CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers, duly elected annually by the churches cooperating with this body, who shall present church letters certifying evidence thereof.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE III - HOLDING POWER

Section 1. The Association shall have power to accept all gifts, such as land, personal property or money, and to approve purchase and develop all property that may be deeded to or purchased by the Association. It shall also have the power to sell or trade property as it may be recommended by the Executive Committee for approval of the members of the Association at the annual meeting or at a called meeting.

Section 2. Beginning in 1961, the Association at its annual meeting shall elect three of its members to serve as trustees of the Association. All three must be lay members. One shall be elected for one year, one for two years and one for three years. Each year thereafter one will be elected for a three year term to replace the retiring trustee. A trustee may succeed himself if the Association so directs. In the event of a vacancy during the year, the Executive Committee shall appoint someone to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting.

Section 3. The trustees shall hold in trust all property of the Association. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property without a specific vote of the Association authorizing such action. They shall have the responsibility of improvement and maintenance but shall not expend monies without the approval of the Executive Committee or the Association.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually on the first day of the Association meeting, and they shall begin serving at the close of the session and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Method of election shall be by nomination from the floor. In the event that two or more are nominated for the same office, election shall be by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by acclamation or designated ballot.

Section 3. Duties of officers.

(1) Moderator. . He shall preside at all meetings of the Association and shall preserve order at the sessions. He shall decide all questions on order and propriety. He shall appoint all committees as designated in this constitution or as directed by the body.

(2) Vice-Moderator. . He shall preside in the absence or at the request of the Moderator.

(3) Clerk. He shall see that messengers are enrolled and that a regular record of all business of the Association shall be made and preserved. He shall have the minutes of the annual meeting printed and distributed to each church.

(4) Assistant Clerk. . He shall aid the clerk in whatever way he is requested.

(5) Treasurer. . He shall receive and keep an accurate account of all monies contributed by the churches in the Association and of any other monies received. He shall disburse monies at the instruction of the Association or its Executive Committee. He shall make written report of the same at the annual meeting or at the request of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. In the event that the Moderator should resign or remove from the Association, the Vice-Moderator shall succeed to the position of Moderator and a new Vice-Moderator shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V - PURPOSE

The objects of this Association are missionary, educational and benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE VI - REPORTS

All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Committee. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. Membership. . The Executive Committee shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music and Evangelism) and the officers of the Association. Associate pastors, ministers of education and music shall be honorary members and all state Baptist employees with membership in the churches of the Association shall serve as advisory members.

Section 2. Election. . The committee of nominations will name the members of the Executive Committee during the annual association, or the nominating committee of the Executive Committee shall name them ad interim, filling vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the nominating committee shall recommend to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

Section 3. Meetings. . This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire. A number equal to half the number of churches shall constitute a quorum. It shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

ARTICLE IX - NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Six months prior to the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of Departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendations, to nominate suitable heads for all departments. They shall also nominate trustees. They shall make recommendation of names to be suggested to the State Convention for members on the State Board of Missions.

ARTICLE X - ASSOCIATION OFFICE

The Association shall establish an Association Office and appoint a qualified salaried person to be secretary for the Association. A committee composed of the Moderator, the Treasurer and the Clerk shall make the selection of the location of the office and of the secretary. They shall report to the Executive Committee for approval of their selection.

ARTICLE XI - SCOPE OF WORK

This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Section 1. The Association shall have power to provide for the general union of the churches.

Section 2. It may counsel with any church in difficulty.

Section 3. It may inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or failing to furnish statistical reports to such, or failing to be co-operative with the denominational program.

Section 4. It may withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or violating the spirit or purpose of this Association.

Section 5. It may accept into this union other Baptist churches which are found to be orthodox and co-operative with the denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. It may grant a letter of dismission to any church wishing such and having requested such letter by writing, provided said church is in good standing and the application can be approved by the Executive Committee prior to the annual meeting.

Section 7. It may appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified, to the best interest of the Master's cause.

Section 8. It may adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this union.

ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature by his own free will and ability.

ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by the imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a general, final judgement.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be everlasting and the joys of the righteous shall be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

ARTICLE XI. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in the exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from worldly amusements. Works of necessity and mercy are excepted.

ARTICLE XII. We believe that God alone is Lord of the conscience and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Since civil government is

ordained by God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to civil powers to carry on its work. The Gospel of Christ contemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its end. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.
3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the Association at the direction of the Moderator.
4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.
5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by Mell's Parliamentary Practice.
6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

The 119th annual session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by John W. Hunt, Moderator, at 2:30 p.m. Thursday October 19, at First Baptist Church, Tallahassee. The program theme was "Facing the Uncertain with the Unfailing".

1. Marion Hayes led the congregation in singing "He Lives" and "Marching to Zion". The organist was Miss Ellen Frazee.
2. Ted Rodda read from the Scriptures, I Peter 2:1-10, and led in prayer.
3. Marion Hayes, Minister of Education of the host church, brought words of welcome.
4. Clerk of the Association, W. M. Scruggs, Sr., moved that the Messengers already present, with others that might register, constitute the organization of the body. The motion carried; and visitors present were welcomed.
5. New church workers introduced by S. J. Hampton, were: Pastors: Hugh R. Kinsey - Haywood Cates Memorial Mission of First Church, Tallahassee; Ted Rodda - First Baptist Church, Sopchoppy; Gene Tyree - Indian Springs Baptist Church; and Marion L. Hayes, Minister of Education, First Church, Tallahassee.
6. John Martin moved and T. F. McReynolds seconded, the adoption of the printed program as the order of business. The motion carried.
7. The Moderator made the following appointments:
Committee on Resolutions - Trumon Gray, Chairman, C. H. Darsey, and Mrs. J. Robert Wilson.
Committee on Time, Place and Preacher - R. P. Tomberlin, Jr., Chairman, H. H. Link and Dewitt Rehberg.

Committee on Nominations - Warren Rush, Chairman, Ellis B. Turner and Ted Rodda.

Committee on Committees - S. A. Coxwell, Chairman, R. E. Loftin and C. O. Houston.

A telegram from Dr. Harold G. Sanders was read.

8. Following the song service led by Marion Hayes, the Moderator called for miscellaneous business. W. M. Scruggs, Sr., moved, and J. E. Robinson seconded the motion that the Florida Association's representative on the State Board of Missions report to the Association, that it may be informed of the Board proceedings. The motion carried.

9. The Vice-Moderator, C. A. Alexander, took the Chair and called for the Report of the Executive Committee, John W. Hunt presented the report and recommended its adoption as printed in the book of reports. The motion was seconded by Hugh Kinsey and carried.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Constitution of the Association states that the Executive Committee shall act for the Association when it is not in session. This we have tried to do during the past 12 months. Meetings have been held each month at the Immanuel Church except for one meeting when Frank Johnson invited the group to meet at his home on the coast, and one meeting that was held at the Silver Lake Camp grounds. Average attendance has been 16 pastors, 8 laymen and 2 advisory and honorary members.

During the year reports have been made monthly from all departments of our Associational work. In addition, special committees have reported and made suggestions that we considered.

Matters which were cared for were the setting up of an Association Office in the Immanuel Church. Miss Roumelle Bowen was employed to serve as the first secretary. When she resigned, Mrs. John W. Hunt was employed until the first of September, at which time Miss Bowen resumed the duties until a regular employee can be found.

During the year three laymen were elected to act as temporary Trustees to receive for the Association property from Fenton Jones which he gave to the Association providing it would be used for a camp or assembly site and be marked to honor his mother, Mrs. Minnie L. Jones.

A number of constitutional changes were approved and will be brought to this session of the Association for consideration.

Eight churches in Gadsden County requested dismissal from the Association in order to aid in the establishing of another association. Action on the recommendation of the Executive Committee will be considered later.

Your Committee would like to make the following recommendation: That the Churches of our Association cooperate in the following programs during the next year: Community Survey in February, Jubilee Revivals in March and Pastor-led Enlargement Campaign in September.

MUSIC REPORT

I am happy to bring you a report of the music activities and accomplishments for the year just ended. In our Association in 1960-1961, from the 40 churches and missions, there were 22 churches in Music Training with 223 awards. Florida Association has been among the High Five Associations in Music Training awards with 2 churches in the Association among the High Five churches.

In our Associational Music Festivals, we had 8 choirs and 4 song leaders from the 3 churches participating. Our Association was represented at the State Music Festivals at Panama City and Live Oak and at the State Youth Choral Clinic at Deland. We have:

- 27 churches with 1 choir or more;
- 17 churches with 2 choirs or more;
- 7 churches with 3 choirs or more;
- 5 churches with 4 choirs or more.
- 1 church with 7 choirs.
- 13 churches with no music program.

Two Music Camps were held at Harmony Bay on the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City. Each church in our association may send 5 intermediates and young people to each camp.

The Church Music Ministry will endeavor to help any church any time during the year by assisting the church in locating capable workers for a music training school. The State Church Music Department will assist any church in financial help for a Music Training School where assistance is needed.

We hope and pray that every church in our Association will strive for a larger and more efficient Music Department for the coming year. May we say thanks to your pastors, music directors and others for your cooperation in your Associational program. Please participate in the 1961-1962 Calendar of Activities.

Let it be understood by all that these requests do not represent any misunderstanding between the churches and the Florida Association. The sole reason for this action has been the desire to do a greater work for our Lord in their area.

We acknowledge with deep gratitude the contribution that these churches have made to the Florida Association.

We heartily commend these churches to God and the Power of His grace; and pray that they shall continue to have a strategic place in our Baptist witness in Florida, and that their work shall grow in depth and effectiveness.

The churches represented this year were: Seminole, 15; Ebenezer (J), 1; Monticello, First, 24; Santa Clara, 7; Havana, 3; Fellowship, 2; Crawfordville Road Mission, 14; Lakeview, 11; Carrabelle, 14; Parkway, 4; Panacea, 9; Immanuel, 6; Forest Heights, 3; Ebenezer (L), 3; Thomasville Road, 2; East Hill, 1; Crawfordville, First, 2; University Heights, 1; Haywood Cates Mission, 7. The 22 faculty members made a total attendance of 151. There were 71 girls, ranging in age from 9 to 18 and 58 boys, ranging in age from 9 to 16. There were 82 Juniors and 47 Intermediates, or a total of 129 youth.

All who attended had a most wonderful time and we only lost one through home-sickness. There were no accidents except many yellow fly bites. The recreational program was "top notch" and the youngsters participated wonderfully well. The meals were delicious and an average of 160 plates were served at each meal at an average cost of 44¢ per plate.

The date for Silver Lake Assembly next year is June 25 to 30. Plan to have your church represented with a large group from your church attending. Get your reservation in early so you will not be left out.

15. The Moderator recognized two other new pastors in the Association - C. W. McDonald, Aeon Baptist Church and John Temoshchuk, University Heights Baptist Church.

16. The report on the Association Assembly Grounds was presented by E. W. Perryman, who emphasized the tremendous importance of the Assembly Grounds to the Association. On the land donated by Fenton Jones there are three residences, all in need of repair and cleaning. Each church should encourage its organizations to plan to use the property during the year as well as in the summer. E. W. Perryman made the following recommendations:

1. That the Association elect a Board of Directors, made up of three laymen and two ministers, which will elect among themselves a Director, and a Secretary-Treasurer with authority to receive and expend all monies designated for the Camp;

2. That E. W. Perryman's resignation as Director of the Camp be accepted. Thomas Cuttino moved, and Trumon Gray seconded the motion to adopt these recommendations. The motion carried following a period of discussion.

17. W. M. Scruggs, Sr., moved that a picture of the camp site be printed in the book of minutes. John Martin seconded the motion, which carried.

18. Marion Hayes led the congregation in the singing of "Blessed Assurance". The Moderator called for the reports on the Program of the Denomination.

19. The report on the Cooperative Program was presented by C. D. Burke, who moved its adoption. The motion, seconded by J. E. Robinson, carried.

COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program represents all the work that Southern Baptists are cooperatively undertaking for Christ. It is our conviction that the whole of our Cooperative Program is more important than any one, or any combination of its parts. No single cause stands alone. Each is dependent on the others.

We believe that the whole of our Cooperative Program will have greater appeal to the Baptists of Florida Association than any one of its parts when it is clearly understood. Since information is the only intelligent basis for co-operation, we recommend that the leaders of our association make every effort to explain the Cooperative Program to the people during the coming year, and give this program loyal and prayerful support.

The forward Program of Church Finance is now in its fifth year of use and is rendering service to churches in planning, promoting, and pledging annual budgets.

Recognizing that some churches need help in budget planning and pledging before attempting the entire Forward Program, stages have been provided for churches with little previous experience in this area. Known as the Beginner and Intermediate Stages, these helps are now available in the 1961 Guidebook.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend:

1. That every church in Florida Association include the Cooperative Program in its budget on a percentage basis.

2. That churches consider the 2 Plus Plan. This plan means increasing by at least two the percentage of the total budget going to missions through the Cooperative Program each year.

3. That Florida Association endeavor to lead all churches to study and utilize the Forward Program or one of its stages in the near future.

20. C. L. Clements presented the report on the Baptist Foundation and moved that it be adopted. John Martin seconded the motion, which carried. Adolph Bedsole of Panama City spoke to the report concerning wills and the Florida Baptist Foundation.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

In Scripture much stress is laid on faithfulness - faithfulness in work, worship, witness; faithfulness in personal devotion and particularly, faithfulness in the stewardship of possessions.

It is a wonderful blessing that God would grant us the privilege of using that which belongs to Him. We should be wise and loyal in our stewardship.

The Florida Baptist Foundation is an Agency seeking to strengthen all the causes of our faith all around the world, by encouraging our people to commit their substance to these causes by Scriptural tithe during lifetime and by Will or Bequest or Trust to serve when the earthly stewardship has passed. Since this is true it is prudence for a faithful steward to "plan" his estate well.

In planning of an Estate the importance of an experienced Attorney cannot be over estimated. By its very nature the creation of an Estate involves many important legal questions requiring knowledge of competent counsel. The effectiveness of a Trust Agreement may depend largely upon the provisions that are made. And in the field of taxation the knowledge of experienced counsel is of utmost importance, that these accumulations of a lifetime of labor may accomplish their greatest good.

During the year Wills have been advised upon and while their value to Convention Agencies may not be listed, they have been considerable. Information concerning 4 other Wills have come to us from several law offices in the State. One Gift Annuity has been applied for and details are being arranged for a second Contract. The gift portions of these Annuities go to State Convention Agencies.

The Foundation continues to handle endowments for Baptist Bible Institute, Florida Normal and Industrial College and Stetson University and commends these interests to the generosity of our people.

21. The adoption of the report on the Children's Home was moved by W. M. Scruggs, Sr., who presented it. J. W. Hough seconded the motion. It carried. Charles Sproul, case worker for the Children's Home, spoke to the report.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

The Children's Home is increasing its casework and counseling services. We now have four caseworkers. They investigate all applications, discuss family problems with parents and children and then make recommendations for the kind of help each needs.

When several children from the same home arrive we try to place them in one cottage. They share the living room, dining room and in many ways live as they would do in their own home. The purpose is to rear brothers and sisters of the same family together that they might learn to depend on and to help each other. The program is working out fine.

The home received 430 applications for admission from July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961. Seventy-eight were accepted in the homes at Lakeland and Miami. The others were referred to other agencies. The total number cared for during the year was 224.

The Baptist Children's Home needs more financial help from the Baptist Churches of Florida. We would like for EVERY CHURCH to place a special amount in its BUDGET for the HOME: May we urge individual classes, W. M. U.'s and other groups to help so that the Home can provide clothing, a small amount of spending money, school lunches and presents on birthdays and Christmas.

THANKSGIVING OFFERING

May we urge that every CHURCH of our Association make a special offering at the Thanksgiving season. I have visited the children on two trips to Lakeland during the past year and they are in urgent need of MORE HELP. Will you do your part? Our Association contributed food and supplies when the truck was in our section. Many thanks.

Our REQUEST and PRAYERS are that the Baptists of Florida will not neglect the CHILDREN in our HOME.

22. The report on the Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board was brought by Ellis B. Turner, who moved that it be adopted. The motion was seconded by W. E. Bailey and carried. Phil Maxwell of Tallahassee spoke to the report.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

As of March 1961 the official name of this Board is "Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention". Baptists over the Convention are urged to use the Board's new name.

Total new members in all the Annuity Board's plans in 1960 increased by nine per cent over 1959, with the largest increase, 2,053, being in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan. Total membership stood at 22,578 on January 1, 1961. More than 4,000 of the churches are paying the full 10 per cent dues. On April 1, 1961 six states had enrolled more than 70 per cent of their churches and pastors in the protection program. District of Columbia had the highest percentage, 94. Average participation of all states was 63 per cent.

Benefits amounting to \$2,745,613.60 were paid to more than 5,200 retired and disabled ministers and denominational workers or widows during 1960. A little more than 4,200 of these were beneficiaries of one of the Board's retirement plans, and the rest were on the relief rolls. Since the Board's beginning in 1918, it has paid out benefits totaling \$34,425,100.55.

Administrative officers of the Board are: R. Alton Reed, executive secretary; Floyd B. Chaffin and L. T. Daniel, associate secretaries; Fred W. Noe, treasurer and investment director; Owen Henley, assistant director of investments and Mable H. McCartney, registrar.

In addition to these administrative officers there are fifteen field representatives serving 22 states in the convention. The field representative for Florida is Rev. Phil Maxwell, with offices at 1105 Sarasota Drive, Tallahassee. Rev. Maxwell is available for personal conferences with pastors or church leaders. Write him for arrangements.

23. Clerk of the Association, W. M. Scruggs, Sr., reported that 34 churches, represented by 120 messengers, had registered. Six churches were not represented by this time.

24. A short service of song was followed by special music, "Follow Me", sung by Marion Hayes.

25. S. A. Coxwell moved and E. W. Perryman seconded the motion that the report on the Baptist Bible Institute be adopted. The motion carried. An address on the Baptist Bible Institute was brought by the President of that institution, Dr. James E. Southerland.

BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE REPORT

The current Southern Baptist Convention policy on limiting enrollment of non-college graduates in our seminaries has created dangers. God-called men need a loyal, dedicated atmosphere where they can prepare for their ministry.

Baptist Bible Institute at Graceville, Florida, provided by the Florida Baptist State Convention, meets this need. Properly recommended applicants may enroll, without even so much as a high school diploma.

Enrollment is highest in the school's history. Total enrollment last year (1960-1961) was 189. September 1961 was 200, with more expected in the spring semester and the summer school that follows. The enrollment figure will reach at least 225, perhaps more, for this year.

To graduate, a student must complete a three-year course (100 semester hours) that parallels work done on the Bachelor of Divinity degree, but without languages.

J. D. Allen, A. B., Th. D., joined the faculty this year to head the Department of Religious Education. This brings the faculty to twelve - nine teacher and three administrative faculty. The faculty ranks with that of any Southern Baptist Seminary or College in earned degrees.

Although a Florida Baptist Institution, Baptist Bible Institute is a vital and loyal part of Southern Baptist Life. The Cooperative Program provided \$72,627 through the Florida Baptist State Convention budget. The Institute budget is set at \$155,055.00 for 1961-1962, an increase with rising costs and an increased student body in mind. This means that more churches should put the school in their local budgets (this is officially agreed upon in the State Convention). From this source the Institute must have \$20,000. Endowment, now quite small, must be substantially increased.

More students mean more problems. The school has too few apartments, too few classrooms. The school could fill a woman's building, if available, and also fill twenty-five new apartments. A music building and educational building are needed. The Institute will soon launch a building fund and endowment campaign. The purpose is to raise \$100,000 for building a new administrative building, and \$100,000 for endowment. It is hoped that the people of Florida will give this whole-hearted support.

The successes of the Institute - i. e., the growing student body, an effective teaching program, the work of the graduates and alumni - have brought favorable attention from Southern Baptist leaders. This year students came from sixteen states and Canada. The Southern Baptist Convention Program Committee

recently considered the matter of Bible Schools for the Convention and was favorably impressed. More colleges are accepting Baptist Bible Institute credits than in previous years, which gives evidence of the growing respect for work done at this Bible School.

Let me urge you to pray for Baptist Bible Institute. Put it in your budget. Use the students when you can. By doing this, you will be fellow-workers with God and our Baptist Bible Institute.

28. L. B. Thomason read I Peter 5:1-11 and led in prayer.

29. The Brotherhood Report was presented by Gary Hurst, who moved its adoption. O. P. Cowart seconded the motion, which carried.

BROTHERHOOD REPORT

During the year there have been four scheduled quarterly meetings. These meetings, held in various churches, were well attended, which was very encouraging.

We have been in several of the local Brotherhoods to lend assistance where we could. All local presidents are encouraged to call on the Associational officers, who will be glad to aid in any area of Brotherhood work.

Our major emphases for this Associational year are our Brotherhood Encampments, Royal Ambassador Congresses and Royal Ambassador Camps. A Regional Conference will be held January 12, 1962 at the First Baptist Church, Quincy. All Brotherhood and R. A. leaders are urged to attend. See the 1961-1962 Calendar of Activities.

30. Mrs. J. Robert Wilson moved the adoption of the report on the Woman's Missionary Union; Trumon Gray seconded the motion, which carried. Mrs. Wilson spoke to the report.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

"Sharing Possessions - A Year of Prayer" was the emphasis for 1960-1962. Woman's Missionary Union Third Jubilee Advance Goals were promoted during the year. The leadership training course was made available to all the societies and auxiliaries.

Woman's Missionary Union of Florida Association has a membership of 2,918. There are 28 societies with 1,485 members; 11 Young Woman's Auxiliaries with 142 members; 39 Girls' Auxiliaries with 596 members and 44 Sunbeam Bands with 695 members. There were 986 members reported as tithees.

The first quarterly meeting was held October 18, 1960 at the First Baptist Church in Quincy with 174 present. There were 9 pastors present and 19 churches represented. The theme was "Pressing Toward the Mark" and the speaker was Mrs. Lewis Bevis of Tallahassee.

There were 176 women representing 18 churches and 6 pastors attended the second quarterly meeting at Thomasville Road Baptist Church on February 13, 1961. The theme was "I Will Be Faithful" and the speaker was Miss Carolyn Weatherford, state G. A. Director.

The third quarterly meeting was held April 13, 1961 at Parkway Baptist Church. The speaker was Mrs. Carlos Owens, missionary to Tanganyika. An informal coffee honoring Rev. and Mrs. Owens was held prior to the meeting in the church dining room. There were 128 representing 18 societies, and 4 pastors present.

The fourth quarterly meeting was held at Carrabelle Baptist Church on July 19, 1961 and the speaker was Miss Vena Aguiard, missionary to French speaking people in Louisiana. There were 15 churches represented with 101 in attendance.

Year books were prepared for all members of the executive board of Woman's Missionary Union and all pastors of churches having a missionary organization.

The president attended the state Girls' Auxiliary Houseparty in Miami, October 21-23 at Riverside Baptist Church, the W. M. U. Convergence at Ridgecrest, August 10-16 and the Advanced Leaders' Conference in Deland, September 5-7.

TRAINING UNION REPORT

The Associational Training Union is your organization. You elect the officers and adopt the Calendar of Activities and we feel it deserves your support. A much greater participation in the Training Union is anticipated in 1962. The officers are ready to help you in any way possible.

The Theme this year is "Lengthen and Strengthen".

On October 1, 1960 there were 36 Training Unions with an enrollment of 4,804. There were no new Training Unions organized this year and the year closed with an enrollment of 4,914, a gain of 110. The Associational Training Union begins with a much lower enrollment this year since 8 churches with an enrollment of 818 are forming the new Gadsden Association.

1. "M" Night with 695 present, the Rev. Bob Blackburn, speaker.
2. Youth Night with 400 present at a fish fry in the Quincy Armory.
3. The District Better Speakers Tournament runner-up - Mr. Ron Geiger, Seminole Baptist Church.

Goals for the New Year

1. Attendance goal for "M" Night is 695. The Rev. T. Clyde Spear, pastor of Holden Heights Baptist Church, Orlando, will be the speaker.
2. Attendance goal for Youth Night is 400. The fish fry will be at the Fair Grounds in Tallahassee.
3. Every church should earn study course awards in Category 18.
4. The Associational goals are the starting of at least one new Training Union and Florida Association becoming a standard Training Union.

32. D. W. Padgett read the Sunday School Report compiled by D. A. Avant and moved that this report along with the report printed in the Book of Reports be adopted. The motion was seconded by Millard Hancock and carried.

SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT

There is no need here to endeavor to evaluate the Sunday School. Everyone is now convinced of its worth, which was not the case a half century ago, or even 34 years ago. We all realize that as the Sunday School goes so goes the Church.

We now have forty Sunday Schools (including three missions) with a total enrollment of 13,010, whereas a year ago we had thirty nine schools with an enrollment of 12,567, a net gain of 443 during the year.

This year we had ten standard schools, six standard departments, twenty-five standard classes, and a standard Association - a total of forty-two standard units. We conducted four group training schools, a training banquet, a Vacation Bible School clinic, and about twenty-five churches observed Bible

study week in January. Thirty-six churches conducted one or more study courses each, earning a total of 3,725 awards. Twenty-two churches had Vacation Bible Schools. February 27-March 1 the State Sunday School Convention was entertained here, meeting in First Church, Tallahassee. On September 8, ACTION NIGHT was observed at Lakeview Church, and the following goals for 1962 were adopted: training awards, category 17, 635; January Bible Study weeks, 29; group schools, 3; enrollment increase, 10%; Vacation Bible Schools, 31; new missions, 5; new classes, 100; new departments, 30; standard classes, 50; standard departments, 10; standard schools, 8; and a standard Association.

Also during the year Mr. Barry, State Sunday School Secretary and your Executive Committee set up plans for a pastor-led enlargement campaign in September of 1962. We recommend that you at this time approve of this effort. The services of the Rev. Harold Marsh, one of the most able Sunday School men of the South, has been engaged to direct this campaign, in which every church is encouraged to participate. Entering into this campaign heartily will greatly aid your church in attaining even more than your share of the above mentioned goals.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL ASSOCIATION

You will permit me to mention a few facts concerning the growth of our work since this organization was founded in the year 1927. It is believed this was the first such organization in the State, and certainly it was the first in all the South to become standard. It attained that distinction three times during its early years when the requirements were much higher than now. For instance, it was necessary then to have half or more of your schools standard, whereas now at least one-fourth must be standard. To begin with, we endeavored to organize the whole district Association which had twenty-five churches, reporting a membership of 3,555 and a Sunday School enrollment of 2,655. Subsequently five of these churches transferred to other Associations. The twenty churches remaining in our Association had, in 1927, a membership of 2,920 and Sunday School enrollment of 2,291. Fourteen of these churches were quarter time. A comparison is made of these twenty churches, showing the church membership and Sunday School enrollment as of 1927 and 1961, as follows:

This shows a net gain of 7,245 church members and 4,691 Sunday School members in these 20 churches in 34 years. Since 1927, eighteen new churches have been organized which now have a membership of 6,183 and a Sunday School enrollment of 6,040. The old and new combined give our present church membership of 16,348 and Sunday School enrollment of 13,010, an over-all gain in the 34 years of 13,429 church members and 10,710 Sunday School members. The 18 new churches have grown much more rapidly than the old ones, though a few of the old churches did have spectacular gains.

Our Association certainly does not claim credit for all this growth, but we do feel we have been a contributing factor. To cite at least one concrete example some statistics are taken from the 1931 minutes. To begin with, our organization embraced the entire District Association. Being unable to interest churches outside of Gadsden County, we secured permission in 1928 from the Sunday School Board in Nashville to organize and operate in Gadsden County only. That year Gadsden churches reported 1,140 enrolled in Sunday School and the rest of the Association had 1,580. By 1931 Gadsden churches reported 2,076 and all others 2,070, showing a much more rapid gain in Gadsden, where the organization was active, then in the other counties. We believe that this was the direct result of organized Associational effort. The Gadsden County Association continued to function alone until about 1939, when we again embraced the whole Association, and we have continued to grow, even more rapidly, since that time.

I am deeply grateful that you have permitted me to serve as Superintendent for these thirty-four years, less two because of illness. During this time, God, through your instrumentality, has richly blessed our feeble efforts.

You have now selected the Rev. Daniel W. Padgett, a man well qualified to lead our hundreds of consecrated teachers and officers to even greater heights. Be assured that he, and you, will have my continued cooperation and prayers that through your faithful teaching of the cardinal doctrines of the Bible unnumbered souls may come to know Christ as Savior and Lord.

It has been a real challenge to me to aid in promoting what may be considered the greatest Sunday School program of all time, as given to us by our Nashville and Jacksonville offices.

With 10 churches reporting standard schools, the Florida Baptist Association Sunday School Department again attained standard. The Sunday School enrollment of the 38 churches and 2 missions a year ago was 12,567. The enrollment as of September 30, 1961 was 13,010.

Mr. D. A. Avant has given our Associational Sunday School good leadership this year, and it has been a fine year for Sunday Schools. Mr. Avant is retiring this year as Associational Sunday School Superintendent after 32 years of faithful and unselfish service to his Master in Sunday School work.

The number of training awards in category 17 of the Church Study Course during the year was 619. Twenty-seven churches earned awards in this category.

One of the major goals for the coming year is to increase our Sunday School enrollment by 10 per cent. In order to accomplish this the Sunday School department will cooperate with the Association in taking a religious survey of the Association, February 28-March 4. Following up this survey the Sunday School will plan and promote a Pastor-led Enlargement Campaign next September during Preparation Week, September 23-28, 1962.

In cooperation with the 30,000 Movement we hope to start at least five new preaching or teaching stations in the Association.

The general theme for 1961-1962 in Sunday School is "Outreach for the Unreached - Spearhead for Advance". The emphasis of outreach for the unreached is unquestionably the continuing basic objective of Southern Baptist Churches. Sunday School is logically the church's spearhead for advance in pursuing this objective.

The program contains four major spearheads for advance: church member enrollment, prospect visitation, new Sunday Schools and expanded organization. The Associational Sunday School Department will help all the churches of the Association to implement this program.

See the Calendar of Activities for regular Workers' meetings.

The Moderator requested that Mr. Avant be escorted to the front of the auditorium by S. J. Hampton, the pastor who had served longest in the Association with Mr. Avant, and Millard Hancock, pastor of the youngest church in the Association. Mrs. J. E. Robinson was asked to escort Mrs. Avant. Mr. Padgett introduced C. F. Barry, State Sunday School Secretary, who spoke to the report.

33. Marion L. Hayes led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace".

34. The Moderator called for miscellaneous business and W. M. Scruggs, Sr., asked that all messengers and visitors register.

35. The report on the West Florida Baptist Assembly was presented by Douglas Watterson of Marianna. The West Florida Assembly is the answer to the claim of the world on the youth, with its decrying of absolute standards which the young people hear and see day after day as compared with the few hours each week that the Church has to reach them. At the Assembly, in a concentrated effort, the nominally Christian youth are confronted with the claim of the Lordship of Christ over their lives. Yet the West Florida Assembly, located near Panama City, was supported by less than ten churches. This liability can be made an asset as all of the Baptist churches in the Florida Association take advantage of it. Mr. Watterson led in prayer, beseeching God's burdening the hearts of church leadership with concern for their young people.

36. Following the singing of "I Love Thee" by the congregation, Mrs. Deborah Clark sang "Great Is Thy Faithfulness".

37. The Scripture for the evening sermon, Revelation 1:1-8, was read by W. E. Bailey.

38. Warren H. Rush brought the sermon, "Jesus Reveals Himself", based on the texts found in Revelation 1:1 and 18.

39. H. O. Lanning pronounced the benediction.

The Third Session of the Florida Baptist Association annual meeting was called to order by John W. Hunt, Moderator, at 3:00 p.m. at the Thomasville Road Baptist Church, Tallahassee.

40. Following the service in song led by Marion L. Hayes, C. W. McDonald read 1 Peter 4:12-19 and led in prayer.

41. D. W. Padgett, host pastor, extended welcome to messengers and visitors.

42. E. W. Perryman recommended that the report on the Baptist Papers be adopted as printed. Frank Johnson seconded the motion; it carried.

REPORT ON BAPTIST PAPERS

We are under Scriptural injunction to "grow in grace and in the knowledge of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ". Without increasing knowledge of the Scriptures it is practically impossible to keep this injunction. We would therefore urge every Baptist to make regular and studious use of the Bible as our most important Christian literature. As we grow in the knowledge of Christ, we also want to grow in the knowledge of His kingdom's advances, its struggles and its victories. Hence, we need to make the widest possible use of our good Baptist literature.

Our people are bombarded on every side with the clever propaganda of every conceivable type of wrong teaching and movement, from the irreligious and godless claims of communism to the religious but often false claims of Romanism. Surely we Baptists want our people to be properly and truthfully informed with our own literature, which is good in content, sound in doctrine, easy to be understood, safe to follow and attractive in appearance.

The 28 Baptist state papers now have a combined circulation of 1,465,471 copies per issue, it was reported to the 1961 Southern Baptist Convention. This means that a total of more than 74,739,000 copies of these papers were distributed to readers last year.

The FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, has (as of September 1, 1961) on its subscriber list 59,671 homes in 810 different churches, with 711 churches using the Budget Plan for at least some part of their membership. Each year more churches are sending the WITNESS to every resident family. Ninety-nine churches have small clubs of subscriptions. While we rejoice over increased circulation, however, we must remember that there are still 447 churches affiliated with the Florida Baptist Convention which are putting a brake on their own growth, gifts and extended service by failing to take advantage of the one most economical medium of information which they could possibly provide their members - a budget subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

We would urge every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its homes to earnestly consider completing its subscription list by including every resident family, and every church which does not now have the WITNESS in its budget to consider getting it started to the membership. The simple Church Budget Plan makes it possible for the small cost of \$1.20 per year to be paid in installments of only 10¢ monthly for each family on the subscription list, and grants the privilege of additions or deletions at any time.

43. The report on the American Bible Society was presented by Gene Tyree, who moved its adoption. John Martin seconded the motion, which carried.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT

During 1960 the American Bible Society -

1. rejoiced that some part of the Bible had been published in 1,165 languages, the full Bible in 221, a Testament in 227 more and a Gospel or other complete book in 667;

2. gave over a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to the Armed Forces and Veterans' Hospitals as a vital link between the home churches and men in service;

3. observed its 125th anniversary of supplying Scriptures for the blind, far below cost, in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records;

4. enlarged the ministry of the Finger-Fono, a phonograph operated by one finger, with Bible records in the languages needed, for use in areas throughout the world where many people cannot read. Records are now available in 30 languages and others are being prepared;

5. helped the Korean Bible Society to realize their long-sought goal of distributing more than a million Scripture volumes in a single year; also rejoiced in the sustained interest in Japan, where for the last 5 years Scripture distribution has averaged almost 2 million volumes;

6. distributed throughout the world a record total of over 23 million volumes of Scriptures. This was over 5 million more than the number of volumes distributed in 1959 and over 8 million more than the 15 million-volumes-per-year average for the past 9 years.

Southern Baptists Support the Work

Because the Society serves Mission work - Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Bible Society for Scriptures they need for their people -- Southern Baptist churches believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1960 Southern Baptist churches gave \$151,626 to the American Bible Society. Methodist gifts led with a total of \$151,934. Gifts from all churches in the U. S. A. totaled \$1,001,768. Although gifts have increased and the work

SOCIAL SERVICE REPORT

The Social Service Committee reports with regret that the alcohol problem is rampaging in our state as a mighty river overflowing its banks. We would like to present you with a few statements and statistics that will help you understand to a better degree the evils of alcohol.

Do you know that drinking alcoholic beverages:

Was a contributing cause in 30% of all fatal accidents in 1958?

Is a contributing cause in 1/3 of the accidental deaths in industry and 1/4 of the disabling injuries?

The alcohol from one bottle of beer or one cocktail makes it dangerous to drive sooner than three hours after drinking it?

A chronic alcoholic loses enough time each year to cause a deduction from his pay-check of \$1,000?

Is the result of seeking company (sociability) by many and escaping from company into a dream world by many others?

Affects even the "moderate drinker" by impairing driving skills, moral controls and the ability to make wise decisions at home and in business?

Does not cure inferiority, but especially causes those who have marked changes of mood to indulge in extreme behavior?

Is involved in 1/6 to 3/4 of all crimes reported in 1958?

Caused 200,000 of the 375,000 divorces in 1955?

Was begun as teen-agers by 70% of those who become alcoholics?

Becomes immoral whenever its effects on the drinker cause injury or unhappiness to others?

Is contrary to the religious teachings of Mohammedanism, Hinduism, Buddhism and great numbers of Christians?

Did you know that in our own state, we had to spend \$20.64 to get \$1.00 from liquor revenue? Also, the beverage taxes last year brought in only 8.84¢ of Florida's tax dollar.

In the light of these reasons and statistics the committee would recommend the following:

1. That we increase our emphasis for complete and total abstinence from ALL alcoholic beverages;
2. That we keep ourselves on the alert for illicit sales in our own counties;
3. That we support by prayer and financial assistance the work of "United Christian Action" in the never-ending battle against the liquor traffic and other immoral activities.

46. The Vice-Moderator assumed the chair and requested that discussion be heard on the proposed amendments to the Constitution. W. M. Scruggs, Sr. moved and Millard Hancock seconded the motion that "...OR FAILING TO COOPERATE WITH THE DENOMINATIONAL PROGRAM" be added to Article XI Section 3. The time designated on the program for the vote on the Constitution was extended to allow for additional discussion on the motion. When the vote was taken, the motion carried over two dissenting votes.

Ray C. Tindall moved that the Constitution as amended be adopted. J. E. Robinson seconded the motion, which carried. (For amended Constitution see page 12). The Moderator resumed the Chair.

47. John Martin moved the payment of a bill for \$7.79 incurred in preparing the printed programs to be paid to the First Baptist Church of Chattahoochee. E. W. Perryman seconded the motion, which carried.

48. A motion to pay Douglas Watterson \$25.00 for traveling expenses was made by John Martin, seconded by Marion Hayes and carried.

49. Marion Hayes, accompanied by Mrs. J. E. Robinson, led the congregation in singing, "There Is a Name I Love to Hear".

50. The Evangelism Report was presented by John Martin, who moved its adoption. The motion, seconded by Frank Johnson, carried. Mr. Martin gave the Convention Evangelism Book to Millard Hancock, who spoke to the report.

EVANGELISM REPORT

These are tremendous days in which we live. Billions are being spent for getting men to the moon, while little is spent for getting men to God. Multitudes sit in darkness and despair. They have absolutely no hope because they have not Christ. This number grows daily. The world's population is increasing by 48,000 per year.

Here in favored Florida there is a tremendous population growth with an alarming number who are not Christians. Many lost people live in our Association. They live near our churches. Business as usual will not suffice for this desperate day. This is the time for total dedication for the task of winning the multitudes to Christ.

During this past year, our Association won and baptized 809, while 1,569 united with the churches by transfer of letters. We lost 1,347 by transfers, death, etc. To go forward we must start from where we are. Our Association is the best launching place for new frontiers in evangelism and in missions.

Therefore we recommend:

1. That we encourage ourselves in the Lord our God for the resurging interest in evangelism across our Convention;

2. That our Association participate in the "Baptist Jubilee Revivals" in 1962 through 1965. Our dates as adopted last year are as follows:

1962... March 11-25	1964... March 8-22
1963... March 10-24	1965... March 7-21

3. That each church participate in the Baptist Jubilee Revivals in 1962-1965 and that they have at least one other revival during 1962, with special emphasis in all revivals placed upon personal, face-to-face, heart-to-heart soul winning;

4. That all churches make full use of the Revival Plan Book for 1962-1964, supplied free to all pastors by the Division of Evangelism, Home Mission Board and is available from the State Secretary of Evangelism 1230 Hendricks Avenue, Jacksonville 7, Florida;

5. That our Association have an Evangelism Clinic in keeping with the suggested program supplied by our State Secretary of Evangelism;

6. That our Association recognize the elected Associational officers as the Evangelism Committee, the Chairman of Evangelism to be the Chairman of this committee, and that we pledge our whole-hearted cooperation to this committee.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Any successful approach to stewardship includes two factors: ownership and stewardship, respectively. Statistics may prove the lack of stewardship, and surely they are essential to measuring progress in stewardship, but statistics alone will never arouse people to activity. To talk about how we waste our resources - though people need to be reminded of this - will never stir people to devotion. Only as the reality that what we have is not our own but that we are only caring for it for God is faced, will we do what we ought to do.

It takes very little searching of the Scriptures to prove that God is owner and that we are stewards or caretakers of what we have. Consider I Corinthians 6:19-20: "What? know ye not that your body is the temple of the Holy Ghost which is in you, which ye have of God, and ye are not your own? For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's". This definitely teaches that we are God's, both in body and spirit, and if we belong to HIM as a bond slave then what we have is HIS.

It naturally follows that what we possess we hold only in trust. If we only hold all that we are and have in trust, then we are obligated to the owner to wisely use what He has entrusted to us to His glory. It also naturally follows that we will be called upon to give an accounting to Him.

In the face of the above I would challenge your heart and mine to place the emphasis where it belongs in stewardship - on God's ownership and our stewardship obligations. When our people realize and accept the two above facts, all will more readily give of time, talent, money, etc., to the service of God.

The most urgent need of the hour is to "Reach out after the Unreached". Materialism has been exalted above the Creator of the Universe and spiritual values ignored. We have failed to indoctrinate, train and deepen the spiritual life of the saints. We must know the need, create concern, establish goals, enlist the churches and possess the land. A mission "is anywhere one or more members are sent from the local church at regular intervals to preach or teach the Word of God."

The accomplishment, as shown in this report, is due to your loyalty, faithfulness and splendid cooperation.

BAPTIST STUDENT UNION REPORT

The Baptist Student Union at Florida State University is a religious organization for Baptist and Baptist preference students (graduates and undergraduates, married and single). Some of its activities are : Orientation Dinner in the Fall,

Senior Outing in the Spring, Intramural sports for men and women, monthly newspaper "Link," dramatics through "Baptist Players," inspiration weekly through Vespers and Morning Watch, Pre-school Retreat, Winter Retreat, Spring Planning Conference, International Student Retreat, B. S. U. Convention, Ridgecrest Student Week, and the raising of money for student summer missions through annual "Hobo" Campaign.

FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS REPORT

The first unit of Florida Baptist Retirement Centers was opened at Vero Beach on March 6 of this year. The buildings at that time consisted of the first portion of the motel unit, one duplex cottage and the two story house which was the home of Mr. and Mrs. Buckingham who gave us the property. The motel unit has ten single rooms and two efficiency apartments, the dining room and kitchen, the lobby and the offices. All but one of the rooms have been taken. Since then two more duplex cottages have been built, making a total of six cottage units, all but three of which have been spoken for already. Plans are being made now to add several more rooms to the main building and other cottage units as they are requested.

The residents are retired ministers and their wives, retired missionaries and retired lay workers in the churches. The lay workers are church members who have given themselves in attendance upon the worship services and in the various activities of Christian service and support. Among the very fine family of residents in the Center now are two retired foreign missionaries, one retired pastor, two who are wives of former pastors in the state, two deacons and others once active in some way in voluntary Christian service in their churches. They are wonderful people indeed.

This new program is supported through the cooperative program, direct contributions, wills and the payments of the residents toward their expenses. Though in operation a little more than seven months, the Center is glad that it can hope to operate the work at a cost to the residents that is much less than what other such retirement centers are charging.

Though reported statistics vary, it is quite evident that there are some 600,000 people in Florida who are 65 years old or older and that more than 50,000 of them are Baptist. Many of them seriously need the sort of provision, fellowship and security that is available to them at the Center. They have served the Lord long and well and it is a privilege for Florida Baptists to provide for them in their "golden years". But the amount that can be done depends so largely upon the financial support of this work through special contributions and through its being included in wills. Surely it is worthy of the best that Baptists may do.

62. Trumon Gray presented the report of the Resolutions Committee and moved that it be adopted. Hugh Kinsey seconded the motion, which carried.

67. C. A. Alexander presented the report on Missionary Education, which was adopted.

MISSIONARY EDUCATION REPORT

Jesus commanded that His disciples witness the world over. His Word should be preached and taught in all corners of the globe. The success of this endeavor is contingent upon our going into all the world and making known the Gospel of Jesus Christ as Saviour and Lord. Baptists must not fail in this matter.

The effectiveness of the Schools of Missions can be attributed to the basic plan of our Home and Foreign Mission Boards. These Boards give direction and help in securing missionaries to hold Schools of Missions in churches of an association.

A Church School of Missions is a program whereby the entire church membership can participate. This school can be led by the pastor and his co-workers. The group usually is graded by ages and graded literature is studied. The school is held for five nights, and awards are given for the particular book studied.

It would be well for the churches to supply mission literature to their membership during the year. The Southern Baptist Convention publishes all types of mission literature. The Brotherhood and W. M. S. could greatly facilitate this project by seeing that many of the mission periodicals be placed in the budgets of the churches. Our young people need to be informed of this missionary endeavor. Since the Mission Boards are accepting only young adults for active service in Foreign and Home mission fields, we should help our young people to be fully indoctrinated in mission needs. Our Lord gave the Commission and we must keep sacred His command.

68. Thomas E. Cuttino presented and moved the adoption of the report on Associational Missions. J. E. Robinson seconded the motion, which carried.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

The report of the Missions Committee is in no way a final report and should be considered a progress report. In the beginning of the year a proposed mission program was adopted; this report gives the progress made toward reaching these objectives. There are two types of missions, full and partial. Full missions are Haywood Cates Mission and Crawfordville Road Mission, both of Tallahassee. Partial missions are a Sunday program in Morrisons Cafeteria; Central Fire Station in Tallahassee; a Sunday School Mission in Quincy, worship services in Tallahassee Memorial Hospital (directed by the Ministerial Association and East Hill Baptist Church) and services in the Oak Grove and Tallahassee Convalescent Homes. A tract and religious periodical ministry has been established at the new Tallahassee Airport.

Continued cooperation of our Association with every department of our Convention in promoting our program of work is evident. Outstanding instances of Florida Baptist Association cooperation was seen in the following activities:

the Billy Graham Rally, Tallahassee; Florida Sunday School Convention, Tallahassee; Planning Conferences for Brotherhood, Sunday School and Training Union; Brotherhood Encampment at Panama City; Evangelistic Conference at Thomasville Road. Many of the Florida Association young people attended the State Conference for Vocational Guidance in Tampa.

We report the enthusiastic response of our Association to two very important programs - the Community Church Survey and the Forward Program of Church Finance. The following churches have participated in the church survey: Havana, Indian Springs, Crawfordville Road Mission and Haywood Cates Mission. Many of our churches participated in the Forward Program of Church Finance Conference for Districts 3 and 4.

Following the recommendation of this committee in last year's report, an Associational office has been set up with needed equipment and materials. This alone has done much to increase the effectiveness of our Associational program. Most of our churches support world missions through the Cooperative Program. However, some did not participate and others made only token gifts.

Concerning the 30,000 Movement, we report that from June 1, 1956 to January 1, 1961 a total of 11,817 missions and churches have been constituted. Florida's part in the 30,000 Movement for 1961-1962 is the establishment of 250 new missions. We call to your attention the accepted definition of a mission: "a mission is anywhere one or more members are sent from the local church or churches at regular intervals to preach or teach the Word of God."

Each church is urged to appoint a Missions Committee and instruct it to keep in touch with the Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary for advice and assistance in keeping a good program of work.

- XII. That we recommend the teaching of the "Associational Guidebook" by Dr. A. F. Dowis, as related to Florida's Program of work, in every church.
- XIII. We recommend that Florida Association cooperate with Gadsden County, Middle-Florida, Suwannee and Taylor Associations in forming a District Missions Committee. The primary purpose of this committee is to help plan and promote the total denominational program throughout the entire district. The direction of this program is by the State Board of Missions in cooperation with the District Missions Committee and Home Missions Board.
- XIV. We recommend that each church appoint a Missions Committee, instructing them to keep in touch with the Associational Missions Committee and the Field Secretary for advice or assistance in keeping with a good program of work.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

STATE MISSIONS:

Is a part of World Missions by promoting the Kingdom of God in the state. Includes the ministry of the Sunday School, the Training Union, the Woman's Missionary Union, the Church Music and the Evangelism Departments.

Area is anywhere a mission or church is needed. There were 46 missions and 26 churches organized during the period of October 1, 1960 to July 1, 1961.

Work includes the Florida Children's Home, Stetson University, Baptist Bible Institute, Baptist camps and assemblies, the Florida Baptist Witness and the Retirement Center for our Senior Citizens.

THE STATE MISSION BOARD:

Is composed of mission-minded individuals representing each Association in the State. They study, pray and plan for advancing work of our State.

Is responsible for planning a budget which will govern the money given by the churches to state missions during the year.

THE CHURCHES OF THE FLORIDA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION:

Are asked by Undersigned to support our State Missions Program. A Goal of at least 10 per cent of the total income of each church to world missions

through the Cooperative Program and the observance of the Annual State Mission Day Program, Season of Prayer for State Missions and Offering. May God help each church to have its share in this work.

70. The Home Mission Report was presented by Trumon Gray, who recommended its adoption. The motion was seconded by John Martin, and carried.

HOME MISSION REPORT

A major share of the personnel and resources of the Home Mission Board are used in 30 states of the northern and western sections of the nation. "We have 2,335 churches in these states where we had only 79 in 1940," announced Courts Redford, Executive Secretary of the Board. "Our Missions Division spends more than 62 percent of its budget in this work."

The growth of new churches and missions has been accelerated by the 30,000 Movement, a denominational effort to start 10,000 churches and 20,000 missions by 1964. The latest report by C. C. Warren, Director of the Movement showed 11,817 started by January 1, 1961. The combined efforts of the denomination, led by the Mission Board, will be on church extension in 1962, with goals to start 6,000 churches and missions. This is the year's emphasis of the Baptist Jubilee Advance. To begin the big effort, more than 800 student missionaries were enlisted in 1961, and laymen are giving vacations and paying their own way to help start missions.

Despite limitations of travel between the United States and a tense situation in parts of Cuba, Baptist work grows on the island. Revivals in the four provinces where Southern Baptists sponsor work resulted in 5,116 conversions, and gifts to the churches increased by 20 percent to \$210,649.00.

Detroit was allotted \$100,000.00 for loans with which to purchase sites and buildings in the "Big Cities" program. The city joined Chicago, New York, San Francisco, and Seattle as areas needing special efforts in financing new churches and missions.

C. E. Aurtey, Director of the Division of Evangelism, continues to stress year-around evangelism. The division has promoted the Baptist Jubilee Revivals, an associational plan of simultaneous evangelistic crusades. Baptisms reported by the churches of the Convention totaled 386,469.

Six hundred and sixty-four Southern Baptist ministers serve as chaplains for the military, institutions, and industry in the United States. An additional 768 are commissioned in reserve forces, student programs, or the National Guard, according to George W. Cummins, new director for the Chaplains Division. The Chaplains Division reported 14,053 professions of faith.

A Home Mission budget in excess of \$4 million (60 percent from the Cooperative Program and 40 percent from the Annie Armstrong Offering) supported 2,035 missionaries during the past year, the largest number ever employed in mission work in the United States, Cuba and Panama. These workers reported 51,463 baptisms. Despite a record force, urgent personnel needs were announced by Glendon McCullough, Personnel Secretary, for Good Will Centers and Japanese, Russian, Spanish and Italian work. "We need more than 270 workers now to fill requests, some vacant for two years because qualified personnel have not been found," he said.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Southern Baptists, since their organization one hundred and eighteen years ago, have been "Missionary Baptists" by name and to a blessed degree have proven themselves Missionary Baptist by nature. We are grateful to God for the extent to which our denomination has carried the Gospel of Christ to man around the world.

Today Southern Baptists have missionaries in 45 countries with world evangelization as the ultimate goal. Mission work is carried on through a varying number of institutions on each of these fields — churches, schools, hospitals, publication houses, good will centers. But all are interactive and the goal of each is evangelism.

In 1960 there were 3,399 churches and 6,522 chapels and mission points reporting 31,107 baptisms and a membership of 452,975. At the end of May 1961, 1,500 foreign missionaries were in active service. There is an urgent request for about 600 more.

Total contributions of Southern Baptists for foreign missions amounted to \$17,312,163.35 last year. Funds from the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering totaled \$8,238,471.07. These contributions must continue to increase if we are to reach our goal of 2,000 missionaries under appointment by the close of the Baptist Jubilee Advance in 1964.

As Missionary Baptists let us never forget that the first command given by our Lord to His disciples assembled as a body was the missionary command to "lift up your eyes and look upon the field." The field, He said, is the world, and the last command of Christ was the missionary command to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."
