WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 17TH, 1928

The Fifty-Seventh Annual Session of the New River Association convened with Wateroak Church, 11 a. m.

After singing and prayer by Rev. G. P. Raymond, it was mutually agreed between Rev. R. W. Bugg, the regular appointee and Rev. Hobson, that the latter should preach the introductory sermon, which he did in a very able and pleasing manner from Matthew, 28th chapter. Dr. Hobson is a member of State Board of Missions; he also represents Stetson University.

1:30 p. m. Moderator read from 85th Psalm and prayer was offered by Bro. Plummer. Moderator declared Association in order.

Roll call of churches was suspended and the time was given over for one hour to Bro. W. G. Upchurch, secretary of laymen's work, who made a splendid talk on this part of the work.

Chas. A. Powers, a deacon in the First Baptist Church, of Jacksonville, was present and asked for time to speak,

which was granted. He took occasion to make a political speech for Mr. Hoover for president, which was not well received by all present, as we believe in adhering to the article in our church decorum, which reads as follows:

Members of this church are admonished to refrain from discussing social, political or religious issues that may reflect discredit upon the church or cause dissention among the brethren.

The Moderator appointed the following as a committee on Finance: H. M. McRae, J. S. Norman, J. T. Harris.

Committee on Digest of Letters: Rev. Kickliter, Rev. Raymond and J. A. Morgan.

It was regular moved and carried that the delegates now enrolled and those that may come in later constitute the body of this Association.

Election of officers was then taken up and resulted in the election of Rev. J. L. Norris Moderator; Bro. D. W. Moore, Clerk and Treasurer for the ensuing year.

THURSDAY MORNING

10 o'clock. Association came to order by Moderator reading 3rd chapter 1st John and prayer by Bro. Hemingway.

Committee on Christian Education made their report, which was adopted as read, after being discussed by Rev. Proctor and Rev. Raymond.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Brother Moderator:

We your Committee on Christian Education, respectfully submit the following report:

First, we wish to emphasize the importance of the place that

the home occupies in the religious training and education of our children and young people.

Second, that the church is God's own teaching force and cannot delegate its responsibility that lies upon it in giving the great commission—when the Master commanded them that they should "teach all things whatsoever I have commanded you."

While we are in full sympathy with all that is being done for the training of our young people, we do insist that it should be done under the direction of the church.

Third, the school; we insist that the greatest possible care should be taken in the selection and training of the children, and young people, and that if they are to receive a Christian education, we must place them in Christian schools.

Your committee most respectfully recommends to our Baptist people in Florida—Stetson University, as a great Christian school in every way the equal of the best.

REPORT ON TEMPERANCE

We your committee see the evil of intemperance, and are becoming more manifest with time, and the efforts to control the same. What was once indulged in without thought of evil has shown itself to be a deadly monster. This statement will prove to be true of all intemperance. At last it biteth like a serpent, and stings like an adder. This has especially proven to be true of the evil of intoxicating drinks. While it was once indulged in without thought of harm, every effort to control it has shown its baleful influence. When recognized to be injurious to both the participant and the public, it fortified itself with the law. When the law was invoked against it, it becomes a violator of the law. Today we have an outlawed evil which lives only through its friends. These friends are those who manufacture it; those who dispense it; those who imbibe it, and those who condone it. In fact it lives through the influence of its sympathizers.

It is being recognized that to enforce the prohibition law men must be elected to office who personally approve and keep this law from standpoint of conviction and principle.

Hoping that our Association will stand for prohibition.

Committee on Foreign Missions made their report. Rev. Raymond spoke to this report. Rev. Proctor discussed this report and same was adopted as read.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

A single sentence from the lips of Jesus produced greater results than any other single sentence which ever fell from the lips of man. This was the sentence—"Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature."

In all the lands of earth, men have put millions upon millions of dollars into their obedience to that command. Tens of thousands of the choicest young men and young women our Christian homes and Christian colleges could produce have gone out facing exile, hardships, peril, for the rest of their days in obedience to that command. They went out to give their lives to people whom they had never seen, whose names they did not know, whose language they could not as yet speak—but, whose needs they had made their own in warmest sympathy, because Jesus said, "Go."

The church of Jesus Christ was founded as a missionary enterprise. It was not intended to stand still, but to "go". It was not intended to be self-contained but to make disciples "and baptize them in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost." It is the essence of Christianity that it is an advancing, conquering religion. The church is the body in which the spirit of Christ is to live and work. The spirit of Christ is missions. When that spirit wanes the church is sick. When that spirit dies the church expires.

Our Southern Baptist membership, 1927, 3,765,001. We gave to missions, last year, \$7,900,000; but we gave in 1921, \$14,037,000. Our Foreign Mission Board has a debt of \$1,145,729. 1,275 churches on our mission stations give \$3.30 per member; 146,072 members—12,542 baptized last year.

In 1925 we had 544 missionaries; since then 72 resigned and six died. A net loss of 50 missionaries in 3 years. 176 missionaries now at home, sick and no funds.

Foreign Mission Board has been in existence 83 years. The secretary, Dr. J. F. Love, died May 3 last. Through his prolific pen and public addresses he sounded in the ears of Southern Baptists a clarion call to worldwide evangelization. By his wise council in conference on the fields of the Orient, South America, Europe and the Near East he brought re-assurance and renewed devotion to the missionaries. His unwavering faithfulness to Gospel truths increased loyalty to them wherever he went. His zeal for the spread of the gospel was so unflagging that he pressed on without stint of time and physical strength until he lay exhausted and prone in death. He served the Board from 1914 to his death, 1928.

Fifty young people now ready to go to foreign fields but no funds.

It is an open confession to the world that we are failing in our duty. Out there, there is always hope and victory. Success on all fields in spite of drawbacks on account of political conditions in many lands; clouds lifting from China. Chinese Christians and pastors were faithful and heroic. 28 main stations of our board in China returning to stations and finding churches welcoming them back. We should be true to China and to Christ.

In Roumania, Feb. 1, 1928 God granted Baptists full liberty of teaching and treatment on equal footing with all citizens. 4,268 baptisms last year, the largest number of baptisms ever reported in any year from any one of our fields. Membership there 36,928, largest membership in any country where our board is operating.

In Nigeria, Africa, our mission has grown remarkably. It now ranks third in Number of baptisms. Their older churches send out missionaries far and wide.

In Latin America to south of us, ripe for harvest; 2,925 baptisms in Brazil. We have missions in Mexico, Brazil, Uruguay, Argentina and Chile. Wide open to immigration and freest land in world. We should pour the Gospel into this vast melting pot of all nationalities.

First church of Rio de Janeiro dedicated January 1, 1928, cost \$150,000, best of any evangelistic denomination. This church was organized in 1884 by Dr. Babgy with 4 members. One evening he was preaching to an almost empty house when Francis Soven strolled in from the streets—words haunted him until he gave heart to Christ. Became pastor in 1900.

Jugo-Slovia began 7 years ago; 4 language groups baptized 97. Gospel is news to them.

Mexico—sorrowful retrenchments on all fields. Six schools

closed, native helpers discharged; Miss Cox and Miss Long returned to States.

Palestine, Jerusalem—J. W. Watts and wife, Miss Clor Church dedicated at Nazareth.

New church built in Jerusalem, house and church combined. Mr. J. F. Easley of Plainwell, Mich., gave money to build this as memorial to his son. Discouraging.

Chairman of Executive Committee made a verbal report to Association. Report adopted.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Executive Committee met at Starke soon after the last Association and went over the situation, and decided to adopt a budget of \$2500.00, which was apportioned among the churches, and secretary was instructed to notify the clerks of the churches of the Association.

We are sorry to have to report that the response from the churches have not been what we expected. We are pleased to report Corinth church 100 per cent. Others have done nobly. Lawley church 100 per cent on Dyal fund. Beulah church 100 per cent on Dyal fund. We have one month more before the books close. Let us hope that all our churches will be able to do their part for the co-operative program, which is a Bible program.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

We your committee on Sunday Schools, ask to make the following report:

Out of the seventeen churches reported, only ten have Sunday Schools, leaving seven without Sunday Schools.

We are glad to report the ten to have 692 pupils, showing an increase of 197 over last year. We are glad that it is an increase and not a decrease, which shows that the good work still goes on. Some of the churches having no Sunday School, are co-operating with other churches, which is nice, and we recommend that the messengers from the various churches encourage this idea, that all may become connected with some Sunday School work.
