2. There is a recommended increase of \$540 per year for Secretarial Help. It is anticipated that a greater work load in the future will mean longer hours for the Office Secretary. The Executive Committee will authorize this adjustment as the need arises.
3. The New Work Fund is Computed at 17% of the total budget.
4. In the event any organization needs more than the budgeted allocation, approval must come on recommendation of Budget and Finance Committee to Executive Committee.
5. It is recommended that each church be asked to support the total work of the Association to the extent of 3% of its regular budget receipts (figured on the same basis as the Cooperative Program percentage). It is further recommended that each church remit early in each month as this will aid in meeting the expenses that occur monthly.

17. Bro. Lane Patrick nominated W. E. Browning, who is in the Winter Park Hospital recovering from a heart attack, to continue to be our Treasurer. Motion made that nominations cease, seconded and so ordered. Our Moderator cast an unanimous ballot for Bro. W. E. Browning as our Treasurer.

18. Bro. Harwood Steele of Riverside made the motion that we elect an Associate Treasurer, seconded and so moved.

19. Bro. H. Fred Williams made the motion that this new officer, Associate Treasurer, be referred to the present Nominating Committee and for them to bring us a nomination as soon as possible, seconded and passed.

20. Bro. Harold C. Epperson, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, presented the name of Randy Reynolds, Minister of Education at Pine Hills, for Associational Sunday School Superintendent. Bro. V. N. Maggard moved that nominations cease. Bro. Hinds cast the unanimous ballot for Bro. Reynolds.

21. Bro. L. A. Lockler of Miller Memorial cited the reports on Retirement Centers, and moved for the adoption of the first report, seconded and so moved. He then introduced Bro. J. W. Oppert of the First Baptist Church of Vero Beach who spoke on this timely subject.

22. Bro. Forrest Thompson and his wife brought a message in song, "The Lord's Prayer."

Maggard, would be glad to take any subscriptions for the Baptist Witness, our Florida Baptist Paper. He moved for the adoption of his report, and had four ladies hold up posters displaying samples of our various Baptist Publications. This motion was seconded and carried. He introduced our speaker, Bro. Richard Whipple of Miami who pointed out the need for our churches to send our Baptist Witness into the homes of our Inactive Church Members.

30. Bro. L. E. McRaem, our Missionary to the Migrants, from Apopka, presented the report on Associational Missions and moved for its adoption. Seconded and adopted. He introduced Bro. James Haskins of Azalea Park, who brought a message on: "Scan the Fields."

31. Bro. Lane A. Patrick of the First Church, Winter Park, gave the Hospital report and moved that it be adopted, seconded and so moved. The speaker, Bro. Edgar Cooper of North Park, was introduced, and spoke on the need for a Baptist Hospital in our area. He used the 9th chapter of Luke and the 5th chapter of John as the basis of his message.

32. Bro. Girod H. Cole, Jr., of College Park brought the report on our Annuity work, stating that he was always ready and willing to help any Pastor or church interested in entering this important program. He moved the approval of this report, seconded and so approved.

33. Bro. Maurice Barnes and Mrs. Edward Kelsey, members of the Joint Committee of our Executive and W.M.U. Committees, gave their report and Bro. Barnes made the motion that our Association accept the W.M.U. organization as a regular department of our Association and have their work included in our associational budget. After some discussion on the part of some of the women, seeing that the motion had already been seconded, it was carried by a unanimous vote.

34. Bro. Bob New, Chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee, gave the proposed budget which includes the work of our W.M.U. He moved for its adoption, seconded and so ordered.

Bro. Allen Higginbotham recognized Bro. J. C. Hockett, Jr. of his church, having formerly been the state Sunday School Secretary of Missouri.

Bro. V. N. Maggard of the newly formed Resolutions Committee, read their report and moved that it be adopted and go into our records. Seconded and so ordered. Bro. Hinds commended the fast work of this new committee.

Bro. L. E. McRae, Migrant Worker, mentioned the fact that he has received many good tracts, and they are available for the use of our association.

76. Bro. Forrest Thompson, presented Bro. and Mrs. Edwin S. Irey, Ministers of Music from the First Baptist, Orlando, who in turn brought a testimony in an instrumental duet-violin and piano.

77. Bro. Allen Higginbotham of New England Heights brought us an inspirational message on Oneness with Christ from the 14th chapter of John and the 17th chapter of John.

78. Bro. Spurgeon N. Hinds asked us to give our whole hearted support to our new Moderator, Bro. Maurice R. Barnes, as well as to the rest of the officers, and presented Bro. Barnes with the gavel. Bro. Barnes expressed his appreciation for this honor showed him by the churches of our association and requested their earnest prayers. He requested the members of our newly admitted churches to come to the front and receive the right hand of Christian and Baptist fellowship after he led us in our benediction.

The last session of the Ninety-first session was adjourned.

REPORTS

THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

We gratefully acknowledge the splendid cooperation and dedicated Christian service rendered the Lord's work through our Association this past year by all of our Associational leadership.

Our Associational Office, with Mrs. A. W. Jordan as Secretary, has done a most commendable job. This office is now providing invaluable service in coordinating our work on the Associational level.

Regular meetings of the Executive Committee were held during the year on Monday mornings after the second Sunday of each month. The business of the Association

has been performed according to the direction of the Association in its last annual meeting and in compliance with our Constitution and By-Laws.

All of the various organizations and committees have done a very earnest job of carrying the work forward with aggressiveness, cooperative spirit and vision. Many important recommendations will come to you in our annual meeting in demonstration of the far-sightedness, planning, and work of those you entrusted with responsibility.

Some of the most far-reaching phases of our work this year are summarized as follows:

1. Through the diligent effort of our Missions Committee, our local Mission work has moved forward; particularly in the fields of local missions established and migrant work. This year, we are entering the field of Juvenile Rehabilitation Work.

5. The increased interest in supporting our Associational Program of Work with a consistent and larger share of your local church finances has been encouraging. We again appeal to you for 3% of your regular budget receipts (figured on the same basis as Cooperative Program receipts). You cannot have a worthwhile, aggressive Program, not even the Lord's Program, without proper financial backing.

The local Churches and their Pastors are to be commended on the fine spirit of cooperation in our unified effort to serve our Lord this past year.

HOSPITAL COMMITTEE

For some months your chairman, together with members of the Hospital Committee and the Reverend Spurgeon Hinds, Moderator of the Wekiwa Baptist Association, have investigated various facets of a program necessary in developing a Baptist hospital. Conferences have been held with Mr. Lawrence Payne, Administrator of the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Jacksonville. Mr. Payne has advised on factors relative to basic hospital structure, organization, duties and relationships of the hospital staff, methods of securing the cooperation of the medical profession, and the raising of funds. Mr. Payne has further offered himself to this Association to assist in developing a hospital program.

The securing of fifteen men to form a corporation to secure property suitable for a hospital and agreeable to the Association, and to secure necessary monies is currently under consideration. Men of strong Christian character and financial ability are needed on this committee. Your suggestions will be welcomed.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

The Home received 430 applications for admission from July 1, 1960 to June 30, 1961. Seventy eight were accepted in the Home at Lakeland and Miami. Those who needed assistance that could not be provided by the Florida Baptist Children's Home were referred to other agencies. The total number cared for during the year was 224.

Two caseworkers have been added in recent months, making a total of four. The caseworkers investigate the applications for admission, discuss the family problems with parents and children and make recommendations as to the type of help the child needs. They counsel with the housestaff and the child that he may get the greatest possible assistance from his stay in the Home. They work with parents and children around his return to his community and home and offer help after the child leaves the institution if it should be needed by the family.

A few years ago the Children's Home began placing families of children in the same cottage. They share the same living room, dining room, playground, study hall and in many ways live as they would were they at home. The program is working fine.

More financial assistance is needed from our churches. Classes, W.M.U. and others may help by providing clothing, giving a small amount of spending money, providing school lunches, and sending presents to some child on his birthday and at Christmas.

The Thanksgiving offering should not be ignored by those not having the Home in the budget of their church. If every church would give five cents per month for each member enrolled, it would be sufficient for all operating expenses of our Children's Home.

Additional aid on the "Migrant Work" came from the Home Mission Board, Atlanta, Ga., but was paid monthly direct to Rev. L. E. McRae. The final net amount used from the Wekiwa Association Budget was \$966.39.

Our final net cost of the Clinic in March 1961 was \$1,649.55.

An encouraging aspect of the year's work: more churches supported the budget than in previous years in proportion to the number of churches in the Association, and support was more regularly supplied. However, much of the total did not come to hand until very late in September. The prospect of a deficit was still threatening until the early days of October. Pastors and Treasurers, I appeal earnestly for monthly remittances; and that as far as possible, your support of the 1961-62 budget shall reach 3% of your undesignated offerings each month.

THE AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

WHAT IS IT: The American Bible Society serves as a missionary and evangelistic arm of the Protestant churches; the Society translates, publishes, distributes - and encourages the reading of - the Holy Scriptures; without note or comment and without purpose of profit. Ability to pay for the Scriptures is a secondary consideration. While the Society's outreach is worldwide, it sees the entire United States population and members of the Armed Forces, wherever they are stationed, as opportunities for "home missionary" service.

During 1960, the American Bible Society--rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1165 languages; the full Bible in 221, a Testament in 277 and a gospel or other complete book in 667 more--gave over a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veterans' Hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and men in service--observed its 125th anniversary of supplying Scriptures for the Blind, far below cost, in Braille and other raised letter systems and on Talking Book records--helped the Korean Bible Society to realize their long-sought goal of distributing more than a million Scripture volumes in a single year; also, rejoiced and sustained interest in Japan where, for the last 5 years, Scripture distribution has averaged almost 2 million volumes--distributed throughout the world a record total of over 23 million volumes of Scriptures. This was over 5 million more than the number of volumes distributed in 1959, and over 8 million more than the 15 million-volume-per-year average for the past 9 years.

From the far-flung corners of the earth--from the beseeching lips of the spiritually under-privileged everywhere--there comes daily a stirring cry for help that can be heard by all, but can be answered only by a fortunate few! It is the cry of peoples of all races everywhere--the cry for spiritual sanctuary and for that peace--"which passeth all understanding" that can be answered only by the living word of God. The sole task of the American Bible Society is to bring this Word--in the form of

Bibles, Testaments and Scripture portions--to all of those who are shut off from it completely or in part.

The help of every Southern Baptist church is needed to support this movement to distribute Bibles throughout the world. Last year Southern Baptists gave \$151,626.00 to support this work. Send your gifts to your Baptist state office marked "for the American Bible Society."

MUSIC REPORT

During the year of 1962, our churches face a great challenge in the emphasis for the year: "Forward Through Church Extension." In order that every church might be reached, large or small, our associational organization - because of their proximity to the churches in their area - because of their knowledge of the churches in their area-stand as the key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in the year of "Forward Through Church Extension." These smaller churches have definite needs in all phases of the work. Our associational music organizations have capable music leaders and stand ready to face the challenge of helping every church in every association.

In 1961, our association held its Annual Music Festival at First Church, Apopka, in January. Nearly 900 musicians participated.

In August, Professor Harold M. Griffin of Stetson University led our association's most successful Choral Clinic ever held in our state. Some 250 singers took part in the week's activities.

Again this year our music committees will present a program of information about our work to the area's pastors.

All in all, we look forward to another successful year in helping EVEN MORE CHURCHES improve their ministries thru' music.

HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS

Home: Of the \$4 million plus home mission budget (60% from cooperative and 40% from the Annie Armstrong offering) 62% is used in the Pioneer States where our work has grown from 79 to 2,335 churches since 1940. Much of this increase is the result of the 30,000 emphasis to start 10,000 churches and 20,000 missions by 1964. Dr. C. C. Warren reports 11,817 started by January, 1961.

From Puerto Rico comes reports of 5,116 conversions and an increase of 20% in giving.

Detroit has been added to the "Big Cities" program. \$100,000 has been allocated to Detroit to purchase church sites.

The 2,035 missionaries and 664 chaplains report 51,463 conversions. Despite a record force there is still urgent need for more missionaries for Goodwill Centers, Japanese, Russian, Spanish, and Italian work.

Foreign: Even with the largest number of missionaries under appointment, numbering 1,500, there is still urgent need of 786 more. These 1,500 missionaries serve in 45 countries around the world. These report 3,399 churches, 6,522 chapels and mission points, with a Sunday School enrollment of 389,138, 452,975 church members, and 31,107 baptisms.

Educational work offers opportunity for evangelism and training of strong national

leadership. The 1,023 Baptist schools which enroll 159,352 students are served by 5,347 nationals and 299 missionary teachers. There are 37 theological schools with 1,378 students, 4 women's training schools with 275 students.

Medical Missions including 18 hospitals and 72 clinics give unlimited opportunity for evangelism. There are 55 missionary and 78 national doctors, plus 60 missionary and 249 national nurses. These served 286,907 patients last year.

Southern Baptists gave \$17,312,163.35 for Foreign Missions during 1960.

VISUAL AIDS

We now have, in the Associational Office, the following filmstrips: 1. Training Kit for using Visuals in a Church, 2. Teacher Improvement Series, 3. A Christian Home and Family Life Kit (suitable for Adults and Young People), 4. Young Teens and Popularity Problems Series (for Intermediates and Young People), 5. A Junior Training Union Series, and 6. Parables from Nature (for Primary and Beginner ages).

Winter Park First gave one of the above to the Association and College Park has just ordered another series, which they purchased with funds received through charging other churches for the use of their own filmstrips and which they will present to the Associational Filmstrip Library.

The Visual Aids Committee has set up the following policy for charging for the use of these filmstrips: 35¢ each for every filmstrip, not per series, and 50¢ each for those with records. This money is put into the fund until enough is collected to purchase another series.

As Visual Aids director for the Association, I urge the churches to show more interest in our Filmstrip Library by making use of the available series or I cannot see the need of asking for further appropriation of funds for the coming year since only approximately 1/4 of this year's budget has been used.

RETIREMENT CENTERS

Your Committee, after careful study, planning and negotiating with numerous persons for property on which to build buildings for a retirement center, prayerfully presented the following report to the Wekiwa Executive Committee on August 14, 1961.

The Retirement Home Site Committee met on August 4, 1961, at the Cherry Plaza for lunch with the following people present: Rev. Allen Higginbotham, Rev. W. A. Lockler, Rev. Harold Epperson, Rev. Spurgeon Hinds, Mr. Don Mott, Mr. Rusty Rich, Mrs. Elmer Jones and Mrs. James L. McKinney.

The J. Authur Stinson property adjacent to Sanlando Springs was considered. A gift of ten (10) acres of land was offered to the association by Mr. Stinson with a one year option.

Property at Longwood with a ranch style house on the site was also considered: It consisted of thirteen (13) land acres and four (4) acres under water.

After prayerful consideration and much discussion, Mr. Don Mott made a motion that we accept the Stinson's gift of ten (10) acres for a year's option, that option being, that the development of the property must be begun within a

year after the signed agreement. Motion seconded by Rev. W. A. Lockler and a wholehearted affirmative vote followed.

A motion was made that the committee write a letter to the owner of the Longwood property stating that we were not interested in pursuing same at this time.

Rev. Spurgeon Hinds and Mr. Rusty Rich were designated to work with the lawyer on drawing up legal papers.

Rev. Lockler was appointed to bring this report to the Wekiwa Baptist Executive Committee on August 14, 1961.

Wednesday, September 27, 1961, the Committee on Retirement Centers met for the purpose of looking into the possibility of the use of a motel as a home for our Senior Citizens.

The Motel is known as the "Blue Ribbon Motel," located on Highway 17-92...It has a frontage of 125 feet, with completely furnished units. Ten in number, a five (5) room cottage, a utility building and office space. It is all air-conditioned. The buildings are all in very good condition and the price is \$85,000.00

The committee has been informed that we would not be responsible for the total cost but that the State would assume its share. This property could be put into operation for about \$1,500.00 within 60 days.

There is a large lot behind the property which may be purchased.

The Center would be within walking distance of the branch post office, stores, grocery and eating establishments.

The committee, after careful consideration, would like to recommend that we purchase this piece of property upon approval of the State and work out a financial agreement satisfactory to all concerned.

With this stipulation, that we ask Mr. Stinson to lengthen his option from one year to three years on his gift of land at San Lando Springs.

This request is made with the idea of another unit being built on his property at another date.

ANNUITY REPORT

NAME CHANGE: The Relief and Annuity Board no longer exists--name-wise that is. The official name is now ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CON-

VENTION. Deletion of the words "Relief And" from the title was approved at the 1960 Southern Baptist Convention in Miami, and made official in March of this year, when trustees of the Board voted to change the Board's charter, incorporating the new name. Baptists over the Convention are urged to use the Board's new name. NEW MEMBERS: Total new members in all the Annuity Board's plans in 1960 increased by nine percent over 1959. Total membership stood at 22,578 on January 1, 1961. More than 4,000 of the churches participating in the protection program are paying the full 10 per cent dues. Twenty-eight of the Wekiwa Baptist Association churches are participating in the protection program. Of these eight are paying the full 10 per cent dues.

BENEFITS: Benefits amounting to \$2,745,613.60 were paid to more than 5,200 retired and disabled ministers and denominational workers or widows during 1960. Four hundred forty-six were new annuitants, added in 1960.

FIELD WORK: Rev. Phil Maxwell, field representative for Florida, has his offices at 1105 Sarasota Drive, Tallahassee. He is available for personal conferences with pastors or church leaders.

OFFICERS OF THE ANNUITY BOARD: Administrative officers of the Board are: R. Alton Reed, executive secretary; Floyd B. Chaffin and L. T. Daniel, associate secretaries; Fred W. Noe, treasurer and investment director; Owen Henley, assistant director of investments and Mable H. McCartney, registrar.

FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

In Scripture much stress is laid upon faithfulness-faithfulness in work, worship, witness-faithfulness in personal devotion and also, faithfulness in the stewardship of the manifold goodness of God. The business of any Agency such as the Florida Baptist Foundation is to constantly emphasize these truths and seek to strengthen and support the forces leading to an ever wider acceptance thereof.

The Foundation is seeking to encourage our people to commit their substance to these causes by the Scriptural tithe during lifetime and by will or bequest or trust to serve when the earthly stewardship has passed. It is only a matter of elementary prudence for a faithful steward to "plan" his estate well. When people work hard all their lives they should give some thought to the disposal of their property at death. In planning an estate the importance of an experienced Attorney cannot be over estimated. By its very nature the creation of an Estate Plan involves many legal questions requiring the knowledge of competent Counsel. The effectiveness of a Trust Agreement may depend largely upon the provisions that are made. And in the field of taxation, the knowledge of experienced Counsel is of utmost importance that these accumulations of a lifetime of labor may accomplish their greatest good.

Druing the year, eleven (11) Wills have been advised upon. While their value to the Convention Agencies may not be listed, they have certainly been considerable. Information concerning four (4) other Wills has come to us from several law offices in the State of Florida. One Gift Annuity has been applied for and details are being arranged for a second such contract. The gift portions of these Annuities go to the State Convention agencies. The Foundation continues to handle endowment for Baptist Bible Institute, Florida Normal and Industrial College, and Stetson University, and always commends these interests to the generosity and consideration of our people.

EVANGELISM

President Kennedy in his State of the Union message said, "I speak today in an hour of national peril and national emergency. Before my term shall end, we shall have to test anew whether a nation, governed and organized such as ours, can endure. The outcome is by no means certain."

To go forward we must start from where we are. Our association is the best launching place for new frontiers in evangelism and in missions.

Therefore we recommend:

1. That we encourage ourselves in the Lord our God for the resurging interest in evangelism across our Convention.

2. That our association participate in the "Baptist Jubilee Revivals" in 1962 through 1965. Our dates are as follows:

1962-----March 11-25 and April 8-22

1963-----March 10-24 and April 14-28

1964-----March 8-22 and March 29-April 12

1965-----March 7-21 and April 4-18

3. That each church participate in the "Baptist Jubilee Revivals" in 1962 (through 1965) and that they have at least one other revival during 1962, with special emphasis in all revivals placed upon personal, face-to-face heart-to-heart soul-winning.

4. That all churches make full use of the Revival Plan Book for 1962, 1964, supplied free to all pastors by the Division of Evangelism, Home Mission Board and is available from the State Secretary of Evangelism, 1230 Hendricks Avenue, Jacksonville 7.

5. That our association have an Evangelism Clinic in keeping with the suggested program supplied by our State Secretary of Evangelism.

6. That our association recognize the elected associational officers as the evangelism committee, the Chairman of Evangelism to be the Chairman of this committee, and that we pledge our whole hearted co-operation to this committee. (Deleted)

7. That our association send the Chairman of Evangelism to Ridgecrest for the annual conference during Home Mission Week.

8. That we commit ourselves to the following outline of achievement for 1962:

I. CHAIRMAN OF EVANGELISM--An evangelistic pastor elected to serve during associational year. Promotes perennial soul-winning in all churches. Serves as Chairman of Baptist Jubilee Revival Committee.

II. ASSOCIATIONAL EVANGELISM CLINIC -- Annual clinic devoting two sessions exclusively to evangelism. Seventy-five percent of churches represented by pastors. Seventy-five percent of churches with at least three members of their church councils present.

III. ANNUAL BAPTIST JUBILEE REVIVAL-- Eighty percent of churches participa-

ting. Eighty percent of churches observing same dates. Eighty percent of churches with two consecutive weeks of evangelism preaching.

IV. ALL CHURCHES CONDUCTING REVIVALS---Each church conducting a minimum of one revival annually. Fifty percent of churches conducting two revivals annually. Churches sponsoring missions revivals where needed.

V. EACH CHURCH WINNING AND BAPTIZING NEW MEMBERS--Churches endeavoring to increase previous year's baptismal record. Seventy-five percent of churches using the church council. Churches sustaining perennial evangelism programs.

We believe that the whole of our Cooperative Program will have greater appeal to Wekiwa Baptists than any one of its parts when it is clearly understood. We recommend that pastors and other leaders of our Association make a sincere effort to explain its purpose to the people, and give loyal and prayerful support to this program.

We likewise recognize the effectiveness of the Forward Program of Church Finance, now in its fifth year, in its services to churches in planning, promoting, and pledging annual budgets.

Recommendations: We recommend

1. That every church in Wekiwa Association include the Cooperative Program in its budget on a percentage basis.

2. That churches consider the 2 Plus plan. This plan means increasing by at least two, the percentage of the total budget going through the Cooperative Program each year.

3. That Wekiwa Association endeavor to lead all churches to study and utilize the Forward Program or one of its stages in the near future.

Last year our Sunday School Board printed and distributed 123,000,000 copies of its different periodicals, 3,122,120 books, some 63,882,000 pre-printed bulletins, and more than 16,000,000 tracts.

Subscriptions for The Commission, The Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the WMU publications continue to increase.

The Florida Baptist Witness has a subscriber list of 59,671 homes in 810 churches, with 711 churches using the Budget Plan. Ninety-nine churches have small clubs of subscriptions. There are still 447 of our churches in Florida not taking advantage of this marvelous asset to the total church program.

We would urge every church to put the Witness into every home. The Church Budget Plan makes this possible for only \$1.20 per year payable 10¢ monthly for each subscription. Additions or deletions may be made at any time.

WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

Our 1960-61 Woman's Missionary Union watchword, "For the Love of Christ Compelled Us--Urged Us To Go Forth For Him."

Real joy has been felt in the organization of new Unions in churches and missions so that women and youth might be educated for missions through prayer, study and work. Take the WMU out of the Southern Baptist Convention and our mission posts around the world would not be strong-holds for Christ. Six Unions were organized in churches where none existed, they now total 53 churches and missions doing WMU work.

Mrs. H. E. Armstrong, Stewardship chairman, reports 1400 giving through the Cooperative Program and 1043 tithers. With the world facing disaster and ruin, the commission of Christ to evangelize is of supreme importance to us. We cannot delay. We must give added emphasis to teaching about tithes and offerings.

Mrs. P. K. Weaver reports 33 societies observed all 5 days of prayer during Foreign and Home Mission week. Through our calendar of prayer, we have called the names of our missionaries at the Throne of Grace, on their birthdays.

Emphasis was put on Community Missions by Mrs. Edward Kelsey. The alcoholic and narcotic advance, April 21-22, at Camp Joy, was attended by 167, with 17 churches participating in this program. An average of 20 societies reported planned community mission activities. Work is sustained in the following institutions and

organizations: Orange County Home, Haven House Nursing Home, Mary Lee Depugh Home, Parental Home, Ecclesten-Callahan Home, Clear Lake Manor, Sunland State Training Center, City Prison and Orlando Union Rescue Mission.

Many young people dedicated their lives to Christian service at Camp Joy this year, where 112 girls attended the two weeks of camp. Rev. William Jones acted as Camp Director. Mrs. W. J. Garnett, who has served so capably, resigned as chairman of the camp committee due to her physical condition. We will always be grateful for her faithful years of service.

Mrs. Leon App, White Cross chairman, reports 7 drums of supplies were shipped to the mission field. Mrs. Ople Newell, after serving in this office faithfully and efficiently for ten years, resigned in April.

This year the Associational Girl's Auxiliary, under the leadership of Mrs. Robert McAllister, has grown in number and enthusiasm. On October 21, 22, & 23, 1960, our Girl's Auxiliary joined girls from around the state in a House Party at Miami. Four Associational meetings were held with a Christmas in August Party at Camp Joy, which 273 girls attended.

Mrs. William Jones has lead the Young Woman's Auxiliary in four council meetings and a mission study. Working with her was Mrs. C. T. Porter, who led, on September 8 & 9, 1961, 50 associational young Woman's Auxiliary girls at a House Party at New Smyrna Beach. Miss Reda Copeland, State Young Woman's Auxiliary Director, taught the YWA Manual.

On October 7, 1960, Wekiwa Migrant Missions Committee met and joined the Lake County Missions Committee. This committee is now known as the Inter-Associational Committee, working together to advance the migrant work. Under the leadership of Mrs. Ben Kent and our Migrant Missionaries, Rev. and Mrs. L. E. McRae, our work has branched out into 17 camps; 1640 Bibles- Testaments were given to the migrants; 3734 Gospel tracts were distributed; 26,820 garments were given for their use; 4 Bible Schools were held; and the refreshments and many supplies were given by the WMU. There has been a total of 31 conversions, 4 dedications and 1 dedication for special work this year.

Our Florida Woman's Missionary Union met in Miami on April 25, 26, 1961, and many from our Association attended. Orlando will be host to this meeting, April 24, 25, 1962.

For the first time an advanced State Leadership Conference was held at Deland on September 5, 6, 7. Much information, inspiration and fellowship was attained by those who attended.

It has been a joy to serve and work with the pastors, officers, women and young people of this association this year. As we look forward to a new year may it be one of renewed dedication to the cause of Christ so that we may say with the Psalmist, "That thy way may be known upon earth, thy saving health among all nations."

"M" Night this year will be held at the First Baptist Church of Orlando, December 4, 7:30 p.m., with Dr. Duke K. McCall, President of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary at Louisville, Kentucky, as our inspirational speaker. Both Nursery and Beginner facilities will be provided for this meeting.

We look forward to a new year with zeal and enthusiasm.

BROTHERHOOD-ROYAL AMBASSADORS

Brotherhood: We have reached over a thousand men in our Associational Brotherhood this year.

We started the year with a Workshop at Delaney Street Church for Brotherhood officers and Royal Ambassador counselors. We held three regular meetings at Camp Joy. We had State-wide Brotherhood University at Delaney Street with leaders for the conferences coming from four states. This meeting was the most important in that we were taught the different Manuals pertaining to Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador work as it applies to our individual church Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador needs.

This year began with a new Brotherhood Organization. This new and improved organizational pattern is a big step in making the church Brotherhood a more effective organization for the men. We have reduced the major officers from thirteen to eight. They are the Pastor, President, Vice President, Secretary, Royal Ambassador Leader, Christian Witness Leader, Personal Stewardship Leader, and World Missions Leader. The new plan calls for concentration of programs and activities in four areas: World Missions, Personal Stewardship, Christian Witness and Royal Ambassadors. We feel that this will strengthen the church in that these four areas of christian work will inform and challenge the men of our churches to do a better job with their lives for Christ.

Royal Ambassadors: The Royal Ambassador program will take on a new form this year effective October 1, 1961. This new approach to Missionary Education for the boys has been acclaimed by counselors, State Brotherhood and Royal Ambassador leaders, pastors, missionaries, educational directors, college and seminary professors and other interested denominational leaders. Many of them have made outstanding contributions toward the development of the enlarged Royal Ambassador program. Regrouping by age--Royal Ambassadors once identified as Juniors and Intermediates

will be known by the distinct program provided for each age group: Crusaders (9-11 years of age), Pioneers (12-14 years of age), and Ambassadors (15-17). We think that with this age grouping we will be able to better lead and train Royal Ambassadors than ever before. We have had a very active program for the Royal Ambassadors this past year with the high-light being the two Camps at Camp Joy. One hundred and six boys attended Camp with sixteen decisions, including six professions of faith. Our Associational Royal Ambassador leader, Ivor D. Groves, Jr., has done an outstanding job in organizing and leading the churches of our Association in developing leaders for Royal Ambassadors. We have a great new program for Royal Ambassadors, may we back them up with the best support, leadership, counselors, and prayers that we can.

I want to express my grateful thanks for the officers that served with me to make our Associational Brotherhood the finest in leadership on any Association. Those serving this year were: K. K. Stokes, Vice President; Ivor D. Groves, Jr., Royal Ambassador Leader; Ike Henderson, Christian Witness Leader; Buddy Dillard, World Missions Leader; F. L. MacWithey, Personal Stewardship Leader; and Eugene E. Burnham, Secretary-Treasurer. We are looking forward to a very good year. We pledge our support in doing all that we can to make the Brotherhood-Royal Ambassador Program in our Association the best. The above named officers have been nominated to serve the 1961-62 year.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

In the Bible we read, "Gather the people together, men, and women, and children, and the stranger that is within thy gates, that they may hear, and that they may learn, and fear the Lord Your God, and observe to do all the words of this law." Deut. 31:12

Our Sunday schools have proven to be great Bible teaching, evangelistic enlistment, and financial agencies of our churches. Through continued guidance in a worthy program they will continue to help our churches in these areas.

Records made available through our State Sunday School Secretary, C. F. Barry, reveal that our churches in our association participated as follows: Total Church Study Course Awards, thru 8/31/61, 5837; in Category 17, thru 8/31/61, 2236; churches earning Awards in Church Study Course, 48; in Category 17, 39; Standard Sunday Schools, 5; Standard classes & departments, 128; total, 133; Vacation Bible Schools, 34; Mission VBS, 7; Number Sunday Schools, 54; number Mission Sunday Schools, 9; total S. S. enrollment 23,875; and the 1960 enrollment 22,311.

We have had regular monthly meetings of our Associational Sunday School organization with a good representation of our churches. In addition to these meetings, we had a very fine Vacation Bible School Clinic and a Sunday School enlargement campaign. Mr. Paul Gore has served as Associational Superintendent and has had the support of an excellent corps of associates and departmental officers.

Secretary C. F. Barry reports continued improvement of all phases of the Sunday School program throughout the state. Although all reports are not in, he estimates the following: Approximately 1400 Sunday Schools; an enrollment gain of about 20,000; bringing our total enrolment to 410,000; Church Study Course Awards, 100,000; Sunday School Category 17 Awards, 30,000; Vacation Bible Schools, 1,050; Standard Sunday Schools, 105; Standard Classes and Departments, 1,500; and Total Standard

Units, 1,600. One Association, Alachua, attained recognition as a Standard Association.

Our department leadership has been excellent this past year. Those serving were: Fred Dunn, Superintendent of Enlargement; Rev. J. Elwood Rawls, Superintendent of Training; Dewey Stone, Superintendent of Visual Aids; Randy Reynolds, Superintendent of VBS; Ike Henderson, Superintendent of Standards; Mrs. Frances Jensen, Secretary; Owen Peardon and R. B. Hagy, Group Superintendents; and the Department Superintendents --- Mrs. J. Elwood Rawls, Cradle Roll; Rev. W. A. Lockler, Extension; Mrs. Buddy Dillard, Nursery; Miss Marie Hermann, Beginner; Mrs. H. L. Lawrence, Primary; Mrs. W. A. Lockler, Junior; Joe Williams, Intermediate; Cliff Evans, Young People; and Louie Wilkinson, Adult. We thank these for their faithful service.

We are looking forward to this Sunday School year as we endeavor to enlist more people in Bible study. We express our sincere appreciation for the support of our churches in the association. We pledge our departments support in doing all we can to make our associational Sunday School work one that promotes an aggressive type program to reach out and teach more people.

RADIO AND TELEVISION

Man can now send radio and television signals anywhere and no unfriendly government can stop him. Communication satellites have made this possible. There are many places that our missionaries cannot go, however, these places can be easily reached by radio. Russia is surely closed to us, but we preach the Baptist message there every week in the Russian language through Radio Monte Carlo. Red China has expelled our missionaries, yet vast areas of China are exposed to radio from the western world. With the coming improvements of communications there will be no place on earth beyond the reach of radio. Even at the present time the world's population is reachable to a large extent by radio and television.

At the present time Southern Baptists are reaching an estimated 50 million listeners each week with eight radio programs and one television program produced and distributed through the Radio and Television Commission. These programs include: "THE BAPTIST HOUR", "MASTER CONTROL"; our television program is called "THE answer"; "THE SPANISH BAPTIST HOUR", and CHAPEL UPSTAIRS", along with the "INTERNATIONAL SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON" serve to produce a well-balanced list of programs.

The communications satellite can make it possible for us to match the population explosion with a gospel explosion. We can, if we will, use these messengers of outer space to help fill the inner emptiness in lost men's hearts.

Your associational committee is still actively trying to get THE BAPTIST HOUR on an Orlando station.

CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The major difference between Christian education and other education is that

Christian education goes beyond the development of the mental, physical and social to develop the spiritual potential of the student's character. Christian education is superior education.

Southern Baptists now operate a total of 71 schools, colleges and seminaries. During the 1960-61 school year, enrollment of regular students reached a record high of 65,338 compared to 61,194 the previous year. In addition, there were 6,462 special and extension students, making a total of 71,800. Of these 5,939 students were enrolled in our six seminaries.

Florida has two Baptist schools -- Stetson University at DeLand, and Baptist Bible Institute, at Graceville.

Stetson, the oldest university in Florida, last year reported a regular fall enrollment of 1,672, a small increase over the previous year. Total enrollment of regular students and others for the 1960-61 year was reported as 2,529. It should be a matter of concern that fewer than one-third of these students were Florida Baptists and that only 47 ministerial students were enrolled last year. There were also eight mission volunteers and 19 church music volunteers among the number.

Baptist Bible Institute, under the leadership of President James E. Southerland, continues to make splendid progress. Last year saw a total enrollment of 187 different individuals studying for the ministry, religious education and music. The enrollment in September 1961, has reached 203.

Wekiwa Association cooperates with Stetson University in maintaining an Extension Center in Orlando. In addition to regular classes last year it provided special training in pastoral care and counseling. Classes opened October 5th in the First Baptist Church of Orlando and will meet each Thursday night during the winter.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

Respectfully submitted by James S. Haskins

Two migrant workers stood by the car of our missionaries. One was asking for a Bible. The other chided him, "You can't take that Bible. You belong to another religion." "I am a man. I am over 21. I can take it, can't I?" Taking the scriptures he said to the missionaries, "This is the first Bible I have ever had. I'll read every word." Bibles and scripture portions (3700) have been individually distributed by our Migrant Missionaries, Brother and Mrs. L. E. McRae, and their dedicated helpers. Some 10,000 items of clothing were given to implement the witness. Six churches sponsored regular preaching services in 7 camps. Four Vacation Bible Schools were conducted with the help of four of our churches. The overall results were gratifying. Seventy-four professed conversion to Christ (27 of these were "off-shore" men, 7 Spanish speaking). We are grateful for the financial participation in this project by the Home Mission Board, Florida Baptist Convention, and the Lake County Association.

As our associational year ends, there are eight missions and five recently constituted churches testifying to our expanded witness. Twelve churches sponsored 21 partial missions.

Another fruitful ministry sponsored by the Wekiwa Association is carried on through the faithful, fruitful visitation of our Hospital Chaplain, Brother Thomas W. Page. Hospitals afford a broad and needy field for Christian witnessing. Patients

are weary and lonely as they suffer. Some are lost; but strangely responsive to the message of salvation. Brother Page has sought continually to share the message of life, light and hope. This year he reports 2411 visits and contacts. Ten professed faith in Christ during these ministries. This report reflects only a part of the results of whatever your church has invested, whether by giving, praying or service.

UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC.

I. The Problem: These destructive forces are now operating in Florida (figures for 1960):

1. The Liquor Traffic, with 17,000 legalized joints, sold over 74 million gallons of beer-wine-or-whiskey. Cost in dollars-over \$450,000,000; cost in human souls--at least 200,000 alcoholics, plus 400,000 problem drinkers, plus 900,000 "social drinkers."

2. The Gambling Traffic, now operating 17 gambling dog tracks (more than all other 49 states combined), 5 gambling horse tracks (recent legislature authorized 2 more), 5 Jai Alai Gambling Frontons. Admission paid last year by 6,300,000 people to gamble away \$350,000,000.

3. The Obscene Literature Traffic, thoroughly putrefying the minds and bodies of multitudes of youth.

The above, and their allied corruption, are now producing staggering crime delinquency, welfare, traffic and family problems which are resulting in declining public and private morals, spiritual decay and death.

II. The Solution: Your prayer and financial support makes it possible for UCA to serve YOU and YOUR church in the following ways:

1. ALERT, our 8-page monthly paper features up-to-the-minute news of and Christian solutions to current moral problems in Florida, a special 2-page bulletin board poster, alcohol education techniques for churches and schools, documented facts and figures to reinforce our historic position in TOTAL ABSTINENCE.

2. LEAFLETS, PAMPHLETS, CARDS, POSTERS, more than 1,000 attractive, accurate information sheets and periodicals prepared and printed in our office, and widely distributed free to young people and adults.

3. LOCAL CHURCHES AND CONCERNED CITIZENS in counties and towns throughout Florida are assisted by our staff in preparing for and the facing of liquor and gambling elections, zoning and hours-of-sale ordinances and other front-line battles for moral and spiritual survival. In the past year, VICTORIES were won by defeating efforts of the gambling traffic to open a Jai Alai Gambling Fronton in Brevard, and defeating the liquor traffic attempts to legalize liquor in Dry Lafayette and Bradford counties. Outstanding progress was made at the 1961 session of the Florida Legislature in a vigorous drive to ban alcoholic advertising and to remove beer-liquor sales from grocery and drug stores. Strong plans are already underway to secure final passage of these measures in 1963.

4. SPEAKERS for worship services in churches, study services in youth camps, schools, and community organizations are provided for weekday and Sunday services throughout the year.

III. The Means: UCA is deeply grateful to those Baptists who did care enough to share of their leadership, undergirding prayers and financial support. Our program would not have been possible without this help. In 1960, from all those churches who participated in the Annual State Mission Offering, UCA received \$8,250; from

individual Baptist churches, through budget or special gift support \$15,343.88; from Woman's Missionary Societies \$371.10; and from associations \$570.45.

CONSTITUTION

OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I, NAME

The Name of this Association is the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II, Object

The object of the Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches; the extension of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ by the thorough evangelization of its territory; and the providing of a convenient means for the co-operation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment

in missions, education, and benevolences as expressed in all of the work of the Florida Baptist Convention, and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III, Membership

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches of Orange County and from Baptist churches of contiguous counties that wish to cooperate in carrying out the object of the Association as set forth in Article II of this Constitution.

Section 2. Each church of the Association shall be entitled to six (6) messengers, and an additional messenger for every fifty(50) members, except that no one church shall have more than fifteen (15) messengers. Furthermore, each recognized mission or chapel under sponsorship from a cooperating Southern Baptist church shall be entitled to one (1) messenger plus an additional messenger for each fifty (50) members.

Section 3. New churches applying for admission into the Association shall furnish satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and orderly in practice to the Committee on Petitionary Letters at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership. These petitions along with information, in writing, as to their doctrinal views and practice may be presented to the Executive Committee at any regular meeting between annual meetings of the Association. After a petition is presented the pastor of the petitioning church may be made a member of the Executive Committee, by a majority vote of the Committee, until the petition can be acted upon at the annual meeting of the Association. At the request of the petitioning church the Committee shall give assistance to the church in putting its petition and credentials in order for presentation to the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall have no power to control or interfere with the rights of the churches, but may act in an advisory capacity to the churches if requested by the local churches involved. It shall have power to refuse seats to messengers from any church which is found to be unsound in faith or practice.

Section 5. Any church which fails to be represented for three consecutive years at the annual meeting may be denied continual representation in the Association upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In case of special meetings the messengers of the last preceding meeting shall constitute the body, except where churches elect and certify new messengers.

ARTICLE IV, Meetings

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it may select. If the Association should fail to select the time and place of its next annual meeting, the Executive Committee shall act for the body. If it should be necessary to change the time or place the Executive Committee is authorized to act for the body.

Section 2. The Association shall meet in a one night semi-annual meeting in April or May for the purposes of spiritual inspiration, electing organizational leaders for the next year, and for any other business necessary. This meeting to be held in lieu of the regular organizational meetings in April or May.

Section 3. In cases of emergency the moderator, in consultation with the Executive Committee, may call special meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE V, Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the Messengers of the Association. Their terms of office shall begin immediately at the close of each annual Associational Meeting, and they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. (See Section 4 below). Election shall be by ballot, except when there is only one nominee for a given office. In such case the election shall be by acclamation, or designated ballot. No brother shall be elected more than twice in succession to the office of Moderator of this Association.

Section 2. In addition to the general officers, the Association shall elect heads of the various Departments, namely: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music, and such other Departments as may be authorized by the Association.

Section 3. Vacancies occurring between the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Associational Clerk shall be elected at the semi-annual meeting of the Association and will assume his duties immediately.

ARTICLE VI, Duties of the Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the deliberations of the Association, Executive Committee, and to discharge such other duties as are generally incumbent on such office in deliberative bodies; and to appoint such special committees as will facilitate the work of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall perform all the duties of the Moderator in the absence of the Moderator; He may also preside over the deliberations of the Association when requested to do so by the Moderator.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of all money for Associational purposes, holding the same subject to the orders of the Association, for the Executive Committee, and make a full report of all receipts and disbursements at each annual meeting of the Association, and to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to: (1) make, correct, and superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of the Association, for which labor and responsibility he shall receive a fair compensation as agreed upon by the Association; (2) Collect and keep on file the minutes of the annual Association Meeting, and any other data in the Associational Minutes, the Historical Tables of the Association from its beginning. (3) The Clerk is empowered to appoint an assistant by common consent of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII, Executive Committee

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of: (1) The officers of the Association, (2) All pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (3) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (4) Association Training Union Director, (5) Association W. M. U. President, (6) Association Brotherhood President, (7) Association Music Director, (8) One lay-member from each church; (9) Any church that is sponsoring a mission or missions shall be authorized to send the mission pastor, one for each mission currently sponsored to the Executive Committee as an additional representative, with said

mission pastor or pastors to become in every respect a full participating and voting member of the Executive Committee; (10) The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the Association between the annual meetings according to the Program of Work approved by the Association in its annual session.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held on the Monday after the second Sunday of each month.

Section 3. Quorum-At all regular and special meetings, fifteen (15) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall: (1) carry out the will of the Association as expressed by that body in regular session; (2) transact all business of the Association ad interim; (3) coordinate and correlate, as far as possible, all Associational activities, and (4) lead the Association in a constructive and aggressive Missionary program at all times.

ARTICLE VIII, Committees

Section 1. Committee on Committees-The Moderator of the Association shall appoint a Committee on Committees at least two months prior to the annual meeting, whose duty shall be to nominate the following committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting
2. Applications for Membership and Dismissal
3. Resolutions
4. Committee on Nominations whose duty shall be to nominate:
 - (a) The heads of departments Namely:
 - Sunday School Superintendent
 - Training Union Director
 - Brotherhood President
 - W. M. U. President
 - Music Director
 - (b) A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association.
 - (c) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.
5. Program
6. Calendar
7. Office Committee
8. Digest of Letters
9. Evangelism
10. Missions
11. Obituaries
12. Public Relations
13. Stewardship

And such other committees authorized by the Association.

Section 2. Standing Committees-The Standing Committees of this Association shall include;

- (a) Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.
- (b) Applications for Membership and Dismissal.
- (c) Resolutions-The Committee on Resolutions shall consist of three members. It shall prepare such resolutions as it may deem wise. All resolutions

submitted to the body shall be referred to this committee for consideration and recommendations, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.

- (d) Committee on Nominations-The Associational nominating committee at the March Executive Meeting of the Association will bring nominations for the Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, W. M. U. President, Music Director, and Budget and Finance Committee, subject to the full approval of the Wekiwa Baptist Association expressed at its semi-annual meeting. The heads of the departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association in their annual report to the Association.
- (e) Program-The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.
- (f) Calendar-The Calendar of Activities Committee shall be responsible for preparing and publicizing a coordinated calendar of Associational activities each year. The heads of the Associational organization, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Music, shall submit proposed schedules of their meetings for consideration by the committee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organizations except in the case of the W. M. U. Quarterly meetings which may be adjusted so as to enable missionaries or State Workers to address them, provided this does not conflict with other scheduled meetings. Other organizations may change their meeting dates if the change does not conflict with other scheduled meetings and if pastors and other leaders are notified two weeks in advance. Decisions of the Calendar of Activities Committee may be appealed to the Executive Committee. The committee shall present the Calendar of Activities not later than the last meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the Association Meeting.
- (g) Budget and Finance- The Budget Committee shall be composed of: (1) Three (3) members elected by the Executive Committee in the March meeting upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee, (2) The Associational Clerk and Treasurer are ex-officio members of the Budget Committee, (3) The duties of the Budget and Finance Committee are: (a) To draw up, recommend and present an annual proposed budget to the Executive Committee in its April meeting, with full adoption of the Proposed Budget at the annual meeting of the Association, (b) To guide the Association in raising the proposed budget, (c) To give guidance to all of the Association finance during the year. (4) The Chairman of the Budget Committee shall be designated at the time of election, (5) The heads of the departments, and any committee chairmen with budget needs, will turn in a proposed budget of their particular needs, in writing, to the Budget Committee at the time of the Executive Committee meeting in March.
- (h) Office Committee
- (i) Digest of Letters
- (j) Evangelism-The Evangelism Committee shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such committees.
- (k) Missions-The Missions Committee shall be composed of six. (6) members, elected for three (3) years, with one third retiring each year. The responsibility of this committee shall be: to establish points of mission need, to encourage churches to sponsor Missions, and promote such other mission programs within the Association as the need may require. The Missions Committee may appoint any necessary committees in order to

expedite the work. The Committee shall annually elect their own officers.

- (1) Obituaries-The Committee on Obituaries shall consist of three (3) members. It shall list all deceased members of the churches during the year and make preparations for suitable memorial services during the annual meeting of the association.
- (m) Public Relations
- (n) Stewardship-The Stewardship Committees shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such Committees and promote Christian Stewardship in the Association.

ARTICLE IX, Parliamentary Procedures

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority for the Association and for the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Association may adopt special rules, if desired, not in conflict with this Constitution or generally accepted parliamentary practice.

Section 3. All questions shall be determined by a majority vote unless otherwise directed by the Constitution.

ARTICLE X, Articles of Faith

The Articles of Faith of the Association, which shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation, are those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in Memphis on May 14th, 1925.

ARTICLE XI, Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Associational meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. All sessions of the Association shall be opened with devotional exercises.
2. The Provisional Program for each annual meeting of the Association shall provide for not less than three sessions of the body.
3. If the program of the annual meeting of the Association is carried over to a second day, another church may be selected as the place for the second day's sessions.
4. In discussions the ones presenting the reports or resolutions shall have preference of the floor, and general discussion shall follow.
5. In all matters of discussion speakers shall be required to confine their remarks to the subject before the body.
6. Personal reflections shall be prohibited.
7. Persons who have spoken to a subject shall not speak more than twice on the same motion without permission until those who have not spoken and who desire to speak have been heard.
8. All committee reports shall be presented in writing, unless the body shall direct otherwise.

9. The maker of a motion may withdraw same without consent, if no action has been taken on it.
10. Visitors may be accorded seats in the body and privilege of discussion, without authority to vote.
11. The Moderator shall take the vote on any subject before the allotted time expires, unless a motion is carried to extend time or to defer action.
12. All members shall use term "Brother" or "Sister" when addressing or speaking to one another; any one failing to observe this rule subjects himself to reprimand by the Moderator.
