CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I - NAME

This Association shall be called the Florida Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers, duly elected annually by the churches cooperating with this body, who shall present church letters certifying evidence thereof.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, and one

additional messenger for every fifty members over one hundred.

ARTICLE III - HOLDING POWER

Section 1. The Association shall have power to accept all gifts, such as land, personal property or money, and to approve purchase and develop all property that may be deeded to or purchased by the Association. It shall also have the power to sell or trade property as it may be recommended by the Executive Committee for approval of the members of the Association at the annual meeting or at a called meeting.

Section 2. Beginning in 1961, the Association at its annual meeting shall elect three of its members to serve as trustees of the Association. All three must be lay members. One shall be elected for one year, one for two years and one for three years. Each year thereafter one will be elected for a three year term to replace the retiring trustee. A trustee may succeed himself if the Association so directs. In the event of a vacancy during the year, the Executive Committee shall appoint someone to fill the vacancy until the next annual meeting.

Section 3. The trustees shall hold in trust all property of the Association. They shall have no power to buy, sell, mortgage, lease or transfer any property without a specific vote of the Association authorizing such action. They shall have the responsibility of improvement and maintenance but shall not expend monies without the approval of the Executive Committee or the Association.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be elected annually on the first day of the Association meeting, and they shall begin serving at the close of the session and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Section 2. Method of election shall be by nomination from the floor. In the event that two or more are nominated for the same office, election shall be by ballot. Otherwise, they shall be elected by acclamation or designated ballot.

Section 3. Duties of officers.

(1) Moderator.. He shall preside at all meetings of the Association and shall preserve order at the sessions. He shall decide all questions on order and propriety. He shall appoint all committees as designated in this constitution or as directed by the body.

(2) Vice-Moderator, . He shall preside in the absence or at the request of the

Moderator.

(3) Clerk. He shall see that messengers are enrolled and that a regular record of all business of the Association shall be made and preserved. He shall have the minutes of the annual meeting printed and distributed to each church.

(4) Assistant Clerk. . He shall aid the clerk in whatever way he is requested.

(5) Treasurer. He shall receive and keep an accurate account of all monies contributed by the churches in the Association and of any other monies received. He shall disburse monies at the instruction of the Association or its Executive Committee. He shall make written report of the same at the annual meeting or at the request of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. In the event that the Moderator should resign or remove from the Association, the Vice-Moderator shall succeed to the position of Moderator and a new Vice-Moderator shall be elected by the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE V - PURPOSE

The objects of this Association are missionary, educational and benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

ARTICLE VI - REPORTS

All churches cooperating with this Association shall send up by its messengers on the first day of each annual meeting a statement of all work done by them during the preceding year, giving in full such statistical information as is called for by blanks currently in use for such purpose, unless such information has previously been mailed to the Clerk of the Association.

ARTICLE VII - MEETINGS

This Association shall meet once each year at such time and place as may have been agreed upon at the preceding session, or by its Executive Committee. When convened it shall be governed by a regular and proper decorum. The Moderator shall preside and the Clerk shall record the proceedings and prepare them for the press.

ARTICLE VIII - EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section I. Membership. The Executive Committee shall consist of all pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association; one lay person from each church and mission cooperating with the Association; the heads of departments of the Association (Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, Woman's Missionary Union, Music and Evangelism) and the officers of the Association. Associate pastors, ministers of education and music shall be honorary members and all state Baptist employees with membership in the churches of the Association shall serve as advisory members.

Section 2. Election. The committee of nominations will name the members of the Executive Committee during the annual association, or the nominating committee of the Executive Committee shall name them <u>ad interim</u>, filling vacancies which occur between meetings of the Association. It shall drop from its roll (1) any member who shall move from the Association within the year, or any pastor who is released from his church unless the nominating committee shall recommend to retain him, and (2) any member who dies during the year.

Section 3. Meetings.. This Committee shall meet as often as it may desire. A number equal to half the number of churches shall constitute a quorum. It shall transact such business as is delegated to it by the Association and shall act for the Association when it is not in session.

ARTICLE IX - NOMINATING COMMITTEE

Six months prior to the annual meeting, the Moderator shall appoint a committee who shall nominate the members of the Executive Committee and such heads of Departments as may be recommended by the departments or in the absence of recommendations, to nominate suitable heads for all departments. They shall also nominate trustees. They shall make recommendation of names to be suggested to the State Convention for members on the State Board of Missions.

ARTICLE X - ASSOCIATION OFFICE

The Association shall establish an Association Office and appoint a qualified salaried person to be secretary for the Association. A committee composed of the Moderator, the Treasurer and the Clerk shall make the selection of the location of the office and of the secretary. They shall report to the Executive Committee for approval of their selection.

ARTICLE XI - SCOPE OF WORK

This Association shall have no power to lord it over God's heritage or to infringe upon the internal rights of any church.

Section 1. The Association shall have power to provide for the general union of the churches.

Section 2. It may counsel with any church in difficulty.

Section 3. It may inquire into the cause of any church failing to be represented at any annual meeting or failing to furnish statistical reports to such, or failing to be co-operative with the denominational program.

Section 4. It may withdraw from any church found to be unorthodox or

violating the spirit or purpose of this Association.

Section 5. It may accept into this union other Baptist churches which are found to be orthodox and co-operative with the denominational program, and providing sixty days have elapsed after a request for examination and entry into the Association has been given to the Executive Committee or to the Association in annual meeting.

Section 6. It may grant a letter of dismission to any church wishing such and having requested such letter by writing, provided said church is in good standing and the application can be approved by the Executive Committee prior

to the annual meeting.

Section 7. It may appropriate money contributed by churches or individuals as specified and when not specified, to the best interest of the Master's cause.

Section 8. It may adjourn to any future time and place deemed most beneficial to the churches comprising this union.

ARTICLE XII - AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote of members present, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to such meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

ARTICLES OF FAITH

ARTICLE I. We believe in one only true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

ARTICLE II. We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

ARTICLE III. We believe in the doctrine of original sin.

ARTICLE IV. We believe in man's impotency to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature by his own free will and ability.

ARTICLE V. We believe that we are justified in the sight of God only by th imputed righteousness of Christ; that we rely solely upon the Holy Spirit for guidance.

ARTICLE VI. We believe that the saints shall persevere in grace and shall

never finally fall away.

ARTICLE VII. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of Jesus Christ; that nothing is baptism except immersion; that believers are the only subjects of this ordinance, and that none but baptized believers are entitled to partake of the Lord's Supper.

ARTICLE VIII. We believe in a general resurrection of the dead, and a

general, final judgement.

ARTICLE IX. We believe that the punishment of the wicked shall be ever-

lasting and the joys of the righteous shall be eternal.

ARTICLE X. We believe that no minister has a right to administer the ordinances only such as are regularly called and have come under the imposition of the hands of a Baptist Presbytery.

ARTICLE XI. We believe that the first day of the week is the Lord's Day. It is a Christian institution for regular observance. It commemorates the resurrection of Christ from the dead and should be employed in the exercises of worship and spiritual devotion, both public and private, and by refraining from

worldly amusements. Works of necessity and mercy are excepted.

ARTICLE XII. We believe that God alone is Lord of the conscience and He has left it free from the doctrines and commandments of men which are contrary to His Word or not contained in it. Church and state should be separate. The state owes to the church protection and full freedom in the pursuit of its spiritual ends. In providing for such freedom no ecclesiastical group or denomination should be favored by the state more than others. Since civil government is

ordained by God, it is the duty of Christians to render loyal obedience thereto in all things not contrary to the revealed will of God. The church should not resort to civil powers to carry on its work. The Gospel of Christ comtemplates spiritual means alone for the pursuit of its end. The state has no right to impose taxes for the support of any form of religion. A free church in a free state is the Christian ideal and this implies the right of free and unhindered access to God on the part of all men, and the right to form and propagate opinions in the sphere of religion without interference by the civil power.

RULES OF DECORUM

1. The sessions of this Association shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Visitors and corresponding messengers, after they shall have been accepted by the Association and enrolled as such, shall have the privilege of speaking.

3. The right to speak on any subject and the length of time is left with the

Association at the direction of the Moderator.

4. Unbrotherly remarks or personal reflections must be avoided by all speakers.

5. The Parliamentary proceedings of this Association shall be governed by

Mell's Parliamentary Practice.

6. These rules may be changed or amended at any full session of the Association by a majority vote.

ASSOCIATION RECOMMENDATIONS

ESTABLISHING MISSIONS - ORDINATION OF MINISTERS ORGANIZING CHURCHES - ORDINATION OF DEACONS

ESTABLISHMENT OF MISSIONS

Too often churches are ineffective due to their location, leadership and lack of purpose.

Missions should be sponsored by churches and should the zeal of some individuals give conception to a mission, they should be encouraged to seek proper sponsorship.

It is recommended that the following policies of guidance be carefully considered and adhered to in order that we may have an effective mission

program in our Association.

1. Let the Associational Missions Committee serve as a point of

clearance to avoid duplication of work.

2. The nearest church to the proposed locale of the mission should be approached and asked to sponsor the mission. If this fails, the cooperation of this church with the next nearest church who would sponsor it should be sought.

3. The Mission Committee of the sponsoring church, the Steering Committee of the mission itself, and -- when desirable -- the Associational Missions Committee should work together to make this mission a success.

The suggested plan of the Home Mission Board makes for a good working relationship between mission and sponsoring church (copies of this plan are on file in the Association office).

The gist of this plan is:

1. That the sponsoring church will, in the spirit of guidance, aid the mission to obtain consecrated, effective leadership during the time it is a mission and certainly before its constitution into an autonomous church.

2. That the sponsoring church will help the mission to find and to practice a sound financial policy in order that the mission may be self-sustaining at the time of organization into a church.

3. That the mission be taught and led into a sound doctrinal position before organization into a church,

4. That the mission be led by the sponsoring church to be a strong evangelical and missionary organization which will involve:

a. Proper organization to get the work done;

- b. A systematic cooperative plan of supporting associational and world-wide missions;
- c. Proper observances of the ordinances of a Southern Baptist Church.

ORGANIZATION OF A CHURCH

- 1. Any group of Baptists desiring to organize a new Baptist church within the bounds of the Florida Baptist Association, and expecting to apply for membership in the Association, are respectfully asked to follow a consistent form of organization.
- a. The first consistent step, after setting a time and place for the organization meeting, is to invite the pastors and deacons of at least three churches in good standing within our denomination to provide a Council to assist with the said organization.
- b. It seems good taste and sound wisdom to include the moderator of the Association and the Field Secretary of the Association in this Council whenever possible as he has usually been in touch with the proposed work from the time of its inception.

2. The Council assembled for the purpose of aforesaid organization should organize itself by the election of a moderator and clerk before any further procedure, then the following order is suggested:

a. The roll of the proposed membership should be submitted to the Council for its approval. This may be done either in writing or by reading the list of names.

b. The Articles of Faith of a Baptist Church should be read and adopted by the proposed members or a statement made that it has been previously done.

c. The Church Covenant should be adopted by the same procedure.

d. The Council should then retire and approve or disapprove of the organization of the said church.

- e. Upon favorable recommendation of the Council, the Moderator should call for a motion from the membership constituency to declare themselves a church. The adopting of a name for the church would be in order. A motion by the new church to call a pastor and to elect necessary officers would be expedient, i.e., at least a moderator (generally the new pastor), a clerk and a treasurer, or to vote a continuation of the term of those who had been serving if the church had been a mission. Election of officers other than the three mentioned may be held at a future business meeting of the church.
- f. The Moderator of the new church would preside at this point and after a formal declaration as to the plan of the missionary program the church is to follow, an offering for World Wide Missions is usually taken.
- g. After the organizational sermon is preached the hand of Christian fellowship would be then extended by the moderator of the Council, for the Council, to the moderator or members of the new church.

h. The benediction may be a prayer or a song.

3. Application to become a member of the Florida Baptist Association should be made in writing at the time of organization stating that the above order of procedure has been followed and application will be considered by the Association or its Executive Committee.

4. If any applicant church has been in another fellowship of Baptists, or if there is any question as to whether the applicant has met all the conditions stated above, the application shall be automatically received and referred to the Petitionary Letter committee elected for that purpose.

This committee shall make full investigation, and offer all aid possible

in helping the applicant to meet the required conditions, and the application shall be considered at the next session of the Association.

ORDINATION OF A MINISTER

With the desire that the pastors and churches of our Association shall have fellowship, and that the form of ordination of our pastors shall be regular, we suggest the following order of ordination.

 Any man, feeling the call to preach the Gospel, who is a member of a Southern Baptist Church, and has been called by a church to serve as its pastor, should ask the church of which he is a member to arrange for his ordination.

2. The following is the regular and accepted procedure:

a. The church desiring the ordination should invite several ordained ministers in good standing within the denomination, from neighboring Baptist churches, to sit together as a Presbytery, for the examination of the candidate. There is less chance of embarrassment if the examination is private and can be held prior to the setting of the date of ordination.

b. The candidate should be examined as to his conversion, his

call to the ministry and his belief in Scriptural doctrines.

c. After a thorough examination the candidate may be asked to

retire and the Presbytery approve or disapprove of his ordination.

d. If approved, recommendation is made to the church to proceed with the ordination. It is customary to have a sermon, a charge to the candidate and a charge to the church. Many churches present the candidate with a Bible. Special prayer is offered with the laying on of hands by the Presbytery, after which the right hand of fellowship is given and the service concluded with prayer.

3. The ordination of ministers other than pastors should be left to the

discretion of the local church.

IV ORDINATION OF DEACONS

Realizing that this matter is solely one which concerns the local church, the following suggestions are made relevant to deacon ordination.

The same general procedure applying to ordination of the minister seems to be a good one except that the Council should consist of ministers and deacons.

In the event ordination services are to be held at a time when pastors and deacons of churches of like faith and order cannot attend, it is suggested that the ordaining church may invite retired ministers who hold membership in churches of like faith and order and any Denominational Workers who have ordination to assist the pastor and deacons of the church in this service.

These suggestions are made that both the deacon and any other church which may elect him to serve as a deacon may feel that his ordination was both

sound and in good order.

PROCEEDINGS

The 121st session of the Florida Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, W.M. Scruggs, Sr., at 9:30 a.m. Thursday, October 24, 1963, at University Heights Baptist Church, Tallahassee, Florida.

"For Liberty and Light," the Jubilee Year Emphasis, was the theme of the meeting.

1. The messengers and visitors were led in singing "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling" and "There Is a Name I Love to Hear" by George L. Starke, Associational Music Director. David Matthews, Assistant Pastor of First Baptist Church, Tallahassee, accompanied.

 Henry Martin, pastor of First Church, Carrabelle, united the thoughts of the Association with a devotional message from Romans 9:1-3

and 10:1-4.

3. The messengers and visitors were welcomed by John Temoshchuk, pastor of University Heights, the host church.

4. Frank Johnson, Clerk, moved that the messengers already present, with those who might register, constitute the organization of the body. The motion was seconded by J. E. Robinson and carried.

5. Silent prayer was offered by the body on behalf of John Martin,

whose mother had passed away early in the morning.

 John Temoshchuk moved that the program be adopted as outlined, along with alterations and changes deemed necessary by the Moderator.
 J. E. Robinson seconded the motion. It carried.

 Gus Johnson, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Foundation, introduced the visitors representing the state causes, who

would be heard from during the session.

8. The Moderator announced Committee appointments:
Committee on Nominations - T. F. McReynolds, Chairman, Trumon Gray,
C. H. Darsey, Henry DeVane, M. W. Hatcher. Committee on Committees Ray C. Tindall, Chairman, Cary H. Hurst, Ted Rodda and Mrs. Sheldon
Shepler. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher - R. E. Merrell, Chairman, Ellis Turner, Mrs. A. B. Simmons, Bill Backus, B. C. High. Committee on Resolutions - C. A. Alexander, Chairman, Mrs. W. C. Reeves,
T. E. Reynolds, Mrs. J. R. Wilson.

9. Earl Lambert, Vice-Moderator, took the chair during the election of Moderator for 1963-64. J. E. Robinson nominated W. M. Scruggs, Sr. to serve a second term. Mr. Scruggs was re-elected by a unanimous vote. The Moderator resumed the chair and asked that the Treasurer be elected next if there were no objections. Frank Johnson nominated Earl Lambert for Treasurer. He was elected by acclamation. The following officers were elected by acclamation: Vice-Moderator - Harold Johnson, nominated by R. P. Tomberlin, Jr.; Clerk - Frank Johnson, nominated by T. F. Mc-Reynolds; Assistant Clerk - Mrs. Hugh R. Kinsey, nominated by Earl Lambert. The Moderator asked that the office of Parliamentarian be eliminated in favor of a Constitution and By-Laws Committee, which was planned to come to the floor during the Second Session.

 The Moderator made the Report of the Executive Committee and moved its adoption. Frank Johnson seconded the motion, which carried.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Executive Committee met each month at the Immanuel Baptist Church, Tallahassee. The average attendance of pastors was 15, of laymembers 11, and of advisory members 2, during the year. More laymembers showed a greater interest in the business of the Association.

The six departments of the Association made special achievements in

their respective fields.

The bulletin, "Baptist Views," received commendation from Dr. John Maguire, Executive Secretary-Treasurer of Florida Baptist Convention, at the Field Secretaries' meeting during the School of the Prophets.

One of the outstanding endeavors of the year was the Evangelistic Conference, planned by Warren Rush, Evangelism Chairman, and held at the

Parkway Baptist Church. A large group of the people of Florida Association attended. It is hoped that this program will grow and be made an annual affair.

RECOMMENDATION: The Executive Committee recommends that the Association establish a Constitution and By-Laws Committee.

J. E. ROBINSON

J. E. Robinson, forty years an active member of First Baptist Church Havana, Florida, served the Florida Baptist Association as Treasurer for

twenty years, ending in 1963.

Mr. Robinson served the Florida Baptist Convention as he gave his energies to John B. Stetson University as a Trustee for twenty-two years, and as a Trustee of Florida Baptist Children's Home for eighteen years. During those eighteen years, Mr. Robinson was a member of the committee that selected the present site of the Children's Home in Lakeland and of the building committee. Mr. Robinson resigned from the Board of Trustees of the Baptist Children's Home after eighteen years of service, but is still an active Trustee of Stetson University.

J. E. Robinson was an active Deacon of the First Baptist Church of Havana, Florida, for twenty-five years, and has held the office of Sunday

School General Secretary for thirty-seven years.

Brother Robinson attended thirty-five consecutive annual sessions of the Florida Baptist Association and of the Florida Baptist Convention. His church is now a member of the Gadsden County Association. 12. The Stetson Report was made by J. E. Robinson, a Trustee of Stetson University, and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. Gus Johnson spoke to the report.

STETSON UNIVERSITY REPORT

Stetson University, with an enrolment this year of 1,585, is the only private university in Florida to have a full enrolment. Of the 17 mission-aries recently appointed by the Foreign Mission Board, 11 were Stetson graduates.

The Ford Foundation has already given the university a check for \$450,000.00 (with no strings attached), and has pledged \$1,500,000.00 in the next three years, provided the university raises \$3,000,000.00. Mr. Gus Johnson has been appointed as Chairman of this fund raising project. The Trustees have agreed to raise \$1,500,000.00 of this money and the Convention an equal amount as follows: \$900,000.00 through the Cooperative Program; \$120,000.00 through Florida Baptist Foundation and \$480,000.00 through a special drive for Christian Education. This drive for Christian Education would be divided as follows: Stetson University - 75% and Baptist Bible Institute - 25%. From all the information the Trustees have to date, they are confident that this goal will be reached.

If every church would put \$2.00 per resident member in their budget over a period of three years, no drive would be required.

 J. E. Robinson moved the adoption of the Children's Home Report. The motion was seconded and carried.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME REPORT

The Children's Home continues to render distinct services to the needy families of our state. Assistance was given to 436 children during the year. There were 190 in the Home at Lakeland and Miami. There were 52 on Mother's Aid and four in foster home care. Caseworkers had 740 interviews with children and 439 with parents and relatives. They made 31 visits to those receiving Mother's Aid and 15 visits to the homes of those who had been discharged.

The Churches of Florida Baptist Association contribute to the program of The Children's Home through the Cooperative Program, and many make a Special offering. Others collect and send food and other supplies. The work the Home is doing is one that needs a specially trained group of people. More should be given to this great work of our denomination. When in Lakeland, visit the Home to see the tremendous job it is doing to care for children and rehabilitate families.

Therefore, be it Resolved, that the Florida Baptist Association meeting in its annual session at the University Heights Baptist Church, express its gratitude to Mr. J. E. Robinson for Twenty Years of faithful service as Treasurer of this Association.

Be it Therefore Further Resolved that we express this gratitude by standing vote and that we ask the Clerk of the Association to dedicate one page to Mr. Robinson in the Annual Minutes of the Association.

ASSEMBLY BOARD OF DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The Camp in Panacea was used by more than 500 persons during the past year. The Brotherhood, for example, had over 150 men present at their July quarterly meeting. 43 boys from 7 churches in the Association had a good camping experience at the Panacea Camp the first week of July. A youth meeting is held at the camp once a month. The Associational Girl's Auxiliary and the Young Woman's Auxiliary Council conducted meetings at the camp, also.

The Director has not been as active this past year due to the distance of the camp from his home and the lack of funds available to the Assembly Board of Directors. However, the other members of the Committee have been very cooperative in the work. About 18 beds were painted and are ready to put to use with little effort. The front porch was completed, and other repair work will begin as soon as funds are available.

A word of thanks is extended to the Brotherhood of Immanuel Baptist Church for the gift of 100 knives, 100 forks and 100 spoons, and to all others who have contributed to the camp.

ASSEMBLIES COMMITTEE REPORT

The Florida Baptist Association Assembly, better known as "Silver Lake Assembly," was not held this year. Efforts were made to secure sufficient Adult leadership to properly conduct the assembly. This failed, and at the last moment, the Assembly was called off. Churches were then asked to send their Intermediates to West Florida Assembly at Panama City. There was a good representation from this Association and reports are that this was the best West Florida Assembly ever held. Juniors were urged to attend the RA and GA Camps and some did respond.

The Churches of the Wakulla area held a church youth camp at the Panacea Camp Site. Approximately 60 youths attended this camp. The leadership was composed of the church leaders of that area. There were 3 professions of faith and 20 rededications from this camping experience in which seven

churches participated. To them is due a word of commendation.

Assemblies have come to be a vital part of our church life, for there inspiration, information and training take place. The Association is urged to support this activity, that Silver Lake Assembly may be revived, staffed with dedicated adult leadership for the developing of youth in Christlikeness.

28. Hugh R. Kinsey moved the adoption of the Baptist Bible Institute Report. Ellis Turner seconded the motion, which carried. Paul Carmichael, pastor of Ancient City Baptist Church, St. Augustine, Florida, spoke to the report.

BAPTIST BIBLE INSTITUTE

A typical student at Baptist Bible Institute would be 32, married, with two or three children, and would have a background as a deacon or other lay leader in a Baptist Church. There is a highly trained, experienced faculty to train this mature student. Classes, chapel exercises and Field Guidance classes led by denominational leaders from both state and SBC agencies, combine in a deliberate effort to produce graduates who not only can lead the churches, but also who will lead them along paths of denominational loyalty.

Courses parallel those leading to the B.D. in our seminaries. Three years, of 100 semester hours of satisfactory work are required for graduation in pastoral training, sacred music or religious education. Enrolment for the first semester was 191, a record. Total unduplicating enrolment for both semesters last year was 225.

A new classroom building should be ready for use by 1964; the adminis-

tration building should be in use by next June.

Professor Thomas S. Roote, Jr., joined the faculty in September. He has completed residence work for his Doctor of Religious Education degree from New Orleans Seminary, and will continue to work on his dissertation while here.

The Budget for 1962-63 was \$189,609.05. Money received last year came from the Cooperative Program, Florida Baptists, \$92,643.17; State Missions Offering, Florida, \$8,400.00; gifts designated through and by churches, directly or through the State Convention office, \$24,211.50; personal gifts, rentals, tuition fees, book sales and otherwise, made up the difference. The recent building and endowment campaign brought cash and pledges for \$175,000.00.

Further needs include a new cafeteria, and housing both for dormitory students and for student families. These needs shall have to be met before

long.

Several colleges will accept up to two years college credit on Bible

major for the three years work done in the Institute.

An anonymous friend has promised \$5,000.00 if the Institute will match it with \$20,000.00 for a student loan fund. The Trustees are raising our share, expecting to complete the job by December 31 of this year. CONGLUSIONS: Southern Baptists profit from this vital home mission effort of Florida Baptists. And Florida Baptist churches profit by having good men drawn into the state to attend the Institute, most of whom remain in the general area as pastors or other staff workers.

The president and faculty are thankful for the love and support of Florida Baptists. They promise to continue, as far as they are able, to merit continuing cooperation, and to work as fellow-laborers for the King.

This witness is an integral part of the nature and mission of the church. The role of the churches is indispensable to the maturing spiritual, moral and intellectual lives of students and faculty members.

Because the university is engaged in the search for truth, of which God is the source, the Christian perspective is essential to the realization of the

ultimate purpose of higher education.

The unique nature of the university situation demands a specialized ministry by our denomination to the individuals in the campus community with their need for redemption and Christian nurture.

There is much to be done. We must always move positively to reach more and more of the unreached. One area of advancement which needs the attention of all of us is the starting of new missions and churches. Your Field Secretary force is greatly concerned at this point. We must keep enough churches to reach the new people who come to Florida. The New Work Revolving Fund is available to the cooperating churches of Florida as a financial help for such mission endeavors.

In State Missions, we want to serve all the churches in Florida and advance the Kingdom of God through Evangelism, Brotherhood, Training Union, Sunday School, Music, Student Work, Woman's Missionary Union, Education, Child Care, Ministry to the Retired and countless other ways. Your prayers and support are urgently needed.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

The Foreign Mission Board reports a total of 1,685 missionaries under appointment to 53 countries, with urgent requests at the end of 1962 for 790 new missionaries. National pastors number 2,701 with 3,783 churches and 6,850 chapels reported. There were 35,509 baptisms; church members total 487, 943 and Sunday School enrolment is 433, 379.

The Home Mission Board reports approximately 5, 000 missions and churches were started as part of the 30,000 Movement. More than 2,100 missionaries served with the Home Mission Board. (For the complete re-

port, see the Book of Reports).

Willoughby presented the Visual Education plan which makes available to twenty churches in an area 12 new filmstrips each, the use of the new 16 mm films, and access to a new Bell and Howell movie projector and film strip projector for \$75.00 annually. Contracts are available from Mr. Willoughby.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS REPORT

Southern Baptists are entering the final phase of the 30,000 Movement. Much emphasis will be put upon this last effort to reach the goals that have been set. This Association has a responsibility to make our contribution to this worthy effort. "A Mission is anywhere one or more members are sent from the local church or churches at regular intervals to preach or teach the word of God." 'Are sent' means with the approval of the local church or the local missions committee. There are five kinds of missions which have been suggested: full mission; permanent mission; branch Sunday School; institutional mission and home fellowship.

The Missions Committee has met several times this year and discussed our program of activity. It has found that where Southern Baptists ought to have missions in operation, other denominations have already established a work or purchased property in stragetic locations. Four years have passed since a church in Florida Association has started a full mission. The members of our churches are urged to study more carefully the need and rise to plant a work for the glory of God.

During the past year the Home Mission Board took a convention-wide

survey on the proposed sites for missions. Our Committee gladly cooperated with this Board through the help of the Field Secretary. The findings of the Committee are listed below. Your Committee recommends the following places where a mission should be:

1. Panacea Bridge, Panacea, Florida - Full mission. 2. Lanark Vicinity, Lanark, Florida - Full mission.

3. Jackson Bluff, approximately 20 miles west of Tallahassee -Full Mission.

4. Jacksonville Highway East, Tallahassee - Full mission.

Perry Highway, Tallahassee - Full mission. 6. Paul Russell Road, Tallahassee - Full mission.

Lake Bradford Road, Tallahassee - Full mission.

8. Mabry Manor, Tallahassee - Full mission.

9. Tharpe Street West, Tallahassee - Full mission.

10. Stiles Road, North on Highway 27, Tallahassee - Full mission.


11. In addition, there are twelve sites where other types of missions should be established.


It is the hope of your Missions Committee that there will be definite action taken this year in the establishing of these much-needed mission stations. Work through your church missions committee and this one.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION REPORT

The 75th Anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union was observed during 1963. It was a year of prayer for and also a year of study about World Missions and a year of pulling the membership of WMU into the main stream

of participation in missions.

The first quarterly meeting was held October 16, 1962, at 10:30 a.m. at the Immanuel Baptist Church. The theme featured the 75th Anniversary, "Yesterday's Woman." Stephens, co-directors of Girls' Auxiliary, and a group of auxiliary members told of attending the 50th Anniversary Convention in Memphis, Tennessee.

The YWA Council met for their first meeting October 4, 1962, at Immanuel Baptist Church. Officers for the year were installed. 7 churches participated. On December 4, 1962, a mission study, "Fragrant Harbor" was taught by Mrs. Bill Talley at Immanuel Church and a hamburger supper was served. December 20 a Christmas party and pageant for underprivileged children was given with 6 churches participating. January 3, 1963, quarterly meeting was held at Lakeview Church. March 7, 1963, a mission study "The Vacant Hearted" was taught by Mrs. John Temoshchuk at Seminole Church. The Seminole WMU served supper. March 22-24 Spring Conference was held at Ft. Walton. 25 YWA's from Florida Association attended. June 28-29 a retreat and manual study was held at Lake Talquin. This was also a quarterly meeting with 37 in attendance. Mrs. Leo Hebert taught the manual. August 8, the First Anniversary Party was held at the home of Mrs. Robert Wilson. September 7, a "Dog Patch" party was given in honor of GAs who were becoming YWAs. 53 girls attended the party held at the Associational Camp site. Installation Banquet was held on September 26, at First Church, Tallahassee. Mrs. Lewis Bevis was the installing officer.

The Associational Girls' Auxiliary met for first quarterly meeting at Lakeview Baptist Church on November 17, 1962. Officers were installed and Miss Carol Nelson, FSU, told of her experiences as a summer missionary. Second quarterly meeting was held at Thomasville Road Baptist Church on February 23.
