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CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article II. The Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches affiliated with this Association. Each Church shall be entitled to its Pastor and three messengers, and one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof over 100, provided that no church shall be allowed more than twenty-five messengers.

Article III. The objects of this Association are: Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article IV. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually. The terms of office shall begin at close of session. The Moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive terms.

Article V. Other churches of the same faith and order wishing to become affiliated with this association must send messengers and a petition for membership, along with information as to their doctrinal views and practices, to any annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership.

Article VI. There shall be an Executive committee composed of: (a) The officers of the Association, (b) all Pastors of Churches cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (c) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (d) Association Training Union Director, (e) Association W. M. U. President, (f) One member from each Church; which shall conduct all business of this Association between the annual meetings.

Article VII. The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect. The Executive Committee, however, shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

Article VIII. The doctrinal statement representing in general the Biblical beliefs of the Baptists constituting this Association, as its ground of common faith and practice, shall be the New Hampshire Confession of Faith (or its like).

Article IX. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are adopted for the government of the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article I. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, so far as applicable shall be followed.

Article II. The fiscal year shall run from October 1—September 30.

Article III. The Moderator of the Association shall appoint at the beginning of each annual meeting a Committee on Committees, whose duty shall be to nominate the following Committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.
2. Committee on Application for Membership and Dismissal, when needed.
3. Committee on Resolutions.
4. Committee on Nominations, whose duty shall be to nominate: (a) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (b) Association Training Union Director, (c) A person to present a written report at next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association, (d) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee, which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.

Article IV. The Clerk shall keep records of proceedings, print and distribute Minutes; keep file of Minutes, which shall be turned over to the successor.

Article V. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except when it feels there is no need for a meeting, at which time written reports from the different officers and committees shall be presented.

The Executive Committee shall appoint the following standing Committees on: Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhoods, and such other Committees as it needs to carry out its work.

The Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee to prepare a budget, including all expenditures of all departments of the work and submit same to the Association for its approval. For the year 1951 it must be presented to the churches and approved.

Article VI. The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.

Article VII. These By-Laws may be altered or amended in the same manner as the Constitution.

THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE WEKIWA ASSOCIATION

The eighty-first session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator Rev. Fayette L. Hall at ten o'clock Thursday morning at the First Baptist Church of Winter Park. Rev. Sible led the congregation in singing, "The Morning Light Is Breaking."

Rev. L. A. Music of the Lucerne Baptist Church read Titus 2nd chapter and spoke for a few minutes on the responsibility of Baptists to be true to the Bible.

The clerk moved that the messengers then present and those who would come later should constitute the body to carry on the business of the Association.

The program was revised so as to give place for a special item to be placed before the Association by Dr. Sam P. Martin at 2:20 P. M. The program was adopted with this revision.

The Moderator, Rev. Fayette L. Hall then introduced the new ministers to the Association. The new ministers were: Dr. H. P. Amos of Kissimmee, L. Wegner of Forrest Park, Rev. H. O. Reynolds of Zellwood, Rev. Sible of Winter Park, Rev. Hollis Young of Winter Park, and Rev. DeSha of Fairview Shores.

Rev. Albert A. Stulck, the present clerk, was elected to serve for the next year.

The following committees were appointed by the moderator to report at this session of the Association:

Time, place and preacher—Rev. H. L. Webb, Dr. Amos and Rev. G. L. Brown.

Resolution—Dr. J. E. Martin and Rev. V. N. Maggard.

Nominations—Rev. V. N. Patterson, J. S. Bookhart and Rev. LeRoy Curry.

The Moderator then gave the report of the Executive Committee. Dr. H. P. Amos read the report on the Cooperative Program and then introduced Rev. M. G. Mines, the city missionary of Tampa who spoke to the report.

Rev. C. C. Kiser read the report on Christian Education and introduced Dr. J. Ollie Edmunds, president of Stetson University, who brought us a fine account of his stewardship as president of the fine institution.

Rev. Sible led the congregation in singing, "Standing On The Promises," and then sang a solo, after which Rev. G. R. West of the Plymouth Baptist Church read Joshua 13:1-7, and 14:6-15. Then Rev. V. M. Patterson of Apopka preached the Annual Sermon. His subject was, "Possessing Our Possessions."

Meeting adjourned to meet in the afternoon at 1:30.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, OCT. 18, 1951

Rev. Sible led us in singing "Send The Light."

Rev. Lawrence Wegner of Forrest Park read John 4:30-38.

Mrs. Sanford the president of the W. M. U. read the report of the women's work for Mrs. Smith who was not able to be present.

Dr. Henry Mangum, the host pastor, then brought us the report of Baptist Literature and introduced Rev. Earl Tharp of Tampa who spoke of the Florida Baptist Witness and urged all members of the churches to secure this fine paper and read it for the information of our work.

Dr. Sam P. Martin brought the special item that was to come before the body at this time. He spoke of the inroad being made in our churches by the non-denominational and interdenominational groups which were causing our people to forget their own work for that which we have no jurisdiction over. He then read a statement by a Plymouth Brother who praised the Baptists for their loyalty to the Word of God. After much discussion it was moved that a special committee be named

to study our beliefs and write a tract setting forth our beliefs and practices. This was adopted by a standing vote. All voted for this to be done.

Rev. J. S. Bookhart then moved that all those who were not pastors stand to show the pastors that they were ready to go with their pastor in teaching our people the Word of God, and loyalty to the Church.

The time had arrived for the reception of new churches into the Association. Rev. Albert A. Stulck made the report for the committee named to study the applications. The report of the committee will appear under the reports.

The report on the Florida Baptist Children's Home was read by Rev. G. R. West of Plymouth. He introduced Rev. Robert T. Liner of Avon Park who spoke to the report.

Rev. LeRoy Curry read the report on the Baptist Bible Institute and introduced Rev. Gambrel who told us of the work that was being done at this School.

Meeting adjourned to meet at 7:30 P. M.

Rev. J. S. Bookhart led in the closing prayer.

THURSDAY EVENING, OCT. 18, 1951

The evening session began at 7:30 by singing, "Rise Up, Oh Men of God," and "Glory To His Name." Rev. George L. Brown read I Kings 18:42f.

The Brotherhood Report was read by Mr. Ford Hausman, the Associational Brotherhood President.

The moderator introduced Judge Douglas Stenstrom of Sanford who brought to us a fine message on our duty as Christian men.

The meeting closed to meet Friday morning at 10. Rev. B. D. Locke led us in the closing prayer.

FRIDAY MORNING, OCT. 19, 1951

The morning session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association opened with Rev. L. A. Music leading in singing, "Must I Go and Empty Handed Meet My Saviour." For the devotional Rev. Fay DeSha read Matt. 26:17-25.

Mr. Philip Earnest read the Sunday School report, which showed that the Wekiwa Association was 100% in training and ranked high in the number of training awards received this year.

Rev. M. E. Taylor read the report on the Relief and Annuity Board for Dr. Sam P. Martin who could not be present Friday.

The Rev. V. N. Maggard read the report on Social Service and Temperance, and introduced Mr. Fred Barnette who spoke to the report.

Mr. Earnest Connell read the report of the Training Union and introduced Dr. J. E. Martin who brought a message on the importance of the Training Union.

Rev. Leo B. Roberts, pastor of the DeLaney Street Baptist Church, brought the Association a message on World Missions. He made a strong appeal that we follow our Master in this great work.

Meeting adjourned to meet in the afternoon at 1:30.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, OCT. 19, 1951

Rev. G. R. West led the congregation in singing, "Blessed Assurance."

Rev. H. L. Webb read John 17 for the devotional.

Rev. Edgar Maroon read the report on The American Bible Society. Mr. W. E. Browning, the Associational Treasurer, gave the annual financial report and presented the proposed budget for the next year, which was adopted.

Rev. B. D. Locke was presented to the Association as our Regional Missionary. He brought us a report of the work he is doing.

Rev. J. R. Chiles, the Chaplain to the T.B. Sanatorium brought a report of the work he is doing at the Sanatorium. He is doing a fine job, and upon a motion made by Rev. Miles Patterson, the messengers stood to their feet in appreciation of the fine work Brother Chiles is doing.

Rev. V. N. Patterson gave the report of the nominating committee. Rev. H. L. Webb gave the report of the committee on time, place and preacher.

Rev. V. N. Maggard read the report of the resolution committee. Rev. LeRoy Curry moved that Rev. Bookhart and Dr. J. E. Martin be named on a committee to present plans for a fifth Sunday afternoon meeting.

Rev. Robert McAllister moved that a committee be appointed to study plans for a Saturday night meeting for our Young People, to study plans to meet the needs of our Young People on Saturday nights. This motion carried.

Dr. H. P. Amos presented two resolutions. One for the Christian Home, and one on the coordinating our work. These carried and will appear under reports.

The following officers were elected. Moderator, Rev. Fayette L. Hall. Vice Moderator, Rev. G. R. West. Treasurer, Mr. W. E. Browning. For Sunday School Superintendent, Mr. Philip Earnest. Training Union Director, Mr. Earnest Connell. For Brotherhood President, Mr. Ford Hausman. For W. M. U. President, Mrs. Sanford.

Rev. W. R. Clarke read the list of those of our number who had been called home to be with their Saviour. He then led in prayer for those whose loved ones had departed this life.

The meeting adjourned to meet with the Lucerne Baptist Church, Oct. 16-17, 1952.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Missionary advance must continue!—The American Bible Society, working with Southern Baptist mission agencies in their Advance Program for worldwide missions, joins in reporting that advance has begun.

The Society also joins in urging that this missionary advance must continue and increase. Experience on mission fields around the world shows that

In every missionary advance, the Bible goes forward first.

The Bible is a "must" in mission work

If the people of the world are to know Christ, they must have the Bible. It is the one primary source of knowledge of Him. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keep on working in a man's heart.

Every man must have the Bible in his own native tongue if the Word of God is to speak to his heart. Someone must translate it into his language, publish it and send it to him, wherever he may live.

In most countries of the world, the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures. Someone must help those who can pay only a part of the cost and the many who cannot pay at all.

The American Bible Society, a missionary non-profit organization, supported by gifts, serves as that "Someone." It aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment, and distributes them, without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world.

During 1950 the American Bible Society

—distributed through its own work, at home and abroad, more than 11 million volumes of Scriptures. Another 3 million volumes were produced through gifts of materials and money to Bible Societies of other countries, especially Germany and Japan, bringing the grand total to more than 14 million volumes for the year;

—supplied Testaments in 9 different languages for United Nations forces in Korea;

—started printing 2 million service Testaments for our own expanding armed forces;

—in Japan, distributed 3 million volumes, which was the goal for 1950, making the total distribution in Japan since World War II, more than 6 million volumes.

1951 Opportunities Call For Even Greater Advance in Scripture Distribution

Japan is the major challenge for greater Advance. It is not just an "open door"; "the whole side of the house has fallen out" and we are free to walk right in. Other fields also present needs which, though not so dramatic, are just as real.

In 1950, Southern Baptist churches gave \$78,643 to the American Bible Society; gifts from churches of all denominations amounted to \$646,756. In view of Southern Baptists' strength and readiness to respond to missionary needs, it is expected that Southern Baptist churches will soon be giving to the American Bible Society at least \$150,000 each year. REPORT OF THE BROTHERHOOD WORK

Last year was a big year for the Baptist Brotherhood. Big in every phase of the work. Gains of a substantial nature were recorded all along the line—in new Brotherhoods organized, in increased enrollment in Brotherhoods, in definite Christian activities among the men, in enlarged promotion of all Church activities and denominational work.

The number of Brotherhoods in the South has now passed the five thousand mark. At the close of the year, December 31, 1950, 5,076 Churches reported functioning Brotherhoods. This is a twenty-five per cent increase over 1949. These Brotherhoods are found in all types of Churches.

The past year has brought some forward steps in the Brotherhood in Florida. Bro. G. A. Ratterree, a great leader of men, was chosen to lead the Brotherhood movement in our State. The Brotherhood has been given full Departmental Status in our State Convention Program. Already new Brotherhoods all over the State are coming into being as the result of Bro. Ratterree's energetic and untiring work.

We are pleased to announce that the Wekiwa Association this year organized the Associational Brotherhood with a full corps of officers and with widespread representation from all the Churches of the Association. We have 13 functioning Brotherhoods at present, which is a gain of four over last year. We are not far from our objective of 500 men enlisted in this work. Our major goal for 1952 is a Brotherhood for every Church. In addition we are adopting unanimously the Southwide Baptist Brotherhood objectives for 1952, as follows:

(1) Evangelism, (2) Cooperative Program, (3) Man and Boy Movement. (4) The Baptist Foundation.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Christian Education is the spirit of Christ at work in the realm of intellectual need. If the spirit of our schools is Christian, then the school itself and the product of it will be Christian. Mohammedan schools turn out Mohammedans; pagan schools turn out pagans. Schools under the domination of material philosophy turn out materialists. Schools conducted under the dominating spirit of Jesus Christ turn out men and women of Christian ideals and principles in life. The character of the student reveals the character of the school. Our Baptist colleges and universities are needed now as never before in our history.

A total of more than 61,000 young people were enrolled in the sixty-six Southern Baptist educational institutions in 1950-51. These schools graduated 10,400. There were 7,800 ministerial students en-

rolled in these institutions. The total property value of our vast system of Christian education among Southern Baptists is more than ninety million dollars. Our own Stetson University is worthy of our prayerful and material support.

There are several observations that our Baptist people need to make at this particular time.

(1) Our Baptist colleges are needed for the training of consecrated church members.

(2) Our Baptist schools are the source of supply for denominational workers and leaders.

(3) The money given by our churches to support our Christian institutions of higher education is as definitely devoted to missions as that given toward the salary, equipment and expenses of the missionary who is on the field of service.

(4) While the purpose of our Baptist program of Christian education is not to establish "monasteries" where our young people are kept away from evil enterprises of a worldly nature, we do feel that the supreme function of our Baptist colleges is to provide educational opportunities under the direction, and in the atmosphere of Christian idealism for those who will be the leaders of thought and life in their communities, in the church, in business and in the State.

(5) It is a well known fact that many of our finest young people in our Association are being turned to non-denominational and secular institutions.

(6) The best way to promote Christian education is to place our young people in our denominational institutions, whether those young people are preparing for special Christian work or secular education. Our educational institutions are fountainheads of Christian leadership. They are sources from which must spring those to whom the carrying-in of the glorious work of Southern Baptists will be entrusted in the future. Our best and most dependable leadership among the young people within our churches is found in those students who have been trained in our Baptist institutions.

REPORT ON THE COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

Voluntary cooperation is the principle that holds Baptists together in their missionary and other activities. It was this principle that brought the Cooperative Program into being in the sessions of the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

According to this plan each agency of the Convention receives funds from the churches according to percentages fixed by the Convention after careful study of the need and of expected income. All agencies work for the Cooperative Program and as the churches give through it all of the work prospers. It is the most satisfactory and efficient way ever devised for our churches to work together in carrying out the Great Commission.

A church that desires to have a share in the world-wide mission of Christ has only to send its mission funds to our Baptist State Headquarters in Jacksonville indicating that it is for the Cooperative Program. Every church in Wekiwa Association has done this during the past associational year. Of the 933 churches in the Florida Convention only one failed to share in world missions through the Cooperative Program during that time. Funds contributed through the Cooperative Program by the 932 churches amounted to \$918,368.72.

We Recommend:

1. That the churches increase their giving to world missions through the Cooperative Program as rapidly as they can.
2. That pastors and other leaders seek to keep our people informed about all of our work and the needs.

3. That when missions and new churches are established, the first offering be for world missions and sent in through the Cooperative Program.

The organizations of the Church Agencies have advanced all along the line. We have 100% participation in the Sunday School Association, the Training Union Association, and the WMU Association. The Brotherhood Association was organized within the Associational year with 13 Brotherhoods participating. The goal of the Brotherhood is 100% participation by every Church in the Association. If your Church does not have a Brotherhood, we urge you to organize one.

Financially our Association is free of debt, and all Churches are participating in the Budget.

God has truly blessed us. Let us go forward humbly and pray for greater achievements next year in evangelism, missions and education.

REPORT ON THE FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME, LAKELAND, FLORIDA

The Memorial Chapel at the Home was finished January 15 of this year. Those who have seen it express themselves very favorably as to its general appearance and furnishings. It is considered the most beautiful building on the campus. It was erected in memory of the boys from the Home who gave their lives in the service of our country during World War II. It serves as a congregational meeting place for the children and workers in the Home. Chapel is held each Wednesday evening, and at other times for special occasions. They do not hold church services at the Institution. The children attend the First Baptist Church and the Southside Baptist Church in Lakeland.

The cottage for junior boys has been finished and twenty children have been added to the enrollment which is now 130. This does not include those who are receiving Mother's Aid. There are 26 children who receive help from the Institution and remain in their homes. The enrollment on the campus and those receiving Mother's Aid make a grand total of 156 who are receiving assistance now. Last year we cared for a total of 169 children—148 on the campus and 21 on Mother's Aid.

A wing has been added to the Gaines Vocational Building. It

provides facilities for six boys. The major part of the cost of this addition was provided from funds left over from the construction and furnishings of the main building. If the need arises for a cottage for older boys another building of similar design can be easily added, which would give them the cottage and cut the cost to a minimum.

The farm and dairy are utilized in the operations of the Home. The dairy supplies the milk for the entire campus. A program of dairy and beef production is carefully followed which will give them all the milk they will use and much of the beef. They have 78 cows and calves in the herd. There are 130 acres in pasture, 40 of which are improved.

The Home has been given permission to ask for a special offering at Thanksgiving. The offering will be taken Sunday, November 25. The income from this source will be used to build a cottage for small children and for the operating expenses of the Home. They are asking for one day's pay from everyone who will help.

The need for the cottage is shown by the fact that they have 32 applications pending for admission. These children need help and, because they believe in Florida Baptists, they have turned to us. We must not send them away. We must not forget that Jesus blessed little children and that He said, "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these My brethren, ye have done it unto Me." We can provide a cottage for these children on November 25, furnish it, and admit every child to the Home it will accommodate if we will give ONE DAY'S PAY to the Institution. Let us here and now dedicate ourselves anew to service in the Kingdom of God and help those who have appealed to us and are in distress.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD

The ministry has ample work to do without worrying about the ghost of old age. Since we are living in an age that is full of uncertainties, it is wise for ministers to prepare for this period during their active span of life. To help provide for our ministers and their widows in old age or disability, the Relief and Annuity Board has a message for the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention.

The officers of the Board retained: Dr. Wallace Bassett, president; Dr. Walter R. Alexander, executive secretary; Dr. Robert S. Jones, associate secretary; Mr. Orville Groer, treasurer-investments. Total incomes for 1951 was \$4,824,268.72, with total benefits paid, amounting to \$1,413,885.82. Total assets of the Board as of December 31, 1951 were \$20,518,200.12.

The department spent \$14,397.11 more for relief in 1950 than Southern Baptists gave for that purpose. It is obvious this can't continue. For this reason all of our churches are urged to take a FELLOWSHIP OFFERING for ministerial relief that the needs of our old preachers and widows of preachers may be met.

The relief department spent more for the third consecutive year than was received. The outstanding contributing factors that caused this are: (1) the sharp increase in the cost of living has caused many to appeal for help from the department although they are receiving retirement compensation, (2) many of those on the relief rolls have found the small amounts received inadequate to care for their bare needs, (3) the large number of ministers who failed to join the Ministers Retirement Plan find themselves, at retirement, with no source of income, and because of this neglect, are forced to request that their names be placed on the relief roll.

A problem of great magnitude is before the Southern Baptists. A large number of our ministers have failed to join the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan. Since

these plans function similar to many retirement plans now operating in our country, we are familiar with the working of them. These plans provide retirement compensation only for those who participate in them.

Since a large number of ministers have not participated in the annuity plan, many of them are requesting that their names be placed on the relief roll. This is a greater load than this department can support.

The following statistical table shows the number without protection which the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan offers.

Therefore, we recommend three things:

(1) That, all active ministers join the Ministers Retirement Plan and Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan as a direct effort to help our denomination.

(2) That, each church take a FELLOWSHIP OFFERING in June or such time as convenient to be used for ministerial relief only.

(3) That, the churches observe this FELLOWSHIP OFFERING as this is the only way to increase the relief funds received through the cooperative program. The relief department receives four and two-thirds cents out of each cooperative program dollar, but the advancing cost of living makes this insufficient to meet the needs of our old preachers and widows of preachers.

SEMINARIES

SOUTHERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY this past year saw for the first time in its history the enrollment reach 1,008 men. Students from the School of Music and the WMU Training School increased to more than 1200 the number attending the Seminary's classes.

Early in the year the Seminary suffered the loss by death of one of its most noted scholars, Dr. William Hersey Davis, and of its beloved president, Dr. Ellis A. Fuller.

Alumni Memorial Chapel, beautiful and loving gift of Seminary Alumni to their Alma Mater, proved a great asset during its first year of occupancy. The old assembly room and adjoining offices are used for library purposes.

Southern Seminary is grateful to Southern Baptists, who, through the Cooperative Program and under the leadership of God, are the dependence for the ongoing of the institution.

SOUTHWESTERN BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY reached a gross enrollment of 2,315, the highest in the history of the institution. 249 were graduated at the commencement May 4, and 366 were sent out during the year into the various fields of service calling for trained and consecrated leadership.

The spirit of missions continues to move with great power through the life of the Seminary. 58 have been appointed for mission service this year: 41 foreign missionaries and 17 home missionaries. To

date 422 missionaries have gone from the Seminary to foreign fields, while 298 have gone to home fields. The number of volunteers for mission service in the current student body has reached 416, which is one-fourth of the enrollment.

NEW ORLEANS BAPTIST THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY student body has almost doubled in five years. There were 667 students enrolled during the 1950-51 session, coming from 27 states and 7 foreign territories.

The 75 acre Gentilly campus was bought in 1947. Four new student apartment buildings were occupied September 1, 1949, and a fifth one on December 21, 1950. The new library building was occupied September 1, 1951. Plans are made for building a new dormitory for women and an administration building to be completed by September 1, 1952.

There is no debt. There is little endowment. The Seminary charges no tuition to students. Therefore, an endowment of two million dollars or more should be built up as rapidly as possible. The building program is being financed through the "capital needs program" of the Cooperative Program.

The loyal support of the Cooperative Program through our churches will help to insure the ongoing of the excellent work being done through all our Seminaries.

and employment agency of the church has been duly emphasized at every opportunity during the year.

For the first time in our associational history a simultaneous enlargement campaign promoted by the Sunday School Association and participated in by all of the churches was conducted in the first months of the year. This was a most successful endeavor and much commendation is due those who took part. Especially do we wish to express appreciation to the associational moderator, Rev. F. L. Hall for his interest and support of this campaign. After the results were all in, the combined census figures of all the churches clearly revealed many hundreds of unreached prospects. Surely campaigns of this kind can only bring outstanding results. Again may we express great appreciation to those of you who participated in this great endeavor, for your untiring efforts and wonderful cooperation.

We have maintained during the year outstanding departmental leadership and in every field of the Sunday School work there has been progress. Our departmental leaders have been most faithful to their task and cooperative in their attitudes. Surely much of the progress of this organization is attributable to their great efforts.

Our Sunday School Training Program has again this year maintained its high place amongst the high associations in the State of Florida. This is the third consecutive year that every church in the Wekiwa Association has participated in Sunday School Training. There were 1841 awards in Sunday School Training issued during the year. Mr. Frank A. Taylor, who has served so well as Training Superintendent during these splendid years of accomplishments will not be with us in this capacity next year. The Sunday School Standard of Excellence has been promoted constantly during the year, and we are happy to report that after having met the requirements prescribed by the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention the Wekiwa Association became the second Standard Sunday School Association in the state of Florida for the year 1950-51. An achievement of which we are justly proud.

This is the second time in three years your Association has distinguished itself by achieving this high honor. There were eight Standard Sunday Schools in this Association, thus making Wekiwa amongst the highest if not the highest in actual number of Standard Sunday Schools in the state of Florida. Those churches receiving this high award were: First Baptist Church, Kissimmee; DeLaney Street Baptist Church; Forest Park Baptist Church; First Baptist Church, Winter Park; Plymouth Baptist Church; Pine Castle Baptist Church; First Baptist Church, Apopka; and Miller Memorial Baptist Church. May we extend our heartiest congratulations to these churches on their splendid accomplishments.

The Vacation Bible School work has again enjoyed a most successful year. Mrs. Lloyd King, our very capable and willing associate leader, led our annual Vacation Bible School Clinic. This was a most successful affair and proved to be most beneficial to our churches in their Vacation Bible School work. There were 200 in attendance for this meeting. Year by year we see this phase of our program continue to grow and how thankful we are for it. Surely we want to extend our appreciation to all who have had a part in making this phase of our work so effective.

May we in closing this report extend to every departmental worker from the Cradle Roll to the Extension, to all of our group superintendents, to our associate Sunday School leaders, and to all of you who have worked so tirelessly to again make this a great year of accomplishments for the Sunday School Association, our very sincere appreciation. May God bless you all.

THE CENTRAL FLORIDA STATE TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL

Contacts also have been made on behalf of patients with pastors back at home, and with friends at other places by mail or telephone and in one case by personal visitation.

Some pastors have met me there, and made some visitations with me. This was appreciated. "I was sick and ye visited me" (Matt. 25:36) said Jesus. In a very real sense you have done that through your representative.

ANNUAL REPORT OF THE WOMEN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Women's Missionary Union had for its watchword during 1951, "Ye shall be My witnesses."

As President of Wekiwa W. M. U. I wish to report that we have 22 churches with a W. M. S. in 19. We have 3 Missions with a W. M. S. in 3. The number of subscriptions to our missionary magazines is 688. We have had 38 Mission Study Classes this year, with 580 women reading at least one missionary book. The more mission books we read, the more we learn of our fellow men who need our help and our prayers.

Community Missions is something in which we should all take part. This year we had 588 women taking an active part in Community Missions.

Women's Missionary Union stresses Stewardship. Lives are blighted by darkness. In this office there is a great challenge to let your light shine.

We have 311 reported as tithers.

During this year our different Societies have given to the Children's Home. Also large numbers of coupons which the Home is using for different things that they need.

We are proud indeed that we have had a part in the White Cross work that has been such a help to our friends Dr. and Mrs. Gavanta. Mrs. Newell reports that she has shipped a total of 34 boxes. Freight to New Orleans 1100 pounds. Most of these shipments were paid for by Sunday School classes. Orlando First W. M. S. and balance by Wekiwa Association. A total of 12,666 other supplies were shipped such as bandages, medicines and hospital gowns, sheets and pillow cases, and many other useful articles. There was a total of 253 ladies working the third Mondays October through July.

1951 Camp was one of the most successful in the 13 years that Wekiwa Association has had camp. 104 young people, 47 boys and 57 girls. Reverend and Mrs. Kiser were Pastor and Director. Counselors and Teachers for boys were Miles Patterson, C. C. Kiser, Robert McAllister, J. H. Avent and Joe Slade.

Counselors and Teachers for girls were Mrs. Wise, Mrs. J. H. Avent, Mrs. T. A. Dillard and Mrs. C. C. Kiser. Serving in other capacities were Misses Barbara Jean Morgan, Barbara Borling, Joyce Carmichael, Frances Denson, Mrs. Dozier, Mrs. Walling, Mrs. Asher. There were eight conversions and 15 consecrated lives to definite Christian work. Forward steps.

Work goes forward slowly on our camp at Rock Springs. It has been surveyed and a well has been dug; also blocks have been bought for the main building. Mr. Kelsey has agreed to build the camp and Mr. J. W. Smith will put on the roof, with members of the different churches helping. The W. M. U. is asking the churches to take one special offering during the year for White Cross and one for the camp. We would like to have this camp finished in time for our 1952 camp.

Rev. Roberts, Miles Patterson and Fayette Hall have served on a camp committee this year and have been very helpful.

At our January meeting we had as our guest speaker Miss Bertha Wallace from our Home Mission Board. Also Mrs. Adams and Mrs. Ayers who were visiting in Orlando at the time. Mrs. Lois Wells our state field worker spoke to us briefly on her work.

In April we had reports from our State Convention held in Panama City given by Mrs. W. J. Garnett, Mrs. J. High and Mrs. T. A. Dillard. It was my privilege to attend this meeting also. I am sure every one who attended received a great blessing and a lot of valuable information. In July we had for our guest speaker Miss Sarah Frances Taylor.

We are grateful for every woman in the Wekiwa W. M. U. for the work that has been accomplished this year. How joyful it makes us feel when we hear missionaries like Mr. William Hickman say that

we have had a part in the work that is being done in our foreign mission fields.
