Of the Fifty-Second Annual Session of the

WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Held With Montverde Baptist Church

October 18-19, 1922

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES

REPORT OF STATE MISSIONS.

To carry out the great commission of Jesus Christ challenges our best thought, our deepest devotion, and the sacrifice of money and men. These are the deplorable conditions as follows:

1. Much unoccupied territory, many Baptists are asking for the Gospel, which we alone can supply, when our work is so scattered, it seems impossible to consolidate the work.
2. We have far too many men who are non-resident seeking work.
3. We recommend that whenever men receive money from our State Board he shall live on some part of his field.
4. To meet this demands \$57,000 provided all pledges are paid. We employ some 15 general workers besides 81 mission pastors and report 6,000 last year.

REPORT ON FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME ARCADIA, FLORIDA

The primary object of our Children's Home at Arcadia is to provide a home, support and training for every orphan boy and girl in Florida who appeals to us for a home. We now have one hundred and eighteen children of various ages in the Home, from little Josie, one year old to the oldest nineteen-year-old girl. The only regret of the management is that we have not been able to carry out the primary object of our Home for the lack of funds.

Your committee feels that there are certain things which should be presented in this report for the information of those who are not familiar with the working of the Institution.

First—We only take full orphan children on the account of limited room and the certainty of displacing the full orphan child if we took the large number of half orphan children applying for a place.

Second—The reason we have not enlarged our Home faster, which would enable us to take care of more children, is because we have not received sufficient money to enable us to enlarge more rapidly.

Third—The home receives support in three ways: Ten per cent of the 75 Million Campaign Fund paid into the State Board of Missions; independent gifts sent to the Home designated independent of the campaign pledge, and from donations of clothing and food supplies sent the Home. The Home is not receiving the support it should. It was understood at the time we launched the 75 Million Campaign

that ten per cent of Florida's apportionment of one million dollars would not be an adequate support. It was hoped, however, that enough independent gifts would be received to supplement the ten per cent to supply all of the needs of the Home. The Convention authorized these independent gifts, but we have been disappointed, as they have not been sufficient to take care of our work as it should be.

Fourth—There must be a rearrangement of the financial policy for the support of our Children's Home if the work is properly taken care of and certainly every Baptist must pay up in full their campaign pledge if the Home is to receive even the small ten per cent constituting their part.

Fifth—The necessary needs of our home are being given careful attention and the children are being provided with as many things as possible, demanded for their comfort and training, though we have had to depend upon our creditors for considerable leniency in carrying accounts and your committee is happy to report that there has been no deaths during the past year and we are receiving an average of about twenty children a year, which takes the place of those leaving for places and positions of self-support. We are happy to report that during the year a two-story, concrete building has been erected, the upper story to be used for a dormitory for small boys, eight and nine years old, and the lower story equipped for a steam laundry. The campaign made to raise funds for the erection and furnishing of this building was supplemented by a \$3,000.00 bequest and made possible the completion of this building.

The committee is happy to report the religious side of our work being taken care of. We have a school in operation under the management of our home and the larger children after graduating from the eighth grade are sent to the High School in Arcadia.

Your committee would urge our people of the Wekiwa Association to pay up promptly all pledges to the 75 Million Campaign. Remember, the Home in independent gifts and donations and by all means pray for the Home in its work and visit at least once a year to keep yourself posted as to what is being done and what is needed.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Using the words of Mr. Harry Strickland, the time has come when the Sunday schools of the South should "catch step" and march together in perfect harmony; in the army we are taught to keep step. First four men are trained to keep step perfectly and then they are placed with four more and drilled to perfection. Eight men thus trained are put with eight others and these sixteen with sixteen others and so on until an entire company, a regiment, a battalion can keep step.

We recommend that the Wekiwa Association be one of the first associations in this great state to catch the spirit and meaning of cooperative work in its Sunday schools, B. Y. P. U.'s, W. M. U., Laymen's Unions, prayer meetings, preaching services and any other or-

ganized work of the church. The Association can then catch step with the great state mission program. State missions means each Baptist church of a state enlisting and training each member for effective service, and then all the churches joining hands and keeping step to win the whole state for Christ. There is power behind such organization and the Sunday school has one of the most important places in its program of work.

We recommend that every Sunday school of this Association, where it is practical to do so, have a class for every age in both sexes up through the intermediate department and that they provide themselves with necessary equipment as laid down by the Board; also that they plan teachers' training courses for the teachers of the various departments.

We recommend that the Sunday school superintendents of this Association give special attention to the work of the adult classes. A Baptist Sunday school is not what it should be if the adults are not found in its rooms on Sunday morning. In every Sunday school of this Association there should be a Berean class, Filathea class, Young Matrons or T. E. L. class and an organized Men's Bible class.

There are many Men's Bible classes today conducted in a ship-shod manner, having no definite aim, the teacher being content to teach those who happen to come and teacher and class having little or no vision of the real opportunity for service which is offered. A large proportion of the classes thus operate dare not organized, because they have never been taught the value of systematic work. There are others whose leaders think that any form of organization in religious work is anti-scriptural and condemn the whole matter as useless red tape.

There are thousands of others, though, that are reaching out for the large local constituency and through their activities making their influence felt for good in church, community and state. Our Lord organized the five thousand into companies of fifty and a hundred and the seventy into twos. Paul organized the believers into churches. Why shouldn't we try the organized class work for our Sunday school.

Two-thirds of the members of our churches in the South are not in Sunday school and this within itself is sufficient argument for organizing a class.

We further recommend that every Men's Bible class join in with the "Flying Squadron" movement and go out into the world doing the will of God in a systematic organized manner.

REPORT ON B. Y. P. U. WORK.

The B. Y. P. U. is the training camp of the Church. This is true of the local church, the federation, the convention and assembly.

The young Christian is a new recruit in the army of the King as such he is to be trained in knowledge, in discipline and duty.

He is an apprentice as in a calling or profession, as such he is to be trained to think in terms of his calling, to live in accordance with his profession; to speak the language of his calling and in such a manner as to magnify his office.

He is a steward of the manifold grace of God, as such he is to learn the stewardship of life, that all he is and had God has given

him—only in trust with service as the purpose.

He must learn the stewardship of increase—that God has given him the very capacities by which he may earn, or win or achieve or become.

He must learn the stewardship of returns—that all he renders unto the Lord in time, in service and money only represents the proportion therein expressed of the whole, which whole belongs to God and he must give account of all he keeps, all he uses, all he enjoys, all he spends.

All that is involved in this course of training is included in the B. Y. P. U. as a training school.

Every church in this Association should have an organization of her young people. While we rejoice at the progress of the past year, as shown in the federation and its splendid work under the direction of Brother L. C. Berry, president, and Miss Carraway, extension worker, still we see the need of a more unified and aggressive effort.

We, your committee, recommend:

1. That the report of the federation be given space in our minutes.
2. That the unions in the bounds of this Association be urged to join the federation.
3. That all our pastors and deacons, together with all other church officers, be urged to co-operate with our young people in the great work they are trying to do, viz: organize a union in every church.

Where there is no such organization and lead up to the standard of excellence all such organizations as we now have.

REPORT ON B. M. A. ASSOCIATION.

We, your committee, beg to report as follows:

The care of our aged, worn-out and disabled ministers is a subject of vital importance today.

In the past the care of our aged, worn-out and disabled ministers has been a trying proposition and much neglected.

But we are now able to say that the question is practically settled to the satisfaction of the Baptist denomination.

In the \$75,000,000 campaign so bountifully and graciously carried on by the Baptist people of our great Southern Baptist Convention in 1919, the Baptist people in the goodness of their hearts made provision for the relief of the aged, disabled and worn-out ministers and their families which are dependent upon them for support.

It is hoped that this fund will grow rapidly and we urge most earnestly the churches to be faithful and prompt in meeting their obligations.

Further particulars may be had by addressing Dr. Wm. Lunsford, Dallas, Texas.

We trust that every Baptist minister in Florida will become a member of this B. M. A. A. as a beneficiary member.

The S. S., Ladies' Aid, B. Y. P. U. and every auxiliary of the church will become honorary members, which is purely benevolent.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Home missions should appeal to us with as great force and be laid upon our hearts with as great emphasis as any one work of our denomination, for it was through the work of the Home Mission Board that our entire Southland has been brought to realize its obligations to the world.

Our Home Mission Board is today spending funds and lending aid to the evangelization among the foreigners in the cities of the South, the inhabitants of the mountain districts, the Indians of the West and in Oklahoma, the Mexicans along our borders and on the frontiers, the negroes of the South, Cuba and the Canal Zone, besides other interest, such as the hospital work, our training school at New Orleans, church building and various other ways in which we are helping the causes represented by our board.

From all these fields of operations we have had most encouraging reports. More than 46,000 additions were brought into the churches through the work of the Home Missions Board and of this number 26,000 were by baptism. Evidently there were many not reported.

Your committee feels that all the work that is being done under the Home Mission Board could be commented upon with interest, but that of our mountain school and our co-operative work with the boards of other states should have special emphasis.

It is from these sources that many of our young ministers come and their early training is fostered.

We are glad to note that through the efforts of Dr. L. B. Warren more than \$1,000,000 church building fund has been secured in cash and that many churches are being aided by this fund. It is regrettable, however, that the resources of the Home Mission Board were not sufficient during the past year to enable the board to conduct its work so that this fund could have been kept intact for the building of churches for which it was secured.

It is hoped that our income this year will be sufficient so that the board shall be able to replace the amounts borrowed.

In conclusion we want to say that no one agency of our convention is doing more to create a wholesome condition in our Southland than our Home Mission Board. We, your committee, would suggest that our pastors emphasize the work of this agency in our church work.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The brightest page in Baptist history for the last century is Foreign Missions. All other religions save the religion of Jesus Christ are more or less local, while His blessing is for the whole world. "Go ye into all the world" or "the field is the world."

The launching of the 75 million campaign was a crucial hour with Southern Baptists, as the following comparison will show. In the three years after the launching of this campaign, Southern Baptists raised three times as much money as in the three years preceding the campaign. During the last three years we have sent out nearly 100 missionaries each year. If the income of Southern Baptists had been tithed, the results would have been greatly increased, aggregating about \$100,000,000 per year.

A deplorable fact staring us in the face is that Southern Baptists have spent an average of \$43.00 each for luxuries and \$10.00 each for the Lord's work. If these figures would be reversed we would be spared the humiliation of retrenchment and defeat. Our colleges and seminaries are preparing workers far beyond the willingness of our people to carry them to the fields of service. There are countless blessings reserved for each one of us as were reserved for the good woman who dreamed she went to heaven and found them there piled up for her claim. The trouble is that we are not willing to claim them on earth.

We recommend the wise words of Dr. Geo. W. Truett, spoken

from his abundant experience and information, that this should be our watchword: "It needs to be written as plainly as if written across the heavens in living letters of fire, that the past standards of giving to missions by our Baptist people will be inexcusable and inadequate and unworthy for the future. We must advance, and advance greatly, and advance now, or we shall gravely sin in the face of the most strategic and commanding calls that have ever challenged our Baptist people, from the first Baptists till now."

REPORT ON EDUCATION.

We know that the greatest teacher the world has ever known was our Saviour. As Baptists, we have tried to lay down in our schools the Christian ideals that Christ used himself. The teacher that makes the best success is the teacher who teaches from the standpoint that his pupils are temples of God, made by the Divine Creator and subject to His eternal love or His eternal banishment.

Education is the process the object of which is to direct aright all human thinking. Its realm includes two fields, one of fact, the other of appreciation.

When we limit education solely to fact, it takes the form of imparting information. When education includes the realm of appreciation, then the knowledge of all facts, whatever kind or character they may be, is so imparted to the student as to make surer for him the meaning of the universe and to reveal more clearly to him the beauty and the harmony of nature, and thus to quicken within him the conviction that every duty must be performed because he lives in a moral universe over which there ever reigns a holy and righteous God.

The school which is free to encourage and to develop the appreciation of that which is best in life is the school where the truest education can be secured.

The institution which gives pre-eminence to the appreciation of Jesus Christ as revealed in the New Testament and which is able to inspire students to think in harmony with His divine mind, provides for the next generation the men and the women who are destined to become the salt of the earth and the light of the world.

Upon these ideals we believe our Baptist schools of the South to be founded. Stetson University of De Land is the only college of Florida and it has no feeders. We urge the Baptists of the State and Association to arouse a sentiment for some secondary schools that will supply Stetson with students trained for Stetson.

We recommend that our people pray for the Christian schools of the entire South and especially for Stetson, and to respond to the Seventy-five Million Campaign that Stetson may have an unprecedented career.
