

CONSTITUTION OF THE NEW RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association, and shall be composed of accredited messengers who are members of constituted churches, and of such others as may be invited to a seat by the consent of the body.

Article 2. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty members. Any church wishing to sever its connection with this body may be allowed to do so upon an application duly made to the Association while in session, and a letter granted thereon. All members of standing committees shall be honorary members of this Association.

Article 3. Churches are expected to send with their messengers letters to the Association, containing an account of their state, particularly of the additions and dimunitions of the past year, and other statistics of interest, together with full statistics of the Sunday Schools under their charges. The letters should show what churches are doing for the cause of Christ at home and abroad, and generally whatever relates to their own peace and prosperity; and with them each church should forward money for the printing of the minutes, and also their contributions for missions.

Article 4. Baptist churches desiring admission into this body shall petition by letter and messengers, and on giving satisfactory evidence of their being sound in their faith of the Gospel, and correct in practice, may be received by a vote of the Association; and the Moderator, in behalf of fellowship.

- Article 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, a Clerk, and a Treasurer, who shall be chosen by separate ballots, and shall continue in office until others are chosen and discharge the duties usually incumbent upon such officers.
- Section 2. There shall be an Executive Committee, which shall be composed of seven members; the Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer of the Association being members and officers ex-officio, the other five members to be elected by the Association.
- Article 6. We acknowledge the independence of particular churches, and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association, and therefore we would disclaim all power of making laws for them under any pretext whatever, but deem it our duty to disown any church that we may consider unworthy of our fellowship.
- Article 7. This Association will be governed while in session by regular and proper rules and every motion made and seconded shall command attention to the body unless withdrawn by the mover.
- Article 8. Every question asked in the letters from the churches must be based on Scriptures, and may relate to faith, practice and church discipline, but the same shall not be taken under consideration except by a majority vote of the body.
- Article 9. Churches composing this Association shall be entitled to as many copies of the minutes of its proceedings as the money sent up with the letters calls for, but each constituent church shall have at least one copy.

Article 10. When a church shall neglect to make a communication to the Association for at least three years it shall be considered as having withdrawn and shall be dropped by a vote from the minutes, unless two or three members of the Association request its continuance and will engage to inquire into its standing and report at the next meeting of the Association.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Association, from time to time, to suggest to the churches what they think most expedient to be done to promote the spread of the Gospel in the world, and to give the best advice possible in cases of difficulty, and to inquire into the cause of failure on the part of any church to report itself by letter and messenger at the annual meeting.

Article 12. This Association, when convenient, shall appoint the time and place of next annual meeting-taking into account the convenience of the churches and the interest of the cause. This Constitution may be altered from time to time as experience may suggest, by two-thirds vote of those present.

MINUTES

OF THE

NEW RIVER BAPTIST ASSOCIATION WHICH CONVENED WITH

HEILBRONN BAPTIST CHURCH, OCTOBER 16-17, 1935

Wednesday, October 16

9:30 A. M.—"Have Thine Own Way Lord" was sung by the congregation after which Brother C. W. Wilkes led in prayer.

Brother E. C. Johns read the 3rd Chapter of Jonah and led in Devotional exercises.

9:50 A. M.—The Association was called to order by the Moderator for the transaction of business. The roll of churches was called and organization perfected.

It was moved and carried that the Association proper be composed of the delegates now enrolled and also those that should be enrolled during the session.

A motion was made requiring the session to adopt the program prepared by the Program Committee. The motion was adopted.

It was moved and carried that the Moderator and Clerk be elected by ballot. Rev. F. M. Taylor led in a short prayer for divine guidance in selection of officers. Brethren J. T. Quigley and T. B. Pinholster were re-elected Moderator and Clerk respectively.

The Moderator called for Petitionary Letters. Bethel Baptist Church presented a letter asking to be admitted into the Association. The letter was held over for further consideration by a special committee composed of all the pastors of the Association and one layman from each church. This committee is requested to make investigations and recom-

mendations and report at the next session of the Association. Rev. J. L. Norris was elected chairman of the committee.

11:00 A. M.—Rev. C. A. Crosby read Matt. 7:13-28, 1st. Cor. 3:11, Isaiah 28:16, and preached an inspiring sermon on "A Sure Foundation."

12:00 M.—Refreshments served on the grounds.

1:30 P. M.—Brother J. R. Neal read the 28 Psalm and led in Devotional Exercises.

Brethren G. E. Cutshaw and C. W. Wilkes were welcomed into the Association as new pastors.

Brethren J. A. Godwin, Moderator of Black Creek Association and M. T. Knight, pastor of Highland Baptist Church were welcomed as visitors from a sister Association.

1:45 P. M.—After an additional roll call of the churches the letters from the different churches were read. All the churches except Dedan and Graham presented letters. The Associational clerk will try to secure the two omitted letters so that the record will be more complete.

The Moderator appointed the following committees: "Nominating"—L. G. Hemingway, C. H. Neal, J. S. Norman; "Sunday School"—E. C. Johns, J. T. Norris, Arch Prevatt; "Our Dead"—J. T. Norris, Mrs. L. L. Conner, Mrs. J. T. Quigley.

3:15 P. M.—The report on "Foreign Missions" by Starke Church was read by Rev. C. B. Price and adopted.

Rev. G. E. Cutshaw read the report on "State Missions." The report was adopted.

At this time Brother J. T. Quigley made an oral report relative to the "Brotherhood" work. The report was adopted.

3:30 P. M.—Adjourned to meet again Thursday A. M. at 9:45 o'clock.

Thursday, October 17

9:45 A. M.—Brother L. L. Conner, the regular appointee on the program being absent, upon motion Rev. L. G. Hem-

ingway was appointed to lead in Devotional Exercises. Brother Hemingway read for a lesson the 10th Chapter of Romans.

10:00 A.M.—Brother J. T. Barnes made a short oral report relative to "Home Missions." The report was adopted.

At this time Brother L. G. Hemingway made an oral report on local mission work.

The "Temperance" report by Ward City Church was read and adopted.

The report on the "Orphanage" by Raiford Church was read and adopted. C. H. Hunter, L. G. Hemingway and L. A. Brown made short talks relative to our orphanage work.

11:00 A. M.—Rev. J. L. Norris read for a lesson the last six verses of the 7th Chapter of Mark. His subject was "The Opening of the Soul." He made a strong appeal for our cooperative work.

12:00 M.—Refreshments served on the grounds.

1:30 P. M.—Brother C. L. Carter led in Devotional Exercises after which Brother Quigley, the Moderator, made a short talk relative to his position or stand on or cooperative work.

2:00 P. M.—The report on "Aged Ministers" was read and adopted. This report was presented by Kingsley Lake Church.

The "W. M. U." report was read and adopted.

The Moderator appointed the following annual committee: "Program"—L. G. Hemingway, L. L. Conner, G. E. McGauley; "Home Missions"—J. R. Neal, R. D. Bevis, J. T. Harris; "State Missions"—J. E. Newton, J. T. Barnes, C. A. Crosby; "Foreign Missions"—C. W. Wilkes, C. H. Hunter, Mrs. Crews; "Aged Ministers"—J. L. Norris, T. B. Pinholster, L. A. Brown; "Temperance"—C. B. Price, J. F. Kickliter, J. H. Pitts; "Orphanage"—H. B. Arwood, J. S. Austin, G. E. Cutshaw.

The "Nominating Committee" made the following report and recommendation: "Executive Committee"—The Modera-

tor and Clerk Tully Norman, A. J. Thomas, E. C. Johns, G. E. Cutshaw, J. S. Austin. Member of the State Board—J. T. Quigley. Messengers to the State Convention—C. W. Wilkes, C. H. Hunter, J. T. Harris, T. B. Pinholster, J. T. Barnes. Messenger to Southern Baptist Convention—J. L. Norris. Introductory sermon by the pastor of the entertaining church. The report was adopted.

It was moved and carried that a page in our minutes be dedicated to the memory of "Our Honored Dead."

The Treasurer's report was read and adopted.

Upon motion, the treasurer was authorized to present to Raiford Church \$25.00 on its building fund.

Several of the churches called for the next session of the Association. Upon motion the invitation from Antioch Church was accepted.

After extending a vote of thanks to the entertaining church the session adjourned to convene with Antioch Baptist Church Wednesday before the third Sunday in October 1936.

FOREIGN MISSION REPORT

Foreign Missions are very near to the heart of Southern Baptists and since the organization of the Foreign Mission Board on August 4, 1845 cur people have labored to bring the message of Christ to all parts of the earth. During these ninety years of Kingdom service the Board has always been faithful to its task and its plans and policies have been constructive. In recent years, because of economic conditions, a policy of retrenchment has been followed, but the past year shows that our people are ready to go forward once more in this great work.

It is not the purpose of this report to present a maze of statistics, which in many instances, are worthless, but to give just those figures which will measure the strength and growth of the work which is so close to our heart.

The following is taken from the report of the Foreign Mission Poard given at the Southern Baptist Convention in Memphis, Tenn., May 1935, and cover the calendar year of 1934:

We have on the Foreign Field (13 countries):

377 Missionaries and 836 ordained native workers.

There are 2,728 churches with a membership of 204,894.

2,386 Bible schools caring for 106,734 pupils.

During the year of 1934 there were 17,784 baptisms.

We maintain 266 schools, of which 5 are colleges, accommodating 20,856 pupils. There are also 12 theological schools.

Following the Great Commission our people maintain 23 hospital buildings (590 beds) and for the year of 1934 cared for 117,412 pa-

tients. 232,501 Testaments were distributed in the hospitals during the year.

As we ponder over these figures we can thank God that we have had a small part in this great enterprise.

In closing we wish to report that the debt on the board has been greatly reduced during the year. The Lottie Moon Offering, the goal of which was \$150,000, far surpassed these figures to reach a total of \$213.576.33.

Such response on the part of our people give us every reason to believe that God will continue to bless the work of Southern Baptists.

STATE MISSION REPORT FOR 1935

For more than fifty years our State Mission Board has labored to bring all material interests of our Beloved state into subjection to Christ. Christ said with the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, and in His Power, that we should be his Witnesses "both in Jerusalem and in all Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Thus we have scriptural authority for every phase of our Mission Work.

We now have listed in Florida 820 White Missionary Baptist Churches. During the past year 562 of these churches made contributions to the work of our denomination, leaving 258 churches which did not contribute through the Cooperative Program.

The State Mission Board depends for its income on three resources, namely; the 32% allocated to the State Work through the Cooperative Program; the special appropriation made to Florida by the Sunday School Board; and the special gifts made to State Missions during October by the women in their week of Prayer, and the Sunday Schools on the last day of the month. The Board received from these three sources last year \$53,166.00, for carrying on its work within the state.

This year our State Board is assisting in the support of 67 Missionary Pastors, one full time missionary, five other special workers, a state evangelist, and several pastors in special revival meetings. These pastors and workers have preached to ninety small and weak churches.

Florida Baptists gave last convention year to all causes \$145,-391.64.

FLORIDA BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOME

At the beginning of the Associational year of 1935, we had 141 children in our Institution. The average for 1934-35 was 143. We have received in the Home 10 children and discharged 11. The applications of children, especially from half crphans is more than doubled this summer as compared with last. We have had many very sad cases of half orphans brought to our attention but the funds that we receive makes it impossible to assist them. It is our hope that we will be able to do a better part by our distressed children who have a parent living than we have done. The need for work in this field is very urgent. The children we have placed have gone to relatives or to school. Some have secured a job. It has been very hard for the last three years to place our older children because of the scarcity of positions. We have kept in constant touch with business in this state and every time it was possible for us to do so, we have placed one or more of our children. We have requests all along that necessitate our making a place for the younger children of the State and increase the

turn over. This keeps us ever on the alert for places where our children can earn their living.

We have five children in Institutions of higher learning and one in training in a hospital. Four of the five in college are in Stetson in DeLand. This was made possible by Dr. Allen who has cooperated with the Home to the fullest extent in the education of its children. The Home is not paying one penny for college training of its children. This is done by friends over the State. It is impossible for us to assist a child after he finishes high school. All money sent to the Home is used for the Home and the children in the Home. If any money is sent for the higher education of any children in our Home, it must be designated.

The buildings have been improved. All dormitories, except one, have been painted. The paint was paid for by the W. M. U.'s of Florida and the boys in the Home did the work. They also repaired the buildings and as soon as the Nursery is finished and two of the dormitories are reroofed, our buildings will be in good condition.

This has been a very difficult year in our Home. The first of July—we had accumulated a deficit of \$1,642.03. "Our receipts for the first six months of this year as compared with the first six months of 1934 were \$2,337.66 less. Had our income been equal to that of 1934, we would have had a balance of approximately \$700.00. We believe this condition is attributed to the freeze in middle and south Florida as this is the source from which most of our income is received. It is unfortunate that our Institution receives its income from certain localities rather than state wide. If the cooperation of our Churches in Florida could be secured, there would never be any trouble about expenses.

The Sunday Schools give approximately half of our income. The Cooperative Program furnishes us with about 20% and the other is divided between individuals, W.M. U.'s and Churches.

The farm and dairy continue to play an important part in the cooperation of our Institution. Each showed a balance at the close of the year. It pays to operate each of them. They have a nice canning plant on their campus from which they received 19,680 cans this spring at a cost of less than one cent per can to the Home. They are

enlarging their farm this year expecting to can the vegetables they will receive next summer from the spring crop.

The school continues very satisfactorily under the supervision of the State and County. The teachers are paid by the State and the children above the third grade go to school in town while those through the first three grades go to school on our campus. The management of the Home is striving to improve the education of the children. They are taking advantage of every opportunity to see that our children are given an equal opportunity with others.

The support of the Home should be more general than it is. The cooperation should be closer. The responsibility of the Institution should fall on every Baptist in Florida. The power to continue the Home lies in the Baptist Churches in this State and it is very important that each Church do semething from time to time to protect its holdings and its children. Our Institution can never enlarge under the present support that it is now receiving. At times it is impossible to protect the investment that Baptists have made in our Home because of the lack of funds. This is an unwise procedure. If the cooperation of one half of the Churches and Sunday Schools can be secured, our Home can be filled to capacity and every item of expense could be paid monthly. With the calls of children coming to us as they now are, we believe that it is incumbent upon all to do something to aid our distressed children.

The Home is deeply grateful for the support given it—for the money and donations of farm produce that were so liberally given from the farming sections last year; they are profoundly grateful. It is the desire of those in charge of the Home to do more for the needy child-hood of our denomination and to give them a Christian home and Christian training and to see that they have every opportunity possible in life. Let us remember them with our gifts and our prayers, and may always be mindful of the value and importance of rearing children.

We, your Committee, wish to recommend that the Home be given more consideration in this Association and that we take more interest in our boys and girls whom we have accepted as our very own.
