work of the Foundation in my Church? Since the work of the Foundation is largely in the field of making Wills, the creation of Trusts or Endowments for the support of our various Agencies, State or Southwide, you may greatly help our work by giving us information concerning friends in your Church who may have custody of some of God's money they want to use for such pruposes.

We have not advocated the establishment of standing Committee in the Associations to promote this type of service for this reason; so much of our work has to do with the making of Wills and Wills are such severely private matters, that with a committee at work in the field, it might be thought by some that the information necessary to the Will (or Trust) would become the knowledge of the Committee and perhaps to the wider group under which the Committee serves. Let this be said-that NO INFORMATION in these respects goes beyond the MAKER OF THE WILL and the COUNSEL AND SECRETARY of the Foundation and is thus treated in strict and absolute confidence.

As we have intimated before to the Associations, we have an arrangement with the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention whereby people with smaller estates and who need the income thereof for life, may purchase Gift Annuities paying them a fixed income for life, at rates ranging from 3% at age 35 to 7.4% at age 80 with the privilege granted the annuitant of naming the Agency to which they desire the gift portion to be given. This gift portion is computed at the time the annuity is purchased and is payable to the agency also at the same time.

During the past year, one of our faithful friends has contributed a substantial "paid-up" insurance policy, establishing a fund, for Missionary Service. Another "Trust Fund" is in process of formation, having as beneficiaries two of the fine Churches in our State. An Educational Trust announced last year is now complete and moneys being added thereto.

RETIREMENT CENTERS REPORT

8:10 PM Friday

Florida Baptist Retirement Centers is the newest department of missions and evangelism among Florida Baptists. Interest in the program is growing throughout the state.

Reports indicate that there are over 14, 000, 000 people in the U.S. who are sixty-five years of age or older, this number to reach 20, 000, 000 by 1970. Some 418, 000 of them live in Florida of whom at least 50, 000 are

Baptists.

Work was begun on the building of the first unit of the Center at Vero Beach during the early part of September. It is located on the beautiful homestead property of Mr. and Mrs. Walter S. Buckingham which they gave to Florida Baptists for this purpose. Their generosity has made it possible for us to begin this new work much earlier than we could have gotten started otherwise. Groundbreaking Ceremonies were October 17.

The building now being constructed will consist of rooms for single residents, the lounge, the dining room, the kitchen and offices. Duplex cottages and cottages of other designs will be erected as requested and provided for. All single rooms will be provided with private bath and ample closet space. It is expected that this portion of the building program

will be ready for occupancy in January of next year.

Those who are eligable for residency are retired missionaries, retired ministers and their wives and retired lay workers in the churches. They will be received upon recommendation of their pastors and their churches.

Beginning as we are it is not possible for us to accept responsibility for "life care". Contracts for "life tenancy" will, however, be issued upon residents fulfilling certain agreements in relation to the construction cost of the accomodations they will occupy. The charges to be made will only be such as will cover actual expenses though not including the expenses of the general office.

The building program presents a number of memorial opportunities such as the construction cost of a room which is \$3,500.00 (though the rooms will cost about \$4,000.00); the cost of furnishing a room-\$500.00, the construction cost of the lounge and that of the kitchen. Also furniture for the lounge and dining room must be provided. We will place a plaque on the door of each room provided for as a gift or a memorial with such

lettering on it as may be desired by the contributors.

Those who are interested in helping to finance the building program may get in touch with the General Director, Rev. J. Perry Carter, 715 Palermo Avenue, Coarl Gables, Florida. Your help is needed now while the workmen are on the job and have their equipment there.
