CONSTITUTION OF THE NEW RIVER
BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

Article 1. This Association shall be known as the New River Missionary Baptist Association and shall be composed of accredited messengers who are members of constituted churches and of such others as may be invited to a seat by the consent of the body. An accredited messenger shall be one who has been duly elected by his church as a messenger or alternate. Others eligible, to be invited to a seat shall be members of the constituted churches, who may be enrolled to make a number equal to the quota allowed that church. All pastors of the churches in the Association shall be enrolled as messengers but only those holding membership in constituted churches of the Association shall be eligible for office.

Article 2. Each church in this Association shall be entitled to three messengers and one additional messenger for every twenty-five members in excess of fifty members. Any church wishing to sever its connection with this body may be allowed to do so upon an application duly made to the association while in session, and a letter granted thereon. All members of standing committees shall be honorary members of this association.

Article 3. Churches are expected to send with their messengers letters to the association, containing an account of their state, particularly of the additions and diminutions of the past year, and other statistics of interest, together with full statistics of the Sunday School under their charges. The letter should show what churches are doing for the cause of Christ at home and abroad, and generally whatever relates to their own peace and prosperity; and with them each church should forward money for the printing of the minutes and also for their contributions for missions.

Article 4. Baptist churches desiring admission into this body shall petition by letter and messengers, and on giving satisfactory evidence of their being sound in their faith of the Gospel, and correct in practice, may be received by a vote of the association; and the Moderator, in behalf of fellowship.

Article 5. The officers of this association shall be a Moderator, an Associate Moderator, a Clerk-Treasurer, each of whom shall be chosen by separate ballot. These officers shall be elected at the opening session of the annual meeting.

Article 5., Section 2. There shall be an Executive Committee which shall be composed of nine members. The Moderator, the Associate Moderator, the Clerk-Treasurer of the Association being members and officers ex-officio. The other six members to be named by the nominating committee of the association.

Article 6. We acknowledge the independence of particular churches, and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this association, and therefore we would disclaim all power of making laws for them under any pretext whatsoever, but deem it our duty to disown

any church that we may consider unworthy of our fellowship.

Article 7. This association will be governed while in session by regular and proper rules and every motion made and seconded shall command attention of the body unless withdrawn by the mover.

Article 8. Every question asked in the letters from the churches must be based on Scriptures, and may relate to faith, practice and church discipline, but the same shall not be taken under consideration except by a majority vote of the body.

Article 9. Churches composing this association shall be entitled to as many copies of the minutes of its proceedings as the money sent up with the letters call for, but each constituent church shall have at least one copy.

Article 10. When a church shall neglect to make a communication to the association for at least three years it shall be considered as having withdrawn and shall be dropped by a vote from the minutes, unless two or three members of the association request its continuance and will engage to inquire into its standing and report at the next meeting of the association.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the association, from time to time, to suggest to the churches what they think most expedient to be done to promote the spread of the Gospel in the world, and to give the best advice possible in case of difficulty, and to inquire into the cause of failure on the part of any church to report itself by letter and messenger at the annual meeting.

Article 12. This association, when convenient, shall appoint the time and place of next annual meeting—taking into account the convenience of the churches and the interest of the same. This constitution may be altered from time to time as experience may suggest by two-thirds vote of those present, but notice of such change shall be given at the annual session previous to the anticipated change.

10:00 A. M.—Brother S. E. Sparks was elected Moderator of the Association and Truby Pinholster was elected Assistant Moderator.

A. Russell Norman was elected Clerk and Treasurer.

10:10 A. M.—The Association welcomed the following visitors: G. W. Wear and wife and Mrs. G. E. Cutshaw.

10:15 A. M.—Frank Norman, Waterloo Church, read the report on Home Missions. The report was adopted.

10:25 A. M.—An oral report on Foreign Missions was given by Rev. G. E. Cutshaw. The report was adopted.

10:35 A. M.—Rev. S. E. Sparks read the report on Christian Education. It was adopted.

10:50 A. M.—The report by Brooker Church on Relief and Annuity Board was read by T. B. Pinholster and adopted.

11:00 A. M.—Rev. L. D. Haines made an oral report on the Cooperative Program. The report was adopted.

It was moved and seconded that the application to the Committee on Ministerial Education for John L. Bray be approved.

11:05 A. M.—Mrs. T. M. Johns of Arcadia gave a report on the Children's Home. The report was adopted.

11:15 A. M.—The Finance Committee reported that 18 of the churches in the Association had presented letters and also funds presented amounted to \$70.50. (The 19th church presented its letter and funds of \$3.00 to the clerk after the Association had met.)

11:25 A. M.—Special music was given by the Southland Harmony Quartet.

11:30 A. M.—A missionary sermon was given by Rev. Dewey Mann. A special free will offering was taken. The offering amounted to \$38.78.

12:15 P. M.—Adjournment—Lunch served by the church.

1:30 P. M.—Rev. Truby Parrish led in devotions.

1:40 P. M.—Brother C. A. Halcomb made an oral report on the Brotherhood and the good our Brotherhood is to our church. He also explained the need of music in our churches.

2:00 P. M.—Mrs. H. L. Hough gave the report on the W.M.U. This was adopted.

2:15 P. M.—Oral reports on Social Service were given by Rev. L. D. Haines, Rev. C. F. Hooker, and C. C. Harris. These reports were adopted.

2:30 P. M.—We your committee on "Resolutions" recommend the following: 1st—That we cooperate with each other in all of our associational work; 2nd—That we cooperate with our State Board in all of its activities; 3rd—That we resolve that our Association go on record as opposing the manufacture and sale of all alcoholic beverages; 4th—That we as Christians put forth every effort possible to see that our alcoholic laws are properly enforced and new laws passed where need be; 5th—That our churches create within them a clean wholesome and Christian entertainment for their young people; 6th—That the host church be extended a rising vote of thanks for its hospitality for this day.

REPORT ON THE RELIEF AND ANNUITY BOARD OF THE SOUTHERN BAPTIST CONVENTION 1946

I. RELIEF

The amazing growth of the Ministers Retirement Plan, promising a new day for multiplied thousands of our Southern Baptist preachers, has not led the Board to the conclusion that there is no longer a need for our relief department. Such a conclusion would be not only erroneous, but greatly disastrous, for there are other thousands who are today, or will become in after years, dependent on the relief grants of this Board for even a modicum of comfort and ease.

There is now, and there shall continue to be, need for a strong relief department for many, many years.

Our funds for this needful work come to the Board from three main sources: (1) Earned income of relief reserves; (2) Cooperative Program receipts; (3) Fellowship offerings from the churches, together with special gifts and legacies. For some years now in the Southern Baptist Convention Calendar of Activities, provision has been made for a consideration by all the churches of the work and needs of the Relief and Annuity Board, and provision has been made for special offerings in all churches during the month of April for ministerial relief. Also, many churches take a special offering for our aged ministers at least once each year in connection with the Lord's Supper.

II. ANNUITIES

In the several annuity plans of the Relief and Annuity Board there are now enrolled some 13,000 ministers and other persons employed in denominational service. There were reported 1742 monthly beneficiaries of these plans at the close of 1945. All pastors and employed lay workers of our churches may and should avail themselves of the benefits of these contributory retirement plans. The Widows Supplemental Annuity Plan, in operation in South Carolina since July 1, 1945, has already been, or will soon be, started in all the states. Let our preachers and other male employed workers ask their state executive secretary for informing literature concerning this plan.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION FOR 1946

CHURCHES PAID IN FULL

Our records show that 132 churches have accepted quotas and paid them in full. Their gifts total \$93,311.34. Many of these churches have not only paid up in full their quotas, but are now carrying Stetson in

their budgets and are making monthly payments.

OTHER CONTRIBUTING CHURCHES

378 churches have paid \$198,106.56 into the Campaign. Many of these churches have accepted definite quotas and are paying by the month, while others have made a cash offering.

CHURCHES YET TO REPORT

We are waiting to hear from 330 churches that so far have not shared in the Campaign.

TOTAL FIGURES

We have not raised the \$1,000,000. We have received \$342,121.71. We have outstanding pledges amounting to \$259,000, making a total in cash and pledges of \$601,121.71.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

THE CHALLENGE FOR HOME MISSIONS IN OUR DAY

Dr. J. B. Lawrence, secretary of the Home Mission Board, says: "The strategic point of approach to this world task is the homeland. Keep the homeland evangelized and mobilized for service and we have the hope and the assurance of a world evangelization."

Dr. W. R. White in his "Re-Statement of Missions" says that world conditions have left a displaced and upset homeland, that Rome is going after the Negroes, that Russia is championing the cause of little nations, and that the challenge to Home Missions today to evangelize the homeland is great.

The man without a chance, underprivileged, cut off by language barriers, tenant farmers segregated by poverty, migrant workers, those in isolated sections, and those in congested city areas, Negroes, and others in our homeland, challenge the best there is in us. Home Missions must answer the challenge.

The spirit of the Home Mission Board is to "help where help is needed." Many of our strongest churches in the South were mission stations operated by the help of Home Missions in an earlier day. Many churches now helped by the Home Mission Board will grow into large and potent churches. A little help now means a great future for some community.

The Home Mission Board has work among Spanish-speaking Americans (Mexicans), Indians, French, Italians, Chinese, and other language groups. There are mission centers, city and rural missions, work among the deaf and among Negroes, Cuban missions, and work in Panama, Costa Rica, and the Canal Zone, in addition to miscellaneous special mission enterprises. The Home Mission Board sponsors work in 587 churches and missions and needs 327 more. It has 700 missionaries and workers and needs 389 more. It needs more than two million dollars for mission properties and over a million dollars a year for operation. The Board is

now housed in its own building at 161 Spring Street, N. W., Atlanta, Georgia.

Keep Home Missions vigorous as a good springboard for world evangelization.
