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# Articles Of Incorporation

## I. NAME

The name of the corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC., and it shall maintain its office in Orange County, Florida.

## II. OBJECT AND PURPOSE

The general object and purpose for which the corporation is organized is to provide a medium through which autonomous Baptist churches cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and maintaining thereof Testament principles located in the counties or portions thereof known as WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION AREA in Orange, Seminole and Osceola Counties, may:

- (a) Promote fellowship and cooperation among the Baptist Churches, who are members hereof;
- (b) Promote the cause of Missions generally and, particularly, to assist in the establishment of new churches, Sunday schools, missions, schools, good-will centers, retirement centers, camps, assemblies, hospitals, and such other institutions and agencies for education, evangelism, benevolence and charity, as shall advance the cause of Christ in all of its member churches and missions and in the community;
- (c) To promote and encourage cooperation in the programs and work fostered by WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, particularly in the field of evangelism, education and missions.

## III. MEMBERSHIP

THE WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, a non-profit corporation, as presently constituted, consists of the following member Baptist Churches, whose names are commonly referred to as:

each of which shall become members under these Articles of Incorporation.

Other Baptist churches may be admitted to membership in this Association by making application through the Executive Committee of the Association on or before October 1st of the year in which such application is to be considered. Upon the favorable recommendation of said Committee, such application shall then be considered on the first day of the annual meeting of the Association, and, if such application for membership is approved by a majority vote of the Messengers present, said Baptist Church shall be entitled to full membership in the Association.

All member churches shall be entitled to representation and membership by and through their Messengers.

Each member church shall be entitled to six (6) Messengers for the first one hundred (100) or fraction thereof of its resident members, one of whom may be its pastor, and one (1) Messenger for each fifty (50) of its resident members, or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) resident members. No member church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) Messengers. The individual church, according to its own rules and methods, shall elect and shall certify these Messengers to the Association in its Annual Letter to the Association.

Membership in the Association shall be completely voluntary on the part of Baptist Churches, and such membership may be withdrawn by

action of a church upon written notice of such withdrawal filed with the Moderator. However, a church that has been extended the privilege of membership in the Association and desires to withdraw shall be requested to give in writing to the Moderator its reasons for withdrawal of membership. The Association through its Executive Committee, shall seek to reclaim or reconcile any such church.

Should any church of this Association become unfaithful and disloyal in matters of practices, conduct, or preaching of doctrines contrary to those acceptable to the churches composing the Wekiwa Baptist Association, it shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to inquire concerning the unfaithfulness and disloyalty endeavoring to reclaim or reconcile such church, and failing to accomplish this objective, shall recommend such action to the Association as it deems necessary, in keeping with Article III of the By-Laws. Any action on the part of the Association shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those present and voting.

#### IV. TERM OF EXISTENCE

This corporation shall have perpetual existence.

#### VI. MANAGEMENT OF CORPORATION AND TIME OF ELECTION OR APPOINTMENT

The affairs of the corporation shall be conducted and managed between the annual meetings by the Executive Committee.

The offices named in the foregoing paragraph, together with all of the pastors of the member churches and missions, one (1) Baptist layman from each Baptist Church, and such others as may be provided in the By-Laws, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet as provided by the By-Laws.

#### VII. TIME OF ELECTION

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association in October of each year.

The Clerk, Associate Clerk, and organizational department heads shall be nominated at the March Executive Meeting of the Association, by the nominating committee and presented to the semi-annual meeting of the Association in April or May of each year. The Clerk and Associate Clerk shall take office at the close of the semi-annual meeting.

The heads of departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association, in their annual reports to the Association in October of each year and they, with all other officers except the Clerk and Associate Clerk, shall take office at the close of the annual meeting of the Association.

The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at the annual meeting and shall take office at the close of the annual meeting. All elective and appointive officers shall be for a term of one (1) year, ending at the close of the annual meeting of the Association, unless otherwise provided for in the By-Laws.

The officers named in Paragraph V. together with the first Executive Committee elected at the annual meeting, the pastors of the member churches and the pastors of their missions, and the lay-members, as provided in Article VIII., shall constitute the first officers under these Articles of Incorporation and shall serve until the next semi-annual or annual meeting, as provided for in these Articles.

#### VIII. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

The Moderator, or in his absence or incapacity, the Vice-Moderator, together with the Clerk, or in his absence or incapacity, the Associate Clerk, shall be the Chief Executive Officers of the Corporation, who shall have the authority to sign and execute all legal documents authorized by the corporation.

#### IX. ANNUAL MEETINGS AND SEMI-ANNUAL MEETINGS

Annual meetings of the Association shall be held in October of each year, as provided in the By-Laws.

Semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be held in April or May of each year, as provided by the By-Laws.

The purpose of the semi-annual and annual meetings shall be to elect the officers of the Association for the next ensuing year, as provided herein; elect the members of the Executive Committee; consider applications for membership of new Baptist churches; approve Messengers; receive reports of all of the agencies and departments of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION, SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, and other institutions and agencies fostered by the Wekiwa Baptist Association; appoint standing and special committees; consider amendments to the By-Laws or Certificate of Incorporation; make plans for the cooperative efforts of the member churches for the future, and do all other things considered necessary and proper to promote the spiritual growth and interest of the Baptist churches.

#### X. SPECIAL MEETINGS

The Moderator shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Executive Committee provided written notice of the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each member of the Executive Committee at least five (5) days prior to such meeting.

The Executive Committee shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Association provided written notice stating the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each church and mission at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting.

#### XI. BY-LAWS, CHARTER, AND AMENDMENTS THERETO

The present Constitution and By-Laws of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION as approved at the 1957 meeting of said Association and/or as later amended, shall constitute the By-Laws of this Association upon the Articles of Incorporation becoming effective.

The By-Laws may be made, altered or rescinded, and the Articles of Incorporation may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Messengers present and voting at any annual meeting. Any proposed changes in the By-Laws or Articles of Incorporation shall be read at a meeting of the Executive Committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting.

## ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

### OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY

We, the undersigned as representative members of Baptist Churches belonging to the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., hereby form ourselves and our successors into a corporation not for profit under the corporate name of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY, of Orlando, Florida, and hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

#### ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY, and it is located at Orlando, Orange County, Florida.

#### ARTICLE II.

The general nature and object of this corporation is to buy, purchase, own, acquire, by gift, devise, purchase or otherwise, real and personal property and to build, erect, construct, provide for, maintain and equip suitable buildings, houses, hospitals, retirement centers and recreational facilities for the benefit, use and occupation of said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., its members and others in maintaining and fostering public worship, and the preaching and teaching of the Word of God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and ministering to the sick and aged, and for all other meetings and purposes for the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., its members and others. To build, construct, erect, maintain and equip schools, mission stations and hospitals; retirement centers and recreational facilities, as the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., may desire for carrying on its work.

To receive, administer, disburse and invest gifts, devises and bequests by or from any persons or corporations.

To issue bonds, notes, debentures and evidences of indebtedness, and to secure the same by mortgage, deed of trust or otherwise.

This corporation is organized primarily for the purpose of holding the title to such property or properties as the said WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY shall, from time to time, purchase or acquire, and it shall have power, from time to time, to make such contracts and to do such things as shall be authorized and directed by the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. This corporation shall

have no power to mortgage, sell, encumber, deed or otherwise dispose of any property without the consent and direction of the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., evidenced by resolution of said Association duly passed.

#### ARTICLE III.

The membership of this corporation shall consist of nine persons designated as Trustees who shall be (a) the Moderator, (b) the Clerk, (c) the Treasurer and (d) six other persons. The said Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer shall serve as Trustees, herein, during their term as such officer of the said Association. The other six Trustees and their successors shall be elected and shall serve terms of three years each. The following Trustees shall serve from the date of incorporation until the annual meeting of the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. in October of 1963:

Upon the expiration of the term of office of the above named Trustees, their successors shall be elected for a three year term at the annual meeting of the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. in the year in which their terms expire. If any Trustee ceases to be a member of said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. or its member Church, in good and regular standing, he shall cease to be a member of this corporation, and the vacancy may be filled by the Executive Committee of the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. in any regular business meeting or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

#### ARTICLE IV.

The term for which this corporation shall exist shall be perpetual.

9. Bro. Edgar R. Cooper announced the workshop on our Annuity Program, May 11, at North Park.

10. Bro. James Whitmire led us in the singing of "Blessed Be The Name."

11. Bro. James Henry of the Committee on Nominations read the following names of the people nominated for leadership on our various departments:

Bro. Robert Murphy moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so moved, whereby electing these members to their various offices.

12. Bro. Lane Patrick recommended Bro. Robert McAllister to continue on in the Clerk's office. Bro. Girod H. Cole, Jr., moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so moved, thus voting to keep Bro. McAllister as our Clerk.

13. Brother Barnes asked the Clerk to read the names of the members nominated to the Budget and Finance Committee, which he did as follows:

There was some discussion concerning the Brotherhood's request for \$1,000.00 and our Moderator, Brother Barnes, explained that this took care of our R.A. work too.

Bro. Jack Lindsay moved that we adopt this proposed budget and recommend it to our Annual Session. Seconded and adopted.

16. The choir of the host church, under the direction of Bro. James Whitmire, sang "God So Loved the World."

17. Our Field Secretary, Bro. B. D. Locke, spoke concerning the growth of our Baptist work in Florida, and that he is now working in just Wekiwa and Seminole Associations with 77 churches.

18. Our Moderator, Bro. Maurice R. Barnes, announced that our special speaker, Bro. Jack Eppes, couldn't make it to speak, but that we could use our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper, who is the President of United Christian Action, Inc.

Bro. Edgar Cooper brought a challenging message on the alcohol problem in our state, with Christ having the answer to the Alcoholic and the need on the Christian's part to introduce the drinker to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. He closed with the poem, "The Touch of the Master's Hand."

19. Brother Barnes called on Bro. B. D. Locke to lead us in our closing prayer, especially giving thanks for the faithful service of our late Treasurer, Bro. W. E. Browning, who passed away recently from a heart attack.

We had 135 messengers registered from thirty-one churches.

## PROCEEDINGS OF

### THE NINETY-SECOND ANNUAL SESSION

"Christ also loved the Church and gave Himself for It."  
Ephesians 6:25 b

THURSDAY MORNING - Miller Memorial, Orlando, Florida  
"Christ Established the Church"

1. Our Moderator, Bro. Maurice R. Barnes, called our Ninety-Second Annual Session of our Wekiwa Baptist Association to order at 9 a.m. and introduced our Associational Music Director, Bro. Forrest Thompson of North Park, to lead us in our opening hymn. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing "The Church's One Foundation, accompanied by Mrs. Brown Setterlind of College Park.

2. Bro. Maurice Barnes introduced Bro. Tom Ellington of Pine-Castle, who read from the 12th chapter of Romans and led us in our opening prayer.

Our Moderator asked for motion to recognize the registered messengers. Bro. Lucius Coward moved that we recognize all registered messengers and those who would be registered during our sessions to be seated and tend to the business of our session. Seconded and so moved.

4. Bro. Maurice Barnes called our attention to the printed program, and asked for a motion to adopt this proposed program. Bro. Jack Lindsay of Paradise Heights moved that we adopt this printed program with its order of business. Seconded and so adopted.

5. Our Moderator introduced the pastor of our host church, Bro. W. A. Lockler, who welcomed us on behalf of the members of the Miller Memorial Baptist Church and made necessary announcements concerning their facilities, and called our attention to their special church bulletin with its map of their buildings.

6. Our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper, as Chairman of the Committee on Committees, gave his report which you will find on another page in these minutes. He moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

7. Bro. W. A. Lockler, Chairman of Committee on Applications, announced the application of the Park Avenue Church, Winter Garden, stating that this church had been received under the watchcare of the association at our Semi-Annual meeting in May.

Bro. W. A. Lockler called our attention to the application from the Southside Baptist Church, formerly a mission of Delaney Street, noting that they had constituted themselves into a Southern Baptist Church just last Sunday, October 14, and they would like to be received into our Association during this Annual Session.

Our Moderator read from our By-laws from section 3 of Article III showing the need for the petitionary letter to be presented to this committee at least 30 days prior to our annual session. Bro. Spurgeon Hinds moved that we receive the Southside Baptist Church under our watchcare of our association with all privileges and considerations extended to them. Seconded and so moved.

8. Bro. Maurice Barnes called for all new Pastors, Ministers of Education, Ministers of Music, to come to the platform and be introduced. The following Ministers were introduced: James Hodsdon, Minister of Education at Apopka, First; Brown Setterlind, Minister of Music and Youth Director at College Park; Pastor Thomas Ellington of Pine Castle; Pastor Wallace Sellers of Southside, Apopka; and Pastor F. W. Brocksmith of Fairview Shores.

9. Bro. Edgar Cooper called our attention to the necessity of our newly elected Resolutions Committee to function during this session, and our Moderator stated that he would study the wording of this in our Constitution and By-laws.

10. Bro. Maurice R. Barnes introduced Bro. Paul Meigs, Captain of our visiting state team who, in turn, introduced the other members with him: Bro. Ben Borders, Bro. Phil Maxwell and Bro. Roger Dorsett. Bro. Doyle I. Carlton was on his way here.

11. Our Moderator asked for our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper, to take the Chair while our Moderator gave his report on the Executive Committee, which he did. Brother Barnes called to our attention his report as found on page 1 in the Book of Reports which had been mimeographed by the Clerk for this session. Bro. Barnes gave words of appreciation for the cooperation of our faithful officers and leaders of our association, telling us that our late Treasurer, Bro. W. E. Browning, who had faithfully served our association for the past sixteen years, had left a will and the bulk of his estate was left to our Association for new mission work through our New Work Fund. Especially commended was the fine work of Bro. Spurgeon Hinds and our lawyer, Bro. J. B. Rodgers, Jr., in drawing up the Articles of Incorporation for our association and the Articles of Incorporation for a Holding Company, too. Bro. Barnes moved for the adoption of this report. Seconded and so adopted.

12. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing "Blessed Jesus."

13. Bro. R. D. Gregg of Lucerne Park gave the report on Christian Education, as found on page 2, and moved for its adoption. Bro. Gregg introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. Ben Borders, who spoke on our need for supporting our Christian Baptist Schools, especially our Baptist Bible Institute located in Graceville. The messengers voted to adopt this report.

14. Bro. Spurgeon Hinds of Edgewood presented his report on the Baptist Retirement Center as found on page 3, and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

15. Bro. Spurgeon Hinds had the mimeographed copies of the proposed Articles of Incorporation distributed to the messengers.

#### 16. ELECTION OF OFFICERS

Our Moderator asked for nominations for Moderator.

- (1) Bro. V. N. Maggard, Mission Pastor of Orlando, First, named Bro. Allen Higginbotham of New England Heights.
- (2) Bro. Allen Higginbotham presented the name of our present Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes. Brother Barnes asked for his name to be withdrawn.
- (3) Bro. George Brown of Hyland, named our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper. Brother Cooper asked for his name to be withdrawn.
- (4) Bro. Spurgeon Hinds named Bro. James S. Haskins.
- (5) Bro. Edgar Cooper moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so ceased. Our Moderator asked for Bro. Allen Higginbotham and Bro. James Haskins to leave the room while we voted; which they did.
- (6) The Moderator presented the name of Allen Higginbotham first and asked for standing vote with two tellers to count, which they did; recording that the majority stood for Bro. Higginbotham.
- (7) Bro. Barnes asked for the standing vote to be taken for Bro. James Haskins and the two tellers to give their report; which they did, reporting that Bro. Haskins received lesser votes than Bro. Higginbotham. The Moderator announced Bro. Allen Higginbotham as our new Moderator.

(8) Bro. Henry A. Parker of Orlando, First, nominated Bro. James Haskins to be our Vice-Moderator.

(9) Bro. W. L. Lockler moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so moved. The Moderator asked our Clerk to cast a unanimous ballot for Bro. Haskins to be our Vice-Moderator, which he did.

(10) Bro. Forrest Thompson nominated Bro. Robert L. New to continue to be our Treasurer.

(11) Bro. Bob Pinder moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so ordered. The Moderator asked our Clerk, Bro. Robert McAllister, to cast a unanimous ballot for Robert New to be Treasurer; which he did.

(12) Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., moved that Mrs. A.W. Jordan continue to be our Assistant Treasurer. Seconded and so ordered.

17. Bro. Spurgeon Hinds recommended that these Articles of Incorporation be read and that we consider them during the afternoon session. Bro. Fred Williams moved that we table this and that these Articles of Incorporation be given to the churches and missions and that each individual church and mission vote on these Articles and that these churches send letters back to the Executive Committee concerning their acceptance or rejection. Seconded and there was much discussion. Brother Barnes called for the vote on tabling this matter and only fifteen voted to table this, and the majority voted not to table these Articles of Incorporation.

18. Bro. W. A. Lockler moved that we consider these Articles of Incorporation during our afternoon session. Seconded and so moved.

19. Due to the absence of Bro. T. E. Gaskins of Beulah, Bro. Barnes called our attention to the report on Baptist Children's Home on page 3 and introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. Roger Dorsett who spoke on the needs of our homes, and their characteristics.

The report was adopted as given.

20. Bro. John Strickland's report on Baptist Literature was referred to on page 4 and he spoke briefly on this subject. He moved for the adoption of this report. Seconded and so adopted.

21. Our Clerk, Robert McAllister, announced that we had 222 registered Messengers, representing 51 churches and 50 visitors. The Assistant Clerk, Bro. Robert Murphy, had tabulated this report.

22. Bro. Barnes recognized Bro. Harold Epperson of Walnut Street, our alternate speaker, and our speaker, Bro. Lane A. Patrick of Winter Park, First, our speaker and had them come to the platform.

23. Bro. Forrest Thompson presented special music in the way of a mixed quartet: Girod Cole, Edwin Geurin, Brown Setterlind, and Forrest Thompson. They sang: "Harke, Ten Thousand Voices." Then Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing: "Come Thou Fount of Every Blessing."

24. Bro. Harold Epperson read from the 7th chapter of Acts, and then led us in prayer.

25. Bro. Lane A. Patrick brought us a stirring message from the life of Moses noting that we need to give God a positive answer when He calls us for His service.

26. Our Moderator called our session to adjourn at 11:50 for our meal.



THURSDAY AFTERNOON, 1:15 p.m.

"Christ Empowered the Church"

28. Our Moderator, Brother Barnes, called our 92nd Annual afternoon session to order recognizing Bro. Edwin Geurin of College Park who led us in singing "Near to the Heart of God." Mrs. Annie Ruth Southall, Pianist.

29. Brother Barnes introduced Bro. Alvin G. Hause of Florida Shores who read from Acts 19 and Ephesians 5:18 and Acts 4:31. He stated that we never receive any more power than we are going to use. Had us stand as we prayed together asking for the Holy Spirit to take charge of all of us.

30. Bro. Robert New, Treasurer, presented his report as given on pages 5 and 6, along with the WMU report on page 27, and moved for their adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

31. Bro. Robert McAllister, East Orange Baptist Chapel, gave a testimony concerning the Por-Tab being used in Bonneville, purchased by the association for mission work.

32. Bro. Robert Murphy of Lockhart called our attention to the proposed budget on page 7 and moved for its adoption. Seconded. Bro. Robert New, Chairman of our Long Range Planning Committee for Camp Joy, mentioned the need for various improvements at our camp. Bro. Edgar Cooper took the Chair while our Moderator spoke on the splendid work of this new committee, asking for our full cooperation in reaching this challenging budget of \$30,000.00 of our association. This was adopted by a unanimous vote.

33. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., of College Park, called our attention to his report on Annuity Board on page 8 and moved for its adoption. Seconded. He mentioned that 33, or 60 per cent, of our churches in our association were participating in this plan. Bro. Cole introduced our speaker, Bro. Phil Maxwell, our Annuity Board representative, who called our attention to the greater percentage of men dying than the women, thus the need for our Ministers to enter into this protection plan. This report was adopted with a few changes as mentioned.

34. Bro. H. Fred Williams referred to his Hospital report as found on page 9 and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so moved.

35. Bro. Edwin Geurin led us in singing: "I Love Thee," accompanied by Mrs. Brown Setterlind at the piano.

36. Bro. Edgar Cooper, our Vice-Moderator, took the Chair at the request of Bro. Barnes and called on Bro. Harold Dann of Trinity to give his report on Florida Baptist Foundation, which he did, calling our attention to his report on page 10; moving for its adoption. He then introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. Doyle I. Carlton, of Merritt Island, who gave a very informing message on this timely subject. The motion was seconded and so adopted.

37. Bro. T. Clyde Spear of Holden Heights moved for the adoption of his report on American Bible Society as found on page 11, which was seconded and so moved.

38. Bro. H. P. Amos moved that we change the time for Miscellaneous Business to after the message of Brother Meigs. Seconded and so changed.

39. Bro. Tom Broomall of Apopka, First introduced our visiting speaker, Bro. Paul Meigs.

40. Bro. Edwin Geurin introduced Bro. Brown Setterlind, the new Minister of Music and Youth Director at College Park, who sang: "So Send I You." He was accompanied by his wife at the piano.

41. Bro. Paul Meigs mentioned the coming Church-related Vocations Conference at the Orlando First Church, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1. 1500 choice young people to be here. "Christ and My Future" is the theme. Brother Meigs called our attention the words of our Saviour: "I must work the works of Him that sent me while it is day." We have a dangerous opportunity (crisis), let's move out and go on for God. The report was adopted.

42. Miscellaneous Business:

Brother Barnes recognized Bro. Spurgeon Hinds, Chairman of the Committee on Articles of Incorporation, and asked him to present these Articles.

A. Bro. Hinds moved that these Articles be considered one at a time, and that these first Articles of Incorporation be adopted as presented on the mimeographed copies. Seconded. Much discussion followed. Moved to vote on previous question, seconded and carried with the required 2/3 vote. The following changes were made as so ordered:

(1) Under Article III. MEMBERSHIP, the names of the Missions were deleted.

(2) Under Article V. OFFICERS, these were agreed upon:

Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, and the heads of the various departments -- Sunday School, Training Union, Brotherhood, WMU, and Music.

The Moderator took a standing vote on the Articles of Incorporation and the majority voted to adopt these Articles. About 12 voted against them.

B. Brother Hinds moved the adoption of the Articles of Incorporation of the Wekiwa Baptist Association Holding Company; seconded, and after some discussion the following changes were made as so ordered:

(1) Under Article II the word churches was deleted.

(2) Under Article III, the last sentence was changed to read: "and the vacancy may be filled by the Executive Committee of the association at a regular monthly, or special called meeting for this purpose."

(3) Approved the names of the following men to serve as officers:

To Oct. 1963-1. Sam L. Lupfer, Sr. - Treasurer from Kissimmee, First

To Oct. 1964-1. J. Davis Bulluck, Jr., - Secretary - Edgewood

2. O. E. Maguire - 2nd Vice President - Trinity

To Oct. 1965-1. Eugene W. Kelsey, Jr. - President - Orlando, First

2. Dennis McNamara - Vice President - College Park

(4) Bro. Hinds moved that the Nominating Committee recommend the sixth Trustee be from the Winter Garden section of our association. Seconded and so ordered.

43. Bro. V. N. Maggard led us in our closing prayer at 4:35 p.m.

44. Our Moderator declared our Session adjourned until 7:30 p.m.

## THURSDAY EVENING

### "Christ Commissioned the Church"

45. Our Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes, called our evening session to order at 7:30 p.m. and asked Bro. Edwin Geurin to lead us in our singing, which he did, leading us in singing "To God Be the Glory."

46. Bro. Robert Pinder of Tangelo brought our devotional reading from the 28th chapter of Matthew, verses 18-20, and led us in our opening prayer.

47. Our Clerk, Bro. Robert McAllister, announced that we had 343 registered messengers from 52 churches, which is much better than last year.

48. Bro. V. N. Maggard, Chairman of our Missions Committee, pointed out his report on page 4 and moved for its adoption. He thanked Bro. B. D. Locke, our State Mission Secretary for this district #8, for his excellent help. He also recognized the other members of the Missions Committee: Robert McAllister, Leonard Jones, George Edwards, Arlis Blackwelder and our Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes. Also noted that the name of Robert Pinder has been added to replace Bro. Roger Seidner who is doing mission work in Philadelphia. Brother Maggard asked our Hospital Chaplain, Bro. T. W. Page to say a word; which he did. Brother Maggard recognized the fine work being done by Bro. and Mrs. L. E. McRae, Missionaries to the Migrants. We voted to adopt this report.

49. Bro. V. N. Maggard called our attention to Bro. B. D. Locke's report on World Missions found on page 13 and moved for its adoption along with any necessary changes. Seconded and so adopted.

50. Bro. Edwin Geurin introduced the Choir Director of the Host Church, Bro. Richard Newsome, who led their church choir in singing a special arrangement of the "Lord's Prayer," accompanied by Mrs. Annie Ruth Southall at the organ and Mrs. William Bowen at the piano.

51. Bro. Maurice Barnes introduced Bro. Henry Parker, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Orlando, who has led their church to give the greatest amount to missions through the Cooperative Program in our state. Bro. Parker read from the 20th chapter of John and emphasized the words: "They were glad when they saw the Lord." Bro. Barnes called on us to pray silently, and then led us in prayer.

52. Bro. Barnes called for the recognition of the members of the Park Avenue Church and had them come to the front that they might receive the right hand of fellowship from the Messengers of this association. Their pastor, Bro. John Strickland, and one of their deacons, Bro. Eugene Ward, came forward and they received the right hand of fellowship for the members of their new church. The choir of the host church sang: "Send the Light," while the people were going by to give the hand of fellowship.

53. Bro. William Smith was called to the platform by our Moderator, and gave a word of testimony of he and his wife's seeking appointment by the Foreign Mission Board to work in Brazil.

54. Bro. Barnes had us all join hands together and we sang "Blest Be the Tie that Binds our Hearts in Christian Love." He declared our session adjourned until 9:00 a.m. Friday, Oct. 19.

## FRIDAY MORNING

### "Christ the Head of the Church"

55. Our Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes, called our Friday morning session together at 9:00 a.m., asking Bro. Forrest Thompson to lead us in our singing.

56. Brother Barnes introduced Bro. Fred Farris, Barton Shores, who read from the 3rd chapter of Ephesians and led us in our opening prayer.

57. Brother Barnes introduced Mrs. J. L. McKinney, Associational WMU President, who presented her report as found on page 14 and moved for its adoption. Mrs. J. L. McKinney and Mrs. Robert McAllister, Associational GA Director, presented a skit concerning the WMU's 75th Anniversary and the GA's 50th Anniversary. The report was adopted.

58. Bro. A. W. Jordan moved for the adoption of his Training Union Report as found on page 15. Seconded. Bro. Jordan introduced the newly elected Associational Training Union Director, Bro. Steve Croft, who spoke briefly on the work and mentioned his appreciation for the fine work of Bro. Abner Jordan during these past five years. Report was adopted.

59. Bro. Elmer Rogers called our attention to his Brotherhood Report on page 16, and moved for its adoption. Seconded. Bro. Rogers introduced his pastor, Bro. Edgar Cooper of North Park, who spoke on this report. Brother Cooper read from the first chapter of John and mentioned the words: "There was a man sent from God and his name was John." A divinely appointed mission to magnify Jesus. He stated that personal evangelism in our churches is our greatest need.

60. Brother Barnes gave a word of appreciation for Brother Rogers' faithful service during the past nine years.

61. Bro. Ben Hammett, our Associational Sunday School Superintendent, mentioned his report on page 17 and moved for its adoption. Seconded. Brother Hammett gave notice of the changing of our monthly meeting time to be on the Monday night following the 3rd Sunday of each month. His report was adopted with necessary changes.

62. Bro. Forrest Thompson gave his Music Report as found on page 18 and moved for its adoption. Seconded. He spoke briefly mentioning the fact that our association was in second place in the state for music awards and that we ranked fourth in attendance in music festivals. His report was adopted.

63. Bro. J. Elwood Rawls of Delaney Street gave his report on Evangelism as found on page 19 and moved for the adoption of this report. Seconded. He spoke briefly, mentioning the need for 100 per cent participation of our churches in the Simultaneous Revivals April 21-28, 1963. He read from Judges, the 2nd chapter, verse 6, asking ourselves the question if we, too, were only one generation from a pagan nation. The work of the churches is reaching people for Christ. This report was adopted. His church led our association in the number of baptisms with 126.

64. Brother Barnes called on the Clerk to give the digest of letters,

which he gave, even though it was incomplete due to the lack of two church letters.

65. Bro. Henry Parker gave the report of his committee of Time, Place and Preacher: **TIME** - Thursday and Friday, Oct. 17, 18  
**PLACE** - Killarney, Winter Park  
**PREACHER** - Tom Broomall

He moved for the adoption of this report. Seconded and so adopted.

66. Brother Barnes cited the need of clarification of Article VIII, Section 1, Committee on Committees, to state the time of their work, or reports.

67. Bro. W. H. Baker of Kissimmee gave the report of the Resolutions Committee found on another page.

68. Bro. J. Elwood Rawls mentioned the fine leadership of our Moderator and the excellent way he moderated our sessions, especially permitting everyone to be heard on the floor, and has helped keep peace in our Baptist family.

69. Bro. William Smith, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, presented the names of the men to give various reports next year as found on another page.

70. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing "What a Friend We Have in Jesus." Annie Ruth Southall, pianist.

71. Our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper, taking the Chair, called on Bro. L. A. Music of Miller Memorial to bring the report on Our Beloved Dead, which he did, quoting from Job 14:14 and quoting from John 11:25 where Christ gave the answer to Job's question: "If a man die, shall he live again?" by telling Martha: "I am the resurrection and the life." Brother Music then read the names of those who have gone to be with the Lord during this past associational year and led us in prayer.

72. Brother Barnes took the Chair again and Bro. Edgar Cooper, Chairman of the Committee on Committees, reported on other members to be added to Bro. Spurgeon Hinds' committee on Retirement Center: E. G. Rich, W. A. Lockler, Mrs. Elmer Jones, Don Mott, Lloyd Bowden. He moved for their adoption. Seconded and so named.

73. Bro. William Smith raised the question concerning an active Hospital Committee, as did Brother Cole. Bro. Bob Pinder moved that we have the Nominating Committee recommend a committee of at least six members, using a revolving system, for a Hospital Committee and have these names presented to the Executive Committee for approval. Seconded and so ordered.

74. Bro. H. P. Amos presented a revised report of the Stetson Extension Committee and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so approved, and will replace the report found on page 19.

75. Bro. Edwin Geurin, Chairman of the Committee on the Calendar of Activities, called to our attention his report as found on pages 22-26 and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted. Bro. Geurin pointed out the need for consulting this Calendar with our associational office before setting any dates in order to avoid any conflict.

76. Bro. George Byland moved that we adopt his report as found on page 20. Seconded. Brother Byland spoke briefly on this vital sub-

ject. Mrs. J. W. Jones of Oakland spoke on the necessity of having a Christian example in the home to combat the alcohol problem. The report was adopted.

77. Our out-going Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes, called for the recognition of our newly elected officers and had them and their wives come to the platform, which they did. Bro. Barnes asked our Vice-Moderator, Bro. Edgar Cooper, to lead us in prayer, especially praying for the dedication of these new officers to their task.

78. Brother Barnes presented the gavel to Bro. Allen Higginbotham and asked him to take the Chair, which he did.

79. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing: "Crown Him Lord of All."

80. Bro. Allen Higginbotham introduced Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., of College Park, who read from the 6th chapter of Ephesians, verses 1-12, and brought a revealing message on Christianity vs. Communism, noting their eight major beliefs. He stated that Christianity's greatest weapon is the truth and that Christianity is more than an ideal -- it is a way of life.

81. Bro. Allen Higginbotham had all of us stand and called on our out-going Moderator, Bro. Maurice Barnes, to lead us in our closing prayer, which he did, asking us to stand as he led us in prayer.

82. Our new Moderator, Bro. Allen Higginbotham, declared the Ninety-Second Annual Session adjourned.

## AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY

"Sharing Christ with the Whole World" is the aim and theme of the Baptist Jubilee Advance. Sharing the Bible with the whole world is an essential part of this program of advance.

If the PEOPLE OF THE WORLD are to know Jesus Christ the one hope of men and nations, they MUST HAVE THE BIBLE. EACH PERSON MUST HAVE THE BIBLE IN HIS OWN LANGUAGE because it speaks to his heart as nothing else can.

But in most countries people CANNOT AFFORD THE COST of the Scriptures. The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave - and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists. It serves mission work at home and abroad. It helps missionaries to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the Blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

During 1961, the American Bible Society:

--Rejoiced that some part of the Bible had been published in 1181 languages; the full Bible in 226, a Testament in 281 more and a Gospel or other complete book in 674 more.

--Distributed a record total of over 24 million Scripture volumes

in over 100 countries on 6 continents. Distribution abroad showed, for the second consecutive year, an increase of two per cent over the year before.

--Realized anew, from sharp increases in Scripture distribution in Cuba and Congo, that the demand for the Bible often rises dramatically in areas of political tension and revolution.

--Continued to enlarge the worldwide ministry of the Finger-Fono, a special phonograph for Bible records, operated by one finger, for use in areas where people cannot read. Records are now available in 40 languages and others are being prepared.

--Gave almost a million Scripture volumes for distribution to persons of special needs; Cuban refugees and others from overseas; hurricane and flood victims; patients in hospitals and nursing homes; inmates of jails, reformatories and prisons; migrant farm workers - and many others.

**SOUTHERN BAPTISTS SUPPORT THE WORK** because the Bible Society serves mission work - and Southern Baptist missionaries depend on the Society for Scriptures they need for their people - Southern Baptist churches believe in the missionary importance of giving to the American Bible Society.

In 1961, Southern Baptist churches gave \$164,342 to the American Bible Society. Methodist gifts were \$163,593. Gifts from all churches in the U.S.A. totaled \$1,065,649.

## ANNUITY BOARD

**BENEFITS PAID.** A total of \$2,879,816.21 was paid in benefits by the Annuity Board during 1961. More than \$2,654,222 of this went to approximately 4,500 ministers, denominational workers or their families who participated in one of the Board's retirement plans. The remaining amount was paid in relief benefits to 826 aged ministers and widows. During the Board's 43 years of operation, it has paid out benefits totaling more than \$37,304,916.

**NEW MEMBERS.** Total membership in all plans of the Annuity Board was 23,214 on January 1, 1962. In 1961, 1,808 new members were enlisted in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan and 789 churches were enrolled. At the end of the year, 64% of the churches in the Convention were participating in the Board's program. Of this number, 43% were paying total dues for both church and pastor. The Institution Protection Program, for employees in colleges, hospitals, orphanages and other institutions of this type, enlisted 32 institutions in 1961.

**WEKIWA ASSOCIATION.** Of the churches in the Wekiwa Association 33 or 60% are participating in an Annuity Plan. The Association Annuity Committee is striving toward a goal of 100% participation. They are willing to meet with any church and pastor to help toward this participation.

**DELAY PENALTY IS "WAIVED."** In their April meeting, the Executive Committee of the Annuity Board voted to waive the penalty

for delayed participation in the Southern Baptist Protection Plan for those who join before January 1, 1963.

According to the Protection Plan Certificate, a person must join within a year after he begins denominational service or after his 25th birthday, whichever is later. For each year he delays joining the Plan, his widow and disability benefits are reduced. Now, because of the trustees' action, anyone joining the Protection Plan before January 1, 1963, will have this penalty removed. The waiver affects only the Southern Baptist Protection Plan.

The waiver also removed the penalty from any person currently in the Protection Plan who may have been affected by it, and it allowed the Annuity Board to make adjustments in annuity checks to widows and disabled persons who were penalized because of delayed entry into the Plan. This adjustment was made effective with the May 31st checks.

After January 1, 1963, any person who delays joining will penalize himself according to the participation clause.

**FIELD WORK.** The Annuity Board now has 14 field men working in 21 state conventions. Their program of education and promotion is conducted through state and associational meetings, on college and seminary campuses, in local churches and through conferences with laymen and pastors.

## ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS

We begin this report with the words of Jesus, "As my Father has sent me, even so send I you." We are grateful to God for our Migrant Missionaries, Brother and Mrs. L. E. McRae, and their dedicated helpers. Preaching services held, 252; Visits, 860; Bibles distributed, 3,062; Tracts, 27,670; Vacation Bible Schools, 4 with attendance 263; Health kits 489; Garments distributed 8,544; and Conversions, 204. Migrant camps, 16 in the Wekiwa Association and 8 in the Lake County Association, or a total of 24. We are grateful for the participation in this project by the Lake County Association, Florida Baptist Convention and the Home Mission Board. For the next year (1963) the Home Mission Board will increase their part from \$600.00 to \$1,000.00.

Another ministry of our Association is the Hospital Ministry of Brother T. W. Page. He reports a total of 2,965 visits and contacts and 14 conversions.

As our Associational year comes to a close, we report 23 Institutional Missions and 10 full Missions, namely: (Mission-Sponsoring

Church) Barton Lake-Pine Castle First, East Orange-Killarney, Holopaw-Kissimmee First, North Kissimmee-Kissimmee First, North Orlando-Orlando First, Southside-Delaney Street, Lake Howell-Prairie Lake, Powers Drive-College Park, Windermere-Winter Garden First, and Hiwassee Road-Lake Hill.

1. The Association purchased a 'Por-Tab' building at a cost of \$2,015.00 (24' x 56') and loaned this building to the Killarney Baptist Church for use in their East Orange Chapel (Bonneville). Your Committee feels this is a step forward in helping to start missions until a permanent building can be built by the sponsoring church.

2. The Association purchased 3 acres of land in the East Orlando Estates, near Bithlo, at a cost of \$3,000.00 total.

Last year our Baptist Sunday School Board printed and distributed 110,395,424 copies of its periodicals; 5,920,177 books; 67,217,225 pre-printed church bulletins; and nearly 17,000,000 tracts.

The other agencies and auxiliaries of the convention such as The Commission, The Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life and all the WMU publications, continue to increase.

The Florida Baptist Witness has a subscription list of 63,104 homes in 843 churches, with 739 churches using the Budget Plan. One hundred four churches have small clubs of subscriptions. There are 449 churches not taking advantage of this wonderful opportunity.

We urge every church to put the Witness into every home. The Church Budget Plan makes this possible for only \$1.20 per year, payable 10¢ monthly for each subscription.

### BROTHERHOOD-ROYAL AMBASSADORS

We had a good year, with a Workshop at North Park and four meetings at Camp Joy. These meetings dealt with the four phases of Brotherhood work. We have tried to stimulate the interest of the men of our association to do Big Things for Christ through their church Brotherhoods.

The Brotherhood of Lockhart Baptist Church won the attendance bell three times in a row this year which qualified them to keep it for their church Brotherhood permanently.

### COOPERATIVE PROGRAM REPORT

The Cooperative Program is Southern Baptists' way of saying "yes" to the Great Commission. When Jesus said, "Go Ye," He said it in the framework of a Biblical plan of finance, which is the tithe. Jesus made this very clear when He said, "Think not that I am come to destroy the law, or the prophets: I am not come to destroy, but to fulfill" (Matt. 5:17). Every church should give more earnest attention to the teaching of tithing as the Biblical principle of giving, and to the consistent increase in Cooperative Program giving.

The Forward Program of Church Finance is fast becoming standard procedure for many churches in helping the leadership guide all members toward Scriptural giving. The Forward Program is tested and proven. It is no longer a question mark in the minds of our people, but is now a finance program of proven quality.

We feel that our world missions program calls for a stronger appeal than ever before. The work we are able to do through the Cooperative Program and the added strength it receives from the regular use of the Forward Program is encouraging. But the greatest uplift we can ever give it is PRAYER. In this month of October, we are participating in a special program of prayer for Cooperative Program. If your church is not already engaged in this prayer program, we recommend that you use the remaining Wednesday nights of the month to pray for Cooperative Program causes.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

We recommend:

1. That each church in Wekiwa Association plan and carry out a definite program for teaching its membership to participate in the Biblical form of giving, the tithe;
2. That each church in Wekiwa Association set up a system of regular monthly contribution through the Cooperative Program;
3. That each church in Wekiwa Association consider the two-plus plan; this is increasing cooperative program gifts by two per cent each year;
4. That each church in Wekiwa Association study and use the Forward Program in its full form, or in its intermediate or beginner stages; and
5. That each church in Wekiwa Association make a regular habit of praying for Cooperative Program causes.

### CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

By the term "Christian Education," we mean "an education with Christ at the center." Time was when we had to emphasize the importance of an education. That time has almost passed and everyone now realizes that every person should have at least a high school education. The trained worker has many advantages over the untrained. It is possible for one to secure an education of the hand and head and thus be enabled to make money. But it is impossible for one to build the highest form of character and be prepared for the next world without an education that not only utilizes the head and the hand but also the heart. It is just as necessary to know the Rock of Ages as it is to know the age of rocks. It is better to know about the Rose of Sharon together with all other plants, than to be an expert in Botany and know nothing about the Lily of the Valley. All of this is to say that an education that leaves Jesus out is very weak. It is even dangerous.

But there are many institutions that render help in securing a Christian education. The first and the most important is the home. It is at the knee of father and mother that the child hears and should learn about the Lord Jesus Christ and His love. The next is the church with a well-rounded program. Then in our daily Christian living. Our Baptist schools should be Christian and their teachers Christian and members of Baptist churches. We are under a great debt to our forebears for their sacrificial efforts in organizing and promoting schools, colleges and universities that are Christian and that turn out young men and women who know the Lord Jesus as Savior and who live a Christian life.

We have many Baptist colleges and universities throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. Then, as Southern Baptists, we have six (6) seminaries. Let all of us work, pray and give, that all our Baptist schools will go forward in a great way. We should highly recommend that those who employ teachers for our Baptist schools employ men and women of the highest type of Christian character. We do not need teachers who spend their evenings in high society, at drive-in theaters, night clubs, drinking, dancing and smoking. Such teachers do great harm and their teaching is exactly the opposite of Christian Education.

**FLORIDA BAPTIST EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.** Well-conducted educational institutions are vital in the work of Baptists. We must have well founded institutions to provide training for the leadership of our churches, institutions and denominations in the years to come. There is further need for the training of students in all the academic realms in the light of the recognition of God, man's need for Him and our relationship to God through Jesus Christ. The development and maintenance of confidence in our educational institutions is important. Baptist young people need to be guided to our Baptist schools for their college experience.

We as Baptist people in the State of Florida need more Baptist colleges in which to guide our young people. We have only one Baptist school that we can call our own, "The Baptist Bible Institute" located in Graceville, Florida. Baptist Bible Institute offers a special training program for students who do not qualify for college entrance. Enrollment increased this past year from 187 to 224. Members of the student body come from 19 states plus Canada, Cuba and the District of Columbia. The institute has been engaged in a campaign to secure \$200,000 in funds for capital improvements and endowment. There are 13 members of the faculty who carry on the training program.

Florida Baptists support Stetson University, but we do not own this school. Baptists gave \$249,000 this past year to Stetson University. Let us pray and work for the day to come when Baptists in this state will own more colleges.

#### STETSON EXTENSION CENTER

The Stetson Extension Center began the fifth year of operation October 4th, in the First Baptist Church of Orlando. Through the third week of operation, 32 were enrolled in the first class -- old

Testament History, taught by Rev. Allen H. Higginbotham. The second class -- New Testament Doctrine, taught by Rev. Harold C. Epperson, had 20 enrolled for a total enrollment of 56, representing a total of 40 people counting the four members of the staff. Represented were 14 Baptist churches and missions; 3 Baptist Associations; 2 Methodist churches, and 1 Church of Christ. Last year the total enrollment for the first semester was 51 and 39 for the second semester.

For the first time the University is offering college credit through the center. This is possible in both courses being taught this year, each of which will last for two semesters. In addition, school teachers may receive credit on certificate extension on the Old Testament course. Students not desiring college credit will continue to be in the majority. Church study course awards are a bonus to those taking the courses.

The Wekiwa Baptist Association office in the First Baptist Church of Orlando is now serving as an information and registration office for the center. This is a great convenience to the prospective students and a help to the center.

The second semester will begin January 24, 1963. The assistance of the pastors and other leaders is urgently requested in keeping this opportunity for growth before their people.

Dr. Paul Meigs had charge of the clinic. A very good attendance was on hand and a wonderful spirit of expectancy prevailed.

The chairman has been constantly reminding the pastors of the simultaneous revival to be held April 21-28, 1963. Many churches have already indicated their intention to participate. It is hoped that every church and mission in our association will see fit to cooperate in this worthwhile endeavor. In order to participate you need to

adopt the date and leadership needs to be secured for this cooperative effort.

A briefing meeting was held as part of the pastors' conference October 1, to present the new Associational Sunday School Witnessing Campaign. This is a new approach to evangelism through the Sunday School. It is hoped that every church in the state of Florida will participate in a simultaneous effort in January, 1964, to make our churches more fruitful and effective in the field of evangelism.

During the past year the Association Executive Committee highlights are as follows:

1. Early in the year our beloved treasurer, W. E. Browning, passed away after many years of humble and faithful service to our Association. Mr. Browning's love for the Lord's work was evidenced in his will leaving the major portion of his estate to the "Wekiwa Baptist Association, to be used to aid in establishing Baptist Missions sponsored by Southern Baptist churches that support the work of the Southern Baptist Convention and of the Florida Baptist Convention by contributing through the Cooperative Program." Such thoughtfulness and consideration gives to this man of God a living memorial. "He, being dead, yet speaketh."
2. At the April meeting we approved the purchase of 2-1/5 acres in East Orlando Estates, Orange County, near Bithlo, by the Wekiwa Baptist Association. This property is to be held by the Association until one of our churches will sponsor work at this location. Recent developments in this area make this step on our part one of wise foresight.
3. In August our Association Executive Board voted to purchase a portable tabernacle to be used by the churches of our Association in sponsoring new missions and providing for them a place of worship. This building is to be used by a local church not more than 2 years, insured and maintained by the local church, and when permanent buildings are established, to be turned back to the Association Missions Committee for use at another location. This portable tabernacle is now being used by the East Orange Baptist Chapel, Bonnevillie, a mission of the Killarney Baptist Church.
4. One of the most important actions of our Association probably in

recent years, has been the work of a committee headed by Spurgeon Hinds with the assistance of Attorney J. B. Rodgers, Jr., relative to the Articles of Incorporation of the Wekiwa Baptist Association. Their report has been approved by the Executive Committee at its last meeting, and final approval should come at this annual meeting.

I am grateful to God for this opportunity to serve you during the past year as your Moderator, and strongly urge every church in our Association to support the work through their church budget on a percentage basis, preferably 3 per cent. I would also suggest that our Association continue with faith and vision to enlarge its program so that we can challenge all our churches to full participation.

### FLORIDA BAPTIST FOUNDATION

On the first day of April, 1947, a charter was approved for the Florida Baptist Foundation.

The business of the Foundation is that of promoting stewardship among our people, not just the stewardship of possessions but also of time, life and love. Through the help of the Foundation you can continue the stewardship of all four until Jesus comes.

The Florida Baptist Foundation operated successfully for a period of fourteen years under the leadership of Dr. J. Harrison Griffin and Dr. G. A. Leichter. Florida owes an eternal debt of gratitude to these two servants of God. Trusts set up, and wills written in cooperation with Convention agencies and institutions during the years of their leadership will furnish funds for the Master's work until He comes again.

On the fourteenth day of November, 1961, an amended charter was approved by the Florida Baptist Convention.

Under the amended charter, the objects of this corporation include: "To solicit, encourage, motivate and facilitate the making of gifts, donations and benefactions by deed, will, gift, annuity contract, or otherwise, for the advancement, promotion and maintenance of the Florida Baptist State Convention and the various causes and objects now or at any time hereafter fostered, approved, endorsed or officially sanctioned by the Florida Baptist State Convention or the Southern Baptist Convention and for any other purposes embraced within the scope of the objects of this corporation as set forth in this charter."

During this year the Foundation office was transferred to Jacksonville and details of the transfer worked out. An agreement was entered into with the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, to assist with the investment program of the Foundation.

Although these details took considerable time, progress was made along other lines. New wills have been written and old wills have been re-written to include Baptist causes. New trust agreements have been entered into and groundwork has been laid for other wills, annuities and trust agreements. The financial condition of every agency and institution of the Florida Baptist Convention has been



improved through the work of the Foundation. The Lord's work will receive thousands of dollars annually as a direct result of the work done this year.

## SOUTHERN BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Facilities of the two hospitals owned by the Southern Baptist Convention and operated by its Hospital Board have been strained during the past year in attempting to meet the steadily increasing demands placed upon them. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans admitted 24,894 patients to its 467 beds, including 4,520 newborn babies. Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, admitted 17,795 patients to its 329 beds, including 2,424 newborn babies, an additional 53,370 patients were treated in the out-patient clinics maintained for those whose needs can be met without hospitalization.

Patients in the two hospitals have been drawn literally from all over the world. Since both New Orleans and Jacksonville are port cities engaged in international commerce, this provides opportunities for demonstrating a positive Christian witness and concern to all patients in the two institutions grow greater year by year.

Charity programs providing services at no charge and on a part-pay basis continue to grow in scope and magnitude. In 1961, the expense of these programs amounted to a grand total of \$383,200.73. The full Cooperative Program allocation for "operating" in the amount of \$25,000 was applied against this cost. Christian friends contributed an additional \$41,200. The remainder of the expense was borne by the hospitals as an operating cost.

Educational programs in the two hospitals for young doctors, students of nursing, students of medical technology and x-ray technique, along with ministers receiving clinical pastoral education, required an outlay by the two hospitals of \$502,670.48. The total cost of these educational programs was borne by the hospitals. It is perhaps in this area that additional support is most sorely needed.

A portion of the Statement of Purpose adopted by all Southern Baptist Hospitals reads, "A Baptist Hospital functions as an instrument of God's grace in enriching and prolonging human life within the scope of Divine Providence . . ." In creating and operating hospitals, Southern Baptists have fashioned instruments that are effective in a far wider sense than providing organized care for the acutely ill. Their very existence is a testimony to the sensitivity of Southern Baptists to human need. In the conduct of their work, the hospitals underscore the Christian conviction that man is more than an intricate organism; he is soul and mind as well. By maintaining instructions for healing that keep in clear perspective the three-fold nature of man, Southern Baptists are obeying the command to "Go ye into all the world . . .," including the world of pain, suffering and death.

It is the hope and prayer of the Hospital Board that all Christians will seek to give greater financial and spiritual support to help to maintain and expand this vital Christian Ministry.

## MUSIC

Your Associational Music Department continues to reach more people and a larger number of churches each year with its ministry.

Our Annual Music Festival in January held at North Park Baptist Church this year, attracted 622 participants and 236 visitors for a grand total attending the Festival of 858.

Our training program this year was aimed primarily at churches with part-time or volunteer Music Directors. One hundred twenty-five people attended the Associational School of Church Music in August held at Miller Memorial Baptist Church. At the time this report is being written, Wekiwa Association stands second only to the Jacksonville Association in the state of Florida in category 19 training awards. This fact, plus the fact that our association was fourth in the state in Festival participation is concrete evidence of the tremendous strides that have been made in the past three years by our association in the field of church music.

Next year's Church Music Festival is scheduled for January 25 and 26. The School of Church Music is planned for August 19 through 23. Tentative plans have already been made for a special emphasis on children's choirs and their workers.

During the year of 1963 our churches face a great challenge in the emphasis for the year: "World Missions." In order that every church might be reached, large or small, our Associational Music Ministry organization - because of their knowledge of the churches in their area - stand as the key to whether or not all of these churches will have the benefits of participation in the year of "World Missions." These smaller churches have definite needs in all phases of the work. Our Associational Music Ministry organizations have capable music leaders and stand ready to face the challenge of helping every church in every association with its Music Ministry.

Throughout our state in 1961-62, there were some 350 churches in music training out of 1300 churches in our state. This year we hope that our association will have every church participating in some form of music training. As an Associational Music Ministry organization, we are going to strive to reach every church in our association.

This past year on an associational level, the Associational Music Ministry organizations showed 37 out of 47 associations held Associational Festivals. Two hundred fifty-four churches participated in the Festivals with 507 choral groups, totaling 10, all choir members - 145 hymn players - 47 song leaders - 6 instrumental ensembles, with a total of 18 participants.

Seven hundred fifty churches out of 1252 reported Music Ministries with an enrolment of 46,249.

Two Music Camps were held at the West Florida Baptist Assembly Grounds in Panama City. Harmony Bay, as these camps are called for music, has a limited capacity of 120 select Intermediates and Young People for each camp. During 1963 these camps will be held August 5-11 for the first camp and August 12-18 for the second camp. Each church in our association may send 5 Intermediates to the first camp and 5 Intermediates who have attended before, and/or Young People to the second camp.

The Church Music Ministry Department will endeavor to help any church any time during the year by helping to locate capable workers for a music training school and, in addition, offer financial help if needed by the church. Churches desiring a music training school during the year should request a Worker Appropriation Form from the Church Music Ministry Department.

On a convention-wide level the Ridgecrest and Glorieta Music Leadership Assemblies again were a great success.

## RADIO AND TELEVISION

Your Radio and Television Committee recognizes that radio and television represent two of the most effective communication media that exist today. This is the precise reason that American businesses spend millions of dollars each year to advertise their products through these media. Beer has become "the American way of life" because of brilliantly planned promotional campaigns. Well over 50 per cent of the money spent in these campaigns has been spent on radio and television advertising. A new soap powder can be known and sold through-

out the entire country in a matter of a few weeks by means of a radio and television campaign. Your committee believes that we must take advantage of these media, but we must be ready, we must plan intricately. Advertising agencies will spend an entire morning producing a 30 second pancake commercial. Should we do less in an attempt to present something that has to do with the Kingdom of God?

One of the great hurdles in dealing with radio and television is the tremendous expense involved. Yet reaching people on a per thousand basis, it is one of the least expensive ways of communication. We need to think big and act big. Through the diligence of one of our committee members, we now have the Baptist Hour in the Orlando area. The program is sponsored by the Golden Rule Press and is played on Radio Station WXIV at 1:00 p.m. each Sunday afternoon.

America's radio and television networks--NBC, CBS and ABC offer the Southern Baptist Convention its best opportunity for reaching large segments of the U.S. audience at relatively low cost, according to a recent study made by the Radio-TV Commission.

A "Bonus" network audience is obtained by combined network and "The Answer" showings on TV. "And The Word Endures," a film produced of Russian Baptists, was shown by NBC-TV twice--April, 1961, and December, 1961, with an audience estimated at seven million each time. In February, 1962, "The Answer" telecast the film to an estimated five million.

Southern Baptists will be represented by nine 30-minute television programs and one hour-long "Special" in the three networks this year, plus a minimum of 14 network radio shows.

Southern Baptists' Radio and Television Commission now produces and distributes a total of 10 weekly radioprograms and "The Answer" weekly television series for local consumption.

It takes the Gospel through these electronic media to 48 states and 25 foreign countries over an independent denomination network of 1300 stations. These programs have an audience estimated at 50 million each week.

Radio programs in several languages for minority groups are produced to realistically reach a larger segment of the world's listening audience.

Earlier this year the Commission launched a completely new approach to religious radio programming. Called "Patterns," this weekly package of minute-long, tape recorded segments by well-known people on a wide variety of subjects.

## FLORIDA BAPTIST RETIREMENT CENTERS

Our Retirement Center Program has been in operation for one year and a half. The only center we have established to date is located in Vero Beach, Florida. The physical units there consist of four (4) duplex cottages and a motel type main building. These facilities accommodate twenty-six (26) permanent residents. We now have twenty-two (22) residents, leaving two single rooms and one duplex cottage available. (These are expected to be filled before the Associa-

tional Meeting.)

Our senior citizens are continuing to inquire about our Retirement Program with a very keen interest. It will be necessary to continue the building program of the Center in Vero Beach. This will be done through Cooperative Program funds allocated to the Retirement Center Program and gifts from interested persons.

Your committee here in Wekiwa has worked long and hard to establish a unit of the Center in the Orlando area. So far, this has not become a reality.

Some of us feel we need one here and will continue to exhaust every possibility and potential to establish the second unit in or near Orlando. Whether or not we are able to do this may well depend upon how much real interest you have in this ministry to our Senior citizens.

### FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

Our Children's Home at Lakeland and the branch at Miami provide Christian care and training for many dependent children from broken homes.

They have devotionals daily in their cottages. Prayer services are held each Wednesday evening on the campus; however, the children and staff attend and have an active part in church services in three of the local Baptist churches where they are members.

Extra training in Christian living and in knowledge of the Bible comes through study courses, G.A., and Sunbeam training on the campus. The leadership for this work is provided by the local churches.

Religious Focus Week is one of the "mountain top" experiences for children and staff each year. Both campuses are together for a week of training, discussion groups, activities, and fellowship. Leaders for this occasion come from over the state and are prominent in their own church programs.

Asside from the institutional care that is provided, there are other methods of helping the dependent children of Florida through the Foster Home and Mother's Aid programs. They are very effective and, in some instances, give the children a great deal more help than could be given in group living. Some children are much happier and make better adjustments when they do not have to compete with, or conform to group living. They offer these three methods of helping children in order to meet the needs of each child who is admitted.

Last year they assisted 243 children. 173 of these were from the Lakeland Home and facilities and 52 were in the Miami Branch. They also supervised the rehabilitation of 18 who were returned to their homes. This is an important part of the work as sometimes a little assistance at the right time can prevent the break-up of the home after a child has been returned.

The special offering at Thanksgiving is an occasion when each member in every church in Florida can have a part in the program of the Home. We ask for your prayers and support for our work with dependent children.

Enrolment, 1,247; 1961 Sunday School Enrolment, 23,880; Loss, - - - ; Gain 1,341.

We have had regular monthly meetings of our Association Sunday School organization with a good representation from our churches. In addition to these meetings we had a very fine Vacation Bible School Clinic.

Our department leadership has been excellent this past year. Those serving were: W. A. Lockler, Superintendent of Training; Mrs. G. A. Thomas Ellington, Beginner; Mrs. H. L. Lawrence, Primary; Mrs. W. A. Lockler, Juniors; Joe Williams, Intermediate; Fred Dunn, Young People; J. C. Hockett, Jr., Adults; Mrs. E. J. Thomas, Extension. We thank these for their faithful service.

Our Associational Sunday School Meetings for the church year 1962-63 will be held on Monday night following the third Sunday in each month. Please consult Calendar of Activities for place and dates.

We are looking forward to this Sunday School year as we endeavor to enlist more people in Bible Study.

Our goal for training awards in Category 17 of the Church Study Course is 3,000; the goal for the number of churches earning awards in Category 17 is 13.

While our goal for enlargement increase is 10 per cent with 250 new classes; 6 new departments.

Every church and mission report in a Vacation Bible School. For Standard Sunday Schools our goal is 16; with 175 standard classes or units.

We recommend that our association vote in this Annual Session to place in our Associational Calendar of Activities the week of

January 26-31, 1964 for an Associational-Wide Sunday School Witnessing Campaign.

We pledge our department support in doing all we can to make our Associational Sunday School one that promotes an aggressive type program, to reach out and teach more people.

What are some practical projects for every concerned Christian?

1. Be a part of OPERATION SPEAK-UP and insist that our Governor and the Representatives and Senator from your local area take whatever action is necessary to:
  - a. Remove all beer, wine, and whiskey sales from grocery stores, filling stations, etc.
  - b. Reduce the flood of TV, Radio, Billboard, Newspaper advertising and Promotion of all alcoholic products and outlets.
  - c. Eliminate all advertising promotion of gambling now permitted through the Dog, Horse, and Jai Alai legalized gambling outlets.
  - d. Take whatever action is required to eliminate the flood of indecent literature on our newstands available to our youth.
2. Be a registered voter in the county and city in which you live.
3. Use your influence to place your church among the growing number whose concern is so uncompromising and clear that every leader, no matter what office they hold, will choose to be an abstainer from the use of, sale of, or approval of all alcoholic beverages, gambling, and obscenity in any form (magazines, movies, etc.)

### NOW WHAT IS UNITED CHRISTIAN ACTION, INC?

A state-wide, inter-church service organization, serving the

churches of 12 evangelical denominations in Florida since 1945. Its basic program and objectives include:

1. Education through ALERT, an 8-page publication, available to Baptists free -- just send your name and address to Lakeland, Florida, care of Rev. Jack Epps, Executive Secretary-Treasurer.
2. Legislation. In addition to the legislative goals already suggested, we seek to secure protection for churches, schools, and communities against liquor encroachment, etc.
3. Rehabilitation information and activities to help those in need.
4. Prevention, especially for our young people.

At present, 175 of our 1200 Florida Baptist Churches provide some support each year through budget allotments. In 1962, UCA will receive \$8,400.00 from our State Mission Offering. ## W.M.U. REPORT

We have witnessed sustained advance throughout this past year as women and youth have found their place in prayer, in effort and in anticipation of what God will bring about through missions.

"Come ye - apart - and rest awhile" were the words of Jesus to His followers. During a brief period from July 18 to October 1, Women from around the world led out in prayer for specific needs as we looked forward to our 75th Anniversary year, 1963.

Our prayer chairman, Mrs. P. K. Weaver, urged each church to have a prayer retreat and "wait upon the Lord---renew their strength." Isaiah 40:31.

Mrs. H. E. Armstrong, our stewardship chairman, asked us to pray that every Baptist be informed, interested, concerned and give us a faithful steward.

An Associational Mission study was held on the Home Missions book with Mrs. O. W. Gardiner from Atlanta, Georgia, as teacher. Mrs. Cecil Taylor urged everyone to read a mission book so as to be better informed.

May 3 and 4, the Alcoholic and Narcotic Education program was held at Camp Joy with Phil Padgett and Jack Epps from United Christian Action leading out in the program. The largest enrolment was met this year with youth from 20 churches represented.

Mrs. Edward L. Kelsey made arrangements for this and led out in many other Community Missions projects this year.

All churches reported soul winning visitation. Three International students from Rollins College were entertained by two churches. Needy families were helped. Bibles and Christian literature were distributed to doctors' offices, beauty parlors, bus and train terminals, Orange County Home, Haven House, Depugh Home, Parental Home, Detention Home, Rescue Mission, Sunland, Orange County Jail, Hammond Nursing Home, Clear Lake Manor and Kirkpatrick Home.

Five drums were shipped to Africa, containing White Cross materials to be used in hospital work there. Eight drums are packed ready for shipment. Our White Cross work is under the directorship of Mrs. A. Leon App.

Mrs. Ben Kent, our Migrant director, has worked in cooperation with Rev. and Mrs. L. E. McRae in conducting summer Bible schools, Christmas parties, distributing Bibles, Testaments and tracts. Clothes, foods and material supplies have been given to the needy families in our migrant camps.

Mrs. C. T. Porter, YMA director, led the Associational Young Woman's Auxiliary in Mission study, Manual study and in their Annual Banquet held during Focus week.

The Girl's Auxiliary held two weeks of camp at Camp Joy with 117 girls plus leaders and counselors in attendance. Four Associational Councils were held with near 400 girls in attendance. Mrs. Robert McAllister is our director.

Mrs. Marion DeGuehary planned our Sunbeam Day camp in August which was a blessing to all.

A parliamentary procedure class was taught May 29-30 by Mrs. George Holland from Miami. Mrs. Elmer Jones was in charge of arrangements.

First Church Orlando entertained the State Annual Woman's Missionary Union meeting April 24-26. Many women and youth from our association participated.

As we have labored together for God this year, advance for missions has been seen - to God be the glory, great things He hath done.

May 11-14, 1963, marks the 75th Anniversary of Woman's Missionary Union organization. The Anniversary watchword is from I Cor. 3:9 and John 3:17. These two verses fit together well for they reveal God's plan for bringing the world to Himself. Listen to them: "Laborers together with God---that the world through Him might be saved."

## WORLD MISSIONS

(State-Home-Foreign)

STATE MISSIONS: The ever increasing demands for State Mission work is evidenced by growing population. For the past eleven (11) years our population has increased at the rate of 600 per day. The present prediction indicates Florida population will double by 1970. This means where we are now serving one, we will then be serving two. The Children's Home, Retirement Centers, Camps and Assemblies will demand enlargements to keep pace with the needs. Each department of denominational life will, through personal contact with the church, seek to do a more efficient God given task. More missions and churches will be needed. Large gifts, through the cooperative program, should be made.

From October 1 through August 31, 1961, 298 new missions and 44 new churches have been started.

For the year 1961-1962 Florida Baptists gave a total of \$2,777,052 through the Cooperative Program, an increase of \$64,395.

HOME MISSIONS: The Southern Baptist Home Mission Board is endeavoring to "Share Christ in our Land" through the many phases of its work. By August 31, 1962, more than 16,000 new missions and churches had been started.

A review of the work emphasizes the roll the Home Mission Board plays in meeting the changing and challenging needs of our America. Churches, through their state conventions, were rallied to meet unique needs, such as Spanish refugee problems. The spotlight of publicity was turned on other unmet needs, and ministries provided with which to meet them, such as the inner-city, migrants, the deaf, and literacy.

At the same time, emphasis is placed on long-range mission and evangelism programs with language groups, national Baptist, unchurched areas, the military and other special groups.

FOREIGN MISSIONS: Southern Baptists are now represented in 51 nations by 1,563 missionaries. Our goal is 2,000 by 1964. At the end of 1961 there were 751 urgent requests for new missionaries. World Evangelism is our ultimate goal. This is being accomplished through education in 1,026 schools, medical work in 18 hospitals and 56 medical clinics, publication work from 16 publication centers, and preaching of the Word by some 8,557 nationals who are actively engaged in the work.

Receipts for Foreign Missions for 1961 were \$17,935,615.82 through the Cooperative Program and \$9,315,754.78 from the Lottie Moon Christmas offering.

There are 125 people working at the Board's home office, Richmond, Virginia.

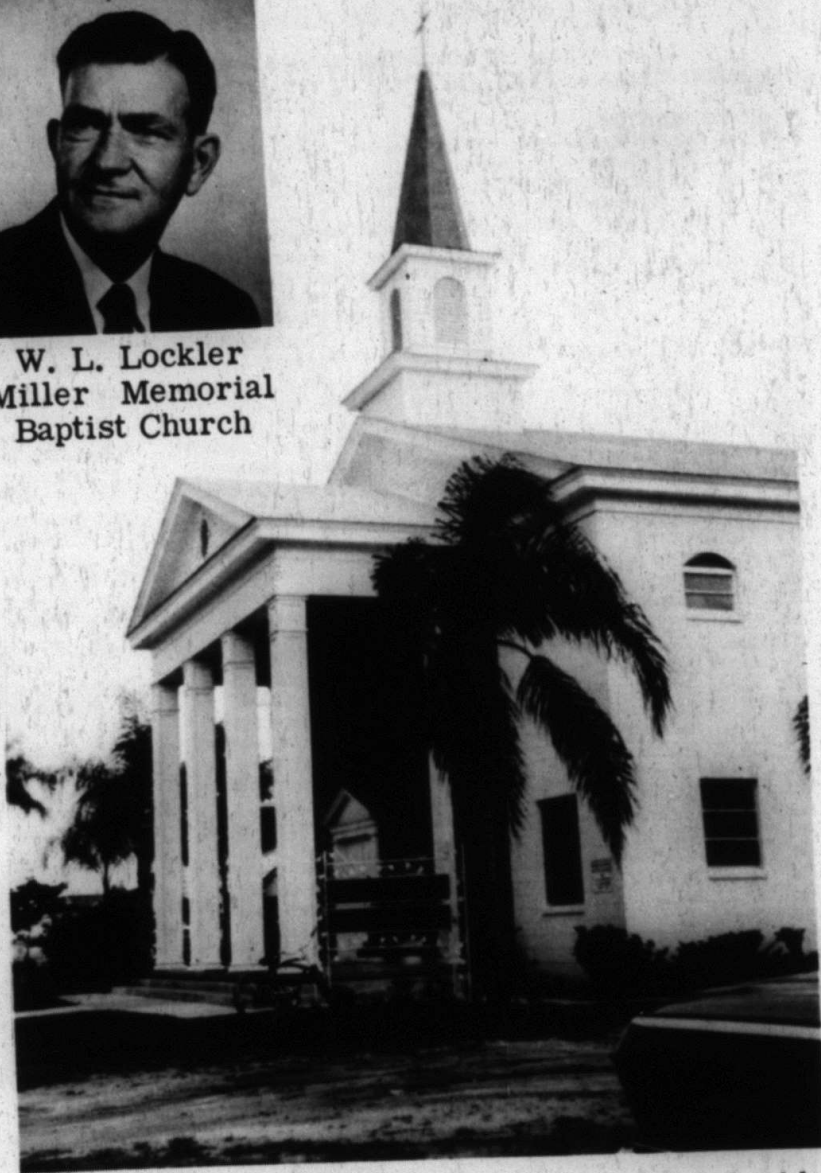

## CONSTITUTION

OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

### ARTICLE I, NAME

The Name of this Association is the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

### ARTICLE II, Object

The object of the Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches; the extension of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ by the thorough evangelization of its territory; and the providing of a convenient means for the co-operation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in missions, education, and benevolences as expressed in all of the work of the Florida Baptist Convention, and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

### ARTICLE III, Membership

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches of Orange County and from Baptist churches of contiguous counties that wish to cooperate in carrying out the object of the Association as set forth in Article II of this Constitution.

Section 2. Each church of the Association shall be entitled to six (6) messengers, and an additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, except that no one church shall have more than fifteen (15) messengers. Furthermore, each recognized mission or chapel under sponsorship from a cooperating Southern Baptist church shall be entitled to one (1) messenger plus an additional messenger for each fifty (50) members.

Section 3. New churches applying for admission into the Association shall furnish satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and orderly in practice to the Committee on Petitionary Letters at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound, they may be admitted to membership. These petitions along with information, in writing, as to their doctrinal views and practice may be presented to the Executive Committee at any regular meeting between annual meetings of the Association. After a petition is presented the pastor of the petitioning church may be made a member of the Executive Committee, by a majority vote of the Committee, until the petition can be acted upon at the annual meeting of the Association. At the request of the petitioning church the Committee shall give assistance to the church in putting its petition and credentials in order for presentation to the Association.

Section 4. The Association shall have no power to control or interfere with the rights of the churches, but may act in an advisory capacity to the churches if requested by the local churches involved. It shall have power to refuse seats to messengers from any church which is found to be unsound in faith or practice.

Section 5. Any church which fails to be represented for three consecutive years at the annual meeting may be denied continual representation in the Association upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In case of special meetings the messengers of the last preceding

meeting shall constitute the body, except where churches elect and certify new messengers.

#### ARTICLE IV, Meetings

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it may select. If the Association should fail to select the time and place of its next annual meeting, the Executive Committee shall act for the body. If it should be necessary to change the time or place the Executive Committee is authorized to act for the body.

Section 2. The Association shall meet in a one night semi-annual meeting in April or May for the purposes of spiritual inspiration, electing organizational leaders for the next year, and for any other business necessary. This meeting to be held in lieu of the regular organizational meetings in April or May.

Section 3. In cases of emergency the moderator, in consultation with the Executive Committee, may call special meetings of the Association.

#### ARTICLE V, Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the Messengers of the Association. Their terms of office shall begin immediately at the close of each annual Associational Meeting, and they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. (See Section 4 below). Election shall be by ballot, except when there is only one nominee for a given office. In such case the election shall be by acclamation, or designated ballot. No brother shall be elected more than twice in succession to the office of Moderator of this Association.

Section 2. In addition to the general officers, the Association shall elect heads of the various Departments, namely: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music, and such other Departments as may be authorized by the Association.

Section 3. Vacancies occurring between the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Associational Clerk shall be elected at the semi-annual meeting of the Association and will assume his duties immediately.

#### ARTICLE VI, Duties of the Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the deliberations of the Association, Executive Committee, and to discharge such other duties as are generally incumbent on such office in deliberative bodies; and to appoint such special committees as will facilitate the work of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall perform all the duties of the Moderator in the absence of the Moderator; He may also preside over the deliberations of the Association when requested to do so by the Moderator.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of all money for Associational purposes, holding the same subject to the orders of the Association, for the Executive Committee, and make a full report of all receipts and disbursements at each annual meeting of the Association, and to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to: (1) make, correct, and superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of the Association, for which labor and

responsibility he shall receive a fair compensation as agreed upon by the Association; (2) Collect and keep on file the minutes of the annual Association Meeting, and any other data in the Associational Minutes, the Historical Tables of the Association from its beginning. (3) The Clerk is empowered to appoint an assistant by common consent of the Executive Committee.

#### ARTICLE VII, Executive Committee

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of: (1) The officers of the Association, (2) All pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (3) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (4) Association Training Union Director, (5) Association W. M. U. President, (6) Association Brotherhood President, (7) Association Music Director, (8) One lay-member from each church; (9) Any church that is sponsoring a mission or missions shall be authorized to send the mission pastor, one for each mission currently sponsored to the Executive Committee as an additional representative, with said mission pastor or pastors to become in every respect a full participating and voting member of the Executive Committee; (10) The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the Association between the annual meetings according to the Program of Work approved by the Association in its annual session.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held on the Monday after the second Sunday of each month.

Section 3. Quorum-At all regular and special meetings, fifteen (15) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall: (1) carry out the will of the Association as expressed by that body in regular session; (2) transact all business of the Association ad interim; (3) coordinate and correlate, as far as possible, all Associational activities, and (4) lead the Association in a constructive and aggressive Missionary program at all times.

#### ARTICLE VIII, Committees

Section 1. Committee on Committees-The Moderator of the Association shall appoint a Committee on Committees at least two months prior to the annual meeting, whose duty shall be to nominate the following committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting
2. Applications for Membership and Dismissal
3. Resolutions
4. Committee on Nominations whose duty shall be to nominate:
  - (a) The heads of departments Namely:
    - Sunday School Superintendent
    - Training Union Director
    - Brotherhood President
    - W. M. U. President
    - Music Director
  - (b) A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association.

(c) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.

5. Program
6. Calendar
7. Office Committee
8. Digest of Letters
9. Evangelism
10. Missions
11. Obituaries
12. Public Relations
13. Stewardship

And such other committees authorized by the Association.

Section 2. Standing Committees-The Standing Committees of this Association shall include:

- (a) Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting.
- (b) Applications for Membership and Dismissal.
- (c) Resolutions-The Committee on Resolutions shall consist of three members. It shall prepare such resolutions as it may deem wise. All resolutions submitted to the body shall be referred to this committee for consideration and recommendations, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.
- (d) Committee on Nominations-The Associational nominating committee at the March Executive Meeting of the Association will bring nominations for the Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, W. M. U. President, Music Director, and Budget and Finance Committee, subject to the full approval of the Wekiwa Baptist Association expressed at its semi-annual meeting. The heads of the departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association in their annual report to the Association.
- (e) Program-The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.
- (f) Calendar-The Calendar of Activities Committee shall be responsible for preparing and publicizing a coordinated calendar of Associational activities each year. The heads of the Associational organization, Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, and Music, shall submit proposed schedules of their meetings for consideration by the committee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organizations except in the case of the W. M. U. Quarterly meetings which may be adjusted so as to enable missionaries or State Workers to address them, provided this does not conflict with other scheduled meetings. Other organizations may change their meeting dates if the change does not conflict with other scheduled meetings and if pastors and other leaders are notified two weeks in advance. Decisions of the Calendar of Activities Committee may be appealed to the Executive Committee. The committee shall present the Calendar of Activities not later than the last meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the Association Meeting.
- (g) Budget and Finance-The Budget Committee shall be composed of: (1) Three (3) members elected by the Executive Committee in the March meeting upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee, (2) The Associational Clerk and Treasurer are ex-officio members of the Budget Committee, (3) The duties of the Budget and Finance Committee are: (a) To draw up, recommend and present an annual proposed budget to the Executive Committee in its

April meeting, with full adoption of the Proposed Budget at the annual meeting of the Association. (b) To guide the Association in raising the proposed budget. (c) To give guidance to all of the Association finance during the year. (4) The Chairman of the Budget Committee shall be designated at the time of election. (5) The heads of the departments, and any committee chairmen with budget needs, will turn in a proposed budget of their particular needs, in writing, to the Budget Committee at the time of the Executive Committee meeting in March.

- (h) Office Committee
- (i) Digest of Letters
- (j) Evangelism-The Evangelism Committee shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such committees.
- (k) Missions-The Missions Committee shall be composed of six.
  - (6) members, elected for three (3) years, with one third retiring each year. The responsibility of this committee shall be: to establish points of mission need, to encourage churches to sponsor Missions, and promote such other mission programs within the Association as the need may require. The Missions Committee may appoint any necessary committees in order to expedite the work. The Committee shall annually elect their own officers.
- (l) Obituaries-The Committee on Obituaries shall consist of three (3) members. It shall list all deceased members of the churches during the year and make preparations for suitable memorial services during the annual meeting of the association.
- (m) Public Relations
- (n) Stewardship-The Stewardship Committees shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such Committees and promote Christian Stewardship in the Association.

#### ARTICLE IX, Parliamentary Procedures

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority for the Association and for the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Association may adopt special rules, if desired, not in conflict with this Constitution or generally accepted parliamentary practice.

Section 3. All questions shall be determined by a majority vote unless otherwise directed by the Constitution.

#### ARTICLE X, Articles of Faith

The Articles of Faith of the Association, which shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation, are those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in Memphis on May 14th, 1925.

#### ARTICLE XI, Amendments

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee not later than the last Executive Committee meeting previous to the Associational meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

## BY-LAWS

1. All sessions of the Association shall be opened with devotional exercises.
2. The Provisional Program for each annual meeting of the Association shall provide for not less than three sessions of the body.
3. If the program of the annual meeting of the Association is carried over to a second day, another church may be selected as the place for the second day's sessions.
4. In discussions the ones presenting the reports or resolutions shall have preference of the floor, and general discussion shall follow.
5. In all matters of discussion speakers shall be required to confine their remarks to the subject before the body.
6. Personal reflections shall be prohibited.
7. Persons who have spoken to a subject shall not speak more than twice on the same motion without permission until those who have not spoken and who desire to speak have been heard.
8. All committee reports shall be presented in writing, unless the body shall direct otherwise.
9. The maker of a motion may withdraw same without consent, if no action has been taken on it.
10. Visitors may be accorded seats in the body and privilege of discussion, without authority to vote.
11. The Moderator shall take the vote on any subject before the allotted time expires, unless a motion is carried to extend time or to defer action.
12. All members shall use term "Brother" or "Sister" when addressing or speaking to one another; any one failing to observe this rule subjects himself to reprimand by the Moderator.
