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## CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article II. The Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches affiliated with this Association. Each Church shall be entitled to its Pastor and three messengers, and one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof over 100, provided that no church shall be allowed more than twenty-five messengers.

Article III. The objects of this Association are: Missionary, Educational and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article IV. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually. The terms of office shall begin at close of session. The Moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive terms.

Article V. Other churches of the same faith and order wishing to become affiliated with this association must send messengers and a petition for membership, along with information as to their doctrinal views and practices, to any annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership.

Article VI. There shall be an executive committee composed of: (a) The officers of the Association, (b) all Pastors of Churches cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (c) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (d) Association Training Union Director, (e) Association W. M. U. President, (f) One member from each Church, which shall conduct all business of this Association between the annual meetings.

Article VII. The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect. The executive Committee, however, shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

Article VIII. The doctrinal statement representing in general the Biblical beliefs of the Baptists constituting this Association, as its ground of common faith and practice, shall be the New Hampshire Confession of Faith (or its like).

Article IX. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

## BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are adopted for the government of the Wekiwa Baptist Association:

Article I. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, so far as applicable, shall be followed.

Article II. The fiscal year shall run from October 1—September 30.

Article III. The Moderator of the Association shall appoint at the beginning of each annual meeting a Committee on Committees, whose duty shall be to nominate the following Committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.
2. Committee on Application for Membership and Dismissal, when needed.
3. Committee on Resolutions.
4. Committee on Nominations, whose duty shall be to nominate: (a) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (b) Association Training Union Director, (c) A person to present a written report at next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association, (d) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee, which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.

Article IV. The Clerk shall keep records of proceedings; print and distribute Minutes; keep file of Minutes, which shall be turned over to the successor.

Article V. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except when it feels there is no need for a meeting, at which time written reports from the different officers and committees shall be presented.

The Executive Committee shall appoint the following standing Committees on: Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhoods, and such other Committees as it needs to carry out its work.

The Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee to prepare a budget, including all expenditures of all departments of the work and submit same to the Association for its approval. For the year 1950 it must be presented to the churches and approved.

Article VI. The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.

Article VII. These By-Laws may be altered or amended in the same manner as the Constitution.

## PROCEEDINGS

THURSDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 19, 1950

After the singing of the old familiar hymn, "Blessed Hour of Prayer," and the reading of the Scripture found in the Book of Jude, by Rev. L. A. Music, the eightieth session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association was called to order by the moderator, Rev. G. A. Ratterree at 8:00 P. M.

The clerk moved that the messengers then present and those who would come later should constitute the body to carry on the business of the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

The program was adopted with a few minor changes.

Rev. Henry Mangum moved that the present clerk be elected as the clerk for the coming year. It carried.

Meeting adjourned to meet Friday morning at 10 o'clock.

### FRIDAY MORNING

Rev. G. R. West read Eph. 2:1-10 for our devotion.

Rev. Fayette Hall brought the report on the Florida Baptist Children's Home and Rev. Thad Intzminger spoke to the report.

The report on Christian Education was presented by Dr. Sam P. Martin who introduced the speaker, Rev. James Parrish who brought a fine message on Stetson University.

Rev. D. V. McAllister read the report on Temperance and introduced Fred Barnett who told us of the success of the temperance forces.

The report on Ministerial Relief was read by Rev. V. N. Maggard. In the absence of Mrs. Sanford, president of the W. M. U., the clerk was asked to read her report and that of Mrs. Avent, the Young People's leader.

The moderator called on the host pastor, Rev. H. L. Webb to speak words of welcome to those present, and then Rev. B. D. Locke, the regional missionary, gave the response.

The Committee on Committees gave its report and named the following committees to report at this session.

The committee on time, place and preacher: Rev. LeRoy Curry, Rev. H. L. Webb and W. E. Browning.

The committee on applications for membership: Dr. J. E. Martin, Rev. Elwood Furgenson and Rev. G. E. West.

The committee on resolutions: Rev. Fayette L. Hall, Rev. G. E. Pent and Dr. Sam P. Martin.

The committee on nominations: Rev. C. C. Kiser, Rev. V. N. Maggard, Rev. Robert McAllister, Rev. L. A. Music and Rev. Leo B. Roberts.

Rev. A. E. Milton read Gen. 28:10-22 and Gen. 35:1-7, and carried us to the throne of grace for the worship hour.

Rev. Fayette L. Hall brought us a great message on the subject, "Back To Bethel." It was a message that stirred our hearts to go home and lead our people to repent and return to Bethel.

Meeting adjourned to meet that afternoon at 1 o'clock.

### FRIDAY AFTERNOON

Rev. LeRoy Curry read the 37th Psalm for our devotion and led in prayer.

The report on music was given by Rev. Robert McAllister.

Rev. G. R. West read the report of Rev. V. M. Patterson, who was detained because of a funeral, on the Brotherhood work.

The nominating committee made its report which is found in the directory of the Association.

The committee on time, place and preacher made its report, and upon motion by Dr. Henry Mangum was asked to secure a preacher for a missionary sermon.

Moved by Rev. J. R. Chiles that the address by Brother James Parrish be presented to the Witness for publication.

Rev. Edgar L. Maroon brought the report on the hospitals.

Dr. Henry Mangum read the report on the American Bible Society.

Dr. L. Gambrell was given a few minutes to speak of the fine work that is being done by the F. B. I.

Rev. Robert McAllister led the Association in singing, "All Hail The Power of Jesus' Name."

Then the committee on petitions gave their report. Upon motion by Rev. F. L. Hall the following churches were received into our Association: Forest Park, Fairview Shore and New England Heights. The moderator welcomed them into our fellowship.

W. E. Browning, our fine treasurer gave us the report on the financial standing and then presented the budget for the year of 1950-1951. Both were accepted by the Association.

Rev. Fayette L. Hall was elected as moderator for the next year, Rev. G. R. West was elected as vice-moderator and W. E. Browning was reelected as treasurer for the coming year.

The meeting adjourned to meet Friday evening at 7:45 o'clock.

Meeting opened by singing, "Send The Light," and "Faith of Our Fathers." Rev. Leo B. Roberts read 1 John 5:1-6.

The committee on resolutions made its report.

The moderator, Rev. G. A. Ratterree asked Rev. Fayette L. Hall, the moderator-elect, to come to the platform. After a few fitting remarks he turned the gavel over to Rev. Fayette Hall.

## REPORT: SOCIAL SERVICE AND TEMPERANCE

... "Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." (1 Cor. 10:31)

Using God's word as a mirror for our social life it rings sound denunciation upon gambling, drinking, cursing, obscene literature and whatsoever does not bring glory to the name of the Lord.

By temperance in accordance to the Baptist Covenant we mean total abstinence from strong drink as a beverage. (Prov. 20:1). "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise."

The alcohol problem is more acute today than ever before. Here are some of the current facts:

Approximately 75 per cent of the adult men and 56 per cent of the adult women of America drink alcoholic beverages. This means between 60 or 65 million of the total population drink in some form. Four million of these are Alcoholics.

In 1942 one out of every ten drivers in fatal traffic accidents had been drinking. In 1947 according to the records of the National Safety Council, one out of every four drivers or pedestrians in fatal accidents had been drinking. This is an increase of 81.8 per cent.

Florida leads the South in the per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages and is the only state in the union which has practically doubled its per capita since 1940, according to the report of the United Florida Drugs.

Accepting the above facts as a challenge and listening to the Holy Spirit as our guide, we, the Baptists of Florida, should use every available resource to combat the evils of alcohol in our city, county, state and nation.

The home, the school and the pulpit should constantly bring to the minds of the people the evils of this narcotic drink, and every available ounce of strength should be exerted to vote and zone dry areas under our influence.

## CENTRAL FLORIDA TUBERCULAR SANATORIUM

"I was sick and ye visited me," said Jesus. (Matt. 25:36.) So, work of this kind is well within His will.

The personal contacts counted the past year have been 1,988, most of them brief, of course, with an effort to get around once per month. In cases of special need, more time has been taken and visits more frequently made.



There have been at least a dozen professions of faith, several renewals of love and loyalty, and very many with more time to meditate, pray and read the Bible, have made improvement in spiritual life, we believe.

Six have returned to their homes, indicating their purpose to join our Baptist churches, and at least four others indicate the same purpose when they are permitted to go.

Four who have made profession of faith there, three of them in previous years, have died during the past twelve months.

Quite a number have made good use of a Bible Catechism, put out by our board at Nashville, and a few have gone on to the Course of Bible Study from our Home Mission Board, both of which might be found helpful to shut-ins and others in our homes.

### MUSIC REPORT

Psalms 33:1-3: "Rejoice in the Lord, O ye righteous: for praise is comely for the upright. Praise the Lord with harp; sing unto Him with the psalter and an instrument of ten strings. Sing unto Him a new song; play skillfully with a loud noise." This is one of the many references to music found in God's Word. From the Bible we find out that there is a place for music in the worship of God. We also learn that His Word leads us to know the right kind of music to use in our services. By Church Music we mean the kind of music that is God-honoring, soul-lifting and Christ-centered. Today there is so much of the other kind of music filling the air that we need to re-emphasize the spiritual music.

In our Southern Baptist Convention and the State of Florida this work of music education has progressed marvelously the past year. There are now available to our Churches more Music Training Course Books. Also a great need has been met by the publishing of the "Church Musician." This monthly magazine not only helps the average Church put on special choir numbers, but it also helps in the aid of good congregational singing. In this new publication of our Sunday School Board we find there are sixteen pages devoted to guiding choirs, music classes, choral technique, methods, materials, organ, piano, orchestra, and many other phases of Church music education. And there are sixteen pages of choir music each month, one composition for each Sunday. This fine magazine may be ordered along with all other Sunday School and Training Union literature. This magazine every month should be in the hands of every pastor, music director, organist or pianist, and every choir member. It costs about twenty cents apiece. You pastors should order at least one copy and look it over and then you will want it each month for your church.

In our Baptist Witness we see that our Music-Brotherhood Department has been fostering a music education program in many churches. ### REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD WORK

Our southwide Baptist Brotherhood reports that Brotherhoods are being organized at the rate of almost 2 per day, or approximately 700 per year. There are now close to 4,500 Brotherhoods with 150,000 men enrolled. There has been more of an awakening to the advantages of Brotherhood work than possibly ever before. During the past year the S. B. C. changed the official title and position of the Brotherhood work from a committee to a definite Commission which puts it officially within the family of organizations of Southern Baptist Work.

In our state of Florida there has been a sizable increase both in number of Brotherhood organizations and total membership. Mr. Julian Stenstrom has recently replaced Mr. George Linney and has been given the title of Associate-in-charge-of-Brotherhood Work. Mr. C. A. Holcomb is head of the Music-Brotherhood Department of our state.

Wekiwa Association has at present 9 Brotherhoods, a decrease of 3 over last year. The membership of these Brotherhoods is 342, which is an increase of 90 over last year. They have undertaken everything from buying a coffee urn to sponsoring Laymen's Revivals. Other projects completed this year were: help to the Baptist Hour, Cottage Prayer Meetings, Layman's Day program. Future plans for our Brotherhoods in this Association call for support of: man and boy movement, tithers enlistment visitation, Layman's Revivals, and promotion of the whole church program.

### REPORT OF THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, 1950

The reports, reviewing the work of the Relief and Annuity Board, presented at the annual meeting of the Board in Dallas on March 8th, showed 1949 to be a year of continued progress and enlarged service to our Southern Baptist constituency.

Total income for 1949 was \$1,269,496.13, with total benefits paid, amounting to \$1,375,209.25. Total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1949 were \$17,613,434.86.

The relief department again spent more than it received in 1949. Southern Baptists gave \$225,376.33 for relief of aged ministers and widows of ministers, while the department spent \$242,066.37 in an effort to prevent suffering and want, among our older preachers. We would urge every church in the association to follow the Calendar of Denominational Activities of the Southern Baptist Convention and take a fellowship offering for ministerial relief, preferably at the observance of the Lord's Supper or at such time as for the church.

**REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME****Lakeland, Florida**

Since relocating the Institution we have completed five cottages for children, a dairy barn, a house for the farmer, a laundry, the Gaines Vocational Building, the Administration Building and the Chapel. This completes our building program except for two cottages, one for little boys and one for little girls. We have been granted permission to ask for a special offering this Christmas. The funds received from this offering will be used to erect one of these cottages. We believe the other can be built by income from private sources.

When these two cottages are finished we shall cease building until a definite need arises and funds are available for the maintenance of additional buildings. We think housing for 150 children will, with good case work, meet the needs of our children for some time.

The finances are in good condition. We have received sufficient funds to meet all expenses. We have been remembered in three wills: Mrs. Annie Lively of Lakeland and Mrs. Scholze of Coral Gables made the Institution a beneficiary of their estates. The estate of Mrs. Lively has not been closed. Mrs. Scholze gave \$2,000.00; Mrs. Minnie Norwood of Arcadia \$653.09.

We have cared for 157 children during the year. Intake and discharge have been greatly accelerated in recent years. This is due to more temporary care and the employment of a case worker, who works with individual children and their families. A close contact is kept with the relatives of many of our children and as soon as they are able to resume responsibility for their care they are returned to them.

#### ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

As president of the Woman's Missionary Union of the Wekiwa Association it is my pleasure to report there are twenty-two missionary societies in the Association with 791 members. There are only two churches in the Association who do not have organized missionary societies. The Woman's Missionary Union had for its watchword during 1950, Luke 1:29: "To give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet in the way of peace."

It has been the privilege of this Association to have a definite part in helping to give light to them who sit in darkness in dark Africa, by the mailing of 10,000 surgical dressings and 5,000 rolled bandages, a total of six shipments containing thirty-five boxes weighing 484 pounds. Total postage \$107.64. Shipped to Dr. Bill and Alice Price Gavanta in Eku, Nigeria, West Africa. Many letters of grateful appreciation have been received from these friends. We should not overlook those who sit in darkness all about us. We pray that our light shall so shine before men that they may see our good works and glorify our father which is in heaven, and surely in this atomic age we are in the shadow of death, and how we need that great Light to guide our feet in the way of peace.

It was my pleasure to attend the Leaders' Conference October 4 to 6, 1949, at Calvary Baptist Church, Clearwater. Attending with me were the Mission Study, Stewardship, and Community Mission Chairmen; also the Young People's Leader. This meeting was under the direction of Miss Josephine Jones, state executive secretary of the W. M. U.

The Association was represented at the annual W. M. U. meeting in Winter Haven by six Associational officers.

Community missions is Christ-like living in one's own commun-

ity. The motivation of the service of each individual member should be the gospel, the giving of Christ to the needy souls. We cannot give what we do not have within us. We should give ourselves and not things. We need individually Christ unlimited in preparation for our great program of Community Missions, then assigned and planned work will be bright like diamonds we are eager to have. Christ said, "Ye shall be my witnesses. Ye are my friends if ye do whatsoever I command."

Sixteen missionary societies, many of their members participating, have held services in jails, visited the county homes and TB Sanitarium.

One new society has been organized this year, in Oakland.

Fifty miso nstudy classes have been held this year with 512 completing the book. To attain the standard of excellence we must have two Mission Study classes with two-thirds of the membership reading a missionary book. Mission study continues to grow as the years come and go with one goal only in view. It helps Christians through the gift of money, prayer, and self to obey the commands of Christ, who said, "The field is the world, Go ye into all the world."

"Every Baptist a tither," is the slogan which challenges to a hundred per cent attainment in the stewardship of the tithes. Christian Stewardship rightly understood and faithfully practiced can solve many problems in the individual life, in the local church and in the world. 382 women are reported as tithers.

The number of subscriptions to our missionary magazines continues to increase. We now have 940 subscriptions to the following magazines: Royal Service, The Commission, Southern Baptist Home Mission, and The Florida Baptist Witness.

Our objective is to train our young people in Missionary Education; to accomplish this we are striving to build a camp, on the site given by Mr. W. K. Price, Jr., where the young people can go to study, pray and enjoy themselves.

During this year we have given \$106.45 to the Children's Home, also many coupons have been sent to them. We have remembered the Key West Mission by giving \$190.94 to their needs. Some clothing and food have been sent to war-torn countries this year, but that program has been discontinued. \$2,327.47 has been given to cooperative program by the Wekiwa Association W. M. U.

At each quarterly meeting outstanding speakers have brought inspirational messages. Miss Josephine Jones told us of the W. M. U. work at the January meeting. We were also privileged to have Mrs. W. P. Reeves, State W. M. U. President of Alabama, with us. She brought an interesting message of her work. Rev. and Mrs. Brothers told us of their work in Africa at the April meeting in Kissimmee. Miss Helen McCullough was present at the young people's rally in July, at the North Park Church, telling of her experience in China.

We thank God for the Woman's Missionary Union, and all they have accomplished. Dr. Canning, a missionary on furlough from Nigeria says, "The Woman's Missionary Union has done more for missions in Africa than any other organization." May we truly be "Laborers together with God."

Our watchword for the coming year is, "Ye shall be My witnesses." Acts 1:8.

#### REPORT OF THE YOUNG PEOPLES' LEADER OF THE W. M. U. OF WEKIWA ASSOCIATION FOR 1949-1950

As the year has been completed we see a deeper interest among our young people in auxiliary work. The drawback this year has been in neglect of parents and counsellors. Again I say it is import-



ant that parents back counselors up by praying for them and by being interested in the progress their child is making in auxiliary work as they are in music, scouts, athletics and their other interests.

During the year we had forty-four auxiliaries to report with a total membership of 565. Our tithers have increased from 77 to 117. We have had 55 mission study classes. Twenty Auxiliaries have observed state, home and foreign missions, weeks of prayer. There are 153 subscriptions to the auxiliary magazines. Twenty-two auxiliaries reported doing community missions and using the stewardship plans outlined by our state. Thirty auxiliaries reported a total of 337 giving to the Cooperative Program; 24 meeting the requirement of two-thirds membership giving, 24 auxiliaries reported members working on forward steps or ranking system, total of 179, with five queens and two ambassadors. Forty-five Sunbeam babies were reported. Only four auxiliaries have reported A-1. We have 21 W. M. S. organizations, 16 have had auxiliaries at least part of the year. Contacts in an effort to organize have been in all but one of these societies.

During the year I attended the Clinic meeting in Clearwater and the W. M. U. convention in Winter Haven.

The focus weeks for each auxiliary were observed by the association. Those auxiliaries not taking advantage of these associational get-togethers are missing much in strengthening their auxiliary interests.

At the young peoples rally in July at North Park we were privileged to have Miss McCullough as our missionary speaker, who told us not only of our work in China but also in Japan and Hawaii. In the afternoon we had our coronation service in which we had Anne Arnold, queen, three pages, five princesses, four ladies-in-waiting and fourteen maidens to participate.

The camp was well attended and good work was done by Rev. and Mrs. Fayette Hall and their staff of workers.

Eleven of our present counselors have had or are taking the leadership course.

With this report I close three years of service as your Young People's leader. They have been happy, busy years for me and I hope they will prove more and more profitable to the Association as we go forward.
