CONSTITUTION

OF THE

WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Changed and Adopted October 16, 1923

Article 1. This union of churches shall be known and distinguished by the style and title of The Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article 2. The Association shall be composed of representatives from the churches in the union. Each church shall be entitled to three delegates and every additional twenty-five members above the first fifty shall be entitled to an additional delegate; and shall also be entitled to an additional delegate for each \$25 or fraction thereof contributed to missions.

Article 3. The delegates, when convened, shall organize themselves into a deliberative body by the appointment of a moderator and clerk; these officers shall be chosen by ballot at each annual meeting, and continue in office until new ones are chosen.

Article 4. This Association shall not interfere with the rights of the churches of which she is composed. She shall regard them as independent bodies in all measures of internal government and shall act only as advisory council, assuming no authority but what is expressly delegated to her by the churches. She, nevertheless, claims authority over her own members, the delegates of the churches, and shall have power to withdraw from and disown all churches that depart from the principles of this compact by becoming heterodox in faith or disorderly in practice. She should, therefore, regard all the churches, united under the constitution, with a vigilant eye for good. Her principal business shall be to promote the declarative glory of God, by extending His kingdom of grace on earth, through the medium of preaching the gospel, and other means in accordance with that gospel; to cultivate union and fellowship with all the churches of Christ and especially with those united in this Association.

Article 5. Newly constituted churches, or churches dismissed from other Associations of the same faith and order, may be admitted into this union on their sending up delegates to an annual meeting with a petition and by those delegates agreeing to the abstract of principles adopted by this Association.

Article 6. The nominating committee shall nominate an executive

committee to consist of one member from each church in the Association. The moderator and the clerk of the Association to be ex-officio members. Committee to meet once each quarter. The business of the committee shall be to act as a steering committee for the Association when in session and when requested to see to the time and place for the meetings of the body and use their best efforts to promote the Lord's cause in the bounds of the Association in the intervals between the meetings of the body.

Article 7. The churches in this union shall transmit to every annual session of the Association written communication specifying the names of the delegates, number and fellowship, baptized, received by letter, dismissed, excluded, restored, deceased, and all other information which churches may deem of importance, which shall be compiled and minuted accordingly.

Article 8. The Association shall furnish the churches with the minutes of every session.

Article 9. The Association shall take cognizance of no query sent up by the churches unless they have endeavored to solve the same and have failed, nor of any difficulty between churches unless they have pursued the direction contained in the eighteenth chapter of Matthew, and have not been able to settle them. Then the Association shall take such matters into consideration and act upon them at her discretion.

Article 10. The duty of the treasurer, who shall be elected at each session by ballot, shall be to receive all money and manage the funds according to the order of the Association, presenting annually for insertion in the minutes a clear and full statement of all receipts and expenditures.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make and keep a regular file of printed minutes of every session of this body and deliver the same to his successor in office.

Article 12. This Association, when convened, shall be governed by proper rules of decorum, which she is authorized to make and amend according to her own views.

Article 13. This constitution may be altered or amended at a regular meeting of the Association by a concurring vote of two-thirds of members present.

Article 14. The moderator shall keep order and conduct the business of this Association in accordance with recognized rules of parliamentary law and practice.

Article 15. Each delegate to this Association shall be expected to remain in attendance until the close of the session, unless expressly excused by the body.

Article 16. The moderator shall appoint the chairman of all committees for the ensuing year, at each session.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

A season of worship was conducted by Rev. S. I. Smith of Kissimmee. EDUCATION—D. F. Sebastian read the report of the Committee on Education, which follows:

REPORT ON EDUCATION

The divine authority for Christian Education is found in the Great Commission of our Risen Lord: "Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you", is the task of our educational program.

We believe Christian education is vastly more than a "secular education" obtained in a Christian atmosphere. We believe the word of God should be given first place in every Baptist school and the doctrines and Principles of our Faith should be taught with emphasis. Our boys and girls returning from our schools should be more intelligent Baptists and more zealous Kingdom workers than when they left home.

It can be no longer said that Baptists are an unlearned and ignorant people. We have under our control 121 educational institutions, 36 Standard Colleges, 80 secondary schools and academies, 5 Seminaries and Bible schools. The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary of Louisville, is the greatest school of its kind on earth. There are over 40,000 students enrolled in these schools. We have invested over forty millions of dollars in educational institutions—more than any protestant denomination in America. 21 per cent. of the Campaign Fund goes to education.

Some of the leading scholars of the last century have come from our ranks. Among whom we mention the immortals: Boyce, Carroll, Broadus and our own Mullens and Robertson.

We have only one school in Florida—our beloved Stetson University at De Land. While giving courses in other lines of education, Stetson gives a strong course in the Bible. Professor H. C. Garwood is teaching splendid courses in Christian doctrines, Baptist History and Sunday School Work.

Our denominational schools are the bulwark of our American Christian Civilization. They are giving to America what State schools can not give. If this is not true then it is useless to foster our separate schools.

Let us avow our loyalty and pledge our support and so far as it is possible send our children to our own schools. Let our schools pledge their absolute loyalty to our Baptist Principles and to the Bible as the unerring word of God.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

J. B. Webb read the following report of the Committee on Religious Literature:

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS LITERATURE

This is a great subject, and one that requires our best thought and interest since so much literature of all classes is scattered broadcast over our land. It is conceded to-day in the minds of those who read, that 90% of the knowledge that we receive is received through the organ of sight. If this be true, then the press becomes a great power and factor in moulding the lives both of men and women, and the lives are moulded according to the material which they read, therefore the very best material should be placed before our people; and to have a progressive constituency in the service of the Lord it is necessary that a study of the Bible together with a study of the very best literature, be maintained.

Therefore we earnestly recommend that a faithful and persistent study of the Bible be made by our church people, as the first factor in the moulding of a good and strong Christian character. Second, that we urge our people to read our State papers; the Witness especially, and other periodicals, such as the "Home and Foreign Journal", the B. Y. P. U. Federation paper, the "Wekiwa Herald," the W. M. U. Magazine, the "Royal Service".

Third, also we would urge under all circumstances, that we use our Sunday School Literature published in Nashville, Tenn., by our own Sunday School Board.

L. C. Berry read the report of the Committee on B. Y. P. U.:

REPORT OF WEKIWA FEDERATION OF BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNIONS

for the year ending July 1st, 1923.

ORGANIZATION

1. **MEMBERSHIP.** Composed of B. Y. P. U.'s in those churches which are members of the Wekiwa Association of Baptist churches and co-operate with the State Baptist Convention.

2. **OFFICERS.** We have the following officers: President, vice-president, four district vice-presidents, secretary, treasurer, intermediate leader, junior leader, and chorister.

3. **COMMITTEES.** We have the following committees: Membership, extension, instruction, social, executive, and program.

4. **GROUPS.** We have the Federation divided into four districts with a district vice-president in charge of the work in each district.

MEETINGS

1. **ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS.** We held an annual meeting in June of the entire Federation. At this meeting 100% of the Unions that are members of the Federation had delegates present. Senior, Intermediate and Junior work was represented at this meeting. A social was held at this time. Owing to the size of the Federation the officers thought it best to hold training schools in each union rather than have one central school. Representatives from 100% of the unions took part in these schools conducted under the direction of the Federation officers.

2. **GROUP MEETINGS.** The Federation held a Quarterly Meeting of the entire Federation in each of the four districts during the year.

3. **BUSINESS MEETINGS.** An annual and four quarterly business sessions were held during the year. Federation officers were elected at the annual meeting. Written reports were made by all the officers. The date for the next meeting was set. The constitution of the Federation calls for the president to make a written report to the Association at its annual meeting.

4. **STATE MEETINGS.** The Federation officers co-operated with the State B. Y. P. U. department and urged all the members to attend the summer assembly. Reports at the annual meeting showed that 100% of the Unions in the Federation were sending delegates.

EDUCATIONAL WORK

1. **A-1 UNIONS.** 100% of the Unions in the Federation qualified as A-1 at least one quarter during the year and over 25% qualified every quarter during the year.

2. **EXTENSION WORK.** 100% of the Unions visited other churches during the year. 200% increase in the number of Unions in the Association during the year. Assisted negro B. Y. P. U.'s.

3. **GIVING.** 28.2 percent of active members tithing. 83.7 percent of the active members giving systematically.

4. STUDY COURSE WORK. 100% of Unions had representatives at training schools. 100% of Unions observed study course weeks. Mission Study courses were fostered.

The above report was made following the Standard of Excellence for Associational B. Y. P. U.'s as given on pages 149, 150, 151 and 152 of the new B. Y. P. U. manual. In addition we report the following:—

BAPTIST MINISTERS' ASSURANCE ASSOCIATION.

The report was read for the Committee by J. B. Holly, B. M. A. A.

REPORT OF BAPTIST MINISTERS' ASSURANCE ASSOCIATION

The Baptist Ministers' Assurance Association was promoted for the purpose of providing a small relief fund for burial and other incidental expenses to be paid to the widow of deceased minister immediately upon his death. The creation of such fund is by means of an assessment of \$1.00 upon each minister belonging thereto and the voluntary gifts of individual lay members belonging to the Association. Churches, Sunday Schools, Baptist Young People's Unions and Woman's Missionary Societies have become members also.

The combined average assessment amounts to about \$150 to \$200, which amount is kept in the treasury for the purpose of immediate relief at the death of its ministerial members.

While the Ministerial Assurance Association has been of great help in the past, the Baptist Ministerial Relief and Annuity Board of Dallas, Texas, not only offers protection to the widow of deceased minister, but aids and comforts the minister, within its membership, in his declining years and provides for widow after his death.

Dr. William Lunsford, Corresponding Secretary of this Board, in his report to the Southern Baptist Convention said: "The people of God should say to the minister in active service, give yourself whole-heartedly to the work; spend yourself freely, be not afraid; we do not pay you just the salaries that we should, but this we do at least solemnly promise

that we will stand back of you; if you fall in the work we will care for you; if you die, we will not permit your family to suffer; if you grow old in it we will comfort your declining years."

We, your Committee, recommend to the churches that they give their support and assistance to these objects of benevolence.

Prayer was offered by J. A. Sutton and the Association recessed until the Wednesday Evening Session, 7:15.

WEDNESDAY EVENING

Devotional service was led by F. G. Symonds after which Dr. J. D. Adcock read the report of the Committee on Foreign, Home and State Mission.

REPORT ON MISSIONS

Four years of the period of the 75 million dollar campaign have passed. These have been the most eventful years of our history. The seven causes included in this campaign have received a total sum of \$44,003,005.79. During these years Southern Baptists have gained 3,068 churches, 3,287 Sunday Schools with 458,223 new pupils, 8,688 Baptist Young People's Unions with 233,917 new members, 7,094 W. M. U. organizations, baptized 762,880 persons and put \$45,405,118 in local church property. As compared with the four years immediately preceding the period of the 75 Million Campaign, Missions, Christian Education and Benevolences have received 44 million dollars against 16 million, a gain of 28 million.

But great as the results have been, our task is only begun. In the field occupied by the Missionaries of our Foreign Mission Board, there are 900,000,000 lost people, and in the territory occupied by our Home Missionaries there 16,000,000 lost people old enough to be saved. "The harvest truly is great, but the laborers are few."

That we may see more clearly the needs of the causes represented in this report and our obligation to these causes, let us look upon the fields and see somewhat of the forces through the facts they present in their

reports; also face the possibility of fatal results if we fail in this time. Your committee is asked to report for the three Mission Boards in particular. So looking farthest and encompassing all of the mission territories, let us try to visualize the field and the forces of our foreign, home and state mission work. Our foreign work grows.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

We have now 891 churches in sixteen foreign lands; 211 or practically one-fourth of these churches are self-supporting; 442 or one-half have their own houses of worship. In addition to the churches there are 2,896 out-stations which give us a total of practically 4,000 stations where the word of God is preached regularly. Last year the crowning year in baptisms, 12,611 were baptized, which is 4,720 more than reported the year before. We have passed the 100,000 mark in membership. This gave \$4.23 per capita last year. We have 796 schools which were attended last year by 32,789 scholars. This is about equal to the number of students in our Baptist schools in the Southland.

There are 1,447 Sunday Schools, with an enrollment of 67,407.

We have now 501 foreign missionaries and 2,820 native missionaries. This is almost twice as many as we had at the beginning of the campaign four years ago.

Our board reported a heavy debt last Spring at the convention, but in the face of this debt the needs are so great that a spontaneous collection was taken to defray the expenses of the outgoing missionaries, and since the meeting in May 48 new missionaries have been sent by our Boards to the foreign fields.

HOME MISSIONS

The Home Mission Board made a great report at the Convention in Kansas City. When the Convention met there eighteen years ago, the board's receipts for the year were less than \$200,000. This year they were more than \$1,002,000.00.

Then the Board reported 10,000 baptisms, this year 38,000. Then there were 20,000 additions to the churches, through the Home Missions Agency, this year over 59,000. Then the board had no special department of evangelism. Since that time that department has been organized, and through its labors 152,846 converts have been baptized, and 208,643 additions to the churches, with 23,260 volunteers for the ministry or definite mission work.

All the other departments of the board's work have advanced in a similar way. Surely we have abundant reason for thanksgiving. The home board is our one great Southwide missionary agency and has been the greatest single factor in helping to make the South a mighty Baptist empire.

The last report of the board states that if we raise the \$75,000,000

by the close of the five year period, and the board receives in proportion, the board's debt can be paid and the board's work increased fifty percent. We cannot too strongly urge the importance of caring for our Home Mission work.

STATE MISSIONS

In our own beloved Florida we have 29 associations, 766 white Baptist churches, with a total membership of 77,846

There were 5,579 baptisms in the State last year; of this number 919 were baptized by our missionaries.

The total number received into the churches on our mission fields last year was 1,843. We employed in whole or in part, 81 missionary pastors and evangelists.

The Board contributed \$20,469.37 to pastoral aid at needy points, 80 per cent. of which went to the aid of country or village churches.

The Board paid on appropriations to church building \$14,539.94, and there was collected on fees by our workers and reported to the Board's office for this purpose \$24,968.52.

The Board assisted in purchasing several valuable pieces of real estate last year for church sites.

The Board appropriated to Ministerial Relief through the Dallas Relief Board to aid disabled preachers in this State \$3,060.05.

The Board appropriated for the maintenance of its Sunday School Department \$4,044.01; for its W. M. U. department \$4,272.93; for its B. Y. P. U. department, \$2,522.60.

The total paid into the Treasury of the Orphan's Home for the year, \$19,562.32.

Florida contributed to Foreign Missions, \$31,655.86.

And to Home Missions \$29,281.67.

For the cause of Christian Education, we have paid into the endowment of Stetson University for the year, \$24,889.43. Paid for the education of ministers and mission workers, \$2,018.05.

J. D. Adcock and S. B. Rogers spoke to the report. The report was adopted, after which a committee was appointed to consider the changes offered by Dr. Rogers as to the Associations reports on Missions and the discussion of same.

The committee appointed was J. D. Adcock, J. A. Sutton, J. B. Webb and D. F. Sebastian.

Following the benediction by Dr. Rogers the Association took recess until Thursday morning Session.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The morning worship was conducted by W. R. Clark, Florida Baptist Children's Home. W. C. Appling read the report of the committee on the Children's Home:

REPORT FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The twenty years Florida Baptists have been maintaining a Home at Arcadia for orphan children have demonstrated the wisdom of establishing such an institution. During these years an average of twelve children have left the Home every year, thus placing the benefits of the Home to the homeless children of our State at nearly four hundred from the work we are doing in this Institution.

We learn from the Superintendent that we now have one hundred and three children in the Home and fifteen have left the Home during the year. Applications are out for other children who are eligible for admission into the Home. We would emphasize the thought of personal responsibility in caring for our family of boys and girls at Arcadia upon each individual member of this Association. We give too little consideration to the needs of the Home as a personal responsibility. The children there are our children, just as surely as we are Baptists and have assumed the obligation of Baptist work in Florida.

At this writing we learn that our family of boys and girls are well, that the activity of the Home life is in full and satisfactory operation and that the children are growing up there under the training and opportunities given them, into useful Christian men and women who are prepared to take their places as citizens in our state. While the equipment at the Home for industrial training and work is limited, the system of the Home is such that the children growing up there are given equal opportunities with children in the average private home. This should be a matter of gratification to us who carry the responsibility of the work of the Home.

The support of the Home for the past four or five years has been inadequate. The larger part of the support money of the Home comes from the ten per cent. of the 75 Million Campaign, but when the Campaign pledges are not paid, the full year's stipend cannot be paid to the Home, therefore forcing the management to look to independent gifts to supplement this amount in order to meet the needs of the Home and the independent contributions have not been sufficient to meet the current needs much less providing an improvement and enlargement fund.

Your committee urges upon every individual Baptist in this Associa-

tion to send donations of food supplies and make independent contributions to the Home at intervals during the year in order to help supply the needs of our family of boys and girls. We also urge every church and every member to meet their Campaign pledge in full in order that the full amount due the Home from this fund might be paid into the Home treasury.

There was collected for the Campaign last fiscal year \$158,279.32. The finishing of the task of the \$75,000,000 Campaign is our foremost duty, and it should be the pleasure of every member of all of our churches to have a part in bringing this stupendous task to a triumphant finish.

By a vote of the Southern Baptist Convention, the period of the 75 Million Campaign will close December 1st, 1924. To complete this task we must pay \$31,000,000 more. This is more money than the Southern Baptists have ever raised in the same period of time, but with an income of \$1,500,000,000 annually, Southern Baptists are able to pay twice this amount.

We your committee recommend that so far as the Wekiwa Association is concerned will meet the entire obligation which we made when we signed the pledge. If some of our members have died, or moved away, surely others have taken their places. So let every pastor and every delegate go home resolved to see to it that every member of every church have a part in finishing this great task. Then we shall see the triumphs of the faith that is so dear to us. Otherwise we shall feel the reproach of defeat which we could easily have avoided.

LAW AND ENFORCEMENT

We your committee beg lief to submit the following report on Law and Enforcement.

We need not spend so much time now to advocate prohibition as in the past for many have already seen the good effects of it since the adoption of the 18th amendment, notwithstanding the law has not been enforced as it should have been and will be in the future.

The issue today, therefore, is not whether a man favors *prohibition*, but whether he favors *law enforcement* or *lawlessness*.

We believe that city, county, state and federal government should cooperate to the fullest extent to secure the efficient enforcement of the 18th

Amendment. Mr. Marshall, a prominent lawyer of New York, declared: "The people have spoken on the 18th Amendment and their will must be obeyed."

We commend the splendid work of *agitation* and *education*, which is being carried on by the Anti-saloon League of America, and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union.

We urge our people to vote and work for the election of officers that really *believe* in prohibition and stand behind them with our moral and financial support.
