### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS OF THE

#### Sunday School Convention and Missionary Union of the New River Association.

ARTICLE 1. This organization shall be known as the Missionary and Sunday School Union of the New River Baptist Association.

ART. 2. This body shall be composed of Pastors, Superintendents of Sunday Schools and Messengers appointed by the Churches and Sunday Schools of this Association.

SECTION 2. Each Church and Sunday School shall be entitled to three Messengers each.

ART. 3. The officers of this Union shall be a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be elected by ballot annually, at the first meeting in the Associational year.

ART. 4. At the first meeting in each Associational year there shall be appointed or elected three Standing Committees, consisting of three or more members each: first, a Committee on Nominations; second, a Committee on Ways and Means; third, a Committee on District Superintendents.

ART. 5. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Nominations to select subjects for discussion, and to nominate who shall open each subject.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Committee on Ways and Means to carefully survey and canvass our mission field and churches, encourage and take collections for mission work, confer and co-operate with the Executive Committee of the New River Association in our mission cause, and also to look after and encourage Sunday School work within our bounds, and to report the interest of the same to each meeting of this body.

ART. 7. The Association shall divide into four Sunday School Districts and each district shall have a District Superintendent elected once a year.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the District Superintendent to organize, superintend and see after the Sunday School cause.

ART. 9. All funds collected at each meeting shall be transmitted (through the clerk) to the Committee on Ways and Means.

ART. 10. This Constitution may be amended only in the following manner: Any proposed amendment must be made in writing at one meeting and if a majority shall vote in favor of the same, it shall lie over until next meeting for final action; if then a majority vote in favor of it, then the Constitution shall be so amended.

On motion adjourned to 9 a. m. to-morrow. The moderator dismissed with prayer.

7 p. m.—After offering prayer, Elder N. T. King preached from John 4-35 and Elder G. T. Leitner closed with prayer.

#### SATURDAY OCTOBER 23, 1897.

9 a. m. Devotional service conducted by Elder D. L. Phillips after singing read Epheseans iv, offered prayer. Prayers by Bros. Joseph Thomas, J. H. Robuck and W. H. Bailey,

comments by Elders G. T. Leitner, B. H. Daimon and Samuel Godwin.

9:40 a. m. After singing the moderator called meeting to order and read Romans xii. Prayer offered by Elder P. W. Corr. Letters called for and read and delegates further enrolled Standing Committees on ensuing year announced.

11 a. m. Elder G. T. Leitner, after reading Romans v offered prayer and preached an impressive sermon from Roman 5-10. Prayer offered by Elder L. W. Kickliter. Dismissed with a song to 1:30 p. m.

#### AFTERNOON.

After singing Elder P. W. Corr stated that the moderator on account of the sickness of his wife could not be with us this afternoon, and requested that he preside for him. Therefore he would call the Association to order by calling on Elder N. T. King to offer prayer and especially for the sick and sorrowing. After prayer Elder P. W. Corr was elected moderator, protom. The committee reported and recommended that Corinth church be received in full membership of this Association, on motion, adopted. The moderator gave the hand of fellowship, on motion, adopted. The moderator gave the hand of fellowship and cordial welcome to the delegates. Reports on nomination recommended that the next meeting of this Association be with the Antioch church on Wednesday before the

Report on Finance received and adopted.

Report on deceased Ministers and Deacons received and adopted. Mark "I".

Brother T. E. Getson, From the Santa Fe Association, welcomed as a visitor. On motion Bros. H. O. Barry and James Strickland were excused. Report of Executive Committee was adopted and marked J.

On motion, the following brethren were elected as the Executive Committee: J. M. Malphurs, C. M. Priest, W. H. Pinholster with the Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer.

Bro. J. M. Malphurs offered the following resolutions: Resolved, That the hearty thanks of this body is due and are hereby tendered to this church and the citizens of this community for their kind welcome and hospitality. Adopted,

Resolved, That the Treasurer pay the Clerk \$18 00 for the printing of the minutes, and \$12 00 for getting up and mailing the minutes. The resolution was adopted,

SUNDAY, OCTOBER 24th,

Devotional services led by Elder Samuel Godwin; read the 6th of Hebrews and offered prayer: Elder A. J. Pinholster led in prayer; Brother Thomas Cason read the 95th Psalm; special prayer by Elder G. T. Leitner for the distressed Moderator.

The Association called for the Treasurer's report, which was read and adopted.

On motion, this Association stands adjourned, after the Missionary sermon, to meet with the Antioch church on Wednesday before the fourth Sunday in October, 1898.

WE, your Committee on Publications, recognizing the power of the press, would recommend, first and above all prayerful and daily reading of the Holy Scriptures, graciously given us of God, and eminently profitable for doctrine, for reproof, for correction, for instruction in righteousness, that the man of God may be perfect, thoroughly equipped for all good work and able to procure salvation through faith in Jesus Christ. Secondly, that it is from literature read and comprehended that sentiments for weal or woe are imbibed. We would emphasize the fact that we cannot be too particular as to what we read, nor attach too much importance to the matter of publications and their potential powers to mould and build up character for time and eternity. Thirdly, we would therefore recommend the utility of our own denominational publications, of which the Florida Baptist Witness is first in importance to Florida Baptists—it being the only standard beacon published by and for our denomination in the state. Fourthly, we would recommend the Texas Baptist Standard as being theologically sound and also worthy of our patronage. Fifthly, we also recommend the works of J. M. Pendleton on the distinctive principles of the Baptist. Sixth, we also recommend the work of J. A. Scarboro entitled *Go-ology*, or the Theology and Philosophy of Missions, and we would recommend for general informations on missions The Home and Foreign Mission Journal. Seventh, to our Sunday Schools we would earnestly recommend a liberal use of the publications of the Southern Baptist Convention, and also the literature published by our grand old American Baptist Publication Society, all being safe and sound. Your Executive Committee report that on the adjournment of your last Association we met and employed Elder J. J. Clark and put him to work as our missionary.
