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CONSTITUTION

- Article I. This Association shall be called the Wekiwa Baptist Association.
- Article II. The Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches affiliated with this association. Each Church shall be entitled to its Pastor and three messengers, and one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof over 100, provided that no church shall be allowed more than twenty-five messengers.
- Article III. The objects of this Association are: Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.
- Article IV. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually. The terms of office shall begin at close of session. The Moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive terms.
- Article V. Other churches of the same faith and order wishing to become affiliated with this association must send messengers and a petition for membership, along with information as to their doctrinal views and practices, to any annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership.
- Article VI. There shall be an executive committee composed of: (a) The officers of the Association, (b) all Pastors of Churches cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (c) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (d) Association Training Union Director, (e) Association W. M. U. President, (f) One member from each Church; which shall conduct all business of this Association between the annual meetings.
- Article VII. The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect. The executive Committee, however, shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.
- Article VIII. The doctrinal statement representing in general the Biblical beliefs of the Baptist constituting this Association, as its ground of common faith and practice, shall be the New Hampshire Confession of Faith (or its like).
- Article IX. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting, and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY - LAWS

- In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are adopted for the government of the Wekiwa Baptist Association:
- Article I. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, so far as applicable, shall be followed.
- Article II. The fiscal year shall run from October 1st.—September 30th.
- Article III. The Moderator of the Association shall appoint at the beginning of each annual meeting a Committee on Committees, whose duty shall be to nominate the following Committees to report at the present meeting:
1. Committee on Time, Place, and Preacher for next meeting.
 2. Committee on Application for Membership and Dismissal, when needed.
 3. Committee on Resolutions.
 4. Committee on Nominations, whose duty shall be to nominate: (a) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (b) Association Training Union Director, (c) A person to present a written report at next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association, (d) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee, which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.
- Article IV. The Clerk shall keep records of proceedings; print and distribute Minutes; keep file of Minutes, which shall be turned over to the successor.
- Article V. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee.
- The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except when it feels there is no need for a meeting, at which time written reports from the different officers and committees shall be presented.
- The Executive Committee shall appoint the following standing Committees on: Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhoods, and such other Committees as it needs to carry out its work.
- The Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee to prepare a budget, including all expenditures of all departments of the work and submit same to the Association for its approval. For the year 1947 it must be presented to the churches and approved.
- Article VI. The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.
- Article VII. These By-Laws may be altered or amended in the same manner as the Constitution.

PROCEEDINGS WEDNESDAY MORNING

The 77th annual session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association met with the North Park Baptist Church, Orlando, October 22-23. The moderator, Rev. M. C. Swicegood called the meeting to order at 10 a. m. and Rev. W. M. Bouterse led the body in singing several hymns and then read Revelation 3:14-27. After which he led in prayer.

The clerk, Albert A. Stulck, moved that the messengers then present and those who came later on would constitute the body of the Wekiwa Baptist Association. It was adopted.

New pastors were introduced: Rev. H. O. Reynolds at Zellwood, Rev. Lyman Hall at Pine Castle, Rev. G. R. West at Holopaw, and Rev. Edward Furginson supply pastor at Apopka.

Rev. Leon Gambrell of Lakeland was given thirteen minutes to bring a report of the work of the Florida Baptist Institution at Lakeland.

The B. T. U. report was read by Brother Martin for W. G. Summers, the Associational Director. It was adopted and will appear in the list of reports.

The Sunday School report was read by W. L. Evans, Sr., for the Associational Superintendent Brother Philip Earnest. The report had the following recommendation in it that \$100.00 be put into the budget for Sunday School work within the Association. It was moved by Rev. W. R. Clarke that the words be changed to read, if possible. Motion carried.

The time had arrived for the Introductory Sermon, and Rev. J. R. Chiles read the following Scripture: Matthew 16:13-18; 18:15-20. Rev. M. D. Jackson spoke on the New Testament Church. He closed with prayer.

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Rev. D. V. McAllister conducted the devotional service, by singing "To The Work," and then reading John 14:1-15.

The Committee on Membership reported that the Zellwood Baptist Church had made application for membership into the Association and that the committee had examined their articles of faith and found them to be satisfactory. The following recommendation was made by the committee. "We recommend, unanimously, that the Zellwood Baptist Church be accepted in full fellowship as a member of the group of churches that constitute the Wekiwa Baptist Association." Signed: J. S. The moderator, Rev. Melvin C. Swicegood extended the hand of fellowship to the pastor, Rev. H. O. Reynolds.

The report on Christian Literature was read by M. D. Jackson and adopted by the body. Dr. E. D. Solomon, the editor of the Florida Baptist Witness, brought a very timely message.

The report on Christian Education was read by Dr. J. E. Martin, which was adopted. After some remarks by Dr. Martin Dr. J. H. Griffin of DeLand brought a report on the progress of Stetson University.

The treasurer then brought his report on the financial standing of the body. It was adopted and will appear in the list of reports.

The moderator led the body in singing, "Praise Him, Praise Him," and "The King's Business."

Mrs. W. J. Garnett brought the report of the W. M. U. It was adopted and will appear in the list of reports.

The body adjourned to convene at 7:30 p. m.

WEDNESDAY EVENING SESSION

Rev. R. G. West, the pastor of the Holopaw Baptist Church, led the body in singing, "Throw Out the Life Line," and Mr. W. E. Browning led in prayer. Brother West read 1 Corinthians 1:18.

Dr. Tucker moved that the report on missions be passed without reading and that Dr. Maguire would be given the time to talk to us about the work of the state. Carried.

The Choir of the North Park Baptist Church brought a special number.

Dr. John Maguire, our State Secretary, brought us a marvelous message on "Catching Step, and Keeping Faith."

The meeting was adjourned to convene at 10 o'clock Thursday morning.

THURSDAY MORNING SESSION

The morning session opened by singing, "Love Lifted Me." Rev. Lyman Hall read Psalm 41:1-11. After the singing "Make Me a Channel of Blessing," Brother George L. Brown led in prayer.

Dr. R. P. Ingersol brought us the report on Ministerial Relief. Brethren Ingersol, Clark, and Martin spoke to the report. It was adopted.

The report on the Hospital was read by Rev. H. L. Webb. It was adopted.

After the singing of "Standing on the Promises," Rev. Albert A. Stulck read a digest of the Church letter.

Dr. J. Powell Tucker brought a report of the meeting of the Baptist World's Alliance and his observations of the impressions received while in Europe. It was a heart-stirring message.

The body adjourned for lunch.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

The Thursday Afternoon Session was opened by the singing of the hymn "Majestic Sweetness Sits Enthroned," "Tell Me the Old Story," and "Dwelling in Beulah Land." Rev. R. T. Liner read I Samuel 1:28, and after singing, "Have Thine Own Way," he led in prayer.

The report on Social Service and Temperance was read by Rev. Albert A. Stulck. It was adopted.

The report of the Executive Committee was read by Rev. Albert A. Stulck and adopted. An amendment to give the Sunday School \$100.00 was lost.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Since 1904 the Baptists of Florida have supported the Florida Baptist Children's Home at Arcadia. As the population of the State has steadily increased the demands upon the home have likewise become greater. As an aftermath of the war homes are being disrupted through desertion and divorce. Dependency, thus created, has caused more applications for entering innocent, suffering children than has the death of one or both parents.

The management of the home tries in every way to assist the unfortunate children of our state, but it has been able to assist only a fraction of the children applying for help.

At present there are 122 children in the home ranging in age from two years to those of high school age. Six of our children are in college. There are also ten children being helped on Mother's Aid.

We are indeed fortunate in having Superintendent T. M. Johns and Mrs. Johns in charge of our children's home. Mr. Johns has given a sound business administration so that the financial condition of the institution is good. Mr. and Mrs. Johns have been father and mother to the children entrusted to their care, looking after the spiritual as well as the physical welfare of the children.

Work is going forward on the new home in Lakeland. This new location is ideal and consists of 51 acres in the City of Lakeland and 80 acres adjoining, just outside the city limits. They have room for

pasture and truck farm and about 30 acres for the building site. This property borders on Lake Hunter Drive and the children may use the lake for fishing and boating. Four of the new buildings are now under construction. When the dormitories are finished, we shall have one of the most modern institutions in the South.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

There are four very definite things in the term Education.

1. Increased ease and power to earn a living.
2. Love of knowledge for the joy it gives.
3. Culture — The adornment of personality.
4. More efficient and dynamic service in the various fields of human endeavor.

Without any doubt at all, the greatest need of the world today is education. Christ centered and filled with His Ideals. False education can blight and curse an individual, a home, church, or a nation. Germany had an abundance of Godless education. We are in danger in this country of the same Godless education. The worldwide upheaval of the masses in all nations claiming they seek democracy threatens the very existence of mankind.

Multiplied millions do not know what true democracy is and they make groups who are easily misled by false and dangerous ideas of social, economic, political, and religious life.

Our holy task is to emphasize and glorify true Christian education which exalts knowledge and wisdom in all our living and joyous service in His name and for His glory. U. has made a rich contribution to the world wide knowledge of our own land and the nations of the world. To read our statepaper, The Florida Baptist Witness is educational.

Our churches are needing and demanding a better educated ministry because of a largely increased number who are not only high school graduates but college graduates as well. Another reason is that every year sees more of our churches having services every Sunday in the month. To meet this demand The Florida Baptist Institute at Lakeland is meeting with great success in giving foundation work to those who did not get high school diplomas. This school aids the student to go on with his work as fast as he can do the work well without being held back by a class.

Florida Baptists have every reason to rejoice over the marked success of our own Stetson University with over two thousand students and over one hundred ministerial students. Surely we will com-

plete the endowment fund of one million dollars. Let every church place this noble institution in their budget. Our people need to send their children there, pray for this university to be loyal to Baptist faith, Christian living and spiritual leadership in our state.

The illness and resignation of Dr. W. S. Allen as president of Stetson is a sad and heavy blow to us at this time. He has led us in a great way, wise in management, democratic in mingling with the people, charming in personality, dynamic in leadership, lovingly loyal to our Baptist cause. May our Lord restore him to complete health and usefulness.

October 22, 1947.

From the records available, there are 85 unions operating in eighteen of the 21 churches in the Association, or a gain of two unions over the previous year. Interest has been stimulated in training schools and 530 awards were granted, or a gain of 54 awards over the previous year. Sincere appreciation is extended to DeLaney Street Baptist Church and Winter Garden First Baptist Church for opening their doors to the association meetings.

REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION

New Executive Secretary —

On January 15, 1947, Dr. Thomas J. Watts, executive secretary of the Relief and Annuity Board for the past nineteen years, retired and Dr. Walter R. Alexander, associate executive secretary, was elevated to this important position.

Officers of the Board —

The twenty-ninth annual session of the Board was held in Dallas on March 26, and the following officers were elected: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. W. Marshall Craig, chairman of the executive committee; Mr. George J. Mason, recording secretary; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. R. S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groner, treasurer—investments.

Nineteen hundred forty-six was one of the most prosperous years the Board had ever known. Many new members were enrolled in the several plans through which the Board serves our Southern Baptist constituency. A total of 2,541 new certificates were issued during the past year.

Widow's Supplemental Annuity Plan —

Six other states qualified for participation in the Widow's Supplemental Annuity Plan as of January 1, 1947, bringing the total number of states now participating in this plan to twelve. It is expected that this plan will be operating in all the states and the District of Columbia at an early date.

Relief —

The high cost of living has made it necessary to heed the requests of hundreds of those on the relief roll for increased amounts. Many others should receive raises and will receive them when Southern Baptists make it possible. More than sixteen hundred look to the relief department for their livelihood. Even small amounts received by those who served before there was any Relief and Annuity Board means the difference between dire want and more or less comfort.

The calendar of denominational activities of the Southern Baptist Convention requests an offering from the churches throughout our Southern Baptist Convention during the month of April. We would urge all of our churches to take an offering for the relief department of this Board some time during the year that these old heroes of the cross may not suffer.

REPORT OF WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Women's Missionary Union had for its watchword for the past year "Go ye and make disciples of all nations." World evangelism began when God gave His Son to die for us and these instructions were given as Jesus spoke to His disciples in Galilee after His resurrection.

The W. M. U. of Wekiwa Association has made progress during the year in carrying out the aims for the year. The first of these is individual and united prayer. All societies are urged to magnify prayer by organizing intercessory prayer groups in the local churches and by establishing family altars in the home. Three special weeks of prayer for Home Missions, State Missions and Foreign Missions have been held in practically all the churches to study the needs on the field, to pray for the work and the workers; and to these causes \$4,439.09 was given during the year.

Another aim of the W. M. U. is to study that they may be, "Workmen that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth." During the year 35 Mission Study Classes were held with 327 members completing the books studied, also 19 members were recognized for efficient work and programs in Mission Study with Mrs. W. G. Tolton of Apopka as the honor graduate. Study strengthens us tremendously for our task as laborers with God.

Tithing is the aim that has been stressed this year and I am glad to report that 36 new tithers were gained, making a total of 319 women in Women's Missionary Societies giving their tithes to the Lord. Believing that the tithe is the minimum basis for contributing the W. M. U. has joined wholeheartedly with Southern Baptists in trying to reach the goal of a million tithers this year.

Community Missions is manifesting Christian fellowship through efforts to win lost souls to Christ, to minister to the sick, to visit the jails, and county homes, and help in every way to reach those in need in our community. In Wekiwa Association 331 women engaged in community missions during the year and much good was accomplished.

Missionary education* of our young people is always given first place in Wekiwa Association, because we believe young people today need guidance and help through missionary education more than at any time during the years that the women have been organized the auxiliary to Southern Baptists. There are forty-four auxiliaries in the Association where from the small Sunbeam through the young woman's auxiliary the young people are taught to study and to give to missions. During the year a house party was held for the Y. W. A.'s with a large group studying missions under the leadership of a missionary of the state W. M. U. During the second week in July a six day camp was held at Camp Wewa for the G. A.'s and R. A.'s with Rev. and Mrs. F. L. Hall as camp directors. Miss Pearl Todd, a missionary to China was the inspirational speaker. The State Royal Ambassador Leader was present to direct the boys. Ninety boys and girls attended this camp. Many of these dedicated their lives for Christian service.

We are glad to know that Taft and Ft. Christmas have organized W. M. U.'s during the year.

Four societies reported that they are A-1, these are Apopka, DeLaney Street, North Park and Winter Garden.

During the coming year the sixtieth anniversary of the organization of the W. M. U. will be observed. It is to be a year of praise and thanksgiving, a year in which joy, the past blessings of God, and press on to a greater devotion to His work, realizing that He is the source of our power.

REPORT ON HOSPITALS

There is a personality element in serving suffering humanity, for each patient is more than merely a "case." Each "case" is a person, and the personality ideal in a Christian hospital is that man is a creature of God, the bearer of something precious, something unique and priceless — an immortal soul.

During 1946, 26,852 patients were admitted to our Southern Baptist Hospital at New Orleans. Eight hundred thirty-five persons were given 9,596 days of free service at a cost to the hospital of \$74,655.72. Thirty-eight young women were graduated from the School of Nursing, and fourteen young doctors completed their fifth year in medical education.

The operating income was \$1,609,827.13; gifts were \$7,245.99; rents, etc., \$1,691.57; thus making a gross income for the year \$1,718,764.69. The Hospital paid all operating expenses, including cost of the free work, paid \$51,553.72 on capital expenditures; and closed the year with a substantial surplus.

During the year there have been proposals to the board for new hospitals in San Antonio, Texas, and Jacksonville, Fla., as well as a proposal to take over the Birmingham, Ala., Baptist Hospital and enlarge the institution. In our own state plans for two other Baptist hospitals are in the making. These hospitals are to be located in Plant City and Pensacola.

Our Lord set for us the example of preaching, teaching and healing. We must not do less than proclaim the fullness of His ministry with our cooperation in sympathy, gifts and prayers.

A study of modern advertising gives one a very good picture as to the plane on which the business world believes most Americans to live. To say the least they expect us to live with a booze bottle in our hand. The world makes us aware of our lack of VITAMINS but not our lack of VIRTUE. It makes us conscious of our lack of complexion but not of the condition of our souls. What the outcome will be depends entirely upon the attitude of the Christian forces.

We are conscious that something must be done about the increase in crimes and the lack of unmorals. You read of the crimes committed by boys and girls in their early teens. Yes, the Department of Justice reported that between 1929 and 1944, crimes committed by boys from the age of ten, to eighteen had risen in the following proportions; murder 47 per cent; rape 69 percent; assault 71 per cent; sex-crimes other than rape 61 per cent. For girls of the same age range during the same period, sex-offenses and prostitution had risen 375 per cent; drunkenness 174 per cent. Children are committing 56 per cent of the major crimes of America.

We talk a great deal about the delinquent youth, but we seem to have forgotten this fact, that all of the shortcomings of the youth can be traced directly to the adults. After all it is the adult men and women who open the way for juvenile waywardness. If you doubt that statement, then ask yourself this: Who owns and operates the distilleries of our nation? Who owns and operates the saloons? Who voted it back? Who makes the moving pictures and operates the show houses? Who owns the magazines? Who fills the divorce courts contrary to the teachings of the Bible? It is the adults of America.

Youth imitates their elders, and if we do not give them a better example then we are to blame.

We need men and women who will put God before politics, business and pleasures. Not until, we build the family altar, and live Christ in our homes can we expect the youth to honor and obey God.
