The thirty-eighth annual session of the New River Missionary Baptist Association met with the Lawtey Baptist church, Bradford county, Florida, October 19, 1909. After singing and prayer Elder James Strickland read II Peter ii, and preached from 1st verse.

Report on Religious Exercises. That E. H. Reynolds preach tonight at 7 o'clock, that J. E. Black lead the devotional exercises at 9:30 a. m. and that G. A. Blount preach missionary sermon at 11 a. m. tomorrow.

THURSDAY.

Bro. Black read 19th Psalm as introductory to devotional exercises.

Report on State Missions. We, your Committee on State Missions beg leave to report the following: We find from a strict canvass of the letters from the churches \$33.53 sent up. Brethren, this looks bad, what is the matter? Is not state missions our Judea? Is it not our duty to evangelize our own state? Is it not our duty to preach the Gospel in our own beloved state as elsewhere? Let us look to the needs of our State Board more than we have. How many they need the Gospel over Florida, for how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard, and how shall they hear without a preacher, and how

shall they preach except they be sent? There are many corners in our state without the Gospel light. We urge the needs of the State Board.

Discussed by Brethren Black, Edwards, L. W. Kickliter and E. H. Reynolds. Bro. Blount read 2d Psalm and preached from Matt. vi: 16, and Luke ii: 2, "Thy kingdom come." This was a treat full of the missionary spirit.

Afternoon.

The Association called to order by the Moderator. Prayer by Bro. J. C. Pop-pell. Petitionary letter from Sampton City church was read, asking for re-rolment. Request granted.

Report on Ministerial Education. Education is essential for every vocation of life, but for none more so than for the messenger who speaks for God. No young minister knows what use the Master may have for him later in life, so better equipped for service he may be the wider will be his range for usefulness. Not only must he know the Scriptures and how to expound them, but he must be acquainted with the times when they were written, be able to refute the false assertions of the enemies of Christ and the opposition of "science," falsely so called. God uses many humbler people for the accomplishment of his purposes, yet he has need of the best talents on earth, for when the great law-giver was to be elected it was the educated Moses, "who was learned in all the wisdom of the Egyptians," who was chosen for this office; and later, when Jesus called an apostle who was to stand for Him before the kings of earth and the wise men of the world, it was the polished, cultured Paul who was favored and not the untutored fishermen of the Sea of Gallilee. The woodman with a sharp axe can do more and easier work than another with a dull blade. The educated mind, used and guided by the spirit of God, can expose evil and reveal truth quicker than a sluggish brain which has to laboriously plod its weary way along.

A few years of well spent time in a good college, or in the Southern Theological Seminary, will prepare a young man better for service than many years in home study, delving alone and unaided. "Wisdom is the principal thing; therefore get wisdom and with all thy getting get understanding." Prov. iv: 7.

Report on Sunday Schools. We regard the Bible or Sunday school as a co-worker with the church in training the young people in the knowledge of the work of God. It is used also as a mission opportunity and as an evangelizing medium, the importance of which should concern all Christians. We notice that there are several churches in the bounds of this Association that report no Sunday schools. We recommend and urge that these churches renew their efforts and organize in Sunday school work, as we consider a live working Sabbath school a very valuable and important acquisition to a church. We realize that the work in the Sunday school is very often retarded because of the unnecessary and uncalled-for indifference on the part of church members. This should not prevail and we do hope and trust that the members of churches destitute of Sunday schools will take new courage to win and organize at the very earliest opportunity. Report on Temperance. We thank our heavenly Father that temperance has become a matter of profound consideration among all considerate and Christian people. We recommend that it be the great consideration of the churches until victory cries aloud in our nation, "Total prohibition."

Discussed by Brethren J. E. Black, J. C. Poppell, I. W. Pinholster and R. H. Green and adopted.

Report on Home Missions. We, your Committee, beg leave to report the following: The Home Mission Board, located at Atlanta, Ga., with B. D. Gray as the corresponding secretary, is now as always, steadily going forward in its great work. The field of the Home Board embraces the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention in the United States, Cuba and Mexico. Its work is to give support to the weaker states in maintaining the cause in places where the harvest is great and the laborers few. In the mountain districts of the South, on the frontier of the West and in the destitute places of our rapidly growing cities the Home Board is pressing the work along with a strong hand. Assistance is given weak and struggling churches in building houses of worship and supporting the ministers where the work is important and the local Baptists are not financially able to support the boards of missions. This work is done in most of the states in co-operation with the state boards of missions. The Jacksonville Association furnishes an example of how the Home Board may help a struggling church at a critical hour and strengthen the cause for all time. The board gave liberal and timely assistance to the Baptists of Jacksonville, Tampa, Pensacola and other cities in helping to erect houses of worship where they could not build by themselves. The work of the Home Board in Cuba is placed upon a better basis and we may confidently expect great things from the work on that beautiful island.

We must show our appreciation by giving if we would grow stronger by receiving. We cannot expect much from the churches of our Association, but each church ought to give something to this great and good work.

Upon motion G. A. Blount, J. C. Poppell, R. H. Green, F. C. Edwards and A. J. Pinholster were elected Messengers to the State Convention.

Report on Orphanage. We, your Committee, submit the following: That we hold the orphanage one of the noblest institutions of God established on earth. The orphanage is the home and training school of the fatherless of our country. In that home the orphans are brought up in the fear and admonition of the Lord, fitted and prepared to meet their life's work. The home needs supplies; they need things in the home just as we need them in our homes. They need provisions to eat, clothes to wear, books to study and tools to work with on the farm.

We are pleased to know that Baptists of Florida are taking such an interest in the home as they are. Let us give more freely to the support of those who cannot help themselves.

Discussed by F. L. Colson and J. H. Bostick. Adopted. Elder Kickliter read part of Matt. x and preached from the words, "When thou art converted strengthen thy brethren."

Afternoon.

The Association convened at 1:15. Scripture reading by the Moderator and prayer by Elder Blount. The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That a vote of thanks is hereby returned to the membership of the Lawtey Baptist church and the citizens of the town and surrounding county for their generosity to delegates and ministers during this session of the Association.

Report on Foreign Missions. We, your Committee on Foreign Missions, report the following: The time has come among Christian people when the righteousness of foreign missions is hardly seriously questioned by men who have taken the trouble to honestly and accurately inform themselves on the Scriptural basis of foreign mission work, the Scriptural requirement to preach the Gospel to all nations, and the results of foreign mission work. The millions of more Christians in India and the hundreds of thousands among other nations, an absolutely unanswerable argument in favor of obeying the command to go into all the world and an unmistakable evidence of our Lord's endorsement of the work. If the Lord had not ordained that the heathen should be saved through the "foolishness of preaching," the Gospel, surely he would not have so gloriously honored the preaching of the Gospel among the heathens. With the command of God upon us and the result of foreign mission work before us no Christian can honestly and conscientiously oppose foreign mission work.

We greatly rejoice at the progress of the work. Nations which only a few years ago were closed against the Gospel are today wide open to the messengers of the cross. China, the great closed empire in the East for so many centuries, is now not only open, but has actually issued an edict allowing the Bible in her common schools, and from high sources contributions have been made to Christian work. What is true in China is true with other nations and will be true with still more in the near future. Moreover, there are encouraging signs at home. Gifts to foreign missions by many of the great denominations are increasing from year to year. The number of those who are offering themselves for the foreign field is constantly growing. The people are studying missions and praying for missions as never before. A great campaign is being planned to continue for the middle of this month until the last of May next whose purpose it is to touch every phase of church life and work of all the great evangelical denominations, instruct them in the work and needs of foreign missions and enlist them for actual systematic service. Nearly all the foreign mission organizations have adopted as their motto, "To evangelize the world in this generation." And it looks as if some of us may have the glorious privilege of seeing that ideal fulfilled. The Saviour tells us there shall be a sign of his coming to judge the nations. Shall we have a part in that glorious work? And shall we be found faithful when that day shall come?

In view of the above we recommend, first, that the pastors of this Association diligently provide themselves with literature concerning foreign missions. Tracts can be had from the Foreign Mission Board at Richmond, Va., for the asking. The Foreign Missionary Journal can be had from the same source for 35 cents per year. The Florida Baptist Witness is essential in every live cause enacted by the pastor as a medium of information as to what is expected of us in Florida. Second, we also recommend that every pastor in the Association do all in his power to instruct his people in the work of foreign missions. Third, that every pastor urge his people to make at least one contribution to foreign missions during the year, sending the contributions to Rev. S. B. Rogers, Gainesville, Fla., and making record of it on the church book so that it will be in the associational minutes to the credit of the church making it. Fourth, that the Association undertake to raise the amount which the Foreign Board asks us to raise for foreign missions and that the executive committee be instructed to apportion the amount between the several churches according to their ability to give and that the churches be earnestly requested to assume these amounts. Report of Executive Committee. To the New River Baptist Association at Lawtey Baptist church assembled: Grace be to you and peace from God our

Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ. I herewith submit the following report: On November 2d, 1908, I instructed Bro. F. L. Colson to have the minutes of the Association printed and draw on the Treasurer for amount to pay for same.

The Executive Committee met in Starke February 29th to consider the employment of a missionary to labor in the bounds of the New River and the Santa Fe Associations, and there being no report from the Santa Fe Association I was instructed to ascertain their decision. A meeting was called at Waldo, but there was not sufficient attendance to have a meeting and the question of employment of a missionary was deferred. Upon motion the Association was ordered to pay Bro. L. W. Kiehlter \$8 as expense to the State Board. The several churches were notified of Elder Damon's ill health and an appeal was made to them to assist him, and Elders F. C. Edwards and F. B. Johns were elected as a distributing committee and on September 15th I reserved \$4 from Long Branch church for him. Upon motion Elder Damon was given \$15 and the State Mission Board \$20 and Columbia College \$6 of associational funds. I also received \$2 from Hope church for Elder Damon's relief and New River church also responded. At your last meeting the Moderator was instructed to appoint the chairmen of the various committees at least two weeks before the sitting of the body, and on September 23d I appointed as chairman on foreign missions F. C. Edwards, J. J. Clark and L. L. Sapp, Jr.; on home mission, L. W. Kiehlter, L. L. Sapp and Henry Ben- nance, James Strickland, J. E. Black, W. A. Jones and Enoch Griffis; on temper- ance, M. W. Lee, D. J. Byrd and James Silcox; on women's work, Harry Lewis, Mrs. Mary Edwards, Mrs. J. C. Poppell and Mrs. Laura Scott; on orphanage, W. H. Pinholster, F. L. Colson and W. A. Bragg; ministerial education, G. A. Blount and James Godwin; on periodicals, J. C. Poppell, Raleigh Britt and A. J. Pinholster; on finance, F. L. Colson, J. L. Warren, Arthur Starling, James Hornsby; aged ministers, S. Godwin, L. R. Prevatt and James Strickland; obituaries, D. L. Phillips, J. E. Black and Philip Crosby; on pastors and deacons, J. F. Kiehlter and R. R. Prevatt; on programs, D. W. Pinholster, Henry Bennett, J. M. Johns and R. H. Green. Since your body insist on the appointment of these chairmen before your meeting, I would urge upon the several churches to furnish the Mod- erator with names of the messengers of each church, so that the chairmen may be readily appointed. Mrs. Scott read 103d Psalm and Miss Spalding, the Corresponding Secretary of the W. B. M. U. of Florida, offered prayer. Mrs. J. C. Poppell, of Starke, read a letter from Dr. Willingham. Miss Spalding read the report from the Starke W. M. S., the only society in the Association representing Mrs. F. C. Edwards reported for the Sunbeam Band a membership of 18 and contributions \$7.25 for benevolence. Miss Spalding then addressed the meeting explaining the several grades of missionary societies, and recommended that each society strive to be an "A" society. The meeting adjourned with prayer by Miss Spalding.

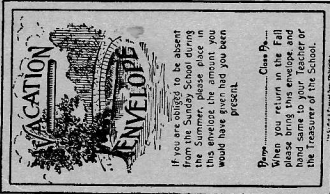
A Trip to Palestine

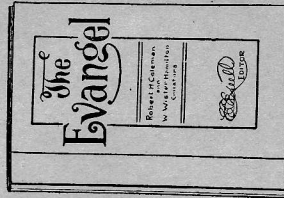
