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CONSTITUTION

OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I, NAME

The Name of this Association is the Wekiwa Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II, OBJECT

The object of the Association shall be the promotion of fellowship among the churches; the extension of the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ by the thorough evangelization of its territory; and the providing of a convenient means for the cooperation of the churches in their work and an efficient agency for their enlistment in missions, education, and benevolences as expressed in all of the work of the Florida Baptist Convention, and of the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III, MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The Association shall be composed of messengers from Baptist churches of Orange County and from Baptist churches of contiguous counties that wish to cooperate in carrying out the object of the Association as set forth in Article II of this Constitution.

Section 2. Each church of the Association shall be entitled to six (6) messengers, and an additional messenger for every fifty (50) members, except that no one church shall have more than fifteen (15) messengers. Furthermore, each recognized mission or chapel under sponsorship from a cooperating Southern Baptist Church shall be entitled to one (1) messenger plus an additional messenger for each fifty (50) members.

Section 3. New churches applying for admission into the Association shall furnish satisfactory evidence of being sound in doctrine and orderly in practice to the Committee on Petitionary Letters at least thirty (30) days before the annual meeting of the Association. If upon examination, they are found to be sound they may be admitted to membership. These petitions along with information, in writing, as to their doctrinal views and practice may be presented to the Executive Committee at any regular meeting between annual meetings of the Association. After a petition is presented the pastor of the petitioning church may be made a member of the Executive Committee, by a majority vote of the Committee, until the petition can be acted upon at the annual meeting of the Association. At the request of the petitioning church, the Committee shall give assistance to the church in putting its petition and credentials in order for presentation to the Association. Section 4. The Association shall have no power to control or interfere with the rights of the churches, but may act in an advisory capacity to the churches if requested by the local churches involved. It shall have power to refuse seats to messengers from any church which is found to be unsound in faith or practice.

Section 5. Any church which fails to be represented for three

consecutive years at the annual meeting may be denied continual representation in the Association upon recommendation of the Executive Committee.

Section 6. In case of special meetings the messengers of the last preceding meeting shall constitute the body, except where churches elect and certify new messengers.

ARTICLE IV, MEETINGS

Section 1. The Association shall meet annually at such time and place as it may select. If the Association should fail to select the time and place of its next annual meeting, the Executive Committee shall act for the body. If it should be necessary to change the time or place the Executive Committee is authorized to act for the body.

Section 2. The Association shall meet in a one night semi-annual meeting in April or May for the Purposes of spiritual inspiration, electing organizational leaders for the next year, and for any other business necessary. This meeting is to be held in lieu of the regular organizational meetings in April or May.

Section 3. In cases of emergency the moderator, in consultation with the Executive Committee, may call special meetings of the Association.

ARTICLE V, OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected annually from the Messengers of the Association. Their terms of office shall begin immediately at the close of each annual Associational Meeting, and they shall serve until their successors are elected and qualified. (See Section 4 below). Election shall be by ballot, except when there is only one nominee for a given office. In such case the election shall be by acclamation, or designated ballot. No brother shall be elected more than twice in succession to the office of Moderator of this Association.

Section 2. In addition to the general officers, the Association shall elect heads of the various Departments, namely: Sunday School, Training Union, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Music, and such other Departments as may be authorized by the Association.

Section 3. Vacancies occurring between the annual and semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

Section 4. The Associational Clerk shall be elected at the semi-annual meeting of the Association and will assume his duties immediately.

ARTICLE VI, DUTIES OF THE OFFICERS

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside over the deliberations of the Association, Executive Committee, and to discharge such other duties as are generally incumbent on such office in deliberative bodies; and to appoint such special committees as will facilitate the work of the Association.

Section 2. The Vice-Moderator shall perform all the duties of the Moderator in the absence of the Moderator; He may also preside over the deliberations of the Association when requested to do so by the Moderator.

Section 3. The Treasurer shall take charge of all money for Associational purposes, holding the same subject to the orders of the Association, for the Executive Committee, and make a full report of all receipts and disbursements at each annual meeting of the Association, and to the regular meetings of the Executive Committee.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to: (1) make, correct, and superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of the Association, for which labor and responsibility he shall receive a fair compensation as agreed upon by the Association; (2) Collect and keep on file the minutes of the annual Association Meeting, and any other data in the Associational Minutes, the Historical Tables of the Association from its beginning; (3) The Clerk is empowered to appoint an assistant by common consent of the Executive Committee.

ARTICLE VII, EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of: (1) The officers of the Association, (2) All pastors of churches and missions cooperating with the Association, provided they hold membership in some church cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention, (3) Association Sunday School Superintendent, (4) Association Training Union Director, (5) Association W.M.U. President, (6) Association brotherhood President, (7) Association Music Director, (8) One laymember from each church, (9) Any church that is sponsoring a mission or missions shall be authorized to send the mission pastor, one for each mission currently sponsored to the Executive Committee as an additional representative, with said mission pastor or pastors to become in every respect a full participating and voting member of the Executive Committee, (10) The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the Association between the annual meetings according to the Program of Work approved by the Association in its annual session.

Section 2. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be held on the Monday after the second Sunday of each month.

Section 3. Quorum - At all regular and special meetings, fifteen (15) members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. The Executive Committee shall: (1) Carry out the will of the Association as expressed by that body in regular session, (2) Transact all business of the Association ad interim, (3) Coordinate and correlate, as far as possible, all Associational activities, and (4) Lead the Association in a constructive and aggressive Missionary program at all times.

ARTICLE VIII, COMMITTEES

Section 1. Committee on Committees - The Moderator of the

Association shall appoint a Committee on Committees at least two months prior to the annual meeting, whose duty it shall be to nominate the following committees to report at the present meeting:

1. Place and Preacher for next meetings, semi-annual and annual.
2. Applications for Membership and Dismissal
3. Resolutions
4. Committee on Nominations whose duty shall be to nominate:
 - (a) The heads of departments, Namely:
 - Sunday School Superintendent
 - Training Union Director
 - Brotherhood President
 - W. M. U. President
 - Music Director
 - (b) A person to present a written report at the next meeting on each of the various objects fostered by the Association.
 - (c) One person from each church for membership on the Executive Committee which person shall be elected by the church as a nominee to the Association.
5. Program
6. Calendar
7. Office Committee
8. Digest of Letters
9. Evangelism
10. Missions
11. Obituaries
12. Public Relations
13. Stewardship

And such other committees authorized by the Association.

Section 2. Standing Committees - The Standing Committees of this Association shall include:

- (a) Place and Preacher for next meetings, semi-annual and annual.
- (b) Applications for Membership and Dismissal.
- (c) Resolutions - The Committee on Resolutions shall consist of three members. It shall prepare such resolutions as it may deem wise. All resolutions submitted to the body shall be referred to this committee for consideration and recommendations, unless otherwise ordered by the Association.
- (d) Committee on Nominations - The Associational nominating committee at the March Executive Meeting of the Association will bring nominations for the Sunday School Superintendent, Training Union Director, Brotherhood President, W.M.U. President, Music Director, and Budget and Finance Committee, subject to the full approval of the Wekiwa Baptist Association expressed at its semi-annual meeting. The heads of the departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association in their annual report to the Association.
- (e) Program - The Program Committee shall be the Moderator, Clerk, and Pastor of the entertaining church.
- (f) Calendar - The Calendar of Activities Committee shall be responsible for preparing and publicizing a coordinated

calendar of Associational activities each year. The heads of the Associational organization, Sunday School, Training Union, W.M.U., Brotherhood, and Music, shall submit proposed schedules of their meetings for consideration by the committee. Decisions of the committee shall be binding upon the organizations except in the case of the W.M.U. Quarterly meetings which may be adjusted so as to enable missionaries or State Workers to address them, provided this does not conflict with other scheduled meetings. Other organizations may change their meeting dates if the change does not conflict with other scheduled meetings and if pastors and other leaders are notified two weeks in advance. Decisions of the Calendar of Activities Committee may be appealed to the Executive Committee. The committee shall present the Calendar of Activities not later than the last meeting of the Executive Committee prior to the Associational Meeting.

- (g) Budget and Finance - The Budget Committee shall be composed of: (1) Three (3) members elected by the Executive Committee in the March meeting upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee, for three (3) years, with one-third retiring each year-(Rotation). (2) The Associational Clerk and Treasurer are ex-officio members of the Budget Committee, (3) The duties of the Budget and Finance Committee are: (a) To draw up, recommend and present an annual proposed budget to the Executive Committee in its April meeting, with full adoption of the Proposed Budget at the annual meeting of the Association, (b) To guide the Association in raising the proposed budget, (c) To give guidance to all of the Association finance during the year. (4) The Chairman of the Budget Committee shall be designated at the time of election, (5) The heads of the departments, and any committee chairmen with budget needs, will turn in a proposed budget of their particular needs, in writing, to the Budget Committee at the time of the Executive Committee meeting in March.
- (h) Office Committee
- (i) Digest of Letters
- (j) Evangelism - The Evangelism Committee shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such committees.
- (k) Missions - The Missions Committee shall be composed of six (6) members, elected for three (3) years, with one third retiring each year. The responsibility of this committee shall be: To establish points of mission need, to encourage churches to sponsor Missions, and promote such other mission programs within the Association as the need may require. The Missions Committee may appoint any necessary committees in order to expedite the work. The Committee shall annually elect their own officers.
- (l) Obituaries - The Committee on Obituaries shall consist of three (3) members. It shall list all deceased members of

the churches during the year and make preparations for suitable memorial services during the annual meeting of the association.

- (m) Public Relations
- (n) Stewardship - The Stewardship Committees shall be in keeping with State and Southwide plans for such Committees and promote Christian Stewardship in the Association.

ARTICLE IX. PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURES

Section 1. Roberts Rules of Order, Revised, shall be the parliamentary authority for the Association and for the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Association may adopt special rules, if desired, not in conflict with this Constitution or generally accepted parliamentary practice.

Section 3. All questions shall be determined by a majority vote unless otherwise directed by the Constitution.

ARTICLE X, ARTICLES OF FAITH

The Articles of Faith of the Association, which shall be the basis of fellowship and cooperation, are those adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in Memphis on May 14, 1925.

ARTICLE XI, AMENDMENTS

This Constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members present and voting provided that notice of such change shall have been given to the Executive Committee meeting previous to the Associational meeting and that notice of such change be given to the Association on the first day of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. All sessions of the Association shall be opened with devotional exercises.

2. The Provisional Program for each annual meeting of the Association shall provide for not less than three sessions of the body.

3. If the program of the annual meeting of the Association is carried over to a second day, another church may be selected as the place for the second day's sessions.

4. In discussions, the ones presenting the reports or resolutions shall have preference of the floor, and general discussion shall follow.

5. In all matters of discussion, speakers shall be required to confine their remarks to the subject before the body.

6. Personal reflections shall be prohibited.

7. Persons who have spoken to a subject shall not speak more than twice on the same motion without permission until those who have not

spoken and who desire to speak have been heard.

8. All committee reports shall be presented in writing, unless the body shall direct otherwise.

9. The maker of a motion may withdraw same without consent, if no action has been taken on it.

10. Visitors may be accorded seats in the body and privilege of discussion, without authority to vote.

11. The Moderator shall take the vote on any subject before the allotted time expires, unless a motion is carried to extend time or to defer action.

12. All members shall use term "Brother" or "Sister" when addressing or speaking to one another; anyone failing to observe this rule subjects himself to reprimand by the Moderator.

Articles Of Incorporation

I. NAME

The name of the corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC., and it shall maintain its office in Orange County, Florida.

II. OBJECT AND PURPOSE

The general object and purpose for which the corporation is organized is to provide a medium through which autonomous Baptist churches cooperating with the Florida Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention and maintaining New Testament principles located in the counties or portions thereof known as WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION AREA in Orange, Seminole and Osceola Counties, may:

- (a) Promote fellowship and cooperation among the Baptist Churches, who are members hereof;
- (b) Promote the cause of Missions generally and, particularly, to assist in the establishment of new churches, Sunday schools, missions, schools, good-will centers, retirement centers, camps, assemblies, hospitals, and such other institutions and agencies for education, evangelism, benevolence and charity, as shall advance the cause of Christ in all of its member churches and missions and in the community;
- (c) To promote and encourage cooperation in the programs and work fostered by WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION, and SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, particularly in the field of evangelism, education and missions.

III. MEMBERSHIP

THE WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, a non-profit corporation, as presently constituted, consists of the following member Baptist Churches, whose names are commonly referred to as:

each of which shall become members under these Articles of Incorporation.

Other Baptist churches may be admitted to membership in this Association by making application through the Executive Committee of the Association on or before October 1st of the year in which such application is to be considered. Upon the favorable recommendation of said Committee, such application shall then be considered on the first day of the annual meeting of the Association, and, if such application for membership is approved by a majority vote of the Messengers present, said Baptist Church shall be entitled to full membership in the Association.

All member churches shall be entitled to representation and membership by and through their Messengers.

Each member church shall be entitled to six (6) Messengers for the first one hundred (100) or fraction thereof of its resident members, one of whom may be its pastor, and one (1) Messenger for each fifty (50) of its resident members, or fraction thereof, above the first one hundred (100) resident members. No member church shall be entitled to more than fifteen (15) Messengers. The individual church, according to its own rules and methods, shall elect and shall certify these Messengers to the Association in its Annual Letter to the Association.

Membership in the Association shall be completely voluntary on the part of Baptist Churches, and such membership may be withdrawn by

action of a church upon written notice of such withdrawal filed with the Moderator. However, a church that has been extended the privilege of membership in the Association and desires to withdraw shall be requested to give in writing to the Moderator its reasons for withdrawal of membership. The Association through its Executive Committee, shall seek to reclaim or reconcile any such church.

Should any church of this Association become unfaithful and disloyal in matters of practices, conduct, or preaching of doctrines contrary to those acceptable to the churches composing the Wekiwa Baptist Association, it shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to inquire concerning the unfaithfulness and disloyalty endeavoring to reclaim or reconcile such church, and failing to accomplish this objective, shall recommend such action to the Association as it deems necessary, in keeping with Article III of the By-Laws. Any action on the part of the Association shall require a two-thirds (2/3) majority vote of those present and voting.

IV. TERM OF EXISTENCE

This corporation shall have perpetual existence.

VI. MANAGEMENT OF CORPORATION AND TIME OF ELECTION OR APPOINTMENT

The affairs of the corporation shall be conducted and managed between the annual meetings by the Executive Committee.

The offices named in the foregoing paragraph, together with all of the pastors of the member churches and missions, one (1) Baptist layman from each Baptist Church, and such others as may be provided in the By-Laws, shall constitute the Executive Committee.

The Executive Committee shall meet as provided by the By-Laws.

VII. TIME OF ELECTION

The Moderator, Vice-Moderator, and Treasurer shall be elected annually at the annual meeting of the Association in October of each year.

The Clerk, Associate Clerk, and organizational department heads shall be nominated at the March Executive Meeting of the Association, by the nominating committee and presented to the semi-annual meeting of the Association in April or May of each year. The Clerk and Associate Clerk shall take office at the close of the semi-annual meeting.

The heads of departments shall bring a slate of their officers for the approval of the Association, in their annual reports to the Association in October of each year and they, with all other officers except the Clerk and Associate Clerk, shall take office at the close of the annual meeting of the Association.

The members of the Executive Committee shall be elected at the annual meeting and shall take office at the close of the annual meeting. All elective and appointive officers shall be for a term of one (1) year, ending at the close of the annual meeting of the Association, unless otherwise provided for in the By-Laws.

The officers named in Paragraph V. together with the first Executive Committee elected at the annual meeting, the pastors of the member churches and the pastors of their missions, and the laymembers, as provided in Article VIII., shall constitute the first officers under these Articles of Incorporation and shall serve until the next semi-annual or annual meeting, as provided for in these Articles.

VIII. CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICERS

The Moderator, or in his absence or incapacity, the Vice-Moderator, together with the Clerk, or in his absence or incapacity, the Associate Clerk, shall be the Chief Executive Officers of the Corporation, who shall have the authority to sign and execute all legal documents authorized by the corporation.

IX. ANNUAL MEETINGS AND SEMI-ANNUAL MEETINGS

Annual meetings of the Association shall be held in October of each year, as provided in the By-Laws.

Semi-annual meetings of the Association shall be held in April or May of each year, as provided by the By-Laws.

The purpose of the semi-annual and annual meetings shall be to elect the officers of the Association for the next ensuing year, as provided herein; elect the members of the Executive Committee; consider applications for membership of new Baptist churches; approve Messengers; receive reports of all of the agencies and departments of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, FLORIDA BAPTIST CONVENTION, SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION, and other institutions and agencies fostered by the Wekiwa Baptist Association; appoint standing and special committees; consider amendments to the By-Laws or Certificate of Incorporation; make plans for the cooperative efforts of the member churches for the future, and do all other things considered necessary and proper to promote the spiritual growth and interest of the Baptist churches.

X. SPECIAL MEETINGS

The Moderator shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Executive Committee provided written notice of the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each member of the Executive Committee at least five (5) days prior to such meeting.

The Executive Committee shall have authority to call a special meeting of the Association provided written notice stating the time, place and purpose of such special meeting is mailed to each church and mission at least thirty (30) days prior to such meeting.

XI. BY-LAWS, CHARTER, AND AMENDMENTS THERETO

The present Constitution and By-Laws of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION as approved at the 1957 meeting of said Association and/or as later amended, shall constitute the By-Laws of this Association upon the Articles of Incorporation becoming effective.

The By-Laws may be made, altered or rescinded, and the Articles of Incorporation may be amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Messengers present and voting at any annual meeting. Any proposed changes in the By-Laws or Articles of Incorporation shall be read at a meeting of the Executive Committee at least thirty (30) days prior to the annual meeting.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY

We, the undersigned as representative members of Baptist Churches belonging to the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., hereby form ourselves and our successors into a corporation not for profit under the corporate name of WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY, of Orlando, Florida, and hereby adopt the following articles of incorporation:

ARTICLE I.

The name of this corporation shall be WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY, and it is located at Orlando, Orange County, Florida.

ARTICLE II.

The general nature and object of this corporation is to buy, purchase, own, acquire, by gift, devise, purchase or otherwise, real and personal property and to build, erect, construct, provide for, maintain and equip suitable buildings, houses, hospitals, retirement centers and recreational facilities for the benefit, use and occupation of said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., its members and others in maintaining and fostering public worship, and the preaching and teaching of the Word of God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ, and ministering to the sick and aged, and for all other meetings and purposes for the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., its members and others. To build, construct, erect, maintain and equip schools, mission stations and hospitals, retirement centers and recreational facilities, as the Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., may desire for carrying on its work.

To receive, administer, disburse and invest gifts, devises and bequests by or from any persons or corporations.

To issue bonds, notes, debentures and evidences of indebtedness, and to secure the same by mortgage, deed of trust or otherwise.

This corporation is organized primarily for the purpose of holding the title to such property or properties as the said WEKIWA BAPTIST ASSOCIATION HOLDING COMPANY shall, from time to time, purchase or acquire, and it shall have power, from time to time, to make such contracts and to do such things as shall be authorized and directed by the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc. This corporation shall

have no power to mortgage, sell, encumber, deed or otherwise dispose of any property without the consent and direction of the said Wekiwa Baptist Association, Inc., evidenced by resolution of said Association duly passed.

Thursday, May 16, 1963

With The

Holden Heights Baptist Church, Orlando, Florida

1. Our Moderator, Bro. Allen Higginbotham, called our Fourth Semi-Annual Session to order.

2. Bro. Walter Barnes of Holden Heights led us in the singing of "Christ Receiveth Sinful Men" and "He Lifted Me."

3. Bro. Kenneth Thornton of St. Cloud brought our devotional from the 16th chapter of Matthew, bringing out the need for real Christian Disciples. Bro. Thornton then led us in our opening prayer.

4. Deacon C. W. Heimburg of Holden Heights welcomed us to the Holden Heights Baptist Church, saying that the Church counted it a privilege of entertaining this Semi-Annual Session.

5. Bro. Higginbotham entertained a motion to seat the messengers so that we might proceed with the matter of business before us. Our Clerk, Bro. Proceedings

OF THE NINETY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION

THURSDAY MORNING - Killarney Baptist Church, Winter Park, Fla.

1. Our Acting Moderator, Bro. James Haskins, called our 93rd. Annual Session to order at 9:00 a.m. and introduced our Associational Music Director, Bro. Forrest Thompson of North Park, who led us in the singing of "Blessed Be The Name" and "Praise Him". Bro. W. H. Baker of Kissimmee accompanied him at the piano.

2. Bro. Haskins introduced Bro. Fred Farris of Palmetto, who read from Matthew 5 and led us in our opening prayer.

3. Bro. E. A. Petroff moved that we recognize all registered messengers and those who would be registered during our sessions to be seated and tend to the business of our meeting. Seconded and so moved.

4. Bro. Haskins called our attention to the printed program and asked for its adoption. Bro. Harwood Steele moved that we adopt this printed program with any necessary changes. Seconded and so adopted.

5. Our Moderator called on Bro. Robert McAllister, Mission Pastor of the Killarney Baptist Church, to give a word of welcome which he did, recognizing the new Pastor of Killarney, Dr. C. E. Landers.

6. Bro. Harold Epperson, Chairman of Committee on Committees, read the names of the Chairmen of the various Committees along with their members, and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

7. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., Chairman of Committee on Applications, stated that his committee and the Executive Committee recommends the admission of Southside Baptist Church of Orlando, and Powers Drive Baptist Church, Orlando, into our association. Seconded and so approved.

8. Bro. Haskins recognized Bro. William Jones, Pastor of the Powers Drive Baptist Church and welcomed him and his new church. Bro. Jerry Glaze was not present at this time.

9. The Moderator asked the Clerk to read Bro. Allen Higginbotham's resignation as Moderator of our association due to his accepting the call to become the Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Sebring. Bro. Edgar Cooper moved that we accept Bro. Higginbotham's resignation, and that we all appreciated the fine work he has done for our association. Seconded and so accepted.

10. Bro. Haskins called for all new Pastors to come to the front and be recognized, which they did. C. E. Landers of Killarney, Henry Garris of Lake Hill, James Parrish of First, Winter Park, W. C. Hall of Paradise Heights, and Fred Bailey of Oakland. Bro. Haskins also recognized visitors from our various churches as well as those visiting us from out of state.

11. Our Moderator asked for the Clerk to call our attention to the Executive Committee Report as found in the book of reports, which he

did, moving for its adoption. Bro. H. Fred Williams moved that we amend this motion and dedicate these Minutes in the Memory of Bro. H. P. Amos, beloved Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Kissimmee, and Director of the Stetson Extension Center, who passed away two months ago. Seconded and so moved. The Executive Committee Report was also approved.

12. Bro. Edwin Geurin of College Park led us in singing - "My Jesus, I Love Thee".

13. The Clerk read a proposed change in our Constitution: Article VIII - Committees, Section 1 - Committee on Committees, 1. Committee Time, Place and Preacher to be changed to read: 1. Place and Preacher for Semi-Annual and Annual Meetings. Also Article VIII - Committees, Section 2, Standing Committees - The Standing committees of this Association shall include: (a) Time, Place and Preacher for next meeting -- to be changed to read: 1. Place and Preacher for Semi-Annual and Annual Meetings

14. Bro. V. N. Maggard moved for the adoption of the report on the Missions Committee as found on page 1, with the change concerning the Holopaw Mission now being sponsored by the St. Cloud Church. Seconded and so approved. Bro. Maggard recognized our Mission Pastors.

15. Bro. Haskins made mention of our World Missions Report and introduced Bro. Henry Parker, President of our Florida Baptist Convention, who in turn gave some highlights of our State work. He mentioned that 17 missionaries for the foreign field came from our State this year, including the William Smith and Bob Pinder families from our Wekiwa Association. Fourteen of these were graduates of Stetson, our Baptist University.

16. Bro. B. D. Locke, our Regional Secretary of the Florida Baptist Convention called our attention to his report on World Missions as found in the book of reports, and moved for its adoption, which was seconded. He stated that Southern Baptists are alarmed at the decrease in the number of baptisms reported through our church letters last year. We need to get back to the main thing and that is reaching the lost for Christ. This report was adopted.

17. Bro. Robert New moved for the adoption of his Treasurer's Report and called attention to the fact that our disbursements have exceeded our receipts during the past year, and that eleven churches did not give anything to our associational work. The receipts were \$4,000.00 more this year than last year. Churches need to remit their monies to the associational office monthly. His motion was seconded and the report adopted.

18. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., Chairman of the Budget and Finance Committee, moved for the adoption of the proposed budget as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and after some explanation the report was accepted with the three (3) recommendations. Lake Association had withdrawn their support from our Migrant work.

19. Our Clerk read a proposed change in our Constitution - Article VIII, Committees, Section 2, (g) To read: The Budget Committee shall be composed of (1) Three members elected for three years, with one third retiring each year, elected by the Executive Committee in the

March meeting, upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee. (Rotation like the Missions Committee).

20. Bro. Harwood Steele moved for the adoption of his report on the Children's Home as presented in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so adopted.

21. Bro. Jerry Glaze moved that we accept his report on Baptist Hospitals, as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so accepted.

22. Our Clerk, Bro. Robert McAllister, stated his appreciation for the fine work Bro. James Haskins has done during this past month in helping get our program ready for our Annual Meeting, since our Moderator, Bro. Allen Higginbotham, had left our association to be Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Sebring, Fla. And the congregation said "Amen" along with the Clerk.

23. Due to our being ahead of our schedule, Bro. B. D. Locke called our attention to the coming Evangelistic Conference in Jacksonville, and the need for each Pastor to attend this heart-warming, soul-stirring meeting. He also named the outstanding preachers who will be on the program this January.

24. Bro. Locke also mentioned that our State Secretary, Bro. John Maguire was having a speedy recovery from his heart attack, and that he was in the Cleburn Hospital at Hefflin, Alabama. Mrs. Maguire thanks Florida Baptists for their prayers. Bro. Locke moved that we send a telegram to Dr. John Maguire, conveying our prayerful interest in his continued improvement. Seconded. Bro. Bene moved to amend this motion to have us send Bro. Maguire a night letter to convey our feelings. Seconded and so moved. Vote of the original motion carried. The Moderator instructed the Clerk to send the night letter.

25. The report on Florida Baptist Foundation was to have been given at this time, but due to the absence of Bro. Albert, Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., moved that we have Bro. Harold Epperson give his report on the Annuity Board. Seconded and so changed.

26. Bro. Harold Epperson stated that his report was to be found in the Book of Reports, and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

27. Bro. Haskins asked for the Chairman of the Associational Calendar of Activities, Bro. Tom Ellington, to present this proposed Calendar, but due to his absence he asked Bro. W. H. Baker of Kissimmee to present it, which he did. He moved for its approval with two necessary changes. Seconded and so approve.

28. Bro. Baker recognized the fine work of our Associational Secretary, Mrs. A. W. Jordan, in compiling this information for our Book of Reports.

29. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., asked the Moderator to recognize other new Pastors in our Association since they have arrived for our meeting. The following men were recognized: Bro. Tom Wenig of Edgewood; Milton Russ of Barton Shores; and Jerry Glaze of Southside, Orlando.

30. Our Moderator, Bro. James Haskins, had Bro. Tom Broomall come to the platform, and he introduced him as our Preacher. His Alternate, Bro. Tom Ellington was out of town, so Bro. Broomall had

Bro. Jerry Glaze come to the platform to read the scriptures.

31. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing, "Stand Up, Stand Up For Jesus" accompanied by Bro. W. H. Baker. Bro. Thompson introduced Mrs. Joyce Anderson of North Park Choir, who sang, "Breathe On Me".

32. Bro. Jerry Glaze read from Psalm 19:89-96; and from Psalm 119. He also led us in prayer.

33. Bro. Tom Broomall of Apopka, brought a message based on the Inspiration and authority of the Bible as stated in the newly published Declaration of Faith which was adopted at our last Convention meeting in Kansas City. His three points were:

- (1) Bible written by men inspired by God.
- (2) Perfect Treasury of Divine Instruction.
- (3) Salvation for its end.

34. Bro. Broomall called on our Migrant Missionary, Bro. L. E. McRae, to lead us in our prayer, remembering to give thanks for our food, which he did.

Our first session adjourned at the early time of 11:30 a.m., and at this time there were 210 registered Messengers. The Killarney Church served our meal family style, with the food already on the tables, and the people were able to go right to their tables where the ladies of Killarney served the iced tea and coffee.

35. Our second Session began at 1:10 p.m. with Bro. Haskins calling our meeting to order, introducing Bro. Henry Garris of Lake Hill, who came to the platform to lead us in our worship.

36. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing - "Leaning On The Everlasting Arms", "Amazing Grace", and "God Our Father, We Adore Thee".

37. Bro. Garris read from the 8th Psalm and led us in our prayer.

38. Bro. Haskins asked for the report on the American Bible Society, but we found that the person designated to give it was not present.

39. Bro. Haskins introduced Bro. Bill Jones of Powers Drive, Assistant Moderator, to moderate our afternoon session, which he did.

40. Bro. Jones recognized Bro. Robert New, Chairman of our Camp Joy Committee, who reported on the progress of making necessary improvements at our Camp. We now have a Caretaker's Cottage by the entrance, where our new Caretakers, Mr. and Mrs. Nabors, live. We also have new restroom facilities and Camp Director's Building. The swimming pool has been filled and the stream dredged and now used for swimming. The fine work of Bro. Jack Lindsay was mentioned in helping with our water-front improvements.

41. Bro. Jones asked Bro. C. E. Patch of the Aloma Church to give the report on Florida Baptist Foundation since Bro. Bill Albert had not as yet arrived. Bro. Patch moved for its adoption, asking that our Clerk be sure to insert the name of Gus Johnson in the last paragraph. Seconded and so adopted.

42. Bro. Jones introduced Bro. Edgar Maroon, formerly Registrar of the Stetson Extension Center, to give the report on this work. Bro. Maroon moved for the adoption of this report as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so adopted. Our new Director of this work, Bro. A. G. Hause of Florida Shores, spoke on this report, mentioning

that he needed more members on his committee and thus more promotion throughout our association.

43. Bro. Bill Jones recognized Bro. Rudy Fagan of Delaney Street as one of our new pastors coming here from the First Church of Sebring. Bro. Allen Higginbotham has recently gone there to be their new Pastor.

44. Our Assistant Moderator, Bro. Bill Jones, recognized Bro. Edgar Cooper of North Park to give us some information concerning his interest in the establishing of a Baptist Junior College in our State. Bro. Cooper mentioned the fact that this matter will be brought again to the State Convention and be voted on. He asked for our prayerful consideration of this proposal, as he felt that we needed a Baptist Junior College.

45. Bro. Jones recognized our Migrant Workers, Bro. and Sister L. E. McRae, and had Bro. McRae come to the platform to tell of their work, which he did. We have four of our churches sponsoring regular services in as many migrant camps: Orlando, First; Pine Hills; Apopka, First; and New England Heights. He asked for more churches to consider sponsoring a Migrant Camp to have regular services there. Mrs. J. L. McKinney announced that Bro. J. Ed. Taylor of the Home Mission Board, in charge of Migrant work in South Carolina, Georgia, and Florida, is in our Association conducting a survey, and that he is to speak at the Associational W.M.U. meeting at Walnut Street next Tuesday.

46. Bro. Edgar Cooper moved that we have Bro. Harold Epperson, Chairman of the Committee on Nominations, find the report for the American Bible Society, so that we can have it in our Book of Reports. Seconded and so ordered.

47. Bro. Bill Jones called our attention to our program and asked to hear any nominations for the office of Moderator.

48. Bro. Edgar Cooper nominated Bro. James Haskins for Moderator. Bro. W. A. Lockler nominated Bro. H. Fred Williams. Bro. Harwood Steele moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so moved. Bro. Jones asked for a consensus of opinion concerning how to vote for Moderator, and stated that we voted by standing last year. The Clerk called our attention to the Constitution, which states that we need to elect by secret ballot in the case where there is more than one nominated for an office. Bro. Jones asked for the distribution of the ballots.

49. Bro. Edgar Cooper moved that the one receiving the least number of votes be considered elected to the office of Vice-Moderator. Seconded and so ordered. While the ballots were being tabulated, Bro. Jones asked that we continue our election of officers and consider the office of Treasurer.

50. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., moved that we have our present Treasurer, Bro. Robert New, to continue in this office. Seconded. Bro. Harold Dann moved that nominations cease. Seconded and so ceased. After unanimous vote for Bro. New, Bro. Jones cast a designated ballot for Robert L. New for Treasurer.

51. Bro. Bill Baker announced that from the ballots counted, Bro. James Haskins was elected as our Moderator, and Bro. H. Fred

Williams as our Vice-Moderator.

52. Bro. V. N. Maggard moved that Mrs. Sarah Jordan, our present Associational Secretary and Assistant Treasurer, be elected Assistant Treasurer again. Seconded and so elected by unanimous vote.

53. Bro. A. G. Hause stated that we should amend the Constitution in regards to the election of an Assistant Treasurer. We should do this next year.

54. Miscellaneous Business:

(1) Bro. V. N. Maggard moved that we instruct the Committee on Committees to nominate 6 more people to serve with Bro. Hause on the Stetson Extension Committee. Seconded and so ordered.

(2) Bro. A. G. Hause moved that there should be a change in our method of presenting the Report on the Deceased. According to our Constitution, the Committee has the privilege of using any method they desire.

55. Bro. Forrest Thompson, Chairman of our Radio and Television Committee, reported that he has obtained the equipment and has this set up at the North Park Church for recording purposes. Plans are under way to have a radio ministry on four radio stations in the Orlando area. They plan to have 14-minute programs packaged which will include good Gospel music, Baptist Promotional Materials, and short devotional messages. We need to encourage our Baptist businessmen to purchase time for these programs. Bro. Thompson moved for the adoption of this report. Seconded and so adopted.

56. Bro. Bill Jones asked for Bro. James Haskins to take the Chair, which Bro. Haskins did.

57. Bro. Bill Jones reported on the Associational Church Recreational program, stating that it composes of Associational-wide skating parties: first Tuesdays for the Juniors, and the third Tuesdays for the Intermediates at Skate City. Bro. James Haskins recognized Bro. Tom Ellington of PineCastle as being one of the Convention-approved Church Recreational Leaders in our Association, and that he has helped us a lot, especially in our Camp programs.

58. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing - "Jesus Is All The World To Me".

59. Bro. Haskins asked for Bro. Robert Murphy to give the report on Evangelism, and since he was out of town, Bro. Robert Mc Allister moved for its adoption as it is found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so adopted.

60. Our moderator, Bro. James Haskins, recognized Bro. Rudy Fagan of Delaney Street, who came to the platform to speak on this vital subject.

61. Bro. Rudy Fagan read from I Corinthians 13, and brought a message on LOVE'S RESPONSE.

62. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing - "My Jesus I Love Thee".

63. Bro. Haskins asked for us to stand and called on Girod Cole, Jr. to lead us in our closing prayer, which he did.

64. Our third session was called to order by Bro. James Haskins at 7:30 p.m. Bro. Haskins introduced the Music Director of Killarney, Bro. Don Lingle, who in turn led us in singing - "O Worship The King"

and "Love Divine, All Love Excelling".

65. Bro. Milton Russ of Barton Shores read from II Corinthians 5, and from Matthew 6, calling our attention to motives for Christian service. He led us in our prayer.

66. Bro. James Haskins called on Bro. Tom Ellington to present his report on the Cooperative Program, found in the Book of Reports. He called our attention to the four recommendations listed and moved for its adoption. Seconded. Bro. Haskins introduced our speaker, Bro. Charles Peterson, Director of Promotion for our State Convention, and Chairman of our visiting state team. Bro. Peterson mentioned the recovery of Dr. John Maguire, our Executive Secretary of the Florida Baptist Convention, in the Hospital at Hefflin, Alabama. He is recovering from a heart attack. The Maguires send their thanks for our prayers.

Bro. Peterson mentioned the two tracts available to our churches: "This is the Cooperative Program", and "Mission Motives". Bro. Peterson stated that our state gave more to the Cooperative Program than any other state except the state of Texas. The First Baptist Church of Orlando, here in our association, gave over \$51,000 to mission work through the Cooperative Program, and this is the first church ever to give over \$51,000 to the Cooperative Program in our state. We need to hear the heartbeat of a needy world, and then give to help meet this need. The report was adopted.

67. Our Moderator, Bro. James Haskins, asked for Bro. Bill Jones of the Powers Drive Church, and Bro. Jerry Glaze of Southside, Orlando, to come to the front with any of their members present and receive the right hand of fellowship by Bro. James Haskins and the Chairman of our Missions Committee, Bro. V. N. Maggard.

68. Bro. Don Lingle led us in singing - "Blest Be The Tie That Binds".

69. Bro. Haskins asked for the Messengers attending our evening session to be sure to register before they left the meeting.

70. The Killarney Church Choir, under the direction of their Director of Music, Bro. Don Lingle, brought us a special song.

71. Bro. Edgar Cooper of North Park moved for the adoption of his report on United Christian Action, as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded and so ordered. He introduced Bro. Kenneth Hanson of the Main Street Church, Jacksonville, and Secretary of United Christian Action, Inc. The title of his message was AMERICA, MY AMERICA, and he brought out the fact that alcoholic beverages were deceptive, destructive, and deadly to America, and that we needed to rise up and fight against this menace.

72. Bro. Haskins had Bro. Hansen lead us in our closing prayer, after which he declared our third session adjourned until Friday morning.

FOURTH AND FINAL SESSION

73. Our Moderator, Bro. James Haskins, called our meeting to order at 9:00 a.m., and had Bro. Forrest Thompson lead us in singing.

74. Bro. Haskins introduced Bro. Louis Taylor, Mission Pastor

from Prairie Lake Baptist, who read from John 14 and Galatians 2:20, and brought out the need for us to die daily to self and live daily for Christ. He then led us in our opening prayer.

75. Bro. H. Fred Williams of Winter Garden moved for the adoption of his report on Baptist Literature and the Baptist Witness as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded. He introduced Bro. Grady Snowden, Sr., who spoke on our Florida Baptist Witness, which is our state paper. He cited the need for more of our churches to have the Baptist Witness in their Budgets and be sent into our Baptist homes. Report was adopted.

76. Bro. Haskins had Bro. Bill Jones preside and Bro. Jones introduced Bro. Allison Banks, our visiting speaker, who reported on the work of our Baptist Retirement Center. Since we did not have this report in our Book of Reports, it was agreed by common consent to have this report included in our book.

77. Bro. Bill Jones had the new Pastors to stand and introduce themselves.

78. Bro. Bill Jones asked for the Digest of Church Letters by the Clerk, but the Clerk asked permission to have it presented during the time for Miscellaneous Business. This request was granted. Changing places.

79. Miscellaneous Business:

(1) Bro. Harold Dann moved that we place Bro. Hansen's message in our minutes if there is enough room, and if it will not add to the expense of publishing it. Seconded and so moved.

(2) Bro. W. A. Lockler suggested that the Committee on Retirement Center be retired. Bro. Haskins moved that this Committee, with commendation, be released from its function. Seconded and so ordered.

(3) The Clerk moved that we change the Constitution by amending ARTICLE VIII, Section 1, Number 1 - Committees - to read: Place and Preacher for Semi-annual and Annual meetings. Seconded and accepted after some discussion.

(4) The Clerk moved that we change the Constitution by amending (a) ARTICLE VIII, Section 2 - Committees - to read: (a) Place and preacher for Semi-annual and Annual Meetings. Seconded and so accepted.

(5) The Clerk moved that we amend the Constitution (g) ARTICLE VII, Section 2 - Committees - to read: The Budget Committee shall be composed of (1) Three members elected for three years, with one third retiring each year, elected by the Executive Committee in the March meeting, upon recommendation of the Nominating Committee. (Rotation like the Missions Committee). Seconded and so adopted.

(6) Bro. Harold Epperson presented the nominations for additional Committees naming the Chairmen and their members. He moved for their election. Seconded and so elected. The Committees named were:

(1) Associational Church Recreation Committee, Bill Jones, Chairman.

(2) Six additional members to the Stetson Extension Committee,

Bro. A. G. Hause, Chairman.

(3) Visual Aids Committee, Dewey Stone, Chairman.

(4) Bro. A. G. Hause's name added to the Committee on Public Relations.

(7) Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., stated that there should be some clarification in regards to accepting new churches in our Association. That we should consider changing the second paragraph under Membership so as to read: Other Baptist Churches may be admitted for membership in this Association by making application through the Executive Committee of the Association at the September meeting of the Executive Committee. Bro. Haskins stated that there should be a special Committee set up during this year to study any needed changes in our Constitution or By-Laws, and in the Articles of Incorporation.

(8) Motion made to instruct the Clerk to write a letter to the First Baptist Church of Orlando, commending them in being the first church of our state to give over \$50,000 to world missions through the Cooperative Program. Seconded and so ordered.

(9) Bro. Bill Jones recognized Dr. and Mrs. J. C. Hockett of Apopka who have so faithfully served on the Sunday School Board for so many years -- especially with The Builder.

80. The Clerk gave the Digest of the Church Letters, stating that this was incomplete since all of the church letters were not in yet. Colonial and Zellwood churches had not reported. The First Baptist Church of Orlando reported 101 baptisms with College Park having 94 and Riverside 81. The First Baptist Church, Orlando, reported 192 additions by letter and College Park with 168 and North Park 152.

81. Bro. Leonard Jones, Chairman of Committee on Place and Preacher gave this report:

(1) Semi-annual meeting on April 30.

Bro. Jones moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

82. Bro. Tom Broomall, Chairman of the Resolutions Committee, gave his report as found recorded on another page. He moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted.

83. Bro. Edgar Maroon, member of the Committee on Nominations, presented the names of those to bring reports at our next Annual Meeting, and moved for their adoption. Seconded and so adopted. Found on another page.

84. Bro. Forrest Thompson led us in singing - "He Keeps Me Singing", accompanied by Bro. W. H. Baker.

85. Bro. Jones introduced Mrs. J. L. Mc Kinney, Associational W.M.U. President, who presented her report as found in the Book of Reports, and moved for its adoption. Seconded. She called special attention to

our plans for Baptist Jubilee during this coming year. Report adopted.

86. Our Associational Training Union Director, Bro. Steve Croft, called our attention to his report found in the Book of Reports, and moved for its adoption. Seconded and so adopted. He called for our support of our new Director, Bro. Ed. Smith.

87. Bro. W. A. Lockler of Miller, presented the Sunday School Report as found in the Book of Reports and moved for its adoption, with any necessary corrections, and the election of the various leaders as so nominated in his report. Seconded and so ordered.

88. Bro. Forrest Thompson gave his Music Report as found in the Book of Reports, and moved for its adoption. Seconded. He mentioned the fact that our Association places third in the state now, which is a great improvement over our record of past years. This coming year there would be special attention given to help the leaders of the various graded choirs. So adopted.

89. Bro. Girod Cole, Jr., moved that the Moderator appoint a Committee to work on the clarification of our Constitution in regards to the giving of the various reports, and just when the certain Committees should begin to function. Seconded and so ordered, after some discussion.

90. Bro. A. G. Hause of Florida Shores read from the 14th Chapter of Revelation, verses 12, 13, and had our memorial service for our Beloved Dead. Bro. C. E. Patch read the list of names of the deceased from the Churches. Bro. Hause introduced Mr. and Mrs. Clark, Gospel Singers called the Happy Clarks, who sang "Beyond the Sunset". Special mention was made of the ongoing of the beloved Pastor of First Baptist Church, Kissimmee, Dr. H. P. Amos, who had served our association so well as the Director of the Stetson Extension Center. We all stood as Bro. Hause led us in prayer.

91. Bro. Ed. Geurin moved for the adoption of his report on Christian Education as found in the Book of Reports. Seconded. He introduced our speaker, Bro. Hugh Hawkins, Pastor of the Bay Street Church in Eustis, who read from Mark 4:24 and spoke on Motive-Budget your members to His training. After this message, the motion was made to extend the time which was seconded and so extended. Bro. R. D. Gregg voiced his opinion that we only had one Baptist School and moved that we have the wording changed to read - that Florida Baptists had one school, Baptist Bible Institute. Seconded. Bro. Fagan stated that Florida Baptists do own Stetson in the same way that Florida Baptists own our Seminaries, like Southern Baptist Seminary in Louisville. The vote was taken on the amendment to strike out the word "two" and place the word "one", and failed. The vote was taken on the adoption of this report, and it was adopted by majority. Bro. Haskins asked for the shov of hands for those desiring to give Dr. Parrish his full time to speak and by common consent this was granted.

92. Bro. Haskins recognized Bro. Charles Lawhon, former Pastor of Plymouth, and one of our Foreign Missionaries to the Phillipines.

93. Bro. Bill Jones recognized all of our Department Leaders and associational officers, having the new officers and their wives come to the platform and he presented the gavel to our former Vice-Mo-

erator, and now newly-elected Moderator, Bro. James S. Haskins. Bro. Haskins stated his gratitude for the cooperation of all the members of the Executive Committee as well as the officers of our association, and Bro. Bill Jones for being his able Assistant. Bro. Haskins called on Bro. E. A. Petroff of Forest City to lead us in a prayer of dedication, which he did.

94. Bro. and Sister Thompson sang - "How Beautiful Upon The Mountains Are The Feet of them that Bring Good Tidings", accompanied by Mrs. Steve Croft at the piano.

95. Our Moderator introduced our speaker, Dr. James Parrish, the new Pastor of the First Baptist Church, Winter Park, and formerly Vice-President of Stetson. Dr. Parrish spoke on "Preserving Main Street, U.S.A." His three points were: The Court House on Main Street, the Little Red School House on Main Street, and the White Frame Church House on Main Street. He used Psalm 33:12 for his text. He cited the need for us to guard against the encroachments of our various freedoms, and Christians are not to be a sponge to soak up the blessings of Almighty God, but we are to be a pipe-line through which the grace of God will flow through to bless others.

96. The motion was made to adjourn, and Bro. Haskins called on Dr. Parrish to lead us in our closing prayer, after which the Ninety-Third Annual Session would be ended.

97. Bro. Parrish led us in our closing prayer.

- PALMETTO - Lost our Pastor, Bro. Ed. White, and called Bro. Fred Farris to be our Interim Pastor. Constructed our second Educational unit.
- PINE HILLS - Constructed building for our mission, Sheeler Heights.

- RIVERSIDE - Purchased adjoining property and using house for more educational space. Purchased Pastorium at Plantation Estates.
- TANGELO - Lost our beloved Pastor to the cause of world missions. Bro. Bob Pinder and his wife accepted by the Foreign Mission Board.
- WALNUT STREET - Built new sanctuary.
- WOODHAVEN - Built new Pastorium, and began construction of new sanctuary.
- ST. CLOUD, FIRST - Called new Pastor, Kenneth Thornton, from Brookneal, Va., on January 1, 1963. Sponsoring the Holopaw Mission.
- TAFT - Constructed new Sanctuary.
- UNION PARK, FIRST - Remodeled Sanctuary, as well as enlarging it.
- WINTER GARDEN, FIRST - Celebrated our 75th Anniversary on August 25, 1963. Called new mission Pastor, Bro. Dwight K. Brower.
- ALOMA - Changed our name from East Side of Winter Park to ALOMA.
- WINTER PARK, FIRST - Lost our Pastor, Bro. Lane Patrick, to Stetson, and called Dr. James Parrish, Vice-President of Stetson, to be our new Pastor, August 1, 1963.
- KILLARNEY - Lost our Pastor, Bro. Maurice Barnes, to the First Church, Key West, and called Dr. Clayborn E. Landers from St. Joseph, Missouri, where he served as Superintendent of Missions. Dedicated the two-story educational building and former Sanctuary, to beloved Deacon, Joel P. Phillips, in his memory. Our Mission began construction on their new building.

Cooperative Program

The Cooperative Program! What is it? It is the fundamental, effective, indispensable channel through which individuals and churches give to finance the Southern Baptist Mission Program at home and abroad. This is the challenge and faith as Southern Baptists, to support God's kingdom's work. TOGETHER, we support all our common endeavors.

There are three Programs, developed and presented to the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention by our Cooperative Program and Stewardship Commission, that are of immeasurable value.

1. The FORWARD PROGRAM of Christian Stewardship.
2. A modified program of the Forward Program has been offered. It is for churches up to 300 in membership. It is called GROWTH in CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP. These two programs help the local church develop giving and givers.
3. YEAR-ROUND STEWARDSHIP DEVELOPMENT is third. It is to be offered in 1964. Its purpose: "to keep Stewardship perennially before our people".

WE RECOMMEND:

1. That our churches give attention to World Missions in October, Cooperative Program month. One Wednesday night during the month is given to prayer for this cause.
2. Every church put the Cooperative Program in the budget on the percentage basis.
3. That the 2-Plus Plan be used. This is, each church giving at least 2% more of the total budget to Missions through the Cooperative Program.

4. That the churches select the Stewardship Program best fitted for them and promote it. All materials are to be ordered from the Forward Program of Christian Stewardship and Growth in Christian Stewardship office.

Associational Missions

We are happy to report that the work of our Hospital Chaplain goes forward, and that it is continuing to bear fruit in winning of souls, and the ministry of comfort and healing. We are grateful for the work of T. W. Page, our Chaplain, who is so admirably qualified in every way for this wonderful work.

This special ministry is a good way to show our love for those confined to our hospitals. This ministry has been rich and fruitful this past year. Visits and contacts made: 2,549, with 5 professions of faith. Jesus said, "I was sick and ye visited me".

S.B. Hospitals

Baptist Hospitals are concrete demonstrations of a Christian response to human need. They came into being as a result of the teaching and example of Jesus, the Great Physician. They are channels for communicating the Gospel to the sick and troubled, and to anxious families and friends. They are evidences of Baptist concern to the experience of disease, disability, and death.

As of the end of 1962, there were 48 Baptist Hospitals located from Miami, Florida to Yuma, Arizona; and from Kansas City, Missouri to

San Antonio, Texas. Most of these are owned and operated by State Conventions of Southern Baptists. The ownership of some is in the hands of local associations. Southern Baptist Hospital in New Orleans and Baptist Memorial Hospital, Jacksonville, Florida, are owned by all Southern Baptists and operated in their behalf by a Southern Baptist Convention Agency.

During the year covered by this report, the Convention's two (2) hospitals operated at near capacity. The combined total of 800 beds were occupied by 35,953 patients. An average of 97 new patients were admitted each day. More than 1,500 individuals received part-pay care in the two institutions during the year. Cared for without charge by staff physicians, these people were encouraged to pay hospital costs as they were able, and they did so. Still, the net cost of this program amounted to \$429,570. The allocation of \$25,000 from the Convention Cooperative Budget was applied fully to these costs, leaving a balance of over \$400,000 to be supplied from other sources, mainly operating income of the hospitals.

On the larger scene, ALL Baptists hospitals reported charity services totaling in excess of \$6,000,000 during 1962. To meet these needs, all Southern Baptists supplied their hospitals with slightly more than 1,000,000. It becomes obvious that Baptists should do more through their Cooperative Program giving.

As is the case of almost all other Baptists hospitals, the two institutions owned by the Convention are engaged in expanding and developing their facilities. The New Orleans Administrative Committee, under Chairman C. J. Briant, together with administrator Raymond C. Wilson, began construction of two units of the first phase of a program that will, by addition and re-development of 200 beds, bring Southern Baptist Hospital to a total of 600 beds, plus auxiliary facilities for the resident house-staff, parking, laundry, and power plant.

Baptist Memorial Hospital has received intensive study throughout the year. Chairman Hardy Harrell of the Jacksonville Administrative Committee and Administrator Lawrence R. Payne, have led in surveys that indicate the need to proceed with long-range development of the institution into a medical center complex. Whether this should be attempted is under active consideration; confidence has been expressed that doubling present capacity would likely not meet even current needs.

Lest too much emphasis be given to projects and buildings, statistics and dollars, a final word should recall that through their hospitals, Southern Baptists minister to PEOPLE. Hospital personnel are mindful that, along with skill, Christian compassion requires large resources in understanding and faith. This degree of concern for each and every patient and his family makes a very Christian difference!

Many churches have already made their plans to participate in this wonderful and worthwhile endeavor! It is our hope and prayer that every church and every mission will cooperate.

Our association is making preparation now to take part in the new Sunday School Witnessing Campaign in January, 1964. In this way we will enlist our members in witnessing and winning others to Christ!

Baptist Literature & The Florida Baptist Witness

"For as much as many have taken in hand to set forth in order a declaration of those things which are most surely believed among us...It seemed good to me also...To write...That thou mightest know the certainty of those things, wherein thou hast been instructed." These excerpts from Luke 1:1-4 set the pattern for the writing of the Gospel that the early Christians might be more perfectly instructed in their faith.

These same words seem an appropriate background for the work of those who edit and publish Baptist Literature that has become vitally important to our Christian Living and to our churches and denomination. These same publications become tools of Evangelism, Missions, and Stewardship, both in the churches and in the missions established by them.

Southern Baptists continue to increase and speed up their publication efforts and the circulation of their periodicals just as rapidly as our constituency will use the publications. For example, during nine months of 1962 (the fiscal year was changed) the Sunday School Board printed and mailed to the users in 50 states and 92 foreign countries 63,003,152 copies of its periodicals, 1,521,149 copies of new books and related

items, 151,817,875 reprints of similar old items, and 11,520,615 Baptist Bulletins.

The other boards, agencies, and auxiliaries of the Southern Baptist Convention have growing subscriber lists for their particular periodicals such as The Commission (Foreign Missions Journal), Home Missions Magazine, Brotherhood Journal, Ambassador Life, and all the Woman's Missionary Union publications.

The 28 Baptist state papers, at the 1963 Convention in Kansas City, reported a total circulation of 1,513,194 copies per issue as of January 1, 1963. Thus, of the state papers alone, some 78,000,000 copies were mailed last year.

THE FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS, our own state paper, (as of August 1, 1963) is going into 65,189 homes in 895 different churches, with 759 of these churches using the Budget Plan for at least a portion of their membership. An increasing number are sending the paper to every resident family. One hundred thirty-six other churches have small clubs of subscriptions. Some thirty to thirty-five thousand Baptist homes in Florida, however, are not yet receiving the paper. There are also still 432 Florida Baptist churches which are saving a little and losing a lot by failing to take advantage of the most economical medium of information which they can possibly provide their members, a subscription to the FLORIDA BAPTIST WITNESS.

We would urge every church which now sends the WITNESS into only part of its homes to enlarge its subscription list to include every resident family, and every church sending the paper into the homes of all its members. The paper is still available through the Church Budget Plan for the low cost of \$1.20 per year, which may be paid in installments of only 10¢ per month for each family on a church's subscription list.

There is no more speedy or economical means toward a better informed, more completely enlisted, more thoroughly generous, more genuinely missionary membership than for a church to send the BAPTIST WITNESS to every family in its membership through the simple Church Budget Subscription Plan.

Brotherhood

The Brotherhood work got off to a good start with a Workshop at Delaney Street church. The meeting was well attended by all officers but especially by the R. A. workers. Each church Brotherhood officer received instructions and help in the duties of his office. Our own associational workers were assisted by the State Brotherhood Secretary, G. A. Ratterree, and his associate, R. W. Galbraith.

Three of our associational quarterly meetings were held at Camp Joy with an average attendance exceeding 185 men. We featured personal stewardship, Christian witness, and R.A.'s at these meetings, while our July meeting held at Delaney Street featured world missions with a motion picture showing the missionaries at work in Africa.

One of the regional Leadership Conferences, sponsored by the State department, was held at North Park Church in December and was

well attended by men in this area. There are now more than 1,092 churches in the state with Brotherhoods and more than 30,000 men enrolled. The Evangelistic World Missions Conference held in Orlando drew men from all over the state to hear Baptist leaders acclaim the cause of missions.

Our associational Brotherhood sponsored two weeks of camping for our boys at Camp Joy. The first week was attended by 54 campers and 17 staff members. More than half this number made decisions during the week. The second week we had 66 campers and 12 staff members. This week saw 12 boys make commitments for full-time Christian work, 10 boys rededicated their lives, and one made his decision to follow Christ.

The entire staff is to be complimented on the fine work that was done. Our Associational R. A. Leader for this year was Victor Crust.

All of the officers who served with me this year did a splendid job and I want to thank each of them for doing their work so well. We are looking forward to another year of Brotherhood growth under the leadership of the new president, John Boyles.

MUSIC

The year 1964 should be a very significant one for Baptists in America. This is the third "Jubilee Year". It should be a year when every Baptist member and church endeavors to reach its maximum for God in celebration for His goodness during the years of organized Baptist life in America. In order to reach every church and to inspire and lead it to maximum service, the Associational Music Ministry Organization stands as a key to whether or not all these churches will have the benefit of participation in this "Jubilee Year". To this end these activities are planned, in which each church may participate. Our Associational Church Music Festival will be held January 24th and 25th, 1964, and our School of Church Music will be held August 24th-28th, 1964. The places for these events have not been chosen at the time of this writing.

Our 1963 Associational Church Music Festival was held in January at the Killarney Baptist Church in Winter Park. There were 11 churches represented with 839 musicians participating, 375 visitors and a total present of 1214. The Annual School of Church Music was held in August at North Park Baptist Church. In cooperation with our forthcoming Radio Ministry, a radio workshop choir was featured as a part of this school. One hundred thirty-six singers represented 21 churches in our Association. Seventy-nine awards were earned.

Our Associational Music Ministry will continue its efforts to provide a personal relationship with those churches that need help in specific areas of their church music program. The members of our committee stand ready to assist in any way that they can when called upon.

ANNUITY BOARD

1. Benefits Paid: More than \$41 million have been paid in relief and annuity benefits by the Annuity Board since its beginning in 1918. Last year these benefits totaled more than \$3 million, and were paid to more than 4,500 ministers and denominational workers or their families, who were members of a retirement plan, and to approximately 750 on the relief rolls.

2. Membership in Retirement Plans: As of April 1, 1963, there were 15,964, or 49% of the total churches in the Southern Baptist Convention participating in the Annuity Board's retirement program for their pastors. Out of a total of 212 educational institutions, hospitals, children's homes and homes for the aged, 121 are enrolled in an Annuity Board retirement plan with their employees. Total membership in all the Board's retirement plans is approximately 25,000.

3. Participation within Wekiwa Association: Of the 56 churches (not including our missions) in the Wekiwa Association, 35 are participating in the Annuity Plan. Being both scriptural and missionary in its scope, we are striving toward a goal of 100% participation. Your Associational Annuity Committee would be willing to be of help to any church or pastor interested in this program. The participating churches are as follows: Kissimmee, First; Apopka, First; Conway, First; Altamonte Springs; Orlando, First; St. Cloud, First; Winter Park, First; Azalea Park; Aloma; Beulah; Barton Shores; College Park; Delaney Street; Fairview Shores; Forrest Park; Ft. Christmas; Holden Heights; Hyland; Killarney; Lucerne Park; Lockhart; Miller Memorial; North Park; New England Heights; Pine Castle, First; Plymouth; Pine Hills; Prairie Lake; Riverside; Starke Lake; Tangelo; Trinity; Walnut Street; and Powers Drive. East Orange Chapel also participates.

4. Special Death Benefit added to Southern Baptist Protection Plan: The Southern Baptist Protection Plan now provides a special death benefit for all members, both ministers and denominational workers, under 40 years of age. It covers both natural and accidental death. If the member dies a natural death before age 40, the benefit provides a cash settlement to the member's widow or estate, equal to the average salary on which dues are paid. If he dies because of an accident, the cash settlement will be double the average salary.

There is no added cost for this special death benefit, which is in addition to the regular retirement, widow and disability benefits of the Protection Plan. The benefit is easy to figure. Suppose a member dies at age 32 of natural causes, and the average salary on which he had paid dues in the Protection Plan was \$3,550. His widow or estate would get a cash settlement of \$3,550, plus the regular widow benefits. If he is killed accidentally, his widow or estate would receive twice this amount, \$7,100, plus regular widow benefits.

5. Cost of Retirement Program: The total cost of the retirement program is 15% of the pastor's salary up to the maximum salary basis of \$4,000. Of this 15%, the church pays 10% and the Florida Baptist Convention pays 5%. The 5% which the Convention contributes

is money that comes from the Cooperative Program gifts of the churches in the state. If a church does not contribute enough money to the Cooperative Program to cover its proportionate 5% cost of the retirement program, it means the other churches have to bear this expense.

6. Field Representatives: The Annuity Board field representative for Florida is Phil Maxwell. He promotes the Board's retirement plans, trying to enlist all those pastors, churches and denominational employees who are not enrolled in the program in Florida. Rev. Maxwell is available to speak to a group in the church or association, or for personal conferences about any phase of the Annuity Board's work. His address is: 1105 Sarasota Drive, Tallahassee, Florida.

7. Officers of the Annuity Board: Administrative officers of the Board are: R. Alton Reed, executive secretary; Floyd B. Chaffin and L. T. Daniel, associate secretaries and directors of development; Fred W. Noe, associate secretary and director of investments; B. J. Chenault, comptroller-treasurer; Owen Henley, assistant director of investments and Mable H. McCartney, registrar.

The Florida Baptist Foundation

The Florida Baptist Foundation, an agency of the Florida Baptist Convention concerned with the support of all causes fostered and/or supported by the Convention, has had another great year of service. During the first nine months of the year, every agency and institution supported by the Convention has been named in wills prepared by the Foundation. In the years to come, money received from these wills will greatly help all these institutions.

The Foundation is concerned with assisting men and women in preparing wills favoring Baptist causes, setting up trust funds, and establishing endowments. At this time, annuity contracts are not written by the Foundation, but are referred to the Home Mission Board, the Foreign Mission Board, or the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. It is hoped that in the near future, it will be possible to enter this field.

The audit of September 30, 1962, shows \$792,204.83 held by the Foundation, compared to \$730,012.21 held at the same time the previous year. None of this money is owned by the Foundation, but it is held as specified by the trust or will covering the particular fund. No part of these funds can be spent except as specified in the agreement.

Partial settlement of one large estate has been received, and final settlement is expected soon. The part received by Baptist causes will amount to more than \$80,000.00.

Professional guidance is available to the Foundation in the field of investments. The Trust Department of the Florida National Bank, Jacksonville, makes suggestions as to investments, which are voted on by the Investment Committee of the Foundation before investments are made. Remarkable progress has been made in the investment field, and earnings are considered good.

The Foundation operates under the direction of fifteen of the best qualified and finest Baptist laymen, and one pastor. These trustees meet annually to receive reports from committees, and determine general policies. An Executive Committee is elected from the trustees, and serves in operational matters. These trustees serve without compensation, and pay their own expenses in connection with all meetings.

Your Secretary, Gus Johnson, expresses appreciation to the Executive Secretary-Treasurer of the Florida Baptist Convention, and to all convention employees for their helpful cooperation. He also expresses his appreciation for opportunities to discuss the work of the Foundation in various associational meetings. He has worked with the Sunday School Department, the Training Union Department, the Brotherhood Department, the Woman's Missionary Union, and in Schools of Missions this year in getting across the message of the place of the Foundation in Baptist life.

Christian Education

"Education with a plus!" is one of the ideas included in our attempt to describe Christian Education. Concerned with the physical, mental, and social development, our educators strive to see that the content and process of our educational institutions are presented and interpreted in the light of the teachings of Christ. It is only when this "plus" is included in our educational processes that we feel justified in the tremendous investment we have made in terms of money and lives.

We are interested in having, in our schools, a workable balance between academic freedom in the classroom and a practical sense of responsibility on the part of all teachers and professors in our schools. This balance can only come about through earnest cooperation on the part of our Denomination and our schools.

With the opening of Mobile College and Houston Baptist College this fall, Southern Baptists will be operating seventy-three schools: 6 seminaries and a joint operation with National Baptists of another seminary; 35 senior colleges; 19 junior colleges; 7 academies; and 5 Bible schools. Two of our junior colleges are now in the process of becoming senior colleges.

Baptist Colleges now enroll about one in five of Baptist students in college and the ratio will probably be about one in ten in the next eight years. This will largely be due to unlimited expansion of facilities of public institutions as over against limited expansion of our Baptist schools to meet the demands of the day. This places upon our Baptists institutions added responsibility in recruitment. Total enrollment in Baptist Colleges 1962-63 reached a record high of 80,987. Graduates during the academic year totaled 10,922. Total assets of Southern Baptists educational institutions now stands at \$392,408,610. of which \$97,654,943. is endowment.

SEMINARIES

Our six seminaries, from the oldest to the newest, are constantly improving the quality of their work and striving to include in their curriculum the studies, research, and practical experience to prepare our future leaders for their many responsibilities. Courses of study and practice are made available for the training of pastors, ministers of religious education and church music, missionaries, denominational workers, teachers, church social workers and others. These seminaries, located at Louisville, Kentucky; Ft. Worth, Texas; New Orleans, Louisiana; Mill Valley, California; Wake Forest, North Carolina; and Kansas City, Missouri, are well located so that our potential leaders from all over the Convention have easy access to them.

Florida Baptist Educational Institutions

Florida Baptists have two schools: Stetson University, the oldest university in Florida, located at Deland, and Baptist Bible Institute located at Graceville. During the 1962-63 term there were 2,686 students enrolled in Stetson University, 501 of whom were Baptist young people.

Baptist Bible Institute offers special training for students who do not qualify for college training. Total non-duplicating enrollment for the year 1962-63 was 225.

A joint committee from the Stetson Trustees and the Convention, authorized by the Florida Baptist Convention, has been working in the direction of bringing about a closer relationship and understanding between Stetson and the Convention. This committee will report at the Convention this fall in Jacksonville.

The Ford Foundation's grant of one and one-half million dollars to Stetson, is made on this basis: for every \$2.00 that we raise, up to a maximum of \$1,500,000, the Ford Foundation will give \$1.00. Plans are being completed for the raising of funds.

As a people, Baptists believe in Christian Education. We know that we must have the very best leadership for our churches, institutions and denominations in the years to come. Let us strengthen our institutions, guide our Baptist young people to attend our Baptist schools, and undergird the administrations, faculties and student bodies with the spirit of love and constant prayer.

Field Secretary's Report

The Wekiwa Baptist Association is made up of messengers from the 56 independent Cooperating churches and 9 church-sponsored chapels, located in Orange and Osceola counties. The Association convenes semi-annually in May and in its annual session in October. An Executive Committee, composed of the pastor and one layman from each church, functions in monthly meetings between sessions to guide the work. These churches, through their gifts, provide a budget in

excess of \$20,000.00 with which to finance the mission program of the association. The churches sponsor chapels and other mission work in addition to this and share, on a percentage basis, in a world mission program through the Cooperative Program.

The programs of the association are divided in four major divisions: Administration, Mission, Education and Promotion. Missions and church extension makes surveys of unchurched areas and unmet needs in institutions, enlists churches in beginning and sponsoring such and leads in purchasing lots in strategic locations.

Education involves assistance in leadership of various organizations as: Sunday School, Training Union, Missionary Union, Brotherhood, Libraries, Vacation Bible Schools, Migrant Work and Camp Work. The Camp was used by approximately 2,500 since September 30, 1962, and approximately 100 made commitments to Christ.

The School of Missions proved a blessing by informing our people and inspiring them to greater mission endeavor. There were 42 churches participating with 38 holding classes and 4 having only the missionary speak. There were 24 conversions, 16 volunteers for Mission Service, 334 addresses made, at a total cost of \$2,609.77; and each missionary receiving an honorarium of \$31.40.

From the Wekiwa Association, two pastors and their families were appointed to foreign fields of service - the Rev. William Smiths and the Rev. Robert Pinders.

Surely God's hand can be seen in this tremendous growth, His blessings and guidance are evidenced by the outreach of the churches that make up this fellowship. When we think of the lost who have been won to Christ, of the Christians who have been enlisted, trained and used in His Kingdoms work, of the missionary program which has been carried out at home and abroad, we can only say "The Lord hath done great things for us whereof we are glad".

But the past is meant only to be a challenge for the present and the future. When the children of Israel came to Kadesh-barnea the first time, they failed to enter the promised land because of unbelief. They stood at the gate of golden opportunity and refused to possess the land God had given them. It took forty years of hardship and failure to finally convince them that when God presents the challenge and opens the door of opportunity, He will give the grace and strength needed to do it.

There are spiritual achievements which can be ours if we have the faith to accomplish them. There are many areas we need to move into with renewed determination.

First - Bible Study that we may be what God's will for our lives is. Let us begin the new year with the January Bible Study of the book of Ephesians.

Second - is that of Evangelism. Never before has there been such desperate need to win men to a saving knowledge of Christ. The terrible, frightening tensions of our time can only be met by those who are empowered by Him and committed to His purpose. May we lead our people to commit themselves by having Soul-winning Commitment Day on the first Sunday in January. Surely each church will want to WIN THE LOST IN THE SUNDAY

SCHOOL by sharing in the Sunday School Witnessing Campaign January 26-31, 1964, and the JUBILEE REVIVAL CAMPAIGN, March 22-April 5, 1964. This will be the harvest time.

Third - is that of Stewardship. Our Baptist people of this great association can make a lasting impact upon Central Florida if we are willing to give God our talents, time, and treasure. Let us give thanks this day that we can be "laborers together with God".

Fourth - is Church Extension. Take the gospel to the people by extending the ministry of our church beyond its walls. Start a mission.

State, Home, And Foreign Mission

Statistical figures can never tell the story of missionary endeavors. At best they can only give a rough idea of the visible evidences of accomplishments, always leaving the story of dedicated service of God's servants as they try to meet spiritual needs in Jerusalem and into the uttermost parts of the earth.

The State Mission program is faced with the difficult task of keeping up with the enlargement and extension in the many areas of need. Endeavoring to keep up with the need for new churches will call for the attention and efforts of all. During 1962-63, we started twenty-four (24) new churches and one hundred and ninety-seven (197) missions, making a total of two hundred and twenty-one (221). Southern total in the 30,000 program for 1956-63 is 19,117. Florida goal for 1963-64 is forty (40) new churches and two hundred and fifty (250) new churches for the total time.

Plans are well under way for developing the new Florida Baptist Camp on Lake Yale near Leesburg - Eustis.

The Home Mission Board now has 2,100 missionaries, most of whom serve under twenty-six (26) State agreements. Seven hundred and thirty-eight (738) are serving as chaplains. In addition to these there are five hundred and ninety-five (595) Summer Student missionaries. All the missionaries reported 48,700 professions of faith for the year.

Growing out of a meeting of six hundred and forty-nine (649) associational missionaries in Gulfshore Baptist Assembly on associational development, a ministry program is now being tested in fifty (50) associations.

Our people are encouraged to take advantage of the special rates on the Home Mission and Commission magazines, thereby keeping themselves informed on mission progress.

Foreign Missions personnel shows a steady gain with one hundred and twenty-nine (129) appointments in 1962, and forty-seven (47) from January to May in 1963, bringing the total in active service to 1,685 serving in fifty-three (53) countries. These appointments have in no way supplied the need as there were seven hundred and ninety (790) urgent requests for new missionaries in 1962. The most pressing needs are in the field of evangelism, church development, theological education, nursing, student work and religious education.

By the end of 1962, the appointed missionaries and 2,701 national pastors reported 3,783 churches and 685 chapels had enrolled 433,379 in Sunday School and baptized 35,509, bringing total church membership to 487,943.

Through our eighteen (18) hospitals and forty-six (46) clinics and dispensaries, fifty-five (55) missionary doctors, eighty-two (82) national physicians, fifty-six (56) missionaries and two hundred and seven (207) national nurses have served 328,898 patients during the year. The in-patients for this period numbered 35,144.

Foreign Mission receipts for the year amounted to \$19,673,232.93. Gifts through the 1962 Lottie Moon Christmas offering accounted for \$10,323,591.69 of this. World Missions depend upon the faithful dedication of God's people and churches to a world responsibility expressed in their giving through the Cooperative Program. Pray, work, and give -- in order that our world may know.

Stetson Extension

The Stetson Extension Center began its sixth year of operation October 3rd, at the First Baptist Church of Orlando. There were 23 enrolled in the first class, "The Life and Letters of Paul", taught by Rev. Jose Cardoso. The second class, "Comparative Religion," and 21 enrolled, for a total enrollment of 48, counting the four staff members. This represents a total of 28 people. Eleven Baptist churches and missions, two Methodist churches and 1 Lutheran church are represented. Last year the total enrollment for the first semester was 57, and 34 for the second semester.

This is the second year the University has offered college credit through the center. This is possible in both courses being taught this year, each of which will last for two semesters. For the first time this year, school teachers may receive credit on certificate extension in both classes. Over 50% of those registered are for college credit. An added benefit is offered as a bonus for those who desire Church Study Course awards by taking these courses.

Again this year the Wekiwa Baptist Association office in the First Baptist Church of Orlando is serving as an information and registration office for the center. This is a great convenience to the prospective students and to the center.

The second semester will begin January 30th, 1964. The assistance of every pastor and other church leaders is urgently requested in keeping this opportunity for growth before our people.

Florida Baptist Children's Home

If you haven't visited our Children's Home at Lakeland or the Branch at Miami, we urge you to do so soon. It is a wonderful inspiration. Our home provides Christian training and care for children from broken homes. These children live as families, with house-mothers in charge,

who love these children as only one who has been called by God to this field of service can. These boys and girls attend three of the Baptist churches in Lakeland. They are active in RA's and GA's and have daily Bible study and devotions in their cottages, prayer meetings on Wednesday evenings in their chapel on campus.

There are 190 children at the homes now, plus 436 being assisted during the year, with four in foster homes and 15 being rehabilitated. Also, there are 52 on Mother's Aid. This program provides help for families that the children might remain in their own home. A case worker visits in the home once each quarter for counseling with the mother and children. The parents must cooperate with the policies of the home for this type help. The children must attend and become a part of the local Baptist church, and must attend school if possible.

The children under care of the home are those from homes broken by illness, lack of strength of parent to carry responsibility of family; inability to provide support; desertion; divorce and alcoholism. Many times the Home is able to rehabilitate the parents and the families are reunited under supervision of case workers.

The W. M. U., Sunday School, Training Union and other church related groups give help by sponsoring a child. This is good for our churches and the child. When a Sunday School class, or others, sponsor a child, this lets him know someone cares, also, blesses the ones giving. These groups help by sending spending money, clothing and other personal needs. There are 72 children being sponsored by church groups in our association this year. We hope many more churches will share in this ministry. It is a real blessing. The Thanksgiving offering is one way all churches can help.

Religious Forum Week is one of the Hi-Lites of the year. The children and staff from both campuses come together for one week each year. This is for training, group study, activity and fellowship. Leaders for this occasion come from churches all over the state. Please pray and support this work for these children. Take a group from your church and visit the home. You will be glad you did.

American Bible Society

The American Bible Society is an active partner of Southern Baptists in the missionary task of sharing Christ with the whole world - a task which calls for the widest possible distribution of the Scriptures.

People must have the Bible because it presents Jesus Christ, the one hope of men and nations.

Each person must have the Bible in his own language because it speaks to his heart as no other language can speak.

In most countries, people cannot afford even the cost of printing the Scriptures.

The Bible is the essential tool of missions and evangelism. The missionary uses it in all his work. The Bible itself is a missionary. It can go where the human missionary cannot go. It can stay on after he must leave - and keep on speaking to a person's heart.

The American Bible Society helps missionaries to translate the Bible, publishes without note or comment and distributes without profit, usually below cost. For the Blind, it supplies Scriptures in Braille and other raised-letter systems and on Talking Book records.

During 1962 the American Bible Society -

**rejoiced that some part of the Bible has been published in 1202 languages; the full Bible in 228, a Testament in 285 more, a Gospel or other complete book in 689 more - but still faced the task of translating the Scriptures into another 1,000 or more languages.

**extended its work to 40 additional countries and provided almost two-thirds of the year's total of nearly 50 million Scripture volumes distributed by all the Bible Societies of the world. Especially encouraging was its overseas distribution of almost 17 million volumes, which was a remarkable increase of 49 per cent over the year before.

**gave almost a million Scripture volumes for distribution by Chaplains to our Armed Forces and Veteran's Hospitals, as a vital link between the home churches and men in service.

**sought new ways for reaching people who have little or no acquaintance with the Bible. Among these new approaches is a program throughout Latin America, in which Christian laymen are recruited and trained, in evening courses, in the evangelistic distribution of the Scriptures in their own communities, under the direction of their own churches.

**continued to expand its distribution of Scriptures to persons of special needs in our own land; people with different language backgrounds; victims of disasters; people in crowded problem-filled "inner-city" areas; patients in hospitals and nursing homes; persons in jails, reformatories and prisons; migrant farm workers -- and many others.

Annual Report Fla. Baptist Retirement Centers

In recent years there has been a growing interest in services and care for the elderly. The reason for this concern is obvious. In 1900 the number of those in the age group of 65 and above was between three and four million. Now they number 17 million, and it is estimated that by 1970 there will be twenty million. Before the turn of the Century, there will be over twenty-five million over 65 years of age.

This age group in Florida is growing at an unprecedented rate. Statistics vary somewhat, but it is estimated that in our state there are 600,000 who are 65 or older and that 50,000 are Baptists. What a tremendous challenge and responsibility we Florida Baptists have concerning our own ministers, widows of ministers, missionaries, and the host of laymen and laywomen of our churches who have given much of their time and talents in service for the Lord.

The Baptist Retirement Center is dedicated to the task of providing for these servants of the Lord in their declining years. It is such momentous task that we will probably never be able to provide facilities, service and care for all our people who would like to come to a retirement center to live. But we have, in these few years, made a good start.

On the 23-acre site in Vero Beach, given to the Florida Baptist Convention by Mr. and Mrs. Walter Buckingham, we have now five buildings -- the Buckingham home, the main building which is motel-type in an H shape, and three duplex apartment buildings. In the main building are the spacious lobby, office, dining-room, kitchen, four two-room efficiency apartments, two two-room suites, and 21 single rooms, two of which are infirmary rooms convertible into resident rooms. In addition there are furnace, rest, utility, and laundry rooms.

Since the last Annual Report, we have added the east wing to our main building. This brings the property value up to approximately \$450,000.00. We are happy to report that by the time the Convention meets for its annual session we will be free of all indebtedness, including the new east wing.

At present we have 26 residents. These include missionaries, pastors' widows, and fine lay people of our churches who have served the Lord faithfully in Kingdom work. We have facilities for four or five more, but expect all vacancies to be filled in a short time. The service we render is necessarily limited to residents who are able to care for themselves. We have neither facilities nor personnel to care for nursing or convalescing patients. There is a definite need in this field and we are hopeful that the Convention at some time in the future, might look favorably upon our entering this phase of the work. The question is, what will we do with our residents when they become incapacitated and need nursing care?

The need for our service to the elderly is growing. This is recognized by all major denominations, and by our state and federal governments. As the need grows, we hope we can continue to expand our facilities and service and as Florida Baptists do our part in meeting this need. We are grateful for sharing in the Cooperative Program which is helping us to expand our facilities and service.

United Christian Action Report

United Christian Action, Inc., is the service agency formed and supported by Baptists and representatives of 12 other Evangelical denominations to seek Christian solutions to the problems of alcohol, gambling, indecency, and other related moral evils in Florida. For the first time in several years, very encouraging signs appear on the horizon, indicating a renewed willingness on the part of Christian people to take forceful action to halt the destructive inroads being made by the forces of evil in our midst. A strong and concerted effort was launched by Baptists and other Evangelical Christians in Florida for action by the 1963 legislature to improve the moral tone of our state. Activities included:

1. A Legislator-Pastors Prayer Breakfast, the second day of the legislative session. This breakfast was attended by Governor Farris Bryant and members of the State Cabinet, over 100 members of the Senate and House of Representatives, and a large representative group of pastors from churches throughout Florida.

2. Legislation was sought to remove all beer, wine, whiskey sales from grocery, drug, filling stations, and other retail family shopping outlets.

3. Sunday Observance Laws were sought to close non-essential businesses on Sunday.

4. Strong opposition was expressed against any extension of gambling, including bingo, and any loosening of restrictions on the alcohol industry.

Unfortunately, both the Beer Ban and Sunday Observance bills were defeated. But legislation to PERMIT bingo and state lotteries was defeated. Even though the objectives sought were not achieved, the legislators of our state really felt the weight of the moral forces on our people.

As we look ahead, the following signs are encouraging: (1) In spite of an unprecedented advertising and promotional campaign to secure increased sales of beer, wine and whiskey, statistics show the liquor traffic is barely holding its own, rather than forging ahead, in the per capita consumption of alcoholic beverages. (2) In spite of the persistent and unrelenting pressures of the liquor trade to gain more privileges and more liberalizations, an awakening public is beginning to count the cost of alcoholism in human suffering, in disintegration of family life, in economic attrition to the individual and the community, and in wasted human and economic resources resulting from the advertising sale and use of beer, wine and whiskey.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

1. Do a better job of acquainting our church members and the public at large with the cause and cure for the constantly increasing alcoholism, crime, domestic conflict, juvenile delinquency, drunken driving, etc. United Christian Action will be glad to provide free all helps needed for such an educational program. This includes speakers, films, charts, and literature of all kinds, and it is available upon your request.

2. As individuals, and as church families, give our young people

regular, clearcut, uncompromising leadership through positive teaching and example of church leaders, both pastor and people, to understand and accept total abstinence as the practical, happy, constructive, Christ-like approach to the moral problems of our day. We must not procrastinate in our efforts. By the end of 1963, Florida will have more than 17,500 legalized beer, wine, or whiskey outlets, in which those who drink will spend over \$500,000,000.00 to purchase and consume more than 70,000,000 gallons of beer, wine and whiskey. Florida is afflicted with more than 250,000 alcoholics and the problems they create for their own families and communities in which they live is a challenge to the church and all of the members. Let all of us unite our hands, our heads, our hearts in giving, voting, and encouraging each other that we might help those who sit in darkness to see the great light.
