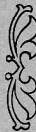

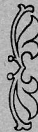

The one reason why the Master's work is so neglected is because our folks are not trained how and what to do. We, your com-mitter, urge that each pastor, when he returns to his people, organize a B. Y. P. U. in his church.

We wish to call attention to the B. Y. P. U. Encampment to be

held in Lake City, July 1-7, 1912. Let's send our young people and go ourselves and sit at the feet of some of our best teachers.

"We, your committee on Sunday schools report, beg leave to offer the following:

We are glad to note the untiring interest of some in the Sunday school work, who seem to have their heart and life in the work and are doing much good to advance the cause of the Master.

But we regret to note that this interest is not as general as should be with the laity of all the churches, though some are better on this point than others, yet we believe all can improve on this line. And while we are doing very well on some lines of the work we do not believe we have reached the climax of what the Sunday school can and should be.

Therefore, we recommend that all the churches try to work up a deeper interest among all its members, that the entire membership as much as can may take part in this great work.

Again. Let the superintendents try to awaken their schools to new life by showing his deep interest in the work. Let the teachers prepare themselves for more and better teaching, and that all of our churches ask the publishers of our Sunday school helps to try and give us better helps on the lessons; not only to give us a verse by verse explanation on the lesson text, but to also give us a verse by verse application of the truth taught therein.

Then let all improve, and the Lord's work will not suffer such loss as it has in the past, but be greatly advanced. May the Lord add His blessings.

Report on State Missions

Report read by W. G. Patterson and discussed by Bros. Patterson, Guy and Thompson:

"To the Wekiva Baptist Association and the messengers assembled here representing your constituent churches:

Greeting:

It is with devout thanks to God and the Great Head of the churches for His manifold blessings vouchsafed to His New Testament churches in this state that we present you the annual report on State Missions. Let us, therefore, present you at once some of the leading facts and figures: The State Mission year, as we know, extends from January to January; nine months of this year have already passed, and we will therefore report progress on that period: Number of missionaries employed 71, sermons preached by the missionaries 4,091. Miles traveled by State Mission force in nine months 54,302, families visited 13,506, churches organized 8, church edifices begun 26, completed 10, churches and stations held 147, Sunday schools organized 26, Baptist Young People's societies 11, members received into the churches 1,432, families found without Bibles and supplied 116, pages of tracts distributed 114,390. This is an account in brief of our State Mission work from January to October, and it will give us some conception of the great work being accomplished by our Florida Baptist State Board of Missions.

CONDITION OF THE FIELD

The work grows upon us daily. The field never was so needy as now, and never so white unto the harvest. There are three whole counties without a resident Baptist pastor; two have only one pastor, and three counties have only two.

IMMIGRATION

People are coming to us all the time on the daily trains and every wave that laves our shores brings new swarms from foreign lands.

When the great Panama Canal is ready for the world's traffic Florida will get more than her share of immigrants, and our safety and prosperity lies in giving them the gospel of our Lord.

We have now eighty-two (82) churches in process of construction (1 mean houses), one hundred and thirty-three (133) churches have no roof over their heads at all.

In order for our State Mission Board to meet their obligations and do in some measure what needs to be done this year it will require \$10,000 from now until January 1st. If our people do not come to the rescue speedily the evil effects will be far reaching.

Our state work will suffer partial paralysis and the effect thereof on missionary operations will be felt unto the ends of the earth.

Our Board is working in thirty-five (35) counties, in 26 (26) associations and expects to enter LaFayette soon.

We are greatly indebted to our beloved superintendent of Florida

Baptist State Missions, Dr. S. B. Rogers, for the statistical features of this report.

Report on State of Religion

Read by Bro. B. H. Guy, spoken to by Bros. Guy and Murphy.

"After a careful study of the letters to the Association we find that the general condition of the churches seems to be much better than last year. There has been an increase in membership in twenty of the churches represented in the Association. Finances have increased in fifteen of the churches and decreased in eight. The total number of baptisms reported is 109, while seven churches report no baptisms. Seventy-seven of the 109 baptisms come from the Sunday school.

We recommend that the increases of this year inspire us all to greater activities in the coming year and that all emphasize the necessity of thorough consecration to the Master in all the phases of our church and business life."

Report on Temperance

Report read by Bro. Cramer, spoken to by Bros. Cramer and Murphy.

"We believe that the sentiment against the liquor traffic is growing stronger throughout the world.

The constant agitation against this traffic, carried on by the temperance force is having its effect, and more and more men are coming to see the great evil of this curse. In many states the sentiment has grown strong enough to undertake a state-wide movement.

The sentiment already developed needs to be cultivated and strengthened, in order that other states may undertake the same thing.

The aim should be nothing short of national prohibition. Great and fierce battles have already been fought, victories won and some defeats sustained. This aim cannot be attained without some great struggle.

The final victory is not won, nor is the conflict by any means ended when, by legislative enactment state-wide prohibition finds a place on the statute books. A battle as fierce and terrific as this is to be fought for years for enforcement of prohibitive laws thus passed. Penalties that are ample and really prohibitive must be attached to each violation of such law. This is the seemingly Herculean task now set before all Christian people of our country.

We believe that every interest of the church of Jesus Christ and the state demands the complete overthrow of this gigantic evil. The manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors must forever cease. If it takes the last man and the last dollar it must go. We stand absolutely and unalterably for county-wide, state-wide and nation-wide prohibition. We rejoice in every victory wherever won, and any defeat sustained only makes us that much more defiantly aggressive. We are neither trembling with fear nor discouraged by what we know to be only temporary reverses. All the moral and religious forces of the church must be enlisted in this great conflict. From every school house, from every pulpit the battle cry must be sounded and the war ceaselessly waged until every saloon shall be destroyed and every shameless defiance of law shall utterly perish from the earth. We rejoice in the great advance movement of the temperance prohibition sentiment. We rejoice in and will earnestly and zealously hasten on every movement that has for the object the absolute and complete destruction of the liquor traffic.

We heartily endorse and pledge earnest and most cordial support to that splendid interdenominational and non-partisan organization, the Anti-Saloon League which, in the very spirit of Christ is waging an unrelenting and uncompromising warfare against this traffic.

We are in hearty accord and perfect sympathy with the Christian women of our state who, in that magnificent organization, the Woman's Christian Temperance Union, espouse the cause of temperance, are unrelenting in their efforts to secure nation-wide prohibition.

We urge greater activity on the part of our Bible schools and churches to secure individual total abstinence.

We urge our pastors to preach at least one sermon each year in which this feature of this question among others shall receive due attention.

We earnestly request that the brethren give special attention to this question in the exercise of the right of franchise whenever called upon to exercise this right, especially in elevating men to office when this question in any of its forms is liable to be passed upon.

We will, by the grace of God, continue the work of education and agitation until, by the blessing of Heaven, the day dawns, and as sure as God rules on His throne and right is right, it will dawn, when the legalized liquor traffic will be forever buried in a nameless, disgraced and an eternally dishonored grave.

Report on Education and Columbia College

Read and discussed by Bro. Bunyan Stephens:

"Education is defined as 'properly the educating, leading out, or drawing out the latent powers of an individual. From the philosophical point of view every one is educated, his powers being developed for good or evil by what he sees, hears, feels or does. Education in this sense begins when one enters the world, and continues all the time he is in it. In a more specific sense, it is used for premeditated effort on the part of parents, teachers and professors to draw out one's intellectual and moral endowments, encouraging what is good to oneself and to society, and discouraging what is hurtful.' To emphasize and augment this latter idea of education we have established Christian schools and colleges. Education puts tools into a man's hands but does not signify for what purpose the tools shall be used. Here the Christian teacher finds his or her great mission in the educational world.

For Baptists this means Baptist schools. For Methodists Methodist schools and so on through the catalogue of denominations. The denominational school pays the denomination well for its establishment.

It gives to the denomination prestige and power acquired no where else. It is the greatest propagator of ideas. The Baptist Argus of 1908 said: 'Our principles will prosper by as much as our schools prosper.' Then the denomination must look to its schools to supply the denomination's leaders, whether they be for the pulpit, the platform or the schoolroom.

For the Baptists of Florida this means that Columbia College is their greatest asset. What a care the Baptists of Florida ought to have then for this institution of learning! Here the Baptist ministry must receive its first training. Here the teachers for our Sunday schools and day schools must be reared. Here the business men-to-be must learn how to apply the tools placed in their hands. Here the home builders must learn what God has committed to their care.

For the Baptists of the South and for Florida the great seminary at Louisville must be the school for our prophets. This noble institution, manned by a noble faculty, pours back upon the denomination that gave it birth and maintains its life, good measure, heaped up, shaken together and running over.

Let us pray for these continually and give to them largely."

Your committee on the work of Baptist Ministers' Assurance Association beg leave to report that for want of statistics we cannot tell as to its work for the past year. Some nine or ten of our brethren have gone to rest. As to the amount of help received from the Treasurer of the Association we do not know. Judging from old reports it would be from \$180.00 to \$185.00, which in old times would be quite a help, but with prices of doctors' bills and funeral expenses how will it be now? Dear brethren, how is it that out of the many thousands of Baptists in the state of Florida, Baptist preachers have to bear the burden of caring for the sick and burial expenses of our preachers who have given their time, and in many cases the comforts of their homes

have been laid aside to carry on their work? Why do not all of our churches contribute to the help of the bereaved family, by each church in the state contributing as well as the pastor, the church pay one dollar as well as the pastor; not each member of the church, but the church as a whole? We recommend that each church appoint a committee to work up this matter. "We know that we have passed from death unto life because we love the brethren."

Report on Religious Literature

"Your committee on religious literature believes pure, clean and wholesome literature is as essential to mental and spiritual growth as pure, clean and wholesome food is to a physical growth. We should each and all take a stand for the best in literature, and endeavor to have the young cultivate a taste for the pure and thoughtful. We should, as far as possible, surround them with good books and periodicals.

Denominational intelligence should keep pace with denominational growth. Every Baptist should be able to give a satisfactory reason for the hope that is within him.

The Bible is the only true rule of our faith and practice, and by it our churches and individuals should be ruled and governed, and by it we should test all books and periodicals, and if they do not stand the test, be discarded from our home, that our children may not read them and be influenced by their teachings. There are many good books within the reach of the people which have been written by many good and pious men and women whose souls were aflame with the love of God and a desire for the salvation of men. We would recommend the reading and studying of them, for through their teaching many of them will be directed to the truth, which is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth.

We recommend the literature of the Sunday School Board of our Southern Baptist Convention for our Sunday schools, the 'Service' quarterly for our B. Y. P. U. work, and the Home and Foreign Mission Journal, and the Florida Baptist Witness published at Arcadia by Dr. Golden, that we may be informed on the important work and movement of Baptists in our beloved Land of Flowers."

Report on Orphans' Home

Read by Bro. Paul Stokely, and discussed by Bros. Stokely, Weeks and Stephens:

"Your committee begs leave to make the following report that the Florida Baptist Orphan's Home at Arcadia, whether considered a monetary investment or religious charity, the home is one of the brightest gems in the diadem of Florida Baptists.

Our efficient and worthy manager, Bro. J. E. Trice, gives us the following information as to the workings of the home for the past year and the present condition of same.

'Since the last meeting of the Association we have completed our new building, at a cost of over \$7,000. We have improved the property and enlarged the lawn, and added many attractive features, swings, see-saws, merry-go-rounds, etc., for the comfort and amusement of the children.

We have refurnished our schoolroom with a sufficient number of comfortable single desks at a cost of \$169.00.

Our school is presided over by Prof. J. M. Earle, who is doing a very satisfactory and sufficient work in the teaching and training of the children.

We have screened all three of our buildings with nice light screen, most of the work being done by the carpenter boys in the home.

We have bought equipment and furnishing for the building, such as iron beds, bedding, springs, etc., at a cost of \$650.00.

We have started a poultry plant for the home and through the gift of friends have some thoroughbred poultry, and hope soon to have all of our different departments in our poultry plant well stocked with the most desired thoroughbred varieties of poultry.

We have started industrial departments in the home, such as stenography and telegraphy, and expect soon to be able to add a bakery, printing plant, carpenter shop and paint shop which, with our farm work, will enable us to prepare all of our children for self-support when they have left the home.

We report further that the receipts of contributions during the summer months are not sufficient to pay the current expenses of the home, which necessitated the borrowing of money.

Your committee urgently recommends to the churches in our Association to make regular contributions for the support and maintenance of the home, as well as immediate collections for the cancellation of the debt incurred during the summer months."

"We, your executive committee, beg to report that at our January meeting we recommended to our State Board of Missions that Bro. W. E. Murphy be retained as missionary to this Association. The recommendation of the committee was accepted and the visible results of Bro. Murphy's work are, as near as they can be ascertained, as follows: Sermons preached, 309; baptisms, 34; converts baptized by others, 12; received by letters, 48, by statement, 4; lectures delivered, 36; money raised and paid to State Board, \$128.26; number of visits, 283; prayer meetings, 21; Sunday schools organized, 2; churches organized, 1; miles traveled in performance of duty, 2,105; received salary from State Board, \$400.

We heartily commend Bro. Murphy for the fine work of the year and recommend that it be the sense of this Association that he be retained as missionary to the Wekiva Association. We also commend him to the various churches for evangelistic work and ask that the churches assist him in locating the needy places and in introducing him to new fields for service.

The letters show that this Association has contributed approximately \$1,300 to State Missions, \$600 for Home and \$900 for Foreign Missions.

We recommend that the apportionments as made by the State Board for this Association be accepted by the churches and that every possible effort be made to come up to or exceed the amounts as suggested by the Board, namely: State Missions, \$1,200; Home Missions \$6,000; Foreign Missions, \$800.

We recommend further that in order to save space in the minutes and decrease the cost of publication that the constitution and articles of faith be left out of the minutes and published only at such times as the circumstances require."

Report on Home Missions

Read and discussed by Bro. J. W. Wildman:

"The Home Mission Board, located in Atlanta, Dr. B. D. Gray Secretary, is the general agency of the Southern Baptists to give the gospel to the South. It is doing Christian work of various kinds in thirteen states, in Cuba, the Isle of Pines and Panama.

There were engaged last year 1,302 missionaries who added 49,297 persons to the churches, 22,431 of whom came by baptism. They constituted 235 churches, erected and improved 289 houses of worship and organized 731 Sunday schools. The receipts for the year were \$333,543.33.

The great field of the Home Mission Board is west of the Mississippi river. In Texas, Louisiana, New Mexico, Arkansas and Missouri great doors of opportunity stand wide open, and also great problems press for immediate solution. But the Board is also doing work of some kind in all the Southern States from Maryland to Mississippi. In Florida the Board aided in the support of two mission workers among the negroes, one missionary pastor at Key West, five mission workers among the Cubans and three among the Italians in Tampa. The Board has also aided the Florida State Board in the support of sixty-one cooperative missionaries. They baptized 782 converts and received into the churches 1,429 members. During the year the Board also aided fourteen churches in building houses of worship.

There has been a marvelous growth of Home Mission interest and effort in recent years. In 1876 the Board had only thirty missionaries, most of whom labored among the Indians; now in addition to missions among native white populations much work is being done among foreigners, in mountain schools, in evangelism, among the negroes and in Cuba.

Among the 3,500,000 dwellers among the mountains the Board sustains 28 schools which employ 127 teachers and enroll 4,419 students, including 65 young men preparing to preach. These schools are exerting a blessed and transforming influence upon the social, moral and religious character of the people in the midst of whom they are established.

The Board is doing a great work in evangelism, through the twenty-seven evangelists who held 243 meetings and witnessed the conversion of 3,860 persons, 3,082 of whom were baptized. They held seven Bible conferences and collected for evangelism \$19,226.80.

The work in Cuba is in good condition. There are twenty-two churches with 1,447 members. The future is bright with promise.

Among the 35,000 workers engaged on the Panama canal the Board maintains a corps of missionaries who, under many difficulties,

are making steady progress. There are eight churches and five mission stations with a total membership of 582.

The Board is also doing a helpful and far-reaching work among the negroes in all the states of the South. The twenty-nine colored missionaries held many meetings and Bible conferences.

It is gratifying to report that after great effort the Board closed the year without debt. But failure to make regular offerings through the year has already brought on a threatening condition which will grow until a panic of alarm arouses our people to make a great effort to relieve the situation. We recommend to our churches of the Wekiva Association that they shall not wait until just before the meeting of the Convention next May to make their offerings to Home Missions; but that they adopt the New Testament system of laying by in store on the first day of the week for this board and the others, as the Lord has prospered them.

Report on Foreign Missions

Read by Bro. F. W. Cramer and discussed by him:

"The work of evangelizing the world is not optional. It is demanded by our loyalty to Christ and our love for mankind. In it each follower of Christ should be deeply interested and actively enlisted. How to awaken church members to a sense of duty and to enlist them in the work is one of the chief problems of the present day church. This task will rest largely upon the pastor, the divinely appointed leader. It goes without saying that he should be a missionary enthusiast, faithfully teaching the people by precept and example, making plain not only the teaching of scripture with reference to missions, but imparting information as to the work being done by our missionaries.

The Sunday school and Young People's societies furnish splendid opportunities for missionary instruction. Faithful sowing here will be sure to produce a rich harvest in the coming years. Mission study classes should be organized in every church. And by all means our people should receive and read the Foreign Mission Journal. Your committee would urge the delegates to lend their cooperation in increasing the subscription lists of the Journal in the churches of the Association.

'Information is inspiration.' We present some of the latest facts and figures concerning the work being done under the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. Last year the Board sent

out thirty new missionaries; there are now 273 missionaries and 513 native helpers, making a total of 804 workers. The Board's last report to the Convention shows 297 churches and 605 outstations, with a membership of 21,343. At present work is being done in China, Africa, Japan, Mexico, Italy, Brazil and Argentina. The reports from the workers at the front ought to lend encouragement to the workers at home. The total receipts for the past year were \$510,000 in round numbers, which was a small gain over the previous year. Of this amount Florida gave \$7,570.44, a gain of only \$731.06.

May God give us a clear vision of the 'fields white unto harvest' and ears to hear the Macedonian cry, and hearts to respond to the same with deeper consecration and larger giving in the name of Him who said, 'As the Father hath sent me, even so send I you.'
