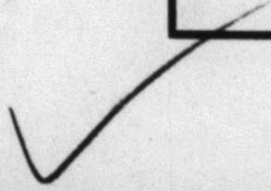

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CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be called the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article II. The Association shall be composed of Messengers from Baptist Churches affiliated with this Association. Each Church shall be entitled to its Pastor and three messengers, and one additional messenger for each 50 members or fraction thereof over 100, provided that no church shall be allowed more than twenty-five messengers.

Article III. The objects of this Association are: Missionary, Educational, and Benevolent, together with a closer fellowship and larger usefulness of all who cooperate with it.

Article IV. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually. The terms of office shall begin at close of session. The Moderator shall not serve more than two consecutive terms.

Article V. Other churches of the same faith and order wishing to become affiliated with this association must send messengers and a petition for membership, along with information as to their doctrinal views and practices, to any annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership.

Article VI. There shall be an executive committee composed of: (a) The officers of the Association, (b) all Pastors of Churches cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (c) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (d) Association Training Union Director, (e) Association W. M. U. President, (f) One member from each Church; which shall conduct all business of this Association between the annual meetings.

Article VII. The Association shall hold its sessions annually at such time and place as the Association may elect. The executive Committee, however, shall be authorized to make such changes in either time or place of meeting as may be found to be expedient.

Article VIII. The doctrinal statement representing in general the Biblical beliefs of the Baptists constituting this Association, as its ground of common faith and practice, shall be the New Hampshire Confession of Faith (or its like).

Article IX. This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting by a two-thirds vote, provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Association meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

In order to carry out the provisions of the Constitution, the following By-Laws are adopted for the government of the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

Article I. Kerfoot's Parliamentary Law, so far as applicable shall be followed.

Article II. The fiscal year shall run from October 1—September 30.

Article III. The Moderator of the Association shall appoint at the beginning of each annual meeting a Committee on Committees, whose duty shall be to nominate the following Committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Committee on Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.

2. Committee on Applications for Membership and Dismissal, when needed.

3. Committee on Resolutions.

4. Committee on Nominations, whose duty shall be to nominate: (a) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (b) Association Training Union Director, (c) A person to present a written report at next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association, (d) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee, which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.

Article IV. The Clerk shall keep records of proceedings, print and distribute Minutes; keep file of Minutes, which shall be turned over to the successor.

Article V. The officers of the Association shall be the officers of the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet monthly, except when it feels there is no need for a meeting, at which time written reports from the different officers and committees shall be presented.

The Executive Committee shall appoint the following standing Committees on: Sunday School, Training Union, Evangelism, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhoods, and such other Committees as it needs to carry out its work.

The Executive Committee shall appoint a Committee to prepare a budget, including all expenditures of all departments of the work and submit same to the Association for its approval. For the year 1952 it must be presented to the churches and approved.

Article VI. The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.

Article VII. These By-Laws may be altered or amended in the same manner as the Constitution.

THE PROCEEDINGS OF THE WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION THURSDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 16, 1952

The eighty-second session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. Fayette L. Hall at ten o'clock on Thursday morning at the Lucerne Park Baptist Church of Orlando, Fla. Rev. Lloyd King led the congregation in singing, "On Jordan's Stormy Banks I Stand." Then Rev. Vernon McAllister led the devotion by reading Psalm 133:1, and commenting on this Scripture.

The clerk, Albert A. Stulek, moved that the messengers present and those who would come in later, would constitute the body to carry on the business of this the eighty-second session of the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

The program was adopted with minor changes.

Dr. Henry Mangum then moved that the present clerk, Albert A. Stulek, be elected as the clerk for the next year. The Moderator asked all those in favor of the motion show their appreciation of the work done by the clerk to stand.

The Moderator, Rev. Fayette L. Hall then presented the report of the Executive Committee of the work done during the year. The report showed that there had been gains in all phases of the work during the year.

Rev. L. A. Music led the congregation in singing "Amazing Grace," and Rev. C. C. Kiser sang a solo, "Satisfied With Jesus."

Then Rev. Ryland Knight read the Scripture, Luke 10:1-9. Dr. H. P. Amos of Kissimmee brought us the Annual Sermon. His subject was "The Urgency of the Gospel." It was a soul stirring message that did us good.

Meeting adjourned to meet at 1:30 P. M.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 16, 1952

The meeting was called to order and Rev. J. E. Curry read Titus 3:1.

The report on Florida Baptist Children's Home was read by Rev. H. L. Webb, after which he yielded his time to Rev. Albert A. Stulek who brought a brief message about the home and its work.

Dr. H. P. Amos moved that we hear Bro. Fred Barnett at this time as he wanted to meet another Association on tomorrow. It was carried and Bro. Barnett brought a message on the success of the Dry forces in some recent elections.

At this time Bro. B. D. Locke, our regional missionary, was heard concerning the proposed changes in the division of the territory of the regional missionaries.

Bro. D. V. McAllister moved that we instruct the Mission Committee to see that the missionary for our district be located in Orlando.

Bro. Miles Patterson read the report on Hospitals by Rev. E. A. Milton who was ill and could not attend the Association. Bro. L. H. Dykes of Plant City brought a report of the progress of the hospital in Plant City.

Mrs. Avent read the Report of the W.M.U. in the absence of Mrs. Paul Stanford who is ill in the Hospital. Then Mrs. Dillard, the Young People's leader, read her report.

It was moved and carried that the Clerk send flowers and a message of sympathy to Mrs. Stanford expressing our regret that she is ill and that we are praying for her speedy recovery.

Rev. Lawrence Wegner read the Report on The American Bible Society.

Rev. J. E. Curry read the report on the Baptist Bible Institute and brought us a message concerning the usefulness of this Institution. Rev. Henry Mangum who is a trustee from our Association, spoke of the fine work that is being done by this school.

THURSDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 16, 1952

The evening session was called to order by Rev. Fayette Hall and Bro. Lawrence Wegner read John 15:1-15 and brought us a brief message.

Mr. Philip Earnest, our Associational Sunday School Superintendent, read the Sunday School report.

Mr. E. J. Connell read the report of the work done by the Associational Training Union, and introduced his pastor, Rev. Leo B. Roberts, who brought the message of the evening. His subject was "The Importance of Training."

The meeting adjourned to meet at ten o'clock Friday morning.

FRIDAY MORNING, OCTOBER 17, 1952

The meeting opened by singing, "Blessed Assurance." Then Rev. V. Miles Patterson read John 1.

Rev. George L. Brown read the report on Social Service and brought a brief message on the need for the Christian to be earnest in his living.

Mr. W. E. Browning, our Associational Treasurer, gave the financial report for the year and then presented to the Association the budget for the coming year, which was adopted.

A motion was offered that the resolution committee draw up suitable resolutions expressing our appreciation for the fine work done by Brethren Browning and Chiles for the fine work done by these two good men of God.

Rev. Henry Mangum gave the report of the Cooperative Program and spoke to his verbal report.

Rev. Albert A. Stulek read a report of the work of World Missions, and Rev. C. C. Kiser brought us a fine sermon on Missions.

A motion was offered and carried that the clerk send Dr. Earl Edington a telegram expressing our regrets that he was not able to be at our Association, and to express sympathy to him and his good wife in this testing time.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, OCTOBER 17, 1952

The meeting called to order by the Vice Moderator, Rev. G. R. West in the absence of the moderator. Bro. L. A. Music led in singing "Amazing Grace." Then Rev. G. L. Brown read I Peter 2:5, and led in prayer.

The following committees made reports:

Rev. C. C. Kiser made report for Nominating Committee.

Rev. H. L. Webb for the Resolution Committee.

Rev. Leo B. Roberts for the Time, Place and Preacher.

The time had arrived for the election of officers. Rev. Leo B. Roberts, the pastor of the DeLaney Street Baptist Church, was elected Moderator for the coming year.

Rev. L. A. Music was elected as Vice Moderator.

Mr. W. E. Browning was elected as treasurer by a standing vote.

Rev. Amos moved that the moderator appoint a committee composed of the heads of the departments to make a calendar of activities for the coming year.

Rev. Robert McAlister read I Thess. 4:13-18 and then read the names of those of our number who had been called home to be with their Lord. Bro. Durrance led in the prayer for the loved ones.

Meeting adjourned until October 15-16 of 1953.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

Sir Walter Scott once said, "Bring me the book!" He was asked, "What Book?" He answered, "There is only ONE book!" Yes, there is only one book!

By which the bark of men could navigate

The sea of life, and gain the coast of bliss

Securely!"

Majestic like the sun:

It gives a light to every age,

It gives but borrows none!"

For 137 years the American Bible Society has been the instrument that God has used for the translation and dissemination of the Bible—God's Holy Word.

If the people of the world are to know Christ as Saviour, they must have the Bible for it testifies of HIM. It is the chief source of knowledge of Him. From beginning to end it points men to the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world. The Bible is the missionary's chief tool. The Bible itself is a missionary. For it can go where the human missionary cannot go, stay when he must leave, and keeps on working as the "Sword of the Spirit" wherever its truth is given an opportunity to enlighten the mind, awaken the conscience, and touch the heart.

The Bible in order to be effective must be translated into the native tongue of all whom we hope to reach with the Gospel. We rejoice to know that some entire book of the Bible has been published and circulated in 1,049 languages and dialects as of January 1, 1952. Fifteen new languages were added to the list in 1951. But in most countries of the world the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures.

But in most countries of the world the income of the people is so low that they cannot afford even the bare cost of the printed Scriptures.

Supported by gifts, the American Bible Society aids in Bible translation, publishes the Scriptures without note or comment and dis-

tributes them without profit and usually below cost, for use in mission work around the world. It also supplies Scriptures for the Blind, in raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

During 1951, the American Bible Society distributed at home and abroad more than 16 million volumes of Scriptures; helped the Japan Bible Society to distribute 3,312,803 Scripture volumes, making a total of approximately 10 million volumes distributed in Japan since V-J Day; in Korea, supplied over 1 million Scripture volumes for civilians, South Koreans and other UN armed forces and North Koreans and Chinese in prisoner-of-war camps; aided the Brazil Bible Society to reach the largest Scripture distribution in the country's history, 1,510,712 volumes. Of these, 168,670 were whole Bibles—almost three times the average of whole Bibles distributed in recent years; provided 941,241 Scripture volumes for our Armed Forces, bringing the number supplied since 1940 to more than 10 million volumes; received from churches and individuals, gifts which make possible the largest budget in its history—and in faith adopted an even greater program for next year.

It gives me a keen sense of gratitude for the part that Southern Baptists have played in the work of the American Bible Society. With gifts from churches of all denominations totaling \$749,085, Southern Baptist gifts stood second, exceeded only by Methodist gifts which amounted to \$120,812. Southern Baptists gave \$90,909, of which \$2,918.63 came from the churches of the Florida Baptist Convention.

Because of Southern Baptists' ability and readiness to respond to missionary needs, the American Bible Society confidently expects that gifts from Southern Baptist churches will soon reach \$150,000 each year.

It was the prophet Amos who said, "Behold, the days come, saith the Lord God, that I will send a famine in the land, not a famine of bread, nor a thirst for water, but of hearing the words of the Lord: And they shall wander from sea to sea, and from the north even to the east, they shall run to and fro to seek the word of the Lord, and shall not find it." (8:11, 12).

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Your Committee on Christian Education makes the following report.

Of all the phases of the work of the churches of our denomination not one concerns the thoughtful leader more than Christian Education. This problem, which confronts us and demands our attention and wide-awake vigilance, has recently taken on a new significance because we come to realize more and more the truth spoken by one of our educators when he said, "What you would have in the life of a people, you must put first in its schools."

Cherishing the principle of Separation of Church and State as we do, we do not expect our tax-supported schools to religiously educate our children. And being aware of the indifference to, and some teaching contrary to our religious concepts in many of these institutions, our responsibility, in this respect, increases in proportion as our constituency increases and as the demand for trained Christian leadership grows year by year.

We are, in a measure, solving this problem with our many church supported Christian Colleges, Universities and Seminaries. But the need is great for a more conscientious support of these institutions by sending our Baptist students to them and contributing more to their financial needs.

The contribution of Christian Education to the life of our denomination is quite evident. The results should be noted and a proper evaluation made. "The Christian College, Seminary and Training School have given to our denomination 806 of the 827 missionaries now serving on the foreign field. More than 70% of our college trained, denominational leaders received their schooling in our denominational colleges." In the years ahead we will make progress in all phases of our denominational work in proportion as we send out trained leadership from our denominational schools.

Our own Baptist school, John B. Stetson University, DeLand, had 1,784 students enrolled in 1951-1952. Of this number 110 were ministerial students, and about 90 others preparing for the mission field and other full-time Christian service. On Stetson's campus there are many religious activities such as the B. S. U., Y. W. A., Vespers, Morning Watch services, which are well attended. Under the leadership of President Edmunds, Christian faculty members, and Christian leadership in the student body the religious atmosphere prevails.

Baptists of Florida are not supporting Stetson as they should. Of the total income of \$1,170,937.03 for 1950-1951 Florida Baptists gave only \$159,217.67. In this same period there was a deficit of \$139,754.45.

Another one of our Baptist schools is the Baptist Bible Institute, Lakeland. This school, not an institution of the Florida Baptist Convention, but Baptist in every sense of the word is doing a marvelous work in educating and training men and women for Kingdom Service who probably would not receive any sort of standard coordinated Christian training if it were not for the B. B. I. at Lakeland. This most worthy institution has received for several years and is to receive this year \$6000.00 of the State Mission Offering.

May the Lord continue to richly bless Stetson, B. B. I., and all our colleges, universities and seminaries, and fire us with a never dying zeal to maintain our institutions of Christian Education, and support them with our prayers, interests, students, and money, praying that they shall ever be true to the principles of Christianity and loyal to the Baptist cause.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

The Wekiwa Association has had a good year of progress. All churches have demonstrated a wonderful willingness to cooperate for the good of the whole and we have witnessed this year the very finest sense of unity and cooperation. God has richly blessed us and we are very grateful.

This past year we have surpassed the previous year's record in the number of baptisms. Last year, with the Simultaneous Revival Campaign, we reported 568 baptisms. This year we are happy to report 704 baptisms, the largest in any single year previous to this time for this association.

This year has also been a good year for missions. The churches have been 100 per cent in their participation in the Cooperative Program with an increase in the amount of the gifts over last year. Let us all continue to move toward the 50-50 plan of giving in our churches.

This past year one new church has been added through our association, the Paradise Heights Baptist Church, which was formerly a mission of the Plymouth Baptist Church.

The organizations of the church agencies have continued to advance all along the line. We have 100 per cent participation in the Sunday School Association, the Training Union Association and the W. M. U. Association. The Brotherhood Association continues to grow with 13 Brotherhoods participating and more in the process of being organized. Let us work together for 100 per cent participation in the Brotherhood Association. If your church does not have a Brotherhood, set it as your goal to organize one this year.

We congratulate the W. M. U. Association which has, with the cooperation of all the churches of the Association, built its long dreamed camp for young people. The camp, which is located on the Rock Springs Run adjacent to Kelly Park, has 40 acres of land, a large dining hall and assembly room and 11 cabins completed. The cabins have been built by the individual churches of the Association. It is hoped that within the next year that all churches which have not built cabins at the camp site will build one. The churches which have already built cabins have the privilege of adding another one to the one they have already built. We consider this the greatest single achievement for the year.

One of the greatest challenges before us for next year will be the establishment of missions. People are flowing into Central Florida in great numbers. We cannot afford to neglect these new and vast areas that are being built up around us. Let us meet this challenge by adding new churches to the new areas that are now being developed.

Financially our Association is free of debt and all the churches are participating in the budget. God has greatly blessed us. The price of progress is problems. Let us go forward with the challenge before us, working through our problems to greater growth than ever in the fields of evangelism, stewardship, missions and education.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Home continues to expand its facilities. We have recently added a cottage for children of pre-school age. This cottage houses both boys and girls and has enabled them to increase the enrollment by 12. The number taken care of in the building has been purposely kept low because of the attention required by a little child. Those who do group work with children have found that a small child gets along

better and develops more rapidly when he is given considerable personal attention. This is the seventh cottage for children and completes the first unit of the new Institution.

The farm and dairy are important in the operation of the Home. They get many of the vegetables used in their dining rooms, from the farm, and all the milk they can use from the dairy. The average milk production for the past four months has been about 260 quarts per day. The calves are kept for future dairy cattle and for beef. There are 96 head in the herd. They expect to produce a large per cent of the meat used on the campus. The Home has an excellent pasture of 130 acres, 40 of which are planted with improved pasture grass.

Applications for admission from October 1, 1951 to September 1, 1952 have exceeded those of any similar period for which there are records. The total number of applicants for the 11 months was 478. This indicates a feeling on the part of many people throughout the state that they can help at the Children's Home, and it also shows a need for better care than the child can receive in his local situation. They admitted 92 children during the year which left 386 applications that were withdrawn, dropped because of a lack of interest on the part of those making them, and for a lack of space in the Institution. They turned away some children who should have been admitted because they did not have the room. Mother's Aid was given in some cases, if there were wholesome family ties, and the child was permitted to stay with his parent.

They admitted 92 and discharged 52 children during the year. The total number under the care of the Institution during the past Associational year was 168.

Your Committee wishes to call to your attention the Special Offering which will be taken for the Home November 23. This is in keeping with the spirit of Thanksgiving and is the time when most of the Children's Homes in the Southern Baptist Convention ask for special gifts. They are not asking for funds for buildings this year. They want us to help feed and clothe our children. We want every church in this Association to give something for the care of the children in the Home. The increase in enrollment, the Mother's Aid Program, and boarding home care will require more funds. If your church cannot make an offering at the suggested time, set a date that will be convenient for you and make it then. It is important to you and to the Home that you have a part in it. If you give to children, you will get a blessing; the child will get a blessing; and your church will be spiritually stimulated.

The Apostle Paul in his charge to the elders of Ephesus said, in Acts 20 and 35, "I have showed you all things, how that so laboring ye ought to support the weak, and to remember the words of the Lord Jesus, how He said, 'It is more blessed to give than to receive.'"

HOSPITAL

We as Southern Baptists can be proud of our Hospital at New Orleans, La. That institution is doing a wonderful work of healing and helping men and women to know Jesus Christ whom to know is life eternal.

A total of 31,764 patients were admitted to the hospital. During the month of September more than 300 babies were born in the hospital. They have a fine staff of workers.

Several years ago the Hospital Board accepted the responsibility of establishing a hospital at Jacksonville, Fla., in cooperation with the Baptists and other interested citizens of that city. A beautiful site

has been purchased and the plans for the first building to be constructed are well under way.

The Jacksonville project has received the approval of the Convention and it is expected that the institution will be completed within the next two years.

RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

Our men of yesterday are our concern of today. This refers to our preachers and pastors who served under financial handicaps of low wages, large families, and poor plans, or no plan, for retirement years; plans that would protect them and their loved ones from embarrassment in the sunset of life. Our generation can and must provide for them now. Our ministers retired and facing retirement deserve all the support that Southern Baptists can render them.

Our Relief and Annuity Board is in its thirty-fifth year and may be given an anniversary recognition in Houston, Texas, at the next Southern Baptist Convention.

In more recent years the Ministers Retirement Plan and the Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan operated by the Board will gradually retire the Relief work of the Board.

Pastors today are privileged to build up a Retirement fund and will not have to depend on relief. Three per cent of their salaries sent in monthly builds up this protection against old age. Even if pastors are within three to five years of the retirement age of sixty-five, they can enter the plan and provide a greater income for their retirement than they would have through relief from the Board.

The Board's total income for 1951 was \$5,144,134.29. At the end of 1951 the total assets was \$23,333,014.10. Ten states received more money paid to their beneficiaries than those states sent to the Board for all causes. Florida is one of the 13 states that sent more to the Board than she received from the Board for her beneficiaries. The Board's combined total receipts from Florida for the year 1951 was \$9,464.10. Payments received from the Board were \$8,087.00, leaving a balance to swell the Board's assets by \$1,326.10.

More each year is being paid out by the Board to pastors and widows of pastors who had no retirement funds built up through the Retirement Plan, than is the income by the Board from all the state for relief work. This means Southern Baptists will have to make offerings for the relief work until those beneficiaries will have cashed in on the Bank of Heaven. Of all undesignated funds to the Cooperative Program, 4 2-3 percent is allocated to the Relief and Annuity Board, not the Retirement Fund. Pastors build their own retirement. At the present there are 1480 people drawing from the Board the major part of their support.

SEMINARIES

Southern Baptists' five theological seminaries report a total enrollment of 4,184 for the 1951-52 session:

Each of our five seminaries reports increased enrollment and the need for additional buildings, faculty, student aid funds and endowment. Student tuition is provided through Cooperative Program funds by Southern Baptists. Cooperative Program money provides for current operational expenses and part of the building programs.

Southern—Louisville, Kentucky

This past year saw Dr. Duke K. McCall inaugurated as seventh president succeeding Dr. Ellis Fuller who died October 29, 1950. The oldest of our seminaries plan the development of a larger program of training for workers outside the pastoral ministry because of the increasing demand for specialized workers. Two new faculty members were added this session in keeping with the policy of the Seminary Trustees of recent years to increase the size of the faculty as rapidly as possible and advisable.

Southwestern—Fort Worth, Texas

Southwestern's School of Religious Education has been accredited by the American Association of Schools of Religious Education. A music library has been added in the School of Sacred Music and a Department of Pastoral Ministry, including personal counseling, has been added to the School of Theology. An increase in the faculty of 38, new dormitories and apartments, and increased income for student expenses are reported as apparent needs at Southwestern by Dr. E. D. Head, President.

New Orleans—New Orleans, Louisiana

Almost every record of past years has been broken during the 1951-52 session at New Orleans. The student body has more than doubled in six years. The 75-acre campus on Gentilly Blvd., purchased in 1947, will be occupied in September 1953. Eighty-seven student apartments and the library buildings have already been opened. Administration, classroom and women's residence buildings will be completed by September, 1952. Music, cafeteria, men's residence and kindergarten buildings will be completed by September, 1953. Dr. Roland Q. Leavelle is President.

Golden Gate—Berkeley, California

Golden Gate Seminary, beginning its third year as a Southern Baptist Convention institution, is situated in the populous West where seven out of ten people belong to no church. Simultaneous with the coming of their new president, Dr. Harold K. Graves on July 1st, was the beginning of an expanding and remodeling program for the Seminary property.

Southeastern—Wake Forest, North Carolina

Southeastern has facilities for only 200 students at present, but has received over 400 applications. This, another of our new seminaries, is located on the campus of Wake Forest College, which is being purchased by Southern Baptists. The Seminary will take over occupancy of other buildings as the campus is vacated by Wake Forest College. Six new faculty members have been added and each is an outstanding and experienced teacher. The third year of the seminary course will be added to the curriculum in 1953. Dr. Sydnor L. Stealy is President of Southeastern.

T. B. HOSPITAL

"And heal the sick that are therein, and say unto them, The kingdom of God is come nigh unto you" (Luke 10:9). The first part of this passage tells what is and the latter what should be not only at the Central Florida State Tuberculosis Hospital in our association but also every sick room and hospital everywhere.

At the hospital mentioned above, during the 12 months ending September 30, 1952, your representative has made personal contacts to the number of 2510. In the individual rooms there may be from one up to as many as six persons. The method usually is to quote some words from the Bible, with may be, a brief explanation or application given.

Christians are encouraged to patiently bear the burden of being laid aside for awhile, and to hope for a spiritual gain to offset any other loss sustained.

To the unsaved an appeal is made to surrender to Christ. When there seems to be sufficient interest aroused the plan of salvation is explained, and its immediate acceptance urged.

Converts are not counted until time is given to verify the reality of it. I think at least 14 can be so counted this year, while several others have renewed their vows for Christian service.

Usually there is a prayer in every room, sometimes led by the

patients themselves, and very often there are audible and hearty amens, when the visitor is leading.

WORLD MISSIONS

The Master gave us a program for World Missions in Acts 1:8. We are to begin at home and then go into the uttermost parts of the world. In this program it is necessary to have a strong base from which to operate. Therefore we need a strong State Mission Program which is instrumental in establishing, nurturing, and enlisting churches from which we can move out into the surrounding pountry. This takes us into the field of Home Missions.

Last year our Home Mission Board had 1,170 missionaries working with all foreign speaking people in the bounds of our Convention. The Board conducted Evangelistic Campaigns in Alaska and Cuba. The Lord greatly blessed the work. Last year the Home Board reported over 36,000 professions of faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. They have 402 Chaplains working with the 355,000 men and women of the Baptist persuasion and reported that over 10,000 accepted the Lord as their Saviour.

The program of World Missions reaches unto the uttermost parts of the world. This work is under the Foreign Mission Board. They now have 832 Missionaries and a budget of \$5,180,000. They are advancing in all parts of the world and the goal is for 1,750 missionaries and a budget of 10,000,000 dollars to carry on this great work. The Lottie Moon offering for 1951 was \$2,668,051. This coming December during the week of prayer Southern Baptist Women will do their best to raise \$3,000,000.

My fellow Christians lift up your eyes and look upon the fields that are ripe unto harvest, and heed the Master's command to go into all of the world. Unless we evangelize the world, Communism will win in the struggle.

BE IT RESOLVED that we express our appreciation to our retiring moderator, Brother Fayette L. Hall, for his two years of untiring service to our association and for his geniality and fair mindedness in presiding and in the discharge of the other duties of the office.

BE IT RESOLVED that we commend Brother W. E. Browning for his efficient and careful handling of the funds committee to his care as treasurer of Wekiwa Association and for his prompt and business like reports.

BE IT RESOLVED that our gratitude be expressed to Brother J. R. Chiles for his enthusiastic and devoted service as chaplain to the TB Sanitorium.

W. M. U. ANNUAL REPORT — SEPTEMBER 30, 1952

As President of the Wekiwa Association Woman's Missionary Union, it is my pleasure to report there are 24 missionary societies in the Association with 844 members. The W. M. U. watchword for 1952 is "Behold the Lamb of God which taketh away the sin of the world." In pronouncing Him the Lamb of God, John revealed Jesus as the final fulfillment of the old dispensation. In a day like this we need to be aware and to behold the presence and the power of the sin-bearer of the world. As we explore the full meaning of this verse we will be called to a more serious study of God's plan for His world. We will be forced to our knees in complete dedication for what He has done for us. We will rise to face our tasks with a sense of stewardship of all of life. We will quickly point our young people to the Lamb of God knowing that through missionary-hearted young people God can and will heal the wounds of nations and bear away the sin of the world. To this end we have built our camp where our young people can be taught the word of God and can dedicate their lives to

Christian service. Eleven cabins have been built by different churches and the main building by the Association at a total cost including land of approximately \$15,000. By the cooperation of every one we have accomplished a great deal, but there is much more to be done.

One new society has been organized this year in Paradise Heights. The message of Christ is needed in every community and every Christian is called to make that message known. Woman's Missionary Union recognizes this call to Christian service and includes community missionaries in its plan of work. Twenty-four Societies have engaged in this work. Telling the message of salvation to the world is the greatest enterprise in which Christian workers are engaged today. We are not born into the kingdom of God possessing all the characteristics we need to be fruitful workers, but we can grow in grace daily and develop through study and purposeful reading into co-laborers God can use to His glory. Woman's Missionary Union has a definite plan for study and reading. 394 members have participated.

Since "Missions wait on Stewardship" the strength of our missionary work tomorrow depends on the stewardship development of our young people today. Woman's Missionary Union plans a year round program of stewardship education. We now have 443 tithers. At each quarterly meeting outstanding speakers have brought inspirational messages. The First Baptist Church of Orlando of this Association was host to the state W. M. U. convention on March 14-16.

Our white cross work has been carried on this year in a marvelous way sending 1088 pounds of hospital supplies to Eku, Nigeria. Total expense for year—\$756.64. Dr. Bill and Mrs. Alice Gaventa who have been in charge of this hospital are now home on furlough. The fact that Dr. and Mrs. Gaventa went from this Association gives us a feeling of nearness to the mission which we so earnestly seek to do.

The fulfillment of the great commission of our Lord can better be accomplished by being "Laborers together with God."

THE YOUNG PEOPLE'S LEADER OF THE WMU OF THE WEKIWA ASSOCIATION FOR 1951-52

There is an old Chinese saying, "If you plant for one year, plant grain; if you plant for ten years, plant trees; if you plant for one hundred years, plant men." It is because we plant for the years and not the year that we choose to invest our lives in working with young people. As this year has drawn to a close we look back to see that we have made a gain of 15 auxiliaries. We have five churches having at least one of each of the auxiliaries. But there still remain three churches who are not reporting as having any. The approximate enrollment of all 68 auxiliaries is 600. Our tithers increased from 119 to 132. There were 79 mission study classes held; 19 auxiliaries observed state, home and foreign mission weeks of prayer.

During the year I attended the leadership conferences in Lakeland in October, and the leadership Camp in Tampa in July, taking seven counselors with me. Attended the Southern Baptist WMU and General Convention and also the State WMU Convention held in Orlando in March. With the help of Sunbeams, Juniors and Intermediates from First Church, Orlando, and Miller Memorial and North Park, we presented a demonstration, "We Will Build a Happy Sunbeam Band" and also a play, "Mother Goose and Her Missionary Family."

At the Young People's Rally in July at Delaney Street we had Miss Lila Watson, Missionary from China as our speaker. In the afternoon we had a recognition service for one Ambassador, two Squires, and two Princesses.

The Camp held on our own camp site was a big highlight of the

year. Rev. and Mrs. Leo B. Roberts were camp Pastor and Director, and served very well with a staff of 14 true pioneers. Mrs. Carlyle Brooks of DeLand was our Missionary for the week. With an enrollment of 83 children, classes were held in the dining hall and on the campus. Classes were held in Mission Study, Doctrine, Forward Steps and Ranking System, and Handcraft. Having spent this week in camp, we came to appreciate all the work that has been done by our churches, and also observed several improvements and additions that we are sure the churches in our association will provide.

We wish to pay tribute to our camp chairman, Mrs. W. J. Gannett who had a vision of the camp and worked so hard to see it come into being. And one other person who deserves such a mention is Mr. Joe Avent who has taken his vacation for several years at a time that he could attend camp. Speaking as one who has attended the first and last camps of this Association, I can truly say that we have come a long way and it is due to the faithful endurance of such leaders as Mr. Avent and others.

To our Pastors, our very splendid Young People's Directors and Counselors and others who have lent their aid, I am indebted.

To God I am deeply grateful.
