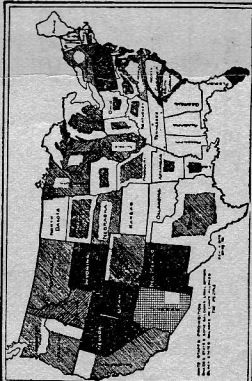

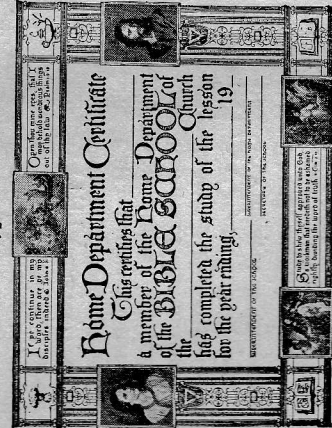

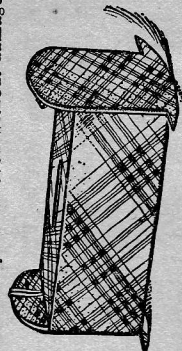

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association and shall be composed of ordained ministers who have membership in or who are pastors of churches in the Association, and accredited messengers who are members of constituent churches, and of such others as may be invited to a seat by the consent of the body.

Art. 2. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty members. Any church wishing to sever its connection with this body may be allowed to do so upon an application duly made to the Association, while in session, and a letter granted thereon. All members of standing committees shall be honorary members of this Association.

Art. 3. Churches are expected to send with their messengers letters to the Association, containing an account of their state, particularly of the additions or diminutions of the last year, and other statistics of interest, together with full statistics of the Sunday schools under their charge. The letters should show what said churches are doing for the cause of Christ at home and abroad, and generally to whatever relates to their own peace and prosperity; and with them each church should forward money for the printing of the minutes, and also their contributions for missions.

4. Baptist churches desiring admission into this body shall petition by letter and messengers, and on giving satisfactory evidence of their being sound in the faith of the Gospel, and correct in practice, may be received by a vote of the Association; and the Moderator, in behalf of the body, shall give their representatives the right hand of fellowship.

Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by separate ballots, continue in office until others are chosen, and discharge the duties usually incumbent upon such officers.

Sec. 2. There shall be an Executive Committee, which shall be composed of seven members; the Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer of the Association being members and officers ex officio, the other four members to be elected by the Association.

Art. 6. We acknowledge the independence of particular churches, and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association, and therefore we would disclaim all power of making laws for them under any pretext whatever, but we deem it our duty to disown any church that we may consider unworthy of fellowship.

Art. 7. This Association will be governed while in session by regular and proper rules, and every motion made and seconded shall command the attention of the body unless withdrawn by the mover.

Art. 8. Every question asked in the letters from the churches must be based on the Scriptures, and may relate to the faith, practice and church discipline, but the same shall not be taken under consideration except by a majority vote of the body.

Article 9. Churches composing this Association shall be entitled to as many copies of the minutes of its proceedings as the money sent up with the letters calls for, but each constituent church shall have at least one copy.

Art. 10. When a church shall neglect to make a communication to the Association for three consecutive years, it shall be considered as having withdrawn and shall be dropped by vote from the minutes, unless two or three members of the Association request its continuance, and will engage to enquire into its standing to report at the next meeting of the Association.

Art. 11. It shall be the duty of the Association, from time to time, to suggest to the churches what they think most expedient to be done to promote the spread of the Gospel in the world, and to give the best advice possible in cases of difficulty, and also to enquire into the cause of failure on the part of any church to report itself by letter and messengers at the annual meeting.

Art. 12. This Association, when convenient, shall appoint the time and place of the next annual meeting, taking into account the convenience of the churches and the interest of the cause. This constitution may be altered or amended from time to time as experience may suggest, by a two-thirds vote of those present.



MINUTES.

The thirty-seventh annual session of the New River Missionary Baptist Association met with the Starke Baptist Church, Bradford county, Florida, October 14, 1908. After singing and prayer Elder F. B. Johns read part of 8th chapter of Romans and preached from Rom. ix: 16. Benediction by E. H. Reynolds.

AFTERNOON.

Rev. L. D. Geiger read I Ps. and offered prayer. The Moderator being absent the meeting was called to order by Clerk F. L. Colson. I. W. Pinholster was elected Moderator pro tem. Visitors and messengers invited and welcomed. J. D. Crosby as correspondent from Central Association, J. M. Deveneau from Santa Fe Association and J. E. Black from St. Johns Association; Bros. J. W. Hilton and Bunch as visitors from Santa Fe Association, Bro. H. C. Peelman and wife from Beulah Association, Bro. L. D. Geiger representing the State Board of Missions and Bro. E. H. Reynolds representing the State Convention and Jacksonville Association.

Report of Committee on Religious Exercises.—That Bro. L. D. Geiger preach tonight and Bro. J. H. Roebuck conduct devotional exercises at 9 a. m. tomorrow and that Bro. C. M. Brittain preach at 11 a. m.

The Association adjourned until 7 p. m.
Night session.—After devotional exercises Bro. L. D. Geiger read first chapter of Acts and preached from eighth verse, offered prayer and took up a free-will offering of \$6.70 for state missions.

THURSDAY.

After devotional exercises conducted by Bro. Roebuck, the Moderator called the Association to order and appointed the following committees:

Bro. C. M. Brittain, from Beulah Association, representing Columbia College, was noted and welcomed. By motion the report on Missions be made a special order of the last day in connection with the missionary sermon. By motion the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That hereafter the Moderator of the Association be required to appoint the chairman of all committees at least two weeks before the meeting of the Association each year and to notify the appointees either in person or by mail of such appointment and instruct them to have their reports prepared before the assembling of the Association.

By motion article 1 of the Constitution and By-Laws of this Association was amended to read as follows: "This Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association, and shall be composed of ordained ministers who have membership in or who are pastors of churches in the Association, and accredited messengers who are members of constituent churches, and of such others as may be invited to a seat by the consent of the body."

By motion Bro. C. M. Priest was enrolled as a messenger from Beulah church. By motion Bro. C. M. Brittain was allowed to use his discretion for the preaching hours. After a song and prayer by Bro. Bunch, of Gainesville, the Association gave way for the preaching service. Bro. C. M. Brittain read eleven verses of first chapter of II Peter and preached and lectured from fifth verse. After sermon a collection of \$9.32 was taken for Columbia College for current expenses.

Committee on Religious services reported that Elder J. E. Black preach tonight at 7 o'clock, and J. M. Deveneau conduct devotional exercises at 9 a. m. tomorrow and Eld. H. C. Peelman preach at 11 a. m. Dismissed by Bro. Brittain.

AFTERNOON.

After song and prayer the Association was called to order by the Moderator. Report read on Temperance as follows:

We thank our Heavenly Father that temperance has become a matter of great consideration with our people. We recommend that it be the great consideration of the churches until the great evil of intemperance is removed from our state and nation. We find that the sale of intoxicants in prohibited territory has been prohibited by the mercy of God and the hard efforts of the temperance people.

Remarks on the report made by J. M. Johns, E. H. Reynolds, Sr., J. W. Hilton and H. C. Peelman and adopted. Report read on Periodicals as follows:

It goes without controversy that information is essential to progress in any sphere of life. It is no less true in the things of the kingdom of God. As we know His will and purpose, we feel the obligation of obedience and we know something of the things that are being brought to pass by Him through His people and we feel inspired to attempt more for Him. In the Bible we know more of His will and purpose; in the periodicals of our denominations we can know something of what He is doing through us as His people. Observation and experience teach us that the well informed Baptist is the interested and active and efficient Baptist. The great burden of our denominational work is done by those who have brought themselves into close touch with the denominational life through its periodicals. With very few exceptions, those who do not read the denominational papers contribute very little to the work of the denomination, either of money or influence. Pastors, therefore, would not do a better thing for themselves or their people or the denomination than to induce their people to take and read the denominational paper. The organ of Florida Baptists is the Florida Baptist Witness. It is owned and operated by the Convention. It stands at the very center of the Convention's work. It is our only medium of communication and information. Nowhere else can we know of our denominational work than through the Witness. As our people read it more and more they will advance in power and usefulness. We need the paper in every home, the paper needs the loyal support of the entire brotherhood. We would urge that all the churches seek to place the Witness in the homes of all their membership in order that all our people may be brought in touch with our great denomination and informed as to its great work. We recommend for the use of our Sunday schools the literature of the Sunday School Board of Nashville. We also urge that the Home Field, the

organ of the Home Mission Board, and the Foreign Mission Journal, the organ of the Foreign Mission Board, be united as near as possible among our people for information about the work of home and foreign missions.

Report read on Letters and Queries as follows:

Query—Should Baptist churches receive into their fellowship divorced persons who have not a scriptural right for a divorce? If not, what should they do with those they already have? Answer—Let them bring forth fruit worthy of repentance after a careful examination as to conversion.

Discussed by J. E. Black, C. M. Brittain, H. C. Peelman, J. M. Johns, J. W. Hilton, B. Dyal and M. W. Lee, and by motion the report on Letters and Queries was tabled until next morning. The discussion was continued Friday morning by J. E. Black, J. S. Clark, J. H. Roebuck, W. L. Heathcote and Mrs. H. C. Peelman and adopted. These resolutions on divorce law were adopted:

Resolved, That it is the sense of this Association that all divorce laws on the statute books of Florida, except the one based on the teaching of the Bible, should be repealed, and that no divorce should be granted by our laws except on the Bible ground; and

Resolved, That we consider it the duty of pastors and others to keep up an agitation among the people with a view to creating such a sentiment as shall finally result in the abolition of the divorce evil.

Report on Nominations.—We, your Committee, beg leave to report that the next session of this body be held with the Lawtey Baptist church and that Elder James Strickland preach the introductory sermon.

Adopted. Report by Committee on Sunday Schools read as follows:

We, your Committee, are sorry to report that we find only six Sunday schools reported to this Association. Now, brethren, we would like to know the cause of this. Are there only six Sunday schools among the churches of this Association? Or is it carelessness on the part of the churches in making up their letters, or what is it? There seems to be negligence somewhere and we would like to find it and a remedy for it.

We, your Committee, beg leave to report that we see the necessity of Christian education and we recommend Columbia College for securing the same.

Adopted. The Association adjourned till 9 a. m. Friday.

NIGHT SESSION.

After song and prayer service Elder J. E. Black read Luke xiii and preached from 8th and 9th verses. Dismissed by E. H. Reynolds.

FRIDAY.

After devotional services the Association was called to order by the Moderator. By motion the minutes of the W. M. U. be printed with the minutes of the Association. By motion a resolution of thanks was extended Bro. L. W. Kickliter, as follows:

Resolved, That this Association tender our sincere thanks to our Bro. L. W. Kickliter for his faithful and able services as our Moderator for the past years, and that we express to him our sincere regrets and sympathy for him in his present illness and we regret that he has been debarrred from the pleasure of attending the Association and that we have lost thereby the inspiration of his presence and the help of his wise counsel; and be it further

Resolved, That the Association now offer prayer for his speedy recovery to health and to the work of the Lord.

Bro. F. C. Edwards led in prayer. Report on Deceased Ministers and Deacons read as follows:

We find that one deacon has been called from our midst to his reward. We humbly submit to God's will.

Adopted. Next was read report on Woman's Work:

We are glad to report more work accomplished by the women of our Association during the past year. The W. M. U. of Starke church has given for missions and benevolence \$146.55. The Ladies' Aid Society has paid out for local church work \$78.60. Young Ladies' Philathea class has given for missions \$45.45.

If the ladies of this Association could only realize how great the need is for their work and how much they could do for our Master through organized effort, we would have missionary societies, young women's auxiliaries and heart beam bands in almost every church. We pray that God will stir up the hearts and minds of our women on this subject of woman's work, and may a consecrated leader be found in every church who will organize and carry on the work outlined by our State W. M. U. We would recommend that our women subscribe for and read the Foreign Missionary Journal, the Home Field and Mission Field, also the Florida Baptist Witness. These are all very good and will keep us informed about our work. We would also recommend that our women take more interest in the Orphanage at Arcadia. Make up a box of good things to eat and send to the orphans. They enjoy a surprise of that kind as much as one's own children do. We recommend and pray that every pastor in this Association do all in his power to create and stimulate interest in woman's work in the churches.

Discussed by F. C. Edwards, H. C. Peelman and Mrs. Peelman and adopted. By motion the following named brethren were elected as a committee to look after ministerial aid and to keep the matter before the Association, viz: F. B. Johns, S. Godwin, L. W. Kickliter, F. L. Colson and J. E. Black.

By motion F. B. Johns, L. W. Kickliter, J. H. Roebuck, W. M. Parker, S. Godwin, M. W. Lee and F. L. Colson were elected as Executive Committee.

By motion the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, first, That a committee of five be appointed by the Moderator to look into the matter of the employment of a missionary evangelist to labor within the bounds of the Association for all of his time or for such part of his time as may seem profitable; and, second, in case it does not appear practicable for this Association to employ a missionary evangelist for full time, this committee be instructed to meet with the Santa Fe River Association at Waldo October 23d, either in person or by representatives to confer with that association with reference to co-operating with us in the employment of a missionary evangelist upon such basis as this committee and that association or a similar committee from that association may agree upon; and, third, that this committee be instructed to report to the Executive Committee of the Association as soon as possible, and that the Executive Committee be given full power to act.

The committee on the above resolution to be composed of F. C. Edwards, L. W. Kickliter, Jesse Thomas, D. W. Pinholster and J. C. Poppell. Report read on Finance as follows:

We find that the churches sent up for associational purposes and for minutes and Clerk \$25.65, for foreign missions \$3.85 and for the Orphanage \$4.31.

Report adopted. The following resolution of thanks was read and adopted: Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the church and citizens of Starke and the surrounding community for the hospitality and kind manner in which they treated us during the session of the Association.

Report of Executive Committee.—Your Committee met with the first Union after the Association and appropriated \$1.50 per month to Bro. Larramore to pay his traveling expenses to Long Branch church. We also paid Bro. Damon \$10. We have paid during the year \$50 to help Bro. James Strickland in DeLand College; we have also appropriated some for state missions, which the Treasurer's report will show. On account of no funds we have not been able to employ any missionary to labor within the bounds of our Association during the past year, but we hope the pastors and churches will bestir themselves toward a greater effort in missionary work the coming year.

Report on Missions.—Your Committee on Missions beg leave to report as follows: He who has closed his eyes to the necessity and importance of missions has shut out of his life the true conception of God and His love, for missions is simply God at work through His people for the salvation of the world. If God

has chosen to save man He has also chosen the means by which He will save. (It pleased God by the foolishness of preaching to save them that believe.) "By grace are ye saved through faith," "faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God." How can they hear without a preacher? How can they preach unless they be sent? The command has come to "go into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." And we have no more right to violate this command than we have to violate the command, "Thou shalt not kill," and the man who withholds his means when there is opportunity for the use thereof from the support and spread of the Gospel is as guilty before God as the man who dishonors his father and his mother. It is true that Paul plants and Apollo waters, but God gives the increase, but it is also true that God will hold Paul responsible for the planting and Apollo for the watering. The most glorious conception of God is His provision for the salvation of lost men. The most glorious work in which mortal man can be engaged is to be chosen of God to carry His message of love and hope and cry it among the perishing millions of earth. There is really nothing else for the child of God to do than to go at the command of his Father, whether that command be to his kindred at his own door or to the darkness of heathendom. This Association gave the past year, according to the letters, about \$400 for all missionary work, which was about 50 cents per member; a good many gave more than this amount. There must, therefore, have been some who did not give anything to this the greatest of all objects. We notice from the reading of the letters from the churches that some of them make no report on mission work. Some of these have taken collections and sent them off, but no report has been made of it to this body. We would urge upon church clerks the importance of making to this body accurate reports of all moneys collected and disbursed for all purposes by the churches and Sunday schools. We would urge the pastors to keep the great cause of missions before their people and seek to get at least one contribution each quarter for some department of mission work from each member. We recommend that hereafter the several departments of mission work be assigned to separate committees to be reported on separately before this body. (Adopted.)

At 11 a. m. F. C. Peelman read Rom. xii and preached the missionary sermon from Rom. i: 14, 15, 16. After the sermon the Association was called to order by the Moderator. By motion the Association sustained the pledge of \$10 made by Bros. L. W. Kickliter and A. C. Odom, Jr., from this Association to Columbia College for current expenses. A collection of \$6.33 was taken to be paid on the \$10 pledge.

By motion this Association adjourned to meet with the Lawtey Baptist church on Wednesday before the third Sunday in October, 1909. Dismissed by H. C. Peelman.

The Woman's Missionary Union of the New River Association met in the Methodist church at Starke, Fla., October 15, 1908. The following churches were represented: Starke, New River, Lawtey and China Grove. The Vice-President, Mrs. F. A. Scott, called the meeting to order and conducted devotional exercises. Mrs. J. M. Devenean led in prayer. Mrs. F. C. Edwards read a letter from Miss E. S. Heck concerning enlistment month. Miss Zola Johns, of New River, read a paper prepared by Miss Spaulding on the same subject.

Mrs. Scott then gave a short talk on the importance of organizing and maintaining missionary societies in our Association. Mrs. H. C. Peelman, of Lake Butler, then addressed the meeting, outlining especially the methods of organizing and conducting W. M. U. She also spoke interestingly of the orphanage at Arcadia. Mrs. F. A. Scott, of Starke, was elected Vice-President of the W. M. U. of the New River Association for the next year. A collection of \$1.70 was then taken for the Orphanage.
